# A Meeting Geared To Builders

I have never enjoyed seeing anything wrecked, not even a building.

Some "Chief Wreckers" may call me down on this statement, but I have heard that it takes a lot less skill to tear down a building than to construct it in the first place.

You can go out and pick up almost anyone to help you destroy something. "Common labor" will do the trick.

But building a lasting structure? That takes planning, patience, knowledge and dedication.

The same ideas undoubtedly hold true for the wrecking or building of a town.

That was one of the reasons why I was particularly interested in attending the Sept. 18 Videoconference in Cisco on "Revitalizing Downtown."

Besides learning some things from this nationwide program, it was nice to sit among some of the "Builders" from throughout the country.

As we watched the televised speakers and scenes I'm sure that thoughts, ideas and memories were spinning in the mind of each person in the audience. Even I had too many ideas to be incorporated in the brief news story I wrote after the event.

Each of us was rooted in our own background, set of values, mental climate and situation in life. Yet we were drawn together by a desire to see the towns in the area prosper and add to the quality of life for their citizens.

And perhaps each of us, in our own way, did not want to see the skilled and careful work of past generations in these towns to be demolished.

Having lived here "only" ten years, I do not have deep family roots in the past of Eastland County. Yet from the time I came here I was interested in saving the old buildings of the towns, instinctively realizing their worth.

This made me particularly engrossed in the advice given during the program on how to go about restoration. The general feeling was that most structures can be saved, and brightened just by a

good "cleaning up" and removal of out-of-character facades.

The recognition of quality in construction is an art in itself. But this art can also be good business, for when a building is saved there are a number of tax credits available for owners who have this work done.

One of the main things which was brought out by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, sponsors of the program, was that agriculture and the small towns of America are closely tied together. The health of one affects the other.

Even the most optimistic soul will have to admit that agriculture in the southwest, including this area, is in bad shape right now. Some of the problems are beyond the control of man - such as the weather. Others need addressing by all concerned.

Other points covered were that each town should build as large an industrial base as possible. It should hire a site manager for the restoration of Main Street, make the downtown areas inviting, save all historic sites, utilize downtown areas for living as well as merchandising, hold events to draw people downtown, encourage new businesses to open, and attract as many tourists as possible.

Eastland County towns are already trying to do some of these things. But on one of the main suggestions - hire a site manager to take charge of the Main Street revitalization - the audience indicated to Ron Bailey, program coordinator, that they were running into a problem.

Especially when the suggested salary for this special person would be over \$35,000 per year and up!

Suggestions were forthcoming, however. Handle it like an area in Oregon, where one site manager was hired for several communities. Or utilize City Managers, Mayors, C of C Managers, Historical Societies and assorted personnel on the work.

During the telecast there was time out for questions beamed from around the United States. The spontaneous replies were from national authorities.

One question was: "How can locally-owned Main Street stores compete with the chain stores which come into a community?"

The answer: "They can't compete as far as price is concerned. But they can compete in areas of quality merchandise and service."

"And quality will always be in demand by many buyers."

"Other things in demand are specialty merchandise and locally produced items. And tourists are always looking for places where they can see authentic historic sites and eat good regional food."

After the telecast was over

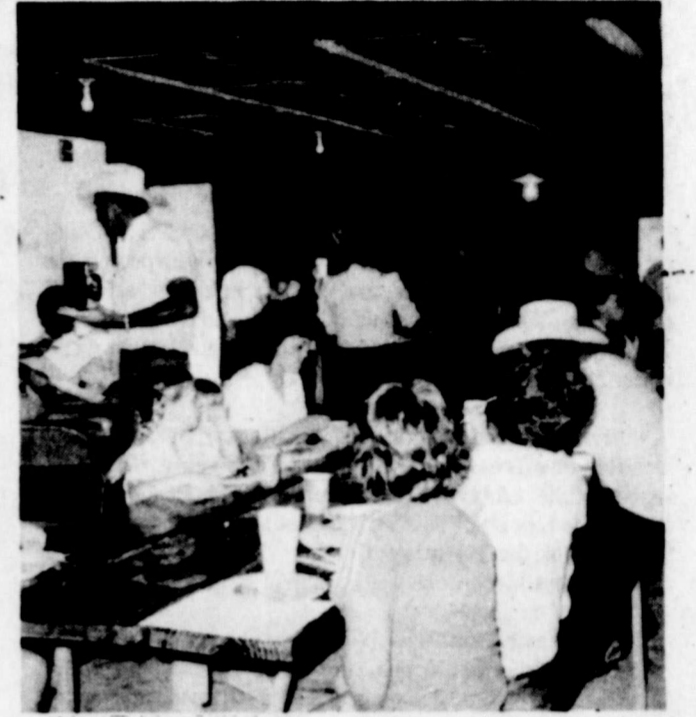

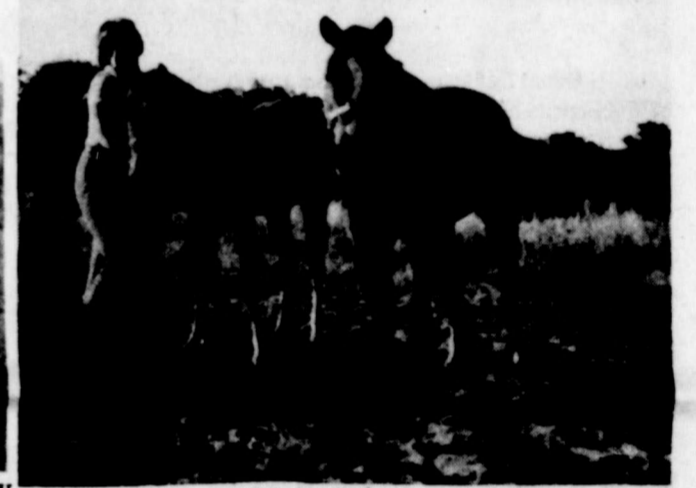

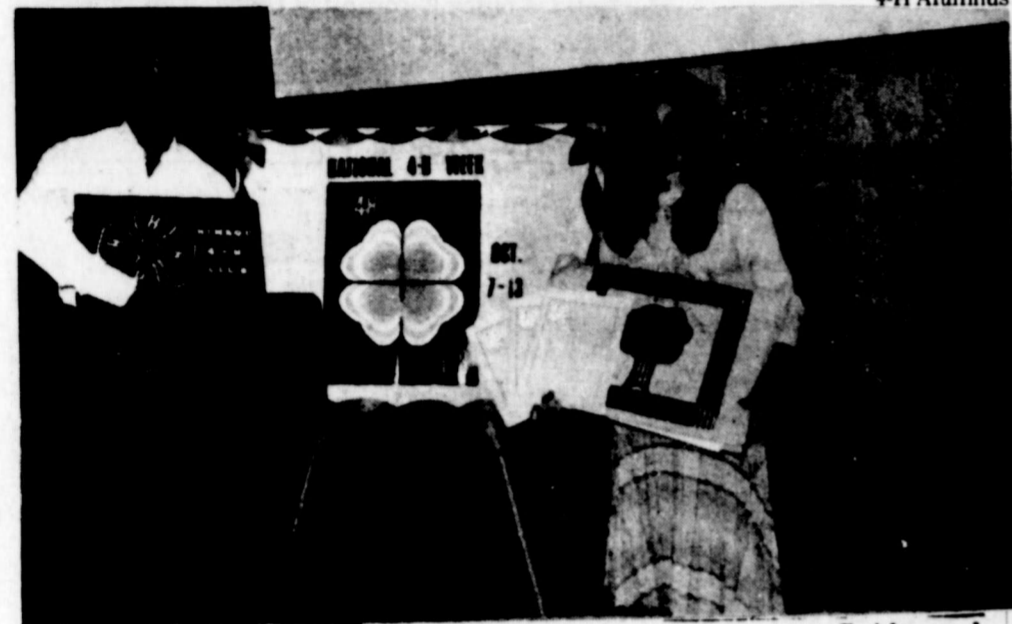

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## Farmers Can Postpone Taxes On Crop Insurance

A number of Texas farmers will likely be collecting on their crop insurance this year due to drought-shortened yields.

Those crop insurance proceeds must be reported as income for the year they are received. However, farmers using the cash method of accounting may elect to postpone reporting crop insurance proceeds to the following year if they can show that they would have ordinarily reported the crop income the following year.

To make this election, attach a statement to your tax return, or amended return, for the year the damage took place, points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The statement must include your name and address and the following information:

- A statement that you are making an election under section 451(d) of the Internal Revenue Code and section 1.451-6 of the regulations.

- The specific crop or crops destroyed or damaged.

- A statement that under your normal business prac-

tice you would have included income derived from the destroyed or damaged crops in your gross income for a tax year following the tax year of the destruction or damage.

- Cause of the destruction or damage and the date it occurred.

- Total amount of insurance payments you received, itemized with respect to each specific crop, and date each payment was received.

- Name of the insurance carrier or carriers from whom you received payments.

One election covers all crops from your farm, says Hayenga. If you have more than one farming business, you must make a separate election for each one.

This election is binding unless the IRS district director consents to a change. To change your election, write to your district director giving your name, address, identification number, the year that you made the election, and your reasons for wanting to change it, notes Hayenga.

Gehenna was a very deep narrow Valley of Hinnom, which lay to the south and southwest of the city of Jerusalem. It was used by King Ahas and Manasseh as a place to engage in the idolatrous worship by sacrificing humans in fire to Baal. (2 Chron. 28:3)

It was also used as a place for the disposal of waste matter from the city of Jerusalem. This included the bodies of dead animals and vile criminals who had been judged beyond the hope of a resurrection. (Matt. 5:30)

Jesus spoke in illustrations and used Gehenna as a symbol of complete destruction. It may be noted that God prophetically decreed that this Valley of Hinnom would serve as a place of mass disposal of dead bodies rather than the torture of live victims. (Jer. 7:32,33)

# 4-H Theme Reflects Rich History

"4-H: Building on Experience," the year-long theme of the 4-H program across Texas and the nation, reflects on the rich past of this youth program as well as on a bright future.

This year's theme will receive special emphasis during the upcoming National 4-H Week, Oct. 7-13.

"The 4-H program has long taken pride in its roots and the practical learning experiences that it has provided for millions of youth," says H.T. "Tom" Davison, state 4-H program leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"4-H, which now reaches some five million youth each year in the U.S., actually had its beginning in Texas in Jack County back in 1908," notes Davison. "From the early corn clubs for boys and canning clubs for girls, 4-H has grown into the nation's largest youth organization outside of schools that today reaches young people from all backgrounds and walks of life."

Conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service in each state and supported by each state's land-grant university and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the 4-H program is built around a "learning-by-doing" philosophy that has stood the test of time.

"We now have more than 190,000 Texas youth between the ages of 9 and 19 enrolled in 4-H, and they are engaged in some 50 project areas that provide a host of learning experiences to prepare them for the future," Davison points out. "These educational projects help young people gain practical skills,

develop good nutrition and health habits, explore career opportunities, generate leadership capabilities, and become involved citizens."

From the traditional projects of field crops and livestock to baking and sewing, 4-H has expanded over the years into such areas as small engines, shooting

sports, gardening and veterinary science. And now computers are finding their way into 4-H.

"With new projects and programs to challenge today's young people, the future of 4-H looks bright," says Davison. "4-H has a proud past on which to build as it continues to help youth prepare for the future."

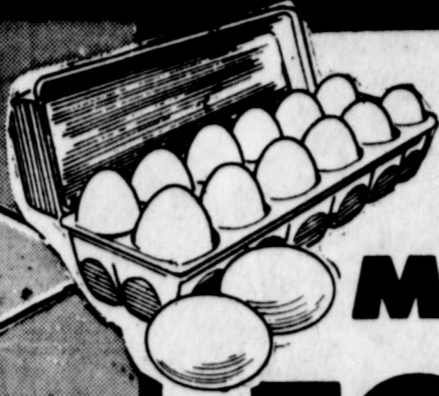

## AARP Tax Counseling For The Elderly

The Eastland County effort of the nationwide tax-aid program has begun recruiting volunteers to serve as tax counselors to older persons for the 1984 tax season.

Tax-aid is a community service of the American Association of Retired Persons working in cooperation with the IRS. It provides free income tax help to the older taxpayer in preparing their returns, according to Walter Knowlden, coordinator for the Eastland County Program.

Mr. Knowlden said that persons volunteering to serve as counselors should have a sincere interest in serving older adults and have a good knowledge of tax matters. They should also be willing to participate in an internal revenue service training course and agree to devote at least four hours a week to provide tax counseling.

Volunteer counselors do not have to be members of AARP. Mr. Knowlden

pointed out that volunteers should be older persons since a unique tax-aid feature is emphasis on peer-group assistance. However, persons of any age are welcome.

"Some of our best counselors are retired professionals," Mr. Knowlden said. "Since the training course emphasis tax benefits for older adults and not general tax preparation, those volunteers who are already familiar with taxes have a head start and usually make better counselors."

Mr. Knowlden explained that the IRS does not consider volunteer tax counselors such as those involved in tax-aid as "Professional Return Preparers."

"Since our counselors don't charge a fee for their services," he said, "The IRS does not require them to sign returns or hold them responsible for under payment of taxes on the returns they assist with."

The IRS training course for volunteers will be held in

January, 1985. The local tax-aid program will offer assistance to older residents at a convenient location from February 1 to April 15.

"We've found that our counselors enjoy their activities so much that most of them come back year after year," Mr. Knowlden said. "But we can always use additional volunteers, especially this year since we're trying to open more counseling sites and reach additional Eastland County older residents."

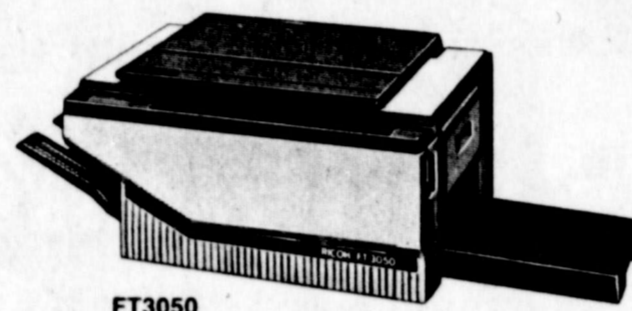

# County Judge Proclaims Fire Prevention Week

**PROCLAMATION BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF EASTLAND COUNTY TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:**  
I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby declare the week of October 7-13, 1984 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Eastland County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, according to the National Fire Protection Association; the 1982 fire loss totals are as follows: United States - 6,137 deaths; from 2,538,000 total fires; total property lost \$6,432,000,000; and

WHEREAS, NFPA also provides these additional facts:

\*Cigarettes are the leading cause of accidental multiple-death fires in residential properties. (Multiple-death means three or more victims.)

\*Children 15 years old and younger account for more than half of all victims in multiple-death fires.

\*Fixed or portable heating equipment is the second most common cause of accidental multiple-death fires.

\*Most multiple-death fires occur during the winter months.

\*The greatest number of multiple-death fires occur between the hours of 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.; and

WHEREAS, NFPA points out that the need for teamwork has never been more urgent than it is today. Firefighters' work is the most hazardous occupation in our country. They risk - and too often give - their lives to suppress fires. But fire safety in any environment also requires fire prevention. Making sure that people of all ages learn how to prevent fires and to protect themselves when fire strikes is a job that takes the efforts of everyone in a community;

WHEREAS, this year's FIRE PREVENTION WEEK theme encourages everyone to "Join the Prevention Team! Learn Not To Burn." It's essential that both individuals and

organizations actively support and join with fire departments to promote and teach fire safety; and

WHEREAS, when everyone joins the Fire Prevention Team, it can be the beginning of an entire year of fire safety activities and events. When everyone joins the team, more lives will be saved.

A dry chemical extinguisher charged with tri-class chemicals can be used on Type A fires, but not as effectively as water.

Never use a water extinguisher on a Type B or C fire - with a B fire you could spread the flames and with a C you could suffer an electric shock. A tri-class 2A-10B:C extinguisher is ideal for a shop, tractor, combine and/or truck where a fire might involve both deep burning and flammable materials.

\* Locate extinguishers near building entrances, and in areas with a higher fire risk such as a kitchen, shop, or petroleum storage. Those on vehicles and equipment should be accessible from both the operators' station and the ground.

\* Teach family members and employees how to use extinguishers. Check extinguishers regularly.

The national FPW theme encourages everyone - both individuals and organizations to actively support and join with fire departments to promote and teach fire safety. Mr. Reich said "Farm Bureau has been a member of the fire prevention team for many years and we are continuing in this teamwork through our programs to provide assistance for firemen training and our educational programs.

October 7-13, 1984 is Fire Prevention Week in Eastland County across the nation, with the theme - "Join The Fire Prevention Team! Learn Not To Burn". According to Ernest Reich, President of the

Eastland County Farm Bureau. Fire can be friend or foe, depending on the situation. Unfortunately, unfriendly situations arise all too often, costing lives and devastating property. Prevention is your best defense, but to minimize loss

you must be prepared if fire starts. To avoid or reduce fire loss, Reich recommends these tips from the National Safety Council:

\* Test smoke detectors regularly. Change batteries within the recommended interval or when you see or

hear a "low battery" signal from a detector. If you have yet to equip your home with these proven lifesavers, do so soon.

\* Post phone numbers of the fire department, emergency medical service and others who could help

during an emergency. Teach youngsters how to call for help in case of fire or other emergency.

\* Prepare, then practice a home fire escape plan.

\* If you have no nearby water source such as a river, lake or farm pond, you can install water holding tanks for fire fighting.

\* Equip your house, out-buildings and motorized

equipment with fire extinguishers of the proper type and rating. Type A fires (paper, wood, straw, etc.) requires the smothering effect of a dry chemical or carbon dioxide extinguisher.

Type C fires (electrical) also requires use of dry chemical or CO2 extinguishers.

Dr. Baugh is now in the process of restoring these bones for display in the museum, which is presently

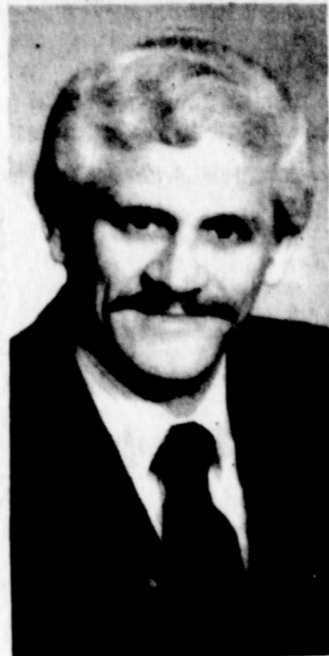
housed in a one room cabin, with plans calling for the building of a new museum shortly.

### Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

More and More people are finding exercise is the one activity that is helping to keep them in shape.

A study, carried out as part of the Stanford University Heart Disease Prevention Program, followed 14 Middle-Aged, previously sedentary men around as they embarked on running programs. After building up their mileage during the first year, they maintained an average 12 miles per week during the second year.

The researchers discovered while the men ate more the extra food was carbohydrates. Although they increased calories, something just the opposite was happening to their body-fat percentages. By the end of the second year, their body fat fell from an average of almost 22 percent to 18 percent.

Each of us should develop an exercise program and maintain it for more than two years to be effective. Discuss your program with your neighbor and then both of you work hard on it.
