A total of 917 students enrolled in the Cisco Public Schools as the 1984-85 school year began Monday, Aug. 20, according to Supt. James Couch. This was some 62 less than the 979 students that were enrolled on the opening day last year.

Enrollment by classes was reported as follows: kindergarten, 65; 1st grade, 91; 2nd grade, 64; 3rd grade, 86: 4th grade, 65; 5th grade, 62; 6th grade, 64; 7th grade, 73; 8th grade, 90; high school, 257. Mr. Couch said several



Tri-Mor Production of Graham has filed for permit to drill the no. 6 Pugh "d", a 4,800-ft. developmental well five miles east of Breckenridge. Location is in a 20-acre lease in Stephens County's T&PRR Survey. The well is in the Moon Field.

Sun Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene has filed first prodution figures on two new oil wells in Stephens **Regular Field.** The operator has 318 acres leased, with drillsite one mile north of Breckenridge. The wells are designated as the No.s 23 & 24 Ackers-State.

The No. 23 showed potential to make 39 barrels of oil daily. Location is in the J. Neill Survey. The No. 24 well indicated ability to make 15 barrels per day. It is located in the ME&PRR Survey.

Bottomed at 3,250 feet, the wells will produce from perforations ranging from 3,127

In an average year, about one of every five Americans

is out of work, said Richard Bolles, an authority on career planning. The author of "What Color

Is Your Parachute?" recently spoke at a United Ministries in Education Conference at Texas Christian University.

The career expert said that there are two types of unemployment: fricitional and structural. Frictional unemployment refers to the inevitable gap there is between losing your old job and finding a new one. This not a bid situation, he says, because your skills are needed, and there are such jobs in the market that can use those skills.



We have seen some of Americas top athletes competing against other athletes in the Olympics, but a marathon runner who is competing against great distance, extreme weather, and danger from traffic, animals and people passed through Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco this past week.

Jim Letherer, a native of Michigan who has spent time in the front offices of some professional baseball teams, is running from Raleigh, North Carolina to San Diego, California.

The unusual thing about the marathon is that 'Captain Jim,' the name the 50 year old sports fan is known by, lost a leg to cancer and is running across the southern United States on crutches

He says that Jesus gives him the strength, hope and love which has inspired him to run this marathon.

If he completes the marathon pledged funds will be given to cancer research, but just as important to Captain Jim is to be able to say to young people who have lost a part of their bodies to cancer, "Life is not over, the Jesus that has enabled me to do this can lift you out of despair and help you to accomplish things too, if you will let him.'


If you think I am handicapped, try running a race with me," Captain Jim challenged an athletic looking young man at the White Elephant in Cisco.







Gravemarker Available to Vets **Through Fed, Says Jack Mathis**

Many families of veterans are not familiar with the fact that the Federal government provides a headstone or grave marker for a veteran's grave when he is buried in a private cemetery. According to Jack Mathis, Commander for V.F.W. Post 4136 Eastland, family members will choose and pay for a grave marker when one could be furnished free of charge by the

Veterans Administration. Even though last year the Veterans Administration provided more than 210,000 free grave markers for graves of veterans, many people still do not know that the VA does not pay for the installation of the marker at the grave site. The marker itself is provided free of any charge, and all shipping charges to its destination are paid by the government, but the cost of installing the marker at the grave site must be borne by the family member or members who authorized the burial. The charge for such installation is generally rather small, approximately \$50 or less.

The VA can also pay for burial allowance of \$300 if the veteran, at the time of his death, was in ceceipt of disability compensation or pension benefits. An additional \$150 can also be paid in most instances as plot or grave space allowance. The burial allowance and plot payment are applicable only if the veteran served during

a period of wartime. If a veteran's death is shown to have been caused by disabilities which were incurred during his or her military service, the VA can pay as much as \$1,100 toward the costs of the burial. Application for the burial allowance must be filed with the Veterans Administration region office serving the area where the veteran is buried. In most cases, the funeral directors will file the claim with the VA, and deduct from the total bill the amount that is paid by the VA.






CISCO


turned-up ugly, bare earth. Gone were the golden dandelions and the pretty violets. "How could anyone spoil a place so lovely?" so-
