Circus Is Due In Cisco 'One Day Only' Wednesday

"One day only" best describes the intrigue of America's last big, traditional circus - Carson and Barnes 5-Ring Circus, which comes to the area north of the football stadium in Cisco for performances at 4:30 and 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 28, sponsored by the Cisco Jaycees.

The awesome task of moving and erecting this mammoth entertainment spectacular each day, seven days a week, 35 weeks a year has captured the imagination of the American public. The

free display of old-time ingenuity - unloading and setting up the big show - attracts throngs to the circus grounds each morning throughout the season, good weather or bad, and Cisco will be no exception. This year, beautiful teams of draft horses join elephants and men in this interesting

So huge is the Carson and Barnes show that it is profitable for it to exhibit more than one day only in the nation's largest cities. Thus, while it spends extra days in

such population centers as Milwaukee, Chicago, Akron, Pittsburgh and Cleveland, the vast majority of mornings will find its gigantic fleet of cargoliners, mobile homes and trailers moving down the nation's highways to yet another site. The logistics are stagger-

ing - 250 humans, more than 200 animals, some 80 pieces of motorized equipment, a big top which is a city block long plus ton upon ton of supporting paraphernalia, all moved almost daily, erected and used for less than 12

hours, then packed away and moved again!

Activity at the circus grounds will begin about one hour past dawn. Heavy pile drivers mounted on the rear of trucks will begin pounding four-foot long wooden stakes around the perimeter of "The Biggest Big Top on Earth." More than 100 supporting poles will be unloaded from other trucks and arranged in place. Then, the brightly-colored, flameproof and waterproof polyvinyl canopy will be spread. Meanwhile, other trucks

carrying the more than 200 wild, exotic and domestic animals will be arriving and discharging their cargo. Some of the more than 25 ponderous elephants will stretch themselves, then head for their morning

Fire that broke out at 2:05 a.m. destroyed the office and the manager's apartment and damaged two adjoining rooms at the Oak Motel on I-20 in Cisco early Friday morning. Although an estimate was not available, the loss was expected to be extensive.

Fire Marshal Bill Webb said the blaze started from a faulty outside flourscent ight fixture. The office, including all equipment, and the manager's apartment were engulfed by flames when firemen arrived. Both the office and apartment were a total loss, Mr. Webb believed.

Mrs. Louise Darnell, manager of the motel since January, said she was awakened by a smoke alarm in the apartment. She called police who summoned firemen.

Mrs. Darnell's daughter, Mrs. Tina Alexander and her two small children, were in the apartment, and they hurriedly left.

Some 15 rooms were occupied by guests and all were awakened and notified of the fire. Some of them packed up and left and others stayed. There were no injuries.






Obituary

It's almost time again. A new tape machine has been ordered, fifty state flags purchased by members of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, and brochures have been passed out to thousands of travel show visitors.

It's almost time again. For the directors to make lists, the publicist to prepare personal stories for each company member, and the bookkeeper to fill out W-4 forms.

It's almost time again. For "Texas" Paul Green's story of the settling of the Texas Panhandle during the 1880's, to hit the board for its nineteenth season on June 13, 1984. The show has played to almost one and one-half million visitors since it opened in 1966. Each summer, guests come from all fifty states and scores of foreign countries to see this musical drama told in song, dance, and drama.

Eighty performers will be supported by twenty technicians and forty hospitality crew members who will greet, serve, and try to make each patron feel welcome.

But there's more to "Texas" than the show. Palo Duro Canyon State Park is a major attraction all by itself. The largest state park in Texas, Palo Duro contains more than 17,000 acres, and last year it hosted hundreds of thousands of visitors. While in the state park, patrons can ride horses, enjoy the Sad Monkey Railroad, explore cliffs, snack at the Goodnight Trading Post, and still have time to see the show.

In the city of Canyon, is the Panhandle Historical Museum which boasts one of the country's best collections of cowboy and Plains Indian artifacts.

Near Amarillo, visitors can experience "Cowboy Morning," and have breakfast around a campfire. There is also a cattle auction, which is the largest in the world, planetarium, Helium Monument, and Art Center.



Services For Norman Ball Are Pending

Funeral services for Norman Robert Ball, 60, who died last Sunday in Germany, were pending at the Cisco Funeral Home Chapel in Cisco Friday morning.

Mr. Ball, son of the late Dr. and Mrs. D. Ball, had been in ill health for some five months. He died in a U.S. Army Hospital in Germany where he had been employed for many years by civil service. Death was attributed by a heart ailment.

The body was sent by air from Germany and was due to clear customs in New Jersey before being forwarded to D-FW Airport and was expeted to arrive Friday.

Mr. Ball who was born in Ciaco on May 28, 1988, attended the Clace Public Schools and Kempe Military Academy. He served in the U.S. Army in WWII, being discharged as a master sergeant. His service included taking part in the Battle of the Bulge in Germany.

from lack of exercise than from the number of years one can count on the calendar, concludes Walter Bortz, M.D.


A great deal of what passes as change due to age is not really that at all, but rather the result of inactivity," concludes Bortz, president of the American Geriatrics Society and cochairman of the American Medical Association's Committee on Aging.

Exercise is now listed as valuable for numerous medical conditions, including coronary artery disease, hypertension, obesity, diabetes, osteoporosis, and depression.

The Internal Revenue Service audited less than 2% of all income, estate, and gift tax returns filed in 1983. But, additional tax and penalties resulting from audits netted \$13.7 billion

Gross federal tax receipts in 1983 totaled \$627.2 billion, with individual income taxes accounting for \$349.6 billion. The IRS received a total of 171.2 million tax returns, of which 95.4 million were from individuals.

The USDA has amended its rules to allow summer fallow land to be designated as agriculture conservation reserve, the same as in 1983 and previous programs. Prior to this action, acreage designated for the 1984 programs could not have been land intended for summer fallow in the current year.

The Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has proposed regulations that would require agricultural employers to provide toilets, potable water, and handwashing facilities for farm employees engaged in hand labor. Farming operations that employ ten or fewer such employees, or that require hand labor of short duration (three hours or less), or that involve hand labor operations conducted inside of permanent structures, would be excluded coverage under the from proposed regulations.

After the big Eastland County Livestock Show, it was only appropriate to have a big market animal auction afterwards, and the business people of Eastland County came through in generous fashion to make it the biggest ever in the county.

With 263 prize winners from the top half of the Livestock Show entries eligible for the special auction, it took a big contribution from the business people just to buy the students animals.

But not only were all of the animals purchased at premium prices, a record \$149,349.05 was paid for them with the thirty Grand Champions, Reserve Grand Champions, and Reserve Champions bringing \$29,247.25 to average nearly a thousand dollars each.

In addition to giving the boys and girls record prices for their animals, two animals, a lamb and a hog, were donated to the Livestock Raisers Association and auctioned off two more times to raise funds to pay for improving the show facilities.

The hog was first bought by Bill Wyatt Tires and Don's Rental, then by Eastland National Bank, and finally by the Cisco Merchants before going to the packer buyers.

The lamb was bought by H&R Lumber and K-Bob's, then by Morgan Buildings and Eastland Savings, and finally by Joe Allen Pit Barbecue.

And with James Wright, assited by Jim Wright, handling the auctioneer duties and show officials keeping up with the transactions, sales commission paid by the students are also used for show ground imrpovements.

The hog raised \$1049.75 and the lamb raised \$885.50. while the students gave \$7217.79 in commissions for a total of \$9,153.04 going to the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association to pay for insulating the show arena and other improvements.

PLANTING AND CARE OF ROSES

In picking a location and preparing the bed, remember roses need at least one half day of sunlight and they do not like wet fest. Roses are classified as shallow rooted plants, therefore they need proper drainage. Here I suggest that rose beds be raised up to 12 inches above ground level by using cross ties, bricks, concrete blocks, etc.

Place a one-inch layer of gravel at the bottom of a 12 inch bed for drainage. Then fill the balance of the bed with sand, peat moss and perlite or vermiculite in equal amounts.

When digging the hold for the bush, be sure to dig it large enough that the roots can be spread out and not bunches together. Do not dig a two-bit hold for a five dollar plant.

At the bottom of the hole mound a small hill in the center for the rose to sit on with its roots spread out on all sides. Then fill in with your planting medium to within one half to one inch of the bud union.

The bud union is the large knot between the root system and the canes. Roses are grafted on different root stock than what appears above the ground. Usually the root stock is the Hawaii cultivar.

There are two ways to pur-

chase roess, bare root and canned roses. You may plant canned roses any time of the year by simply cutting the can away and placing the rose with soil intact in the hold in the bed. The bare root roese can be planted only in the spring or late fall. Which is the best is a matter of personal opinion.

Remember, you may save money on your intital purchase by buying a rose which is of quality less than No. 1, but you will spend as much or more on fertilizer and care and still you will not have a No. 1 bloom

After planting, I recommend a good application of humic acid, as this lessens the shock of transplant. Humic acid is not a root stimulator.

The first year rose must be kept well watered and not allowed to dry out. They are building their root system. After the first year, a bush needs two inches of water per week. Here I recommend you place a coffee can in your bed to keep track of the water weekly, especially if mother nature does not
