Town Hall Meeting Will Be Conducted By City Council Tuesday At Cisco High

A Town Hall meeting will be conducted by the Cisco City Council on Tuesday evening, November 1, for the purpose of acquainting citizens with the various factors involved in the November 19th city bond election. The meeting will be at the Cisco High School Auditorium at 7:00 p.m.

The bond election, now about three weeks away, will put before the voters three separate issues which would facilitate the city's compliance with a court order to construct a new wastewater (sewerage) treatment plant, and to supplement the already-approved improvements to the city's water distribution system.

Scheduled for attendance at the meeting are all members of the city council, the city manager, city secretary, and city engineers. The city employs the engineering firm of Jacob and Martin of Abilene. Mayor Eris Ritchie will preside and moderate the discussions.

In April of 1982, Cisco voters approved by a 2-1 margin the construction of a new water filtration plant, along with improvements to the city's water distribution system. In the same election, voters approved the construction of a new 10 inch sewer outfall line to alleviate an overloaded condition on the city's sewer lines, and they also approved \$300,000 towards the construction of a new wastewater (sewerage) treatment plant. This amount was projected to be approximately one-third of

the total funds that would be needed for a new sewerage treatment facility. At the time of the 1982 election, it was pointed out that the new sewer plant project would be dependent upon the city's receiving a grant funded through the Environmental Protection Agency for the remainder of the cost of the facility.

Shortly after the 1982 election, the city learned that the EPA grant program they planned to apply for had been discontinued, and that in its place was a more limited and much smaller-scale program. The city was also advised by state water authorities that Cisco's chances for receiving any sort of grant assistance at this time were very poor.

The city's wastewater plant problems were compounded when in August of this year the Texas Attorney General's office advised the city of their intentions to file a lawsuit in 91st District Court against the city for violations of their wastewater discharge permit. The suit charged the city with "Numerous and repeated" violations of its permit, citing 120 specific violations dating back to 1976, but with documents on record showing violations back to 1963.

The suit was initiated by the Texas Department of Water Resources, the state agency that had warned the city repeatedly for the past several years that wastewater improvements were mandatory and must be made. The civil penalties, or fines, that could have been imposed on the city were up to \$1000 per violation, or a total of \$120,000.

In view of the city's obviously poor position in the matter, the city negotiated an out-of-court settlement in the suit, with an agreed-upon fine of \$7000, with an additional \$7000 probated. But also a part of the settlement was the condition that the city build a new state-approved wastewater treat-

ment plant, beginning in 1984, and completing by 1985.

The city's engineers have estimated the cost of a new sewer plant to be \$875,000. Since \$300,000 has already been approved by the voters in 1982, the city is seeking approval in the November 19 election for obligating the city to the additional \$575,000 needed for the project, in view of the hoped-for grant no longer being a realistic possibility. The city still does plan to apply for a grant that would provide approximately one-half of the needed funds for the plant, but prospects for the grant have been described to the city as "slim to none". City officials pointed out that if the grant were by some means approved, then only approximately one-half of the \$575,000 would actually have to be obligated.

On the election ballot, the first issue will be for \$100,000 in Certificates of Obligation for the wastewater project, this amount to be combined with the \$300,000 approved in 1982, which funds would be repaid through increased monthly sewer charges. City

officials have stated that the monthly charge would be increased by about \$2.00 over present sewer rates. This would provide a total of \$400,000 towards the new sewer plant project.

The second item on the ballot will be for \$475,000 in General Obligation (Tax) Bonds for the wastewater project, providing the additional funding needed. This would be repaid by an increase in city ad valorem taxes of approximately 10 cents per \$100 valuation.

The third issue on the November 19 ballot will be for \$100,000 revenue bonds for water distribution system improvements. City officials have pointed out that approval of this \$100,000 issue is needed to supplement the funds approved in 1982 for the city's water distribution system. Voters okayed a total of \$1.45 million for the new water filtration plant and distribution system improvements in the previous election, and when bids were received in September of this year—it became evident that the approved funds were \$100,000

lower than needed for the complete projects.

Actually, according to city officials, the low bids received were almost exactly the amount of the already-approved funds, but the state requires a \$60,000 "contingency fund" on projects of this magnitude, which hopefully will never have to be used.

Another \$37,500 is needed for work on the old valves in the Lake Cisco dam, which had been unforeseen in 1982. "These additional funds will be necessary for us to have available in order to complete our new water system into one that will give Cisco a state-approved water supply," city spokesmen said.

The city council members have issued an "Open Letter" to the citizens of Cisco, urging them to attend the Town Hall Meeting, and also expressing complete unanimity in their collective belief that approval of the bond package is the only responsible action the city can take, in view of the court order. The letter appears elsewhere in this publication.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS OF CISCO

Dear Fellow Citizens of Cisco:

As most of you are aware, the City of Cisco is now under a court order to construct a new wastewater (sewerage) treatment plant. This court order, handed down in 91st District Court, is the result of a negotiated out-of-court settlement of a lawsuit which had been imminent. The lawsuit, originating with the Texas Department of Water Resources, was being prosecuted by the Attorney General's Office of the State of Texas. We were charged with numerous and repeated violations of our wastewater discharge permit, causing a hazard to the environment, with such violations being documented back to 1963. And repeated warnings had been given the city during the course of the past several years. The timing of the suit was very regrettable, as the city was finally in the process of seriously attempting to remedy the situation. Had the suit gone to court, it could have resulted in civil penalties (fines) against the city as high as \$120,000, as well as a court order to construct the new wastewater treatment plant.

Your mayor, city attorney, city manager, and two council members negotiated the out-of-court settlement. Please believe us when we state that the settlement reached was the best we could have possibly hoped to obtain. The fine we are having to pay, \$7000 plus \$318 interest, is very small compared to what it could well have been had it gone to court, not to mention legal costs. An additional \$7000 was probated, and we will not have to pay it if we construct the new wastewater treatment plant as stipulated in the court order.

In the April, 1982 bond election, voters of Cisco approved three issues—complete costs of a new 10" sewer outfall line to alleviate the overload on our sewer lines, complete costs of a new water filtration plant and substantial improvements to our water distribution system, and \$300,000 (approximately one-third of the estimated cost) towards a new wastewater treatment facility. At the time of the '82 election it was pointed out that this project would be dependent upon approval of an Environmental Protection Agency grant for the remainder of the cost of the wastewater project. Unfortunately, not long after the election, the grant program we planned to apply for was discontinued. At this time a smaller-scale grant program is in effect, but we have been advised that our chances of actually receiving a grant are "slim-to-none." Nevertheless, we are going ahead and applying, and if we are fortunate enough to be approved, we will not need to obligate the city for but approximately one-half of the funds proposed in the upcoming bond election. Again we must realistically emphasize, however, that our chances for the grant funds do not look good at this point.

The first project approved in 1982, the sewer outfall line, has been completed and is in use. Contracts have been awarded for the second project, the water filtration plant and water distribution system improvements. The approved funds were adequate for the first project. The approved funds were adequate for the water filtration/distribution projects except for a \$60,000 contingency fund required by the state plus some additional work needed on the old water valves in the dam. These two items are the reason for the \$100,000 water improvements issue on the November 19 election ballot. The other two issues on the ballot are for dividing the remaining cost of the wastewater treatment plant between ad valorem taxes and revenue from users of the sewer system, requiring a tax increase of approximately 10¢ per \$100 and \$2.00 increase in monthly sewer rates. The system of wastewater treatment to be funded by this bond issue is by far the most cost-effective to the city of any available system, not only in capital cost but in future operating costs.

You as citizens have been tremendously supportive of us as your city council. We want you to know that we have given hours and hours of careful study to these matters, over a considerable period of time. We feel that the only responsible action we can take is to urgently recommend to you the approval of the three issues in the November 19 election. We have no doubt but that the state means business in seeing to it that we have a safe, approved wastewater treatment facility. And we know that we need it. All seven of us on the council are completely in agreement in recommending your approval of the three issues to come before us on November 19.

We cordially invite you to attend the Town Hall Meeting at the Cisco High Auditorium on Tuesday evening, November 1, at which time these matters will be discussed in more detail, and your questions will be welcomed.

CHS Jr. Varsity Wins Over Hawley 26-23 Thursday

Cisco High School's Junior Varsity strengthened their district record to 4-2 here Thursday night as they defeated Hawley 26-23. Cisco is now 4-4 for the season.

The J.V. of Cisco scored first following a Hawley fumble recovery by Robert Rains at Cisco's own 37-yard line. On the first play, a handoff from quarterback John Gonzales, David Kearney raced for a 63-yard touchdown run. A pitchback to Kearney failed to gain any extra points making the score 6-0 with 6:33 left in the first quarter.

Hawley managed to add a touchdown of their own to the scoreboard as the timer buzzed to end the first half of play. Hawley scored on a six-yard pass play to the end zone. A pass for two extra points was good making the half-time score 8-6 in favor of Hawley.

On Cisco's first possession in the second half of play they started out on their own 36-yard line. Three plays later QB Gonzales completed a pass to James Berry who took the ball into the end zone for a 61-yard pass play. A pass to Dusty Deitiker in the end zone added two more points to the score giving

Cisco a 14-8 lead with 6:13 left in the third quarter of play.

Not to be outdone, Hawley received the ensuing kick-off from Cisco and raced back down the sideline for a 77-yard touchdown return. A kick for an extra point was good giving Hawley back the lead. With 5:54 left in the third quarter, the score was 15-14.

Cisco received Hawley's kick and started another scoring drive, this time from their own 39-yard line. Runs by QB Gonzales, Kearney and Shelby Nixon moved the ball to Hawley's 46 in three plays. A pass from QB Gonzales to Deitiker gained a 46-yard touchdown play with 3:47 left in the third quarter. An incomplete pass to Deitiker failed to gain any extra points making the score 20-15.

On Cisco's next possession of the ball, they put together another scoring drive which originated on their own 27-yard line. Runs by Steve Abbott, QB Gonzales, Nixon, Kearney and Michael Wester moved the ball to Hawley's 14-yard line in 12 plays. Passes were also completed during the drive to Abbott and Deitiker.

A handoff to Kearney netted a 14-yard touchdown run with 6:05 left in the game. A pass to Deitiker was juggled out of bounds making the score 26-15.

Cisco tried an onside kick, but Hawley recovered and started out their drive from Cisco's 49-yard line. Eight plays later, Hawley's quarterback kept the ball around his right end for a five-yard touchdown run. A pass for two extra points was incomplete making the score 26-21 with 2:52 left in the game.

Hawley then tried an onside kick of their own, but Cisco's Jeff Dennis recovered the ball at Cisco's 49-yard line. Three plays later the ball was fumbled and Hawley recovered at their own 35-yard line.

Five plays later, Cisco's Berry intercepted a pass giving Cisco possession of the ball at Cisco's 40-yard line. With 1:03 remaining in the game, Cisco tried to let the time run out on the clock. On the first two snaps of the ball the Cisco quarterback fell on it, but Hawley used their remaining time-outs to stop the clock each time.

With 50 seconds remaining in the game, a handoff to Kearney was stopped at the line of scrimmage. Cisco then took a delay of game penalty and the ball was moved back to their own 31-yard line bringing up a fourth down needing 19 yards for a first. With ten seconds left in the game, Cisco's punting formation came on the field. Punter Nixon received the snap and raced back into his own end zone giving Hawley a safety, but allowing Cisco to kick the ball from their own 20-yard line. So with one second remaining in the game, the score was 26-23 in favor of Cisco.

Cisco's Nixon kicked the ball to Hawley's 49-yard line as the buzzer sounded for the end of the game. Hawley's receiver was pushed out of bounds to end any chances they might have for adding points to the scoreboard.

Cisco Junior High Teams Lose To Visiting Hawley

Cisco Junior High's seventh and eighth grade football teams were defeated here Thursday night by visiting teams from Hawley. The seventh lost 14-0 while the eighth grade score was 20-8.

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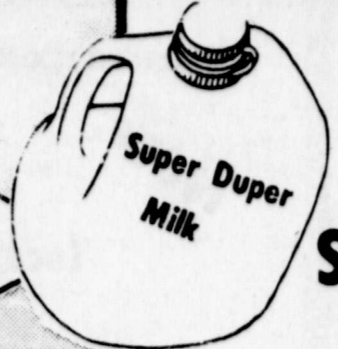
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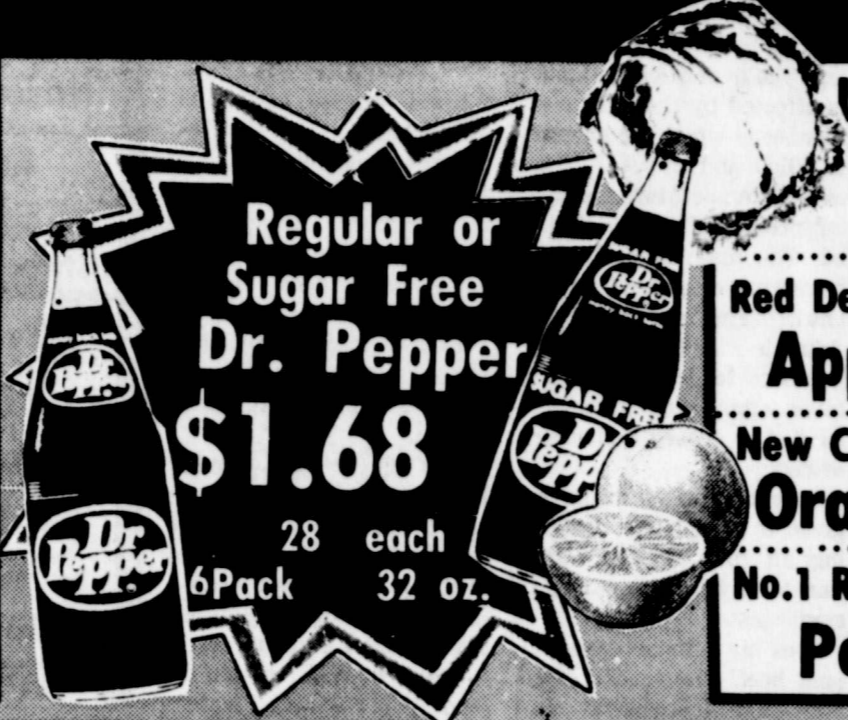
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Windbreak Seedlings Available

LUBBOCK—Farmers and ranchers in 96 West Texas counties can now purchase low-cost conifer seedlings, for use in planting windbreaks around their fields and farmsteads, thanks to stepped-up production by the Texas Forest Service's West Texas Nursery here.

In its fifth year of operation, the West Texas Nursery has increased its production to the point where it can offer seedlings to 27 additional counties for the first time, making a total of 96 Panhandle and other West Texas counties served.

According to Robert Fewin, TFS silviculturist at Lubbock, there are five species of conifers available for most of these counties for the 1983-84 planting season which ends in late March. Now is the time to write for applications and make arrangements to pick up the 6 to 12 inch seedlings. They will be distributed at pick-up points in eight different cities during February and early March.

Fewin said the seedlings are grown in individual cells, 30 cells to the Styrofoam container. A minimum order is 30 seedlings or one container (plus 4 percent state sales tax). They are sold by the container, or in multiples of 30. The containers are 12 inches wide by 14 inches long, by 8 inches deep, and several containers can be easily transported in the back seat of a car or pick-up cab.

The species available this year include: Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, Arizona cypress, Redcedar and Afghanistan pine.

Fewin said that two of these species would not be offered to the northernmost 20 counties in the Panhandle because of the cold tolerance.

"Arizona cypress and Afghanistan pine can't stand the cold weather as well as the other species," Fewin said, "and we have found that they don't survive well, especially in the first year or two after being planted in the northernmost counties."

West Texans interested in planting trees for homestead, field, feedlot or wildlife windbreak, should write for seedling applications: West Texas Nursery, Texas Forest Service, Rt. 3, Box 216, Lubbock, Texas 79401, or call (806)746-5801.

Seedlings produced by Texas Forest Service nurseries may not be used for landscaping or ornamental purposes. Seedlings will be sold to applicants on a first-come basis until the end of the 83-84 planting season, or until the supply is exhausted.

Because the containers are not designed for shipping, it will be necessary for the windbreak planters to drive to pickup points.

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Homemaking Hints

Deer hunting season is soon approaching. The leaves are gold and the early morning air is crisp. Clusters of men dressed in camouflage hats and jackets piled into pickup trucks and campers to celebrate an age-old ritual. It's hunting season again!

Delicious meals can be prepared from venison. Venison can be substituted in many dishes that call for beef. Venison is very nutritious and provides protein, iron, thiamin, riboflavin and niacin. Venison is generally low in fat and is lean meat.

Most people who say they don't like the taste of venison have never had it prepared properly. Proper preparation is the whole secret of making wild game appealing. The quality of the meat is affected by the age, sex, manner in which the animal is killed and the way it is dressed, temperature and aging process after being killed. The male animal may have a more "gamey" flavor than female animals. Animals killed cleanly will be more tender than those killed after being wounded, excited or chased by hunter or dog.

Careful attention should be given to completely removing all muscles and fatty tissues because they can add a wild taste.

Cook big game as same as lean beef. The tender cuts such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or roasted. Round steak, meat from the

leg and the less tender cuts are best when cooked by moist heat - braising, stewing, or pot roast.

Do not overcook big game meat. Overcooked or too high a temperature will toughen venison.

Use acid to tenderize. Vinegar, tomato sauce and French salad dressing are good for tenderizing big game. Marinate the meat for 24 hours.

The Eastland County Extension Service has two excellent publications that are free to the public. The bulletins are B-1388 Big Game Cooking Care and L-634 Field Dressing Big Game.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
 With cooler weather, chili is simply delicious. Try our recipe for venison chili.

VENISON CHILI
 2 pounds venison, cut into 1/2 inch cubes
 1 pound ground beef
 2 large red onions, chopped
 2 (15 1/2 ounce) cans kidney beans, undrained
 3 (8-ounce) cans tomato sauce
 1 (6-ounce) can tomato paste
 1 cup water
 3 to 4 tablespoons chili powder

Combine venison, ground beef, and onion in dutch oven; cook until meat is browned, stirring to crumble beef. Drain off pan drippings. Stir in remaining ingredients; cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours or until venison is tender; adding more water as needed.
 Yield: about 7 cups.



The Eastland County Pecan show is coming up soon. The show is scheduled for December 9 and 10. Now is the time to start saving pecans from the new crop and putting them back for the pecan show.

Anyone producing pecans in 1983 may enter the pecan show. An entry consists of 43 pecans of one variety and native pecans from any single native tree. All entries should be sacked and labeled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans. These should be selected from the best pecans, usually among the first to fall. Entries may be left at the County Extension Agent's office anytime the courthouse is open from now until 4:00 p.m. December 8.

This will be the 31st Annual Eastland County Pecan Show. It is sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

While selecting pecans for the show keep in mind that they should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. Mixed samples - more than one

variety in an entry - are disqualified.

You may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement.

A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 Choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one Choctaw entry. However, an entry of natives of seedling should all come from the same tree on two natives or seedling trees are exactly alike.

Nuts should be free of dust, dirt, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed or polished to alter the shape or color of the shell. Discolored shells and kernels may result from peeling pecans from the shucks too early. Pecans must be from the 1983 crop and are judged on the basis of size (number per pound), appearance, and shell color. Kernel quality is also important and is based on the percent kernel (as relative to shell), color, general appearance, texture, and taste.



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Bronze Sculpture Collection On Exhibit At Eastland Bank

A collection of Bronze Sculptures of internationally known Houston Artist, Ann Armstrong, will be on exhibit at Eastland National Bank during banking hours October 31 through November 4, 1983, and art lovers of this area are cordially invited to view the collection during this coming week.

In 1982 after winning a competition among Houston area sculptors, Mrs. Armstrong was commissioned to a life sized bronze to be placed in front of the Houston City Library. Her designs were first required to be approved by city residents and a panel of judges before the work could begin. The sculpture, entitled "Total Trust", is an elegant work depicting a mother with her two children feeding a seagull. The bronze was officially dedicated on February 13, 1982, which was declared "Ann Armstrong Day", by Houston Mayor, Kay Whit-

mire. Mrs. Armstrong, who has been sculpting for twenty-five years commented that some of her works require as long as three months to complete while others require only two weeks. Her "miracle piece," a portrait bust of Golda Meir was completed in only two weeks. She was commissioned to do the work by a U.S. Christian delegation which in turn presented the bust to the Israeli Government in conjunction with their Feast of Tabernacles. It is now on display in the Knesset, the Israeli version of Congress.

Mrs. Armstrong has also done six pieces in a series on the dance, and one in particular entitled "Swan Lake" was presented to benefit the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre. It was created over a period of months by observing ballet models, pictures and by memory recall. Mrs. Armstrong describes her artistic expression as

empathy. She has a genuine desire to create art that reveals the creator's love for the subject. A professional artist, she has always been inspired by human relationships. Mrs. Armstrong, who received formal training in the fundamentals of art at the Kansas City Art Institute, teaches beginning sculptors and conducts workshops across the State

of Texas. She is a partner-member of Archway Gallery in Houston. Other affiliations include The Art League of Houston, Texas Fine Arts Association, Southwest Sculpture Society and Art Community Center in Corpus Christi.

Mrs. Armstrong's visit to Eastland will be in conjunction with a week's workshop being held here.

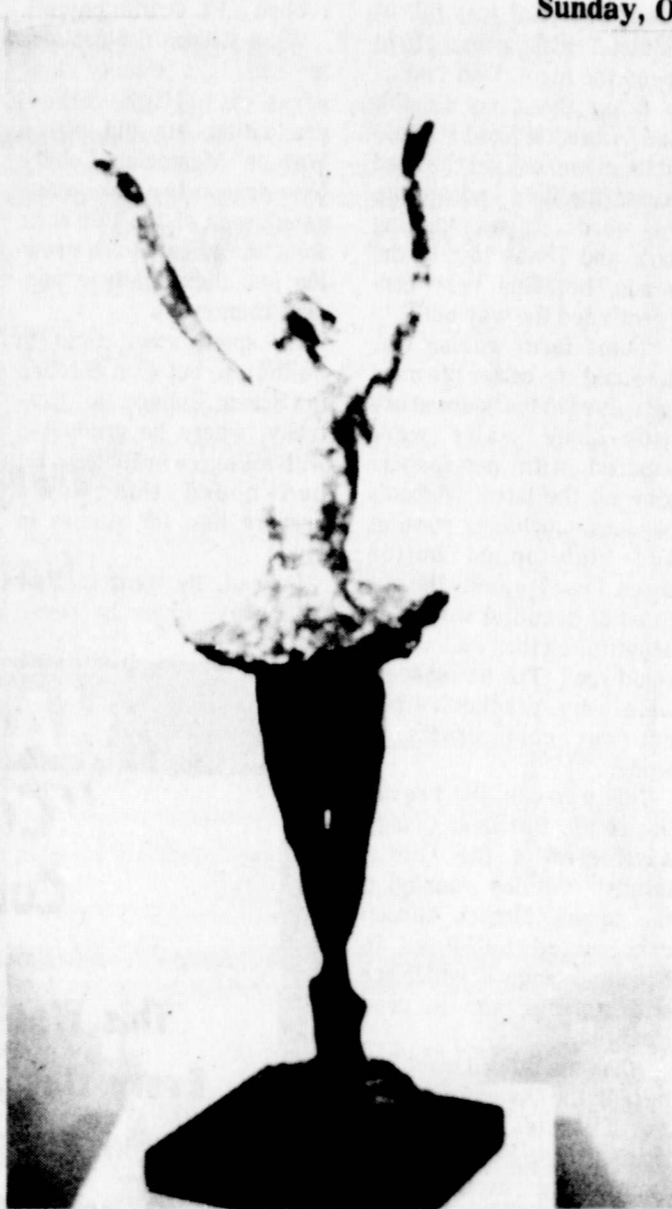
Vance O'Brien Named To '83-'84

Wray Gibson's Book

Some Eastland County residents will remember Wray Gibson, EHS Class of 1930, as a tall young man who used the by-line "Edwin" with his columns for the school newspaper. He was an imaginative, high-spirited youngster, they say. The son of a local builder, Horace Gibson, Edwin Wray Gibson became "the boy who made good" in such places

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as a Kentucky college, and New York.

Although he spent many years in other lines of work, he did not lose his interest in creative writing. So people who didn't have a chance to meet him during his youth will enjoy getting to know him now - through his book "Collected Stories and Essays", published by Vantage Press, 1983.

After retiring from a successful business career in New York City, Wray Gibson moved to Fredericksburg, Texas a few years ago. Then he took time to collect and arrange his varied stories, articles, and poems into book form.

There is humorous material in his book, metaphysical writing, light verse, political parables, stories dealing with space exploration, and factual articles and stories dealing with the author's boyhood in San Antonio and Eastland County. There is also a historical article on Ft. Griffin.

The boyhood memories - The San Antonio as well as the Eastland ones - are written with time-distilled clarity. Edwin Wray was born in Lubbock before that location became a town. Then his father moved the family to San Antonio, where they lived for several years.

In 1916, the author remembers, his father acquired two farms in Eastland County and prepared to leave San Antonio. He sold all the houses he had constructed and bought two teams of army artillery horses. "Remounts", he called them. He also bought two covered wagons. A young couple drove one wagon for the transportation, and the Gibsons rode in the other one.

"We traveled 300 miles from San Antonio to Eastland in 17 days," says Gibson. "Once we were on the road, the ruts were usually so deep, it was a major project to get the wagons out when we met other travelers heading in the opposite direction."

"When we reached Eastland, we drove to the north farm, three miles northwest of the village. There we found that a twister had picked up the house, turned it forty-five degrees, and set it back on its foundations. We couldn't live in it until it was turned back to its original position, so we headed for the other farm Dad had acquired."

"The south farm was five miles southwest of town. When we arrived, the fence around the house was half-

gone. The yard was full of half-wild cattle, coming in to spend the night. Dad told us to chase them, so we did. Bud (a brother) and I spooked them and chased the herd across the field and up into the woods. It was getting dark and I was lost in the woods, but Bud very confidently led the way out.

"Some farm woman who dreamed of a better life must have lived in the house at one time. The walls were papered with newspapers showing the latest women's fashions, including bustles and high-topped button shoes. I used to study the pictures of beautiful women in beautiful clothes and wish I could read. The newspapers were very practical. They cut out cold drafts in winter."

This was only the beginning of the Eastland County adventures of the Gibson family. Besides managing the farms, Horace Gibson constructed buildings in Eastland - some of which are still standing and in good condition.

When the 1918 oil boom hit, he built the Dixie Hotel at 115 North Dixie. The family managed the establishment, furnishing meals with rooms. It was a very busy place.

When only a child Wray Gibson explored the countryside, finding some interesting things. Once he found unusual carvings on a rock on top of a small hill. Another time he and a friend, Oral Young, found a bracelet in hollow possum tree. And in Eastland he once met an old man who was said to be a member of an outlaw gang who once

robbed a Ft. Griffin payroll.

Wray Gibson did not stay in Eastland County long after his High School graduation. He did attend Warner Memorial College for a year or two. Like many young men of the 1920's, he went out to explore a growing and industrially expanding country.

He spent some time in California, but soon enrolled in Berea College in Kentucky, where he graduated with a Degree in History. He had hoped this would prepare him for studies in law.

Instead, he went to New York City, where he began

work as a die-maker. He married a young lady from the city, and brought up his family in that vicinity. He did not leave the northeast until after the death of his wife.

"The choice of Fredericksburg as a place to live was a good one," Gibson said during a recent visit in Eastland. "It's a friendly town - historic and interesting and a nice place."

It's good to be back in Texas.

"But I like to come back to Eastland too, back to see friends, and go down streets I used to know."

"My book? It's a personal thing, really, it covers a lot of things I have thought about, and things I enjoy remembering. I hope others will enjoy it too."

Readers of the book will be glad they joined him on these mental journeys.

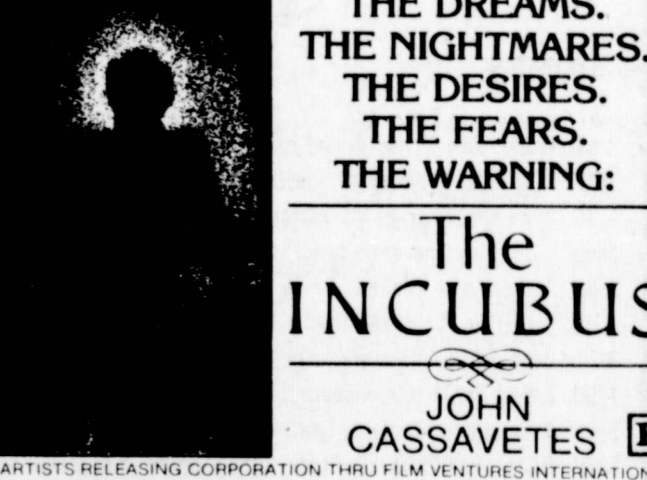

ORDINANCE NO. 0-83-18
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS ESTABLISHING WATER, SEWER, AND SANITATION RATES; ESTABLISHING A SURCHARGE FOR OUT OF TOWN USERS; ESTABLISHING WATER AND SEWER TAP FEES; PROHIBITING METER TAMPERING AND PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROHIBITING DUAL CONNECTIONS; ESTABLISHING A DELINQUENT AND DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE CHARGE; REPEALING ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, It is deemed necessary to promulgate rules and regulations to provide water, sewer and sanitation services to all citizens of the City of Cisco; and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary to prescribe adequate rates for the provision of these utility services and establish rules for the timely and proper collection of revenues for said services; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: Water Service Rates.

a. Monthly water rates shall be as follows:

2,000 gallons minimum.....\$12.00
2,000 - 50,000 gallons.....\$1.50 per 1,000 gallons.

50,000 - 200,000 gallons.....\$1.25 per 1,000 gallons.

All over 200,000 gallons.....\$1.00 per 1,000 gallons.

b. The above rates shall prevail for all active City employees and volunteer firemen and City employees and volunteer firemen who have retired from active service with the City, except that 10,000 gallons shall be used for the minimum rate.

c. Monthly rates for water service for Chesley Football stadium shall be \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons metered, with no minimum.

d. Monthly rates for wholesale customers, as defined by the City Council, for raw and/or treated water shall be determined separately and established by Council action.

SECTION 2: Water Service Deposit.

a. A deposit of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be paid in advance to the City for water service to be metered by 5/8 to 3/4 inch meter.

b. All other water customers having a meter size larger than the standard residential meter (5/8 to 3/4 inch) shall require a deposit based on meter size to be paid in advance to the City as follows:

Meter Size Amount of Charge
1 inch.....\$100.00
1 1/2 inch.....\$150.00
2 inch.....\$200.00

c. Meters larger than 2 inches or sizes other than those indicated above shall have the deposit based on the cost of the meter.

d. Any deposit made to the City under provisions of this ordinance shall be held by the City until the customer's water service is terminated. Upon termination of such services, the customer shall be entitled to a refund, less any amount which is due or owing to the City. No deposit shall draw interest.

e. A customer changing his residence or place of business within the City shall have the right to have such deposit transferred to the new location. Deposits shall not be transferred from one individual to another.

SECTION 3: Customers residing outside the City limits shall be charged the same rate as inside the City limits for water service, plus a ten dollar (\$10.00) utility surcharge per utility per month.

SECTION 4: All property owners and their agents and tenants shall be responsible as consumers for any loss of water and property damage due to leakage in pipes or plumbing inside the discharge side of the meter, or on such property, and if this leakage is not repaired and is not paid for according to the rates provided in this ordinance, the water shall be cut off and not turned on

again until all claims are paid and leadage terminated.

SECTION 5: Water Meter Tampering:

a. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a duly authorized employee of the City, to tamper with any water meter in any manner, or in anyway act to damage or injure any meter; or to manipulate or attempt to manipulate any meter in any manner so as to affect its registration or measurement of water.

b. Any person who shall violate this provision shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

c. This shall in no way affect or waive any other remedies available to the City including other applicable criminal or civil statutes governing conduct of this nature.

SECTION 6: Water Tap Fees.

a. All water taps to City-maintained water mains shall be made by the City Water Department.

b. Tapping fees for water service shall be as follows:
Size of Tap Amt. of Chg.
3/4 inch.....\$145.00
1 inch.....\$220.00
1 1/2 inch.....\$400.00
2 inch.....\$550.00

c. Fee for water taps over 2 inches shall be for cost of materials and labor as determined by the City Manager.

SECTION 7: Sewer Rates.

a. Monthly sewer rates shall be as follows:

Residential
1. Flat rate.....\$6.00
2. Over 65, totally disabled persons.....\$4.50

3. City employees, volunteer firemen.....\$5.00

Commercial

1. 1st 10,000 gallons of water metered.....\$6.00
2. All over 10,000 gallons of water metered......60 per 1,000 gallons

SECTION 8: Sewer Tap Fee.

a. Tapping fee for sewer service shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00). Such fee is for inspection purposes only.

b. All sewer taps shall be made by master plumbers as licensed by the State of Texas. Placement and location of such sewer taps shall be at the discretion of the City.

SECTION 9: Customers residing outside the City shall be charged the same rate as inside the City limits for sewer service, plus a five dollar (\$5.00) surcharge per utility per month.

SECTION 10: Water and Sewer Service Line Requirements.

a. Metered water service lines.

1. The minimum size water service line shall be three-fourths inch in diameter. Other service line sizes shall be one (1) inch, one and one-half (1 1/2) inches, two (2) inches, four (4) inches, six (6) inches, twelve (12) inches and sixteen (16) inches.

2. Each house or building or group of buildings on a separate lot or tract of land shall have a separate water service line connection to a water main abutting the property.

3. Two (2) or more small service lines laid in parallel and belted shall not be installed to serve one customer as a substitute for one adequately sized main.

4. The size of water service line required, if larger than the minimum, will be determined by the City Administrator and/or City Engineer.

5. A customer desiring his water service line enlarged or relocated shall pay for each enlargement or relocation on the basis of water line connection charge stated in this article.

SECTION 11: Water Meters.

1. Water meters shall be furnished in the following sizes: five-eighths (5/8)--three-fourths (3/4) inch, one (1) inch, one and one-half (1 1/2) inches, two (2) inches, three (3) inches, four (4) inches, six (6) inches, eight (8) inches, and ten (10) inches. Meters one (1) inches and larger may be of the turbine or compound type.

C. Sanitary Sewer Service Lines.

1. The minimum size sanitary sewer service line shall be four (4) inches in diameter. Other service lines shall be six (6) inches,

eight (8) inches, ten (10) inches or twelve (12) inches.

2. Each house or building or group of buildings shall have a separate sanitary sewer main that may be abutting or nearest to the property.

3. The size of the sanitary sewer service required, if larger than the minimum, shall be determined by the City Water Department.

SECTION 11: Dual connections (more than one user on a single meter or sewer tap) to the water and/or sewer systems shall be prohibited, with the exception of City-permitted master meters (i.e. apartments, etc.).

SECTION 12: Rates and charges for water, sewer and sanitation services rendered by the City shall be billed to the customers and shall not be permitted to make payment for any service separately, but all services must be paid at the same time. Monthly billings for the sewer and sanitation services are integral parts of the water service billing and nonpayment for any such services shall result in the discontinuance of water service.

SECTION 13: The monthly rates and charges as now or hereafter fixed by the City of Cisco, Texas, to be paid for sewer, water and sanitation services furnished by the City, shall be due and payable before the 16th day following the mailing of the monthly bill, and if such charges are not paid on or before such date, same shall thereafter be considered delinquent, and a late charge of five dollars (\$5.00) on the amount of that month's bill will be made.

SECTION 14: Discontinuance of Service.

a. If utility service and delinquent charges are not paid on or before the expiration of ten (10) days from the date the charges become delinquent, the City, with just cause and upon notification, is hereby authorized to disconnect the water service furnished by the City. A fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) will be charged for the reconnecting of such service.

b. An additional fee of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars shall be charged to any customer who requests that their water service be disconnected for thirty days or more, except in the cases of emergencies.

SECTION 15: All residences within the City limits shall be required to connect to the City's water and sewer systems, except in such areas as the city cannot reasonably supply service mains, which is to be determined by the City.

SECTION 16: Any and all sums of money hereafter collected as a fee, service rate, tap, connection or any charge set forth and related to the City's water and sewer systems as set out in this ordinance, shall be credited to the Utility Fund (Water and Sewer funds) of the City of Cisco, Texas.

SECTION 17: Sanitation Rates. Monthly sanitation (solid waste) removal charges shall be as follows:

a. Residential
One family residence.....\$4.00
Two family residence.....\$7.50

One family residence/mobile home.....\$7.50

Mobile home in or out of park.....\$4.00

SECTION 18: Residential collection of solid waste shall be 2 to 4 times per week, depending on type of business and need. Exception to indicated number of weekly collections shall be for designated City Holidays.

SECTION 19: Collection Containers.

a. Containers for residential pickup shall be plastic bags.

b. Containers for commercial pickup shall be plastic bags, 20 or 30 gallon cans, or City approved garbage bins.

c. Mobile home parks shall provide wire cages in appropriate locations to serve all spaces adjacent to the pickup point.

d. To be picked up, boxes must be broken up and brush neatly piled in bundles that can be easily handled, and stacked by the curb.

SECTION 20: Regulation of the City's solid waste disposal site (landfill) shall be handled through a separate ordinance.

SECTION 21: Severability. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases are separable, and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid by the valid judgement or decree of any court of competent jurisdictions, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this ordinance of unconstitutional or invalid phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections.

SECTION 22: Supercedes, Repeals. All ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with this ordinance are hereby superceded and repealed.

SECTION 23: Effective Date. The effective date of this ordinance shall be October 15, 1983, with increased rates to be reflected in the water service bills that are due on and after December 1, 1983.

County News Briefs

Operating out of Wichita Falls, Beldon and Smith are preparing for a plugback for shallower pay in Stephens County's Rickles Field, three miles north east of Ivan. The well is designated at the No. 2 Rickles. Proposed total depth is 4,602 feet. The well is in a 1,067-acre lease block, SPRR Survey.

First production figures have been posted for a new completion in the Stephens Regular Field 14 miles south-southeast of Breckenridge.

Bob Miller of Granbury reported his No. 4-A Harris-Hawkins is capable of pumping 21 barrels of crude oil daily on open choke. It bottomed at 2,090 feet and was perforated to produce from an interval 2,003 to 2,012 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 100-acre lease in, T&PRR Survey.

Kanotex Inc. of Dallas has

filed for permit to drill three wells in Stephens County's Southwest Bowar Harding Brothers Fields 15 miles northwest of Breckenridge.

Located in a 60-acre lease in the R. and J.F. Smith Surveys, the wells all carry permit for 4,600-ft. total drilling depth.

The wells are designated as the No. 1, 1-C and 2 Harbison. The lease location is about one-eighth mile west of the Clear Fork of the Brazos River.

Lions Hear About Leader Dog Center

The Leader Dog program that has provided more than 6,000 blind persons with help in attaining self-sufficiency was explained by Vincent Syracuse of Rochester, Michigan, in a talk at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant.

Mr. Syracuse and his German Shepherd Leader Dog Friday were guests of Archie Chamness, District 2-El Governor, who was making his official visit to the Local Club. The Leader Dog program has been presented throughout the district to Lions Clubs, Mr. Chamness reported.

In the program, Lions were told that the Rochester non-profit organization carries on a continuing training program to make dogs ready for a life-long association with a blind person. They use German Shepherds, Labradors and Golden Retrievers, starting them when they are puppies.

When a blind person is accepted for a dog, he or she goes to Rochester for a "training" period with the dog and the blind person leave for the latter's home. Prior to "meeting his master," the dog goes through an extensive five-month training period.

"Leader dogs for the blind is supported by contributions from the public, Lions Clubs, sororities and various agencies," Mr. Chamness said. "There is no charge for a Leader Dog or any part of the four week training program, and it costs the school about \$6,000 for each team."

Mr. Chamness said he visited the Leader Dog center in Michigan recently. He said that any blind person interested in the program could obtain complete information by contacting an official of a Lions Club.

Mr. Chamness said that Lions of Texas operate a training and rehabilitation program for the blind at their Kerrville camp for Crippled Children during the fall and winter months. They also have an eye bank program that makes valuable contributions to those with eye problems.

Council Approves Water Measures

Two ordinances and two resolutions pertaining to the water system improvement program were approved by the City Council at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

An amendment to the ordinance passed Oct. 11th authorizing the issuance of \$1,300,000 in Utility System Revenue Bonds was approved to change the interest rate of the bonds from 10.9 per cent to 8.2 per cent. This will save the city \$323,000 over the 30-year life of the bond issue, City Manager Mike Moore reported to the Council. The amendment also increased the principal payments during the first half of the bond life to affect \$66,000 in interest savings.

The ordinance that raised water rates was approved on final reading. It becomes effective Oct. 15 and will be reflected in the Dec. 1 billing. The new rate will be approximately double current water bills, raising the minimum to \$24.00 per month - up from \$12. Senior citizens will pay \$21.00. This ordinance will generate sufficient income to make payments on the \$1,300,000 bond issue that will finance the new filtration plant and other improvements.

The ordinance in its entirety is scheduled for publication in The Press. The city manager said a letter would go with water bills with details of the ordinance.

Two resolutions were passed to authorize mayor Eris Ritchie to sign papers for authority to run a 12-inch water line under railroad property. It will cost \$596 for a right-of-way across M-K-T Railroad property that no longer is used for a railroad. The Missouri-Pacific right-of-way will cost the city \$150.

The Council appointed Ralph Glenn, business manager at Cisco Junior College, to be a member of the board of directors of the Eastland County Tax Appraisal District. The term of office will be two years. Mr. Glenn is a long-time resident of Cisco.

Joe Cooper, local CPA, was named auditor for city records and accounts for the 1982-83 fiscal year. He has conducted city audits for the past three years.

Ballots and election supplies for the Nov. 19 city election on a \$675,000 bond issue to finance a new waste-water disposal facility were assigned. Absentee voting will begin Oct. 31st, City Secretary Ginger Johnson reported.

A proclamation that Oct. 29th be the official date for Halloween trick or treating activities was approved. It appears elsewhere in The Press.

In his report to the Council, City Manager Moore said that Cisco's application for street paving under a federal block grant program was assigned a priority too low for consideration this year. Of 21 applications submitted in this region, Cisco was given a No. 17 priority and only three were approved for funds, Mr. Moore said.

The city manager told the Council that West Texas Utilities Co. has advised him that they are proceeding under bond with a rate increase before approval by the Public Utilities Commission.

A report from the Texas Water Resources Board is expected in a week or ten days on engineering details submitted regarding the possible use of the Wilcoxon Alternate Site for a waste-water facility, Mr. Moore said.

Mr. Moore said that plans were going forward for a town hall type meeting Tuesday, Nov. 1, at 7 p.m. when the city will provide citizens with complete details of the waste water facility bond issue that will be voted on Oct. 19th. He said that state officials were not expected to be present as it was a local matter.

During the citizen-council discussion period, Mrs. Louise Allison had questions about a provision of the water rate ordinance that says: "The rates shall prevail for all active city employees and volunteer firemen and city, except that 10,000 gallons shall be used for the minimum rate." The minimum for others is 2,000 gallons.

Mrs. Allison observed that this would represent some \$10,000 per year.

Frank Wilcoxon, who has offered an alternate to the optioned site for a waste-water facility, told the Council that has been cooperating in engineering detail work and that he felt that the most cost efficient site should be used.

Both Mr. Wilcoxon and Ricky T. Morton, rural water customers, raised questions about a \$10 monthly surcharge under the new rate structure. The new ordinance raises rural surcharges from \$5 to \$10 per month. Mr. Moore explained that the city has extra costs, including reading rural meters.

Mayor Ritchie presided with Councilmen Ivan Webb, Bobby Rains, Roy Dennis, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Batteas, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright in attendance.

Mrs. Allison observed that this would represent some \$10,000 per year.

Be it further resolved, that the General Board and members commend the life and works of Armo B. Chambers to the greater community of Cisco for their remembrance and love.

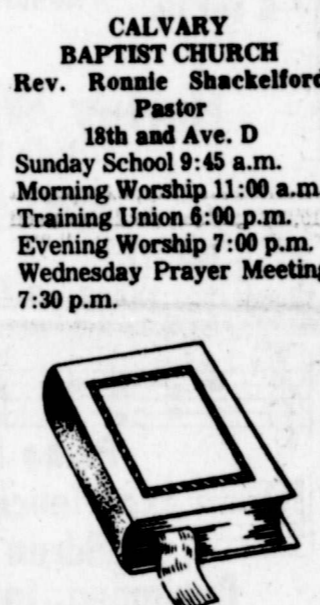
