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'Guys and Dolls', Another Roof Garden Theatre Hit

Another hit, is how the Roof Garden Dinner Theatre's production of "Guys and Dolls" can be remembered. The final production of the summer was to run thru all of this week, with the final performances scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights of this week.

"Guys and Dolls" by Frank Loesser, Jo Swerling and Abe Burrows is a classic of the American musical theatre. Miss Sarah Brown's Salvation Army Mission near Times Square is a dismal failure until Nathan Detroit, the operator of a floating crap game makes her the uncraving object of a bet with Sky Masterson, a

handsome gambler who thinks all "dolls" are the same - easy pickings. What develops is true romance, but Sky discovers that to win Miss Sarah he must first make her mission a success by recruiting his gambler associates for a prayer meeting - not an easy task. Well known songs include "Luck be a Lady,"

"Can Do," "A Bushel and a Peck," and "Sit Down You're Rockin' the Boat." The two acts, seventeen scenes play presented the theatre program with special problems in that it calls for at least six different settings. Director Philip Craik states, "We solved these problems by adopting the old-fashioned practice of

employing roll-drops, as well as roll-away scenery." He continues, "Our cost is almost as large as that of last summer's "Fiddler on the Roof" and the costuming and scenery are more elaborate. We are also using a percussionist and a couple of brass players as well as a pianist for our orchestra." "For the first time we have brought in a dance choreographer, Nicki Harle, and all in all this summer's production of "Guys and Dolls" promises to be the most spectacular show ever staged at the Roof Garden."

The menu for the dinner consists of Rib Roast, a tossed mixed vegetable salad, au gratin potatoes, green beans in bacon sauce, dinner rolls and cherry cheese cake. Reservations may be made by calling the Roof Garden Box Office at (817) 442-2589. All reservations or cancellations must be made by noon of the day of the performance, however, several of the performances have already been sold out, so theatre goers are advised not to wait until the last minute to make reservations.

Three of this year's professional guest artists are featured in the play, along with director Philip Craik, who portrays his fine acting ability in the character of Sky Masterson. A number of apprentices and local citizens are also in the play which has a cast of 30 characters. Philip Craik has completed his third year as Theatre Director at Cisco Junior College, and his work has resulted in a growing audience and community involvement with the Roof Garden Theatre. Since coming to CJC, Philip had

directed a total of 13 plays (before this summer). A native of Abilene, Mr. Craik received his undergraduate training in music and drama at Hardin-Simmons University. Graduate training includes a year of study at the Webber Douglas Academy of Dramatic Art in London and five years of graduate work at LSU where he is a Ph.D. candidate in theatre. Guest artist Linda McNeil, who portrays Sarah Brown, is a native of Mexia, Texas and is currently working toward her Master of Music degree in vocal performance at Baylor University. Her professional experience includes work with the Dallas Repertory Theatre where she played the lead in "The Pirates of Penzance" numerous chorales with Casa Manana and the Fort Worth Opera Co., and leading roles in "Oklahoma" and "How To Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" by Dinner Theatre Inc.

Professional Melanie Taylor calls Union City, Tennessee home and she received her undergraduate training in theatre at the University of Tennessee in Martin. She has recently completed work on an MA degree from the University of Kansas where her principle areas of training were in acting and costuming. Her professional experience includes working for WIVB, Channel 11 in Topeka, Kansas; as costumer for the Kansas Repertory Theater; and as actress/costumer for the Vanguard Summer Theatre. Ms. Taylor portrays Miss Adelaide in "Guys and Dolls."

Steven Vincent turns in his usual professional performance during the dinner theatre, this time as Nathan Detroit. Mr. Vincent needs no introduction for regular Roof Garden Theatre goers who remember him as the hysterical slave Hysterium in "A Funny Thing," the devious Sidney Bruhl in "Deathtrap" or the timid tailor Motel in "Fiddler on the Roof." Mr. Vincent has also performed in the previous two productions of this summer's dinner theatres. He also directed "Dirty Work at the Crossroads" and last summer's production of "Tartuffe." His training includes a BFA from TCU, and MFA from OU, a year of study in London with The Drama Studio, and graduate work at the University of Kansas where he is a Ph.D. candidate. Credits include a stint in New York City with the Provincetown Playhouse, the Drama Committee Repertory, and the New York Theatre Ensemble as well as work with the Creede Repertory Theatre in Colorado.

Good performances were turned in by the entire cast and the audience was kept laughing at some of the actions and antics of the apprentices and guest artists. The cast of characters includes: Greg Qualls as Rusty Charlie; Jim Means as Nicely-Nicely Joynson; Clay Ingram as Benny Southstreet; Linda McNeil as Sarah Brown; Jimmy Walker as Arvide Abernathy; Amanda Lewis, Katrina Bogle, Dicky Seider as The Mission Band; Ronny Powell as Angie the Dr. Wes Wynn as Lt. Brannigan; Steven Vincent as Nathan Detroit; and Brad Hawari as Society Max.

Other characters include: Chris McMurray as Scranton Slim; Joe Searcy as Big Jule; Dickey Seider as Liver Lips Louie; Melanie Taylor as Miss Adelaide; Philip Craik as Sky Masterson; Brad Hawari as Joey Biltmore; Sherri Ashley, Johnna Brown, Jill Siebert, Christi Terrell, Jana Wester as the Hot Box Girls; Joan Fariello as General Matilda B. Cartwright; Jana Wester, Brad Hawari as Cuban Dancers; Jill Siebert as featured Hot Box Dancer; Brad Hawari, Clay Ingram, and Chris McMurray as Waiters.

entering her career. Wanda has consistently been a best seller for Capitol Records and has thrilled millions of fans throughout the world in her personal appearances.

A Hermleigh High School graduate, Hacker attended Ranger Junior College where he played football and met his future wife, the former Linda Brockman, an Eastland High School graduate.

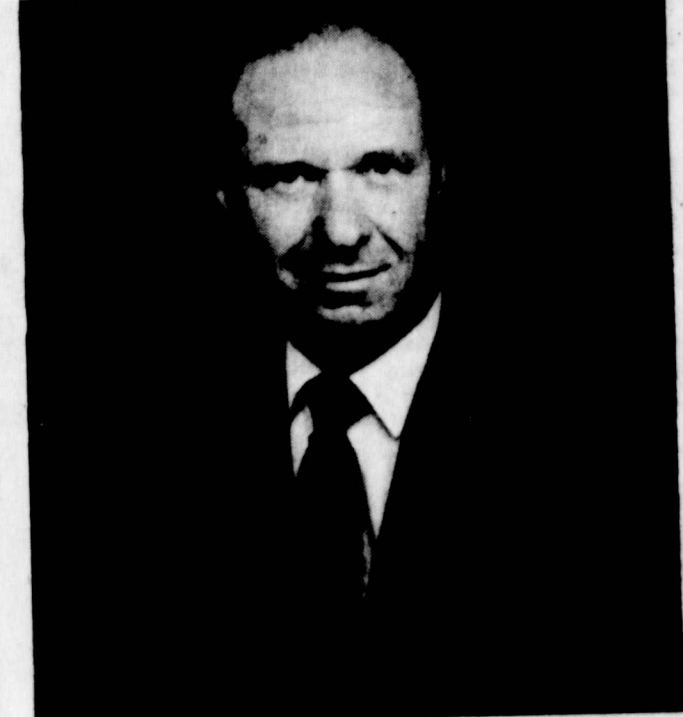

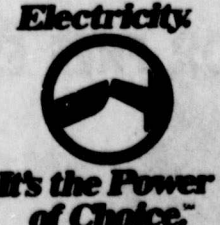

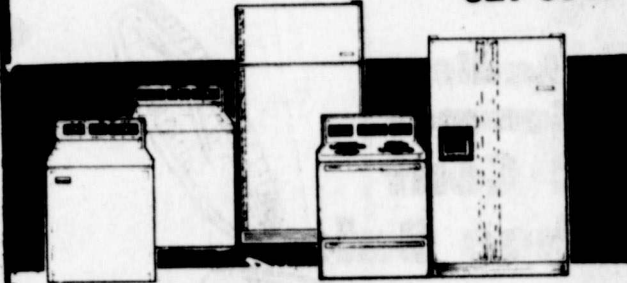
group. Today we studied Fruit & Vegetable group and walked several miles. Thursday we will jog and study bread and cereal group. Friday we'll tie it all together.

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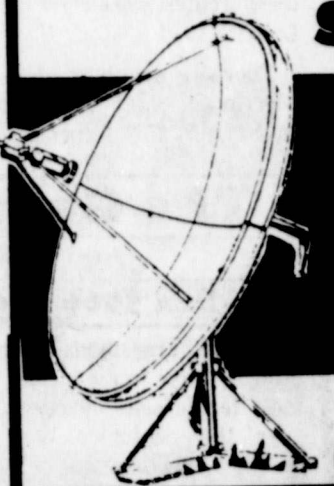

Natural grasslands and prairies have some of the most fertile soils on earth, over the centuries have modified the physical properties of the soils in which they grow. Grass plants and the soil that supports them have continued to grow and develop through the millenniums. Interdependently, they thrive mainly because they support each other. It is from this unusual partnership that fertile, productive soils has been formed in grasslands. In the United States, most of these areas have been converted into the "Corn Belt" where much of our best farmland is located. A large share of the world's grain is produced here.

Grass is a unique plant. It stems and leaves are high in nutrients and energy. One of the most extraordinary features is the extensive root system. It usually makes up a large fraction of the total

weight and bulk of the plant, and has the capacity to store large amounts of nutrients enabling grass to survive close cutting and even burning.

In grass, as in few other plants, the tissue responsible for growth and cell division is located toward the base of the shoot. When chopped, it will quickly grow back from the base. For this reason, lawns will continue to flourish despite frequent mowing.

Other unique features of a grass plant are its rhizomes and stolens. These horizontal stems grow either above or below ground sending out new shoots and roots. This characteristic causes grass to grow and spread in dense stands forming what we call sod.

Lawns have become an important part of our surroundings. Luxuriant stands of grass add aesthetic value and utility to yards, parks,

golf courses, athletic fields, cemeteries and road sides. Homeowners constantly strive for the "perfect lawn" and spend time, energy and money to achieve this coveted goal. Turf grass management has become a specialized profession. Sophisticated maintenance techniques have developed from extensive research programs.

Superior varieties have been produced through plant selection and breeding. Even with the many advances in turf technology, lawns are creating increasing frustration. Despite following the recommendations for use of fertilizers, water and pesticides, many lawns are still a disappointment. The desired lush grass covered is never achieved.

Today, professional lawn care operators have emerged and are providing home owners the important service of fertilizing, weed and

insect control. However, even these specialists are confronted with many unsolved turf problems.

With our hot and dry weather we need to keep our lawns watered at this time of the year in order for them to survive now as well as next winter. Our lawns need at least two inches of water per week. A good soaking of these two inches is much better than spreading these two inches over a seven day period. Water once a week heavy and the time of the day you water is very important. Early morning is the best time to water. If you water in the heat or middle of the day you can scald the plant material and if you water in the evening the plant material may not have time to dry before night fall and you can have a problem with fungus disease.

Drilling Bits

A new producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Hanvey Field, with Richey & Co. of Ft. Worth as the operator.

Located two miles northwest of Cisco the well is in a 40 acre lease in the SPRR Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Ivie-Wallace.

On a 3/4-in. choke it flowed 650,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 700,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The well bottomed at 3,930-ft. and will produce from a perforated interval in the Lake Sand Formation, 3,513 to 3,519 feet into the hole.

Eastland County's REB Field gained a new producer when Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth completed the No. 2 Lowrance-East five miles north of Eastland.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 35 barrels of oil and 120,000 CF casinghead gas per day on an open choke. It was taken to a 4,063-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,546 to 3,564 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in an 80-acre lease in the H & TCR Survey.

A Rising Star-based operator has staked locations for the Nos. 15 and 16 D. Dunn, developmental wells to be located two miles north-northwest of Rising Star. With projected total depth of 1,500-ft. each, the wells are in a 120-acre lease in Eastland County's Regular Field, ETRR Survey. The operator is Jane Petroleum Co.

At a location three miles northwest of Eastland, Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's REB Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Tankersly, pumping oil at the rate of 24 barrels and casinghead gas at the rate of 108,000 CF per day on an open choke.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in the H & TCR Survey. Bottomed at 3,850-ft., the well will produce from perforations 3,448 to 3,456 feet into the hole.

Puentes Petroleum Inc. of Abilene has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Phippen Field. The No. 1 Clifford Phippen showed potential to make 65 barrels of oil per day on a 12/64-in. choke.

The operator has 80 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's Te&I Survey, seven miles northwest of Cisco.

The well will produce from an interval 4,048 to 4,058 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,158-ft.

Proco Operating Inc. of Grapard has revealed plans to drill a 3,500-ft. wildcat for oil and gas. The operator has 128 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's ETRR Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 1 Edwards-McCollum. Drillsite is ten miles south of Carbon.

Two new producers have been brought on line in Eastland County's Regular Field, with Jane Petroleum Co. of Rising Star as the operator. Located two miles northwest of Rising Star the wells are in an 11-acre lease in the ETRR Survey.

The No. 3 D. Dunn "A" showed potential to pump 15 barrels of oil per day on an open choke. The well bottomed at 1,150-ft. and will produce from a perforated interval 1,025 to 1,100 feet into the hole.

Showing potential to pump 20 barrels of oil per day on an open choke is the No. 4 D. Dunn "A". Bottomed at 1,144-ft. the well will produce from a perforated interval 1,000 to 1,115 feet into the hole.

Eastland County's Regular Field gained a new producer when T-Square Petroleum completed the No. 6 Taff one mile southeast of Pioneer.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of five barrels of oil per day on an open choke. It was taken to a 2,520-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations 2,388 to 2,392 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 79-acre lease in the ETRR Survey.

A 2,000-ft. developmental well is planned by M.M. White & Associates of Eastland at a drillsite six miles south of Cisco, Eastland County. The location is in a 70-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey. Well's designation is the No. 7 Alvin Kincaid. It is in the Nimrod (Crosscut) Field.

At a location six miles north of Eastland Welcome Well Service and Boykin Brothers of Big Spring have finalized two new oil producers in Eastland County's AB (Ranger) Field. Locations are in a 234-acre lease

in the H&TCRR Survey.

The No. 7 Alvin Kincaid showed potential to flow 91 barrels of oil and 98,000 CF casinghead gas per day on a 10/64-in. choke. Bottomed at 3,904-ft., the well will produce from perforations 3,725 to 3,727 feet into the hole.

The No. 6 Alvin Kincaid indicated ability to pump 20 barrels of oil and 67,000 CF casinghead gas per day on an open choke. It was taken to a 3,905-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations 3,714 to 3,724 feet into the wellbore.

A Lawton-based operator has staked locations for the Nos. 1 and 2 Claypool, developmental wells to be located six miles southeast of Eastland. With projected total depths of 1,995-ft. each, the wells are in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's AMV Field, McClennan Survey. The operator is AMV Operating.

The same operator has revealed plans to drill a 1,995-ft. developmental well in the AMV Field. The operator has 123 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's William Van Norman Survey and had designated

the venture as the No. 1 Hazard "B". Drillsite is seven miles southeast of Eastland.

107 Gas, 44 Oil Discoveries In July

Texas oil and gas operators reported 107 gas and 44 oil discoveries in July, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace. In June, a total of 117 gas and 68 oil discoveries were filed with the Commission. A discovery is an exploratory well that is completed in a previously untapped reservoir.

So far this year, 808 gas and 397 oil discoveries have been reported. Through the same period of 1983, operators had filed 780 gas and 497 oil discoveries.

Gas discoveries in July included one in the San Antonio area (District 1), 23 in

the Refugio area (District 2), 13 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 43 in deep South Texas (District 4), one in East Central Texas (District 5), five in East Texas (District 6), 13 in West Central Texas (District 7B), one in the San Angelo area (District 7C), two in the Midland area (District 8), one in the Lubbock area (District 8A), two in North Texas (District 9), and two in the Panhandle (District 10).

Oil discoveries included two in the San Antonio area (District 1), four in the Refugio area (District 2), three in Southeast Texas (District 3), nine in deep

South Texas (District 4), four in East Texas (District 6), 10 in West Central Texas (District 7B), five in the Midland area (District 8), four in the Lubbock area

(District 8A), and three in North Texas (District 9).

These totals were included in the 1,464 oil, 440 gas, and 40 service completions operators reported in July.

In June, operators filed 1,645 oil, 456 gas, and 21 service completions.

A total of 451 dry holes were reported in July, compared to 558 in June.

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County Sales Up 15% Over '83

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$98.3 million in local sales tax payments to 988 cities that levy the one percent sales tax.

Although bookkeeping changes that were part of last year's tax deadline speedups made the August 1984 payment smaller than the previous August payment, Bullock said year-to-date comparisons can be made accurately.

"This 12 and a half percent increase is honest growth over last year because both this August payment and last August's are based on all sales reported during the first half of both years," Bullock said.

Eastland received the largest check in the county, \$31,376.91, however, it was down from \$34,361.86 received for July, 1983. This brings the Eastland 1984 total to \$206,231.46, up 38.12% over last years \$149,311.04.

Cisco's check for \$24,257.47 was down from \$25,212.88 last July. 1984 payments to date total \$137,293.14, up 55% over last years \$136,537.55.

Gorman received a check for \$4,233.31 to bring this years total to \$17,106.23, up 4.10% over 1983's \$16,431.72.

Ranger's check for \$15,070.10 brought this years total to \$77,525.32, down 1.27% over the 1983 total of \$78,522.26.

Rising Star's check for \$3,055.20 was down from last July's check for \$4,253.38. This brought the 1984 total to \$17,961.09, up 21.39% over 1983's \$14,796.51.

The total sales tax payments received in Eastland County total \$78,192.99 compared to \$82,198.45 for the same period last year. This brings the total for the year to \$456,117.24, reflecting an increase of 15.30% over last year's \$395,599.08.

Houston received the largest check, \$17.1 million, bringing Houston's yearly total to \$99.3 million. Dallas' check was for \$11.7 million. Dallas has received \$66.9 million so far this year.

San Antonio's check was for \$6.1 million, a 6.1 percent increase over the July 1983 payment. Austin received \$4.3 million, boosting that city's total for the year to \$24.1 million. The Fort Worth payment was \$3.5 million.

Midland received \$911,000, bringing the yearly total to \$5.3 million, ahead of last year's total through August by 10.7 percent.

Bullock also sent checks to the four Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston MTA received \$19.5 million, bringing the total for 1984 to \$114.6 million. DART's check

JULY OIL AND GAS

A total of 3,851 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in July, according to RRC Chairman Mack Wallace. In June, the Commission processed 3,700 applications, and 3,860 were handled in July 1983.

The July 1984 total included 2,973 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 76 applications to deepen existing holes, 286 applications to plugback existing holes.

Applications for new oil and gas holes in July included 378 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 113 in the Refugio area (District 2), 246 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 255 in deep South Texas (District 4), 44 in East Central Texas (District 5), 139 in East Texas (District 6), 443 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 181 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 386 in the Midland area (District 8).

WASHINGTON, July 31 - Congressman Charles W. Stenholm's agricultural staff will be in DeLeon on Tuesday, August 14, to discuss the upcoming 1985 Farm Bill.

Dale King, of Stenholm's Stamford office, and Randy Green, from the Congressman's Washington office, will hold a workshop at City Hall at 2 p.m. on August 14. Farmers, ranchers and others who are interested in agricultural policy are invited to bring their ideas and suggestions to the meeting for discussion.

"My staff will be there mostly to listen," Stenholm said. "They'll try to give producers some insight into what's going on in Washington, but the main purpose of the workshop is to get people's ideas on what should be in the new farm legislation Congress will write next year."

Every four years, Congress reauthorizes and revises the nation's farm programs. The last overall farm bill was written in 1981, and it is widely believed to be a failure.

We've got to do a better job this time," Stenholm said. "What's needed is an environment in which profits can return to agriculture."

Stenholm, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, has taken a strong interest in the upcoming farm bill. In addition to his regular trips to his home district to discuss agriculture, the Stamford Democrat has participated in Congressional farm policy hearings in California and North Carolina during the past month. He was featured speaker on farm policy at the National Conference of
