## Court of Appeals Upholds Lundstrom Guilty Verdict

The action of the 91st District Court in finding Loyal L. Lundstrom, 60-year old Ciscoan, guilty of the March 1983 murder of his wife was upheld by the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in a decision announced Thursday.

Lundstrom was given a life sentence in the Texas penitentiary by a 91st Court jury in a trial last September. The 11th Court was asked by the defense to set the verdict aside and order a new trial in briefs filed and a hearing about a month ago.

Lundstrom still can appeal the 11th Appeals Court's decision to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin and, if not successful there, he can go into the federal courts and carry the appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. His attorney was not available for comment.

The 11th Court's opinion, an eight-page document signed by Associate Justice Bob Dickenson, said "The evidence is sufficient to support the jury's findings that the appellant is guilty of

murder as alleged in the indictment."

The five grounds of error filed by Defense Attorney Bill B. Hart were each overruled by the appeals court.

Hart claimed that Lundstrom should have been granted a change of venue and noted five affidavits filed by the defense, each stating Lundstrom could not get a fair trial in Eastland. However, the appeals court noted that the state had filed five affidavits of its own that

stated that Lundstrom could get a fair trial.

The court also held that by granting the defense's request for individual questioning of potential jurors, Hart had ample opportunity to question each person about his knowledge of the case.

The defense in its second point of error stated it should have been given the opportunity to inspect the police files after officers testified

they had referred to the files to refresh their memory at a pre-trial hearing on a motion to suppress. The appeals court ruled, however, that the testimony was given at a pre-trial hearing and not before the jury.

Hart also claimed a mistrial should have been granted when the district attorney used the word "confession" while questioning an officer. The court of appeals overruled the claim, stating that the trial court

acted correctly when it instructed the jury to disregard the sentence using the word "confession."

In his fourth ground of error, Hart argued that the letter Lundstrom wrote to his pastor should not have been admitted as evidence. Lundstrom, however, voluntarily gave the letter to officers, the appeals court said, adding that the handing over of the letter was a spontaneous act, and not the result of interrogation.

The defense, in its final point, claimed there was insufficient evidence to disprove the statements that Lundstrom did not kill his wife intentionally, according to the letter that had been admitted.

"...unknowingly I cocked the gun and pulled the trigger," the letter Lundstrom wrote to his pastor read. "I do not remember doing it. I have earnestly prayed also for God's forgiveness and his blood to wash away what I

did without thought or intention of harm. I know truthfully I wanted to scare her only, not hurt her."

The court of appeals, however, overruled Hart's argument, stating the evidence is sufficient for a rational jury to find the essential elements of the crime beyond a reasonable doubt.

The court added that the admissions in the letter support the jury's findings that the shooting was intentional.

but also that Lundstrom failed to summon help for his wife after the gun fired.

District Attorney Emory Walton said he was pleased with the 11th Court's ruling. "I've felt from the beginning that there was no errors in the Lundstrom case," he said.

Lundstrom's wife, Doris, was found murdered in their Cisco Motel apartment in March, 1983, and her husband gave himself up to authorities 11 days later.

## Phil Gramm Brings Grassroots Campaign

U.S. Rep. Phil Gramm of College Station, campaigning in Eastland County Thursday said the 1984 Senate election offers Texans a clear choice between a conservative who shares traditional Texas values and a liberal who is closer to Ted Kennedy than he is to Texas.

Gramm, who co-authored President Reagan's economic recovery pro-

gram, is probably best known as the congressman who resigned his seat in Congress and sought re-election as a Republican after Tip O'Neill and the liberal National Democratic Party

denied him his seat on the Budget Committee in retaliation for Gramm's successful efforts to control government spending.

"The differences between

my opponent and me on the key issues are stark," Gramm said.

"I have worked six years to control spending so the working people of Texas can keep more of what they earn. Lloyd Doggett is committed to raising taxes so the government can go on spending as usual."

Congressman Gramm also noted that on his first day in Congress, he introduced the balanced budget amendment to the Constitution while, by contrast, Doggett "voted against the Texas Legislature's resolution urging Congress to adopt the balanced budget amendment. He opposes the balanced budget amendment for the same reason Tip O'Neill and Ted Kennedy oppose it - they want more spending, not more restraint."

Touching on defense, Gramm pointed out that the two budgets he co-authored in the House provided for both a strong defense and for audits "to assure we get our money's worth."

"But Lloyd Doggett opposes virtually every element of our effort to strengthen national defense, including the MX missile, the B-1 bomber and the Pershing II missile," Gramm noted. "He even called it 'gunboat diplomacy' when our troops rescued the Americans trapped on Grenada last year."

Approximately 100 people jammed the Eastland Chamber of Commerce office reception for Cong. Gramm to meet him and to hear him talk. His talk was interrupted three times by spontaneous applause.

Congressman Gramm also discussed several other issues, including these:

- Right to Work. "I'm for it; he is against it."

- Voluntary prayer in school. "Again, I am for it; he is against it."

- Gay Rights Bill, legislation that would mandate affirmative action in the hiring of homosexuals. "I'm against it, but Lloyd Doggett is for it."

## Police Officer In Hospital Friday

Cisco Police officer Risa Biggs was in E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Friday morning after being kept overnight for observation with a mild concussion, stated Chief of Police Billy Rains.

Chief Rains said Officer Biggs and Sergeant Larry Jernigan were flagged down by a truck driver Thursday night, July 12, at 11:45 p.m., at the White Elephant Restaurant and Truck Stop. The driver advised the police officers that a Hispanic male subject was lying on the ground behind his truck and he wanted officers to check the subject.

Upon contacting the subject, he was uncooperative in regards to answering questions. He then became irate and belligerent, and starting cussing at the officers. Sergeant Jernigan placed

the subject under arrest for disorderly conduct and they took him to the patrol car where they attempted to handcuff him. After placing the cuffs on his right hand, the subject began fighting with the officers and he ripped a pocket off Officer Biggs shirt and began kicking her. During the scuffle Officer Biggs was knocked to the pavement.

After subduing the subject, he was transported to Eastland County Jail and Officer Biggs was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Doctors advised that the officer had a mild concussion and kept her overnight for observation.

Chief Rains said charges were expected to be filed Friday against the subject for aggravated assault on a police officer. He will also face the charges of disorderly conduct.

## High Quality Service Maintained Despite The Massive Changes

Statistics show area phone users are continuing to receive high-quality service despite massive changes in the telephone industry, according to Larry Vernon, Southwestern Bell manager.

## Advertising And Nutrition Claims

Consumers can be easily misled by food advertising that plays on their concerns about calories, cholesterol and sugar, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

Advertising is regulated by the Federal Trade Commission, and cannot contain incorrect information, says Dr. Alice Hunt. But some advertising claims take advantage of consumers' lack of nutrition information.

Many products are labeled "light" or "lite" to capitalize on consumers' interest in lower calorie foods, she says. While these products may be lighter in color or taste, they often have the same number of calories as other brands of the same product.

The labels on some vegetable oils, margarine and peanut butters state they have no "cholesterol."

"Unfortunately, many consumers don't know that

cholesterol is found only in animal products, so a vegetable product wouldn't contain it anyway," says Hunt.

These consumers may also mistakenly assume that similar vegetable products contain cholesterol, simply because their labels do not claim otherwise, she adds.

Consumers trying to cut down on sugar may be misled by similar advertising. For example, some brands of orange juice claim to have "no sugar added." This implies that other brands do have sugar added.

Yet under federal standards, any product labeled "orange juice" must be 100 percent orange juice with nothing added," explains the nutritionist.

Products advertised as having "half the sugar," may or may not have less sugar than other brands, Hunt points out. Often the products has fifty percent less sugar than it did before, but it may still contain a high amount of sugar.

Advertising can provide some valuable and useful information, she says. But to avoid being misled, consumers must become informed about nutrition and take the time to carefully read the labels on food products.

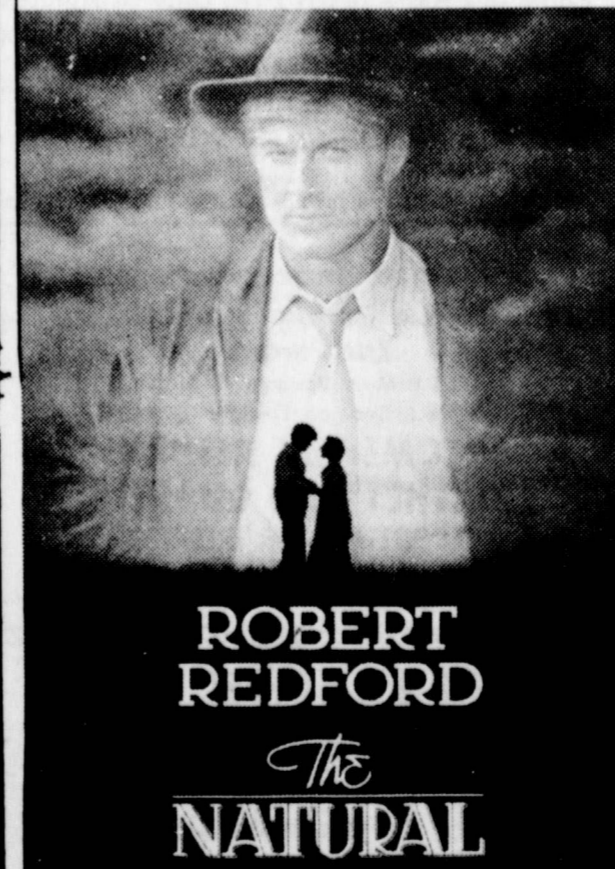

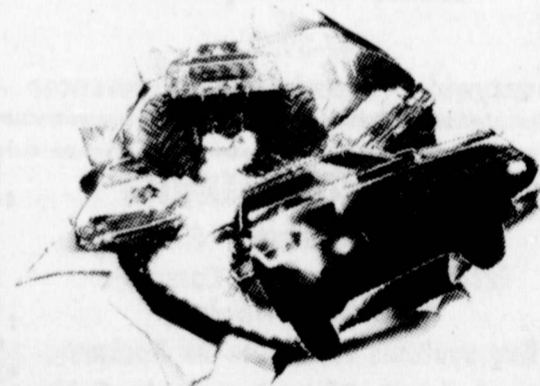

## Camp Inspiration Bell Is Historical Reminder

A bell which has been mounted on a stand at Camp Inspiration in Eastland is possibly the oldest relic in the county still in use.

The bell, cast around 1850 in St. Louis, was brought to Eastland County in a

covered wagon by John T. Townsend in 1869. The 640 lb. bell was then used on the Townsend Ranch until about 1900.

Given to the First Baptist Church, it was used by the church until the brick building was built in the 1920's. No place was provided for it in the brick church.

Given to the First Church of God, it was installed in the building at Lamar and Valley Streets, but was later removed when the building was sold in 1981.

It was first placed in the gazebo and finally on a stand at Camp Inspiration.

The stand was built of brick from the First Baptist Church building which was torn down in May and from the Warner University building that occupied the Camp site from 1928 until 1958.

Warner University opened in 1930 and closed in 1934. The property was sold at auction in 1935 to the Church of God.

The Texas Ministerial Assembly bought the property in 1946 and built the tabernacle in 1954. In 1962 the West Texas District of the Church of God was granted the 60 acres and has developed the present Camp Inspiration.

First granted by the governor and the State of Texas to the Houston and Texas Central Railroad in 1880, the land was given to Warner by the City of Eastland.

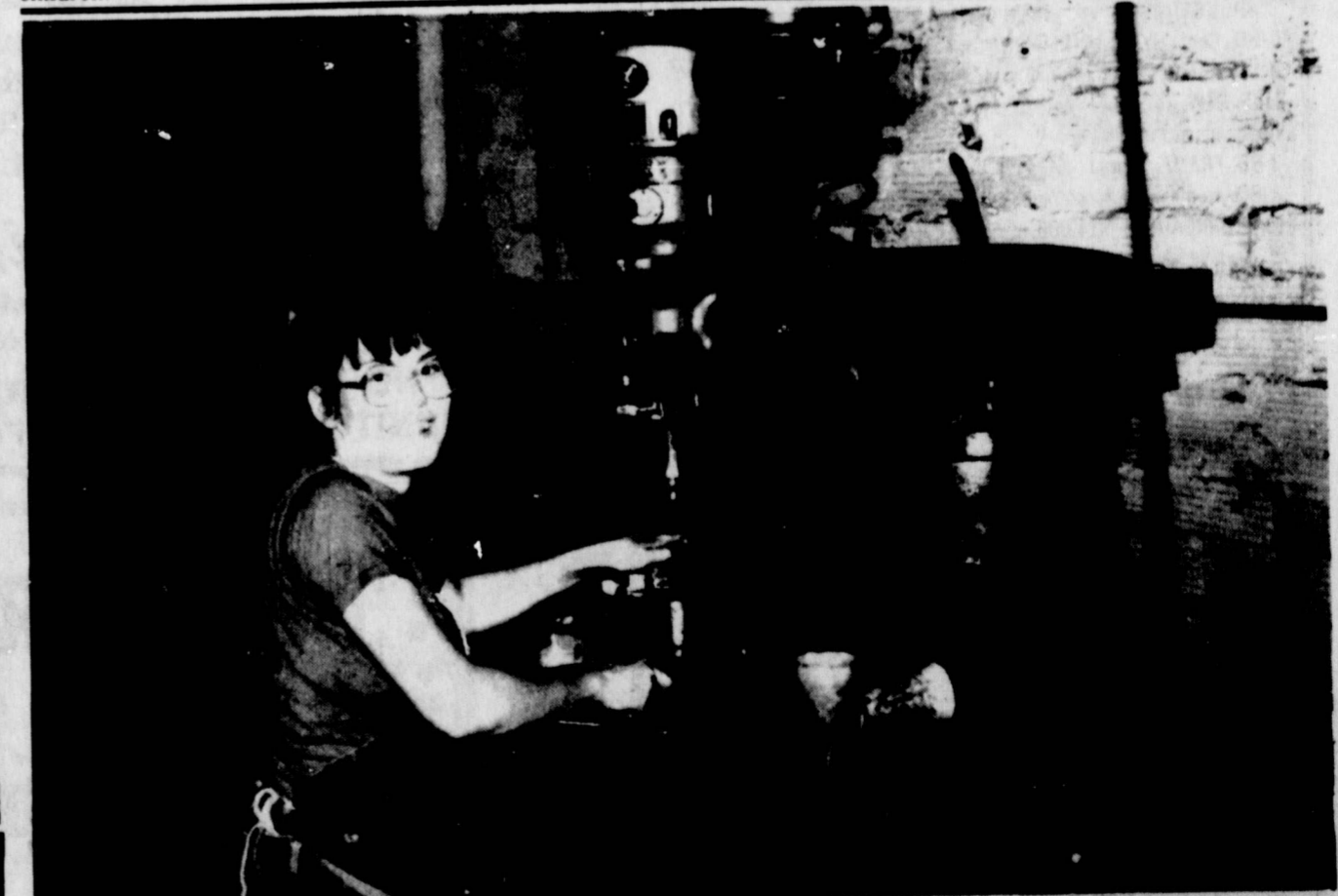

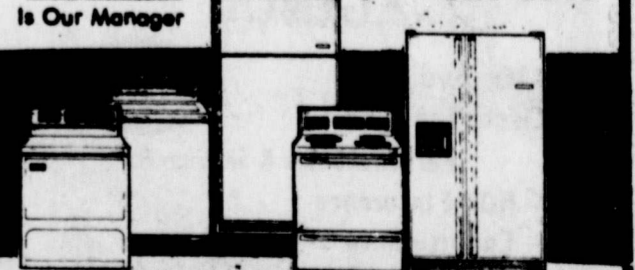

Recent scattered rains in June have helped some beef cattle operations in Eastland County. But many pastures and ranges are already so depleted that beef cows may have to be virtually full fed for some time. One of the most common pasture or range substitutes, grass hay, is not easy to find and the price is high compared to most recent years. The question may be asked, what are some alternatives to grass hay for beef cows?

Grass hay seems to be currently priced at \$80 to \$100 per ton, so \$90 will be used for a reference. Alfalfa can perhaps be found for not much more than that, but what is it worth?

Average alfalfa contains 17% crude protein or approximately twice that for average coastal hay (about 9%). But the energy in alfalfa is only 20% higher. Also, beef cows require only about 9% protein (less for dry cows) in their total diet, so the extra protein in alfalfa is not used if hay is full fed. In short, if average grass hay is priced at \$90/ton then alfalfa is worth \$110-115/ton, or about 25% more, for full feeding to beef cows.

Low quality hay (less than 5% protein), grain straw, or grain stubble, (or limited low-quality grazing) are other possibilities. Compared to average coastal, these materials are only 1/3 to 1/2 as high in protein, but they generally have 75% to 95% as much energy. Since the protein deficiency can be made up with relatively small amounts of high protein feeds, these low quality forages are worth more than may be thought. In fact, they should be worth \$60-\$70/ton (70-75% as much) for beef cows compared to \$90 coastal.

How about combining alfalfa with low quality forages, say on a 50-50 basis? Then the straw or stubble value is not changed much. But the value of alfalfa jumps to \$140-\$150/ton, mainly because the extra protein in alfalfa can be used in combination with low protein roughages, as opposed to full feeding alfalfa.

Finally, high energy grains like corn may be used for beef cows. If used to replace about half of the average coastal ordinarily needed, corn is worth about \$8.25-\$8.50/cwt. If combined with straw or stubble valued at \$50/ton, corn is worth about \$9.00/cwt. Any charge for mixing, sacking, etc. must be included in this value. So, at times like these, feed grains can be used to advantage for beef cows, especially if drought relief grain is available.

What if average grass hay is priced at something besides \$90? Then the value of the other feeds depends somewhat on whether your cows are dry or have a calf. Alfalfa and corn have more

feeding value and can be priced higher for lactating cows than dry cows, while straws, etc., are more useful for dry cows. These differences in value, relative to production status of the cow, are more pronounced as feeds decline in price.

For dry cows, for every \$10/ton change in the price of average grass hay, the value of alfalfa changes \$12/ton, straws, etc. change \$10/ton, and corn changes \$.90/cwt. For lactating cows, for every \$10/ton difference in grass hay, the value of alfalfa also changes \$10/ton, straws, etc. change \$13/ton, and corn changes \$.75/cwt.

Of the feeds we've discussed, the value of low quality materials such as straw or stubble is most drastically affected by changes in the value of grass hay. If grass hay costs \$110/ton, straws or stubbles are worth \$80-\$90/ton or about 80% as much. But if grass hay drops to \$60/ton then straws or stubbles are worth only \$30/ton (50% as much as grass hay) for dry cows and only \$20/ton (only 33% as much as grass hay) for lactating cows.

There are some options to traditional grass hay programs. You just have to look for them.

## Drilling Bits

The distinction is important. The Media lumps us in with television news. The Press does not. The Press is newspapers -

Walter Cronkite, talking about today's chorus line of news commentators said, "I suspect that if television didn't exist they'd be in acting."

John Dancy of NBC says TV news "always favors the simple story, not complex issues." And Brit Hume of ABC said of TV coverage of the Iowa campaign, "You can always get on the air with pigs."

Charles Kuralt said it well in a recent university appearance.

He deplored the "very depressing state of affairs around 6 o'clock in the evening all over America."

"Urgent electronic music plays, the lights come up and an earnest young man or woman says to the camera, 'Good evening, here is the news.' This is said very

urgently and with the appearance of sincerity - most often by an attractive young person who would not know a news story if it jumped up and mugged his coiffure."

Kuralt went on to criticize TV station managers who "don't know anything about news and don't care" but do listen to consultants who tell them:

"You must have ringing bells and flashing graphics to seize the attention of the sap at home who might otherwise be inclined to read a book or play with his children. Then, you must keep the show moving to dazzle the sucker. Put those reporters out there live at the scene - it doesn't matter what scene - and make them talk loud and fast. The successful station is the one that masters the staccato pace and the one-sentence inter-

view and the car wreck on the highway."

Again, television news is show biz plus a spoken headline or two.

Television news is big - maybe biggest of all - today when people say, "The Media."

Test that statement. The next few times somebody starts criticizing "The Media" ask them to be specific, pin them down. Most of the time they are talking about television news. Not us.

So let's be what we are - the Press.

Let's take our lumps for our own shortcomings and claim our rewards for our success.

Let's let television strut on stage to cue-card applause while we do our traditional job - a job of serving the high cause of an informed people (if not an entertained people) so that they may better build and maintain a government of, for and by themselves.

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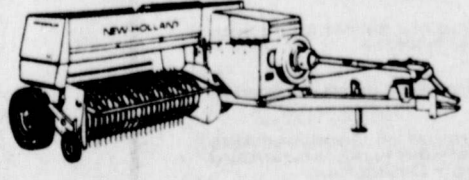

## Phone Service Gets High Technology Boost

There's a new computer system in Cisco and it's giving a high-technology boost to local phone service.

The system - with the appropriately futuristic name of COSMOS (Computer for Main Frame Operations) - was activated July 9. It will help local Southwestern Bell employees change telephone lines for customers quicker and more accurately than with past systems.

COSMOS identifies

telephone lines and other equipment that can be used when customers change service or begin new service. This step, that can take as long as two to three days manually, is accomplished in two or three minutes by COSMOS. Though there are many more steps involved in changing customers' service, COSMOS helps coordinate and expedite the process.

The computer system

reduces the need for employees to manually send, and check paper forms," said Larry Vernon, local manager. "The result is faster service for customers that is accurate and economical. When you're working with 3788 telephone lines, as we do in Cisco, a computerized system works wonders in identifying available lines. It's quite an improvement over our older, manual process.

"For example, the system reduces the chances of a wrong line being assigned, through human error, which can significantly slow customer service."

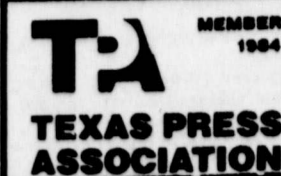
Vernon said COSMOS automatically gives employees information on making connections that further speeds customer service. "It combines the intelligence of a record-keeper and technician, giving us information instantaneously," Vernon said. "With it, we're improving service and fighting the ever-increasing cost of providing local service. That helps us reduce the many pressures of increasing phone rates to customers.

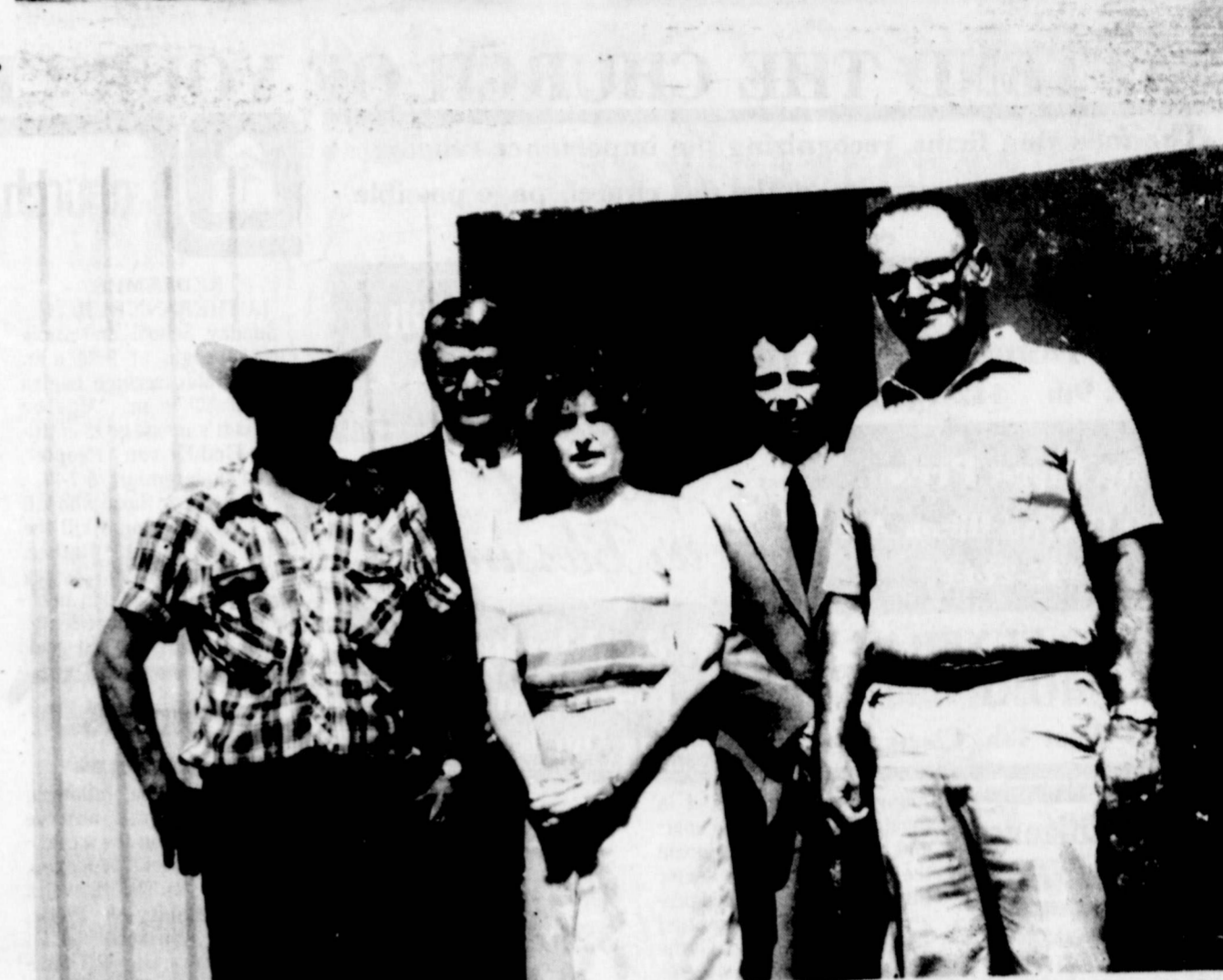
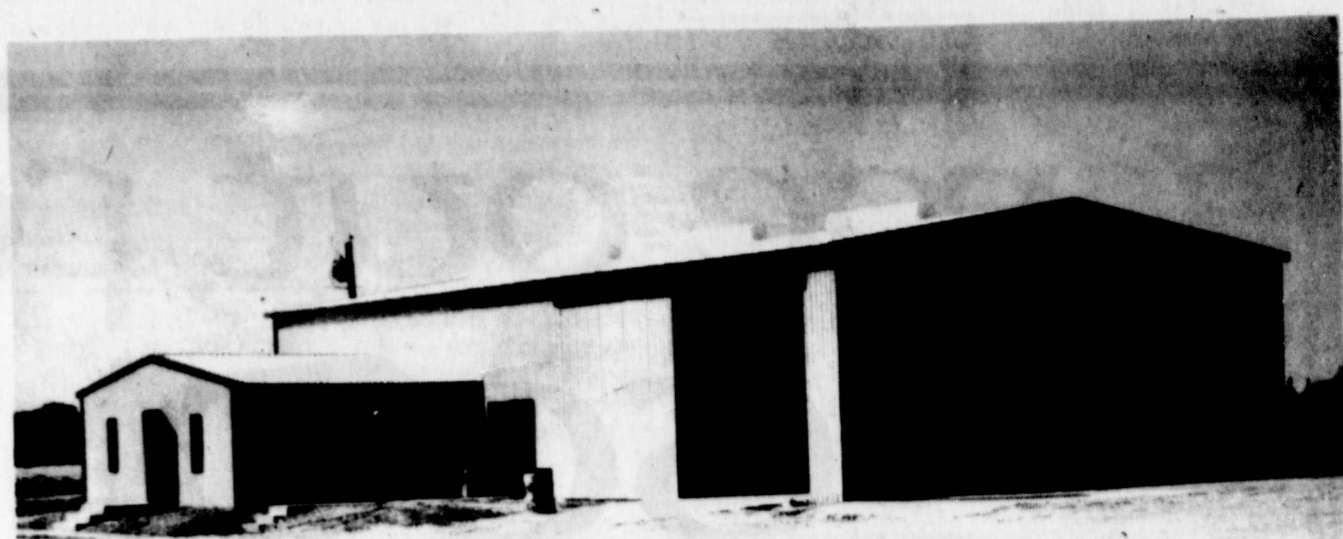
