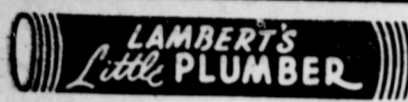


ITINERARY OF ARMY RECRUITER GIVEN

USE CAUTION IN USING WASHING MACHINE

Lubbock—Washing clothes with an electric washing machine is not generally considered a hazardous undertaking, but certain safety precautions should be observed to prevent accidents, according to Miss Lola M. Drew, assistant professor of home management at Texas Technological College.

The cord to the machine should be covered with rubber, and if an extension cord is used it, too, should be rubber insulated to prevent wires from becoming wet. Electric switches should never be touched when the operator is holding wet clothes, standing on a wet floor, or when her hands are damp, Miss Drew warned.

Weeping Lovegrass May Be Answer To The Permanent Pasture Problem

Weeping lovegrass, a native of Africa, where drought and extreme growing conditions occur, may be a partial answer to the search of South Plains farmers and ranchers for a permanent planted pasture and a good cover crop for sandy areas.

For the irrigation farmer who improved permanent pastures may have been overlooked as a good bet for several years.

V. L. Formway, living on the northeast edge of Plainview, had enough curiosity to plant one acre of weeping lovegrass in 24-inch rows last April. Watering it, he harvested 23 pounds of seeds in July. Watering again each two weeks, he placed eight steers and cows on it on Aug. 5, where they grazed until Nov. 4, except about six days a month when it was being watered.

He sold two steers that had received no other feed and found from sales tickets that they had gained 135 pounds together. At that rate the acre plot of ground produced 540 pounds of beef in 90 days. At 20 cents a pound this would amount to \$108 an acre.

It would be interesting to know what this grass mixed with a legume of some kind would do in a

full season. There is a booklet issued by the United States Department of Agriculture—Circular No. 730, which can be bought from the Superintendent of Documents for 20 cents, which gives some starting comparisons between weeping lovegrass and our own native and irrigated grasses.

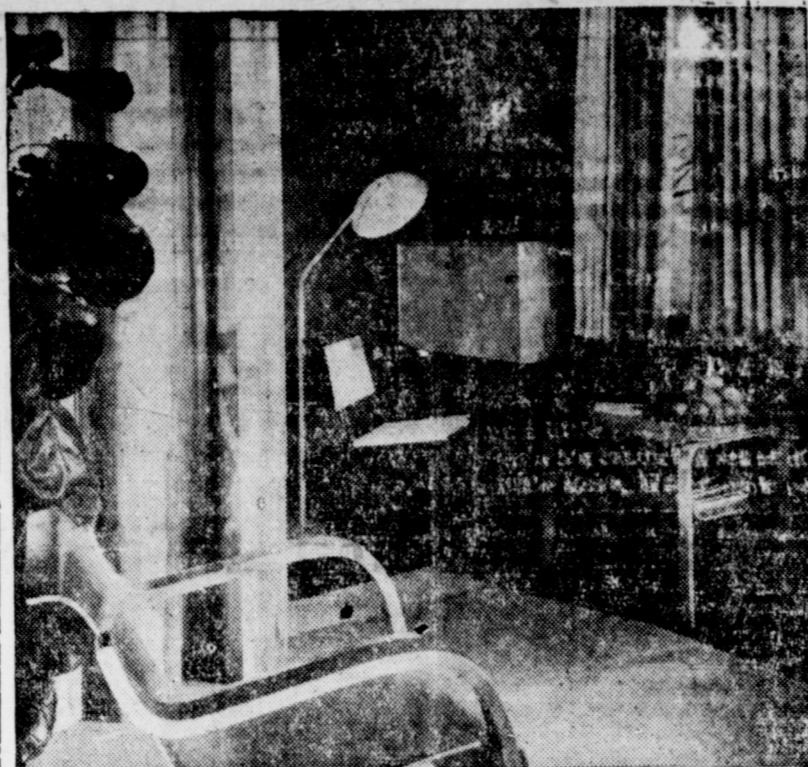
One table shows the digestible protein to be 50 per cent higher than our native grama grass, double that of bluestem hay. The dry hay has 8 to 9 per cent protein.

The tops and roots of three-year-old grasses were cut, washed and grass showed more than six times the weight of orchard grass, five times that of blue grama. The percent against 49 per cent and 27 percent of leaves to stems favors lovegrass also, it having 84 per cent on the big and little blue-stems.

Back to another more practical example in this area, Dyer Slaton of Plainview planted 40 acres broadcast along a draw west of Plainview in August, 1946. Rains brought up a good stand and this season carried 38 head of beef cattle all summer with only one irrigation.

"These cattle were in poor condition when I got them; now they look good," Slaton says. "This love-

grass kept me from having to take them to my New Mexico ranch. I expect to plant more of the grass next year.

Originally the grass was not meant for pasture. It was intended only to check water and wind erosion and soil building. However, if it proves equal to or better than other grasses in many ways, there is no reason why it should not be given a trial in this irrigation belt.

A legume should be found to plant along with it. A Louisiana experiment used red clover with weeping lovegrass and got 430 pounds of beef gain per acre by Aug. 1, a half season of growth.

The grass has narrow, tough leaves that would make a rope and when wrapped around farm machinery will dull a knife rapidly. Yet, if it will produce and is as palatable as other grasses and it is said to be, it deserves a trial.

Several ranchers over the area have broadcast the seed by airplane on abandoned cropland, weedy pastures and thinly-vegetated areas. Plantings by air have been made in Hale, Swisher, Cochran and Lynn counties and will be made in Hockley county soon.

Plantings by air were made after observations in Lamb county showing that broadcast seedings there on several farms in 1946 produced good results. No dirt coverings were made and according to Lem Weaver, county agent: "Broadcast it on top of the ground and let old Mother Nature do the rest."

Weaver recommends some weeping lovegrass in pasture mixtures.

Pete Carmichael, farmer in Deaf Smith county, has grazed 35 head of cows and calves on nine acres of sweet sudan and eight acres of irrigated pasture since June 1. He reported to County Agent Hugh L.

Clearman that the irrigated pasture, planted last spring, was seeded to a mixture of five pounds broom grass, five pounds crested wheat, five pounds perennial rye and three pounds alfalfa. The cows began grazing this pasture six weeks after planting. One mowing was necessary to control weeds.

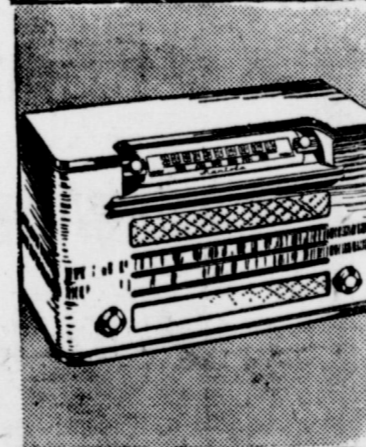

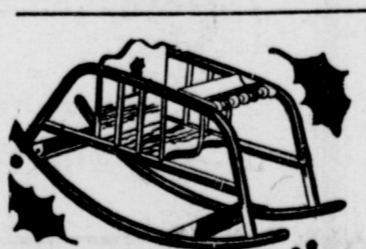

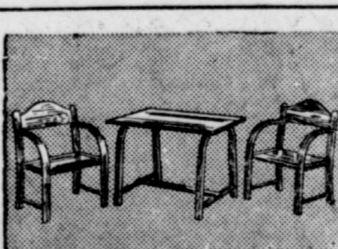

SU Texans who are wondering whether to put their savings in- to farm or ranch land at to- day's prices may profit from a recent analysis on the land market during four significant periods — postwar, depression, recovery and the war years.

The analysis, prepared by Joe Motheral, of the Agricultural Ex- periment Station of Texas A. & M. College, and John H. Southern and Samuel L. Crockett of the USDA Bureau of Agricultural Economics, shows that farm income is the main factor determining land prices. Prospective buyers would be wise to watch the trends in prices of

the principal commodities that pro- vide the farm income, as these prices tend to lead the land mar- ket by a year or more.

In some areas, a single important commodity sets the pace, as pean- uts in the West Cross Timbers, while in other areas, a combination of enterprises influences land prices. Beef cattle, rice and cotton al- ong the Gulf Coast, for instance, or cattle, sheep and goats in the Edwards Plateau, must be consid- ered in calculations for these areas.

Government price and export programs may also alter land prices, and buyers might take into consideration that five of Texas' most important farm commodities — cotton, corn, wheat, rice and pea- nuts for nuts—are covered by price guarantees at 80 per cent of parity or more through 1948.

The status of mineral rights is among other items reflected in the market values of Texas

land. Separate ownership of mineral rights lowered surface values by more than one-half in Smith county, where a special study has been made. Where various fractions of the mineral rights were reserved, farm tracts changed hands at various prices ranging between these two extremes.

Land prices have already reached "boom" proportions in some sections of the state, particularly in grazing areas, but some of the usual characteristics of a boom are lacking in the present market. One of the bright spots right now is the high percentage of cash transactions and accompanying low volume of mortgage indebtedness.

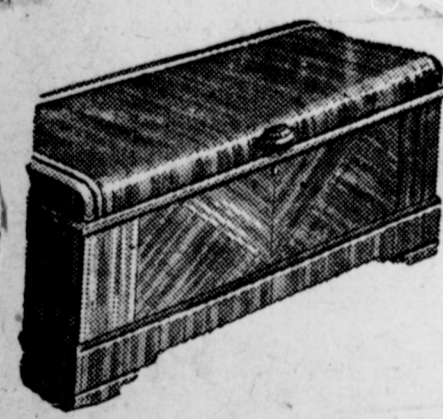

Farm Notes

COTTON BALANCE SHEET

Austin—Not since the fall of 1924 has the November cotton balance for the nation been as small as it is this year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Dr. A. B. Cox, professor of cotton marketing, College of Business Administration, pointed out that cotton, because of its many ramifications into the economic life of this nation and the world, is particularly sensitive to economic and political storms now dominant in the world.

"Cotton the best hedge in the world against inflation," according to Dr. Cox, "because it has a world market and is relatively nonperishable. At the present time cotton is in rather scarce supply, especially with the United States cotton balance standing at 11,733,000 running bales."

Strong world demand for cotton, the wide margin of profit to spinners, drastic government proposals of price ceilings, exchange regulations, export programs, crop quotas and subsidies will regulate cotton in the near future as far as price movements are concerned.

FARM CASH INCOME

Austin—Texas farmers cashed in with the stakes high during October as farm income soared \$100,000,000 above its September level to score a 42 per cent monthly jump. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Estimated farm cash intake for the state reached \$342,210,000 in October, exceeding October 1946 by 55 per cent. The bureau's seasonally-adjusted index stood at 550 in October (Base: 1935-39 equals 100). The index was slightly under the September mark, since the monthly advance failed to come up to gains called for in the seasonal pattern.

The gain in intake over October last year is especially significant in view of the fact that gains were expected to be less spectacular for the second half of this year than they were for the first. The basis of comparison has changed: in the first half of the year, the comparison was between a free market and OPA-ceilinged prices of a year earlier.

Austin—Sleep is a necessity of life and health, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and habitual loss of sleep will tend to retard the body's recovery from the fatigue of the day's activities. "We may be able to go without sleep for a night or two, but too long a sleep for a prolonged length of time will undermine the health of a rugged person and sleep that is not made up," Dr. Cox said. "When good health can be protected to such a large extent merely by sleeping, and thus allowing overtaxed bodies and minds

to secure the proper rest, it is hard to understand why so many persons are heedless of this important health measure." Some individuals require more sleep than others. How well we sleep is as important as how long we sleep. A "good night's rest" means a sufficient number of hours spent in sleep to enable the individual to feel well, do efficient work and to keep in a cheerful humor the next day. "A comfortable bed, and fresh air in our sleeping quarters," Dr. Cox said, "will help us to sleep soundly at night, especially after some outdoor exercise such as a brisk walk. Christmas Card Custom Is Only 100 Years Old

Colorful Christmas cards today seem as much a part of Christmas tradition as does Santa Claus. Yet the custom of sending cheery Yuletide cards is only a little over 100 years old — and it met stubborn popular resistance during its early days!

Early Christmas card designers, back in the 1850's met widespread public ridicule. Like Fulton and his steamboat, they were warned that the custom of sending Christmas cards "could never win popular support."

Today postoffices are buried under the landslide of Christmas cards every holiday season. More than 1,500,000,000 Christmas cards will be exchanged in the United States alone this year, according to an estimate by the National Association of Greeting Card Publishers.

The first known Christmas card was designed in 1842 in London, England, by William Maw Egley,

a sixteen-year-old engraving apprentice. He printed only one hundred copies, and sent them to his friends.

His quaintly cluttered card, printed in black ink on white paper, showed a formal banquet, a party dance, skaters, and a typically English pantomime performance. Underneath the illustration he wrote, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year To You" — still the most popular Yuletide greeting among all those ever composed.

The card won no fame for William Egley, and nothing is known of what happened to him when he grew up.

Four years later, in 1846, Sir Henry Cole asked an artist friend, J. C. Horsley, to design a Christmas greeting card for him. The drawing featured a decorative trellis covered with a grapevine enclosing two small illustrations of acts of charity plus a larger panel picturing a merry family party, the celebrants all holding wineglasses filled to the brim. One thousand copies were lithographed and sent to Sir Henry's friends.

The cards raised a storm of public criticism from crusaders for the temperance cause, who claimed that

Sir Henry's design "promoted wine bibbing." Taught discretion, Sir Henry never issued another card.

In 1862, a London publisher, Charles Goodall & Sons, courageously began issuing cards, and they won rapid acceptance. During the intervening twenty years, Prince Albert had presented Queen Victoria with the first Christmas tree in England, Charles Dickens' jolly writings had popularized Yuletide festivities, and the stern English attitude toward Christmas had melted.

Meanwhile, the first Christmas card in the United States had been published by R. H. Pease of Albany, N. Y. It was a commercial card picturing a family group, toys, a Christmas dinner, a was-sail bowl, and advertising Pease's store. The card is not dated, and since Pease was in business in Albany from 1834 to 1855, it is possible that this card was even earlier than William Egley's.

Louis Prang, who issued his first cards from his litho shop in Boston in 1874, is known as the "father of the American Christmas card." Within a few years his cards were world famous for their beauty and craftsmanship, and were being sold all over the United States.

Reproduced in as many as twenty colors, the Prang cards are unsurpassed by even the modern Christmas cards. Many were large in size and trimmed with luxurious silk fringe, and sold for several dollars apiece. Unlike the present-day cards, however, Prang's cards pictured few of the traditional Christmas scenes, using instead designs featuring spring flowers, children playing, harvest scenes, birds and animals.

The 1,475 lodges of Elksdom, representing some 900,000 members, have adopted for the coming year an aggressive plan to sponsor and assist financially the promotion of the Boy Scout program, Senior Scouting and Cub Scouting, especially in less privileged districts and neighborhoods, according to an announcement by Lafayette A. Lewis, of Los Angeles, newly elected Grand Exalted Ruler of the B.P.O.E. In this connection Colonel Charles Spencer Hart, Past Grand Exalted Ruler, has been appointed to represent the Elks on the National Civic Relationships Committee of the Boy Scouts of America.

On a special trip to New York, Mr. Lewis conferred with Dr. Elbert K. Fretwell, chief Scout executive for the United States; Colonel Hart and Commander Thomas J. Keen, U.S.N.R., National Director of Civic Relations of the Boy Scouts of America, and developed plans for Elk participation. "Already we have 300 lodges of Elks sponsoring Boy Scout troops and Cub Packs," Lewis declared, "but our goal is to have every one of our 1,475 lodges cooperate with from one to three local Scout units. More than one million boys — nearly 1,100,000 — reach twelve years of age each year and 700,000 of them indicate they want to become Boy Scouts. Yet only 400,000 can be accepted because of insufficient sponsorship. We want to help provide Scouting facilities for the 300,000 left-overs and we

mean to furnish funds and offer many of our war veteran Elks as Scout leaders and committeemen.

"The 68,000 Boy Scout troops for nearly two million Scout members are not enough. We have seen militant minorities working for some revolution or other; why not the militant minority of Scout-trained citizens sponsored by Elks who stand for our best institutions and traditions?"

Mr. Lewis quoted with pride the figures of Admiral Chester Nimitz that 40 per cent of his men had been Boy Scouts and that 60 per cent of his decorated heroes had been Scouts.

The new Elks' chieftain has arranged itineraries totaling 150,000 miles of travel to subordinate lodges this year. On his visitations he plans to pledge more vigorously than ever the Elks' campaign against internal enemies of America. The particular targets of the Elks are the Ku Klux Klan, Communism, Fascism and other subversive elements.

In its 79-year history the B.P.O.E. has donated to worthy causes more than \$72,000,000, reaching a total of \$5,000,000 during the past year alone in addition to other sums given by local lodges. Lewis expects basic contributions this year will total more than \$12,000,000. Much of this will go for care of war veterans in 152 hospitals in 41 states, for the benefit of crippled children and toward college scholarships to outstanding secondary school students.
