## CHS Plans Homecoming

Activities Will Begin Thursday, Oct. 4 At 7 P.M.

Cisco High School will have its annual homecoming activities beginning Thursday, October 4th with a Sing-Song program in the high school auditorium at 7:00 p.m. All six homecoming queen nominees and their escorts will be introduced by High School Principal, Mike Turner at the beginning of the Sing-Song. Immediately after the Sing-Song, the bonfire and pep rally will be held on the west side of Front Street directly across from the parking lot of Chesley Field.

On Friday, October 5th school will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. so that students can make preparation for the homecoming parade. The parade will be held around 3:00 p.m. beginning at Avenue D and 3rd street and moving south to Thornton Feed Mill. A pep rally will then be held at the Thrift Mart parking lot.

### Rain Measures Up To 2.5 Inches In Area

Rain measuring up to 2.5 inches fell in the Cisco area last Tuesday as a cold front moved through the region and state, dropping temperatures some 30 degrees. The low reading of the week was reported to be 48 degrees early Wednesday morning.

The area north of town appeared to have received most rainfall with gauges measuring up to 2.5 inches. Lake Cisco received over two inches. This was the first significant rain in some two months.

A new cold front was scheduled for Friday, Sept. 28, and scattered showers were forecast. Rain gauges registered some two-tenths of an inch Thursday night.

City officials announced this week that 1984 tax statements were to be mailed beginning Friday, September 28. Citizens should begin receiving their statements Saturday and throughout the next week.

All of the statements will be mailed by October 5. Also, officials at City Hall have said the water utility bills will probably be a day or two late this month, since the bills were not received until later in the month than usual.

## New Law Requires Changes At CHS

Beginning this school year, due to new changes in the law, all report cards/grade sheets must be signed by the parent and

returned to school. High School students will be asked to have their parents/legal guardians sign on the back of their grade sheet and return

to school within one week from the date issued.

In addition to students being required to return their grades sheets to school signed, any student who receives a grade equal to less than 70 will also receive a "Notice To Parents Of Unsatisfactory Grade" which will be attached to their grade sheet.

This notice to parents will be filled out by each teacher who has a student doing unsatisfactory work and will state at least two dates for a parent/teacher conference. Also, this notice must be signed by the parent/legal guardian and returned to school within one week from the date issued. Grade sheets and the notice of un-

satisfactory grade will be issued on Wednesday, October 3rd and must be returned by Wednesday, October 10th.

Another important change this school year according to High School principal Mike Turner is that Cisco Jr.-Sr. High School will be providing a tutorial program from 3:30-4:30 Tuesdays and

Thursdays for those students who are doing unsatisfactory work. The tutorial program will begin on Tuesday, October 9th in the high school library. Lou Jane Qualls, the high school librarian will be the assigned tutor. Parents who have children doing unsatisfactory work are encouraged to have their child attend these sessions.

## Westbound Corp. Meets Here Fri.

A compromise plan to settle water rate differences between the City of Cisco and the Westbound Water Supply Corporation was on the agenda for a meeting of Westbound members at the Laguna Hotel Corral Room Friday night.

Attorneys for the water district and for the city had met to work out the compromise plan, which was considered and approved by the City Council at its regular meeting Tuesday. If approved by Westbound members at the Friday night meeting, the matter apparently would be resolved.

Westbound, a non-profit organization of some 425 members, buys water from Lake Cisco and Lake Leon and re-sells it to its customers on line between Leon and in the Cisco area. Some 300 customers use Lake Cisco Water.

Last March, the city raised rates to finance an extensive water quality project, including a new filtration plant, to meet state health standards. Westbound was asked to pay \$1.27 per 1,000 gallons instead of 50 cents as

per the 1979 contract. Westbound had offered 93 cents per 1,000.

Attorneys agreed on a compromise under which the Westbound rate would be \$1.10 per 1,000 gallons with a stipulation that there would be an annual review of the rates.

Austin attorneys were due to attend the meeting to help explain the compromise. J.C. McDaniel is president of Westbound and was due to preside at the meeting.

City Manager Mike Moore said that Cisco councilmen agreed with Westbound directors that it would be to the best interests of all for a compromise plan to be worked out to prevent costly court action.

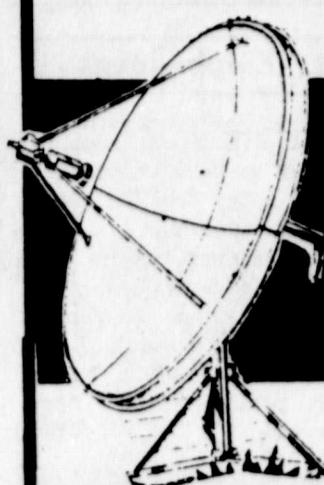

NEW LAKE KEEPER

The District also announced the employment of Bob Simmons, a six-year resident of Ranger, as new Lake Keeper for Lake Leon. Mr. Simmons and his wife Sue will live at the Lake Home and provide services including lake and fishing licenses as well as planning to expand the services of that facility.

Mr. Simmons said he looks forward to working with the people of this area in helping provide the best lake services possible. Problems include trash dumping at the lake which will be more carefully patrolled with violators to be prosecuted he said.

Among the avenues which the district will begin exploring will be the clean-out of

the 80-foot 24 inch pipe to be used if it doesn't rain and the water level continues to drop.

The district averaged collecting some \$25,000 a year in taxes, which was necessary to maintain funds which were required by the bonding companies.

"If we don't get some lake-filling rains," one district official said, "the people are going to need to understand that there can't be any yard watering next year."

## Cisco Service Club Plans

### Carnival Oct. 27

The North-East Texas Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is pleased to announce that there will be cystic fibrosis education materials available at the Cisco Service Club's Halloween Carnival Booth. The date for this event is October 27, 1984.

Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children and young adults in America today. It is a disease which strangles and starves its victims. Approximately ten million Americans, one in twenty of us are unknowing carriers of the gene which causes cystic fibrosis and there is no carrier test.

When two carriers conceive a child, there is a 25 per cent chance the child will have CF and a 50 per cent chance the child will be a carrier. And, while nearly half the babies born today with cystic fibrosis will live past the age of 21, the disease is fatal. The hope of the CF child, his family, and all of us who are unknowing carriers of this disease, is research. The funds raised in your community will be used to fund research and to increase public awareness of CF.

Kiss your baby. If he/she tastes very salty, he may have CF. Other signs of CF are breathing difficulties; failure to grow despite large appetite; nasal polyps; frequent, bulky bowel movements; and clubbing of the finger tips. If you are worried that your child may have CF, visit your doctor. There is a simple, reliable test called the "Sweat Test" to determine if your child has cystic fibrosis.

## 'Going To A Dance'

Editor's note: This article was found in an old newspaper clipping. It might be of interest to you.

At the age of 16, like many other youths of my day I thought that I wanted to be a cowboy. Inasmuch as my parents had loosened the reins somewhat and did not question us children too closely, I took the spending money I had saved and bought a nice saddle, a pair of high heeled boots, a broad-brimmed hat and cowboy clothes. I already had a nice pony.

I then saddled up and headed to West Texas to begin what I had hoped would be a full and happy life of ranching. After two or three days, I landed at the edge of the ranch country. My dad's older brother and wife and son my age and two older daughters lived there. An older daughter married to a man operating a combination farm and ranch also lived there, and they offered me a job at \$15 per month including lodging, board and laundry.

Thinking this would be a good chance to begin my life's work as a rancher, I accepted. After several months, doing mostly farm work which I hated, the crops were laid by. My cousin came over and told me there was to be a big dance at a large ranch some 35 or 40 miles across the river. So we decided to attend.

In those days when the country was thinly settled the big ranches would invite folks from all the big towns like Abilene, Fort Worth and Dallas as well as those from other farms and ranches surrounding them. They would hire professional music makers and the event would last two to three days.

A long table would be set up and two or three fat yearlings would be barbecued. There usually was a keg or two of booze. Anyone was welcome to eat or drink as he wished. When he got sleepy or drunk he could go to the bunk house and sleep it off. Ladies, Ladies went upstairs at the ranch house.

You paid \$2.50 when you arrived and you had it made.

On the occasion when we went to the dance, it had been raining a lot and we had to cross the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River. We knew it would be high but

both of our horses were good swimmers. We rolled up a complete change of clothes in a heavy blanket and wrapped them in a tarp, making same fully waterproof and took off to the dance.

A mile or two before reaching the river, we were riding along when there was an exceedingly loud scream. I thought there was a woman in distress. Both of our horses began cutting up and my cousin laughed at my concern and told me it was a panther. These animals are better known today as cougars, or pumas or, maybe, mountain lions.

In a short time, the scream came again and it seemed closer. And it kept coming as we rode along on horses almost unmanageable. Reaching the river, we found that the ford crossing was a hundred yards or more downstream, and the stream was running about half bank full.

Just about the time we were riding beside the river and under a high bank, Mr. Panther looked down on us and let out a piercing scream. Both horses were badly scared and spooking. I pulled my gun and shot the panther in the breast. He grabbed his breast with both front paws and came tumbling down the bank toward us, falling into the river in front of us.

Our horses also jumped into the water and swam across to the other side. After crossing a quick sand bar, we stopped and built a fire and changed clothes, spreading our wet garments to dry on the grass. We camped until morning and then we went on to the dance.

And what a dance it was! I can still remember it that weekend some 75 years ago. I am sure there were 75 to 100 folks present. They were people from all walks of life - from horse wranglers to bankers. There wasn't a roughneck in the crowd either. Anybody who got out of order left escorted by the toe of a high heeled boot.

There was a young widow present from Dallas. I danced with her most of the time.

She was the finest jib or buck-and-wing dancer I ever saw. I was told she could do 36 different steps. I corresponded with her for some time afterwards.

In any event we had a great time and hated to go back to work. I still like to look in retrospect at events like this dance.

## Sunday, September 30, 1984 Fishing Report

### FALL FISHING

With cooler temperatures easing in on us, many sportsmen begin laying aside their rods for those deer rifles and duck guns, or maybe running those quail dogs a little more often. But some savvy anglers will be enjoying some excellent fishing. Water temperatures along with atmospheric temperatures will begin falling off. Thus bringing sporadic increases in the ap-

petites of those big ol bass. Admittedly fall fishing can be very frustrating due to fish being a little harder to locate. As always look shallow first, as almost on any given day you can locate some fish shallow. Don't be afraid to vary your depths shallow, medium, deep, until you can place together a couple of definite patterns. Gentle falling points present excellent habitats providing a feeding table for all occa-

sions so to speak. Fall also presents us with those disrupting frontal passages. Perhaps the three most important items to remember while fishing during or after a front are (1) slow your retrieve (2) reduce bait size (3) and set the hook at the slightest difference. By slowing retrieve you offer an easier obtained meal for sulking bass due to barometer change. Smaller bait also seem easier prey during fronts. Bass during this time more than any other may simply inhale your bait, rather than striking furiously.

Popular frontal baits: Beetle Spin, grubs, 4" worms, deep diving crankbaits, crappie jigs, and rubber jigs over hair.

## Deadline Ahead For Old Pits

The deadline for oil operators to file applications for old pits is Oct. 29, 1984. Railroad Commission Rule 8, which was amended effective May 1, requires operators to apply for new permits for all pits which were in existence before May 1. Applications are considered "filed" on the date they are received in the Austin office.

A new permit is necessary even if a permit was issued before May 1. But new permits are not necessary if the pit is of the type authorized without permit. Under certain conditions, Rule 8 allows the following types of pits without permits: reserve pits, mud circulation pits, completion/workover pits,

basic sediment pits, flare pits, fresh makeup water pits, and water condensation pits.

Applications are to be made on Form H-11. Here are some of the main points of information the Railroad Commission is looking for: the exact type of pit, the need for the pit, the need for the pit (don't be too brief), the chloride concentration, the pit dimensions, and the depth of the shallowest fresh water.

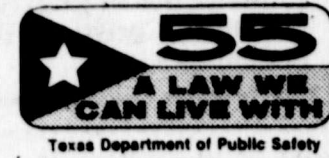
On the chloride, the RRC staff advises the operator to give them the highest chloride concentration which would possibly happen, but explain in a cover letter why such an event is unlikely.

As to pit dimensions, the

RRC is looking for measurements 2 feet below the dike, rather than at the surface or at the bottom of the pit.

The Texas Department of Water Resources is reported to be overloaded with requests as to the depth to shallowest fresh water in any given area. In order to avoid possible delays at TDWR, it might be wise to find the answer to this from other operators in the area.

Some of the towns around would probably like to know this too!



## USS Enterprise

Former officers and crew of the USS Enterprise (CV-6), most decorated ship of World War II, will reunite in Pensacola, Florida October 19-21, 1984. In addition to enjoying a reunion, Enterprise shipmates will dedicate the USS Enterprise (CV-6) Museum and Exhibit aboard the U.S. Naval Air Station, Pensacola. Dedication ceremonies will follow a noon luncheon October 20. A banquet will be held that evening.

Enterprise was the only U.S. aircraft carrier to see action at Pear Harbor December 7, 1941 and to be still afloat at war's end. She participated in 20 of the 22 major engagements in the Pacific. During those battles Enterprise was hit 16 times and was reported to have been sunk on six different occasions by the Japanese.

The Enterprise spearheaded the first offensive strike against the Japanese, and escorted the USS Hornet and General Jimmy Doolittle during the Tokyo bombing April 18, 1942, located the Japanese carriers at Midway, sank two of them and helped sink a third. She was credited with destroying 911 enemy aircraft, sinking 74 enemy ships, damaging or probably sinking 192 enemy ships, and destroying enemy shore installations throughout the Pacific from Guadalcanal to Tokyo.

Following the Battle of Santa Cruz October 26, 1942, when the Hornet was sunk, Enterprise was the lone American carrier in the Pacific, and she was badly damaged.

Enterprise was America's only ship to receive both the Presidential Unit Citation and the Navy Unit Commendation. And, while she was visiting New York City on Navy Day, 1945, President Harry Truman recognized and saluted her.

The British presented Enterprise with the highest of honors when she arrived in England to return United States troops home at the end of hostilities.

Shortly after the war, Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal sent a letter to President Truman extolling the accomplishments of the Enterprise and requesting the preservation of America's greatest warship. President Truman agreed and forwarded his recommendation to Congress. Forrestal's letter and Truman's recommendation were fitting indeed, for between December 7, 1941, and May 14, 1945, the Enterprise compiled a fighting record unmatched by any warship in history. However, Congress failed to appropriate necessary funds and, as a result, America's greatest warship ever was scrapped.

Four former Cisco men served aboard the Enterprise during WWII. They are Carroll and Wayne Barnhill, Raymond Reames, and J. Nelson Williams. R.V. Cole, Ranger, was a member of the Marine detachment aboard the Enterprise.

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# Lobo Varsity Has Season Total Yardage Of 1,021

Cisco's 1984 Lobo varsity football team had managed a total offensive yardage, during their first three games, of 1,021 yards with an average of 340 yards per game. Cisco had scored total of 76 points while their opponents have managed 74 points.

The Lobos opened their district play for the season on Friday night against the Coleman Bluecats in Coleman. The statistics in this article do not include that game, but only the games against DeLeon, Rotan and Mart.

The total offensive yardage of the Lobos was broken down into 774 yards rushing and 247 yards passing. The average per game was 258 yards rushing and 82 yards passing.

Leading rushers for the Lobos were Josh Potter, 172 pound senior, with 58 carries for 261 yards, averaging 4.5 yards per carry. Johnny Ramirez, 174 pound senior, had a total of 52 carries for 258 yards, averaging 5 yards per carry.

Steve Abbott, 155 pound sophomore, 22 carries for 106 yards, averaging 4.8 yards per carry. Wade Shackelford, 172 pound senior, had 25 carries for 67 yards, averaging 2.7 yards per carry.

Danny Kearney, 147 pound senior, had 16 carries for 61 yards, averaging 3.8 yards per carry. Shelby Nixon, 145 pound sophomore, had two carries for 11 yards, averaging 5.5 yards per carry. Patrick Qualls, 175 pound senior, had one carry for ten yards.

Passing leader for the Lobos was Wade Shackelford, with 14 completions out of 47 attempts for a total yardage of 247, averaging 17.6 yards per carry.

Lobo receiving leaders were Patrick Qualls with two catches for 71 yards, averaging 35.5 yards per catch. Danny Kearney had one catch for 45 yards. Johnny Ramirez had three catches for 36 yards, averaging 12 yards per catch.

James Berry, 120 pound junior, had two catches for 25 yards, averaging 12.5 yards per catch. Eric Zarate, 145 pound senior, had two catches for 23 yards, averaging 11.5 yards per catch.

John Gonzales, 150 pound senior, had four returns for 30 yards, averaging 7.5 yards per return. Shelby Nixon had two returns for 24 yards, averaging 12 yards per return.

On punt returns, Cisco's Steve Abbott had two returns for 17 yards, averaging 8.5 yards per return. Johnny Ramirez had three returns for 16 yards, averaging 5.3 yards per return.

## Drilling Bits

First production data has been posted for a new producer in Eastland County's Phippen Field, seven miles northwest of Cisco.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Clifford Phippen with Puentes Petroleum, Inc. of Abilene as the operator.

It flowed 89 barrels of oil per day on a 12/64-in. choke. The well registered flowing tubing pressure of 275 PSI. With drillsite in an 80-acre unit, TE & L. Co. Survey, A-509, the well probed to a total depth of 4,158 feet. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Caddo Formation ranging from 3,073 feet into the hole.

At a location five miles northwest of Gorman, B & B Operating Co. of Odessa has completed the No. 2 W.D. Brown in Eastland County's REB Field.

It pumped 31 barrels of oil and 65,000 CF gas per day on open choke.

With drillsite in an 80-acre unit, H & TC RR Co. Survey, the well probed to a total depth of 4,000 feet and will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation at 3,590 to 3,612 feet into the wellbore.

Eastland County's REB Field gained a new producer when the No. 1 J.G. Gregory was completed by North Ridge Corp. of Duncanville.

Located two miles northeast of Eastland, the well pumped 26 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

North Ridge took the well to a total depth of 3,860 feet and will produce from a set of Marble Falls perforations ranging from 3,320 to 3,340 feet into the hole.

The operation is in a 166-acre lease in the H & TC RR Co. Survey, A-1434.

First production figures have been posted for the No. 2 Lasater, a new producer in Eastland County's East Flatwood Field, five miles southeast of Eastland.

With AWS Petroleum Co. of Eastland as the operator, the well showed potential to pump five barrels of oil per day on open choke. Flowing

tubing pressure was registered at 25 PSI.

AWS took the well to a total depth of 1,576 feet and perforated the Gardner Formation for production at 1,144 to 1,146 feet into the hole.

Pumping 29 barrels of oil per day on open choke, the No. 1 Martha A. Hise has been completed in Eastland County's REB Field, six miles north of Eastland.

North Ridge Corp. of Duncanville is the operator.

The well is in a 160-acre unit in the H & TC RR Co. Survey, A-303. It probed to a total depth of 3,909 feet and will produce from a set of Marble Falls perforations at

3,414 to 3,443 feet.

The No. 1 Henderson is scheduled for spudding in Eastland County eight miles south of Ranger. Serendipity Exploration, Inc. of Fort Worth will be the operator. The wildcat venture will be situated in a 217-acre lease in the Harvey Kendrick Survey, A-340. It is scheduled to bottom at 2,000-ft. maximum depth.

A 4,000-ft. developmental well is planned by Comanche Investments of Breckenridge at a location four miles northeast of Ranger. The well will be spudded in a 20-acre lease in the Andrew Bradley Survey, A-15, Eastland County. The well will be known as the No. 1 Big Mike "D".

P&R Oil, Inc. of Eastland has revealed plans to re-enter the No. 1 Jordan, a wildcat venture, three miles south of Eastland in Eastland County. The operation will be in a 160-acre unit in the H & TC RR Co. Survey.

Lubbock-based Pyramid Minerals is preparing to make hole for the No. 1 K.E. Nelson in the Palo Pinto Regular Field three miles southwest of Salvesville. Aimed at either oil or gas pay, the well is in a 24-acre lease. Daniel W. Robbins Survey, Palo Pinto County.

Apples are in abundant supply right now. An apple isn't just an apple. It may be red, yellow, or green; round or tapered; tart or sweet. With so many different varieties of apples, you may wonder which are for eating and which are best for cooking. The Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, and Jonathan apples are all good eating apples because they're crisp and juicy. The Red Delicious apple is an all-around favorite. It has a tapered shape, a big top, smaller base and a deep red color. The Golden Delicious apple has a rounder shape than the Red Delicious and is yellow-green to bright yellow in color. It will stay white longer after being cut than other varieties. The Golden Delicious is really an all-purpose apple and works well for both cooking and snacking. The Jonathan apple is rounded too and has a bright red color. Its taste is a little tart. Stayman, Rome Beauty, and York Imperial apples are best for cooking because they hold their shape and retain their flavor while cooking. These varieties have a midly tart flavor. Do you ever wonder why apples look waxy? You'll find many apples look shiny and actually polished on the fruit stand. All apples produce a natural wax that helps hold in moisture and

protects them from disease and insects. But before they're packed and distributed, every apple is washed, removing the natural wax. To keep apples from drying out, they are sprayed with a new coating of wax. This wax is like that on medicine tablets and candies, without odor and taste, and is completely safe to eat.

To keep apples from turning dark when they're cut, dip them in lemon juice or ascorbic citric powder to keep them from browning. They should be drained and patted dry before they're used.

The best way to store apples is in the refrigerator in a plastic bag or the vegetable crisper area of your refrigerator. If left at room temperature, apples will ripen 10 minutes faster than when refrigerated. Apples that become too cold (colder than 32 degrees) will ruin, so it's best to keep them away from the freezer section.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:**  
With the arrival of fall and cooler weather, treat your family to a good coffee cake. The fresh apples will add a delightful, fresh flavor.

Combine flour, baking powder, nutmeg, and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Mix well after each addition. Stir in vanilla. Pour batter into a greased and floured 9-inch square pan.  
Combine apples, 1/2 cup sugar, and cinnamon; mix well. Sprinkle over batter. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Yield: one 9-in coffee cake.

Apple Coffee Cake  
1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2/3 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1 cup finely chopped cooking apples  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
Cream butter; gradually add 3/4 cup sugar, beating well. Add egg; mix well.

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Apple Coffee Cake  
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2 teaspoons baking powder  
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2/3 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1 cup finely chopped cooking apples  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
Cream butter; gradually add 3/4 cup sugar, beating well. Add egg; mix well.

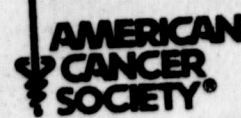

## WTU Looking For Base Rate Increase

A settlement agreement providing an increase in base rates and a decrease in fuel cost charges has been reached in the West Texas Utilities Co. rate case now pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

A formal hearing scheduled for this week in Austin was cancelled after WTU, the PUC staff and intervenors on behalf of several cities entered into a negotiated settlement on all issues involved in the rate case. A hearing is set for 3 p.m. Wednesday Sept. 26, for submission of the written agreement, which must be approved and signed by the cities. The hearing examiner then will make a recommendation to the three-member Commission.

Under the agreement, WTU would receive an increase in basic rates of approximately \$12.5 million. It will receive about \$7.1 million less for fuel costs because fuel process apparently have softened. WTU also will refund to consumers about \$6.1 million in fuel costs over-collections during the past year, bringing the total fuel revenue reduction to roughly \$13.3 million. The refunds will be reflected in customer bills throughout the coming year.

The effects on various classes of customers depends on details of the new rate design which were being worked out by Company representatives and other interested parties. A new feature for WTU rates will be a summer-winter differential for residential and commercial customers. This will establish lower rates during the winter period, November through April, and higher rates during the rest of the year, which is the peak usage season.

The new rates will not go

into effect until a final order is issued by the three-member Commission. In WTU's last case, the hearing was held in September and rates became effective in January.

## Cross Plain Men Collide With Bus

Leland Watson, 28-year old area resident, suffered several broken bones and cuts and bruises when the motorcycle he and his brother Terry, 23, were riding collided with a Cisco School bus at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday at West 8th Street and Conrad Hilton Avenue.

Leland Watson remained in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene Friday for treatment of a fractured ankle and leg, a dislocated shoulder and a broken nose. Terry Watson, who had a badly bruised knee, was released after examination and treatment.

The two brothers were taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital here by Patterson ambulance and, after emergency treatment, were transferred to the Abilene hospital.

Police Chief Billy Rains and Policeman Tom Barrett investigated the mishap. Leland Watson told them that he did not see the bus when it stopped and ran into the back of it. Carson Holdridge, the bus driver, was eastbound on his way to pick up students.

The police report said the motorcycle was demolished. The bus had minor damages. It was still dark and rain was falling when the mishap occurred, the report said.

The Watson brothers, who live four miles north of Cross Plains on Highway 206, were

and approved proposed plans for the painting of the tower an off-white color with a wide gold band around the tank, with big, black letters spelling CISCO.

Bids will be taken for the re-painting project, but work will not be allowed to begin until next April.

The council also approved an ordinance adopting the budget for the fiscal year October 1, 1984 through September 30, 1985, for the city. The Tuesday night reading of the ordinance was its second required reading, and its approval puts the ordinance into effect.

A city financial report and the city manager's report were accepted by the council. In the manager's report, City Manager Mike Moore said the recently appointed committee for the study of alternate water sources has met two times and another meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 2.

He said they are looking for the best and easiest way to approach the securing of alternate water sources. He continued that some good progress has been made on the subject and they think they might have some possible sources.

Mr. Moore said the West 17th Street paving project is underway and should be completed within the 45 day time limit. He also said the city's water filtration plant is about 98 percent complete.

Three citizens, Henry McCoy, Gene Childer and Richard B. Spencer, requested the city have paving contractors on West 17th Street to also pave Avenue M from the corner of West 16th to West 17th Street. The three citizens offered to pay \$300 each for a total of \$900.

Council members were told the estimated cost for the additional block of paving was \$2000. Since almost 50 percent of the cost was being offered by the citizens, it was approved to change the project to include that block.

Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie thanked the three citizens and commended them on their interest and willingness to come forward and offer their support in the project.

The council discussed a proposed method for enforcement of sanitation, storage and condemnation ordinances, but City Manager Moore stated the plans were not finalized. He

said he would propose a clean-up effort to involve the voluntary cleaning up of property by as many citizens as possible.

He said the city will need to look at enforcing such ordinances with those who refuse to comply. It was suggested to divide the city into five different phases for enforcement, with the first phase involving all major entry ways into Cisco.

Once the first phase is clean, then enforcement of phase two will begin which will include the northwestern and western parts of the city. Following phase two will be phase three (southern part), phase four (eastern part) and phase five (northern part).

Mr. Moore said the idea behind the ordinances is to "create a respect for your community." He stated that any constructive ideas as to how the project may be handled will be listened to, since he wants citizen involvement.

An interview is planned by the Press with Mr. Moore on Monday and a full report on the proposed "Clean-Up" campaign will be in next Thursday's edition of the Press.

A proposed amendment to the city's water contract with Westbound Water Supply Corporation was discussed by the Council. The

amendment will hopefully be accepted by the corporation and the lawsuit against the city may be gotten out of the courts, according to Manager Moore.

The proposed amendment would allow the water to be sold to Westbound for \$1.10 per thousand for a one year rate. At the end of that year, the city will have the right to review the rates and continue to do so annually.

It was understood the Westbound corporation was planning a meeting Friday night to discuss the proposals.

Council member Brad Kimbrough summed up the council's feelings by stating, "We, as a council, desire to work with our rural neighbors and come to a compromise which is fair for both sides."

A resolution was passed by the council on its first reading to adopt a grievance procedure for revenue sharing requirements in compliance with new regulations.

Also approved on its first reading was an ordinance approving rate schedules to be charged by West Texas Utilities Company in the City of Cisco, providing for schedules, conditions, severability and repeal of conflicting ordinances.

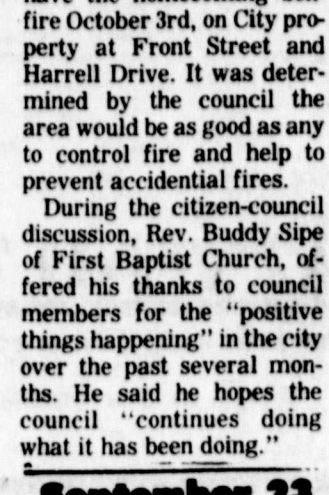
Mr. Moore said he would have more information for

the council on the matter before the required second reading and approval of the ordinance.

A request was approved from Cisco High School to have the homecoming bonfire October 3rd, on City property at Front Street and Harrell Drive. It was determined by the council the area would be as good as any to control fire and help to prevent accidental fires.

During the citizen-council discussion, Rev. Buddy Sipe of First Baptist Church, offered his thanks to council members for the "positive things happening" in the city over the past several months. He said he hopes the council "continues doing what it has been doing."
