

## Front Produces Freezing Weather and Snow Here

Record low temperatures were experienced in the Cisco area this week as a cold front moved in late Wednesday and early Thursday morning. Freezing temperatures and snow were produced by the front which was expected to last through Sunday.

Sleet started falling around 3 a.m. Thursday and by dawn snow was seen blowing ahead of the gusty winds which accompanied the front, with gusts up to 25 miles per hour. By Friday morning, a couple of inches of snow had fallen in the area but roads were mostly clear since the winds kept the snow from collecting on roadways.

Where the wind was

unable to blow the snow from the surface there were drifts of snow and slick areas on the highways. Motorists were continually reminded to be careful while driving.

The high temperature for Thursday and Friday was in the middle teens and the overnight lows were between 6 and 8 degrees. The temperature was not expected to climb above freezing until Sunday.

High winds caused everything to seem colder and the wind chill factor - the feeling of cold produced by wind blowing against exposed skin on a cold day - at 8 p.m. Thursday was 29 degrees below zero, according to the National Weather Service in Abilene.

Jerry O'Bryant, with the National Weather Service, said a winter storm warning was in effect for Texas and freezing temperatures would

reach as far south as Corpus Christi and the Rio Grande Valley.

O'Bryant said the cold was not expected to leave the Big

Country until Sunday. It might creep above freezing late Saturday afternoon, he said, but it was more likely the 32-degree mark wouldn't

be breeched again until Sunday.

But before it warms up, it was expected more snow could hit the ground, O'Bryant said. A second low pressure system hovering to the west was expected to possibly send more snow to

the area Friday.

By Saturday, up to 6 inches of snow might fall, O'Bryant said.

Cold weather and bad driving conditions caused the closing of Cisco Public Schools, as well as others

throughout the county, although Cisco Junior College continued with classes.

Several club meetings and other activities were also cancelled on Thursday, Friday and Saturday throughout the area because of the weather.

## Weather Causes Games To Be Cancelled Friday

## Candidates For City Council May File Mon.



# 40 Years Later

We had lunch in the town of Cassino and special military services were conducted at the Abbey.

Cassino is a modern town on the Rapido River, at the foot of the mountain which the famous Abbey of Monte Cassino stands. Of Volscian origin (Casinum), it was first municipium and later a Roman colony. The town has been awarded a gold medal for military valor. On the Aussostrade del Sole motorroad, it is 112 km from Rome and 83 km from Naples.

Situated southwest of the town on the Castilina road at the foot of the mountain is an archaeological area. The Amphitheatre, dating nearly full circle ground plan; the mausoleum of Ummidia Quadrattilla, a cruciform construction of the 1st century, A.D., transformed into a church in the 10th century remains of Byzantine frescoes in the inner walls; a semicircular theatre with a diameter of over 50 m., reconstructed; remains of the Roman road and walls. Excavations continue with notable results.

Three Monumental Military Cemeteries are located here: Polish, on the Monte Cassino State Highway, English or Brit, on the S. Angelo provincial road, German, Caira locality. All of these were killed during World War II.

A great sports center is in the course of construction, which will include swimming pools, tennis courts, skating rinks, etc.

**MONTE CASSINO ABBEY**  
The Benedictine follow the rule of life dedicated by Saint Benedict of Nursia (about 480-543). His plan was that each monastery should be a separate organization, and that for the monk it should take the place of his family. The first monastery in Italy was established by Benedict at Subiaco; then came the famous foundation of Monte Cassino in 529. The order spread rapidly. It led in bringing Christianity and civilization to Western Europe during the next cen-

ture. The benediction order helped to preserve the traditions of Christianity through the Middle Ages.

The Benedictines are noted for their piety and encouragement of learning. During the Middle Ages, the neglected no branch of are or learning then know. They produced many of the books written before the invention of printing in Europe.

Monte Cassino is located between Rome and Naples. Here St. Benedict founded the Roman Catholic Benedictine order. About 529, A.D., St. Benedict sought refuge from persecution inside the ruined city of Cassino. Later, he and his followers built the monastery on a height above the city.

The Benedict order at Monte Cassino reached the heights of its influence from 1087. Abbott Desiderius, who later became Pope Victor III, ruled it during that time. The monks produced manuscripts and paintings which became famous through the world. In 1071, a magnificent new abbey church was consecrated. It was named a cathedral in 1321.

In 1886, when Italy dissolved many of its monasteries, Monte Cassino became a national monument. Its buildings held a monastery, a school for laymen, and two seminaries. The abbey's library contained an excellent of Manuscripts.

During World War II, the Allied advance was helped at Cassino and the abbey was bombraded but most of its treasures were saved. By 1952, the buildings had been rebuilt along their original lines. They put the masterpieces of the monastery on display for the public.


The Americans had never been able to launch an attack against the main and final objective. As they struggled forward toward the Monastery, the more stubborn and fanatical the Germans had become behind the

defenses of ever-increasing strength which remained as a barrier to the Abbey itself. The key point, Monastery Hill which dominated the ridges to the northeast as well as overlooking the town at the foot of the hill and whole valley beyond, had to be bombarded. Such a condition meant but one thing as far as the Allied combat troops were concerned - the Monastery with the German strong points under its wall must be destroyed by any means possible. No matter where the men of the Fifth Army were in the forward area, the building overlooked them, dominating their lives and thoughts, dictating how and when they could move because they had to answer one question first: "Can I be seen from the Monastery?"

The fighting soldiers hiding behind rocks or crouching in stone shelters had no doubts, or misgivings. Americans in the forward positions had long been convinced that the Abbey was German stronghold and had bitterly resented the embargo on any direct action against the building itself. "You can fight round the Abbey but you can't hit it."

The Germans propaganda machines had sought the plaudits of the civilized world for the measures taken by their soldiers to save priceless works of art from destruction. Later claims were announced that there were no armed German soldiers within three hundred yards of the wall, although it was stated that the Abbey still housed a few monks and a handful of refugees. How then could the British and Americans even contemplate the destruction of the ancient building, with its great religious significance, especially when the Germans claimed, it was not manned for defense and had no tactical value whatever?

In the early days of February a lot of time was spent in Headquarters Fifth



Army trying to decide whether or not to believe the Germans' claim that none of their soldiers were inside the walls of Abbey.

The simple brutal truth was that the Abbey stood on the summit of the key point at the heart of the Cassino defense. The German High Command had selected the best possible position from which to off-set the advantages the Allied possessed with their air superiority which gave complete aerial observation over the battle field.

Only from the highest vantage points on these mountains could the Germans direct artillery and mortar fire on to any part of the battle that threatened danger.

"Once the enemy had decided to include Monte Cassino in his defense system the building on its summit inevitably became a legitimate target for though the mountain might have been defended it could not have been captured without attention to its summit it is the nature of war not to be played to the whistle between white lines."

When soldiers are fighting for a just cause and are

prepared to suffer death and mutilation in the process, bricks and mortar, no matter how venerable, cannot be allowed to wear against human lives." Every good commander must consider the morale feelings of his fighting men and what is equally importance, fighting men must know that their whole existence is in the hands of a man whom they have complete confidence. How could a structure which dominated the field of battle be allowed to stand?

The Monastery had to be destroyed.

"When a choice is to be made between a valuable building and the lives of young men then there is no need for a long debate; although the Abbey stood for a belief in human dignity and individual worth. The tired American infantry men who saw the bombing cried for joy as bomb after bomb crumbled into dust.

On the afternoon of the 14th of February leaflets in propaganda shells were fired by the artillery which fell close to the Abbey.

These read:  
"Italian friends

BEWARE. We have until now been especially careful to avoid shelling the Monte Cassino Monastery. The Germans have known how to benefit from this but now the fighting had swept closer and closer to the sacred precincts. The time had come when we must train our guns on the Monastery itself. We give you warning so that you may save yourselves. We warn you urgently to leave the Monastery, leave it at once. Respect this warning. (signed: the Fifth Army).

Messages were sent by the Old Abbott to the Germans who agreed that the remaining monks and refugees should be evacuated during the night. On 15th February 226 Fortresses, Liberators, Mitchells and Mauders flew over the snow-capped mountains, and with terrifying precision dropped their bombs on the monastery. From neighboring Castellong Ridge men of the 36th watched excitedly as the great billows of smoke and flames consumed the abbey.

The roof of the Monastery was blown away and the interior of the building reduc-

ed to a shell, although the mighty walls were not split from top to bottom as had been anticipated by the experts. Inside their shelter the Abbott, his faithful band of monks, and the remaining civilians thought that death was imminent.

In terror they knelt in prayer when not only the building but the whole mountain shook as if it was in the

throes of a giant earthquake. At approximately 1:45 p.m., there was silence and the inferno seemed to be over. The Abbott and surviving monks climbed out of their shelters or caves into the open to be confronted by a terrible spectacle of utter destruction.

It was indeed a picture that proclaimed more eloquently than any words the futility of war.

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# Oil Belt News

Eastland County's Adams Field gained a new producer when the No. 3 Duffer "A" was finished by Robert E. Byrne in a lease four miles south-southeast of Ranger.

The well pumped at the rate of 65 barrels of 40-gravity crude per day on an open choke.

With drillsite in the S.N. Mathias Survey, the well probed to a 3,550-ft. bottom. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Lower Duffer Formation, 3,410 to 3,449 feet into the hole.

An undrilled Eastland County wildcat location has been abandoned about one mile north of Gorman by independent operator Nathan L. Apple. The venture had been designated as the No. 3 D.B. Warren, with total depth projected to 600 feet.

The No. 1 Hildegard, pumping 42 barrels of 42-gravity oil per day along with 82 barrels of salt water on an open choke, has been brought on line in the South Ranger Field, Eastland County.

Ridge Oil is the operator. Bottomed at 3,600 feet, the well will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,220 to 3,240 feet. Drillsite was about four miles east of Eastland.

Pumping 55 barrels of oil with 50 barrels of waste water daily on open choke, a new producer has been completed in the REB Field, Eastland County, by Northridge Corp. It is designated as the No. 1 Pougé-Eastland Unit.

Location is in a lease about one mile north of Eastland. Northridge took the well to a 3,550-ft. bottom. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,270 to 2,308 feet into the wellbore.

Wildcat drilling action is planned in Eastland County by New West Exploration about four miles east-southeast of Romney. Carrying permit for 1,400-ft. TD, the well is in a 72-acre lease in the Erath School Land Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Poe.

New West Exploration of Abilene is the operator.

The No. 4 Pearson-Poteet has been brought on line in Eastland County's REB Field, pumping 68 barrels of 41-gravity oil per day on open choke.

With Snow Oil Co. as the operator, the well was drilled to total depth of 3,890 feet and was plugged back to 3,760. Production will be from a set of Marble Falls Formation perforations 3,404 to 3,430 feet into the wellbore.

Located four miles north of Eastland, the well showed it will make 29 barrels of waste water in addition to the oil.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for an ill-fated developmental try in the Eastland Regular Field two miles west-southwest of Carbon. Designated as the No. 1 Tankersley, the well was spudded Dec. 18 and probed to a dry bottom at 3,653 feet. Schkade Brothers Inc. was the operator.

Wildcat drilling action is

scheduled in Eastland County four miles north-northwest of Cisco, with Tex-Am Petroleum as the operator. The explorer well will be known as the No. 5 Donovan. It is slated for 4,300-ft. maximum depth. It is in a 640-acre lease in the SPRR Survey A-460.

Operating out of Gilmer, Southern Oilfield Producing Co. has staked drillsite for a 1,300-ft. developmental venture in the Eastland Regular Field. The well is designated as the No. 1 John J. Cooper, with drillsite one mile southwest of Rising Star.

The operation will be in a 72-acre lease in ETRR Survey A-93.

A Cross Plains operator, Earl D. Lee, has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 R.C. Brown in the Eastland Regular Field, three miles south-southwest of Sabanno. Located in a 138-acre lease in the M.L. Smith Survey A-24, the well carries authority for 3,600 feet of hole making.

Madewell Field gained a new producer when Pend Oreille Oil and Gas completed the No. 24 Stroebel in a lease one mile northwest of Nimrod. The well showed ability to pump 18 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

The Houston-based operator took the hole to a 1,450-ft. bottom. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Cross Cut Formation, 1,355 to 1,359 feet into the wellbore.

T.L. Robertson Operating of Eastland has filed for permit to drill the 1-A Morgan, a developmental venture in the Eastland Regular Field. Located about three miles south-southwest of Carbon, the well carries authority for 1,250-ft. maximum hole. It is in a 200-acre lease in

the J.O. Bohannon Survey A-1977.

A pair of 4,200-ft. developmental wells are scheduled for spudding in the Eastland Regular Field two miles north-northeast of Cisco, with E.D. Anderson of Dallas as the operator.

The wells are designated as the No. 3 and No. 4 W.B. Wright. The operation will be in a 123-acre lease in the H&TC Survey A-942.

Pumping 65 barrels of oil per day on an open choke, the No. 2 Durham-South has been finished in Eastland County's REB Field by Snow Oil Co. of Abilene.

Location is about five miles north of Eastland. Snow took the hole to a 5-30-ft. bottom. It will pro-

duce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,494 to 3,518 feet into the hole. Oil tested at 41-gravity.

A stripper well has been finished in the Hawk-Eye Field, Eastland County, one

mile west of Romney. The well is designated as the No. 31 Delbert Tarver "A", with Ridgeway Exco Inc. as the operator.

The well was taken to a 1,110-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Adams Branch

Formation, 1050 to 1,064 feet. It indicated ability to pump three barrels of oil daily on open choke. Oil tested at 36-gravity.

Hypothermia is a very serious medical problem so be sure and keep as warm as possible. Contact your friends or relatives if you feel you are cold. For a balanced diet call 442-1557 and make a reservation for a good luncheon.



## Don't Mix Water And Electricity

Precious as they are to us, our homes are not always places of peace and safety. Every year a significant number of people are killed and suffer disabling injuries from accidents that occur in the home.

Many of those accidents could be prevented if more precaution were taken.

So often we warn our children and older people to "be careful in the bathroom and don't fall. The bathtub is slick." But there are worse things than slipping and falling that can happen to you in the bathroom. Every year an average of 20 people are electrocuted in bathtubs.

According to actual death certificates, 95 persons died in this manner in the United States from 1979 to 1982. And more than half the deaths involved hair dryers.

Many deaths occur when a plugged-in hair dryer falls into the bathtub while the victim is bathing. And more often the victim is a child. According to a recent article published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Of the 95 who

were electrocuted in bathtubs between 1979 and 1982, 19 were younger than 5 years, and 18 were 5 to 9 years old.

It's important to remember - don't leave hair dryers plugged in when they're not in use. Even with the switch off, a plugged-in hair dryer that falls into a bathtub will electrify the water and is likely to electrocute anyone in the tub.

The statistics given above illustrate just the consequence of mixing electricity and water. Yet, there are three places in the home where water and electricity must live side by side - the bathroom, the kitchen and the laundry room.

The following tips should be followed to prevent accidents in those parts of the home where plumbing and electricity are necessary companions.

-Do not place or store appliances where they can fall or be pulled into a tub or sink. Disconnect kitchen appliance cords at wall outlets, not at the appliance. A cord

removed from a coffee maker and left plugged into an outlet is energized and could be deadly if it fell into a sink filled with water.

-Never turn on an electrical appliance while standing on a wet floor. Keep the electric parts away from water.

-Don't touch plumbing or metal objects and an electrical appliance at the same time.

-Disconnect an electrical appliance that sparks or stalls.

-Follow manufacturers' instructions when operating electrical appliances or equipment.

-Pull plug, not the cord, when disconnecting appliances. Avoid kinking, twisting, binding or crushing cords.

-Unplug extension cords when they're not in use.

-Do not touch appliances or light switches when your hands are wet.

-Do not reach for an appliance that has fallen into the water. Unplug it immediately.

Remember, electricity and water are never safe companions. If you let them meet through your body, you can be in serious trouble. (Courtesy of Texas Electric Service Company)

## Valentine's Day Legends Both Secular, Christian Roots

The association of Valentine's Day with courtship and love stems from a secular, medieval legend that birds in the spring begin to pair on Feb. 14, says Dr. James Atwood, who teaches church history at Texas Christian University.

Another explanation is that the holiday originated from a pagan Roman festival called Lupercalia. The Feb. 15 rite was held to ensure protection from wolves.

Valentine's Day has also been associated with two

saints in the early Christian church named Valentine, said Atwood, though some scholars believe the two may be the same man.

The first Valentine was a priest and physician in Rome who was beheaded on Feb. 14 and buried on the Flaminian Way. One story says that the reason he was killed was that he had gone against the wishes of Emperor Claudius, who forbade young men to marry because he believed unmarried men made better soldiers. The priest was said

to have disobeyed the emperor's order and secretly married young couples.

The other Valentine was a Bishop of Terni, who lived about 60 miles from Rome and was scourged, imprisoned and then beheaded. It is said that the romans imprisoned him because he refused to worship their gods. The legend tells that Valentine was tossed notes between the bars of his cell window by the many children he had befriended.

The first mention of Valen-

tine's Day in English literature comes from the 14th Century poet Geoffrey Chaucer. In "The Parliament of Fowls," he wrote, "For this was on St. Valentine's Day, When every fowl cometh there to choose his mate."

Shakespeare also refers to the rite in "A Midsummer Night's Dream," when, upon finding two lovers in the woods, a character says, "St. Valentine is past; Begin these woodbirds but to couple now?"

Ophelia, in Shakespeare's "Hamlet," also sings:

Good morrow! 'Tis St. Valentine's Day

All in the morning bed-time,  
And I am a maid at your window,  
To be your valentine!


## Lake Proctor

## Property Managers Reveal

### Sources Of Tenants' Complaints

More than one-fourth of tenants' complaints against their property managers center around the amount of attention given to general maintenance and upkeep of property, according to professional property managers.

A survey of representatives of each of the 25 local chapters of the Texas Apartment Association was conducted by the Texas Real Estate Research Center (TRERC) at Texas A&M

University.

TRERC Research Economist Dr. Arthur Wright said the amount of promptness of the security deposit refund was the second largest source of tenants' complaints, while the claim that specific repair requests were not made quickly was the third.

Other sources of tenant complaints included noise and personality conflicts among tenants, rent increases and inadequate pest

control. Communications with the management also was a source of complaint. Specific complaints were that management was not available, not listening or not responding to tenant complaints and that the resident manager did not fully understand the owner's rules and policies.

"In general terms, more than two-thirds of the tenants' complaints were related to maintenance and repairs or interpersonal dealings with the manager and other tenants," Wright said.

## Jr. College Football Conferences Enlarged

Members of the Texas Junior College Football Conference voted unanimously to enlarge the conference to include all junior colleges in the state which have football programs.

Tyler Junior College President Raymond M. Hawkins, who is president of the TJCF, announced Monday from Austin that three schools will now be added to the conference, Cisco, Ranger and Navarro. The conference currently in-

cludes Tyler Junior College, Kilgore College, Henderson County Junior College, Blinn College and Wharton County Junior College.

"The enlarging of the conference, a new scholarship arrangement, and the adoption of the National Junior College Athletic Association's eligibility rules are expected to be positive steps toward achieving the goals of the conference. These measures will allow more students the opportunity to

participate in intercollegiate athletics at the junior college level, improve the caliber of competition and permit better scheduling among the Texas junior colleges which play football," Hawkins said.

Under the new scholarship arrangement approved on Monday, there would be no restriction on the number of players on each team's roster. However, the total financial aid provided to the student athletes by each college could not exceed the equivalent of 35 full-time scholarships per year.

## AARP Tax-Aide Program

### Provides Free Income Tax Help

AARP Tax-Aide counselors have just completed a comprehensive Tax-Aide training seminar and are now setting up counseling sites in Eastland County cities.

AARP Tax-Aide is a program designed to provide free income tax assistance for the elderly and for persons who are unable to afford professional assistance.

The counselors have been trained and certified by IRS, certified instructors. In 1984 the Tax-Aide program completed or assisted in completion of one and one third million returns, including 700,000 federal returns, thus helping over one million taxpayers nationwide with an accuracy rate of 93.7 percent.

Persons wanting assistance should bring with them their income tax package, their W-2 forms and all their 1099 forms showing income received. They should also bring with

them their copy of last years return.

to the elderly in filling out their income tax returns. The purpose of the assistance is to assure the elderly taxpayers of all their special benefits, such as pensions, sale of a home, tax credits and also help regarding the recent taxation of certain Social Security benefits.

Persons wishing to receive free tax counseling may telephone the nearest site between February 1 and April 15, 1985.

## Navy Within Our Navy... (6th In Series) Pride In Its Namesake - Corpus Christi

The vessels of the United States Navy represent a powerful force in the defense of our country. Named for noted people, places and events, these ships have in time of peace and in time of war, provided an essential service both to the Navy and to the United States.

Of the 595 ships commissioned in today's Navy, 10 are named for Texas cities, events or after famous Texans. One of these is the USS CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI!

The CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI (SSN-705), a fast attack submarine, is the second United States warship to be named after the Texas coastal city. The first was the USS CORPUS CHRISTI (PF-44), commissioned in 1944.

The first CORPUS CHRISTI was twice commended for unusual accomplishments. The first came for locating and rescuing 92 survivors of the torpedoed SS PETER SYLVESTER in the Indian Ocean in 1945 after an extended search by all available ships of the United States and Australian navies was unsuccessful. Her second commendation came when she refueled the British battleship HMS HOWE at sea.

The current USS CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI is named for the major Texas Gulf Coast seaport, which was founded in 1883 as a trading post, and named in 1847 for a nearby bay. Now with a population of more than 230,000, Corpus Christi is a mercantile center for a wide area of south Texas. The Corpus Christi Naval Air Station is based in the city, which prides itself on maintaining a balance of economic, educational, military and cultural activity.

Corpus Christi's port is the deepest on the Gulf Coast, and is one of the largest saltwater ports in the nation, making the busy city a worthy namesake for the most advanced nuclear submarine in the world.

The CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI is a nuclear attack submarine of the LOS ANGELES class, and was commissioned January 8,

1983. She serves a member of the Atlantic Fleet Submarine Force in Submarine Squadron 2, homeported in Groton, Connecticut.

Most recently, the USS CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI was deployed in the Indian Ocean. Prior to that, she was involved in operations in the Western Atlantic Ocean along the eastern coast.

LOS ANGELES class submarines are the Navy's

newest class of nuclear-powered attack submarines. Their mission is to hunt down and destroy enemy surface ships and submarines.

The 360-foot, 6,900 ton ships is well-equipped for her mission. USS CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI is armed with sophisticated Mark-48 anti-submarine torpedos and harpoon-guided missiles. She carries a crew of 127, 12 of-

ficers and 115 enlisted men, all specialists in their respective fields.

Both the CITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI and her namesake city play an important role in the defense of our nation, each contributing in their own way to the strength of the Navy and of the United States.

## GM Saturn Plant Is Fast Becoming The 'Prize Of 1985' In Number Of Locations

General Motor's Saturn plant obviously has become the "prize of '85" - and Eastland County is sure in the running.

That's the word from near and far and the various news media around the country visit and call to "find out what's going on around Eastland."

Latest major inquiry came Wednesday from the Kansas City Star which interviewed Chamber of Commerce Manager James Wright by telephone to get the Eastland picture.

Wright indicated that the interviewer's first question was "What are you people offering?" - implying that others are making inducements to the General Motors company.

"We're just offering to help them in any way we can," Wright answered, telling the newspaper that the people of this area are joined together in an effort to help make it attractive and mutually beneficial for G.M. to locate its new Saturn plant here.

Bidders are apparently numerous according to the Kansas City writer. He said that 74 cities and towns in Illinois have offered as many as 179 different sites to GM.

Six locations in Missouri (including Kansas City) are bidding, as are nine in Indiana.

In all as many as 25 states have made appeals for the plant, the reporter told Wright.

A Fort Worth Star-Telegram writer recently wrote of the situation:

Eastland County is plump with rumors these days.

So plump, in fact, that Chamber of Commerce officials daily receive calls about jobs that don't exist and some residents speak of their rank being doubled by the end of the decade.

"We've honestly never had so many rumors before," Eastland Chamber Director James Wright said.

And the rumors are so persistent that business leaders are beginning to act on them.

Churning the rumor mill is speculation that the county is under consideration as the site for General Motors Corp.'s Saturn plant.

"All the rumors started a

few months ago, maybe a year ago," Wright said. "But lately we've had about 10 calls a day about it."

The calls come from people who want applications forms for the 6,000 jobs that the assembly plant promises to bring to whatever community is chosen to be its home.

"People say they want a job application. They say they know we have them because they heard a friend got one," Wright said. "We don't have any job applications."

M.H. Perry, head of the Eastland Industrial Foundation, said he regularly gets calls from people who say they understand that land has been purchased for the plant.

Wright and Perry both say the rumors started last year when someone reported that someone from GM had stayed overnight at a local motel - supposedly to look at some land.

Perry said that a year ago, the rumor was that GM was going to build a parts plant in Eastland. With the announcement that GM plans to build a new line of small cars - the Saturn - rumors

quickly spread.

Another factor contributing to rumors is a small-scale building boom that has brought K-Bob's and McDonald's restaurants to Eastland. That boom also brought promises of a Baskin-Robbins ice cream store. "But we didn't get it," said Charlene Young, a K-Bob's assistant manager.

Eastland County has its roots in the oil industry. It's biggest claim to fame thus far has been the story of a legendary horned toad - Old Rip.

But with the GM rumors, chamber officials and county business leaders have decided that since they have the rumors, they might as well try to get the plant.

"After hearing all the rumors, we finally just thought, 'Why not Eastland?'" Wright said.

"It's a good rumor. I'd like to see it be true," Perry said.

A committee made up of citizens from each town in the county has been formed. Members traveled to Austin to meet with the Texas Industrial Foundation about the plant. The committee also has called GM officials and the governor's office,

said committee Chairman Delton Ake.

Ake and others agree that bringing the plant to Eastland County would require a massive buildup of the city's utilities, schools and water services. In fact, officials, acknowledge, it would require a multimillion-dollar effort by all taxing entities before the county could handle the population surge that would accompany the plant.

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

Too wit: and in re - the new sidewalks at the post office in Cisco. Postmaster Wiley Cox (who doesn't really want to be quoted in the paper) complaineth, (justifiable we think) of a recent J.W. Sitton column which took the Postal Service to task for the sidewalks around the post office in Cisco.

J.W. (who immediately went as a snowbird south about the time the column came out) justifiably complained about the probable cost of the project and questioned whether it should have been done at all.

The Postal Service position is: "This project started out as a repair project but was changed to a project of replacement of existing sidewalks and curbs due to the condition of the old sidewalks. The existing sidewalks were out of level at all expansion joints and were replaced to insure safety to our customers."

Now that's a reasonable thing.

Now J.S. was very careful to point out that the local P.O. folks shouldn't be blamed - and that's probably the crux of the matter...What started out to be a minor fix-up, as often is the case when the federal government is involved, turned into a bigger project. Postmaster Cox also made me wonder in one telephone conversation when he informed me that he'd been named to a P.O. Second Class Audit Team.

Bet what J.W. and the other folks are saying and thinking is that what with the national deficit and all, if maybe this project was really necessary. He and other are told,

"Well it's not being done with tax-payers money because the P.O. is now a self-sustaining entity." Well, yes and no, the P.O. still gets subsidy, but the difference is that there doesn't seem to be any government control over the P.O. nowadays. Makes us wonder if it wouldn't have been better to have kept it as a political plum the way it used to be...which is another matter.

One sentence from Cox certainly makes sense. He says, "I would appreciate anything you can do to build good will with the community." We're all for that and maybe we all need to remember this:

The local post office is the most visible and most definite symbol of our federal government, and so Mr. Cox if we citizens sometimes seem to take out our pent-up frustrations and exasperations on you, it's not personal, it's just that you're the feds, and we don't have anybody else to listen. The sparrows and cardinals are still fighting for the chicken scratch - and we're wondering if it's still snowing or just blowing off the trees.

# County News Briefs

## EASTLAND

Mr. and Mrs. H.V. O'Brien have purchased the Callahan County Star of Baird, and this newspaper will join the group which includes the Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram, Ranger Times and Rising Star. The purchase was from Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Burfield, who have owned and published the paper since 1964. Offices will be maintained in Baird and a staff announced soon. "We are happy to add the Callahan County newspaper to our group, and pledge to provide the local community news coverage which is the hallmark of our other publications," O'Brien said.

The Eastland area has been confirmed as a possible GM Plant site, according to several sources. One of these is WFAA Television Channel 8, which came to Eastland this week to do a story. In related developments, members of the Eastland County Task Force have been in Austin conferring with the Economic Development Commission about the GM program. The Saturn Division is viewed as a move which could change the way cars are made. The facility is reported to mean up to 18,000 jobs. Several other Texas towns are reported to be under consideration also.

County Judge Scott Bailey, who serves as Chairman of the Citizens Advisory Council of the Texas Department of Aging, will attend a Forum on the elderly in Austin on Feb. 7. Among others in attendance will be representatives from the Governor's office and from the 69th Legislative session. The statewide meet will have in-depth discussions on Health, Housing and Nutrition for older Texans.
