which are expected to cost some \$25,000, will enable the Abilene campus to offer courses in computer science.

Dr. Henry E. McCullough, president, was also authorized to ask for bids for a computer aided drafting system for use by the drafting department here. Bids also will be requested to buy the 15 micro-computers.

The board will advertise for bids on the Spang Building, which has an appraised value of \$11,700. The building is 60 x 73 feet in size and contains 4,380 square feet of floor space. It has a

concrete floor and is a metal building located just east of the railroad at the north end of Hilton Avenue.

The Sa-So Company of Arlington was the low bidder to supply the college with two new metal flag poles that will be erected with local labor near the new signboard at College Hill. The Arlington firm's bid was \$4,899.

Quality Printing Co. of Abilene was the low bidder for a contract to print 11 color brochures that will be used in recruiting activities. The Abilene firm's bid was \$14,499.

Dr. McCullough was authorized to seek bids to supply the college with a copy machine for use by the executive department. The college will open a

campus at Coleman in January, 1985, to offer basic college courses in English, math, government, history, and the like. Dr. McCullough reported. CJC was invited by the Coleman Public Schools to use their facilities in the new program, he added. Carroll Scott, vice president for academic studies, will be in charge of arrangements for the Coleman campus program, it was reported.

A report on enrollment for the 1984-85 fall semester was made by Dr. McCullough. It showed total enrollment of 1,610 students with 697 on the Cisco campus and 913 on the Abilene and Clyde campuses. Dick Woolley, board president, presided at the meeting, which was attended by all board members.

Hilton Board Gives Architect Go-Ahead

The board of trustees of the Conrad Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center has given a Dallas architect the "go ahead" to prepare plans and specifications for restoration of the old Mobley Hotel as the first Hilton Hotel, according to Chairman Eris Ritchie.

The trustees met Friday, Oct. 12, with Architect Karl Komatsu and his associate, Gordon Merchant, of Dallas, at the community room of the First National Bank, here.

The architects will prepare plans in keeping with ideas presented by the trustees to include offices for the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, a large meeting area, display space for Hilton mementoes, and other facilities. The architects are expected to meet with the board within the next 10 days, Mr. Ritchie said.

Preliminary drawings will be presented to the trustees for final approval when the next meeting is held.

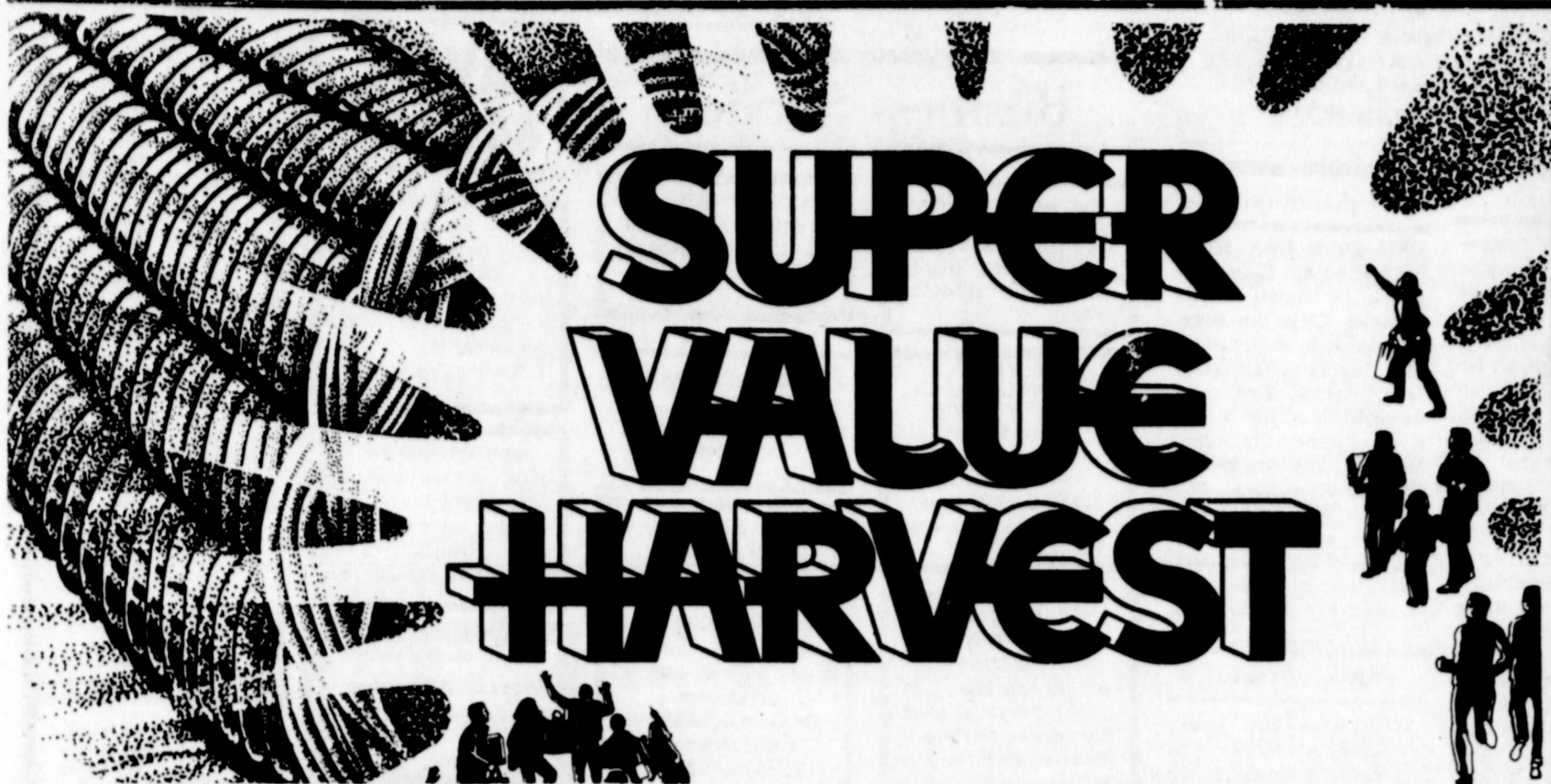

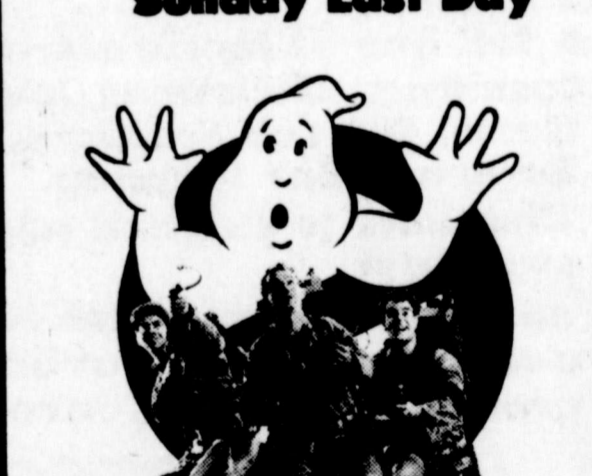

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Energy Conservation Workshop Local Antlerless Deer Permits Being Planned For Churches To Be Issued In November

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service are working on a program of Energy Conservation for religious structures. This would be a two-day workshop including possibilities for saving money with low cost investments. The workshop would be held in late 1985 or sometime in 1986 (only eight workshops are held).

Each participant will have an opportunity for "hands-on" experiences of conducting an energy audit and analyzing alternatives for energy cost reduction.

The two-day workshops are available on a first come-first served basis. Priority will be given to churches in rural areas and small towns as well as geographic spread.

Host churches are needed for holding the workshops. It is expected that the participants would consist of a minister and one or two people responsible for building maintenance and repair from each of at least ten churches.

County Extension agents and the host church would work together with a Texas

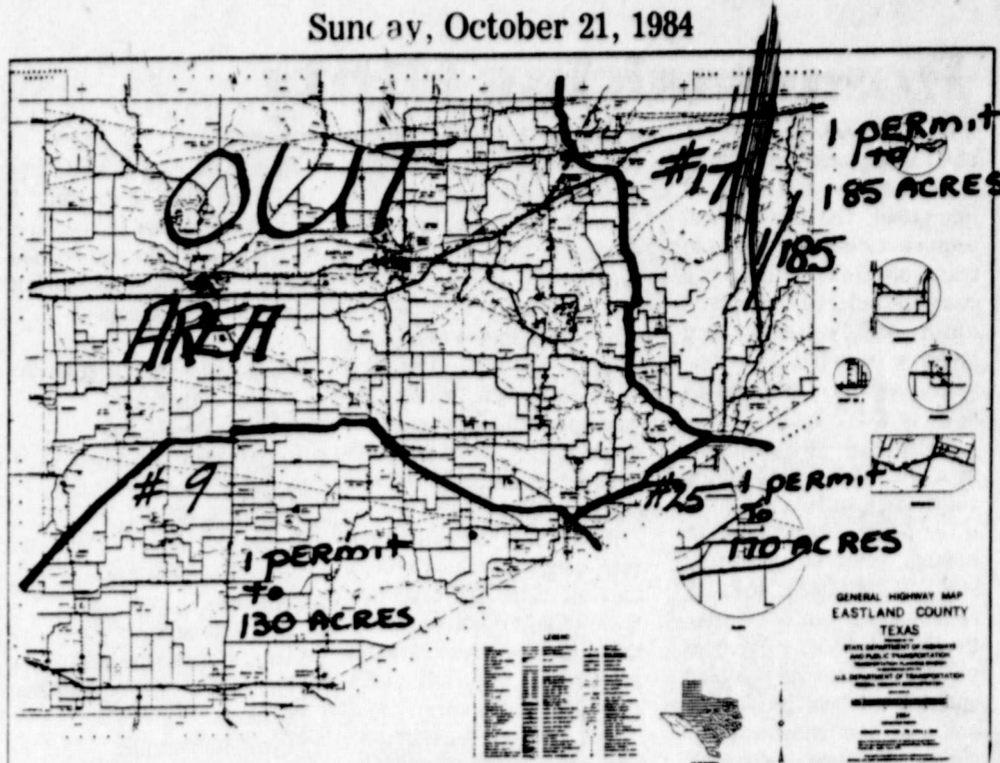
Agricultural Extension Service specialist to plan the program and ensure participation. If you and your church are interested or need more information, please contact the County Extension Office (629-1093).

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for Eastland County on November 5 and 7 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon and 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. in the Eastland County Courthouse.

A map with the antlerless deer permit issuance compartments and issuance rates will be posted in the county courthouse prior to the issuance date. To qualify for permits, a landowner must own or control acreage equal to at least one-half of the permit issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located.

After the opening of the hunting season, permit will only be available through Regional Offices located in Rockport, San Angelo, Tyler, Waco and the State Office in Austin. Permits will not be issued by local department personnel, after the opening of deer season on November 17, 1984.

Landowners or their agents are urged to pick up permits on the scheduled issuance dates.

Homemaking Hints

As of October 31, 1984, the child safety seat law passed by the Texas legislature goes into effect. The new law will require residents of Texas to transport children up to two years in federally approved child safety seats and children from two up to four years old in child safety seats or safety belts.

An offense is punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$50, but the court will dismiss the charge if the person shows proof of having acquired a safety seat by purchase, loan or rental within ten days after the offense. The law exempts violations involving a person operating a vehicle for hire and a person transporting a child in a vehicle in which all seating positions equipped with the child safety seats or safety belts are occupied.

Although the law is effective at the end of October, only those offenses committed on or after January 1, 1985 will be prosecuted.

Every year more than 1,000 children younger than five years old die from injuries resulting from highway accidents. Tens of thousands more are injured. Small children are top heavy and have softer bones so injuries from falls or tumbles in a moving car can happen easily.

Young children should not be allowed to stand on a car seat. They should sit with their seat and shoulder harness secured in case the car stops suddenly. Several restraints are available for

children, including infant carriers, harness restraints, harnessed wrap-around seats and seats with padded surfaces in front. Lightweight plastic infant carriers used for feeding were not designed to be used as car seats since they lack vital restraints. When you hold your child in your arms or lap, or the allow the child to stand on the seat, you are risking a life.

When using the child's car seat, double check to be sure that all belts are fastened. Even if you think you baby looks like an astronaut being prepared for blast off, make sure he or she is safe.

Last, but not less important, set a good example for your children by always using seat belts yourself. For more information on selecting the correct type of seat, contact my office.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
This week I am featuring a recipe from my own file which we enjoy. This is a recipe for Bran Refrigerator muffins. These high-fiber muffins are wonderful served as a nutritious snack or served with a salad plate

luncheon. The best part is that they will make lots of muffins! I always half this recipe, and recommend that you do also unless you are preparing food for a large crowd.

BRAN REFRIGERATOR MUFFINS
2 cups boiling water
2 cups raisins or dates
5 teaspoons soda
2 cups sugar
1 cup shortening
5½ cups sifted flour
1 cup nuts
1 teaspoon salt
4 cups all-bran cereal
2 cups 40 percent bran flakes
4 eggs
1 quart buttermilk

Pour the boiling water over the raisins. Add soda and let cool. Cream the sugar with the shortening. Sift the flour into a mixing bowl and save out ½ cup to flour the nuts. Add the salt and the cereal. Beat the eggs, add buttermilk and blend. Fold in the raisin mixture. Add all at once to the sifted flour and floured nut mixture; mix until dry ingredients are moistened. Cover and store in refrigerator. Makes 4 quarts.

When needed, heat oven to 375° F. Take out the quantity of mix desired and fill muffin cups two-thirds full. Bake 20 to 25 minutes. When kept in the refrigerator, this batter will keep for 6 weeks.

The desert termites have really been noticeable in rangeland and coastal bermuda grass field in Eastland County. Some people have called the insects "ground lice." These soil inhabiting termites thrive in grass land area when dry weather persists.

The drier the weather, the better this insect pest can survive. Excessive moisture kills the developing termite forms. We have had plenty of dry weather the last two years so the termites have caused extensive damage.

This insect is seldom noticed during periods of ample rainfall. A good general rain would decrease termite populations, enhance grass growth and boot prospects for winter pastures.

Some have been concerned that these termites have move into buildings and cause damage. However, the desert termite differs significantly in its living habits from termite species which commonly damage wood or houses, although its physical appearance is similar.

All termites regardless of type seek source of cellulose for food. The desert termite uses various species of common grasses as its food supply. Rangeland, coastal bermuda and lawn grasses have experienced severe damage from abundant populations of the desert termite.

Damage to the grass producing areas is caused during the insects worker stage as tubular or sheet-like coverings of soil are placed

over entire plants. The termite workers bring up moist soil and build a chimney covering the plant stems. The plant tissue dies and becomes the dried cellulose needed for its food. They burrow very deep if necessary to reach moisture. The termites are actually beneficial during periods of ample rainfall because they help to turn dead organic matter into soil.

Fields are generally infested in a patchwork pattern with droughty areas first under attack.

Special mechanical means should be employed to the infested areas to destroy the mud chimneys covering the plant tissue. A heavy chain, a log or light disc can be pulled over infested areas to prepare the site for chemical treatment.

Spray applications of the insecticide containing malathion can be applied to infested pasture areas following mechanical

preparations. Ample water must be used to achieve good coverage of the infested area during the spraying operation.

A suggested rate of water use is 20 to 30 gallons per acre. Be sure to read and follow label directions carefully on the container purchased.

Cattle can continue to graze treated areas of coastal or rangeland.

Field inspections must be made in treated areas 7 to 10 days after the initial insecticide treatment. If pockets of termites are still apparent, re-treatment of infested areas may be required.

A good general rain would be the best treatment for control of desert termites.

Building. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Hendricks Medical Center of Abilene will be present to take donations. To add a bit of sport, technicians will be dressed in costume in keep-

ing with the Halloween theme.

A blood insurance policy is available to interested blood donors. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be

assured of having blood available to them for one full year.

Please help! Blood is so necessary for life itself. Accidents and sicknesses can happen very quickly when there's no time to ask for blood then. Please help yourself, your family, friends or community by giving some of your blood on Wednesday.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

A. All donors must be age 18 or older, there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.

B. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

C. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood, however no medication should be deleted without first checking with the perspective donor's own doctor.

D. Any person who has been sick or has had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

E. Any person who has had their ears pierced within the

last six months at any place other than a doctor's office should not donate blood.

F. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood, due to malaria possibilities.

G. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood, should not donate blood.

H. No woman who is pregnant, or suspects she is so, should give blood, and

should not do so until six weeks after pregnancy.

I. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although, it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this

often.

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

The nutrition program is interested in every phase of our member's health. In the recent issue of the Modern Maturity there was a brief article which we felt you might have overlooked. It concerns the body temperature of an older person, and what is acceptable. In other words, is 98.6 degrees a fever in disguise?

A recent study at the University of New Mexico's College of Nursing, to determine normal temperature among a group of adults between the ages of 65 and 90, revealed an average temperature of 97.7 degrees—substantially below the old standby norm of 98.6 degrees. Realizing that elders have lower body temperatures are important for health-care practices, notes researcher Patricia Higgins. The summary of the article indicates any temperature to 98.6 or above, particularly in persons over age 75, should raise suspicion of fever and prompt a search for the underlying cause, she writes in the Journal, Geriatric Nursing.

Annual 'Federation Day' Meeting Is Held

A long over-due opportunity to explain "Who they are, What they are, What they have done, and What they propose to do in the future," was afforded the six member clubs of Cisco's City Federation of Women's Clubs at its annual "Federation Day" meeting, September 22, in the Fellowship Hall of the First Christian Church.

Clubs and Presidents are: Mrs. Arlin Bint, Federation President; Cisco Music Club, Mrs. J.C. Dyer; Cisco Garden Club, Mrs. R.B. Caldwell; The First Industrial Arts Club, Mrs. Stanley J. Pirtle; The Twentieth Century Club, Mrs. Roy Cartee; The Delta Kappa Gamma Society, International, Beta Upsilon Chapter, Mrs. B.J. Taylor; and Lake Cisco Extension Homemakers' Club, Mrs. M.D. Bailey.

All of these clubs are different in purpose, but all have a common bond in Community Service, Service to Country and Volunteerism. All are affiliated with State and National or International organizations. All have early-day origins - The Twentieth Century Club in 1898; the First Industrial Arts Club in 1906; and all others dating back at least 50 years. All have continuing work records.

All pursue programs of local benefits as well as state and national objectives of parent organizations that include conservation of land and water, environment protection and beautification, crime prevention, education, employment of the handicapped, voter registration, child support, alerts to problems of alcohol and drugs and abuse of children and the elderly; scholarships for young people, encouragement of interests in music and other fine arts; sponsorship of 4-H clubs and cooperation with the Department of Agriculture. The list grows - the opportunities are boundless, and communities reap the benefits while club members experience personal growth, education and self-satisfaction for their contributions.

Members and guests at the meeting were registered by Mrs. M.D. Bailey and presented programs designed by Mrs. Pirtle. The cover pictured a leaf, with the inscription, "Don't Fall Short - Try Volunteering." Fall colors were reflected in floral decorations and the centerpiece for the refreshment table, laid with an exquisite white linen cloth, punch, coffee and cake were served. The beautifully decorated

cakes were the handiwork of Mrs. Pirtle, Mrs. Lou Schlurpo, and Mrs. Sue Taylor.

Recitation of the Collect for Club Women and Pledges to the United States and Texas Flags were followed by singing of the Federation Song and "America, the Beautiful" led by Mrs. Ella White, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Lynn Williams.

Welcome was extended by Federation President Edna Bint, with an explanation of the program as a series of presentations by representatives from each club.

Speaking for the Garden Club, Mrs. Marshall Allison named certain members who represent areas of interest, talents or just enjoyment of the "congeniality" that characterizes this club, because of its common interest in flowers, birds, butterflies, nature in general, and the preservation of natural beauty. Named were: Mmes. Lloyd London, Roy Caldwell, Arlin Bint, C.L. Webb, Bill Howell, Alfred Cole, J.T. Carson, and special recognition to two members, now deceased, Mrs. Zoe Clinton and Mrs. Eva Zint. Along with studies and demonstrations of plant care, arrangements, new plants and broader subjects of soil and water conservation and many more subjects, the Club has sponsored the "Yard of the Week" selection, flower shows, an excellent exhibit of poisonous plants, and it has contributed to landscaping projects at Graham Hospital, Cisco Junior College, private gardens, and flower planting at the Nursing Center. The Garden Club is affiliated with Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. and the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

The Cisco Music Club presentation was by its President, Mrs. J.C. Dyer. This club is affiliated with the Texas and National Federations of Music Clubs - the latter having been organized in 1880. Mrs. Dyer is a Life Member of both organizations, has served in several offices in the past, and currently is Chairman of the District III Department of Magazines and Literature. Music in the Home and Community is the primary objective, with a special emphasis on encouraging young people to be interested in fine arts and the pursuit of careers in music and other arts. The Club offers scholarships and invites young musicians to perform at club meetings. She cited as an example of success, the phenomenal career of Stacey Blair of Eastland.

The First Industrial Arts Club, a member of Heart of Texas District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and General Federation of Women's Clubs, was represented by Mrs. Van Gardenhire. This Federation is acclaimed to be the "World's Largest Volunteer Women's Service Organization." To illustrate the variety of subjects covered by the Club's yearly study program, Mrs. Gardenhire displayed an umbrella with each point representing a specific program which was explained by various members of the club. Members meet twice each month and are actively engaged in local, state and national projects that carry out their own stated purpose, "To encourage and promote educational activities and topics of general information." The President, Mrs. Pirtle, is Second Vice President of the District. In 1926, a former President, Mrs. A.J. Olson, was responsible for acquisition of the Clubhouse for use by the City Federation.

Mrs. Roy Cartee, representing the Twentieth Century Club, stated that the basic project of this Club is the Cisco Public Library. For its history, she read a poem composed by Mrs. C.H. Fee, the first President to be elected by the club in 1898, who with wit plus facts, described the manner in which the young ladies of that day met to organize. Two years later, they embarked on a project to build and maintain a permanent

home for a public library - that Library is in operation today. The club is affiliated with the Texas Federation General Federation of Women's Clubs, and accepts, in general, those purposes for establishing free libraries and seeking "to bring into communication... with like organizations throughout the world, the purpose of mutual benefit, and for the promotion of their common interest in educational, industrial, philanthropic, literary, artistic and scientific culture."

Mrs. B.J. Taylor, President, was speaker for the Beta Upsilon Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society, International, an organization of active and retired teachers and honorary members. The local club membership is approximately 65, and includes members Callahan and Eastland Counties. One interesting fact, in addition to the many education-related activities, is that the Society originated in Austin, Texas in 1929, spread to become an international organization, and still maintains its headquarters in Austin.

The Lake Cisco Extension Homemakers' Club, with Mrs. M.D. Bailey as President, has a long record of accomplishments and involvement with county activities that relate to offices of the County Extension Agent for Home Economics and for Agriculture which operate under the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The Lake Cisco Club, as related by Mrs. Arlin Bint, is a member

of the Council that includes clubs of Flatwood, Morton Valley, Kokomo and Pleasant Hill. A very active organization with opportunities for service as well as learning by doing, members participate in the annual Pecan Show, the Eastland County Fair, State workshops and regional meetings and promotion of programs for young people as well as older citizens, and their very special "Achievement Day."

The concluding report also was by Mrs. Bint - a brief history of the City Federation, and an account of its two annual meetings to honor Federation of Women's Clubs, and to celebrate Texas Independence Day. She paid special tribute to Mrs. O.L. Stamey, long time member of the Federation, Twentieth Century Club and First Industrial Arts Club, holder of many offices and presently Historian for all three. She is a Life Member of the State and General Federations.

The consensus regarding this meeting is that this was an outstanding program of recognition of past generations of clubwomen; credit due and respect for today's clubwomen; an opportunity for these six clubs to point with pride to their accomplishments and share admiration for the achievements of others. It also was an example for the younger generation of the power that exists in numbers and cooperation yet leaves obvious the tremendous need for Volunteers.
