

## City Council and Chamber Members:

# Meeting Discusses Future Growth and Development

The Cisco City Council met with several members of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce Thursday afternoon at 4 p.m., in a special meeting to discuss the need

for more economic growth and industrial development in Cisco and to look at avenues for helping retail sales in the city.

The main theme of the meeting was what the City and Chamber can do jointly to stimulate the growth and development of Cisco.

Dick Woolley, CofC chairperson for the steering committee, stated several businesses have been contacted about possibly locating in Cisco. He said the steering committee is presently working with two

retail outlets: one a major expansion of an existing business and the other a location in Cisco of a major retail chain based in San Antonio.

The expansion project is definite and formal announcements on both projects will be made at a later date, according to Mr. Woolley.

Mr. Woolley also said contacts have already been made to the Texas Industrial Committee, West Texas Utilities Development Division and Lone Star Gas

Development Division for a list of companies in northern states wishing to locate in the Sunbelt area. The list is being compiled and the City Council and CofC will "jointly pursue companies compatible to our area," said Mr. Woolley. He went on to say that a company is being solicited to locate in the Otis building and possibly one for the Oil States Rubber building.

The Council and Chamber members expressed their feelings of gratification in seeing the two groups merge

together to reinforce their commitments to the growth and development of Cisco.

City Manager Mike Moore commended the group on its enthusiasm and dedication to the city. He said, "All of our efforts remain vital for the economic growth and a progressive attitude in Cisco."

The City Manager also informed the group of two other alternatives for helping with development which they might look at, with one being an Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG)

from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and the other the Main Street Texas program sponsored by the Texas Historical Commission. He said if the group would be interested in either program, or both, they could be pursued further.

Mayor Eris Ritchie summed up the meeting by saying the City Council and Chamber members would appreciate any positive or constructive suggestions from local citizens regarding economic growth and development in the City.

## Council Installs New Members

The City Council installed two new members, elected a mayor pro tem and transacted business at the regular semi-monthly meeting at City Hall Tuesday night.

After canvassing returns of last Saturday's election as submitted by Judge Thelma

Smith, City Secretary Ginger Johnson gave the oath of office to Bobby Ingram, re-elected to Place 6, and Joe Besselaar who was elected to Place 5. Both men began three year terms.

The Council elected Mr. Ingram to serve as mayor pro tem during the coming year. He took the place of Ivan Webb, who did not run for re-election to Place 5. Mr. Webb, who presided at the meeting in the absence of Mayor Eris Ritchie, turned the gavel over to Mr. Ingram after his election as mayor pro tem.

The Council approved an agreement with Jacob and Martin, Inc., Abilene, to provide engineering services regarding the city's litigation with Westbound Water Supply Corporation in a water rate dispute. The firm represents the city in other engineering work. The agreement provides for Jacob and Martin to be paid on an hourly basis for any work they do in the litigation.

An amendment to the city's Peddler's Ordinance was approved on second and final reading. The ordinance requires itinerant vendors to pay \$5 for a one-day permit, \$10 for a week, \$20 for a month and \$75 for a year. The ordinance does not apply to merchants or vendors of locally home-grown agricultural fruits and vegetables.

Action on proposals received last month by the Council to provide the city with street and road maintaining equipment under a lease-purchase agreement as tabled until next meeting while officials study an alternate plan.

The Council approved a contract change order for Fambro Construction Co., contractors for a water main line from College Hill to the overhead tower in South Cisco. The order for installation of equipment and check valves that will relieve present and prevent new problems, was approved by City Manager Mike Moore. The new work will cost \$1,841 and raise Fambro's contract price to \$201,528. The company was also given a 30-day extension of time to complete the project.

Change orders were considered on the contract at the water filtration plant at Lake Cisco. The Council agreed to remove paint and re-paint a backwash tank, add flocculator baffles to equipment used in treating water with chemicals and make changes in the valve arrangement in the area where water leaves Lake Cisco at the dam and enters the water system. This work will cost some \$2,000. Other proposed contract changes were tabled for further study.

Councilmen Roy Dennis and Linton Bateas were appointed to work with the city manager as an ad hoc editorial review committee for recodification of municipal ordinances. A special meeting was ordered for 4 p.m. Thursday

at City Hall as a special workshop session with Chamber of Commerce directors and others to discuss economic development and the industrial outlook for the community.

At an executive session following the meeting, Attorney Mike Willatt of Austin briefed the Council on legal details of the Westbound Water Supply Corporation's suit in 91st District Court in a water rate dispute. The city's answer has been filed

but no hearing date has been set, the city manager reported.

Councilman Webb expressed appreciation for having been a member of the Council for three years and pledged his support as a citizen in helping with city problems.

During a council-citizen discussion, Mrs. Louise Allison asked questions about the cost of engineering and legal services in the water case and about pro-

gress of the sewage plant project. John Moss inquired about a top for the new filter reservoir at the lake. Officials said that a top was not recommended by engineers and they saw none in any inspection trips over the area.

Present at the meeting were Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Bobby Rains, Ivan Webb, Brad Kimbrough, Linton Bateas, Roy Dennis and Joe Besselaar, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright.

Yonder, take it down from off the shelf.

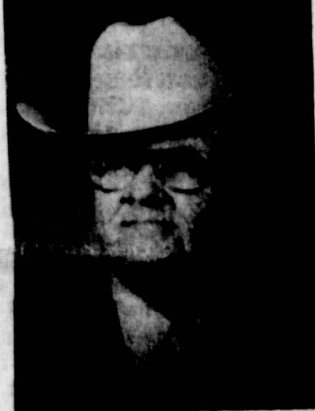
And it will speak to you indeed,

## Sheriff Morren Makes His Bid For Re-Election



Sheriff Johnnie W. also a recipient of an Outstanding Leadership Award from the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association in 1976. He is a recipient of a Distinguished Service Award from the Eastland Independent School District for dedicated service to the school system from 1972 to 1978.

Giving a quick look at Sheriff Morren: He is a Texas Certified Peace Officer; presently serving as Eastland County Sheriff since July 9, 1979; served 12 years with the Eastland Police Dept., 10 years as Chief of Police; Over 400 hours of law enforcement training.

He is a combat veteran of World War II, served in Europe; served with United Nations Forces in Japan and Korea; member of men's Fellowship Bible Class; member of Bethel Baptist Church; served six years on Board of Trustees of EISD, three years as vice-president; member of the Chamber of Commerce; served as Truant Officer for EISD for 10 years; was Civil Defense Director for eight years; member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4136; charter member of Eastland County Law Enforcement Association and past president; native of Eastland County, married to the former Bonnie Kinman and they have three children; and a member of the Texas Sheriff's Association.

"We at the Sheriff's office believe that the sheriff and his staff are to serve, not to be served. I appreciate your support and ask for your vote May 5," Morren concluded.

The Cisco Service Club is working with the Cisco Kiwanis Club in assisting the local Police Department in fingerprinting all Cisco youths, with parental consent. The sole purpose of the fingerprinting will be for the purpose of identifying youths in the event they are discovered missing.

Of the thousands of children reported missing each year in the United States, approximately ninety percent return home, leaving still thousands unaccounted for. It is with this fact in mind that the fingerprint program, is motivated.

The club sponsors of the "Fingerprints on File" program, would like to stress the fact that no child will be fingerprinted without parental permission. Likewise, no copies of the prints will be kept on file, anywhere besides with the individual.

In the event the child is found missing, the fingerprints should be turned over to law enforcement authorities when making the report.

Fingerprints are an efficient tool for identification no matter how much time has lapsed between the child being reported missing and the possibility of the child being found. Fingerprints remain the same all through life.

The program can only be successful through the cooperation of the community, school officials, parents and guardians with the efforts of the Sheriff's officers and local Police Department.

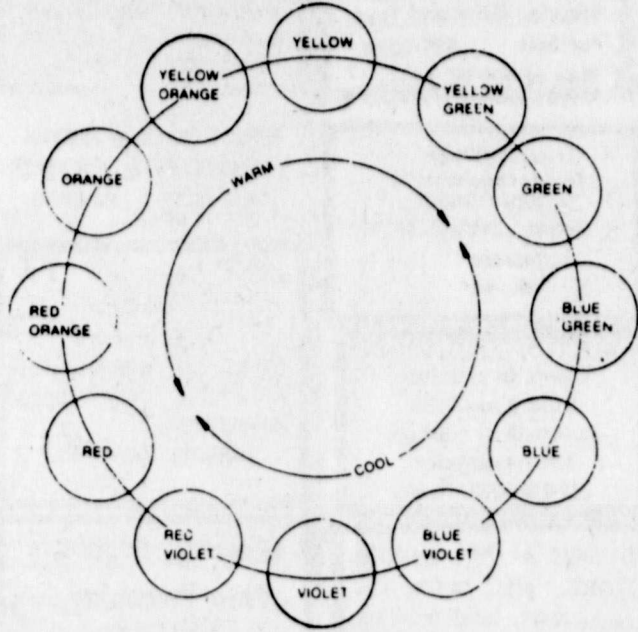

Q. I hate to sound ignorant, but what is meant by primary colors? Also, I have heard the term "complimentary colors". Does that just mean colors that look good together?

A. You don't sound ignorant at all. It sounds as if you are aware of the importance of color theory in creating a pleasing environment.

The primary colors are red, blue and yellow. They are called primary because they are the only colors which cannot be made from mixing other colors. In fact, all other colors, except white, are made from a combination of the primary colors. Blue and yellow make green, for instance. Look at the color wheel and you will see how colors are related. It will also help explain the term "complimentary colors".

or" Complimentary colors are colors located opposite each other on the color wheel. Red



and green are complimentary, as are orange and blue, and yellow and purple. Surprised? They are considered compliments of each other because each color is made to appear more intense when they are together. A little red makes green look greener. That brings us to a rule of thumb when working with complimentary colors: Never use equal amounts of complimentary colors

together.

Make one color dominate by either using less of the other color, or by using a grayed-down, subdued of the other color.

Did you know that grays are made by mixing complimentary colors? When dealing with paint, adding a small portion of the complimentary color is the best way to create a subdued shade.

Color relationships are fascinating, and can become very complex, but you now know the basics. Study the color wheel diagram and you will be able to analyze color more easily.

# Charlie Jordan Tells Sixth Graders About Weather

Charlie Jordan, meteorologist for KTAB-TV was in Cisco Thursday morning talking to sixth graders at Cisco Intermediate

School. He was invited down to discuss weather conditions and what makes the weather do what it does. Mr. Jordan told the 6th

graders what makes the wind blow, about winds that blow up, (a low pressure), and winds that blow down, (a

high pressure), tornadoes and hurricanes.

He said a meteorologist must like math, physics and must always ask the question why? It seemed to enjoy him when a student would ask "why" after he explained about some weather condition.

You could tell he really enjoys his occupation by the way he would tell the students "Isn't weather fun? Weather is fun!"

Charlie, who grew up in Pampa, Texas said he knows a lot about tornadoes. He called them a beast. He used a chalkboard to explain how a tornado looks on radar and how a tornado travels after it is on the ground.

Contrary to belief a tornado does not always travel northeast. He said they had one not too long ago in Merkel that traveled southeast.

He also told the students that to get into a car and try to outrun a tornado is one of the most dangerous things you can do. The cloud from the tornado travels about 70 miles an hour and the tornado travels about 25 miles an hour. When the tornado has reached its elasticity point it snaps like a rubber band to catch up to the cloud and during that time, it can be traveling up to 170 miles an hour. He said his old pickup cannot travel that fast.

The area that has the most tornados is between Quanah, Texas and Altus, Oklahoma. Last year there were over 220 tornados sighted. A boy asked why and Charlie said with a big grin "That is the question I like to hear." He then explained why.

He could not answer a question as to why there are some years when there is plenty of rain and some where there is a drought. The weather guessing game has only really started since

1943. And only recently has there been a five-day forecast. In the 1960's a two-day forecast was unheard of.

When asked if weather could ever be controlled he said that a small thunderstorm has more energy than 20 hydrogen bombs. The bombs being the size that were dropped on Hiroshima. So no, weather can not be controlled.

He was presented with two weather predicting devices by students as shown in the photographs.

A total of 324 cases, including 239 for traffic regulation violations, were filed in City Corporation Court during the first quarter of 1984. Judge Jasper Cook told the City Council in a report at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Fines paid during the three months totalled \$9,347.50, an increase of

some \$2,100 over the last quarter of 1983, the report showed. Of the money paid in fines, the sum of \$7,722 went to the city and the balance of \$1,625 went to the state.

The judge held 34 trials, dismissed 16 cases and assigned 15 persons to take a defensive driving course in lieu of paying fines.

## Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Many of us take large doses of Vitamin C for many reasons. Ranging from colds to just not feeling good. However, researchers at Oregon State University have found that too much Vitamin C may lead to anemia.

Megadoses (1,000 milligrams or more) of any vitamin should be avoided. Nutritionists and doctors have warned us. Now researchers have found that large doses of Vitamin C can cause low copper levels in the body, which can eventually lead to iron deficiency anemia.

Researchers Elizabeth Finley and Dr. Florian Cerkowski stated individuals who risk developing this kind of iron deficiency are those whose dietary intake of copper is marginal and who have been taking large doses of Vitamin C for a long period of time. Copper rich foods include organ meats, shellfish (oysters in particular) nuts and whole grain cereals.

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# Homemaking Hints

Modern research on the effects of stress has concentrated on the dramatic events of life: the death of a spouse, a friend, divorce, marriage, retirement, being fired, etc. This research has largely ignored the effect on the minor but more frequent daily events that might be best described as "hassels." Hassels are the irritating, frustrating, or distressing incidents that occur in our everyday lives. They can take the form of disagreements, disappointments, accidents, or unpleasant surprises. They range from getting stuck in a traffic jam to losing a credit card; from an argument with a teenage son to a dispute with a superior at work.

Through research at the University of California, it has been discovered that daily hassels are more closely linked to and may have greater effect on our moods and our health than the major misfortunes of life.

The top ten hassels and uplifts are commonly voiced by middle age people are: Hassels: (1) concern about weight (2) health of a family member (3) rising prices of common goods (4) home maintenance (5) too many things to do (6) misplacing or losing things (7) yard-work or outside home maintenance (8) property, investment, or taxes (9) crime (10) physical appearance.

The ten most common Uplifts are: (1) relating well with your spouse (2) relating well with friends (3) completing a task (4) feeling healthy (5) getting enough sleep (6) eating out (7) meeting responsibilities (8) visiting, phoning or writing someone (9) spending time with family (10) home pleas-

ing to you.

It was interesting to note that all age groups of people seem to voice three big hassels that affect all age groups. The big three are: (1) misplacing or losing things (2) physical appearance and (3) too many things to do.

Dealing with stress is of major importance. Some good advice and techniques for dealing with stress are as follows: First, when something worries you, it is a good idea to talk it out. Talk your problems over with a level-headed person you can trust; your husband or wife, parent, good friend, your clergyman, your family doctor; a teacher or counselor. Several research studies have been conducted which show that people who have strong personal relationships have less mental and physical illness than people who go it alone. Se-

cond, some people expect too much from themselves and get into a constant state of worry and anxiety. Trying to be "superman" or "superwoman" is an urge we all have to fight from time to time. Third, a sure way to take your mind off your troubles is to reach out and do something for someone else, and Fourth, take one thing at a time. It also helps to set priorities of what is most important. Two good questions to ask yourself are "what is the worst thing that could happen if I do not do this" and "will it matter a year from now."

Niebuhr's famous prayer is still appropriate today: "God grant me the serenity to accept the thing I cannot change, and the courage to change the things I can, and

Ear tags containing synthetic pyrethroid insecticides do a good job in controlling horn and ear ticks in cattle, and more and more cattlemen are using them.

These specially treated ear tags generally give good fly control throughout the spring and summer seasons. They can be used safely on cattle and calves, including lactating dairy animals.

Considering their convenience and long-lasting control of flies, ear tags are relatively inexpensive when compared to penning cattle and spraying them with an insecticide two or three times during fly season.

Despite the effectiveness of these ear tags, some cases of horn fly resistance to pyrethroid insecticides had been suspected. To avoid this possibility of increased resistant development for upcoming fly season, several steps can be taken:

-use tags on all animals according to label directions.  
-Don't put tags on until shortly before fly season starts.

This is usually late in April or early May for Eastland County. Tagging time will correspond with the working cattle in the spring.

-Always remove old ear tags when retagging cattle in the spring.

-Use alternate fly control methods from year to year, such as ear tags treated with insecticides which have a different mode of action, forced-used dust bags of traditional sprays with alternate type insecticides.

Several different types of insecticide-treated ear tags are available to cattlemen and all do a good job in controlling flies. If you haven't used them in the past, this might be a good year to give them a try.

Whichever method you use, fly and ear tick control is important on cattle because it improves the animal's thrift, vigor and performance.

Farmers and ranchers have several opportunities in the coming week to attend seminars on estate planning.

The seminars are being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, as part of a continuing effort in farm and ranch management. They are designed to help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and

learn new methods for passing their operations on to the next generation.

Titled "How to Lower Your Estate Tax Burden," the seminars are slated for April 24-25, Howard Johnson, 7800 North I-35, Austin, and May 8-9, Ramada Inn, Hwy 69 at loop 323, Tyler. Each day's program will be from 9 a.m. to 4:40 p.m.

Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected by new estate tax rules. The best planning of the past may be the worst under the new law.

Each seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including will, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly.

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships, selling part of the business to heirs, and oil and gas interests.

The second day of each seminar will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, "flower" bonds and other property.

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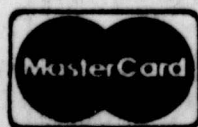

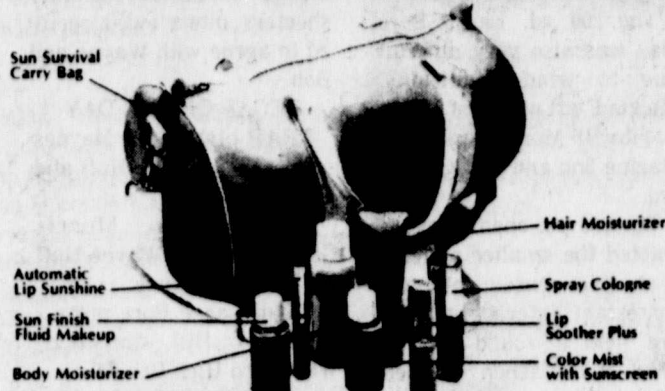

**"Why?" "Because"**  
The teenage suicides are appalling.

Though I have tried to put myself in the places of their parents, I am sure my imagination is far from adequate.

Where my imagination does take me is to the myriad questions the parents are asking themselves. Chief one, of course, is, "Why?"

The only answer I have come up with is, "Because." Cold comfort.

What might help these parents is what lies beyond "because." Does anyone know?

"The thoughts of youth are long, long thoughts," a poet said—was it Longfellow? He knew what he was talking about.

As an ex-teenager, the mother of three ex-teenagers, and confidential "ear" of any number of teenagers along the way, I'll stand surety for that.

It always has been beyond my understanding how so many people can drool about their happy childhood. Let me make it "perfectly clear"—and I do remember who said that—I will tolerate no put-down of my parents in reference to the questionable happiness of my own childhood!

My parents cannot be held accountable for the necessity of learning to walk, to talk, to eat—all in a manner acceptable to the general public. I might as well blame them for my being here in the first place, but look at what I'd have missed!

It's a considerable chore for an infant to absorb all stages of civilization, especially when that civilization keeps changing every day.

The teen years always have been particularly difficult as far as I can tell. Socrates wrote a little homily about the younger generation going to the dogs. It applied equally well to my generation as to the present one, and I am sure it was timely when he wrote it. I'll go out on a limb and predict no change in the foreseeable

future—not that I'm all that much into the foreseeing bit. But I'll put my money on ol' Soc.

I did not like growing up. The strictures of clothing bothered, probably because I was forever growing into a size or out of a size. I'd bet there never were two consecutive weeks that my clothes fit!

And what I wore—oh, wow! I can't remember when I first passionately declared that when I grew up I would never, never, NEVER wear long-handled. I do remember that I got spanked for "sassing," so I must have been pretty specific about my displeasure.

As I grew into my teens, many things baffled me. So many of my burgeoning questions I instinctively knew were not "nice" that I lived at a permanent frustration level. If I couldn't have read, I suppose I would have burst—and been much less well-informed.

But my parents were not at fault. No more are the parents of these boys who presumably terminated their own lives.

It seems too easy to blame "society" though our present day socio-economic system may well be the culprit. Consider the ogre of modern life. Where I felt pressure from the demands of the comparatively mild society of the depression era—you can't cut a very wide swath with no cutter—I did not have to cope with instant tea, instant potatoes and instant re-plays.

Who knows how youngsters are going to react to instant living? Maybe the prospect of a high-tech lifestyle was more than those young men wanted to try to handle.

It is not always a case of negligent parenting, a communications gap, a specific instance that provides an answer to "Why?"

Unsatisfactory as it often is, the best answer just may be, "Because."

## Prize Letters May Be Too Good To Be True

That official-looking letter announcing you have won an expensive prize which can be claimed by attending a resort areas sales meeting may seem to good to be true.

Unfortunately, these offers — typically used to promote land sales or timesharing a vacation home — often are too good to be true, says Dr. Marjorie Smith, a resource management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program.

Many of the prizes are less

expensive imitations of luxury items, she says. To collect these prizes, consumers may be subjected to high-pressure sales tactics used during sales meetings.

Consumers who sign contracts at these sales meetings may also find it difficult to cancel without losing some money, says the specialist. That's why it's important to carefully consider any purchase before signing a contract, cautions Smith.

Due to a growing number of complaints from consumers, the Federal Trade Commission has issued the following

•Do not be swayed by official-looking letters. Some contest promoters use an official-looking name or envelope that looks like it contains an important telegram.

•Make sure you read the contract carefully before signing.

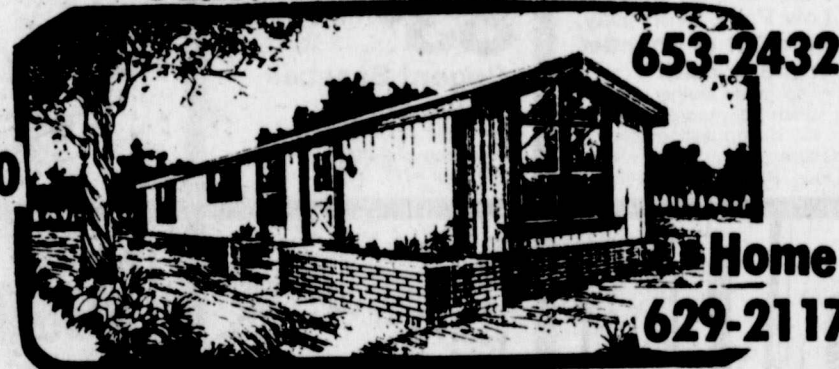

The pansy is known botanically as the Viola Tricolor Hortensis and Viola Cornuta. The pansy is one of the most popular plants because of the variety and combination of colors.

You can find purple, white, blue, rose, and dark red and yellow. Many people

describe these combinations as smiling happy faces. The pansy comes to us from Europe and is one of the most hybridized plants.

A pansy always has five overlapping petals. Most pansies have blooms of two to three inches, but we have the Rogue Giants and the

California Giants which are a hybrid type and can have blooms of up to four and one half inches.

Pansies are technically a perennial but they tend to deteriorate very fast in this climate after the first year and, therefore, we must treat them as annuals or even bi-annuals where the temperature is warm or hot such as we have in the Southwest and Gulf Coastal areas.

Pansies normally grow to a height of about eight inches and are considered to be a low-growing plant which makes them excellent for borders. They are also good as an edging as well as in window boxes and used as pot plants.

They have a delightful fresh fragrant aroma. Remember that the more often you pick your pansies during their blooming stage, the more blooms that they will produce for your pleasure. They are one of the mainstays of Grandmother's Garden, and this is one of the reasons why.

cept where the temperature exceeds 90 degrees. They can also grow in semi-shade so they are very versatile as to both color and growing conditions. A mass display of pansies is very effective landscaping.

There are two ways to start pansies. One way is from seed and the other is to buy bedding plants. Local nurseries all have good stocks of pansies on hand now. Remember when selecting plants to pick vigorous looking ones, as you get what you pay for in most instances.

Pansies from seed should be planted around here from August to November, and you can enjoy their blooms from November to May. If you mass plant and stagger

your planting dates, you will receive a greater abundance of color for a longer period of time.

Pansies like rich sandy loam with an abundance of humus. Pansies like a regular well-balanced diet with a water soluble fertilizer. Remember that pansies will reward you with larger and more abundant blooms if they are fed on a regular schedule, and the spent blooms are picked off. Pansies are one of the plants that love fireplace ashes, especially oak ashes. The further north you go, the later the beginning blooming date.

My neighbor and I both bought pansies one year and planted for a mass effect. He could never understand why mine were so much bigger,

but it is really very simple as I told him. I bought a quality plant and gave it the care it needed; he bought a Saturday Special and did not fertilize to any extent. Just remember, pansies will produce for you if you produce for them.
