

## Viewpoint: Voluntary Prayer -- A Call To Action

Supporters of voluntary prayer in public schools now have their best chance in 20

years to win passage of a constitutional amendment that would win religious freedom for school children.

The United States Senate no later than the last week of February 27 will begin to debate the prayer amendment and bring it to a full Senate vote possibly by March 6.

Religious freedom is at stake. The writers of our Constitution originally placed within our Constitution the right to religious freedom. This right was overturned by the Supreme Court decision in 1962-63. Since that time we have been forbidden the freedom to pray in our public schools. This decision reached the minds of our children, the leaders of tomorrow.

Attempts were made during these twenty years to restore this freedom. Not until recently when President Reagan took an all-out step and called for national support for voluntary prayer in public schools have we had such an opportunity.

In his State of the Union Address President Reagan said, "The time has come for the Congress to give the American people what most of them want for their children -- a constitutional amendment making it clear that our children can hold voluntary prayer in every school across the land."

This week a Gallup Poll announced that 82% of the American public favored returning to the original constitutional right that gave us freedom for voluntary prayer in our public schools.

As of this week, and this is changing daily due to the telephone calls, letters and office calls to the United States Senators, 48 Senators are for the amendment, 23 are against and 26 non-committed, 3 are for silent prayer.

The Voluntary Prayer amendment which will soon

be voted upon by our Senate states, "Nothing in this constitution shall be construed to prohibit individual or group prayer in public schools or other public institutions. No person shall be required by the United States or by any state to participate in prayer. Neither shall the United States nor any states compose the words of any prayer to be said in public schools."

Certainly, this amendment protects both those who wish to pray and those who don't. You still have time for action. Until March 6 you can combat the forces against freedom to pray in public school such forces as the American Liberties who are

trying to prevent passage of this freedom. This is the best opportunity America's school children have had or

ever will have to once again pray in their schools. Invest in two long distant telephone calls to our

Senators, John Tower and Lloyd Bentson. The numbers are 1-202-224-3131 or 1-202-224-9222.

### HALL OF REMARKS

REV. LARRY SOWELS of the Bible Baptist Church in Cisco brought a newsletter into our office this week which is distributed by The American Council of Christian Churches entitled Fundamental News Service. There was a portion of the newsletter which he thought should be of interest to everyone and after reading it I agree.

But instead of telling what it said, I am reprinting the article in this column and ask that you read it and do what you thing is right.

**FAKE PETITION No. RM2493** - Have you heard recently that the well known atheist, Madelyn Murray O'Hair is petitioning the Federal Communications Commission to ban religious broadcasting?

Since 1975 more than 14,732,531 letters have been received by the FCC requesting that they not agree with RM2493, which supposedly asks that all religious radio and television broadcasts be banned.

The petition by Mrs. O'Hair does not even exist. Neither is there any other petition before the FCC to ban religious broadcasting.

Here are the facts: In December, 1974, Jeremy D. Lansman and Lorenzo W. Milam filed a petition (RM2493) with the FCC. Their lengthy document asked the FCC to issue rulings that would freeze the assignment of additional educational television and FM radio licenses to individuals or groups planning to air religious programs. In an unanimous action on August, 1975, the FCC denied the Lansman-Milam petition.

Madelyn Murray O'Hair does not now or never has had any connection in any way with RM2493 according to the FCC.

Her son, William Murray, now a Christian and pastor in Dallas, Texas, claims that atheists keep alive this petition rumor to make Christians look foolish before the FCC which must approve applications for Christian radio and T.V. stations. He claims the petition is printed by the atheist group and circulated mainly in Baptist and Assembly of God churches and recently in Catholic churches as well.

In reality, Murray says, his mother does not want religious broadcasting off the air because "If it were removed, she could not demand free equal time." The American Atheist Center has radio programs free throughout the nation.

No more letters to the FCC are needed on this subject, but there is a very important

letter you can write that needs your immediate attention. The Federal Communications Commission is requesting comments from concerned citizens with regard to prohibiting "Dial-a-Porn" telephone recorded message services. The "Dial-a-Porn" services used by High Society Magazine, Inc., a New York pornographic publication, has had over 500,000 calls a day, many from children which receive a recording that depicts or describes deviant sexual activity.

The pornographic business has become a multi-million dollar a year industry - too frequently at the expense of exploiting our children. Because of nationwide advertising of the "Dial-a-Porn" number and similar services, children have been exposed to offensive and damaging messages.

Access to this service by children has alarmed many congressmen. On May 6, 1983, 46 congressmen sent a letter to FCC's Chairman Fowler expressing their concern and urging that the "Dial-a-Porn" service be stopped. U.S. Representative Thomas Bliley of Virginia, Senator Paul Trible and others supported the inclusion of language in an FCC authorization bill (No. HR2755) which would prohibit the activities of "Dial-a-Porn" and similar services. It would also raise the fine for obscene telephone messages from \$500 to \$50,000 and give the FCC greater authority to prosecute those who supply these messages.

Under the Communications Act of 1934 which specifically states it is against the law to make any statement over the telephone that is "obscene, lewd, lascivious, filthy or indecent", most legal experts believe that the FCC has been given the authority to render filthy language over public telephones as obscene.

Now the FCC needs to decide whether the public wishes it to make an obscenity determination and take action to stop the morally offensive activity. The Commission will determine whether it gets involved or not by the amount of public outcry against telephone pornography.

All concerned citizens are urged by Rep. Bliley to write to the FCC urging the agency to put a stop to "Dial-a-Porn" services. The address is:

The regional tournament

is scheduled at Chapparel Center, Midland College, and CJC will play the Western Texas College team, winners of second place. The Lady Wranglers ended the regular scheduled with a record of 20 wins and 11 losses.

The regional tournament schedule calls for the Lady Wranglers to meet Western College of Snyder at 4 p.m. Tuesday, according to Coach Ronnie Hearne.

The eight schools in the regional playoff include Cooke County JC, McLennan County JC, Cisco JC and Ranger JC in the eastern bracket. In the western bracket are Odessa JC,

Western Texas, Amarillo JC, and Howard County JC.

The CJC team had a six-point half-time lead and increased it to 12 points in the second half. Aulden Robinson led scoring with 23 points for CJC. Anthony Bryant and Melvin Jones had 21 points each. The Wranglers finished the season with a 14-15 record--6-10 in conference.

The Lady Wranglers were led by Barbara Williams with 32 points in their win. Nancy Butler had 15 and Ester Mendez scored 10 points.

### HOW TO...

Check Out Open Circuits  
Writing in a recent issue of *Mechanic Illustrated* magazine, car-care expert Paul Weisser tells how to deal with a simple form of electrical malfunction, the open circuit.  
An open circuit means a break somewhere in the circuit even when the circuit is supposed to be complete. A blown fuse, or a popped circuit breaker is the most common manifestation of an "open."  
Also possible are a broken wire, a switch that is malfunctioning, a burned-out accessory or bulb, or a defective electrical ground. Or there could simply be a bad connection.  
When the circuit's fuse is good, first check wiring connections at the accessory and any switches or relays. If the wiring goes through

Everyone goes through some or all of these stages whenever he loses something or someone very important. In other words, what we are really talking about is "good" grief, a normal process of grieving—not abnormal grief. This healthy kind of grief can help a person move through an important loss with minimum harm to self, either physical or mental.

1. The first stage of grief is shock. We become temporarily anesthetized against the reality of the event. This state of shock can be helpful because the reason does not have to comprehend the magnitude of the loss all at once.

2. The second stage of grief is emotional release.

This occurs when the dreadful loss is realized. People sometimes need to be encouraged to give vent to their feelings and to recognize that emotional release is normal and appropriate. We have been taught to admire people who "cope, are brave, get back to normal."

3. The third stage is one of utter depression, loneliness, and a sense of isolation.

We experience the depths of despair, believe there is no hope for the future. As helpers, we should show our concern and intervene, and not wait to be asked.

4. The fourth stage of grief brings physical symptoms of distress.

One study shows that 80 percent of people seeking medical treatment have suffered a loss during the preceding six months. Most people have problems sleeping and are unable to eat. It is not unusual for survivors to experience symptoms similar to the symptoms suffered by their dead loved one. Seeking out competent and compassionate medical help and gaining an understanding of the grieving process are often both necessary and helpful.

5. The fifth stage of grief begins when people become panicky.

Panic sets in when we are unable to concentrate on anything except our loss. Distressing dreams and hallucinations cause us to fear that we may be losing our minds. It is helpful to know that these responses are normal, natural, to be expected, and are actually anticipated in other cultures.

6. At the sixth stage the person begins to feel guilty about everything related to the loss.

Guilt and regrets are normal responses and need to be expressed and worked through. We have found it to be helpful to draw up an acknowledgement of something that was done that pleases or relieves the grieving individual.

7. Grief's seventh stage is one of hostility.

This is a sign that the depression is lifting. Anger is a powerful emotion and, if expressed, it can be energizing. Helpers need to have this awareness, so they do not take it personally.

8. At Stage eight the person seems unable to return to usual activities.

Although grieving is painful, at this time it feels more familiar and comfortable to the individual who has to contemplate facing the world again, alone. We need to be encouraging and help people chart their progress.

9. In stage nine, we gradually begin to gain a glimpse of hope.

Little by little, emotional balance returns with proper support and encouragement. It is impossible to predict when this will occur because there are so many individual

differences.  
10. Acceptance: the last stage; we adjust our lives to reality.

We do not become our "old selves" again. We are never old selves after we have had a great grief experience. We are different from what we were before. It is possible to live, laugh, and love again.

The annual Eastland County Livestock Show is scheduled for March 14 through March 17 at the County stock show grounds on Highway 3101 North of Eastland. Officials are expecting one of the largest youth stock shows ever. Entries in most classes are up reports Tommy Toland, show superintendent. There are 246 head of market hogs entered compared to 162 last

with the steers.


The special stock show auction will be held at the Moylan Exposition barn at 7:00 p.m. Saturday March 17.

Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Clark of Rising Star had in excess of \$19,000 stolen, most of their furniture, appliances (large and small), dishes, linens, antiques, and guns. The J.F. Guy residence in Gorman lost over \$1,100 in tools. Another case solved was the break-in at Bramlete Implement Co., a John Deere dealership in Rising Star. Three Feeders valued at \$750.00 were recovered, Morren said.

## Gordon Spot

Last week in this column we discussed lawn weed control. This week we will discuss lawn scalping and fertilizing.

Each spring many homeowners go through a process of removing the dead grass from their lawns. This process has been called "scalping" or more incorrectly, "de-thatching." Thatch is a layer of organic material that, under certain conditions, may develop between the base or crown of the plant and the soil surface. Scalping involves the removal of the dead upper parts of the plant.

Scalping is an interesting phenomenon. There is no agronomic reason why a lawn should be scalped. The material removed is not thatch nor does it contribute to thatch. A scalped lawn may or may not green up earlier in the spring. Since green up is triggered by temperature, the removal of this dead layer may allow the soil to warm up faster. On the other hand, if scalping and the resulting earlier green up is premature, a late frost or freeze may severely damage the lawn.

Another reason why scalped lawns "turn" green earlier is that just the physical removal of all the brown material may, at first, allow more of the green to be visible. Scalping the lawn may stimulate early growth, but this may not be desirable. If this early growth is followed by a freeze, the leaves will die back. While freezing back is not usually a life and death situation for the grass plant, this year may be different. The severe cold may have reduced the plant's food reserves to the point that it may not be able to bounce back from a freeze and put out more leaves.

Scalping a turf in the spring is not a part of any professional turf management program. Athletic fields, golf courses and like areas are all maintained without scalping. Most homeowners consider scalping to be very dirty, unpleasant job which generates hundreds of bags of grass material.

All these bags find their way to our area landfills where space is already at a premium. Many cities must pay overtime in the spring just to deal with this tremendous volume of dead grass and, of course, the irony of the situation is that this is all unnecessary.

Scalping is not necessary to produce a good quality lawn. Proper mowing technique, the timely use of the right fertilizer and the timely application of water go together to produce a quality lawn.

A good reasonable fertilizer program is one of the basic parts of any turfgrass maintenance program and, of course, the home lawn maintenance program is no exception. Lawns that are under-fertilized tend to be thin and have poor color, while lawns that are over-fertilized, especially with high levels of a soluble nitrogen fertilizer, may tend to develop excessive thatch and be more prone to insect and disease damage.

The first application of fertilizers for the lawn should be made after the second or third mowing. Too often we fertilize the lawn too early and damage the grass. In the absence of a soil test, a fertilizer with a 1-1-1 or 2-1-1 ratio should be applied at the rate equivalent to 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. For example if you use 12-12-12 you should apply about 8 pounds per 1000 sq. feet.

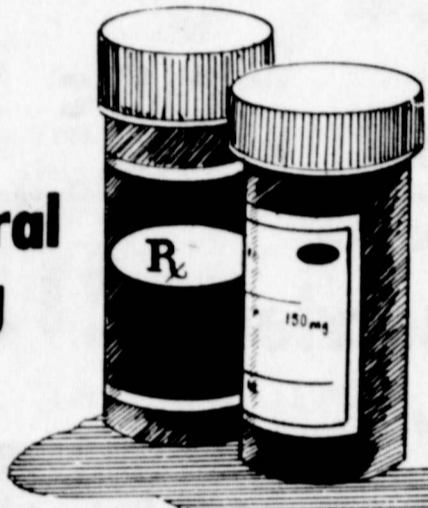

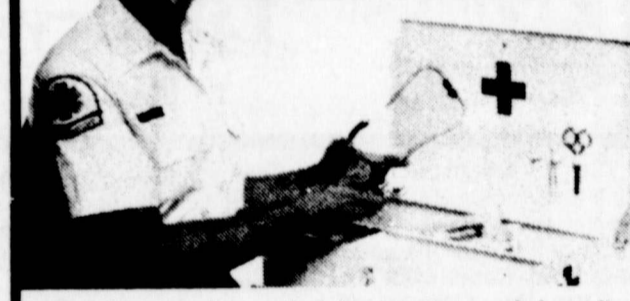

"These are all in addition to our basic information and referral services," said Mrs. Justice. "And, depending on location, we also have several rehabilitation programs including Reach to Recovery for mastectomies, esophageal speech lessons for laryngectomies, ostomy rehabilitation and related patient and family support groups."

The concept for these rehabilitation programs is the volunteers who are

themselves former patients and who are specifically trained by the Society to help other patients and even their families adjust to living with cancer."

Mrs. Justice cited that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they relate the name to cancer research. "While it is true the ACS funds millions of dollars for cancer research, we are also a community-based organization providing many local services. These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

Rangers are at least 30 years old when hired and are selected from outstanding candidates with at least 8 years of experience - men working as DPS troopers or with a bona fide law enforcement agency. They receive special training and are assigned to protect life and property, suppress riots, investigate major crimes, and help apprehend fugitives.

**WE ENJOYED** especially seeing a display of the guns, badges, hat, boots and the like of Texas Ranger M.T. (Lone Wolf) Gonzales who died a few years ago. It was soon after we began our newspaper writing work at Kilgore in East Texas in the 1930's that we began interviewing Mr. MTG who was there helping bring law and order to the wild East Texas oil field. He was an outstanding Ranger and left his good marks in the history of Texas law enforcement.

You'll come away from the museum with a new appreciation for the Texas Rangers who began their service to this state under Pioneer Stephen F. Austin in the year 1823. He paid 10 men to become the first Texas Rangers. The force became
