Circus Is Due In Cisco 'One Day Only' Wednesday

"One day only" best describes the intrigue of America's last big, traditional circus - Carson and Barnes 5-Ring Circus, which comes to the area north of the football stadium in Cisco for performances at 4:30 and 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 28, sponsored by the Cisco Jaycees.

The awesome task of moving and erecting this mammoth entertainment spectacular each day, seven days a week, 35 weeks a year has captured the imagination of the American public. The

free display of old-time ingenuity - unloading and setting up the big show - attracts throngs to the circus grounds each morning throughout the season, good weather or bad, and Cisco will be no exception. This year, beautiful teams of draft horses join elephants and men in this interesting job.

So huge is the Carson and Barnes show that it is profitable for it to exhibit more than one day only in the nation's largest cities. Thus, while it spends extra days in

such population centers as Milwaukee, Chicago, Akron, Pittsburgh and Cleveland, the vast majority of mornings will find its gigantic fleet of cargo liners, mobile homes and trailers moving down the nation's highways to yet another site.

The logistics are staggering - 250 humans, more than 200 animals, some 80 pieces of motorized equipment, a big top which is a city block long plus ton upon ton of supporting paraphernalia, all moved almost daily, erected and used for less than 12

hours, then packed away and moved again!

Activity at the circus grounds will begin about one hour past dawn. Heavy pile drivers mounted on the rear of trucks will begin pounding four-foot long wooden stakes around the perimeter of "The Biggest Big Top on Earth." More than 100 supporting poles will be unloaded from other trucks and arranged in place. Then, the brightly-colored, flameproof and waterproof polyvinyl canopy will be spread.

Meanwhile, other trucks carrying the more than 200 wild, exotic and domestic animals will be arriving and discharging their cargo. Some of the more than 25 ponderous elephants will stretch themselves, then head for their morning

duties of helping push and pull the big top into the air.

Carson and Barnes was the first United States circus to use a polyvinyl big top. Now, a replacement has been imported from Italy at a cost of more than \$100,000. Even more resplendent than its predecessor, it stretches more than a city block long to cover the only 5-ring circus in the entire world.

Outstanding animal acts in the tradition of the great Al G. Barnes and human performers from 17 nations bringing joy to circusgoers of another city or town each of the 245 days the big circus is on tour each year.

Patricia White, "the beauty with the beasts," subjugating African lions and Bengal tigers, is featured

animal trainer. Carson and Barnes also boasts the largest group of horses and ponies carried by an American show in more than 25 years and, of course, more than 25 elephants. The spectacular animal acts also include a bareback-riding tiger, frisky dogs, trained groups of camels, llamas, horses, ponies and zebras.

A host of funny clowns and America's last traditional circus brass band augment the glittering displays.

All circus tickets include admission to the vast traveling zoo and horse fair, featuring such species as giraffes, rhinoceros and hippopotamus. Midway attractions open one hour before show time.

The sponsoring Jaycees offer a savings of \$1.00 below the showday price on tickets purchased prior to 5 p.m., Tuesday. Tickets are available now at Cisco Chamber of Commerce office and Olney Savings.

Refreshments will be served and all members of the Credit Union are invited to attend this meeting.

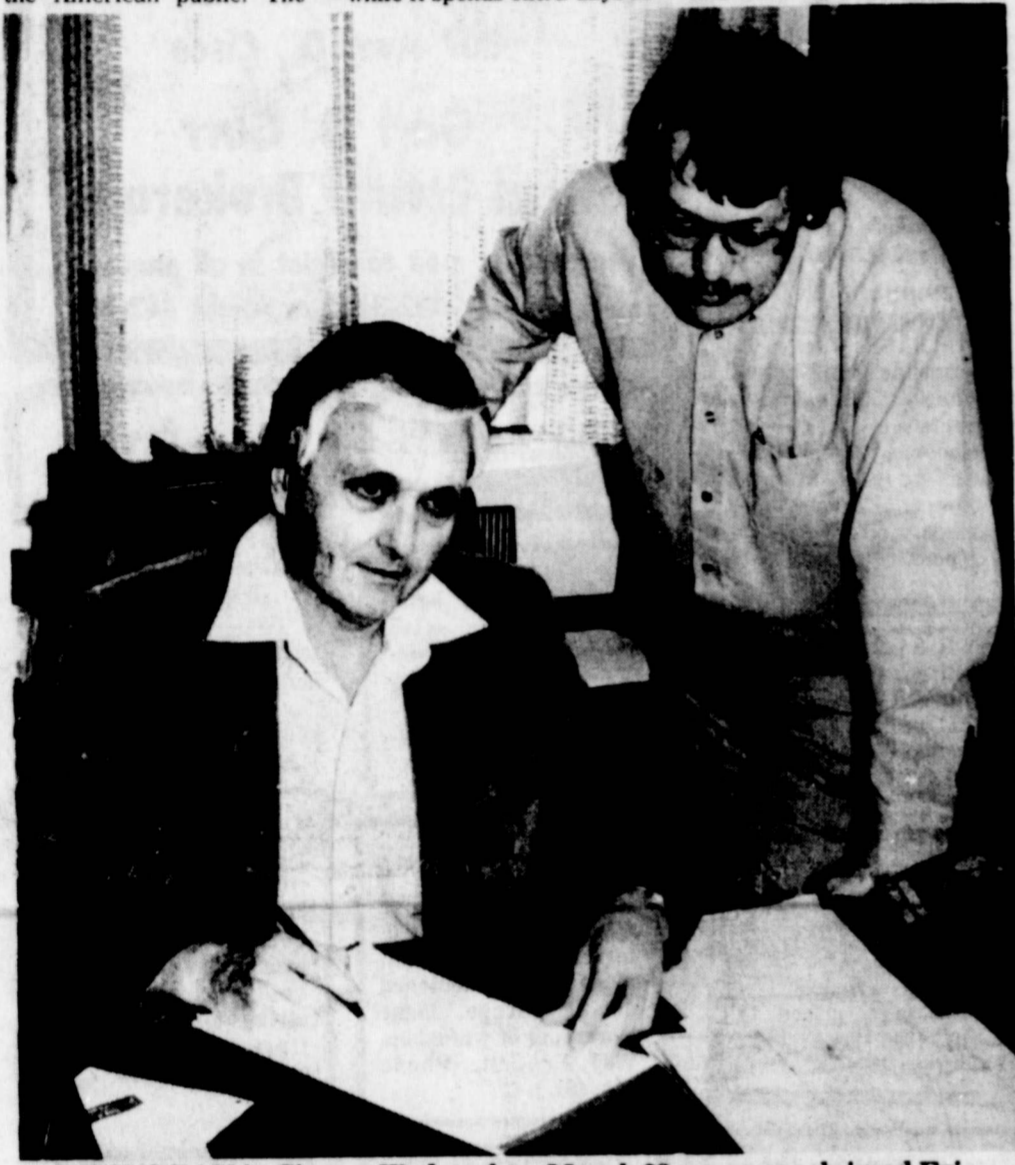
Lobo Relays Set Here Saturday

City Preparing For Water Suit

Employment of Mike Willatt, Austin attorney who specializes in water rate and contract matters, to work with City Attorney Billy Wright in a court suit by Westbound Water Supply Corp., was approved by the City Council at a called meeting last Tuesday night.

Mr. Willatt was recommended to the city by the Texas League of Municipalities, reported City Manager Mike Moore. The Austin attorney is expected to meet with the City Council at their regular meeting at City Hall next Tuesday night.

Westbound has filed suit against the city for clarification of the water contract between the corporation and the city. The action followed the raising of westbound's water rates from 50 cents to \$1.27 per thousand gallons several months ago.

Mr. Moore said the rate raise to Westbound was on the same basis as to other city water customers and that rates were raised to pay for

necessary improvements to the water system.

"We were under court order to improve the quality of our sewage disposal facilities and our water system had been condemned in numerous reports by state inspection agencies," Mr. Moore said. "We have no alternative but to make improvements."

"The only way the city has to pay for improvements is by raising rates. The new water rates will pay for the needed upgrading of the water plant, including a modern filtration plant. And the sewage system improvements will be paid for by additional charges to the people it serves."

"We are not 'picking' on Westbound and its customers in the rural areas. They won't be helping pay for anything that won't improve the quality of their water. Our Council acted in raising water rates because there was no alternative. The litigation will increase our expenses."

Inspection Tour Planned at Lake

A special meeting of the City Council will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday, March 31, to give councilmen and others an opportunity to inspect the Lake Cisco water treatment plant where an extensive improvement program is in progress.

City Manager Mike Moore reported that one television station (KTAB) and two radio stations have accepted invitations to have reporters here for the inspection tour. The public will be welcome

at the lake.

Plans call for councilmen, reporters and others to gather at City Hall at 10 a.m. and to be transported to Lake Cisco in a CJC people mover (25-passenger bus).

Engineers, contractors and others will be on hand at the lake to explain improvement projects, including a new water filtration plant.

Wear comfortable shoes for there will be considerable walking," the city manager said.

trio, the Promise Kids of Cross Plains, Talent Singers of the Mangum Baptist Church, Russell Abbott and his guitar and others.

Willard Johnson's country and western band will play and the Lions Club quartet is scheduled to sing several numbers.

"We would like to have more people enter the talent contest," Mr. Cook said. Anyone interested was invited to call Mr. Cook.

Proceeds from the show will be used by the Lions Club to complete work on the Pavilion at City Park, President Dill said. The club put up the pavillion last year and now plans to add a concrete floor.

It's almost time again - For the dancers to begin limbering up, the actors learning their parts, and the singers practicing their outside voices. It's almost time again. The phones are ringing, the buget has been made, and the restroom facilities are being improved. The souvenirs have been counted, and the T-shirts ordered, and the caterer is ordering beef. It's almost time again. A new tape machine has been ordered, fifty state flags purchased by members of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, and brochures have been passed out to thousands of travel show visitors.

It's almost time again. For the directors to make lists, the publicist to prepare personal stories for each company member, and the bookkeeper to fill out W-4 forms.

It's almost time again. For "Texas" Paul Green's story of the settling of the Texas Panhandle during the 1880's, to hit the board for its nineteenth season on June 13, 1984. The show has played to almost one and one-half million visitors since it opened in 1966. Each summer, guests come from all fifty states and scores of foreign countries to see this musical drama told in song, dance, and drama.

Eighty performers will be supported by twenty technicians and forty hospitality crew members who will greet, serve, and try to make each patron feel welcome.

But there's more to "Texas" than the show. Palo Duro Canyon State Park is a major attraction all by itself. In the city of Canyon, is the Panhandle Historical Museum which boasts one of the country's best collections of cowboy and Plains Indian artifacts.

Near Amarillo, visitors can experience "Cowboy Morning," and have breakfast around a campfire. There is also a cattle auction, which is the largest in the world, planetarium, Helium Monument, and Art Center.

In the area, is Cal Farley's Boy's Ranch, Alibates Flint Quarry, and Lake Meredith Recreation Area.

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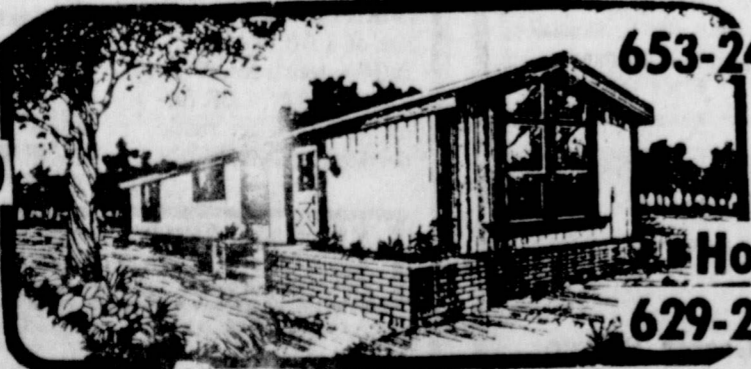

Eastland Telegram Will Have New Building Soon

A new building to house the Eastland Telegram, production facilities for Eastland County Newspapers and offices has been announced by H.V. and Gay Nell O'Brien, publishers. The new facility will be of pre-engineered steel, faced with white brick, facing onto S. Seaman St., on the lot which was formerly site for automobile dealerships. The production facilities will be two stories high with adequate room for expansion, and will be on the north side of the lot and in a position to shield the alley view. Office side will be one-story along the south side of the lot. The new building will join the firm's storage building, providing newsprint unloading off Olive St., and a smooth flow of materials and workflow on the floor throughout the building. Construction bid notice is printed in this issue with a closing date of April 6, set for opening, and it is hoped that construction can begin by April 16. Estimates are that construction could take 210 days. The Telegram and Eastland County Newspapers Co. production facilities are presently housed at 110 W. Commerce St., which was in a building refurbished in 1971 when new equipment was installed. The new facilities will provide room for growth, the publishers said. Eastland County Newspapers include The Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram, Ranger Times, and Rising Star, and commercial printing.


Plans for the present building have not been announced.

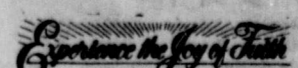

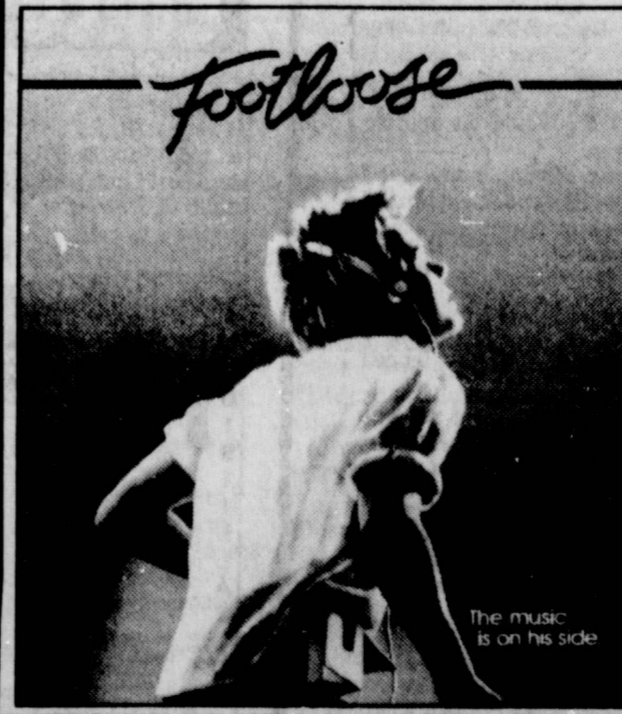

As a tribute to the nation's largest and most basic industry, the President of the United States proclaimed March 20, 1984 as National Agriculture Day. A fact book

published by the U.S. Department of Agriculture states that farm assets total 70% of the capital assets of all manufacturing corporations in the nation. Agriculture is this country's largest employer. Around 22 million people work in some phase of agriculture, from growing food and fiber to selling it at the supermarket.

The services of about 20 million more people are needed to store, transport, process, and merchandise the output of the nation's farms. Approximately one out of every five jobs in private enterprise is directly associated to the agricultural industry.

Article I, Section 8, Clause

2 of the U.S. Constitution provides that the Congress shall have the power to borrow money on the credit of the United States. If this phrase had been left out of the Constitution, the federal government could not legally incur a national debt. Congress would be required to limit federal spending to equal the amount of federal revenue.

Until 1978, Congress was not required to balance the federal budget. However the Bretton Woods Agreement Act provided a balance of outlays and receipts, thus committing Congress to balance the current federal budget.

The Internal Revenue Service audited less than 2% of all income, estate, and gift tax returns filed in 1983. But, additional tax and penalties resulting from audits netted \$13.7 billion.

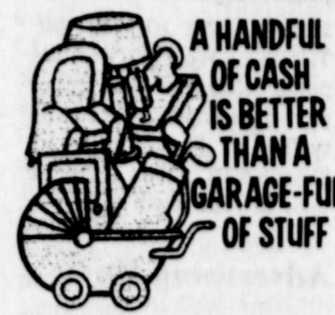
Gross federal tax receipts in 1983 totaled \$627.2 billion, with individual income taxes accounting for \$349.6 billion. The IRS received a total of 171.2 million tax returns, of which 95.4 million were from individuals.

The USDA has amended its rules to allow summer fallow land to be designated as agriculture conservation reserve, the same as in 1983 and previous programs. Prior to this action, acreage designated for the 1984 programs could not have been land intended for summer fallow in the current year.

The Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has proposed regulations that would require agricultural employers to provide toilets, potable water, and hand-washing facilities for farm employees engaged in hand labor. Farming operations that employ ten or fewer such employees, or that require hand labor of short duration (three hours or less), or that involve hand labor operations conducted inside of permanent structures, would be excluded from coverage under the proposed regulations. Comments on the proposed regulation may be sent to the Docket Office, Docket No. H-308, Room S6212, Department of Labor, 200 Constitution Ave. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20210, before April 16, 1984. Copies of OSHA's proposed sanitation rules are available on request from the Texas Farm Bureau Department of Research and Education in Waco.

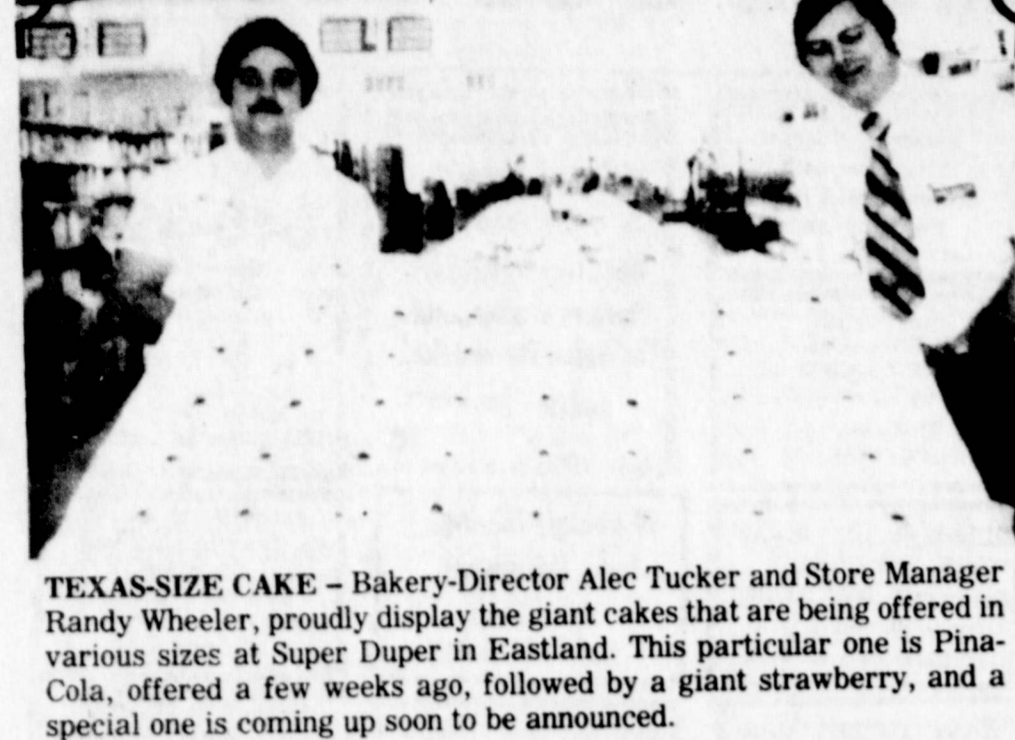

Drilling Bits

The No. 19 Delbert Tarver has been finalized by Ridgeway Exco, Inc. of Houston.

It is a developmental well in the Hawk-Eye Field, one mile west of Romney. Drillsite is in a 120-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 57, Blk. 3.

Daily potential of five barrels was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,129-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations 1,086 to 1,094 feet into the wellbore.

A 650-ft. developmental well is planned by Southwestern Energy of Burtleson at a drillsite three miles north of Scranton, Eastland County. The location is in a 76-acre lease in the BBB&C Survey, Sec. 2, Blk. 2. Well's designation is the No. 6 Jewell. It is in the Eastland Regular Field.

Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has revealed plans for a re-entry operation four miles south of Ranger. Location is in a 139-acre lease in the Eastland Regular Field, Elizabeth Finley Survey, A-119. Proposed total depth of the No. 1 Brashers is 3,700 feet.

Sux Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene has filed for permit to plugback for shallower pay at the No. 1 D.K. Scott in the Eastland Regular Field, four miles southwest of Ranger. Proposed total depth is 3,950 feet. The well is in a 288-acre lease in T&NORR Survey, A-531.

Chester R. Upham, Jr. of Mineral Wells has filed first production figures on two new gas wells in Palo Pinto County's Calabria (Conglomerate) Field.

The No. 1 Laverne Martin indicated ability to flow 336,000 CF gas per day on 7/8 choke. It was rated at 1,000,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The operator has 112 acres leased, with drillsite in the W.H. Bradford Survey, two miles southeast of Brazos.

The well will produce from an interval 3,787 to 3,979 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,325 feet.

The No. 1 Thomason flowed at the rate of 347,000 CF per day on a 7/8 choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 820,000 CFD.

Location is in a 107-acre lease in the G.W. Taylor Survey, Bottomed at 4,450 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,882 to 3,891 feet into the hole.

A new producer has been brought on line in the Palo Pinto Regular Field, with Sun Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene as the operator.

Located six miles northwest of Strawn, the well is in a 1,920-acre lease in the T&P&R Survey. It is designated as the No. 197 J.H. Stuart.

On a 3/8 choke, it flowed 273,000 CF per day. It was rated at 650,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 1,730 feet, and will produce from perforations 1,062 to 1075 feet into the hole.

The Palo Pinto Regular Field gained a new producer when F&S Operating of Levelland completed the No. 1 Brown four miles southwest of Grafrod.

The well indicated ability to flow at the rate of 190,000 CF gas per day on a 5/8 choke. It was given 230,000-CFD rating on open flow. It was taken to a 4,953-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 4,156 to 4,164 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 160-acre lease in the TE&L Survey.

At a location four miles northeast of Ivan, G.A. Hawkins of Graham has finalized a wildcat gas well in Stephens County.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Dofflemyer, flowing at the rate of 1,846,000 CF per day on a one-quarter inch choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 11,000,000 CFD.

Location is in a 198-acre lease in the Ruthy Campbell Survey. Bottomed at 4,174 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,064 to 4,082 feet into the hole.

A new gas producer has been brought on line in Stephens County's Pit Rom Field, with Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge as the operator.

Located three miles southeast of Caddo, the

well is in a 1,200-acre lease in the T&P&R Survey. It is designated as the No. Coody. On a .312-in. choke, it flowed 659,000 CF per day. It was rated at 6,332,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 4,261 feet and will produce from perforations 3,861 to 3,866 feet into the hole.

A 4,300-ft. wildcat well is planned by Cal Energy Properties, Inc. of Mineral Wells at a drillsite two miles east of Eolian, Stephens County. The location is in a 140-acre lease in the Blind Asylum Lands Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 Tomlin.

International Oil & Gas Consultant of Graham has filed for permit to drill the

No. 1 Forbes, a 4,500-ft. developmental well five miles southwest of Ivan. Location is in a 280-acre lease in Stephens County's TE&L Survey. The well is in the Stephens Regular Field.

Stephens County's Bowar Field gained two new producers when Hoty F. Casteel of Graham completed the Nos. 3 & 6 L.G. Finley, five

miles northwest of Crystal Falls. Thw No. 3 well indicated ability to flow 42 barrels per day on a 10/64 choke. It was taken to a 4,490-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 4,197 to 4,202 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 6 well showed potential to flow 64 barrels daily on a 8/64 choke. Flowing tubing pressure registered 610 PSI. Bottomed at 4,496 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,153 to 4,157 feet into the hole.

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Club Animals Bring Some Record Prices

After the big Eastland County Livestock Show, it was only appropriate to have a big market animal auction afterwards, and the business people of Eastland County came through in generous fashion to make it the biggest ever in the county.

With 263 prize winners from the top half of the Livestock Show entries eligible for the special auction, it took a big contribution from the business people just to buy the students animals.

But not only were all of the animals purchased at premium prices, a record \$149,349.05 was paid for them with the thirty Grand Champions, Reserve Grand Champions, and Reserve Champions bringing \$29,247.25 to average nearly a thousand dollars each.

In addition to giving the boys and girls record prices for their animals, two animals, a lamb and a hog, were donated to the Livestock Raisers Association and auctioned off two more times to raise funds to pay for improving the show facilities.

The hog was first bought by Bill Wyatt Tires and Don's Rental, then by Eastland National Bank, and finally by the Cisco Merchants before going to the packer buyers.

The lamb was bought by H&R Lumber and K-Bob's, then by Morgan Buildings and Eastland Savings, and finally by Joe Allen Pit Barbecue.

And with James Wright, assisted by Jim Wright, handling the auctioneer duties and show officials keeping up with the transactions, sales commission paid by the students are also used for show ground improvements.

The hog raised \$1049.75 and the lamb raised \$885.50, while the students gave \$7217.79 in commissions for a total of \$9,153.04 going to the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association to pay for insulating the show arena and other improvements.

Auctioned for the club boys and girls were 111 hogs, 111 lambs, 7 steers, and 34 pens of three broilers each.

The Grand Champion steer weighed 1242 lbs. and brought \$4 a lb., to sell for \$4,968., while the Grand Champion broiler pen sold for \$200.

The market lamb and hog Grand Champion both sold for for the same amount, \$910. The lamb weighed 130 lbs. and brought \$7 per pound, while the hog weighed 260 lbs. and brought \$3.50 per lb.

Ridge Oil bought the top steer, Gorman First National Bank the broilers, KEAS Radio the lamb, and Columbia Packing the hog.

Eastland Auction Co. was the packer buyer for the hogs paying \$45.80 per hundred lbs., while Lynn Bint, who owns the Graham and Breckenridge Auction Barns, was the packer buyer for the lambs paying \$51.25 per hundred lbs. and for the steers paying \$62.30 per hundred lbs.

Ther Reserve Grand Champion lamb sold to Ranger Rexall Drug for \$7.25 per lb. The R.G.C. steer brought \$1.00 per lb. from Gorman First National Bank, and the R.G.C. hog was purchased by Ridge Oil Co. for 3.25 per lb.





The 1984 Eastland County Livestock Show was the largest ever in number of entries and value of the sale. I would like to express my appreciation to everyone who helped with the stockshow and everyone who contributed time, money, services or materials for the show. Because we are human, there were some mistakes made. There were some misspelled names in the catalogue and a few ads left out. We ran out of some ribbons. We apologize for these mistakes and hope to learn from them so they will be corrected in the future. However, the mistakes were relatively few compared to all the jobs that were done.

Computers can help farmers, ranchers and homemakers in their decision-making by providing them with an instantaneous barrage of management information. All of this will be put into perspective at a computer workshop at the Texas 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood April 3-4. The workshop will provide basic information on computer terminology and selection and the role of the computer in the farm, ranch, agribusiness and home. In addition, operating systems and basic programming procedures will be discussed for those with some prior computer experience. The Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring the event.

Registration will be from 12 noon to 1 p.m. the first day, and opening discussions will focus on computer applications to family resource management and farm and ranch management.

Discussions on computer hardware (the computer itself) and software (the computer program) and tips on selecting a computer also will be featured.

Computer software and hardware vendors will provide a number of exhibits for workshop participants.

Workshop participants will have an opportunity to get some "hands on" experience with computers during a series of concurrent sessions dealing with the following: preparing for computerized accounting systems, selecting a farm or ranch accounting system, crop decision aids, electronic spreadsheets, marketing decision aids, data base management system, livestock decision aids, and dairy decision aids.

The sessions will be repeated the second day, and the workshop will conclude at noon.

Another program that may be of interest to you is a two-day seminar, Teaming Up In Agriculture, at College Station, April 13 and 14. The target audience is farmers and ranchers that are considering expanding their farm/ranch operation to bring in a son, daughter or another person. The goal is to give the participants knowledge to make an informed choice as to the best alternatives for their family, financial and business situation to expand their business. PLANTING AND CARE OF ROSES

In picking a location and preparing the bed, remember roses need at least one half day of sunlight and they do not like wet feet.

Roses are classified as shallow rooted plants, therefore they need proper drainage. Here I suggest that rose beds be raised up to 12 inches above ground level by using cross ties, bricks, concrete blocks, etc.

Place a one-inch layer of gravel at the bottom of a 12 inch bed for drainage. Then fill the balance of the bed with sand, peat moss and perlite or vermiculite in equal amounts.

When digging the hold for the bush, be sure to dig it large enough that the roots can be spread out and not bunched together. Do not dig a two-bit hold for a five dollar plant.

At the bottom of the hole mound a small hill in the center for the rose to sit on with its roots spread out on all sides. Then fill in with your planting medium to within one half to one inch of the bud union.

The bud union is the large knot between the root system and the canes. Roses are grafted on different root stock than what appears above the ground. Usually the root stock is the Hawaii cultivar.

There are two ways to pur-

chase roses, bare root and canned roses. You may plant canned roses any time of the year by simply cutting the can away and placing the rose with soil intact in the hold in the bed. The bare root roses can be planted only in the spring or late fall. Which is the best is a matter of personal opinion.

Roses are graded by standards such as No. 1, No. 1½, No. 2, and No. 2½. The number one grade rose has at least three canes with the canes one-half to three-fourths inches in diameter. Remember, you may save money on your initial purchase by buying a rose which is of quality less than No. 1, but you will spend as much or more on fertilizer and care and still you will not have a No. 1 bloom.

After planting, I recommend a good application of humic acid, as this lessens the shock of transplant. Humic acid is not a root stimulator.

The first year rose must be kept well watered and not allowed to dry out. They are building their root system. After the first year, a bush needs two inches of water per week. Here I recommend you place a coffee can in your bed to keep track of the water weekly, especially if mother nature does not furnish the needed rain.

This is where a good mulch

comes in handy. A one-inch layer of cedar mulch helps conserve your moisture. Cedar mulch has been proven to retard nematodes and restore nitrogen to the soil.

Roses should be fed twice a year, the first year with a well balanced fertilizer such as 20-20-20 water soluble. Remember that your fertilizer has to get into a liquid form before your plant can use it.

Roses go dormant in the winter in the Northern states. Pruning is done in the spring after the last freeze. You should cut the canes back to within 15 inches of the ground. This is done on all the different varieties except the climbers.

The new blooms are born on old growth on the climbers. A climber is pruned only when needed to control the growth after the blooming season is over. This lets a climber produce new canes before going dormant.

The biggest problem with roses is powdery mildew and blackspot which can be controlled by regular spraying of a fungicide such as benlate. If you already have powdery mildew, this can be eradicated by the use of P M Acti Dione. Red spider on your roses can be controlled by the use of an insecticide such as Isotox. If you should have Aphids, you can control them by the use of Malathion.

Your garden editor hopes this helps you with your roses and that you will have beautiful roses this year.
