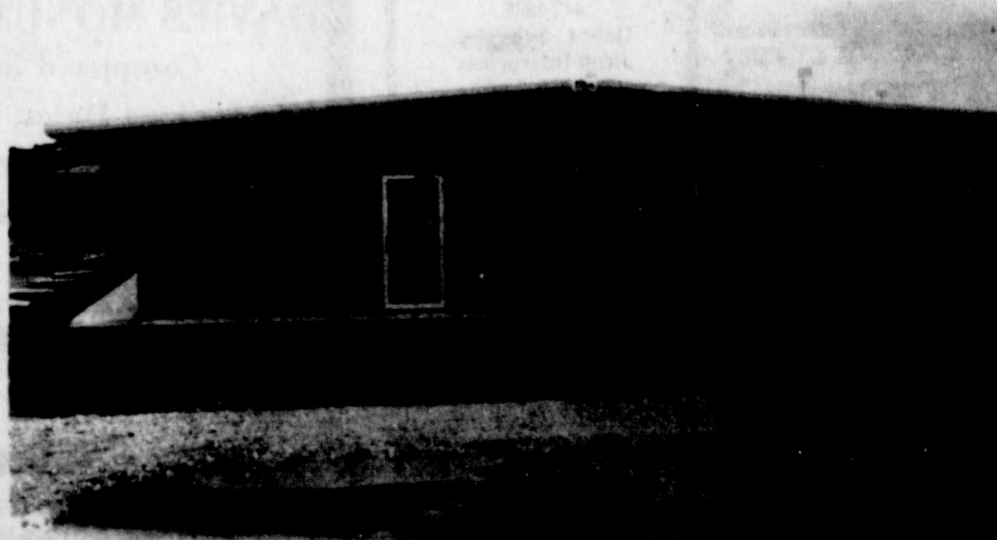

ANIMAL HEALTH

Several management practices influence calving efficiency. These would include: sire and cow selection, proper feeding, insect control, frequency of herd checks during calving season, veterinary medical programs, pregnancy testing, and others. If the above practices are poor, poor calving rates occur. Pregnancy testing becomes profitable by removing open and late calving cows before the winter feeding season begins. No one is going to profit by feeding an open cow all winter. Assume 1000 lb. cow is going to eat 20 lb. of hay per day during a 150 day feeding season. It will cost \$100 or more to feed her through the winter. If a producer has 100 cows and has to pay a veterinarian \$2.00/head to pregnancy test then it would cost approximately \$200.00 if only 5 cows

were found to be open the producer could save \$500.00 in feed cost over the winter by culling those cows before feeding season. This situation would produce a \$300.00 net savings to the producer.

There are several points to keep in mind when considering pregnancy testing as a management tool: 1) Rectal palpation is fast, economical, and accurate. Your veterinarian can assist you in other health problems at the time of pregnancy examinations are conducted. 2) The time of examination to eliminate mixing and having a to sort later. 4) Well designed corrals and handling facilities are needed to prevent injuries to cows and people. They save time also. 5) If there are high numbers of open cows determine the cause as soon as possible to prevent the same problem next year.

AMENDMENTS 4

AMENDMENT NO. 4—"THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ABOLISH THE OFFICE OF COUNTY TREASURER IN BEXAR AND COLLIN COUNTIES."

The proposed amendment of the Texas Constitution abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties and transfers the powers, duties, and functions of the office to the county clerk. Abolition of the office must be approved by the voters of each affected county in a local election separate from the election on adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment.

BACKGROUND

The Texas Constitution provides for the office of county treasurer; however, the duties of the office are defined by statute. As the name of the position implies, these duties include receipt, custody, and disbursement of county funds.

The office of county clerk is also created by the Texas Constitution and the clerk's functions are prescribed by various statutes. The county clerk is the clerk of the county court and is the official recorder for the county. In the capacity of recorder, the county clerk is responsible for keeping all documents required or permitted to be filed with the county. The county clerk charges and collects fees for many of the recording services performed.

In 1979, the 66th Legislature by statute attempted to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant County, subject to the approval of the voters of Tarrant County. The office of county treasurer would have been merged with the office of county auditor in that county, and the duties would then have been performed by the county auditor. A subsequent attorney general opinion said

that the action was unconstitutional because it attempted to abolish by statute an office created by the constitution. Also, the Fort Worth Court of Civil Appeals affirmed a decision by a Tarrant County district court, that the legislation was unconstitutional. Against this background, in 1981 an amendment was proposed to provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties if the abolition was approved by the voters in the counties. The amendment was adopted in 1982 and the voters of the two counties have approved the abolition.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. Allowing the voters of Bexar and Collin counties to decide for themselves whether the separate elective office of county treasurer serves their needs is in the best tradition of local self-government.

2. By transferring the county treasurer's functions to the county clerk, more efficient management of county funds will be accomplished and county revenue will be saved.

3. The transfer of functions to the county clerk will retain necessary safeguards against the misapplication of county funds. The voters, by electing the county clerk, and the county auditor, by auditing county funds and approving disbursements of the funds, will continue to act as checks on the actions of the county clerk.

AGAINST:

1. The transfer of functions to the county clerk will concentrate too much authority in a single office.

2. Although county government may need streamlining and reorganization, the piecemeal approach taken by the proposed amendment is not the answer. A thorough, statewide study should precede any attempt

to alter the constitutional framework of local government.

3. The financial duties of the county treasurer and the duties of the county clerk relating to the collection of fees for many of the clerk's services are incompatible and should not be vested in a single officer.

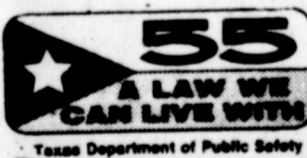

J.V. Plays Good Game Thursday October 18th Accident

The Junior Varsity's of Cisco and Eastland High School battled in Cisco Thursday night to an 8-0 finish with Eastland coming out victorious. Despite the score, the game was a hard fought one which was not decided until the final minute of the game.

Following the 7th and 8th grade games, the J.V.'s had to play on a very muddy field. By the end of the game the players were so covered with mud their numbers on their jerseys were almost unreadable.

During the first half of the game, neither team was able to score or to even get the ball past the opposing team's 20-yard line. Cisco managed four first downs while Eastland did not get any in the first half.

In the second half of play Cisco got five first downs and Eastland had four. Eastland also received a safety on a Cisco punt and intercepted a Cisco pass and returned it for a touchdown. Those were the only points scored in the game.

Fumbles plagued both teams with Eastland fumbling three times and losing it two, while Cisco fumbled eight times and lost three. Quarterbacks on both teams also threw one interception each.

After a scoreless first half, the first points of the game were put on the scoreboard after Cisco held Eastland from scoring eight yards out. Cisco took over possession of the ball at its own five-yard line.

Four plays later, with the ball on Cisco's nine-yard line, Cisco punter Mark McGinness received the snap from center. The snap was low and as McGinness reached down for it, his knee touched the ground in the end zone giving Eastland a safety with less than two minutes remaining in the third quarter.

Leading 2-0 in the fourth quarter, Eastland added the final points to the scoreboard when Eastland's Matthew Housson intercepted a Cisco pass at the Lobos' 36-yard line and returned it 64 yards for a touchdown. Eastland quarterback Calvin Golden tried to add two extra points to the score but he was stopped short of the goal, leaving the score 8-0 with 4:23 left in the game.

Cisco recovered an Eastland fumble at Cisco's 39-yard line and proceeded to return it downfield to Eastland's 14-yard line in eight plays, picking up three first downs. With only 54 seconds remaining in the game, Cisco fumbled the ball and Eastland recovered.

All that remained was for Eastland to run out the clock which showed 46 seconds.

Seventh Grade Beats Eastland

8-6, Eighth Grade Wins 14-0

Cisco's 7th and 8th grade teams both defeated the visiting teams from Eastland Thursday evening at Chesley Field. Both games were played on a muddy field which became progressively in worse condition as the games, and rains, continued.

The Cisco 7th grade won an 8-6 victory while the Cisco 8th grade shut out Eastland 14-0.

In the eighth grade game, Cisco rolled up 176 yards of total offense holding Eastland to less than 20 yards.

Neither team was able to score in the first quarter or in the second half of play. Both Cisco scores were made in the second quarter.

The first touchdown was a 16 yard run by Brady Brock with 3:31 left in the second quarter. Quarterback Doug Witt kept the ball for an unsuccessful try for two points, leaving the score 6-0-0.

On the ensuing kick-off, Cisco's Witt kicked a short onside kick which he recovered at Eastland's 49-yard line. A couple of plays later, Witt hit Paul Flores for a 47 yard touchdown pass play. Cisco converted for two extra points making the score 14-0-0.

Offensive linemen standouts for Cisco were John Clark, Philip Shackelford, and Scott Stuart.

Defensive Cisco standouts were Brady Brock, Kody Wallace, Keith Davis, Davin Hohertz, Gary Byars, and Larry Fields.

In the seventh grade game, Cisco scored first on a 47 yard pass from quarterback Matt Goosen to David Zell in the second quarter.

Lance Moore gained the extra points on the conversion play to give Cisco an 8-0-0 lead.

Eastland came back and scored a touchdown of their own in the second quarter. But, on their try for two extra points, Cisco held them out of the end zone to maintain a Cisco lead of 8-0-6.

Neither team was able to score any other points during the game but both Cisco's offense and defense did a great job.

Matt Goosen led the offense with 66 yards rushing and Lance Moore had 30 yards. David Zell caught two other passes, besides the touchdown pass, which were for eight yards each.

Coach Bob Keyes and his staff took a squad of some 70 men to Lubbock for the game, which was played on a soggy field. The squad arrived back home at 3 a.m. Friday.

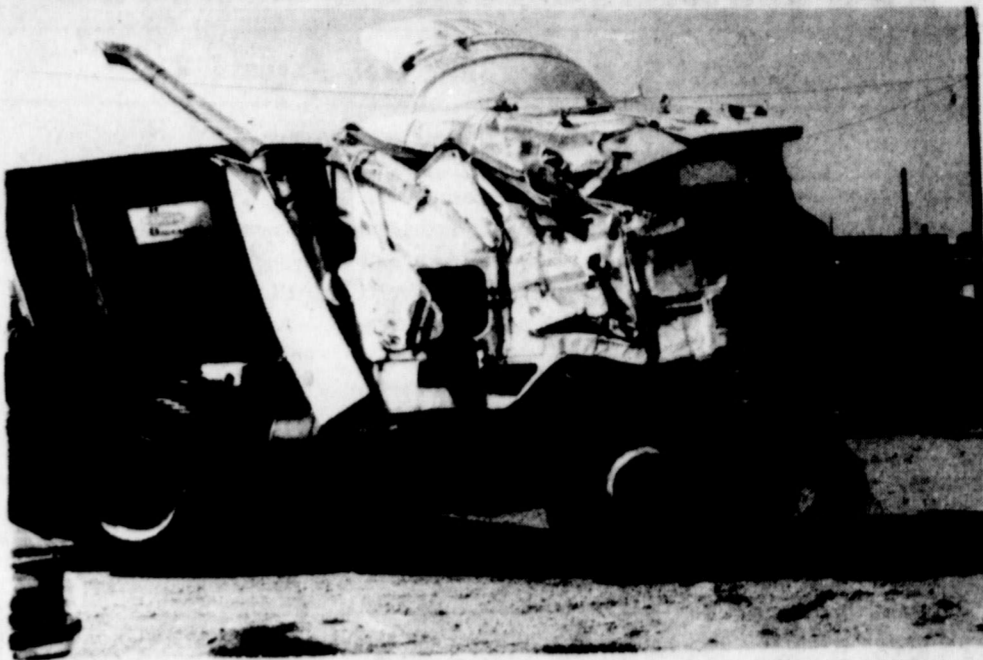

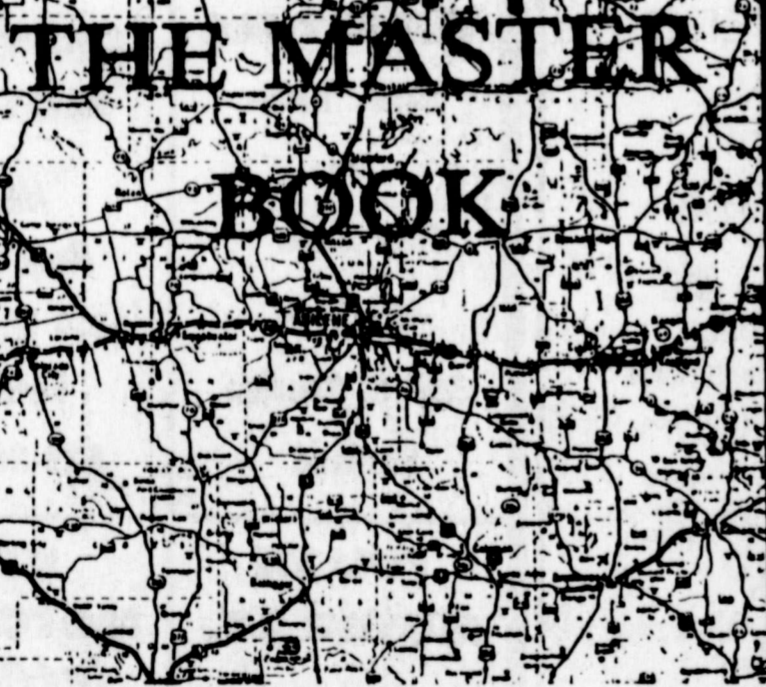

Frequently, I am asked for a family budget. Actually, it's very difficult to tell any family how much they should spend on food, clothing, shelter, transportation and other items, because all families are different.

Family budgeting might be easier if there were some simple guidelines for spending money.

Financial counselors at some of the non-profit consumer credit counseling services have developed a simple, easy to understand system called the 25 percent budget.

While using this set of budget guidelines may not be helpful to every family, it does provide a benchmark, especially for those who are not budgeting at all and may be experiencing some financial difficulty.

To make this budget work, you divide your monthly take home pay into four equal parts. Assign 25 percent for housing, 25 percent for food, 25 percent for monthly loan payments and 25 percent for everything else.

Allowing 25 percent for housing, including taxes and if possible, utilities, means you won't exceed one week's take home pay for housing costs.

Allow 25 percent for food, including groceries, children's luncheons, and other meals away from home.

Allow 25 percent for monthly payments on everything you are buying on time, such as a car, furniture, television, appliances, home improvements or credit card charges.

The final 25 percent should cover everything else like savings, insurance, education, recreation, contribution, child care, personal expenses and emergencies.

The percentages in each budget category are flexible. For example, some families may spend 30-35 percent on housing. This means that each of the other parts of the budget will have to be reduced.

But no matter how you divide up your take-home income, your expenses will have to add up to 100 percent.

Anyway you prepare it, chicken is a family favorite. If you are tired of your "same ol'" casseroles, then bake my recipe, for Chicken-Vegetable Pot Pie. It's delicious and all you need is a green salad to go with it for a delicious meal.

CHICKEN-VEGETABLE POT PIE

1 (2 1/2 to 3 pound) broiler-fryer

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

4 to 4 medium potatoes, pared

5 stalks celery

1/2 pound carrots

1 (17 oz.) can English peas

1/2 cup all purpose flour

1 cup milk

1 chicken-flavored bouillon cube

2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

Pastry for a double-crust 4-inch pie

Place chicken, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, and water to cover in a Dutch oven. Bring to a boil; cover and simmer 1 hour or until tender. Remove chicken from broth; cool. Remove chicken from bone, and cut into bite-size pieces.

Cut potatoes, celery, and carrots into 1-inch chunks. Place in broth; simmer until tender. Drain vegetables, reserving 3 cups broth. Combine chicken, potatoes, celery, carrots, and peas; spoon into a 13x9x2 inch pan.

Melt butter in a heavy saucepan over low heat; add flour, stirring until smooth. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Gradually stir in milk, 3 cups chicken broth, and bouillon cube, cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and bubbling. Stir in 2 teaspoons salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Pour the sauce evenly over chicken-vegetable mixture.

Prepare pastry; roll to fit 13x9x2 inch pan. Place crust over chicken mixture; cut 4 to 6 small slits in crust to allow steam to escape. Bake at 400° for 45 to 55 minutes or until crust is golden brown. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

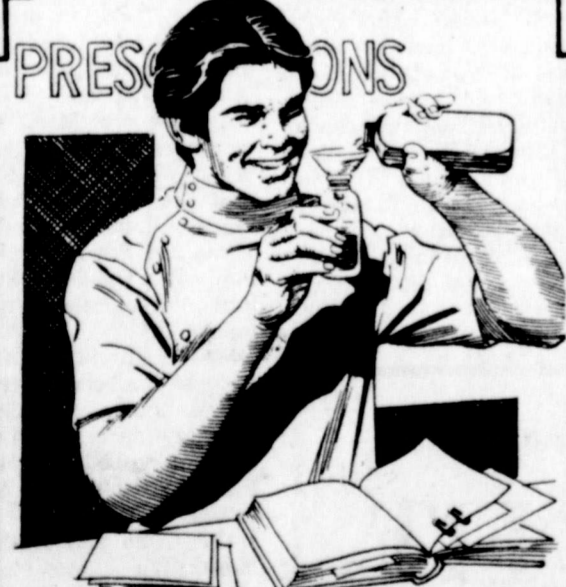

Drilling Bits

Stephens County's Jackson Field gained a new producer when Jackson Oil Co. of Ranger completed the No. 21 Robert Jackson, seven miles south of Caddo. The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 18 barrels per day. It was taken to a 1,782-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn Formation, 1,706 to 1,761 feet into the hole. The operation is in a 160-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

A wildcat gas producer has been brought on line in Stephens County, with Shilleagh Corp. of Wichita Falls as the operator. Located seven miles southeast of Wayland, the well is in a 232-acre lease in the HT&B Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Frasier.

Rob-Joe Oil Co. of Ranger has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Jackson Field. The No. 18 Robert Jackson "H" showed potential to make eight barrels of oil per day. The operator has 320 acres leased, with drillsites in Stephens County's T&PRR Survey, eight miles south of Caddo.

The well will produce from an interval in the Strawn Formation, 1,722 to 1,750 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,790 feet.

Sun Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene has revealed plans to drill five developmental wells in the Stephens Regular Field. The operator has 5,113 acres leased, with drillsites in the TE&L Survey and the SPRR

A gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Robertson Field, with Sun Exploration & Production of Houston as the operator. Located 14 miles north and two miles west of Ranger, the well is in the HT&B Survey, A-318. It is designated as the No. 3 J.M. Griffin.

On a 16/64 choke, it flowed 765,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 2,550,000 CF on absolute open flow. The well bottomed at 3,650 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,353 to 3,360 feet into the hole.

Eastland County's Snow Field gained a new producer when Hilco Petroleum completed the No. 1 Easter four miles east of Cisco.

The well indicated ability to pump 25 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 3,910-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Ranger Formation, 3,542 to 3,546 feet into the wellbore. The operation is in the H&TC Survey, A-919.

A 3,750-ft. wildcat well is planned by Natural Production of Dallas at a drillsite one-half mile south of Cisco, Eastland County. The location is in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-250. Well's designation is the No. 1 Claborn "67".

At a location one mile south and three miles west of Romney, Sentinel Petroleum has finalized a new oil producer in the Eastland Regular Field. The well is designated as the No. 1 Spencer "A", pumping oil at the rate of 19 barrels daily. Location is in the W.P.

Northridge Corp. of Duncanville has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 D.E. Benhoff, a 4,000-ft. wildcat well two miles north and one mile east of Eastland. Location is in a 195-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, A-2042.

A 3,000-ft. developmental well is planned by AFN Energy of Abilene at a drillsite one mile northeast of Sabanno, Eastland County. The location is in a 133-acre lease in the D. Pullock Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 G.T. Dawkins. It is in the Eastland Regular Field.

Clyde Petroleum of Breckenridge has filed for permit to drill the No. 203 North Pioneer Unit, a 2,600-ft. developmental well two miles north of Pioneer. Location is in a 1,731-acre lease in the Eastland Regular Field, George Click Survey, A-52.

A Berger-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Frank Snodgrass, a developmental well to be located one mile south and one mile east of Sabanno. With projected total depth of

3,800 feet, the well is in a 100-acre lease in Eastland County's Theo Jireh Field, W.R. Burgess Survey, A-25. The operator is Hutch Petroleum.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 1 Shawver, a 600-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be located one mile south and three miles west of Nimrod in a two-acre lease in the A. Burnley Survey, A-11. The operator is Rising Star Oil & Gas of Ft. Worth.

The No. 2 Taff has been finalized by T-Square Petroleum.

It is a developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field, one mile east of Pioneer. Drillsite is in the ETRR Survey, A-1894.

Daily potential of one barrel was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 2,541-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations in the Caddo Formation, 2,387 to 2,394 feet into the wellbore.

Hutch Petroleum of Borger has revealed plans to drill three 3,800-ft. developmental wells in the Theo Jireh Field. The operator has 330 acres leased, with drillsites in

A 4,000-ft. wildcat well is planned by Kelly Oil of Wichita Falls at a drillsite one mile southeast of Leeray, Eastland County. The location is in a 160-acre lease in the W.C. Sartos Survey, A-1077. Well's designation is the No. 1 Throp.

- Eat a diverse diet, with emphasis on reducing fats and increasing fiber-containing foods.
- Practice moderation when drinking alcoholic beverages.
- Watch closely for changes in moles on the

- Protect against unnecessary exposure to pesticides, chemicals in the workplace and various
- X-rays.
- Get help, when needed, to cope with stressful situations.

There is a lot of interest in the cow-calf clinic that will be at the Eastland Auction barn Wednesday, October 31. This should be one of the best beef cattle programs we have had in Eastland County in a long time. All the topics to be covered should be beneficial to cattlemen. The topics include a panel of buyers to evaluate calves, winter feed requirements, new management products, up-date on brucellosis program, and market trends and outlook.

In addition to all the good information there will be a free barbecue lunch, thanks to a number of sponsors in Eastland, Stephens, and Palo Pinto Counties. We owe Lloyd and David Coan a big thanks for hosting this event and providing cattle for the program.

Dairymen in Eastland County will be interested in a Texas Dairy Short Course to be held in Stephenville on Thursday, November 1. The short course will start at 10 a.m. and will conclude by 3:00 p.m. The meeting place will be the Holiday Inn on Highway 377 in Stephenville. Some of the topics to be discussed are Feeding and Managing the High Producing Dairy Herd, Effective Mastitis Management of the Milking Herd, and Reproductive Management of the Dairy Herd.

Cattlemen should be alert to prevent acorn poisoning in their animals.

Acorn poisoning generally occurs when animals fall prematurely while they are still green. In past years, numerous cases of poisoned cattle from eating excessive quantities of acorns have been reported by Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories.

Most cattle like acorns and tend to seek them out. Eating excessive quantities can cause death. The quantity tolerated by an animal is influenced by the protein content of its diet, with higher protein permitting the consumption of more acorns without poisoning symptoms.

Animals affected by acorn poisoning have a lack of appetite, appear dull, become constipated and suffer weight loss. They also pass blood in the feces and may bleed from the nostrils. Profuse diarrhea may follow constipation. Affected animals drink large amounts of water and urinate excessive amounts of clear urine.

Many animals go down after three to seven days of symptoms. If animals do not die, they will require two to three weeks of recovery. Ranchers suspecting a problem or noting symptoms should contact a veterinarian as early as possible.

Treatment is of little value in severely affected animals. However, giving calcium hydroxide and increasing the protein content of the

diet may help. Protein, usually in the form of cottonseed meal, combines with toxic elements in acorns, making less of the toxic principle available to animals.

A feeding containing 54 percent cottonseed meal, 30 percent dehydrated alfalfa leaf meal, 6 percent vegetable oil and 10 percent calcium hydroxide (hydrated lime) has prevented oak poisoning when fed daily to cattle. This supplement can be fed in loose form in troughs at the rate of about 4 pounds per head per day for adult cattle. Where possible, remove cattle from access acorns.

Of course, acorn poisoning can be prevented by removing cattle from areas with oak and acorns during the time they have recently fallen. Try to reserve these pastures for late fall or winter grazing. If any animals are suspected of poisoning, remove other animals until a diagnosis can be made.

Charged With Perjury

A Ranger man, who was to be a witness for the state in the Richard Gaeta capital murder trial and then charged his testimony, was charged with aggravated perjury Thursday.

Thomas Eugene Dawson, 36, was arrested in Ranger by Eastland County Sheriff Johnnie Morren, and is in Eastland County Jail under \$10,000 bond set by Lois Holder, Cisco Justice of the Peace.

According to Morren, Dawson reportedly signed a statement some time ago detailing his knowledge of the defendant's part in G.J. Carter's murder.

During testimony, however, Dawson took the witness stand and testified that threats had been made against his family to force him to sign the statement.

Dawson's wife, who had also signed a statement before the trial, during the trial said she did not remember the information to which she had attested.

She did, however, admit she signed the statement.

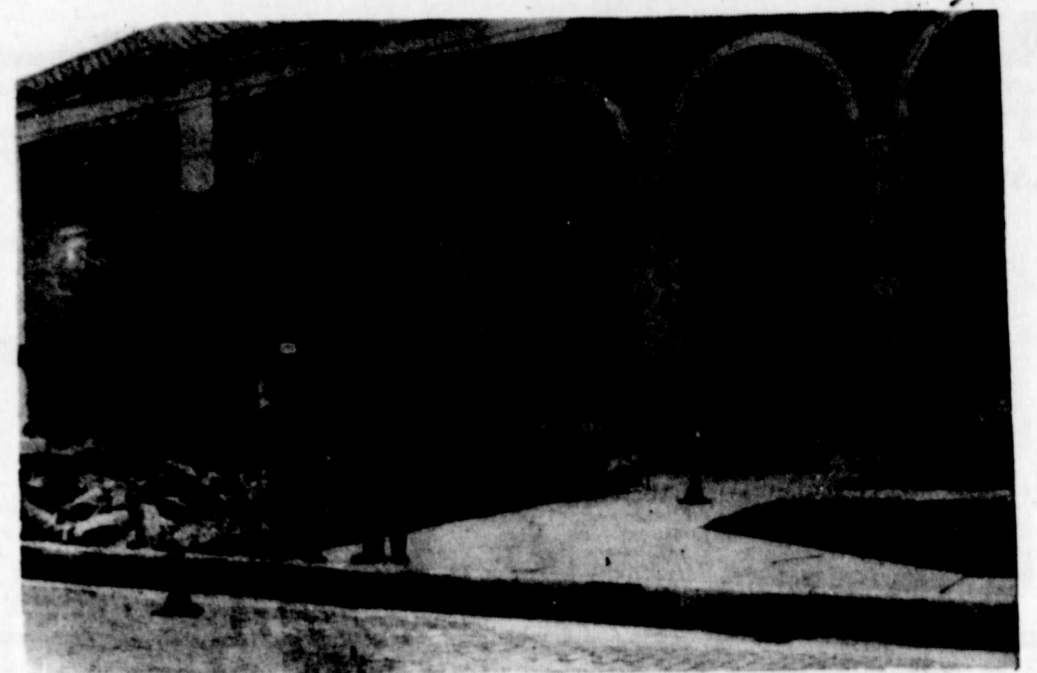
