below College Hill. The Frontier Jubilee Parade is set for Saturday, May 5th, at 10 a.m.

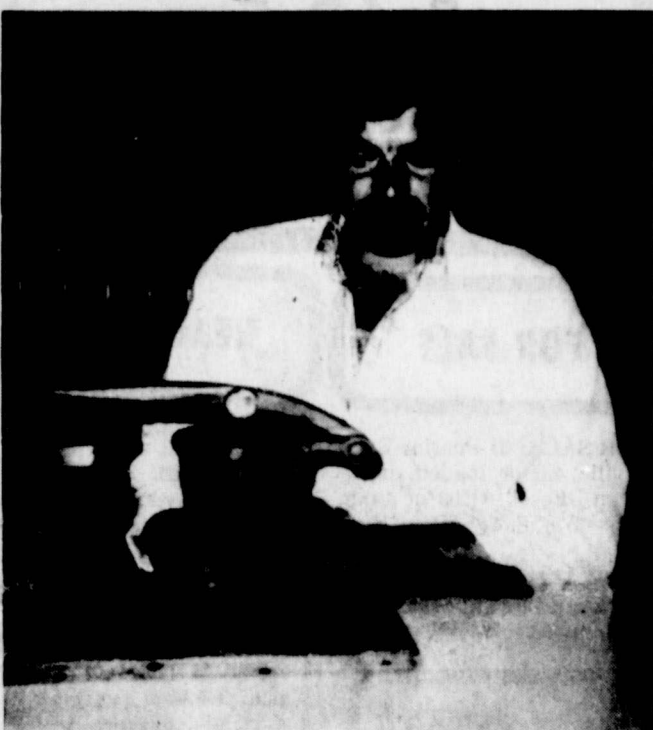

Contract Let For Medical Clinic Bldg. Near Hospital

A contract has been approved for the construction of a medical clinic building adjacent to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, it was announced at the quarterly breakfast meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday morning at the Colony Restaurant.

L.D. Woolley, chairman of the CoC steering committee and member of the board of Hendrick Medical Development Corporation, made the announcement. He attended a meeting of the Hendrick Satellite Western Hospital Affiliates, Inc., in Abilene last Tuesday when plans for the Cisco facility were finalized.

The Cisco clinic building and land will represent an investment of some \$125,000 and Roy Cozart, local contractor, was the successful bidder for the construction work, Mr. Woolley said. Work is scheduled to get underway within a month and the building of some 2,400 square feet of floor space is expected to be ready for use by mid-September. The clinic site is just east of the hospital.

Dr. Tim Boersma, who opened offices here recently to practice family medicine, will occupy the new facility, Mr. Woolley said. Quarters will be provided in the facility for another doctor, he added, and one will be sought sometime next year, it was expected.

A.E. Fogle, prominent Abilene resident, presided at the Tuesday meeting. Mike Water, president of the Hendrick Medical Development Corporation, was among those in attendance.

"It is good to have our hospital affiliated with an organization that demonstrates over and over that it cares about our community," Mr. Woolley told the CoC meeting. "Since they took over our hospital, the Hendrick corporation has worked untiringly to upgrade our facilities. I am sure that I can speak for the community in an expression of sincere appreciation to them."

President Jerry Morgan presided at the breakfast and introduced Mr. Woolley for the report on the work of the steering committee. The committee's efforts to obtain a tenant for the Otis Engineering property and for new retailers is meeting with encouraging results, Mr. Woolley said. He added that Thrift Mart Super Market will soon announce a substantial expansion program.

The Mobley Hilton project committee is continuing to make progress and it is an-

icipated that complete plans will be approved and construction work started within a few months, Mr. Woolley said.

"Our committee wants everybody's help," Mr. Woolley said. "Call us or the CoC offices with any ideas or suggestions."

The Rev. John Clinton, pastor of the First Evangelical Methodist Church, gave the invocation. Mr. Morgan announced that Shirley Hargrave and Rick Roark have been appointed to the board of directors to fill vacancies.

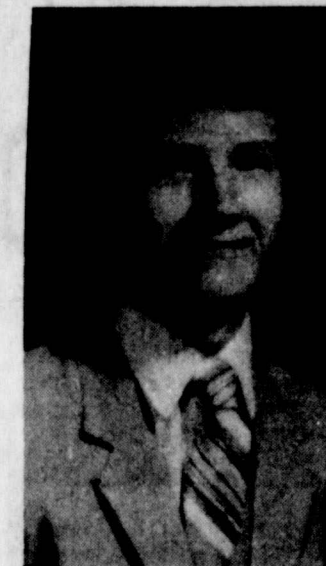

Eastland County Cattlemen are invited to an important beef cattle event next Thursday. One of the key buying people in the nation's livestock industry will be a speaker at The Heart of Texas Cow-Calf Clinic May 3 at the Brownwood Coliseum.

Dr. Rob Bowling, vice president of Research, Development and Quality Assurance for Monfort of Colorado, Inc. will address cattlemen on the subject of "Cattle that Make Money for Me."

Making money for Monfort is more than passing interest to cattle raisers, since Monfort is one of the giants of the meat-packing industry.

Monfort, headquartered in Greeley, Colo., is a nationwide operation with feedlot operations and packing plants among its widely diversified cattle operations. Monfort's three feedlots furnished 412,000 cattle in 1983.

The Heart of Texas Cow-Calf Clinic is co-sponsored by Texas Power & Light Co., the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce. Eastland County is one of eight participating counties.

The gathering will cover topics as diverse as "New Developments in Weed & Brush Control" to "The

Futures Market." In the first, Dr. Tommy Welch of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will outline the chemical and physical developments in weed control. In the second, Dottie St. Clair, a "hedging specialist" from the Clayton Brokerage Co., Dallas, will address the subject of utilizing the booming options markets in cattle to lock in profits on livestock—or how to hedge against drops in prices.

The clinic is designed to give cow-calf operations the informational tools for making the decisions to increase returns from their herds.

Other program topics for the one-day session include: —Basic Management Practices in Reproduction, by Dr. John Beverly, animal reproduction specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

—Herd Improvement Program: Keeping Accurate Records is the Key, by Dr. Larry Boleman, livestock specialist, Texas AES, Bryan.

—Market Update: Factors that Affect Prices, by Dr. Ed Uvacek, an economist who specializes in livestock marketing for the Texas AES.

—Beef Promotion: Where does Our Checkoff Money Go, by George Feaster, president, Western Beef,

Amarillo. Feaster will discuss the ongoing campaigns that stem from 25-cent per-head checkoff paid by seller of livestock.

—Visual appraisal of Beef Cattle, by Dr. Randall Grooms, a livestock specialist for the Texas AES, Overton.

The clinic, which is without a registration fee, will open at 8:30 a.m. for registration and viewing of exhibits at the Brownwood Coliseum.

It will end at 3:30 p.m. after a one-hour question-and-answer session.

Bill Streckert, manager of the TP&L Brownwood District, said the gathering is expected to attract around 200 participants.

Streckert said organizers from Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Mills, McCulloch and San Saba Counties have been involved in planning the clinic.

Robert Porter, president of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, will welcome participants during a noon luncheon.

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Maude Bailey Knows Her 'Basics'

Public education is constantly in the news these days. In Texas, as well as other states, there is a total re-examination of aims, means and methods used in the teaching of young people. Reports such as "A Nation At Risk" from the U.S. Dept. on Education, published April, 1983, have focused public attention on the subject. A "Back to Basics" campaign is being waged in many places.

No one needs to explain to Mrs. M.D. (Maude Arnold) Bailey of Cisco what the "Basics" are! For this 94-year-old pioneer educator taught them - in rural Eastland County Schools. Her memory, with its amazing recall of details, helps keep those long-ago experiences vivid.

She taught her first school at Mitchell, 3 miles southwest of Cisco, during the 1911-12 term. After she taught in Hamilton County, then became the principal of Cook School, about 15 miles southwest of Cisco, in the term of 1915-16.

At that time Mitchell and Cook were part of an extensive rural school system all across the county. School buildings were usually about three miles apart, so that children in the county would be within walking distance of them.

"Both Mitchell and Cook were good schools," Mrs. Bailey says. "I found trustees and other parents really interested in their children's education." She pauses a moment, recalling that her own parents had also been interested in educations.

She was born in 1890, to E.J. and Melinda Arnold of the Long Branch Community, south of Cisco. After E.J. died in 1900, Melinda Arnold tried to stay on the stockfarm with her family and care for the crops and cattle. But within a few years she moved to Rising Star so the children could attend high school.

Maude Arnold Bailey's special preparation for teaching began at Hankins College, Gorman, during the term of 1910-11. In the spring she took a State examination and received a Teacher's Certificate good for any school in Texas.

In 1911 she was hired for one-room, one-teacher Mitchell, with the customary \$50 per month. Before hiring this pretty young lady, the trustees made sure that she had good character. They also made sure that she did not use tobacco or alcohol.

Maude Bailey made arrangements to live with a Livingston family, whose home was a mile from the school. Room and board was \$10 per month, and Maude shared a room with the grandmother of the family, Mrs. Troutman.

The Livingstons had eight children, with four of school age. One of the sons, Charlie, still lives near Cisco. There are several other relatives currently in the vicinity.

"Mrs. Livingston was a wonderful cook," Mrs. Bailey says. "She got up early and fixed a big breakfast before the older children and I started to walk to school. Then she packed us a good lunch in 'dinner buckets' with tight-fitting lids. We had meat and bread, maybe a boiled egg, fruit and fried pies. At night there was always a big meal waiting, with some of the best tasting homemade bread I ever ate."

"School began at eight, and was supposed to be over at four, but I usually stayed until four-thirty.

There were 26 children enrolled, but attendance varied. Sometimes there were young children visiting, or parents or trustee dropping by to see how things were going. That fall the older children stayed out to help gather crops. The grade levels ran from 1 to 7, with all taught in one room. All the children wore

homemade clothing, with the girls wearing pinafores over their long dresses. Of course I made all my clothes too.

"School days always began with an assembly, where there was Bible reading and prayer. Children took turns learning the Bible verses."

Mrs. Bailey explains that the books and supplies used in Mitchell School would probably seem strange to a modern child. The children purchased their own books, and took very good care of them. There was chalk on blackboards, but few art supplies. Crayons were not available, but the children used pencils with several colors. Maps were sometimes made of salt, and there were other ingenious ways of doing things.

Library books were scarce, but some of them held interesting stores and great poetry. The children learned recitation and declamation. The use of the words, the ability to write

well, to recite and to figure arithmetic was considered an absolute necessity, even in the primary grades.

The water well near the school was a favorite spot, with a bucket and dipper for drinking. All drank from the same dipper.

The trustees stacked oak wood near the building, and the large boys brought it in during the winter and built a fire. The older girls helped sweep out the building and keep it clean. And spelling bees were considered a great form of recreation - something looked forward to by all.

"These were happy children," reports Mrs. Bailey. "and discipline was really not a problem."

After teaching at Mitchell, Maude Arnold Bailey alternated between teaching in Hamilton County and attending North Texas State College. Then she came back to Cook School as Principal,

with a salary of \$75 per month. Reba Ransom was her assistant, and there were 27 pupils enrolled.

This school, like Mitchell, was the center of the social and religious as well as the educational life in the community. Part of the learning experience was to train the children to speak in public and act in plays. Music was also an important part of the school life. When there was a special program at night, the whole community attended.

While Maude Bailey was at Cook, it was suggested that she set up a Teacher's Training Program after school hours. She cheerfully began this program, not dreaming of the impression she would make on a certain young man. For M.D. Bailey had come out from Kentucky to visit relatives, and decided to enroll.

After this class was over, two students passed and became teachers immediately - others went on to college. Maude also decided to go to college - back to North Texas to get her Degree in Home Economics.

As she got off the train in Denton, she was met by none other than M.D. Bailey, who was with a group of other students.

After their marriage in 1917, the Baileys moved to Kentucky, where they lived for the next nine years. Maude Bailey taught school, and M.D. Bailey worked in the coal mines. The couple had several children during that time.

In 1926, they came back and settled in Cisco. Mr. Bailey worked in the area as a carpenter, including helping to build a dormitory at Cisco Junior College.

Eventually there were seven children in the family, and Maude Bailey stayed at home to raise them. She did not teach in public schools again until the mid 1930's, when she taught some adult

classes in Food and Nutrition in the Cisco schools.

All the Bailey children shared their parents desire for an education, so they earned a number of Degrees between them. Of the six living children, Judge Scott Bailey is the only one residing in Eastland County. The others are in teaching and various professions across Texas and the southwest. And, although M.D. Bailey died in 1964, Maude Bailey has continued to maintain the family home.

As she thinks of the early-day school, she realizes there have been sweeping changes in education during her lifetime.

But for those who might wonder if the rural schools of Eastland County really equipped the students for life in the world outside, Mrs. Bailey has quite a story.

It concerns a baby who was born in the Cook community while she was teaching there. An older boy in the family was one of her pupils, and very fond of "Miss Maude."

"Mother, please name baby brother after Miss Maude Arnold," he insisted. "But wait," his mother said, "you don't want to name a little boy 'Maude'!" "No, but you can sure name him 'Arnold,'" the little boy replied.

So 'Arnold' he became - Bevington Arnold Reed. If the name sounds familiar, it's because he later became head of the State Department of Education, retiring from that position only a few years ago.

"Not only Bevington Reed, but a lot of other fine students came from those rural schools," Mrs. Bailey says. "We must have had some good basics after all."

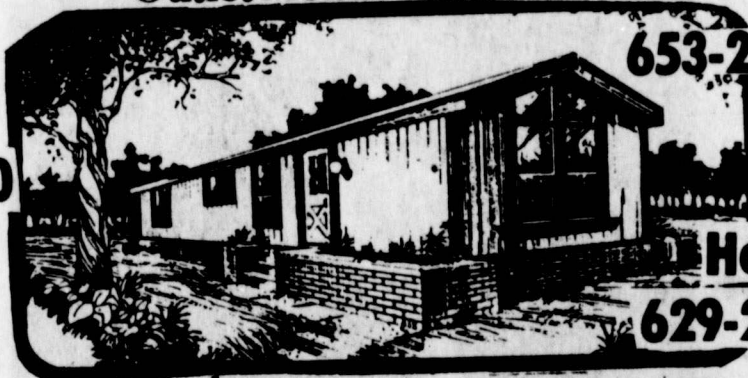

Mr. Fix

**UPHOLSTERY TOOLS
AND MATERIALS**

You'll need a few special tools to upholster furniture, including a webbing stretcher, a magnetic tack hammer, and some sailmaker's needles. You can buy a kit containing all of these for less than \$10 at most good fabric stores.

In addition, you'll need some materials:

Tacks: Upholstery tacks are bought by the box. You'll use a lot of tacks, so buy large boxes. Tacks are numbered according to size:

- No. 1 Tacking the dust cover.
- No. 3 All purpose; muslin cover, lightweight final cover.
- No. 4 All purpose; installing burlap; medium-weight final covers.
- No. 6 For heavy final covers and where tacking through several layers of material.
- No. 12 Tacking down twine in tying springs; installing webbing (No. 12 webbing tacks are best, but No. 12 standards work.)

Webbing: Comes in long rolls. Standard is 3/4 in. wide, made of polyester available by the yard in good fabric shops. A chair takes about 12 yards, a sofa about 35.

Thread and twine: Use heavy flax or linen thread, commonly called carpet thread, for sewing fabric. For tying springs use 6-ply hemp which you can buy in large balls. Don't use cotton twine as it deteriorates too quickly.

Burlap: Best weight for upholstery work is the 10 oz. It comes in 36- and 40-in. widths.

Padding: Replace cotton padding with the polyester which you can buy in most fabric stores. Comes in 36-in. width, in long rolls, can be torn or cut to fit the work area.

Foam: You can substitute polyurethane foam padding, which comes in a variety of thicknesses, for hair and moss stuffing. Cut the foam to shape, rounding the corners and edges as needed, then tack in place.

Rubberized hair: If you decide to use hair as a padding, you can buy pads of rubberized hair. It comes in rolls 36 in wide, in several thicknesses.

Final cover: The choice of fabrics and patterns is wide. Just be sure the fabric is upholstery grade, not drapery. "Fix-It-Fast" Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc. 425 N. Michigan, Chicago, IL 60611

2 California Murder Suspects Arrested

Two men were jailed in the Eastland County Jail Wednesday night in connection with a homicide that occurred in Sacramento, Calif., about a week ago.

Phillip Eugen Golob Jr., 19, of Carbon and California, was arrested at his grandmother's home in Gorman.

John Anthony Gresham, 31, of Odessa and California, was taken into custody at the El Morocco Motel in Eastland.

The pair have been charged with the murder of Howard H. Maddux, 64, of Sacramento, according to Sacramento police.

Cecil Funderburg, Gorman police chief, said he received a Teletype message from California Wednesday afternoon advising him to watch for a 1984 Chrysler belonging to Howard H. Maddux, 64, of Sacramento

and for Golob, who was believed to be driving the vehicle.

Funderburg said he remembered noticing the car in the area earlier in the day.

Believing he might need assistance, he said, he enlisted the aid of Don Underwood, Brent Foster and Johnny Ingram.

They arrested Golob at his grandmother's house without a struggle, impounded the car and had it stored in Eastland.

Bobby Ariola, Eastland police chief, said he, two Eastland officers and a Department of Public Safety trooper went to the El Morocco Motel about 6:30 p.m. and arrested Gresham, who reportedly also traveled to Texas in Maddux's car.

Ariola called the arrests "the result of good police cooperation between two

cities."

Maddux's severely beaten body was found Sunday in the bathtub of his home, according to a statement released Thursday by Sacramento Police Chief John Kearns, a reporter for the *Sacramento Union* said.

Police in California believe Maddux met the two men in a club and invited them to his house, the statement said. When his body was found, his car and wallet were discovered missing.

J.L. Patton, manager of the motel, said he lost money Wednesday when Gresham was arrested, explaining that the room was paid for with one of Maddux's credit cards.

Gresham had been at the motel only a short time when he was arrested, Patton added.

The men agreed to waive

extradition, said Emory Walton, Eastland County district attorney.

Fapers will be signed Friday. One investigator from Sacramento had arrived in Eastland Thursday night, and two others are expected Friday.

The three officers will return the suspects by plane.

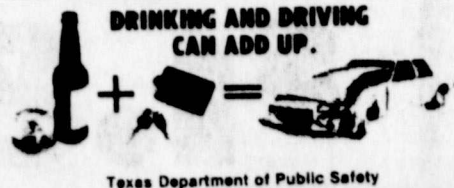
Relatives of Maddux will come to Eastland to drive the car back to California.

Bond was set Thursday by Justice of the Peace R.G. Lyster at \$50,000 for Golob and \$100,000 for Gresham, but the state of California requested no bond, and that will be honored, Walton said.

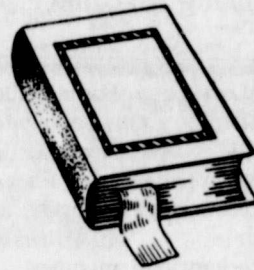

Mr. Stamey said he had made up missed meetings of the local club in Mexico, Canada and 14 states.

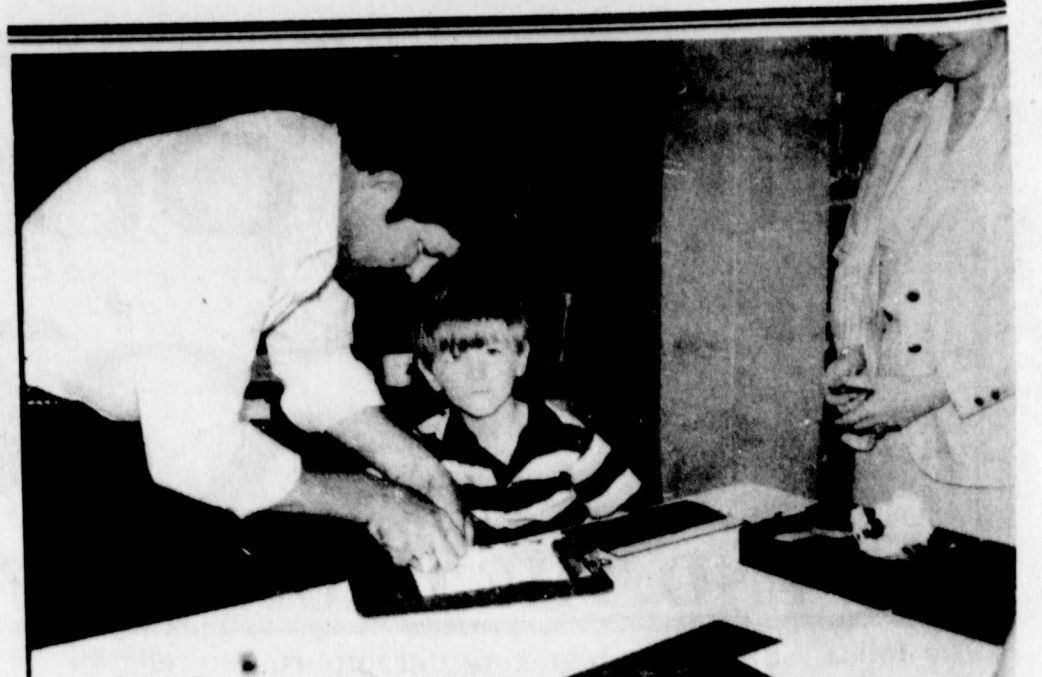

Cisco Phone Customers May Benefit From New System

Cisco telephone customers - especially senior citizens - may benefit from a new pricing system proposed by Southwestern Bell Telephone, according to Bob Cox, manager-community relations for the company.

Bell has asked the Public Utility Commission to approve a plan for "Life Line" phone service for elderly customers. Part of a three-part charging plan, Life Line service would be available for customers age 65 years or older whose income is at or below the poverty level, as established by an appropriate state or federal agency. The service would cost \$5 per month and provide 25 outgoing local calls per month at no additional charge. Any outgoing local calls over the 25-call allowance during a month would cost 8 cents each. There would be no charge for incoming calls.

"We're happy to propose this plan for elderly citizens," said Cox. "We know how great the impact of rising phone costs is on elderly customers, and want to make the service as affordable as possible."

Cox said the second part of the plan is called Local Measured Service in which residence customers would pay a lower rate plus a charge for each call. In Cisco, customers would pay \$5.85 per month plus a per-call fee. For local calls the first minute would cost 4 cents and 1.5 cents for each additional minute.

Time of day discounts would include: 75 percent between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m.; 50 per cent between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. and 50 percent between 7 a.m. and 11 p.m. on Saturday, Sunday and

holidays. This service would also be available to business customers at a slightly higher monthly rate.

"We see optional measured service as a much fairer way to charge customers than having everyone pay the same higher flat rate," said Cox. "Flat rate charging means people who don't often use the phone must pay the same rate as those who use it frequently."

Eastland county is one of the more than 230 counties that the Hance Campaign has organized throughout the state of Texas. "I'm proud of our county organiza-

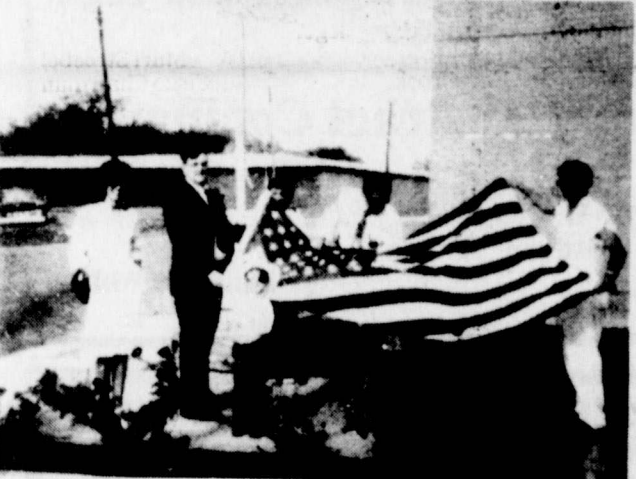
tions, and the role they are playing in my race for the Senate," Hance said. "These county organizations prove the strength of our campaign is statewide."

Paving Policy Meet Set By City Council

A special meeting to conduct policies, priorities and funding methods for street paving was ordered for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 1, by the City Council after a lengthy discussion at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night.

In other action, the Council endorsed restoration of the Mobley Hilton and pledged to support it, approved plans to seek grant funds for waste water treatment facility updating, and approved a plan to contract for street maintenance.

The Rev. Timothy Gray, pastor of New Life Tabernacle Church, and a delegation from his congregation appeared before the Council to present a petition and urge paving West 17th Street from Hilton Avenue to the Church of Christ at Avenue N and I-20.

Rev. Gray said that three churches are located on the street along with a good many residences. He submitted traffic count figures to emphasize the need for paving. His church, which has undergone a substantial improvement program, plans to pave its parking lot, the pastor said. He pledged his support to the Council "in your important work in our community."

Jerry Taylor of Taylor's Center appeared before the Council to request that consideration be given to paving 2nd Street in the area of Hilton Avenue. Traffic is considerable in that area, Mr. Taylor said. He suggested that attention be given to drainage conditions in the same area.

Mayor Ernie Ritchie and Council members pointed out that the city's finances for street paving were limited. The city has applied for federal funds in the block grant program.

Endorsing the "full restoration" concept for the Mobley Hilton, the Council approved financial support if needed to maintenance of the building to the extent of some \$10,000 per year with funds from the levy of a hotel and motel room tax as approved by state law. City Manager Mike Moore was asked to prepare a resolution to be presented to the Council at their May 8th meeting.

The federal government's regulations for grant funds have been changed recently to include funding for improvement of waste water facilities. In view of this action, the Council asked the city manager to apply for a grant to help pay for the new waste water facility that the city plans to build this year.

In view of the negotiation with United Energex, the Council voted to table action on a proposal for a lease-purchase contract on new street maintaining equipment. This matter had been under consideration for the past month.

A resolution supporting increased state highway funding, passage of a pot-hole bill and increased highway charges was approved. This matter will be before a special session of the legislature in June.

The Council voted to open bids May 1 for the sale of surplus equipment, including a 1978 Dodge police car, a 1972 Ford pickup truck, a 3/4 ton chassis and cab, a Caterpillar Model 933 track loader and an Allis-Chalmers model DD road grader. Bids forms can be obtained from the city manager's office at City Hall.

During an executive session, the Council discussed litigation brought by an oil company to clear title on city land on which the firm holds an oil and gas lease.

The monthly financial statement for March, as prepared by City Accountant Pablo Rodriguez, was approved. The report showed tax collections of \$238,098 for the fiscal year - 91 per cent of the total. Collections during the month included \$8,751 in delinquent taxes, \$13,770 in sales taxes, \$3,219 in franchise taxes, \$6,961 in sanitation fees, and \$9,660 in oil and gas royalties - totaling \$50,533.

General fund expenses amounted to \$60,907 during the month, and administrative expenses totaled \$12,880. Other expenses included \$16,824 for the police and court department, \$6,606 for the fire department, \$15,719 for the street and shop department, \$7,512 for the sanitation department.

The water department had income of \$52,764 and expenses of \$171,378 including part-payment of improvement work.

Mayor Ernie Ritchie presided over the meeting. Present were Councilmen Bobby Ingram, Joe Besselaar, Bobby Rains, Roy Dennis, Brad Kimbrough and Linton Batteas, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright.

At a recent meeting, the Council approved the employment of Randolph and Gilreath, Abilene planning engineers, to assist in grant matters. This firm will work with the city manager in preparing application for a grant for the waste water project financing.

The Council also asked the city manager to make application for the city's participation in an economic development block grant program. This would seek aid for paving, public works and other activities.

The Council asked the city manager and a council committee composed of Bobby Ingram, Joe Besselaar and Linton Batteas to work with United Energex, Inc., Cisco, on a proposed contract for that firm to take over street maintenance work in the city. The matter is due to be submitted to the Council May 8th.

Officials of United Energex said they would provide labor and road maintenance equipment at a cost of \$42 per hour and estimated that their services would cost the city some \$26,000 per year. The city manager was also completing a study to determine the cost effectiveness of the

The Library has many needs - specifically, building repairs. There will be no waste of these dollars. The Club takes very seriously its aim to provide information and education as well as entertainment for its readers, with a very special emphasis on efforts to encourage young people to open doors to opportunity by reading.

Drilling Bits

Ray Herring of Graham has filed first production figures on two new wells in the Stephens Regular Field. The No. 4 Nantz indicated ability to flow 311,000 CF gas per day on a two-inch choke. It was rated at 1,000,000 CFD. Location is eight miles

northeast of Ivan in a 170-acre lease in the S. Latham Survey. Bottomed at 4,230 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,142 to 4,147 feet into the wellbore.
