## Citizens Urged To Take Pride & Help Clean-Up Cisco

"Citizens of Cisco need to get excited about helping to clean up our town and take pride in Cisco," said City Manager Mike Moore Monday morning. Mr. Moore made the comment when being interviewed about a city proposal to begin a clean-up project.

Mr. Moore stated the City cannot afford to clean-up all

the vacant lots, condemnable buildings, abandoned automobiles, and trash in yards. "If we are forced to do the cleaning," said Moore, "then it will cost you, the taxpayer, more money."

It is hoped by the city council and city manager that local citizens will back the project and take an initiative in helping in any clean-up efforts, and especially in cleaning up their own property. Mr. Moore emphasized he is not talking about making people re-paint or anything of that nature, but simply to help rid the city of health or safety hazards.

Local service clubs are being urged, along with individual citizens, to get involved in the clean-up effort,

because the more people who become involved the more likely for the success of the project. Mr. Moore said he will be glad to present a report on the program to any club which would like to invite him to attend their meeting.

The Kiwanis Club of Cisco has already heard this program and shown enthusiasm in helping. It was suggested that local clubs might volunteer to help clean-up vacant or elderly person's property, with the owner's permission.

Mr. Moore stated if anyone has any constructive suggestions on how to get the people more involved, he will gladly listen to them. He said he is not asking for people to call in and tell what their neighbor's yard looks like, because he said he knows where the trouble spots are, but they are wanting suggestions on how to go about getting them cleaned up.

The City will be looking at four different sets of ordinances which will probably have to be revised to alleviate the problems in

Cisco. Those areas are 1) condemnation of vacant, collapsing houses; 2) the abatement of abandoned autos on both public and private property; 3) the clean-up of yards and property that present poor health and safety hazards; and 4) outdoor storage which presents a health, safety or fire hazard.

Mr. Moore said the condemnation of structures ordinance is already in effect and he will begin working with it, but he is not exactly sure when the others will be

worked on by the city. It will be in the near future, but the city urges everyone to get started now and clean up their own property.

The city realizes this will be a long-term project, according to Moore, but he said he is being instructed to continue placing emphasis on getting it started. The city plans to work on the clean-up and enforcement of ordinances in five different areas of concentration.

The city is being divided into five sections, but that

does not mean everyone should wait until their section is being closely looked at by the city before the begin cleaning up their property.

Anyone who is wanting to clean-up their property but lack the means of hauling off trash, may contact the city who might be able to provide a truck, but no manual labor.

The five sections for clean-up are:

1) The main arterials in and out of the city—Conrad Hilton Avenue—Hwy. 183, 8th Street—U.S. 80, Hwy. 6 north,

and 6th street or Breckenridge highway.

2) Northwestern and western parts of city—From 8th and Conrad Hilton north and west and everything west of Front Street.

3) Southwestern portion of city—From Conrad Hilton and 8th street south and west to Front Street.

4) Eastern half of city—Everything east of Conrad Hilton and south of the railroad tracks.

5) Far northern part of city—Everything north of the railroad tracks.

by Principal Mike Turner of the high school as Angela Bradford, Sabrenia Justice, Lynn Pittman, Tammy McCulloch, Jeanine Reich and Shelly Schaefer.

The student body was to vote on the queen during a third period assembly Wednesday, and the winner's identity will not be

made public until half-time at the football game.

The nominees and their escorts will be introduced at a homecoming program singing at 7 p.m. Thursday at the High School auditorium. Mr. Turner said. Band Director Wayne White will be in charge of the program.

Around 8 p.m., students

and Lobo fans will gather on the parking lot north of the football stadium and in front of Community Gym for a bonfire and pep rally. Students were spending spare time this week in gathering materials for the bonfire.

The homecoming parade will be held at 3 p.m. Friday

## Loboes Are Looking For District Win

The Loboes of Cisco High School will still be looking for their first district win this week as they host the Ranger Bulldogs in Chesley Field for

Cisco's Homecoming. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m. in this District 11-AA contest.

The Junior Varsity of Cisco High School will also

be looking for a win Thursday night as they travel to Ranger, along with the Junior High teams. Cisco's JV is 0-4 for the season.

In the Junior High games, Cisco's 7th grade team will be looking for another win Thursday night, since their record is 2-0. The Cisco team defeated Ranger earlier this season.

The 8th grade team will be looking for its first win of the season, since they lost their opening game last

week Coleman. The 8th grade is 0-1 for the season.

The Thursday night games will begin at 5 p.m., in Ranger, with the 7th playing first, followed by the 8th, and then by the J.V.

In Friday night's high school game, Cisco will be looking to better its 1-3 season record and even out its 0-1 district record. Ranger is 2-2 for the season, having defeated Cross

Plains and Early, while losing to Baird and Gorman.

The Bulldogs try to throw the ball quite a bit, according to Cisco Head Coach John Parchman. He said it will be hard to keep them from scoring something during the game. "They have a wide open offense," said Parchman.

The Loboes may have James Berry back in this week's line-up if a doctor's appointment later in the

week approves his playing. If Berry returns to play this week, Coach Parchman said he may not start, but he will probably see some action as his defensive position of safety and offensive position of split end.

Coach Parchman said there were no injuries from last week's game against Coleman, which Cisco lost by the score of 27-10-6.

The Loboes starting line-up will be the same as in the past games.

## IRS Approves Hilton Board

The Internal Revenue Service has approved an application by the Conrad Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center to be a tax exempt corporation, the board of trustees was advised by President Eris Ritchie at a meeting last Friday afternoon.

Mr. Ritchie was informed of the IRS approval in a telephone conversation with government officials, he told the board. This means that all contributions to the community center corporation, which has been issued by the Secretary of State, will be tax exempt, including funds that the Hilton Foundation have allocated for restoration of the Mobley Hotel in Cisco, Mr. Ritchie said.

A number of memorial gifts have been made to the corporation by area residents as tributes to deceased friends and relatives. These gifts, too,

are tax exempt, Mr. Ritchie said.

In other action, the board began work on a floor plan for the restored building. Plans call for the structure to have offices for the Chamber of Commerce, an auditorium for meetings, dining room, areas for display of Hilton memorabilia and the like.

A meeting has been scheduled for Friday, Oct. 12, with the architect for the project, and the board hopes to have details of a floor plan completed to turn over to him.

Board members expressed the belief that everything will be ready for construction work to begin in early 1985 and for the project to be completed before the end of next year.

Board members are Mr. Ritchie, Dick Woolley, Bobby Smith, Mike Moore, Joan Cermin, Barbara Pope, and Brad Kimbrough.

## Westbound Water Hears Discussion

Members of the Westbound Water Supply Corporation heard a discussion of a compromise plan in rates that the City of Cisco proposes to charge for water at a meeting last Friday night at the Laguna Hotel.

President J.C. McDaniel, who presided at the meeting, said the purpose of the gathering was for officials to acquaint the membership with the negotiations. He said the city's attorneys had presented attorneys for the corporation a compromise plan.

Under a contract signed in 1975, the corporation was to receive water for re-sale at 50 cents per 1,000 gallons. Last spring, the city raised the rate to \$1.27 when a system improvement program was launched at Lake Cisco.

The city's attorneys have proposed a compromise with a \$1.10 rate. This was

presented a Westbound attorneys who have not made recommendation, it was understood.

Mr. McDaniel said the Westbound board would ask members to ballot on any changes that might be finally proposed in the contract to purchase water from the City of Cisco.

"The \$1.10 proposed rate has not been 'nailed down,' but is in the discussion stage between attorneys," Mr. McDaniel said. "We met to allow our members to express their views."

Mr. McDaniel said that any change in the 1975 rate would have to be approved by the Farm Home Administration, from whom Westbound borrowed money to finance the extensive water system line building.

Some 50 Westbound water customers attended the meeting at the Corral Room of Hotel Laguna.

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To Hay Fire

Cisco volunteer firemen took three trucks eight miles west of town on I-20 at 3:23 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 30, when a big truck loaded with hay caught fire. The truck was east bound and traffic in the east lane was blocked for an hour or more.

The fire of undetermined origin destroyed the load of hay and the trailer, and the rear tires on the tractor were ruined, firemen said. The truck was en route to Stephenville when the driver discovered the blaze. Firemen from Putnam and Baird also answered the alarm.

Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie and Firemen Johnny Jarvis, Richard Connell, Billy Cozart, Vandell Weathers, Royce Darr, Kenneth Boyd, Freddie Anderson, and Bryan Jackson made the run with the three Cisco trucks.

Firemen went to 302 East 19th St. at 1:30 a.m. Monday after gas caught fire back of a stove. There was smoke damage to the wall, the fire report showed. Joe Wheatley was listed as owner of the dwelling.

CHS Loboes Lose

To Coleman, 27-6

The Loboes of Cisco High School lost their District 11-AA opening game to the Coleman Bluecats, who are picked to win the District Crown. The Friday night game, played in Coleman, ended with a 27-6 score.

Cisco managed only one

touchdown in the game and it was on their very first drive. The Lobo defense held Coleman scoreless until the last five minutes of the third quarter.

Coleman then scored one touchdown in the third quarter and three in the final quarter. The Bluecats scored during all, but one, of their possessions in the fourth quarter.

The Loboes started their scoring drive on their own 33-yard line when Patrick Qualls recovered a Bluecat fumble. After ten plays, the ball rested on Coleman's three yard line.

Josh Potter, Johnny Ramirez and quarterback Wade Shackelford carried the ball during the drive, Potter carried five times and gained two of the four first

downs. Ramirez carried the ball four times and gained one first down, while QB Shackelford carried one time and gained one first down.

With the ball on Coleman's three-yard line, Ramirez took the next handoff in for a touchdown. A fake on the extra point kick, a run by ball-holder John Gonzales, failed for a score of 6-to-0 with 4:48 left in the first quarter.

In the second half of play, Bowie took their second possession of the ball at Cisco's 47-yard line following a punt by the Loboes. Two runs by Darrell Warrick put the ball on Cisco's 42-yard line. Quarterback McCord Wilson then hit Speedy

# Gordon Spot

Do you usually have a problem with grassy weeds and broadleaf weeds in your lawn in early spring? If so, now is the time to consider applying a pre-emergent herbicide in order to control winter weeds. Very soon now, weeds like henbit, annual bluegrass, rescue grass and others be germinating. One of the easiest ways to control them is to never let them come up.

Pre-emergent herbicides like benefin (Balan), bensulide (Betason) or DCPA (Daethal) may be applied according to their recommended rate. These chemicals, when properly applied, form a chemical barrier at the surface of the soil. The weed seeds are then killed as they begin to grow. These chemicals will not control weeds after they have germinated.

After bermudagrass and St. Augustine have gone dormant, winter weeds may be controlled with material containing glyphosate such as Roundup, Kleenup or Doodsday. Apply according to the label and be sure the lawn is dormant before spraying. This chemical will kill any plant that is green.

The rain on Sept. 25 and 26 was very welcomed in Eastland County. The best rain was in the western part of the county and got lighter towards the east side of the county.

Many small grain producers are now preparing soil for planting. Oats, wheat and rye should be planted as

soon as possible. Hopefully, we will get more rain to get the grain started off in October.

Dryland peanuts that have been very drought stressed should not be dug for about ten days following a rain. This gives time for the segregation 3 peanuts to come off.

Plans are being made for a cow-calf clinic at the Eastland Auction Company on October 31. This should be very helpful to cattlemen. Eastland, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties are working together for the big event.

# Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band To Be Here Saturday

The World Famous Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy Band whose most recent appearance was an extended tour of Europe in the Spring will be one of the many features of the Eastland County Fair Parade which begins at 10 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 6.

The Cowboy Band will also present a mini-concert on the south steps of the Courthouse following the parade, under the direction of W. Scott Mather, director of H-SU bands.

The Band was here in 1981 at the first parade and treated the parade spectators to "two Trips through the route" - leading the beginning of the parade, regrouping and coming through again at the conclusion of the parade.

The Band members, the Six White Horse Riders and their sponsors will be guests for lunch with the First Baptist Church and the Eastland Dairy Queen.

Since the band's inception in 1909, it has been in an important and active part of

the Big Country as it has marched in presidential and gubernatorial inaugurations, nationally televised football games and a host of parades and other festive affairs.

It was back in 1923 that Grady Kinsolving, secretary of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, asked the band to represent Abilene at a West Texas Chamber of Commerce gathering in San Angelo, quite an honor considering the fact that the little band had previously ventured no further than Baird, Tuscola, and View, traveling by train and horse-drawn coach. In looking about for some distinctive yet "affordable" uniforms, chaps & cowboy hats became the dress-and the "Cowboy Band" was born.

D.O. Wiley, also known as "Prof," was the first of only four permanent Cowboy Band directors and came to the school in the mid-twenties, just about the time that Will Rogers, America's beloved humorist, head of the band and became its friend and promoter. He gave the boys his blessing and \$200 "to go buy some tunes". They returned the favor by making Rogers an honorary member of the band.

By 1925, the band was such a going thing that it was incorporated, Gib Sandefer, son of then HSU president J.D. Sandefer, becoming full-time manager and Y.P. Kuhn taking over as drum major. Kuhn was the college

gym coach at the time and is the person responsible for the band's distinctive parade step which moves the group along at 200 beats per minute as opposed to the more sedate 120 steps used by many bands.

In 1934, the band was taken over by Marion B. "Little Mac" McClure. McClure directed the band until the fall of 1973, just long enough to see the construction of a dream in the completion of new facilities for the Cowboy Band in a new building completed in the summer of 1972.

In 1973, after McClure's death, the third director (and former band member) Lawson Hager, took over. In 1981, Bill Woods, a former drum major with the band became just the fourth full-time director in the long and glowing history of the band. The band is one of the most

widely traveled bands around. It has played tunes at five presidential inaugurations: Herbert Hoover in 1929; Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1941; Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1953; Richard M. Nixon in 1969; and Jimmy Carter in 1977.

The band has played for several Texas governors' inaugurations; the first for Governor Dan Moody in 1929, and the latest for Governor Bill Clements in 1979, and Governor Mark White in January, 1983. It has represented the State of Texas at national and international civic club conventions in San Francisco, New Orleans, New York, Chicago, Detroit, and Dallas. Known as one of the top rodeo bands in the country, the Cowboy Band has played for world championship shows in New York's Madison Square Garden, Colorado Springs, Phoenix, and many others.

The group's first European tour came in 1930 as they traveled to England, France, Belgium, and Holland. In 1952-53 they paraded through the continent again with the USO European Tour. In 1963 the band traveled to Japan in 1979 to name the darlings of Montreal, Canada.

Although Rogers was the first genuine celebrity to perform with the band, Bob Hope, Gene Autry, Bing Crosby, Paul Whiteman, Gary Cooper, and Dale Robertson are a few others who have appeared with the band.

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He didn't find his dreams...his dreams found him

**A.** Probably the surest way for you to come up with the camera manuals you're seeking is to issue a plea for help. So, help! If anyone has an unwanted camera manual for an Argus A-2 or C-3 (or a photocopy of a manual), please forward it to me in care of this paper and I'll see to it that it's sent along to the above.

**Q.** What gives? It seems like within the last few weeks there's been an explosion of 35mm film on the market. First Kodak announced four new VR films, then Fuji announced a couple new, fine-grain films, and now Polaroid is advertising a 35 mm instant film. Why all of a sudden? I find it hard to believe there's been a crying need for these films that's only now being met. Yet, I feel obligated to try them...or at least the Polaroid. After all, I may have just recently gotten comfortable with good old Kodachrome, but I don't want to miss out on anything.

I guess my question is, are any of these new films really all that good or exciting? I hate to waste time and money trying out something new if it turns out to be no better than—or maybe even worse than—what I've been using. What's your evaluation of these films?

G.W., Rockford, IL

**A.** My evaluation is as follows: Eastman Kodak, Fuji, and possibly several other film manufacturers by now have discovered what Kodak calls a new flat-tablet (T-grain) emulsion technology. Basically, it's a new approach to an old problem—making the finest, fastest color film possible (within, of course, a reasonable price range). In the process, the very real possibility of extending exposure latitude to the remarkably fast 1,000 ASA of Kodak's Kodacolor VR 1000 proved feasible from a marketing standpoint.

From the standpoint of good old-fashioned quality, one might say a 1,000-ASA film leaves something to be desired...at least for regular shooting. For special purposes when nothing short of the new film's speed will do—well, what's that old adage about beggars?

On a cheerier note, the Kodacolor VR 100 is touted as being the sharpest Kodacolor film ever made. Although I haven't yet read any independent lab tests on the films, my own experimentation shows that the claim may be true.

As for the Fuji films, yes, they're generally improved, as well. And, in fact, by the time this column comes into print, Fuji will have introduced a new line of professional films alleged to be among the finest available (although certainly personal taste plays a major role in such determinations).

The Polaroid instant film is a rogue in the field of 35 mm films. It's quite fascinating. And, although it's supposed to appeal to industrial and commercial film use, my workshop students recently tried some on various nature subjects and—to a one—found it very exciting. Its major drawback is clear: in an era when everyone else is struggling to produce the fastest films possible, Polaroid has introduced a 40 ASA film—one of the slowest currently available anywhere. Will its instant-developing capability compensate for its speed limitations in the marketplace? Only time will tell. But one thing is certain. Polaroid has been enthused enough about this new film and the positive reaction it has received from the photographic industry in general that the company is now at work developing a faster, finer-grained version.

Is a second generation of Polaroid 35 mm film right around the corner? Probably not. It will likely be some time before we see anything drastically different than what is already on the market.

Is it worth trying? If you're willing to invest in a Polaroid processor (an investment of slightly more than \$100 at present), definitely. And how about Kodak's and Fuji's new films? Well, nothing ventured, nothing learned.

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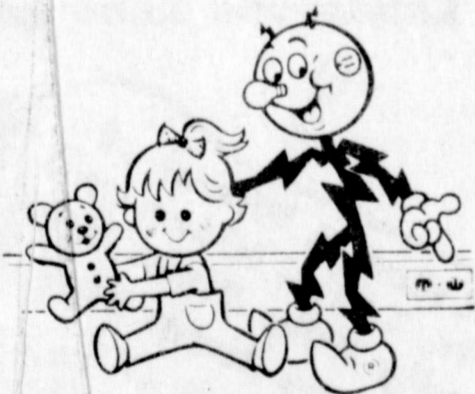

Here are a few other tips on how to live more safely — electrically:

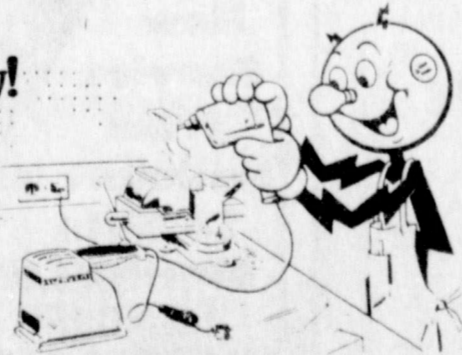


### Keep Children Away from Outlets!

Favorite places are mid lake islands. Crankbaits and worms seem to be producing the most effective. Brownwood recently hosted the Sandhills Invitational and some excellent fish were caught. Terry Wilson brought in 1 fish weighing 7 pounds 4 ounces. Also 1 six pound 4 ounce fish was caught plus six four pound fish. Crankbaits worms and jugs and pugs were producing. Cisco's bass are steady with some catches running 3 fish 11 pounds 4 ounces. Worms and crank baits were hot. Graham bass good on main lake points worms and crankbaits producing well.

Upcoming tournaments include Brownwood Chamber of Commerce Inv. Oct. 6th and 7th Lake Brownwood. Eastland County's Inner Club tournament Oct. 14 lake to be drawn at Thursdays meeting.

With colder temperatures upon us we start looking for good crappie holes for upper runs. Why not build your own. Just as we have discussed areas being built to draw bass so we can also attract crappie. Cedar, mesquite, willow trees, and even tumble weeds work well. One special item to look for when placing these attractions is to go ahead and put them out of those cold north winds for your own comfort. But don't get on a dead bank. Go just around a sharp point where wind is blowing across.

Don't forget to place extra clothes, socks and maybe even a towel in your craft, you never know when you might become wet, and when its only 40° atmosphere and you are wet, the boat ride to the ramp can be quite chilling.

Good fishing and take the whole family next time out they'll love you for it.

## Drilling Bits

The No. 202 J.N. Stuart is scheduled to be drilled in Palo Pinto County's Stuart Field eight miles northwest of Strawn. The operation will be in a 1,920-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. It carries authority for 4,100 feet of hole making and is aimed at oil production in the Marble Falls Formation.

Sun Exploration and Production of Abilene will be the operator.

Operating out of Lubbock, Robert E. Byrne has staked location for the No. 1-B Johnson, a developmental well in the REB Field, three miles north of Eastland. With projected total depth of 3,950 feet, the venture is in a 180-acre unit in Eastland County's H & TC RR Co. Survey. The well's target is production in the Marble Falls Formation.

Pumping 83 barrels of oil per day on an open choke, a new producer has been brought on line in the Stephens Regular Field within the Breckenridge City Limits.

A trio of wildcats for oil or gas is scheduled to be drilled in Palo Pinto County by Thomas Hydrocarbons Inc. of Weatherford.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Dye-Gallagher, with Del-Mar Petroleum of Breckenridge as the operator. It is in a two-acre lease in the Laticus Asylum Land Survey.

The wells are designated as the No. 1 and No. 2 Grainger and the No. 1 Hittson. All carry permit for 5,000-ft. maximum drilling depth.

Del-Mar took the hole to a 3,306-ft. bottom. The well will produce from a set of perforations 3,097 to 3,128 feet into the wellbore.

At a location about 15 miles northwest of Breckenridge, Ridge Oil of Breckenridge has finished the No. 2 LeCar "A", flowing over in Stephens County's Lenoir Field.

It showed ability to make 49 barrels of oil per day, flowing on a 6/64 choke. Flow pressure stood at 130 PSI.

The well was drilled to total depth of 4,630 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval 2,749 to 2,752 feet into the hole. Location is in a 120-acre lease in the Nancy Williams Survey.

At a location five miles south of Caddo, J.E. Conner of Breckenridge has completed his No. 5 Eddleman in the Stephens Regular Field. It pumped 24 barrels of oil per day on an open choke.

The well was taken to a total depth of 3,700 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations 3,265 to 3,283 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 90-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey, Stephens County.

Stephens County's Munneryn Field saw a new production come on line when the No. 3 Harris-Langford was completed by Thomas C. Canan of Wichita Falls about 15 miles southeast of Breckenridge.

It pumped 12 barrels of oil with 110,000 CF gas per day on an open choke.

Drill site was in a 260-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Canan took the hole to total depth of 4,098 feet, with production to come from Mississippi perforations at 4,001 to 4,029 feet.

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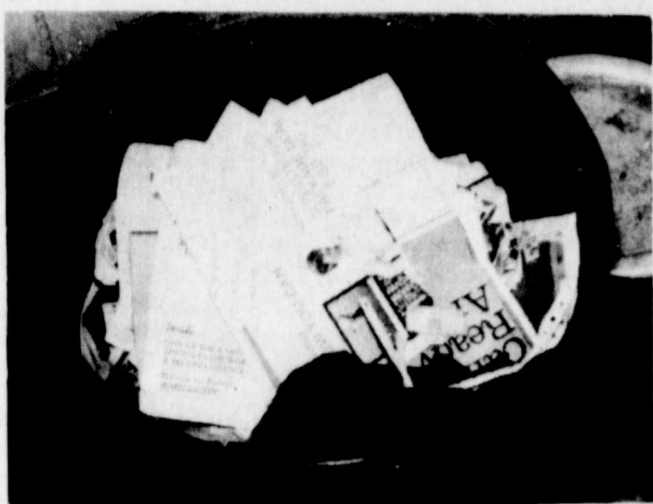

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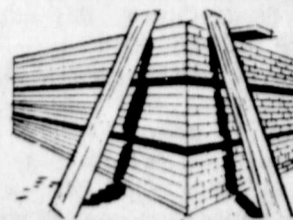


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## FmHA State Directors Advising on Farm Initiatives

J. Lynn Futch and Robert Hopper, farmer program chief for Texas, returned over the weekend from a day-long strategy session in Washington with FmHA National Administrator Charles W. Shuman and other national and state FmHA officials.

"There can be no question about the commitment of the Farmers Home Administration at all levels to put this plan to work to help those

farmers with sustainable operations who are caught in a financial squeeze through circumstances beyond their control," Futch said.

Based on the agency-wide discussion of loan and guarantee details, final procedures for operation will be completed in the FmHA National Office in a matter of days. Once any legal questions are resolved, the agency then will publish the instructions and distribute them to field offices for action.

Under the President's plan, FmHA will be able to set aside up to 25 percent -- to a maximum of \$100,000 -- of a qualifying farmer's loan without interest for five years.

For farmers in financial distress who do not have

FmHA loans, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a new loan if their lender is willing to write off enough of the farmer's debt to put the loan in a secured position and achieve a positive cash flow.

The key in both approaches is to restore the farmer to a positive cash flow situation. Essentially, that means to restructure the debt and reorganize the farming operation, if needed, to establish the financial strength needed to meet all farm operating costs, family living expenses, machinery upkeep and service all debts.

Futch said FmHA borrowers will be advised of their eligibility to participate during the annual review of their loans.

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## Farm Credit Plan To Help Farmers

Eastland, Oct. 1 - President Reagan's farm credit initiatives to reschedule portions of loans for some financially stressed Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) borrowers and to guarantee loans of some other borrowers may help farmers in Eastland County, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips said today.

Annual reviews of FmHA farm loans will soon begin, Phillips said. A major priority of the reviews will be to determine which farmers in Eastland County will qualify for a rescheduling of part of their loans for up to five years.

The President's plan permits up to a five-year deferral, with no interest payments, for as much as 25 percent of a loan, up to \$100,000, for FmHA borrowers who are experiencing severe financial stress and who show promise of success with a temporary economic boost.

Under the new guarantee plan, FmHA will be able to guarantee a loan in severe difficulty if the lender is willing to write off at least 10 percent, up to the amount necessary to give the borrower a positive cash flow. The borrower must meet general eligibility criteria for FmHA farm operating and ownership loans.

**NEW TAXES** and new laws went into effect on Tuesday... We all need to make ourselves aware of the changes.

Eastland Police Chief Bobby Arriola advises that new child-resistant laws regarding youth in vehicles affect just about everybody. Car seats and safety belts are now the law for youngsters.

and new provisions concerning leaving children unattended in automobile is something that parents need to be aware of: it's against the law to leave little ones unattended.

**RECENT CHANGES** in the Medicare law will affect many Medicare beneficiaries. Beginning October 1, 1984, participating physicians and suppliers will "accept assignment" on all Medicare claims. "Accepting assignment" means that they accept Medicare's approved charges as full payment on all claims. The Medicare beneficiary cannot be billed for more than 20 percent of Medicare's approved charge, regardless of the amount of the actual bill. Medicare pays the other 80 percent after the yearly deductible has been met.

Before these changes in the law, doctors have been able to decide on a claim-by-claim basis whether to accept assignment on Medicare claims. In those cases where assignment was not accepted, Medicare paid 80 percent of the Medicare approved charge after the yearly deductible was met, but the beneficiary could be billed more than the remaining 20 percent of Medicare's approved charge.

After October 1, 1984, Medicare beneficiaries whose physicians or suppliers do not participate will still have Medicare coverage and the physician still has the option of accepting assignment on an individual basis. Medicare will still pay 80 percent of the approved charge after the yearly deductible is met. But the beneficiary can be billed for more than 20 percent of Medicare's approved charge, unless the doctor has accepted assignment on the claim.

The new law also places a freeze on doctors' Medicare charges for fifteen months from July 1, 1984 to September 30, 1985. During the period of the freeze, non-participating doctors are not permitted to increase their actual billed charges for Medicare patients.

Medicare beneficiaries may ask their doctor if he or she is a participating provider. Also, Medicare carriers will maintain a Medicare Participating

## Consumers Want Their Steak Lean

**COLLEGE STATION**—A nationwide panel of beef tasters verified that a sizeable group of consumers want their steak lean and there will be a ready market for that type product.

More than 1,100 consumers in four cities—San Francisco, Houston, Kansas City and Philadelphia—took part in the study just completed by the Texas Agricultural Market Research and Development Center at Texas A&M University. The center is an education and research service of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The study, which is the first part of a two-phased researched project, produced more than 8,000 ratings of beef steaks," said Dr. Bob Branson, director of the market research center. "Panelists ate and rated beef loin steaks as to their flavor, tenderness and juiciness. The steaks represented seven levels

within the federal grades—low Prime; high, middle and low Choice; and high and low Good; and Standard."

Branson explained that Prime grades of beef are usually served in the better restaurants while Choice and Good grades are generally sold in supermarkets. The Standard grade is reserved for the leanest beef. Beef grades, he explained, are based on the amount of marbling—small specks of fat—in the red meat.

"We were trying to find out what kind of beef consumers really want so that both beef producers and retailers can do a better job in providing that product," Branson said. "Some retailers are continuing to market USDA Choice beef, which has more fat, while others are trying to appeal to the consuming public by promoting the health aspects of leaner beef. Cattlemen are caught in the middle and are not sure which way to turn."

While panelists nationwide agreed on the rankings, some important geographical differences were found, noted Branson. For instance, panelists in the Houston and San Francisco areas found no significant difference in the low Choice and high Good beef steaks. Also, about 25 percent of those in the study rated the lower half of the Good grade beef with a sever or higher on a nine-point scale, indicating high desirability.

So where does that leave the beef producer and the retailer?

"Obviously, we still have a lot of work to do to get a better handle on what direction beef production and marketing should take in the future," Branson said. "Phase two of this study will be a market test in retail supermarkets to obtain information about consumer preferences for a variety of beef cuts and to determine how well leaner beef can be marketed."

"It's possible that there are two markets for beef—one for higher quality beef with more fat and one for leaner beef. We hope to find the answer," Branson said.

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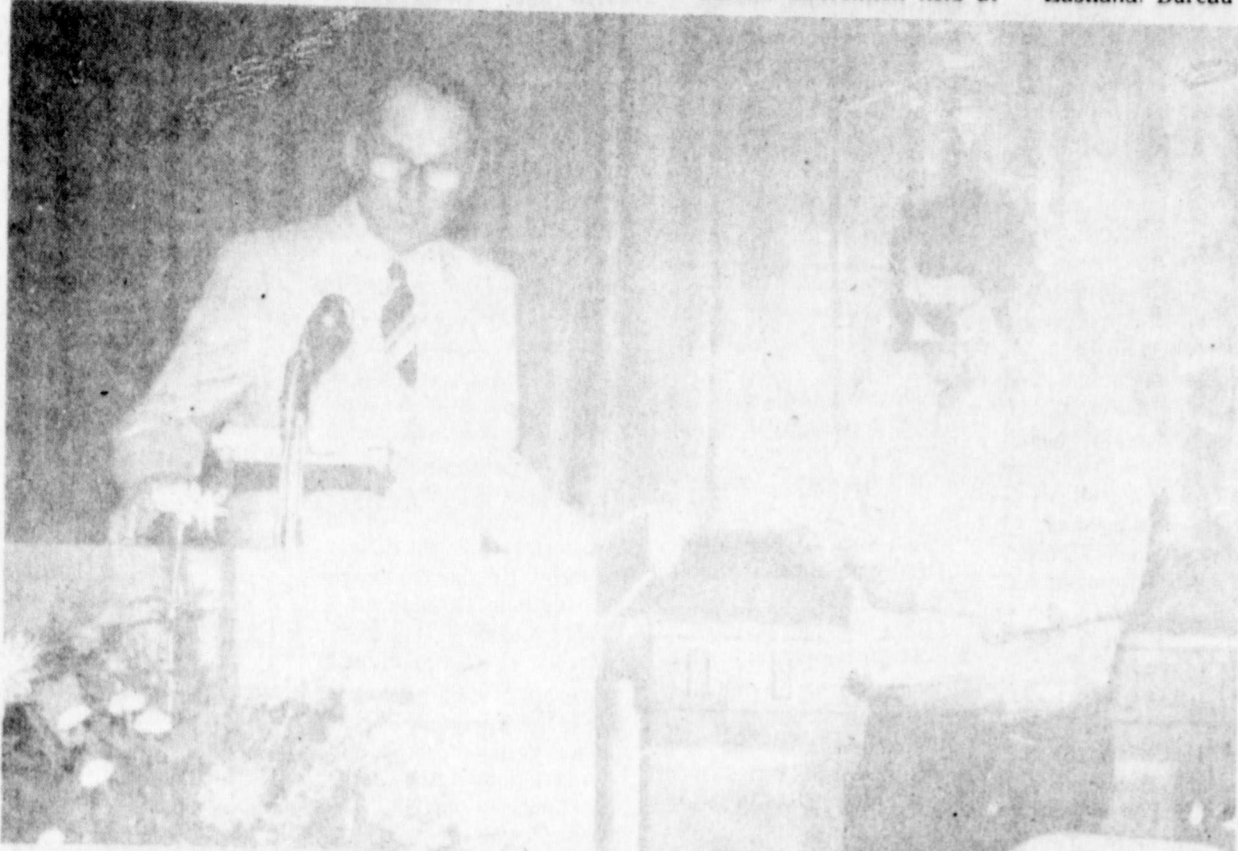

Torres attended a fireman's training school at Texas A&M University which is supported by the Farm Bureau. Each year one fireman from Eastland County is sent by the Bureau to the school. Chosen on a rotating basis, next year a fireman from Rising Star will be sent to the school.

Danelda Gevara, Bureau secretary, read a letter from Christi Caldwell and Karen Ritter, Eastland students, who were sent by the Bureau to a citizenship seminar. Also on a rotation basis, two students from Ranger will be sent next year.

Harry Holt, known for his television program, was the guest speaker at the convention. Mr. Holt started in the news business 50 years ago. He has worked for newspapers, radios and televisions during that time.

Holt, a self-proclaimed "eternal optimist", said farming has progressed from the use of teams for plowing to mechanical farming. Now it is going into the use of computers for various aspects of farming.

Farmers and ranchers, according to Holt, "have a wonderful heritage we must protect." That heritage was said to include honesty, integrity, a sense of fair play, and loyalty.

Told by a farmer that "1984 is the hardest year ever endured", Holt said farmers need to organize for better marketing of products. He summed up by saying, "We need to protect our heritage. Do not be negative, but reflect and learn from the hardships of our fore-fathers... Let's keep agriculture number one."

In the business portion of the convention, Bureau president Reich said he is proud of the County Farm Bureau. He said he feels it is being blessed because it is inspired by God. He said no Bureau meeting is ever started without asking for God's guidance and directing of their paths. "On that strength it will progress," stated Reich.

John Kidd reported there are 1,800 members in Eastland County's Farm Bureau. New members number 303, while there were 1,475 renewals. He said 23 more members are needed for the Bureau to have a gain in membership, as it has for the past 23 years.

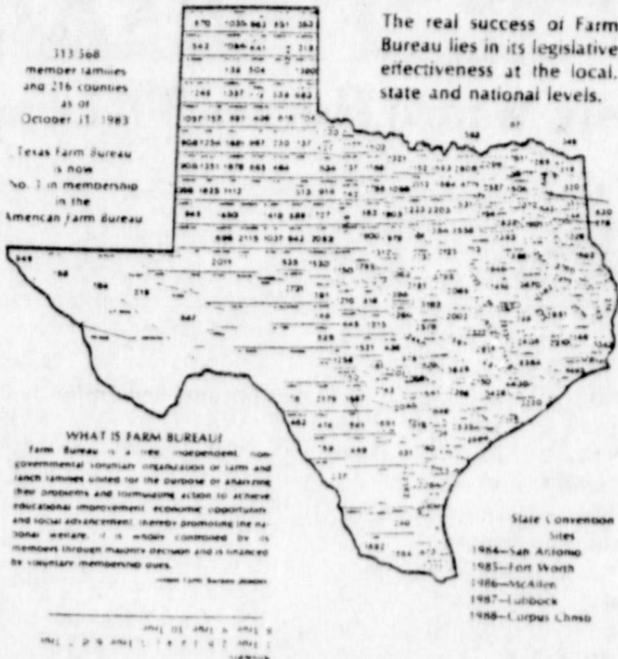
Dee Williamson reported the Bureau's outlet stores have sold \$118,985.52 of tires and \$4,504.84 of batteries. Bureau agent and office manager Jim Kennedy reported 279 individual life insurance policies sold during the year.

Bureau members adopted four resolutions presented by Grant Lewis. Those resolutions deal with: 1) the

Bureau being opposed to State and Federal inheritance tax; 2) the want of closer screening of doctors and hospitals accused of overcharging insurance companies for services; 3) favors retaining peanuts; and 4) favors repeal of State ad valorem tax, recommends small increase in sales tax including one percent on foods.

Seven directors were chosen by the convention to fill seven vacancies. Chosen were W.D. (Bill) Brown of Kokomo; Truman Fambrough of Ranger; and Morris Underwood of Ranger. Also elected were incumbents Joe Frank McCollum of Carbon; Preston McWhorter of Eastland; Ernest Reich of Cisco and Bob Shults of Rising Star.

The Six White Horses and their Riders from Hardin-Simmons University have appeared in every Fair Parade and the public always welcomes this group with loud applause.

Dr. Bill Beazley, a University vice president well known to Eastlanders, is in charge of this group and will be here with the parade. In previous appearances here, he has been most complimentary of this parade and he's an expert, having been in charge of the West Texas Fair and Rodeo Parade in Abilene for many years.

The Six White Horses have quite a history, dating back to their organization in 1930.
