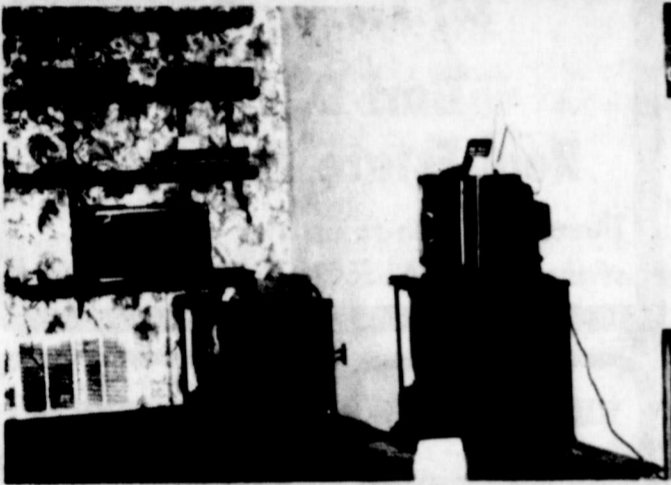

Cisco Youth In Jail For Kidnapping

A 17-year old Cisco youth was in Eastland County jail Friday after he was charged with aggravated kidnapping, burglary, and attempting to escape following an incident in Cisco late Wednesday.

The youth, Erbey Reyes, was being held under a \$50,000 bond set by R.G. Lyerla, justice of the peace in Eastland, after his arrest here and charges being filed by District Attorney Emory Walton.

Tom Barrett, Cisco detective sergeant, reported that Reyes was accused of breaking into a Cisco home, kidnapping two brothers at gun point, and ordering them to drive him to Mexico. One of the brothers was Charles R. Roykin, Jr., 21, of 1908 Avenue H. The other was a 14-year old youth.

Officer Barrett said Reyes broke a window to enter the Roykin home. Soon after he forced the brothers into their car and started

away, the older brother began scuffling with Reyes and was successful in pushing him out of his car in the 1000 block of Hilton Ave.

The brothers then drove away and reported the incident to police. Some 10 minutes later, Reyes was arrested by Officer Barrett, Sgt. Frank Thumsden and Officer Darrell Shipman. He still had the gun, a .25 calibre automatic pistol, which was taken by policemen.

While he was handcuffed, Reyes broke and ran from police. They soon caught him and took him to the county jail. Officer Randy Haskins assisted with the chase and arrest.

Reyes had been released some two months ago from a Corpus Christi church home where he was sent by court order after he slugged a coach in an incident at Cisco High School last year, officers reported.

CJC Wins Season Opener

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, who opened their 1984 season with a 28-to-0 victory over Panhandle Eastern College at Goodwell, Okla., Thursday night, will play the McMurry College JV at Chesley Field in Cisco at 7:30 p.m. Monday.

The Wranglers scored three touchdowns in the second quarter to take com-

mand of the Thursday night game. After a scoreless first period, QB Mike Frazier passed to End Michael Robertson for a 62-yard touchdown soon after the second quarter began. Moments later, Robertson hauled in another Frazier pass and scored on a 90-yard play. Late in the period, Jason Potter of Cisco scored from three yards out. Walter

Rule kicked all three extra points.

In the final quarter, a 4th Frazier pass was caught by Keith McCarty for a touchdown and Rule converted.

Walter Green, defensive cornerback, suffered a shoulder separation that will likely sideline him for a

month. Coach Bob Keyes used all of the 48-member squad in the game.

The Wranglers will use their freshman players in the Monday night game with the McMurry JV. The entire 100-man squad will go to Stephenville next Thursday night to meet Tarleton State's JV.

CHS Junior Varsity Drops Game To DeLeon, 16-6

The Cisco High School Junior Varsity opened their 1984 football season Thursday night in DeLeon with a 16-6 loss to the Bearcats.

The Lobo J.V. played better in the second half of the game than they did in the

first. Cisco managed to score as time ran out in the first half of the game.

DeLeon scored both of its touchdowns in the first half of the game, with one touchdown in each quarter. Both of their tries for extra

points were good.

The first touchdown for DeLeon was on a seven-yard run. DeLeon then completed a pass for two extra points making the score 8-0 in the first quarter.

DeLeon's second touchdown drive was set up when a bad snap from Cisco's center sailed over punter Brian Wagnon's head and he was tackled on Cisco's 23-yard line.

Six plays later, DeLeon completed a pass into the end zone from seven yards out for their second touchdown. Another pass netted the Bearcats two extra points making the score 16-0 with 8:56 left in the first half.

Later, with only 38 seconds remaining in the first half, Cisco's Pete DeLeon knocked loose and recovered a DeLeon fumble at mid-field to set up Cisco's only scoring drive of the game. A 13-yard run by Billy Wyatt placed the ball on DeLeon's 37-yard line. A completed pass from quarterback Jason Phillips to Kevin Kirk gained 17 yards.

With the ball resting on the 20-yard line and six seconds remaining in the first half, Cisco tried another pass which fell incomplete as time ran out on the clock.

All interested persons are invited to attend.

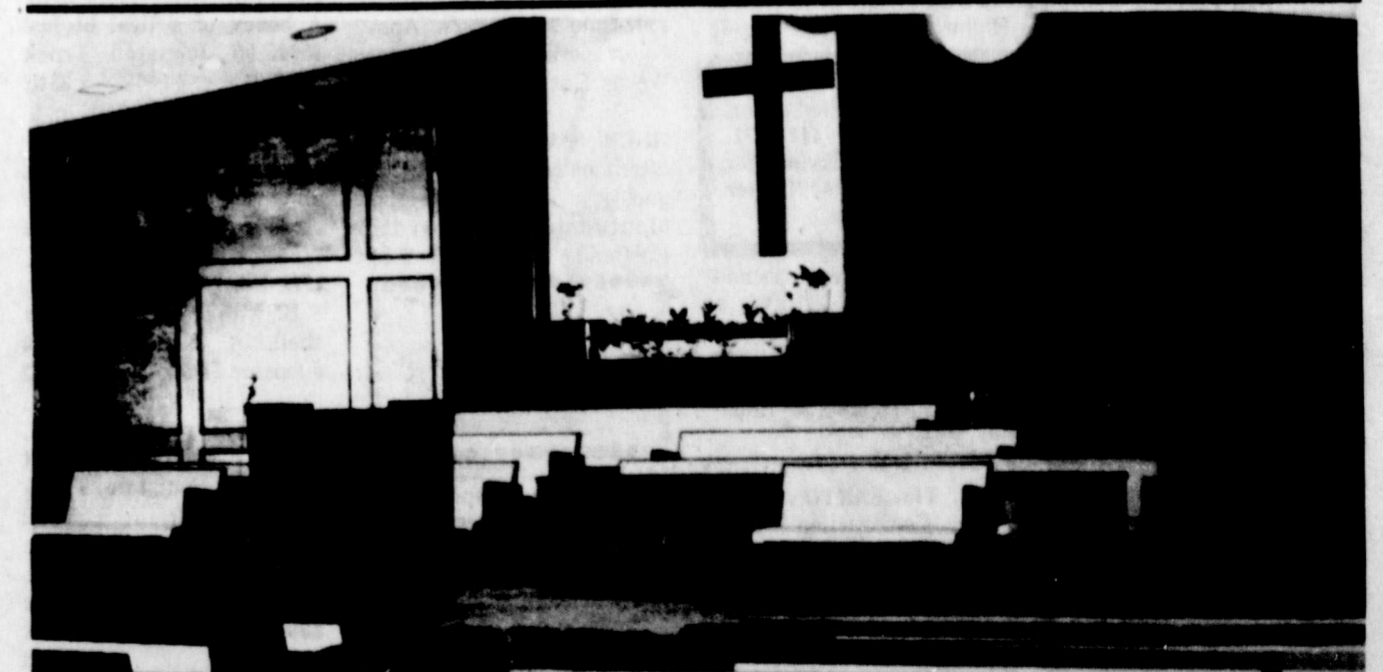

During the second half of play, DeLeon was able to push the ball inside Cisco's 20-yard line only once and that drive ended with the ball on Cisco's 17-yard line. Cisco was unable to sustain a drive past DeLeon's 41-yard line.

NEW SANCTUARY-- Calvary Baptist Church, 1801 Conrad Hilton, Cisco, held its first worship services Sunday, September 2, in their new sanctuary with 138 present. The new portion of the building, which will seat 250, was started the second week of October, 1983. Some finish work is still required and the church has future plans for extensive remodeling of the older portion of the building. Rev. Ronnie Shackelford, pastor of the church, says a dedication day will be held for the new building on Sunday, October 14, at 2 p.m. A program for the service will be announced at a later time.

Rev. Shackelford stated, "Up until now, everything is paid for in this construction. We will probably have to borrow about \$10,000 to complete the project." He explained that the majority of the work was done by men of the church and volunteers from other churches. Some of those volunteers were from the First Baptist Church in Cisco, the First Evangelical Methodist Church in Cisco, and one volunteer from Rainbow Baptist Church in Glen Rose who has been doing the electrical work. CHS Juniors Should Note PSAT Test Date

Juniors in high school who are interested in going to college after graduation should take note that the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) will be given on Tuesday October 23, 1984 at Cisco High School.

The PSAT/NMSQT is cosponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. It is administered annually to more than one million students and measures verbal and mathematical abilities that are important in college work.

The PSAT/NMSQT gives students a chance to find out what the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like and can be used to predict scores on the SAT. It also helps students in planning for college. Further, students who opt to participate in the College Board Student Search Service have an opportunity to hear from colleges that they might otherwise not learn about. The PSAT/NMSQT is also the qualifying test for students who wish to participate in the nationwide scholarship competitions administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Students in competition for this scholarship awarded in 1986 must take the PSAT/NMSQT in 1984.

Before the test, students will receive the PSAT/NMSQT Student Bulletin which contains a complete sample test with an answer key and scoring instructions. In December, students will receive a Report of Student Answers which displays the correct answers and the students' responses as well as scores. Schools will return test booklets at the same time so that students can review the original questions. Students will also receive "About Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores," a booklet containing information on interpreting PSAT/NMSQT results and on general college planning.

The fee for taking the 1984 PSAT/NMSQT is \$5.00 per student, to be paid at the time of registration. Fee waivers may be requested for students from low-income families who cannot afford to pay the fee. Students may register for the test in the counselor's office before October 4th. Students requesting fee waivers must register before September 26th.

ACT and SAT Test Dates Given

High School Juniors and seniors who are thinking of going to college after graduation will want to take note of the national test date schedule for the ACT Assessment Program and the Admissions Testing Program of the College Board (including the SAT and the Achievement Tests). Most colleges require that one or the other of these tests are taken for admission.

Students who want to take the ACT or the SAT on the first 1984-85 national test date must have their registration materials completed and mailed before the

The Cisco High School Lobos are beginning their 1984 season with a good first team but weak in replacements, Coach John Parchman told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday.

Most of the first stringers play both offense and defense, Mr. Parchman said. This lack of depth developed because of the large number of seniors on last year's varsity squad, the coach added.

Mr. Parchman expected his reserve strength to improve every week during the season. He said there are some 60 players out for the varsity and junior varsity squads and "we're learning and gaining strength every

day." He praised the attitude and determination of squad members.

Letters To The Editor

To the Editor:

In a Sept. 5th whistlestop through central Texas, Phil Gramm correctly claimed that he and Sen. Lloyd Doggett differ on right to work. Doggett supports everyone's right to work--blacks, Hispanics, women, the elderly, the handicapped, and small businessmen and farmers and ranchers.

Doggett has never voted against Texas' right-to-work laws. He voted against making those laws a part of the Texas Constitution because it is already too long. Doggett also voted against including his own "Sunset Act" in the Texas Constitution. (The "Sunset Act", which Doggett got passed into Texas law, decreases government spending by requiring periodic review of state bureaucracies to determine if they are wasting money.)

Besides supporting Texas' right-to-work laws, Doggett has actually strengthened the right to work of Texans. He authored the bill creating the Texas Human Rights Commission, which provides a means of appeal for people denied jobs because their sex, color, religion, age, or handicaps.

Gramm's lack of sympathy for the aged is seen in his voting eight times to cut social security. When asked to reverse his vote on cutting minimum social security benefits to people over 80, Gramm said, "Most people don't have the luxury of living to be 80 years old, so it's hard for me to feel sorry for them."

Gramm's statement on educational programs for the handicapped (which will enable them to work) is even more shocking. Speaking of such programs sponsored by the Democrats, Gramm said, "Look at that! Look at that! They're encouraging people to be handicapped." (Wall Street Journal, April 28, 1982). Gramm also said, "Rich people, not the poor, have been the real victims of inflation." (Dallas Times Herald, Sept. 14, 1981.)

One of the few true statements Gramm has made is that he and Doggett are worlds apart. Gramm's world is against the right of average people to work, to go to school, or (in the case of minimum social security benefits) even to live, while it's for tax cuts to the rich and federal money to agribusiness corporation while denying drought relief to small Texas farmers and ranchers or FHA loans (not give-aways) to those same family farmers and ranchers.

Doggett's world is for everyone's right to work, to go to school, and to a livelihood, while decreasing government spending in the sensible method of the "Sunset Act."

Mrs. Doggett In Gorman

"The choice Texans face in the election for the U.S. Senate is indeed a clear one," Libby Doggett, wife of U.S. Senate Nominee Lloyd Doggett, said today. The first Health Fair of Eastland County was considered a huge success according to Ruth Cartee, director of the Cisco Senior Center.

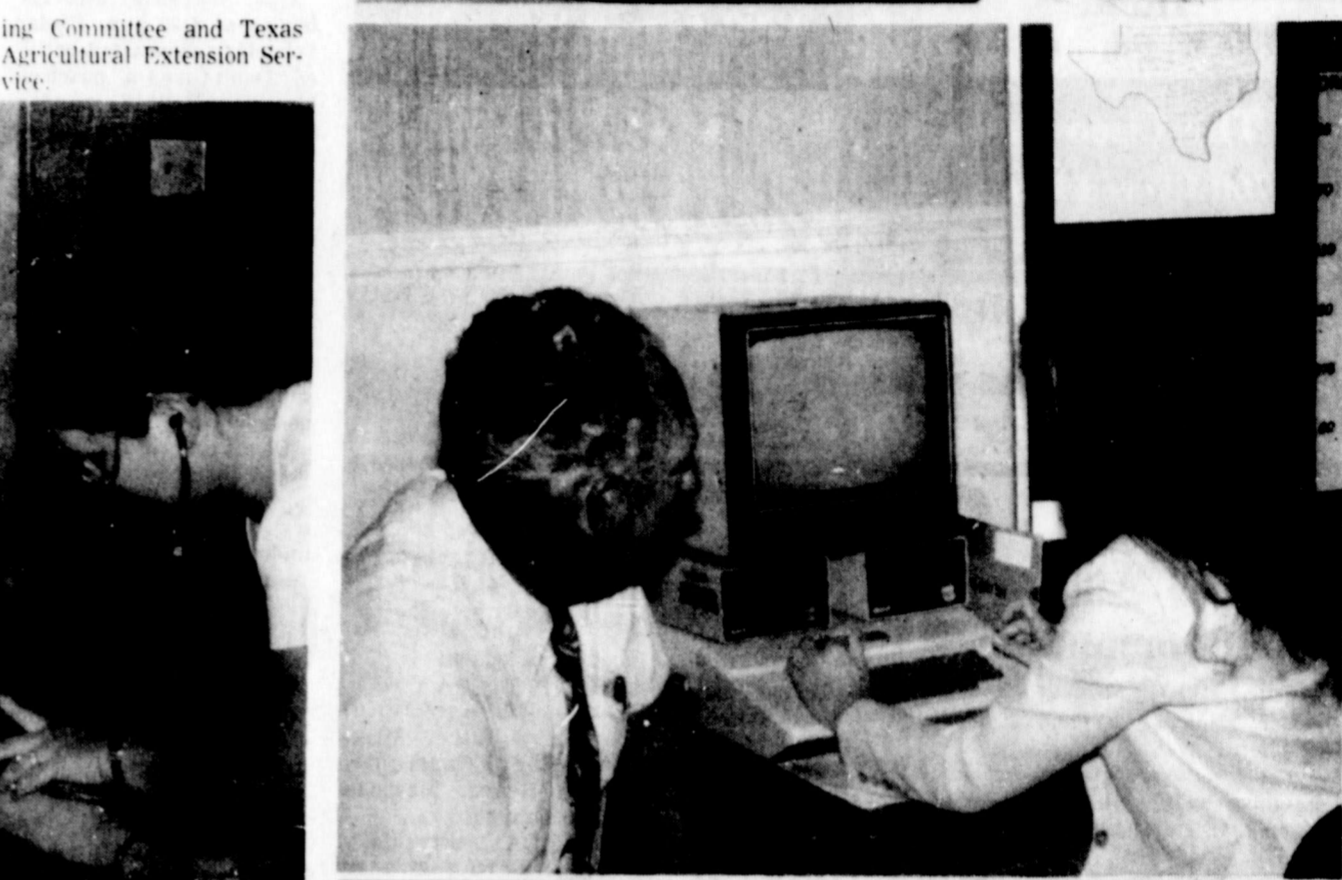
"Other people who have been to several Health fairs said this was the best they have seen. And I think that is just great," Mrs. Cartee said.
