Downtown Pep Rally Is Planned For Friday

There will be a downtown pep rally for students of Cisco High School and Lobo football fans at 1:30 p.m. Friday in preparation for the regional playoff game with Frisco at Azle later in the day, Principal Mike Turner announced Monday.

Classes for the public schools were to turn out at the usual hour Tuesday for Thanksgiving week. Wednesday will be an "in-service" training day for teachers of the school system.

Mr. Turner said the downtown pep rally would be held in front of the Chamber of Commerce, and the Lobo Band will be present to play for the event. The public was invited to attend the rally.

City officials reported that the 600 block of Conrad Hilton Avenue will be closed to traffic during the pep rally.

One-day holidays will be observed by virtually all business firms, including financial institutions. The Cisco Post Office will close on Thursday. Super markets will be among those closing for the day, it was announced.

The city schools dismissed students after classes Tuesday for the week. Teachers were due to work Wednesday in an "in-service" program. Cisco Junior College planned to release students as they complete class work on Wednesday.

There will be no trash pickup by the city on Nov. 24 and 25, the city manager's announcement said. Garbage will be picked up on Nov. 26 as usual. The landfill will be closed Nov. 24 and open Nov. 26.

The Chamber of Commerce announced that it would be closed Thursday and Friday.

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Loboes Win Area Championship, Advance To Regional Play-Offs

Will Face Frisco Friday At 8 p.m. In Azle

The Cisco High School Loboes, Area Champions, advance to the Regional Play-Offs this Friday night when they travel to Azle where they will play against the Frisco Coons. Kick-off will be at 8:00 p.m.

Cisco claimed its Area Championship last Friday in Weatherford when they defeated the Archer City Wildcats 13-7. The Loboes played well both offensively and defensively.

The offense did a good job of keeping control of the ball and making yardage to sustain drives, while the defense contained the Archer City offense and held them to only one scoring drive.

Lobo Head Coach John Parchman said Tuesday that Frisco has a big team similar to San Saba's. The Loboes defeated San Saba 7-6 in the Bi-District play-offs in Comanche.

Coach Parchman stated that Frisco is probably a better team than San Saba because they can also throw the ball well. But he said they basically like to line up and run behind their big linemen.

The Frisco defense stunts a lot, according to Coach Parchman. Last Friday night's game appeared to be a defensive battle when Frisco led Whitney 2-0 at half-time.

Frisco came back in the last half and scored 20 points to make the final score 22-3, giving them their area championship.

Coach Parchman said he believes Frisco is about 10-2 for the season, having lost to Farmersville and Pilot Point. The Frisco team played Farmersville again in the play-offs and defeated them. Frisco is runner-up in its district to Pilot Point.

Cisco is also 10-2 for the season, with its only district loss going to Winters who won the first place position

All Lobo players are well and ready to go Friday, Coach Parchman said, and they will go ahead and work out as usual, even though school will be closed the remainder of this week.

He said, "We can't quit now. We are excited to be where we are and we are not ready to quit. I believe we will do well against Frisco this Friday."

Tickets for the Regional game will be on sale at the Azle stadium on Friday night. Admission price will be \$4.00 for adults and \$3.00 for students.

In Friday night's 13-7 win over Archer City in Weatherford, the Lobo defense limited their opponents to only one touchdown in the first quarter of play. Archer City's only other threat was on their first drive of the second half, when they moved the ball to Cisco's 11 but failed to take the ball into the end zone.

On their four possessions during the game, the Wildcats were limited to their own half of the field by the Cisco defense.

Cisco, on the other hand, was in possession of the ball seven times during the game. On their first possession they scored from Archer City's five. On their next two possessions they were forced to punt when the Wildcat, defense held them on their own end of the field.

On their fourth possession, the Loboes scored from Archer City's eight-yard line, after the defense recovered a fumble at the seven. On Cisco's fifth possession of the first half of play, the Loboes moved the ball to Archer City's six-yard line before the half ended.

In the second half of play, both teams had possession of the ball twice with Cisco driving to Archer City's nine where an attempted field goal was no good. Cisco took over the final possession of the ball when the defense intercepted a pass at Archer City's 45-yard line.

When the game ended, Cisco had the ball on the Wildcats' eight-yard line.

Cisco received the opening kick-off from Archer City at the Loboes five-yard line and Cisco's Doug Hendricks returned it to the Lobo 40. Runs by Johnny Ramirez, Hendricks and Josh Potter, along with a pass reception by Hendricks, moved the ball to Archer City's five-yard line in 13 plays with four first downs. Cisco quarterback Joe Perry kept the ball on the next play and raced around the left end for a Cisco touchdown. Wade Shackelford held the ball for Butch Jessup who booted his only point of the game. With 5:52 remaining in the first quarter, Cisco led by the score of 7-0.

Archer City received the kick from Cisco at their own four and returned it to the 22-yard line, where they started their first drive of the game. With Brad Pippin at quarterback, the Wildcats began moving the ball downfield on runs by Mitch McLemore, Devin Devrow, Mike McBride and QB Pippin. Robert Stallcup received

two passes from QB Pippin during the drive, including the 24-yard pass play for the touchdown. McLemore held the ball for Stallcup who kicked the tying point, making the score 7-7 with 2:10 left in the first quarter of play.

Early in the second quarter, Archer City punted the ball to Cisco's 27-yard line where it did not seem to be downed by anyone and the officials failed to signal the ball dead. Cisco's Perry picked the ball up and returned it 73-yards to the Archer City endzone for an apparent Cisco touchdown; however, the game officials called the ball back and Cisco started out on their own 26. Six plays later they punted the ball from their own 45 and Jessup's kick went out of bounds at the Wildcats five.

Four plays later, Cisco's Robert Sherman recovered a Wildcat fumble at Archer City's seven-yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage, Cisco's Potter took the ball to the one but the Loboes lost yardage back to the eight on a fumbled handoff on their next play. QB Perry then kept the ball around his right end for Cisco's second touchdown. This time Jessup's extra point kick was no good leaving the score at 13-7 with 5:19 left in the second quarter.

In the second half of play, Archer City took the opening kick-off and drove the ball downfield from their own 25 to Cisco's 11-yard line where their drive stalled. Out of three attempts at complete on two. On the first attempt, the ball was caught by Stallcup but he was out of the end zone so the play was no good.

With Archer City unable to score a touchdown, Cisco took over possession of the ball at the eleven. Runs by Ramirez, Hendricks, QB Perry, Potter and Mike Williams helped move the ball downfield. Ramirez also received a pass for a gain of 17 yards. During the drive, Cisco picked up seven first downs in 23 plays moving the ball to Archer City's six-yard line. A fumble, recovered by Cisco QB Perry, lost yardage back to the seven and a handoff to Potter was stopped for a two-yard loss set-

ting the ball on the nine.

On a fourth down at Archer City's nine, Cisco's Jessup came on the field for a 27-yard field goal attempt. The kick was ruled no good leaving the score at 13-7 with 7:18 left in the game.

Archer City took over their final possession of the ball at their own 20, but six plays later a pass was intercepted by Cisco's Johnny Seabourn at the Wildcats 43-yard line.

Runs by Cisco's Ramirez, Potter and QB Perry moved the ball to the three-yard line of Archer City in eleven plays with three first downs. With less than a minute remaining in the game, Cisco took a delay of game penalty which moved the ball back to the eight.

With only 26 seconds left, Cisco QB took the snap from center and fell on the ball allowing the final seconds of the game to run out, giving

Cisco the 13-7 victory.

Azle Is Selected As Play-Off Site

Selection of Azle as the site for the regional playoff game between the Cisco and Frisco football teams was the result of a compromise by officials of the two Class AA winners, Supt. James Couch of Cisco reported. The game will be played at 8 p.m. Friday.

Cisco wanted to play at Weatherford, where they won a 13-to-7 victory over Archer City last Friday night, and Frisco suggested Plano. Mr. Couch said Frisco looked on Weatherford as an advantage for Cisco since the Loboes had played and won there, and "we considered Plano too far away."

Azle High School offered the two teams the free use of their facilities for the contest, and it was accepted. An alternate would have been a coin flip to determine whether the game went to Frisco or Cisco but the schools did not want to take that chance, Mr. Couch said.

Supt. Couch and Coach John Parchman met with Frisco officials in Azle Saturday morning to make arrangements for their playoff meeting.

A report from Weatherford had not been received Monday but Mr. Couch believed that the gate receipts there would be substantial as a good crowd turned out for the contest. Only costs are twelve and a half per cent of the gross to the University Interscholastic League and paying the officials. The two schools split the balance.

Coach John Parchman said the Loboes suffered no injuries and expected to be in good condition for the game.

Mr. Parchman said the Lobo squad would workout Wednesday afternoon as usual although classes will not meet after Tuesday. On Thursday, the Lobo squad will workout during the morning in order that players can eat Thanksgiving dinner with their families.

All members of the Lobo squad, including freshman, junior varsity and varsity, will make the trip to Azle, leaving at 3 p.m. Friday by charter bus. All players except freshmen will suit out for the game as they did at other playoff games, the coach said.

Rev. Stockwell received his A.B. Degree in Philosophy from Eastern

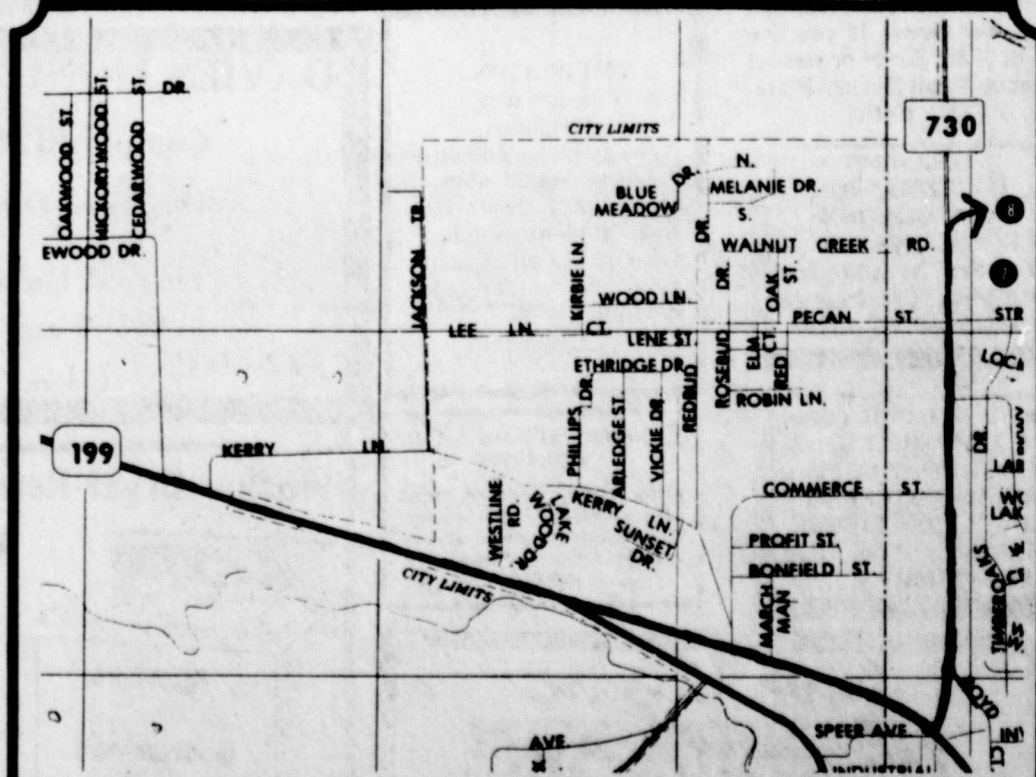

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Bass Club

Dabbling, flipping, doodle sock'n, swing dabbling, call it what you want it all boils down to **Hawg Hunting**. This increasingly popular method of fishing is not a new method. Early pioneers of bass fishing quickly discovered that micropterus salmoides (Lacepede) large mouth bass love to inhabit hard to get to places. Weedless jugs either hair or rubber, or both are the most preferred baits. However, worms rigged Texas style are effective as are spinner baits. Placement of a jig and worm trailer in a brush pile can be as exciting as a 6 pounder on topwater. Over all average weight of fish taken while dabbling seem to be greater most of the time. But as any type of fishing there are those days when you can't even buy a bite.

Rod selection is important, choose a rod with enough backbone to bring 'em out fast. Normal length is 7 1/2 ft. Heavy line in the 20 lb. - 40 lb. range should be used to avoid breaking off when the bass dives under a log or wraps around a twig. After sometime of fishing this method one develops what is known as a automatic arm. You have already set the hook before you can think to do so. Strikes may occur as a simple tap, line movement, and early stop on the fall, or the hardest of all just simply a mushy feeling on the end of the line. If you pitch into that willow and you see a twig move for no reason, put the steel to him 9 times out of 10 you will connect with a nice bass. A nice 4 lb. fish on 7 ft of line at close quarters is something you will love so if you don't pick up a fish the first few times don't give up cause when you do connect, you'll have a blast.

Dec. 15 Is Deadline For State Hay Show

Texas farmers and ranchers who would like to see how their 1983 hay crop stacks up have until Dec. 15 to submit entries for the Texas State Hay Show.

The show will be held Jan. 24 at the Sheraton Crown Hotel in Houston.

"The main purpose of the annual hay show is to give producers over the state an opportunity to put up their hay against the competition and to have it evaluated for its nutritional content," points out Don J. Dorsett, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. He expects about 400 hay samples to be entered in the show.

Hay quality varies widely over the state in any given year due to growing conditions, the weather and other factors, notes Dorsett. 1983 has been a particularly interesting year in hay production, he points out, due to the adverse spring weather, lack of summer rains in some sections, and some late-season heavy rains in various parts of Texas.

Hay producers may submit one sample in each of seven classes in the show, says the forage specialist.

Classes include coastal bermudagrass, other bermudagrasses, other perennials, mixed grasses, summer annuals, winter annuals and legumes.

Entries should be sent to Dorsett, 355 Soil and Crop Sciences Bldg., Texas A&M University, College Station 77843. County Extension agents can provide additional information on sub-

pensation (FSC) program. This extension will provide additional benefits for claimants under the following guidelines:

1. Claimants who received FSC benefits prior to April 1, 1983, are not entitled to these additional benefits.
2. Those individuals who have previously qualified for FSC claims subsequent to 4-1-83 and have exhausted their benefits prior to 10-23-83 will be entitled to an additional 5 weeks of benefits up to a maximum of 13 weeks total payment under the FSC program.
3. FSC claims established prior to 10-16-83 with benefits remaining after 10-23-83 will be entitled to 2 additional weeks with total entitlement not to exceed 10 weeks.
4. Claimants who establish FSC entitlement between October 16 and 23, 1983, will be entitled to one additional week for a total of 9 weeks.
5. Claimants who qualify for FSC on or after October

23, 1983, will be entitled to the lesser of 8 weeks or 55% of their maximum benefit amount.

Senator Glasgow stated that notices would be mailed

to Texas claimants who have exhausted FSC benefits as soon as possible. Additional questions may be referred to the local Texas Employment Commission office.

Lights From The Christian World

The first American Thanksgiving Day was celebrated during the second winter the Plymouth colonists spent in the New World. The first dreadful winter in Massachusetts had killed nearly half of the members of the colony. But new hope grew up in the

summer of 1621. The corn harvest brought rejoicing. Governor William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621, be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer, to show gratitude of the colonists that they were alive. More than eighty friendly Indians came to the feast.

The Indians brought wild turkeys and venison or deer meat, as their share. Tables were set out doors, and all the people sat around them like one big happy family. Prayers, sermons, and songs of praise were important in the celebration. Three days were spent in feasting and prayer.

Various states had a yearly thanksgiving holiday. In 1863 President Lincoln issued a proclamation setting aside the last Thursday of November in that year "as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father."

Congress after 1941 ruled that the fourth Thursday of November would be observed as Thanksgiving Day and would be a legal holiday.

This Thanksgiving Day of November 24, 1983 will find many families and friends enjoying the traditional feast and all the trimmings. While many are enjoying a bountiful meal there will be men and women who will probably be depressed during this time because months of job-seeking has led to nothing... 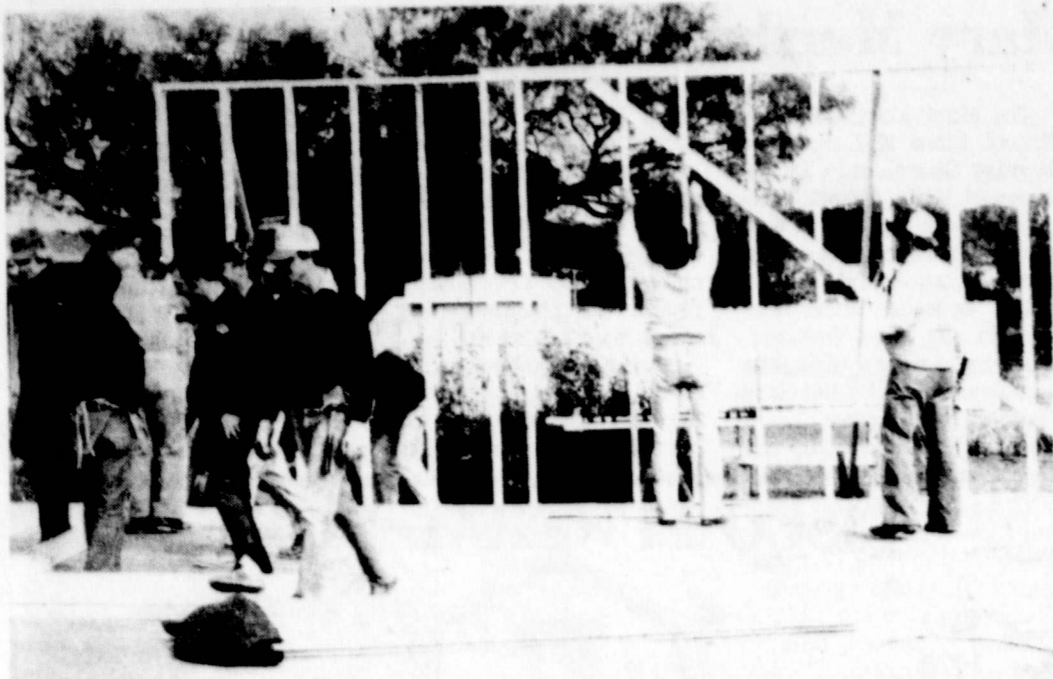

Church Holds Special Thanksgiving Service

Cong. Charles Stenholm Reports... 1232 Longworth Ofs. Bldg. Washington, D.C. 20515

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) introduced a bill to make farm programs simpler, more predictable and fairer. The legislation simplifies and standardizes the way acreage bases and yields are assigned to producers. Stenholm has been working on the project almost a year, along with the Texas Agricultural Forum, a coalition of farmers and agribusinessmen in the state. An acreage base, or number of acres to be planted, is assigned to farmers who wish to take part in federal farm programs. A yield measures how many bushels or pounds per acre the farmer is assumed to produce. Both bases and yields are important when farmers decide whether to participate in the programs. "Right now, our system of bases and yields is a mess," Stenholm said. "It's not fair to many farmers; it's unpredictable for the rest; and it leaves too much discretion to USDA's bureaucratic whims. It needs to be changed and put into permanent law."

Bases and yields are now set by four-year farm bills, Stenholm said, which makes them subject to the political winds every four years. If the base and yield formulas were in permanent law, they would stay there unless repealed, and farmers would have a better idea how many acres they can plant. "When unpredictable programs keep farmers from planning ahead," Stenholm said, "they often decide not to bother with the programs at all. But this usually means

more production and that lowers prices, which drives up taxpayer costs for the farm program." Stenholm's proposal assigns bases for both overall farm acreage and individual crops. It bases yields on actual records, and gives farmers more flexibility than they now have in deciding for themselves how much of a given crop they will plant. **Office Closes For Thanksgiving** The Drivers License Office will be closed Thursday, Nov. 24, and Friday, Nov. 25 for Thanksgiving.

The Pilgrims and the Indians featured in our kindergarten conversation quite a bit this month.

Mandi's Indian name, from kindergarten or day-care, is "Raindrops," and her thighs substitute for an Indian drum which accompanes her "ow-ow-ow's"

whenever the Great Spirit moves her.

We haven't sorted out why the Indians appeal to her more than the Pilgrims. Action? Color? Maybe. Probably it's the same pull that takes the adult to the circus on the fair grounds rather than the political rally on the

courthouse lawn.

Mandi pays lip service to the explanations her inevitable "Why?" and "What for?" produce, but it is clear that abstractions such as "religious freedom" and "persecution" are not her cup of tea.

Mandi's questions also served as a reminder that this time last year, we were very much in the Pilgrim class ourselves.

Last Thanksgiving featured plenty of physical food, but the spiritual aspect was lacking—on my part, anyway. Dismay, rather than gratitude, characterized Thanksgiving '82 for me. There was a lot of resentment, too.

Thanksgiving '83 is a different matter.

We have learned enough to make changes in recipes and personnel at The Pizza House...and will make more.

We don't spend as much road time between Eastland and Waco as we did.

Mandi likes kindergarten—a plus in any school life.

There are many more "grace notes" in our lives now. There may have been just as many last year, but I couldn't find them.

This Thanksgiving, I am both happy and grateful for those graces and optimistic about many more for the coming year.

I hope you are happy, too.

Australia Has Oil Boom, Robert Kamon Finds

The Queensland area of Australia is enjoying an oil boom of considerable importance and part on the recent progress has been made on and adjoining acreage under which a Cisco oil company has substantial interests.

This report was made by Robert Kamon of Cisco, president of Golden Triangle Royalty and Oil Company, who has just returned from Australia where he spent a month.

Recently completed oil and gas production on a block adjoining GTRO holdings totals some two billion cubic feet of gas and 23,000 barrels of oil, representing income of about \$2,500,000 daily Mr. Kamon said. Two important discoveries were made during the final week of Mr. Kamon's visit there.

On GTRO properties, Pan-

continental Oil Company's No. 1 Nockatunga has been completed as an oil well and two additional wells are planned for the coming year. A second well was in completion stages. GTRO owns 30,000 royalty acres in the 4,324,000-acre block.

Mr. Kamon learned that a new pipeline was under construction to deliver oil from the area of development to connect with lines that run to Brisbane and refinery operations. The line, which will begin initially with 14,000 barrels per day, will eventually move up to 55,000 bar-

rels of oil per day. In other areas where GTRO holds interests, Mr. Kamon found encouraging signs of oil and gas from seismograph survey work being completed. Drilling programs are due to be considered when the survey results are turned over to oil companies, he said.

While in Australia, Mr. Kamon visited his 4,500-acre beef cattle ranch in Queensland. He usually makes two trips per year to Australia to look after the interests of the oil companies with which he is associated.

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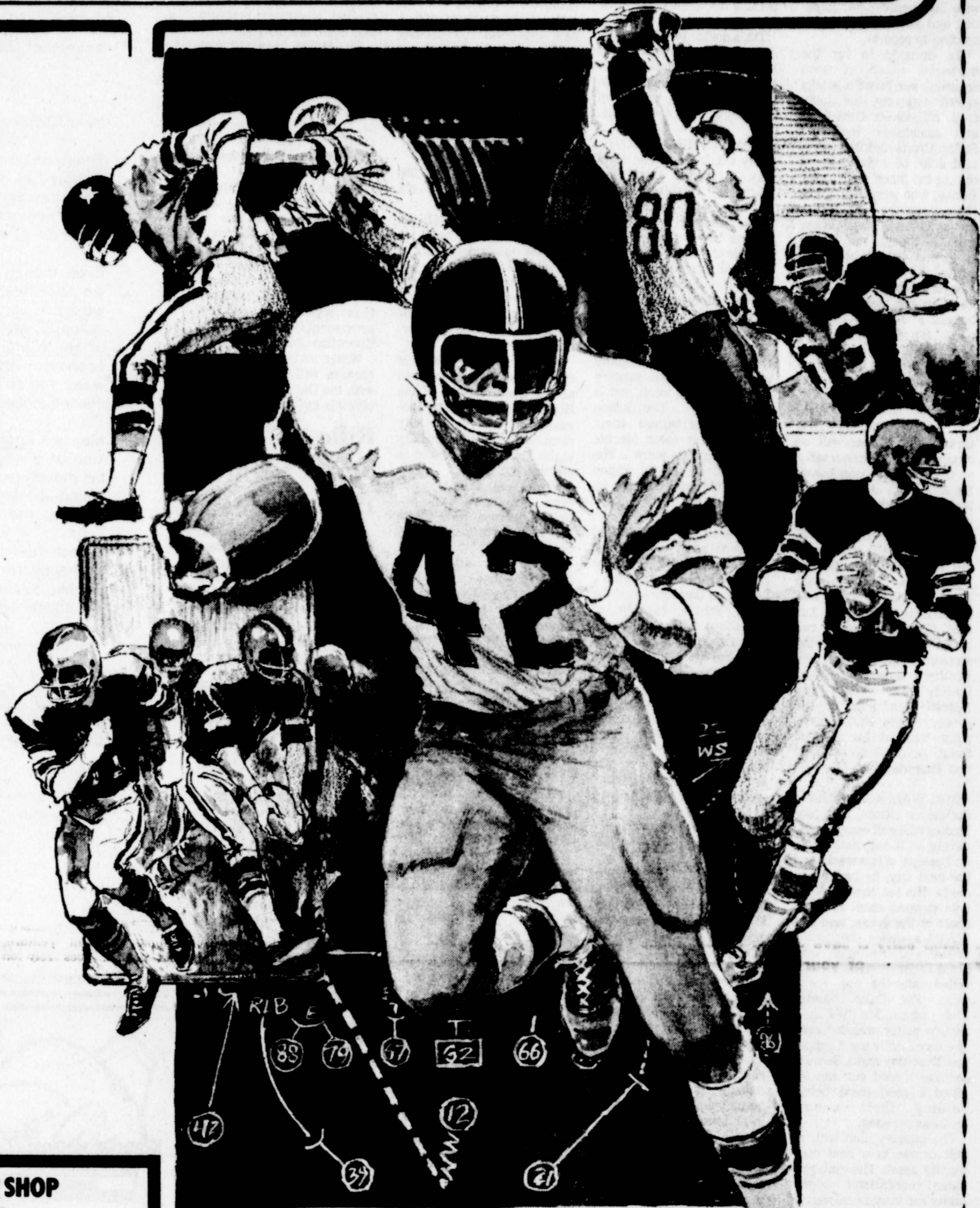

A \$675,000 bond issue to complete financing for city water improvements and a new waste-water treatment facility was approved by more than 3-to-1 majority as some 475 voters went to the polls in an election here last Saturday.

Voting results were reported by City Manager Mike Moore as follows:

Proposition 1, a \$100,000 sewer revenue bond - 356 for, 115 against.

Proposition 2, a \$475,000 general obligation bond for the new treatment plant - 357 for, 115 against.

Proposition 3, a \$100,000 water revenue bond to provide a contingency fund for contracted projects - 360 for, 111 against.

Mr. Moore said results of the election, which was held at the Corral Room of the Hotel Laguna, would be canvassed at the regular city council meeting Tuesday night. M.L. Bailey served as election judge.

Voting was not as heavy as city officials had anticipated. Some 1,000 voters had been expected to turn out.

Mayor Eris Ritchie told The Press that he was well pleased with the result of the voting. He believed that senior citizens and others

Water and sewer rate increases will go into effect with the Dec. 1 billings, city officials have announced.

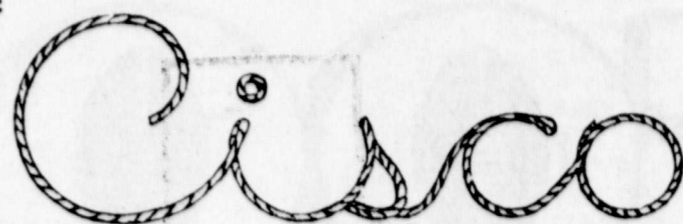
Rifle Is Stolen From Parked Car

Missing from the car were a Marlin 30-30 rifle, a field jacket, radio equipment and a pair of binoculars, Sgt. Knight said. Mr. Smith, who had been deer hunting, stopped at the restaurant to eat. Police were investigating.

In other weekend activity, police arrested two men on charges of driving while intoxicated, arrested two others for driving with suspended driver's licenses and one man from North Carolina on charges of public intoxication.
