Large Turn-Out Forecast For General Election

A large turn-out has been forecast for the general election in Cisco, Eastland County, Texas, and the nation Tuesday, Nov. 6, when voters will fill public office vacancies from the precinct to the national levels. Between 5,000 and 6,000 votes are expected to be cast in Eastland County, and Cisco voters are expected to number 800 to 1,000, according to forecasts. Considerable interest has been shown in this year's election at all levels. Precinct Chairman Tom Autrey reported Friday that everything was in readiness for Cisco area (Precinct 4)

residents to vote from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Corral Room of Hotel Laguna. Some 15 workers will be on hand to handle the election. Mr. Autrey said they would have three counting tables in an effort to keep up with vote totaling. County Clerk Joann Johnson reported that a total of 9,500 ballots were printed for the election. Precinct chairmen were to gather at her office at 2:30 p.m. Saturday for a school on election rules and regulations. Ballots and election supplies were to be issued to the chairmen at the school.

Mrs. Johnson reported that a total of 580 absentee ballots had been cast through 5 p.m. Thursday, one day before the deadline. This was a record high for the county in absentee voting, indicating considerable interest in the election, Mrs. Johnson said. Eastland County has some 12,000 registered voters, and some 1,800 voters are qualified in the Cisco area, it was reported. A 45 per cent turn-out would be the largest ever for the county, Mrs. Johnson believe. The county had 320 absentee votes in the presidential election of 1980. The election ballot lists a

full slate of candidates under the Democratic Party column, five offices with candidates under the Republican party column, and one Independent Candidate. There is also a Write-In column. Listed as candidates under the Democratic Party column are: President and vice-president, Walter Mondale and Geraldine A. Ferraro; U.S. Senate, Lloyd Doggett; U.S. House District 17, Charles W. Stenholm; Railroad Commissioner, Mack Wallace; Chief Justice Supreme Court, John L. Hill; Justice Supreme Court,

Place 1, Franklin S. Spears and Place 2, C.L. Ray; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, Sam H. Clinton, Place 2, W.C. Davis and Place 3, Bill White; State Senator, Bob Glasgow; State Representative, Jim Parker; Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 11th District, Place 1, Raleigh Brown; District Judge, 91st District, Jim R. Wright; sheriff, Don Underwood; County Tax Assessor-Collector, Nancy Trout. Each precinct will have different candidates under the Democratic Party for constable and justice of the

peace where vacancies occur. In Precinct 4, the Cisco area, Ted Parrish is listed as the constable candidate, and J.V. Heyser is listed as the Justice of the Peace candidate. Jasper Cook is an announced write-in candidate. Under the Republican Party, listings are as follows: President and vice-president, Ronald Reagan and George Bush; U.S. Senator Phil Gramm; Railroad Commissioner, John T. Henderson; Chief Justice Supreme Court, John L. Bates; and Judge Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, Virgil E. Mullanax. Under the Independent

Party, listed is Lyndon H. LaRouche for president and Billy M. Davis for vice president. Mrs. Johnson said that new election laws relieve election workers from counting any write-in votes except for those who are announced candidates. She said that a notice would be posted at the polling places about any Write-In Candidates. The bottom half of the ballot lists eight proposed changes in the state constitution. Q: Does the balloting on Nov. 6 conclude the general

election? A: It does for all races except the presidency and vice presidency. Those are determined not by the popular vote, but by the Electoral College. The votes of the electors will be opened in Washington on Jan. 7, 1985. Electors from each state cast all of their votes for one party's ticket, depending on which one received the highest popular vote in the state. Texas has 29 electoral votes; a candidate must get 270 votes to be elected.

Goodfellows Organizing Here For Christmas Season

bad luck" when things just do not seem to be going right. Maybe there are not enough funds to do the things

you would like to do or buy the things you would like to buy. For some people, those

feelings are not just every once in a while but they are felt almost all year around and especially during the

holiday season. It might not be they do not work, but maybe they are just continually butting their heads against a wall when it comes to stretching their

paychecks to meet their monthly bills. This year they will have an organization to turn to in the form of the Goodfellows. Newly organized in Cisco, Goodfellows will be trying to make Christmas brighter for those who are sick, out of work, out of luck, poor or just do not have any money. During the past three years, the Kiwanis club of Cisco has delivered baskets of food and toys to needy families. This year applications for food baskets will be

made to the Goodfellows, who will be taking donations and buying the food, which will be distributed by volunteers from the Kiwanis club. Letters of request for help from any family in Cisco are invited for review by the Goodfellows Board of Directors. The letters of request must be accompanied by an official Goodfellows application which may be picked up at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office, 619 Conrad Hilton Avenue. Goodfellows also request that families more fortunate than the destitute contribute funds to help those families in need who can not help themselves. The local organization has filed for a tax exempt status so contributions will be tax deductible. All letters seeking aid should contain the complete mailing address of the person requesting help and the telephone number, if the family has a telephone. Letters should be mailed to Goodfellows of Cisco, Box 1072, Cisco, Texas 76437. All requests for aid must also include one of the application forms. Letters of request will be accepted through December 10, 1984. The Goodfellows have already received \$900 in donations this year, but much more is needed if they are to provide very many families with food. The Goodfellows will mainly concentrate their help in the area of food baskets. All solicitation for funds will be made through The Cisco Press and everyone is urged to donate to this worthy cause. The money you donate will be used to help the needy of our community. The Goodfellows have stated they have a responsibility to contributors to spend the money wisely and aid as many persons as possible. Donations may be mailed to The Cisco Press, or given to one of the directors. A donor list will be published in The Press listing donors and their contributions. Anyone wishing to remain anonymous will be listed as such upon request. All checks are to be made payable to: Goodfellows Fund of Cisco. Goodfellows will have 12 directors and 10 of those were named here Wednesday night. They are Linton Batteas, Gilbert Garces, Herrel Hallmark, James Jones, Gene Kinser, Allen Masters, Debora Moore, Stanley Pirtle, Randy Speegle, and Oscar Weeks. The following officers were also elected by the Goodfellows: Stanley Pirtle, president; James Jones, executive vice president and secretary; Herrel Hallmark, vice president and public relations; and Allen Masters, vice president and treasurer. Everyone in Cisco is asked to please help their fellow man who might not be as lucky as they are during the holidays. Goodfellows are hoping that there will be as much generosity in Cisco this year as there is need.

Traditions Is Now Open

A new atmosphere may be felt inside the building which formerly housed Pitt Grill along IH-20 in Cisco, since new owners Bobby and Rita Fink have done extensive remodeling and opened a restaurant called Traditions. An expansion is also planned for the facility. Located at 302 East IH-20, Traditions will be open from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and from

6 a.m. to 10 p.m., Friday through Sunday. Friday and Saturday night closing times might be later, depending upon how busy the restaurant is at 10 p.m. The Finks are planning to add a new dining room which should be completed in about three weeks, depending upon the weather. The addition will seat approximately 40 people and will measure 20 x 38. Presently the restaurant

seats 56 people, so the addition will almost double the serving capacity. At the present time, Traditions will be serving from a menu but in the future they hope to be able to offer daily specials. A salad bar is also available in the restaurant and it is located inside an old, antique bathtub. Future plans, besides the extensions, call for pictures of the past in Cisco to be framed and placed on a wall in the restaurant which has the name of the restaurant lettered upon it. Also, the traditions theme will be carried out in the new dining room with different settings disolved to represent dif-

ferent countries. Traditions hamburgers will offer 7 ounces of all-meat patties. All meats will be breaded at the restaurant and there are also homemade pies being offered, which are baked by Donna Gerhardt. The Finks expressed appreciation to members of both their families who have helped out with the remodeling and to "get things going." They also expressed appreciation to Frank Spangler, Jr., of Cisco, who did the lettering at the restaurant, as well as the artwork on the menus and the printing of the menus.

Jim Ned scored their only touchdown of the game with 4:10 left in the third quarter. A run of three yards gained the touchdown and Jim Ned also picked up the extra points on a run for a score of 14-to-8.

Cisco's record for the season is 1-7-1. Offensive standouts for Cisco included Kevin Kirk, Brian Wagnon, Chris Ledbetter, Lonnie Pevey and Curtis Taylor.

Defensive standouts for Cisco was the whole defensive team according to Coach Stephen Young. He said the defense played a "real good game."

Cisco gained approximately 100 yards total offense while holding Jim Ned close to 110 yards.

Homemaking Hints County Extension Agent Janet Thomas

The Consumer Product Safety Commission is warning parents that the antique crib or hand-me-down high chair that was bought at the neighborhood garage sale might be hazardous to infants.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission states that newer products are generally much safer than older-cribs, playpens, and high chairs now stored away in attics and garages.

As a general rule, the Safety Commission recommends that if a crib is more than 10 yrs. old, throw it out. The agency estimates that unsafe nursery equipment caused 90,700 infant injuries and 177 deaths last year, and about 1,300 fatalities since 1973. Of the 177 infant fatalities, 129 deaths in 1983 were attributed to faulty cribs alone.

The commission suggested that parents look for these safety features when purchasing nursery equipment:

Cribs: slats should be 2 3/8 inches apart or less; head and footboard without cutouts or finials; mattresses that fit securely, quality construction for durability.

Dropside Mesh Crib & Playpens: Mesh netting with holes less than one-fourth inch; a label warning users not to leave side down so child does not become entangled in mesh and suffocate.

Baby Walkers and Strollers: Stable products with a wide base so they will not tip over; protective covers for coil springs and joints; stroller seat belts to secure the child.

Toy Chests: Products that are equipped with a lid support device and the toy chest must be well ventilated.

Highchairs: Chairs that are stable and have a seat belt that fastens around the child and a crotch strap to prevent slipping under the tray.

Baby Gates and Expandable Enclosures: Avoid the scissor-like, expanding gates and corrals.

- All voters should have a right to elect the Judges of our statewide courts, not just those who vote in the primary elections. Traditionally these Judges have been elected in the Democrat Primary.

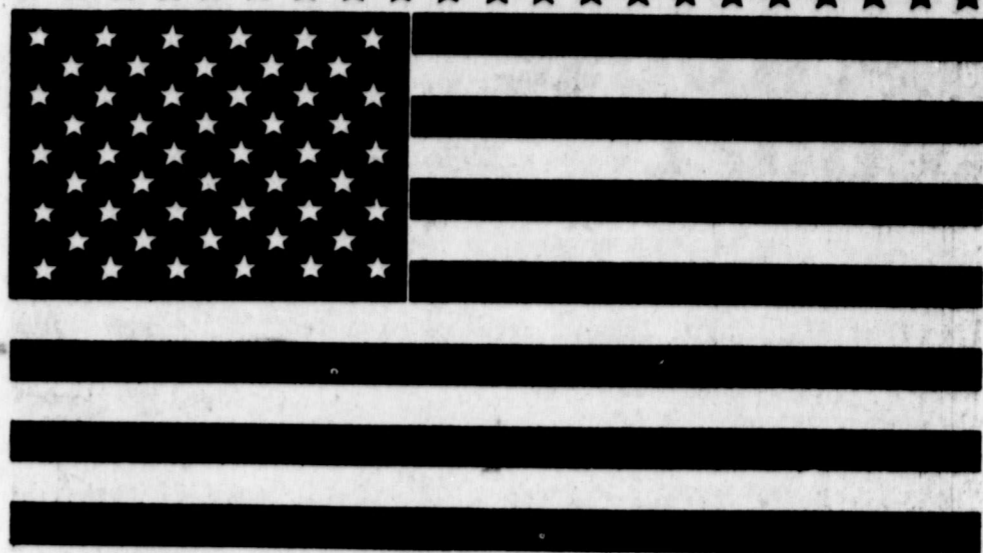
Eastland Co.

Eastland's check for \$90.68 represents 15% of \$604.55 total city tax revenue.

The 32nd annual Eastland County Pecan Show is about one month from now December 7 and 8. That means you need to be selecting some of your best pecans to put back for the pecan show. Any grower in the area may submit entries to the show. No entry limit per exhibitor is made, but participants are limited to one entry of each named variety they grow. The grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he wishes. The exhibitor must be the grower.

the basement of the county courthouse. Plant parasitic nematodes represent a distinct hazard to plant health and crop productivity in soils where their populations reach critical levels. Now, or immediately after fall harvest, is the best time for homeowners and farmers to obtain representative soil samples for submission to the Plant Nematode Detection Laboratory located at College Station.

A minimum 43 pecans are necessary for each entry. This sample of 43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. Mixed samples—more than one variety in an entry—are disqualified.

Soil samples obtained during winter months or during early spring will likely not be indicative of the true nematode numbers in the soil. This may result in an inaccurate nematode analysis.

The grower may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement.

nematodes, being biological organisms, are sensitive to extremes of temperature and moisture. Nematode numbers are highest close to plant roots and populations will be most representative if several soil samples are obtained.

A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 Choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one Choctaw entry.

Several soil samples from representative areas may be combined so that one or more subsamples can be obtained. By sampling now, or immediately after fall harvest, a client will have enough time to fumigate before spring planting should test results indicate control is necessary.

Nuts should be free of dust, first, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed to the extent that shape or color is altered.

Soil samples should be taken 4-6 inches below the soil surface but close to plant roots. The sample should be transferred to a plastic bag for shipment to the laboratory. Soil that is excessively wet or excessively dry will not give accurate results. The sample should be kept from extremes of temperature and do not expose soil sample to direct sunlight.

Discolored shells and kernels may result from peeling pecans from the shucks too early. Pecans must be from the 1983 crop and are judged on the basis of size (number per pound), appearance, and shell color. Kernel quality is also important and is based on the percent kernel (as relative to shell), color, general appearance, texture and taste.

All entries must be turned in to the County Extension office by 4:00 p.m. Thursday, December 6 to be eligible for judging. The County Extension office is located in

A gas producer has been brought on line in Eastland County's Marsan Field, with Morrison Energy as the operator.

Located eight miles west of Gorman, the well is in the A.C. Williams Survey, A-1985. It is designated as the No. 3-1 Riddle Unit.

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AMENDMENTS

By Senator Bob Glasgow

AMENDMENT NO. 7—"THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT RELATING TO THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE STATE COMMISSION ON JUDICIAL CONDUCT AND THE AUTHORITY AND PROCEDURE TO DISCIPLINE ACTIVE JUDGES, CERTAIN RETIRED AND FORMER JUDGES, AND CERTAIN MASTERS AND MAGISTRATES OF THE COURTS."

The proposed amendment changes the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, adds to the list of judicial officials subject to the commission's disciplinary authority, and expands the types of conduct that may be the basis of a complaint to the commission.

BACKGROUND
The State Commission on Judicial Conduct considers complaints against certain judicial officials and either takes action itself or recommends action to the supreme court. The proposed amendment makes the following changes:

(1) eliminates one of the two positions on the commission for courts of appeals

justices and one of the two positions on the commission for district judges and assigns those positions to one municipal court judge and one county court at law judge;

(2) deletes the requirements that the commission member representing the justices of the peace be selected from a list submitted by the Justice of the Peace and Constable Association;

(3) expands the reasons for which a judge may be disciplined to include incompetence or willful violation of supreme court rules or the Code of Judicial Conduct;

(4) provides for immediate suspension without pay for a judge charged with a misdemeanor involving official misconduct;

(5) includes masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges subject to current assignment in the group of judicial officials subject to disciplinary action by the commission;

(6) allows the commission to issue private or public admonitions, warnings, and reprimands, or to require

that the person obtain additional training or education; (7) establishes a review tribunal of seven justices of the court of appeals to review the commission's decisions with the review tribunal decision appealable to the supreme court under the substantial evidence rule; and (8) allows the judicial officer the right to discovery after formal proceedings are filed.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:
1. Changing the membership on the commission would make the commission more representative of the judicial officials it disciplines.

2. Including masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges subject to assignment makes those persons subject to the same sanctions as other judges in the state.

AGAINST:
1. With an increased list of possible complaints, the disciplinary system will be easier to abuse with frivolous complaints.

2. The additional complaints will require more staff and commission work which increases the costs to the state.

AMENDMENT NO. 8—"THE CONSTITUTIONAL

AMENDMENT TO PROVIDE A PER DIEM FOR MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE EQUAL TO THE MAXIMUM DAILY AMOUNT ALLOWED BY FEDERAL LAW AS A DEDUCTION FOR ORDINARY AND NECESSARY BUSINESS EXPENSES INCURRED BY A STATE LEGISLATOR."

The proposed constitutional amendment replaces the existing per diem payment of \$30 for members of the legislature when the legislature is in session with a provision tying the amount of the per diem payment to the maximum daily federal income tax deduction allowed for a state legislator's expenses.

BACKGROUND

Under the Texas Constitution, a member of the legislature receives a salary of \$600 a month during the

entire term to which he is elected. When the legislature is meeting, a member's responsibilities and expenses may reasonably be expected to be much greater than at other times during his or her term. The per diem payment is an additional compensation granted during a legislative session to help offset those additional demands and expenses. The payment provided has been set at \$30 a day since April 22, 1975.

The amount of the per diem under the proposed constitutional amendment would not be permanently fixed. It would be determined every year on January 1 according to the maximum deduction allowed under federal income tax law for a state legislator's ordinary and necessary business expenses for each day the legislature meets.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. The per diem allowance of \$30 adopted in 1975 does not begin to adequately reimburse a member of the legislature for the costs incurred in maintaining two residences during a legislative session. Significant inflation has occurred since 1975, and the cost of living in Austin has increased dramatically as well.

2. Tying the amount of the per diem to the federal income tax deduction allowed for a state legislator ensures that the amount will always be reasonable, reflecting higher or lower costs generally incurred by a legislator because of changes in the economy. It would also eliminate the need to keep adjusting the amount of the per diem through the costly constitutional amendment process.

AGAINST:

The per diem allowance

granted under existing law is satisfactory to offset ordinary living expenses during a legislative session.

per diem to federal law is too indefinite. The state has no control over the amount of the federal allowance.

Green Thumb Employs 1,000 In 109 Texas Counties

More than 50 representatives from government, agriculture, and social service organizations participated recently in all-day tour of project sites that utilize workers from the Green Thumb senior employment program.

Green Thumb employs more than 1,000 rural, low-income persons aged 55 and over, in 109 counties across the state. Sponsored by Texas Farmers Union, Green Thumb has been in operation in Texas since 1970. Green Thumb enrollees are placed with non-profit organizations such as libraries, schools, senior centers, and municipalities to provide services that might not otherwise be available. This year's tour will include stops in Elgin at the Adult Day Health Services Center; Doak Springs Senior Center; Doak Springs; Fayette County Fairgrounds, LaGrange; and the Combined Community Action Program in Smithville. Each of these organizations utilize the abilities of Green Thumb workers to assist in providing needed services for their rural communities.

Food Stamp Users Will Get More Benefits

The 1.3 million Texas participating in the Food Stamp program will receive increased benefits beginning November 1st, it was announced today by Martin Dukler, Deputy Commissioner for Programs of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Dukler said the increase in food stamp allotments will average about \$3 a month for a four-person household. Allotments vary with size of households and family income.

Authority to increase the allotments is contained in a joint Congressional resolution passed October 12, 1984, and signed the same day by President Reagan.

The increase will provide an additional \$12,000,000 in benefits to Texas annually, Dukler said. The food stamp program is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered by the various states.

WTU Customers Paying Less Than State Average

West Texas Utilities Co. residential customers are paying slightly less than the state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.74, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows. For 500 kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residential customers was 1,020 Kwh in September in 1983 and 701 Kwh in October 1983.

The survey included 19 utilities, among which were 10 investor-owned companies. Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Co., which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 Kwh. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 Kwh.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome of a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to a PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

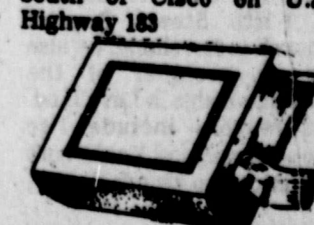

CISCO AND THE Mobley Hilton are going to be on television again. KTAB, Channel 32, Abilene (or 7 on the cable), sent Big Country Reporter Rusty Rhodes and a filming crew to Cisco last Tuesday for a story about the old hotel.

YOU'LL BE GOING to the polls on Tuesday to take part in the presidential election and to vote in other contests from the precinct level up through county, district and state. And there are 8 proposed changes in the state constitution for you to consider.

We're inclined to vote in favor of the first seven—No. 1 gives state banks the same rights as national banks, No. 2 allows all state universities to share in the Permanent University Fund, No. 3 deals with payment of benefits to survivors of public servants killed in the line of duty, No. 4 abolishes the county treasurer's post in two counties, No. 5 allows the senate to designate a lieutenant governor in the event of a vacancy, No. 6 permits schools to deal with mutual insurance companies as well as stock companies, and No. 7 provides a discipline procedure for judges.

We're going to vote against No. 8, which raises the expense per diem for members of the legislature from \$30 per day to the maximum allowed by IRS. This per diem is paid while the legislature is in session. At \$30 per day, a legislator draws \$900 per month and he should be able to eat and sleep anywhere for that amount. The IRS maximum would increase this amount to some \$2,500 per month.

A 17-YEAR OLD Denmark girl, Miss Annette Jorgensen, is enjoying life with a Cisco ranch family as an exchange student. She is a senior at Cisco High School and lives with Curt and Sue Covert and their daughter, Leslie, 16, CHS junior, at their ranch home north of Lake Cisco.

The Coverts bought the Morris White ranch three years ago and began living there on weekends. They're from Dallas where he is a vice president of Texas Distributors, Inc., heating and air conditioning equipment jobbers.
