Don Underwood has authorized this newspaper to announce that he is a candidate for the office of Eastland County Sheriff subject to action of the May Democratic Primary.

Mr. Underwood is a native of Eastland County, having lived in the Gorman and Carbon area, and graduated from Carbon High School.

He and his wife, Dolores live five miles south of Eastland on Highway 6. They have three sons, Lyndall who lives in Big Lake with his wife, Connie and twin sons, Jody and Jody, age three, Lyndall is a deputy for Reagan County. Son Greg lives in Clifton and is employed by Texas-New Mexico Power and Light. Their youngest son, Daryl is a junior at Carbon High School.

J.C. Penney Company Will Close Cisco Store

J.C. Penney Company will be closing the Cisco store "on or before January 28", according to an announce-



ment here Thursday by local manager Robert Dudley and District Manager Jim Heinrichs of Dallas. The local store had been in operation here since August of 1974.

"Declining business over the past several years, along with expenses which keep going up and low-volume business have forced us to make this choice," explained Mr. Heinrichs. He stated, "This is not something we like to do, but from the business economic standpoint we don't have much choice."

Heinrichs said he was in Cisco to make the announcement to the associates at the store Thursday morning. He praised Mr. Dudley for his contributions to the local store, as well as the community, during his time in Cisco. Mr. Dudley became manager of the local store in April of 1977.

Should the local store sell out its remaining merchandise before Jan. 28, it will close at that time. Heinrichs said a telephone number will probably be set up for catalog sales at either the Abilene or Early stores.

Dudley expressed his appreciation to the customers of J.C. Penney for their friendship and patronage. He stated, "Cisco and Eastland County have been very good to us and we hate to have to close, but due to the problems mentioned we are forced to do this."

He said he will continue to work for J.C. Penney and will be transferred to another town in the near future. Dudley and Heinrichs said it will probably be the end of January before they know for sure where Dudley will be transferred.

'Christmas In May' Applications Ready

"Christmas in May" is Cisco's annual volunteer housing repair project for the elderly and handicapped. All money is contributed voluntarily by the Cisco community and is spent only for materials to make the repairs. The houses are repaired by volunteer labor (the people are not paid to do the work).

To qualify, someone must own their home and live on a small fixed income. If the recipients are not 60 years old or older, they must be physically handicapped

whereby they cannot earn a living. Any one fitting these descriptions is encouraged to come by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, at 619 Conrad Hilton Avenue, to fill out an application. The Board of Directors for "Christmas in May" will determine from the applications who will receive this benefit. Dr. Norman Wallace, President of Cisco Junior College, is the Chairman of this committee. We will be accepting applications from January 9, 1984 through February 6, 1984.

Some fourteen volumes of district court records were filed Wednesday, Jan. 4, with the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland as defense counsel began steps to ask for an appeal from a life sentence given Loyal Lundstrom in his murder trial last September.

The records include everything pertaining to the murder of Doris Lundstrom in Cisco on March 3, 1983, and court action involving her husband from his arrest some 10 days later through his conviction in 91st District Court on Sept. 6, 1983.

Documents Are Filed For Lundstrom Appeal

There were several pre-trial hearings and several days devoted to jury selection plus a number of motions by defense counsel plus the week-long trial for court reporters to transcribe before the case could be submitted to the appeals court.

The defense has 30 days in which to file the motion for new trial, for which the fourteen volumes of records will be the basis. The court reporter had to obtain a 30-day time extension to complete the records that were filed Wednesday, it was understood.

First Appeals Court action on the Lundstrom appeal could be in April or May.

With the transfer of the documents from 91st District Court Wednesday to the 11th Court of Appeals, a process begins which will first give

the defendant 30 days to file any additional data to the court, after which the State has another 30 day period for additional filing.

At the end of this period the court will write each side asking if oral arguments are requested, and they are expected to be, so the first hearings, the oral arguments could be set for

one of the regular Thursday argument days of April or May.

Medical Doctor Moving To Cisco

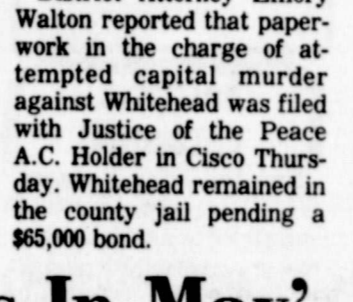
Oklahoma College of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery at Tulsa.

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verdict that there would be an appeal.

Lundstrom, 60, and his 27-year old wife lived in Cisco for some 10 years, operating the Cisco Motel and a monument business. They were active in church and community affairs and he was a member of the city council and mayor pro tem at the time of the shooting.

The body of Mrs. Lundstrom was found in their motel apartment bedroom three days after she was shot in the abdomen with a 20-gauge shotgun. Their five children had been left in the care of friends and Lundstrom was missing when the body was discovered.

Some 10 days later, Lundstrom surrendered to Cisco police and was released under bond. He was taken into custody immediately after the jury's verdict was read and transported to Huntsville the next day.

Lundstrom was previously in prison, serving part of a sentence after his conviction in the death of his first wife, Helen, after a quarrel at their home in Minnesota. The conviction was later overturned for court error and he was never brought to trial again.

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Lundstrom was sent to prison at Huntsville a day after the jury's verdict assessed him the life sentence, which was the maximum in the murder case. He was represented by Bill Hart, Eastland attorney, who gave notice after the

verdict that there would be an appeal.

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Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



Last summer when West Texas ranchers came to me asking for help surviving their area's worst drought in decades, they did not ask for a handout.

What they wanted was to buy damaged, surplus government-owned grain, at reasonably reduced prices, so that they could save what remained of their livestock from starvation.

The compelling reasoning in favor of this strategy was that the damaged grain, much of which had been stored in Texas, was not of good enough quality to use for export or the Payment-In-Kind program. It was not good for much except livestock feed.

This damaged grain was stored in grain elevators at an enormous cost to taxpayers. U.S. Department of Agriculture records in June showed 83 million bushels of damaged grain was running up an annual bill of \$48 million in storage and interest charges.

Agriculture Secretary John Block had it within his discretion to release this grain to these ranchers, yet he repeatedly refused to help.

At one point the department did offer improved terms for Farmers Home Administration loans. But our drought-stricken ranchers and farmers didn't really need another note at the bank. They needed something a cow could eat.

For more than six months, ranchers and farmers were forced to play an agonizing waiting game because of the department's obstinance. Congress had to pass legislation forcing release of the grain. The legislation, which I introduced in the Senate, was finally signed into law on Nov. 29, 1983.

Shortly thereafter, a USDA spokesman admitted publicly that the grain could have been released four months earlier, and without legislation.

So our ranchers paid the price. Some went out of business. Many had to cut back herds they had spent years developing.

In the 27 Texas counties designated as drought disaster areas last year, statistics for January 1983 showed 755,000 cattle and 1.2 million sheep and goats. Texas A&M University estimates there are now 300,000 cattle and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association estimates there are only 300,000 sheep and goats.

This was a tragic price to have paid so needlessly.

Had the Secretary acted to provide drought relief last summer, this emergency aid would have been far more timely and more helpful.

Even at its best federal aid cannot end the problems brought on by the drought. Only rain can do that.

But effective and timely federal relief—such as emergency livestock feed assistance—can help. Unfortunately, the help our ranchers and farmers are getting is several months late.

District Court Sends 200 Jurors Home

The 200 prospective jurors who had been summoned to report to 91st District Court Tuesday for a scheduled capital murder trial were paid for the days service and asked to report back to the court on Jan. 16.

A number of other criminal cases had been set to follow the murder trial Tuesday, but the prospective jurors were released because Criminal District Attorney Emor Walton was ill.

The murder trial had been disposed of late Friday afternoon in a virtually empty courtroom when Brenda Gail Andrews, 21, of Rising Star, through her attorney plea-bargained down to a criminal conspiracy count, and was assessed a 10-year

probated prison sentence. She had been indicted for capital murder in the death of 29-year-old Debra Jo Garcia.

Oilwell Plugging Unclear

Recent Railroad Commission actions have made some oil operators concerned about the effect of property transfers on well plugging responsibility.

In fact, enforcement actions probably will be directed against the original operator first - even when the parties to the transfer intended that the new operator would be responsible.

Under current policy, when an existing lease is transferred from one operator to another, the new operator becomes responsible upon the approval of his P-4. But the original operator - the first to abandon the well - is also responsible.

The Commission is telling operators that it will turn down requested subdivisions of leases where the purpose is merely to allocate plugging responsibilities between the parties. It is not clear what the situation must be in order to limit the new operator's responsibility.

Income Tax Workshop To Be Held

A farmer's income tax workshop will be held at the Eastland National Bank Community Room Tuesday night January 10, at 7:00 p.m. according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

It is that time of the year again when farmers and ranchers are getting their records together for the income tax reporting. The Ex-

ension Service will conduct the workshop to help farmers and ranchers understand changes in 1983 tax laws and provide information that could save money at tax paying time.

Dr. Ashley Lovell, Area Extension Economist, will discuss changes in the 1983 tax laws and answer questions on tax reporting and discuss other tax topics of in-

terest. Farm records will also be discussed.

The meeting has been planned at night so that farmers and wives who have off-farm jobs during the day may attend Gordon says.

Everyone is invited to attend the workshop which will last about 2 1/2 hours.

Railroad Comm. Amends Rule 8

The Texas Railroad Commission has republished an amended version of its proposed Rule 8, which concerns water protection and oilfield pits. The earliest possible date of adoption is Jan. 9, 1984.

Several Significant changes have already been made.

First, producers are no long being held responsible for pollution by saltwater haulers when the producer is in no way at fault.

Instead, producers are liable for such pollution

when they FAIL TO DETERMINE THAT THE HAULER IS PERMITTED, OR WHEN THE PRODUCER KNOWS OR SHOULD KNOW THAT THE HAULER IS LIKELY TO POLLUTE.

Another change - backfilling time for water pits can be extended to 120 days. The original proposition called for a 30 day time frame.

The Railroad Commission will accept comments on Proposed Rule 8 until Jan. 9. Call them in Austin if you wish.

K. Hance Wants To Debate

Democratic Senate Candidate Kent Hance today challenged his two chief rivals to a series of televised debates throughout Texas.

"It's time for voters of Texas to see first hand, just how sharp the contrasts are between me and my opponents," Hance said.

When he issued his debate challenge, Hance noted that the Federal Communications Commission recently relaxed its equal time requirements for political campaigns. In the past, a third party has had to sponsor a debate in order for broadcasters to cover it as "bona fide news event," and be exempt from equal time provisions of the Communications Act of 1934. The Hance campaign has invited every television station in Texas to provide time for a debate.

Hance said he hopes Texas broadcasters take advantage of these new provisions designed to provide greater flexibility in the news programming and to promote the political education of viewers and listeners.

"The FCC ruling will be good news for the voters, if my opponents will agree to debate," Hance said.

"I know why I'm in this race," said the Lubbock Democrat. "I want to take a Texas vision for America's future to the United States Senate."

"That means holding the line on government spending and taxes and a recognition that here in Texas, hard work, independence, courage, and ingenuity still count for something."

But Hance said, "It is also a vision that includes equal opportunities for all Americans, and the need for government programs to help those people who cannot help themselves."

"I know why I'm running for the Senate," Hance said, "but I'm not sure about the other two candidates, and I bet he voters of Texas aren't either." A debate, Hance said, "would allow voters to make an informed choice, on the issues and the candidates."

The Hance campaign also announced today that Walter Mischer of Houston, and Rick Strauss of Dallas have agreed to be State Finance Co-Chairmen.

Mischer is Chairman of the Board of Allied Bancshares, and Chief Executive Officer of the Mischer Corporation of Houston.

Strauss is Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Realty Development Corporation of Dallas.

Homemaking Hints

What are the future trends in housing for the 1980's?

Big homebuilders aim to take a larger share of the market from here on, and 1984 prospects have dimmed by September's 13.4% slip in starts - but many small builders are amazingly buoyant. The reason: they are riding a new boom in remodeling and renovation.

With mortgage rates and new-home prices still high, more people are refurbishing or enlarging their houses instead of trading up to the customized homes small builders normally thrive on.

Demand for improvement loans has been rising steadily for the past year. Remodeling has become so strong that the National Association of Home Builders estimates 30% of its members will be involved in it within a few years vs. only 16% in 1978. The business, of course, is much bigger than home improvements or additions done by builders. It includes home repairs or remodeling done by homeowners themselves and rehabilitation of aging structures into new residences.

Spending on home remodeling, repairs, and rehabilitation could reach \$54 billion, more than 42% of the estimated \$127 billion of residential construction - including homebuilding - this year. That is quite a leap from the \$36.3 billion spent on remodeling in 1978, when it made up only 33.5% of residential construction spending, and a nice rise over 1982's \$49.1 billion.

There has been a great demand for anything that ties in with storage. People are trying to eke out every bit of space in their homes. National Gypsum Co., the nation's second-largest wallboard producer, expects repair and renovation to be one of the brighter markets in the 1980s.

While a good part of home remodeling is cyclical and fluctuates with the market for new housing, the repair and rehabilitation portion is almost insensitive to interest rate changes. When the roof is leaking, you don't worry about what rate you have to pay for a home-improvement loan.

All signs point to a continued boom in rehabilitation investment in the 1980s. Besides the move back to the

inner city, which enhances demand for rehabilitated buildings, there is a new reluctance to tear down what was built just because it is old. The current 25% tax credit for refurbishing a historic landmark also boosts "rehabbing."

This means that many smaller builders, home-repair centers, and material suppliers will find new profit niches in the more constrained housing environment of the 1980s.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
Cold Weather and a good cup of something to drink go together. A recipe for Almond Tea was used at an Extension Homemakers Club meeting and was delicious.

ALMOND TEA
1 1/4 cups sugar
2 quarts water
4 tablespoons instant tea
1 teaspoon almond flavoring
1 teaspoon vanilla
Strips of rind from one lemon

Combine sugar, water, lemon rind and boil 5 minutes. Remove rind; add tea, almond and vanilla flavoring. Serve hot or cold. (Cover leftover tea tightly and refrigerate. Will keep for two weeks) Makes 10-12 servings.

New Driver Classifications To Be Used For Licenses

Beginning January 1, 1984, those persons who renew their driver license, qualify for their first license, or apply for a duplicate permit will receive licenses bearing new codes signifying class of license.

Colnel Jim Adams, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the department is starting the conversion to a new classified driver licensing system in accordance with a law passed this year by the Texas Legislature.

"License issued prior to 1984 will be valid until the expiration dates which appear on them," Adams said. "The new licenses will carry classifications designating the type and weight of vehicles which the holder may operate."

The new license classifications are "A", "B", "C", and "M".

The Class "C" license permits operation of single, two-axle vehicles with a gross weight of 24,000 pounds or less excluding motorcycles and mopeds. This designation also allows the towing of a vehicle not exceeding 10,000 pounds gross vehicle weight (GVW) or a farm trailer not exceeding 20,000 pounds GVW. In addition, the Class "C" designation permits the operation of a bus with a maximum seating capacity of 23 passengers not including the driver. Standard operator licenses issued under the old law will be converted automatically to Class "C" permits upon renewal or issuance of a duplicate license.

The Class "B" license allows the holder to drive all Class "C" vehicles plus single vehicles with a GVW exceeding 24,000 pounds and busses with a capacity of 24 or more passengers. Motorcycles and mopeds are excluded.

Class "A" permits allow operation of any vehicle or combination of vehicles including those listed for classes "B" and "C".

Mopeds and motorcycles are excluded. Commercial and full chauffeur licenses issued under the old statute will be converted automatically to Class "A" permits upon renewal or issuance of a duplicate license.

The Class "M" designation allows the holder to operate motorcycles, motor-driven cycles and mopeds.

The road test must be taken with a vehicle which meets the specific requirements of the license class for which the person is applying.

"All classes of licenses including renewals will be valid for four years," Adams said. "The fee for obtaining or renewing all license classes will be \$10. An examination fee for five dollars will be charged for those drivers seeking higher license classification or a motorcycle endorsement for their current license."

Drivers who have no moving violation convictions over a four-year period and who also have no physical limitations are eligible to renew their licenses by mail. To qualify for mail-in renewal, a driver must first receive a DPS form in the mail. This application should be mailed back to the department within one week after it is received. When the license is renewed, the driver will be sent a validation card which must be carried with the old license. A vision test and new photograph will not be required for mail-in renewals. Drivers who receive mail-in renewal forms may also visit a driver license office and renew their licenses according to the standard procedure which will require them to be photographed and have their vision tested.

The fee for a provisional license is computed at \$2.50 per year until the driver's eighteenth birthday with a minimum fee of four dollars. The cost of a duplicate license is three dollars.

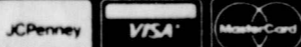

The fight against cancer is real, continuous, and demands a ready army. We the volunteers are the soldiers of that army. Our great responsibility is to educate the people so they can take advantage of early detection. It is in all people of all ethnic groups social, and political. Drilling Bits

Flowing 796,000 CF gas per day on a 2-in. choke, the No. 1 Gloria Ruby has been brought on line in the Davenport Field, Eastland County, by Comanche Investments of Cisco. Drillsite was three miles northeast of Ranger.

The well got a sturdy 6,000,000 CFD rating on open flow.

It is in a 26-acre lease in the Andrew Bradley Survey A-15. It bottomed at 3,557 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 3,456 to 3,470 feet into the hole.

First production figures have been posted for the No. 9-F Katlaco "D" in Eastland County's Ardinger Field, three miles northeast of Cisco.

With Katlaco Operating Inc. of Lubbock as the operator, the well pumped 42 barrels of oil and 165,000 CF gas per day on open choke. It bottomed at 4,045 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Lake Sand, 3,419 to 3,476 feet.

The operation is in a 120-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey A-988.

Bryan-based Republic Energy Inc. has posted first

production data for a new producer in Eastland County's Moreno Field, six miles south of the Carbon townsite.

Designated as the No. 1 Martin, it is in a 995-acre lease in the George W. Robinson Survey Sec. 34.

It showed potential to pump 33 barrels of crude per day on a half-inch choke, plus 113,000 CF gas per day. Flow pressure was gauged at 75 PSI.

Republic took the well to 3,354-ft. bottom and perforated the Marble Falls Formation for production, 2,738 to 2,762 feet into the hole.

Operating out of Hurst, Sentinel Petroleum Inc. has finalized the No. 1 Spencer "A" in Eastland County's Eastland Regular Field 12 miles southwest of Cisco.

The Spencer well indicated ability to pump 19 barrels of oil and 102,000 CF gas per day on a 25/64 choke. It registered flowing tubing pressure of 75 PSI.

An 800-ft. developmental well is planned in the Eastland Regular Field by Supreme Oil of Abilene two miles east of Carbon. The well will be in a 60-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey Sec. 19, Blk. 2. It will be known as the No. 1 Gilbert Estate.

Katlaco Operating of Lubbock has staked location for the No. 10 Katlaco "K" in Eastland County's Ardinger Field four miles northeast of Cisco, about 3,000 feet east of U.S. Highway 183. The well is aimed at oil production in the Lake Sand. It is situated in a 130-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey A-988.

A total of four shallow wells are scheduled for spudding in the Eastland Regular Field by Midwood Petroleum Inc. of Brownwood. The wells are designated as the Nos. 2 through 5 Isenhower, all carrying permit for 500-ft. TD. They are in a 45-acre lease in the SFRR Survey A-2037, about four miles east of the Putnam townsite.

North Star Energy Inc. of Strawn has filed for permit to deepen an existing Palo

Pinto County well located five miles northeast of Strawn. It is the No. 21 Ball, with drillsite in a 1,377-acre lease in the Abner Ashworth Survey. Proposed total drilling depth is 4,200 feet.

1040A Tax Form Becomes More Versatile

The short Form 1040A is a little longer, and Internal Revenue Service officials say that will be good news for many taxpayers.

In 1983 version of the 1040A has added five lines and a schedule which may be attached if needed. According to the IRS, the new short form becomes a more versatile tax return that will save time and reduce errors for the taxpayers who can use it.

For example, taxpayers claiming the child care credit can now use the 1040A instead of filing the longer Form 1040 and separate

schedule that were previously required. Likewise, taxpayers claiming Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA) deductions can use the short form.

According to IRS officials, the new 1040A should reduce refund delays caused by errors as well as save time for those who use it. One reason for that is that many taxpayers who previously had to use the 68-line long form can now do the same job with the 1040A. This not only

saves the time of reading through the nonapplicable lines of the 1040 but also reduces the chance of errors caused by wrong line entries.

Taxpayers who filed Form 1040A or 1040EZ last year will automatically receive the same forms in the mail. Other taxpayers can request the 1040A or 1040EZ through the Federal Tax information number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government.

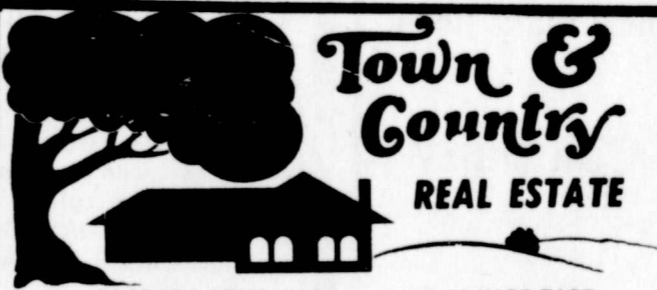

It may seem a little late to be writing about ice and freeze damage just after we have experienced the coldest weather that most can remember. However, it is still early winter and we will surely have more extremely cold weather before winter is over.

I have heard a lot of equipment damage, livestock losses and pipe damage resulting from the cold weather. It is too early to know the amount of damage to grasses, ornamental plants and trees.

Cutting ice on stock tanks or hauling water to livestock was a daily chore for all livestock owners during the freezing weather. I heard of something that might prevent having to cut ice on stock tanks if they freeze over again. Try placing a salt block in the shallow water of a stock tank. I've been told that this will not freeze for a foot or so around the salt block. This should provide a place for livestock to get water. It sounds reasonable, but I've never seen it tried. It would be worth a try the next time the tank freezes over.

Use extreme caution when applying common salt to sidewalks, streets and driveways to keep them free of ice.

The salt may injure nearby trees, shrubs and other growing plants. As ice and snow melts, the water may drain into the lawn area, carrying the salt into the root zone of nearby plants. Visible effects of the salt injury may not appear until early summer as hot dry weather approaches. Tree damage may vary from marginal burning of the leaves, complete browning and death of the leaves, or, in extreme cases, loss of a prize tree or shrub.

What can be used to rid walkways of hazardous ice? Let me suggest using ammonium nitrate where drainage moves the water into lawn and shrub borders. This will fertilize the plants as well as melt the ice. If ammonium nitrate isn't available, any commercial fertilizer high in nitrogen

and potassium may be used. Use only enough material to melt the ice since continued use over a long period can also damage plants.

Sand can be used on icy walks and drives to provide better traction.

So, before using salt on drives and walkways, check the drainage pattern to make sure its use will not damage valuable plants. A little caution at the time of application can prevent damage to valuable landscape trees.

Homeowners can take certain steps to reduce or prevent freeze damage to landscape plants.

To reduce the likelihood of freeze damage, especially to evergreen plants, be sure to mulch root areas to prevent low soil temperature. This allows continued up-take of moisture and less chance of dehydration. Do not allow soil to become excessively dry. Water thoroughly before a freeze but do not water while ground is frozen.

County Agent De Gordon suggests covering choice plants with large cardboard containers or by wrapping them with polyethylene film. If film is used, be sure to remove whenever direct sunlight hits it, as extremely high temperatures can develop and cause more damage to the plant than that caused by the cold.

Do Not be over-anxious to remove plants that appear to have been killed by a freeze. Often damage plants will send out new shoots from the roots. Unless they are budded or grafted plants, new growth will be the same as the original plants.

Careful pruning to encourage compact growth will produce an attractive plant. Be sure to remove dead or damaged wood by pruning to good, sound tissue. However, wait until new growth starts before pruning so you can determine the extent of injury. Pruning too soon can result in removing too much uninjured wood or having to repeat the pruning operation because not all dead tissue was removed.

Prevent Back Problems

Virtually no one goes through life without having at least an occasional backache, and some people suffer from it constantly.

The Texas Medical Association says there are several ways to avoid back problems while performing day-to-day activities:

-Lifting: The legs are much stronger than the back, so let them do the work in lifting a heavy object. Stand close to the object with your feet about a foot apart. Keeping your spine straight, bend your knees and grasp the object. Lift by straightening your legs, but do not pull upward with your arms and back.

-Standing: Your mother was right. Stand erect with your head up, your shoulders straight, and your chest forward. Balance your weight

on both legs.

-Sitting: A firm chair with a high back is best. Avoid slouching in a chair when you are tired. If you are that tired, lie down. On long car trips, use a cushion to support the small of the back.

-Sleeping: A firm mattress or one with a board under it helps keep your spine straight while you sleep. A single, relatively flat pillow or none at all will help accomplish this.

-Shoes: Wear low-heel shoes that are comfortable. High heels put strain on the back. The higher the heel, the more unnatural your stance becomes.

Finally, overweight persons place added stress on the back. Losing weight not only will ease this but will make the person healthier in general.

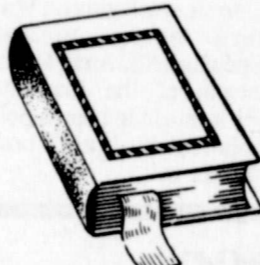
