### Little Hope Is Seen For Co. Students

Students of county schools who had hoped to be able to show their animals in the Eastland County Livestock Show March 13-16, seem to be out of luck if they failed one of their grades during the past six weeks. A new state ruling, House Bill 72, prohibits any students from participating in extracurricular activities if they fail one subject. Authorities of the Livestock show say it is up to the superintendents of the schools whether the animals can be shown, but the superintendents have to abide by the state ruling. Approximately 75-80 students in the county are being affected by the ruling and will not be able to show their 4-H or FFA projects, unless something can be done about the ruling before the show.

A STORY OF interest to our area appeared in the Tuesday, March 5 edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in the front page column written by George Dolan. The article deals with the old flea market tank at Putnam.

Entitled "Ideas come by thankful for former flea market" the article was written as follows:

There's a "For Sale" sign on an old 64,000 barrel crude oil tank near Putnam that during its heyday was the subject of a half-page story in the New York Times and a commentary by Charles Kuralt on CBS News.

And that heyday had nothing to do with oil. It came during the eight years when the tank housed a flea market. It's a tank with a special magic that sparks imaginations, says owner R.W. Reynolds.

He says he has been approached by people with all sorts of ideas for it. Among them:

• "Some trucking people from Alabama want to put in a truck stop and cafe."

• "A producer of mesquite wood chips wants it for a factory site."

• "A guy in the Middle East wants it for an antique shop."

• "Two fellows would like to build homes in it."

• "A Wyoming town mayor would use it for water storage."

• "And just the other day it was suggested that it might be used to bottle mineral water, since Putnam has a plentiful supply."

The old tank, along Interstate 20 a mile east of Putnam, Callahan County, was one of three tanks built on a 15-acre site by Humble, which is now Exxon, Reynolds says.

They were used to store crude oil during the 1930s but had outlived their usefulness in the late 1940s.

They were purchased by a group of seed men who used them to store milo maize under the government grain loan program.

Then Reynolds, who was superintendent of Putnam schools, bought the tanks for storing milo, wheat, oats, peanuts and hay.

"Before I could get started with this," he says, "someone suggested holding a huge community garage sale in one of the tanks."

It was such a success that the tank's future was determined: Junque be thy destiny.

"Flea markets were just being introduced to this part of West Texas, so this one did a booming business," Reynolds says.

He sold the other two tanks back to Exxon during the steel shortage of the mid-70s. Exxon used the material for construction of tanks on the Gulf Coast.

Now Reynolds, after triple-bypass surgery, has slowed his pace. He operates an antique store closer to Abilene. The flea market hub-bub is absent.

"I feel as lonely," he confesses, "as a Maytag repairman."

## Area Burglaries Are Investigated

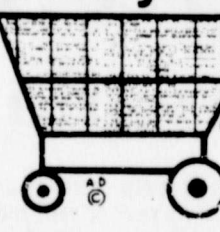

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## Traveling Safety Has A Banner Day

Your car breaks down on a lonely stretch of highway late at night. You need to signal for help, but like most drivers, you're not carrying emergency flairs or a CB radio. To get help, you have to leave the safety of the car.

Now a lifesaver for stranded motorists is as close as your glove compartment. It's called a Highway Emergency Banner, available from the non-profit National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW), Greater Minneapolis Section, and it helps a driver call for help.

The banner is easily secured to a car rear window with preaffixed double-faced tape. Reflective lettering makes the words CALL POLICE, printed in eight-inch florescent letters, visible both day and night.

Some 150,000 banners have been distributed nationally in the past six weeks since they became available through the NCJW. Proceeds go to community service programs. The banner began with volunteers working at the kitchen table in a member's home. But a notice about the banners in the syndicated *Dear Abby* newspaper column

catapulted the local community service project to a major full-service operation.

The organization has been deluged with hundreds of requests and testimonials each day from seniors, women, police departments, schools and corporations interested in sponsoring employee safety programs.

Cost of the reusable banner is \$3 each, which includes postage and handling. Checks or money orders should be made payable to NCJW Banner, P.O. Box 5300, Hopkins, MN 55343. Volume discounts are available to organizations who wish to distribute the banners.

### BANNER DEMAND ATTESTS TO PERSONAL SAFETY ISSUE

Letters, delivered by the hundreds each day to the NCJW banner office, testify to the fear many motorists have of being stranded with a disabled car.

The majority of the 45,000 letters received have been from women, according to organizers. "Women identify with this project," notes Francie Glickman, project coordinator, "because they identify with problems of

personal security."

A nurse from Weymouth, Mass., writes "I am a registered nurse who drives many hours alone, day and night, and feel your banners are a terrific idea." A Florida woman echoes these sentiments, ordering a banner because "I drive in a remote area of the Ocala National Forest and often travel at midnight or later on a 20 mile stretch of highway."

"What a good idea," wrote a woman from Newton, Penn. "Only another woman would think of this."

Another woman describes her experience stranded in a disabled car on an east coast highway in freezing weather. Despite the fact she hung her bra out of the window to signal for help, she had to wait four hours until a state trooper noticed her stalled car.

NCJW banner project volunteers have recognized others in need, making special efforts to make banners available to handicapped drivers, seniors, and arranging for the banner to be distributed in packets to new mothers at hospital maternity wards.

says Erickson. "To be honest about it, I had reservations about turning my book over to television. I worked long and hard to build up an audience, and during our contract negotiations with CBS, we talked a great deal about maintaining the quality and integrity of the material.

"After talking with several of the people involved with 'CBS Storybreak,' I got the feeling that they were just as concerned about quality as I was. That was a relief."

The first "CBS Storybreak" episode will air on Saturday morning, March 30, at 10:00 a.m. Central Time. Hank the Cowdog is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, May 4, at 10:00 a.m. Central Time.

### YIELDS HIGH RETURN FOR COMMUNITY

Tested by a simple fundraising idea that blossomed into a national revenue-producing effort, a group of local volunteers found that they could act with all the business acumen of corporate executives.

And in the case of the Highway Emergency Banner project, the bottom line is an important contribution to community service.

Initiated as an all-volunteer project by the Greater Minneapolis Section of the National Council of Jewish Women, the emergency banner program revealed a national demand for the simple safety device.

When 1,700 requests appeared in a recent Friday's mail, sixteen volunteers were hastily called together to work a ten-hour day processing the orders. When yet another 20,000 requests appeared the following Monday and orders grew by the tens of thousands each successive day, the volunteers shifted from clerical duties to implementing management initiatives to meet the growing demand.

Donated office space soon replaced the living room. Electric letter openers replaced serrated kitchen knives. Telephone lines were ordered and installed. Ban-

ner production quickly increased from 24,000 to 48,000. Within a week, one press run alone accounted for 180,000 banners.

The primary objective of the NCJW was not only to fulfill the orders efficiently,

but also to return the proceeds to the community. Sheltered workshops were contracted to package orders. Seniors, displaced homemakers, the handicapped and others in need now process orders which con-

tinued to arrive in batches of hundreds. Proceeds are returned to community service projects that benefit women, children and the elderly.

"The demand for banners exploded in just three weeks,

" noted Judith Traub, section president. "In this effort, every step provides a community service and the end result assures that car trouble will not become car tragedy."



## Hank The Cowdog

### Bound For Hollywood

It's ironic that Perryton, Texas, author John R. Erickson never intended for his book *Hank the Cowdog* to be a children's story - ironic because he has just signed a contract with CBS Television that will allow the network to make it into a 30 minute animated cartoon program.

In Hollywood, the Hank story will become one of 13 programs in a new series that will debut in March. The series, called "CBS Storybreak," is described by CBS as "an attempt to upgrade our children's programming by bringing classic works of children's literature to Saturday morning cartoon time." The entire series will be narrated by Bob Keeshan, better known as Captain Kangaroo.

Hank the Cowdog, as you may know, is Head of Ranch Security and star character in a series of books written by Erickson and published by Maverick Books of Perryton. Hank thinks of himself as a detective, a hero, a protector of his ranch.

Among young readers, he has become the most popular dog to come out of Texas since Old Yeller, yet Erickson says he never would have predicted it.

"My wife was the first to read the manuscript, and her first comment was, 'This is a great children's story.' It made me mad because that wasn't my intention."

But as he watched the sales figures climb and saw the book go through four

printings, he got over his anger. Instead of arguing, he brought out two more Hank episodes, and Maverick Books has scheduled the fourth and fifth books for release in 1985.

Erickson, who got most of his ideas during the eight years he worked as a cowboy, is elated with the CBS contract. "We're a small press, located in a rather unlikely place, and for CBS to recognize the quality of our books gives us a tremendous boost. All at once we don't seem quite as small."

He was also pleased to learn that one of aims of "CBS Storybreak" will be to encourage children to read the stories they have watched on screen.

"That impressed me."

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# CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



Let me take a slight step out of order this week and made a few comments about the most recent effect of education reform.

The first grading period after the effective date of H.B. 172's academic requirements for extracurricular participation has come and gone and has, quite literally, decimated the ranks of school sports teams, bands, FFA judge and show teams, and virtually every other conceivable activity.

So that you better understand what I mean, let me give you an example of a friend's child who lives in a neighboring district. The young man in question has remarkable ability to play the game of baseball and is one of the rare individuals, in high school sports, who might well be able to make use of his ability beyond public school. The young man is taking a full course load of six subjects and has a "A" average in four subjects, a "B" average in the fifth subject but, unfortunately, a grade of 67 in geometry.

Under H.B. 72, of course, this young man is completely ineligible to participate in any extracurricular activities, including baseball, for the next six weeks. If, after six weeks, he brings the grade of 67 to 70 or above then he may participate. Strangely enough, he could bring his "A" and "B" averages down to a 70 average and still participate.

In my opinion there is very little in this set of circumstances to serve as an incentive to the child. Surely you can remember that at age 16 six weeks seemed like "forever" and hopefully you see that the child is not just a lazy, disinterested student undeserving of consideration.

I am co-sponsoring H.B. 649 that would relax, I think to a reasonable degree, the academic requirements for extracurricular and co-curricular activities. This sports cars manufactured during the early and middle years of this century.

The annual Eastland County Livestock Show is set to begin Wednesday, March 13, and will last through Saturday, March 16. This event is always exciting and brings people throughout the county.

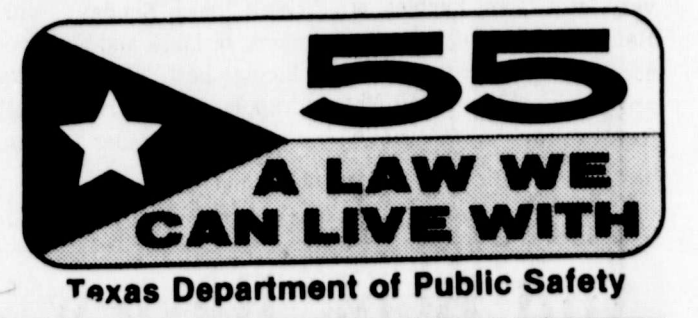

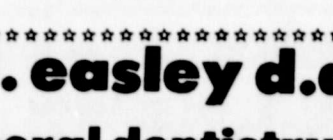

# Oil Belt News

Eastland County's Tee Jay Field gained a new producer when the No. 2 V. Wallenberg was finalized by Enre Corp.

Located five miles northwest of Cisco, the well flowed 852,000 CF gas per day on a 16/64-inch choke with absolute open flow at 1,550,000 CFD.

The operation is in a lease in the SPRR Survey, A-948. It was taken to a total depth of 4,165 feet and will produce from a set of perforations in the Conglomerate Formation at 3,913 to 3,920 feet.

H.E. Austin of Cisco is preparing to drill three 900-ft. developmental wells

Eastland County, two miles west of Romney. The ventures are in the Hawk-Eye Field. The operator has 133 acres under lease with drillsite in the H&TC Survey, A-1328. The wells will be known as the No. 16A Cox, the No. 17A Cox, and the No. 18A Cox. The well's target is production in the Adams Branch Formation.

Dramar Development Co. of Eastland has revealed plans to drill the No. 1A Sibley, a 1,300-ft. developmental well six miles south of Ranger in the Eastland Regular Field. The operation will be in a 20-acre lease in the Wm. Van Norman Survey, A-545.

Abilene Petroleum Land Services has abandoned an undrilled location in Eastland County, two miles northwest of Desdemona. The wildcat venture had been designated as the No. 1 West.

Two undrilled locations have been abandoned by Brown Operating Co. in Eastland County. They were to have been spudded seven miles southwest of Carbon. They were designated as the No. 1 Criswell and the No. 1 Medford.

First production figures have been filed for the No. 2 Lambeth, a new producer in Eastland County, three miles southwest of Cisco.

With Katlaco Operating Co. as the operator, the well indicated it can flow 219 barrels of 43-gravity oil per day on an 18/64-inch choke. Flowing tubing pressure

came in an 180 PSI.

Katlaco bottomed the well at 4,224 feet total drilling depth. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Ellenburger Formation, 3,944 to 4,066 feet into the wellbore.

Drillsite was in the H&TC Survey, A-1515.

The Eastland Regular Field gained two new producers when Midwood Petroleum Co. completed the No. 5 Charles Little "A" and the No. 6 Charles Little "A".

The wells are located in the H&TC Survey four miles east of Carbon. Both wells indicated a potential to pump four barrels of 37-gravity oil per day. Midwood bottomed the wells at 929 and 900 feet, respectively. Production will be from perforated intervals in the Winchell Sand Formation from 860 to 884 feet.

Midwood has issued plug-and-abandon orders for the No. 1 Charles Little "A," a developmental venture in the Eastland Regular Field, Eastland County. Spudded on January 10, 1984, the well had reached 1,475 feet total depth. Drillsite was three miles east of Carbon.

rating on absolute open flow.

With drillsite in the John A. Hughes Survey, A-583, the well was drilled to 3,280 feet total depth. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Conglomerate Formation, 3,038 to 3,044 feet into the hole.

Two unsuccessful wildcat ventures and one developmental well have been written off as dry holes in Eastland County. The wildcat wells are: the No. 3 B.W. McKinnis Unit, bottomed at 588 feet and the No. 1 L.P. Talley, drilled to a total depth of 607 feet. Both wells are located one mile southeast of Carbon in the

H&TC Survey, A-281. The No. 2 K.M. Ditmore had reached 1,600 feet total depth and was located two miles southeast of Nimrod in the H&TC Survey, A-1950. Bill C. Burns was the operator.

Two undrilled locations have been abandoned by Diamond Shamrock Exploration Co. in the Davenport Field, Eastland County. They were to have been

spudded three miles northeast of Ranger and were designated as the No. 2 Gloria Ruby and No. 3 Gloria Ruby.

Eastco Gas Co. has abandoned an undrilled location in Eastland County, two miles southeast of Romney in the Eastland Regular Field. The well had been designated as the No. 2 S.E. Carter.

An undrilled location has been abandoned by Hoffman Oil Co. in the East Nimrod Field, Eastland County. It was to have been spudded one-half miles southeast of Nimrod. It was designated as the No. 1-B Schaeffer.

Pearson & Adams have finalized a new producer in Eastland County's Reb Field, pumping 81 barrels 40-gravity oil per day along with 10 barrels water. Drillsite was in the H&TC Survey, A-751, seven miles west of Ranger.

The well is designated as the No. 4 Carter. The operator took the hole to 3,865-ft. bottom and perforated the Marble Falls Formation for production at 3,456 to 3,486 feet.

Don H. Hanvey Oil Interest of Dallas is preparing to drill a 4,500-ft. wildcat well in Eastland County, two miles north of Cisco. The operator has 40 acres under lease with drillsite in the SPRR Survey, A-928. The well will be known as the No. 2 Hanvey-McCleskey.

Operating out of Cisco, Lester King Oil Co. has staked location for the No. 1 King, a developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field, five miles north of Pioneer. With projected total depth of 3,800 feet, the venture is in a 144-acre lease in Eastland County's James Murphy No. 18 Survey, A-381.

Pearson & Adams of Abilene have revealed plans to drill two wildcat wells two miles northeast of Eastland in Eastland County. They are the No. 1B Miller and the No. 2B Miller, both with projected total depth of 4,000 feet. The operations will be in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-847.

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# Eastland County History

One of the grand old men of the Carbon community was Rev. W.B. Cobb, who first settled in the county near Cisco at what was then known as Red Gap, where he with Rev. C.G. Stephens organized the Red Gap Baptist Church in or about 1877. He probably moved to the farm so long owned by him, near Carbon, in 1878 or 1879 as he organized the Live Oak Baptist Church, afterwards the Jewel Baptist Church, in 1879 and was one of its charter members.

He assisted in the organization of the Red Gap Baptist Association in 1878 and was prominent in that organization for many years. In 1883 he was in the organization of the Carbon

Baptist Church and was its pastor until 1886 and probably a member of that body until his death. He was active in the service of his master for many years filling the pulpits of Carbon and other neighboring churches until incapacitated by age.

Another of the beloved preacher citizens of the Carbon community was Rev. I.N. Reeves, familiarly known as "Uncle Ike." He was born in Lawrence County Alabama December 18, 1830 and died at his home near Carbon, December 13, 1910, lacking but five days of reaching four score of years, sixty of which were spent preaching the gospel.

During the civil war he was chaplain of the 16th

Mississippi Regiment and continued to be active in the ministry in his native state until his coming to Texas in 1875, where he joined the North-West Texas Conference and continued with that body until 1893 when he was superannuated. He spent the last twenty years of his life as a resident of the Carbon community.

"Uncle Ike" as he was familiarly called much to his pleasure, was a man of strong convictions which he was not backward in expressing.

The writer is under many obligations to Thos. H. Dingle for his interest and assistance in securing information in connection with the Carbon trade territory.

Carbon Lodge No. 786, A.F. & A.M., was chartered Dec. 3, 1896, and had its first permanent meeting place in the second story of Post Master, W.J. Reed's dwelling. The writer does not have to guess in this matter as it was there in the year 1897, he was Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason. Judge J.R. Frost, of Eastland, was the Worshipful Master, at the time. At present the office is filled by H.L. Jackson. The Lodge had worked for sometime during the years 1895 and 1896, under dispensation.

The records further disclose that Bro. T.H. Dingler, and Bro. M.C. Tucker, were voted HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP, in the Lodge, by unanimous vote, at a stated meeting held on the 2nd, day of Oct. 1939. The writer is indebted to Bro. T.H. Dingler, a Past Master, of the Lodge for gathering

the foregoing information. Postmaster Neill S. Haynes appointed January 25, 1882 (Established); Charlie T. Phillips appointed May 23, 1887; William J. Reed appointed December 27, 1890; William B. White appointed October 3, 1904; Elmer T. Gilbert appointed July 25, 1913; Miss Rebecca White appointed December 23, 1922; Devoe Dover (Acting) appointed July 10, 1933; Devoe Dover appointed May 5, 1934; and Willard E. Trimble appointed July 1, 1940.

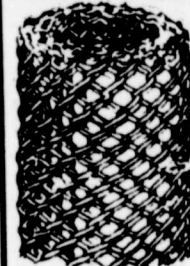

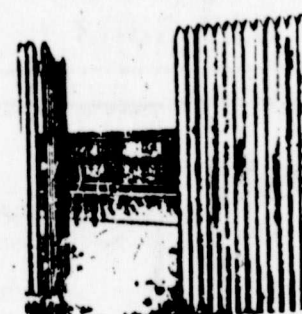

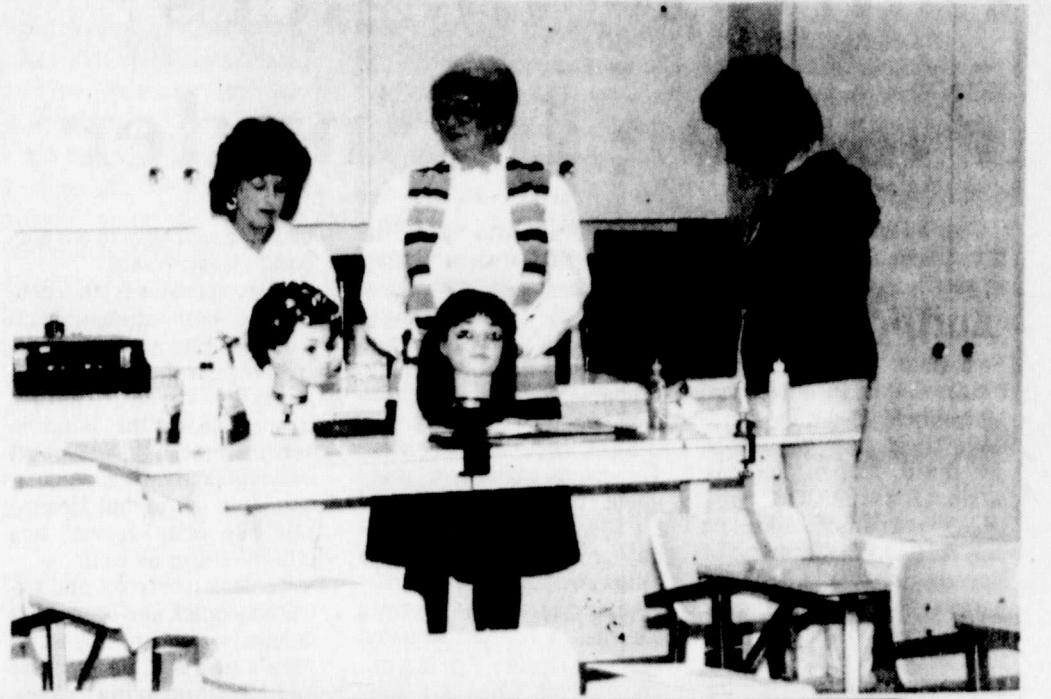
classroom teaching first and then they work on mannequins for 150 hours. After they successfully complete this part of their studies they are brought out on the floor.

## TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

### Try Tatume—A Squash Everyone Should Like

Tatume is a little known squash with a great taste. It probably originated in Mexico, but its seed has been sold in the United States for at least 20 or 25 years.

The squash, which has been described as a "round zucchini-type," is now planted widely in Texas and Mexico. It's about time you tried it in your home garden.

Don't worry if you're one of those people who can't stand the sight of another zucchini; the flavor of tatume is different. Its white meat has a buttery and slightly nutty taste, and has been known to make squash eaters out of people who thought they didn't like squash.

The squash itself is egg-shaped with a blunt blossom end. White streaks mark the pale green skin, which is so tender that you don't need to peel it.



Tatume is a vining squash which produces an abundance of foliage that shades the fruit. Plant it in hills as you would any other squash. If possible, keep it watered during dry weather. Drought will reduce the vine's productivity and life. Since the vines

grow rampantly, you should try tying them to a fence or trellis if your garden space is limited.

Your first squash should be ready for harvest in about 50 to 60 days. Search carefully, since the leaves may obscure the fruit. Harvest tatume while the skin is still light-colored and shiny. Although tatume squash on the grocer's shelves are often only 2 or 3 inches long, you can safely let them grow to 3 or 4 inches in your home garden for most uses. When the skin toughens and darkens and the seeds become large, though, you'll know you've left the squash on the vine too long.

Tatume is a succulent-meated squash which can be

cooked just like any other squash, and it is delicious battered and fried. And last but not least of the points in its favor, you'll be amazed at the visual beauty of your own, homegrown, fresh-from-the-garden tatume squash.

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# Lady Wranglers Playing In Snyder

Coach Ronnie Hearne and his Cisco Junior College women's basketball team, champions of the north zone of the Texas Junior College Basketball Conference, left for Snyder and the regional tournament at 9 a.m. Tuesday. Their first game was scheduled at 7 p.m. Tuesday against Amarillo JC.

The tournament schedule called for the winners of Tuesday's two afternoon games, Odessa vs. Ranger and Clarendon vs. Grayson, to meet at 7 p.m. Wednesday. The winners of the Tuesday night games, Cisco vs. Amarillo and Western Texas vs. McLennan, were scheduled to play at 9 p.m. Wednesday.

The regional championship game was scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday at the Scurry County coliseum in Snyder. The men's regional tournament, which was scheduled to open at noon March 7 at the Snyder coliseum, will end with the finals on March 9th.

Single ticket admission to all games was \$5 per person or \$25 for a tournament ticket.

Coach Hearne's Lady

Wranglers, who won the district title with a victory over Grayson County JC last Thursday night, held workouts Sunday afternoon and Monday morning in preparation for the regional tournament.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram carried a story about the tournament and the Cisco team in their Monday morning edition, as follows:

Cisco Coach Ronnie Hearne, a former standout for Abilene Christian, believes his team is a solid contender. "The regional is one of the toughest anywhere, and Odessa is definitely the team to beat," he said. "But we've really played well the last month and look forward to the competition."

Cisco (23-5) has the ingredients to go all the way to the national tournament. The Wranglers are hitting 47 percent from the field and have scored 76 points a game while allowing opponents only an average of 53.

"We've shot the ball well all season, but I believe defense and the unselfish attitude of the players have

been the real keys to our success," Hearne said.

Cisco operates from a double low-post offense, with Valerie Barnett, a 6-foot freshman from Azle, the top scoring threat inside. Barnett leads the team in scoring with a 17-point average and in rebounding with 10 a game, but Hearne said his prize recruit has other abilities as well.

"Valerie is strong and extremely quick and is our best defensive player," he said. "She's also still very young and is improving every game."

Elaine Browning, 5-11, of Anson is other post, with 5-10 Ingrid Mitchell of Dallas Carter and 5-7 Nena Barber of Canadian the forwards and 5-5 Ester Mendez of Baird the point guard.

Mitchell, a freshman, averages 12 points and eight rebounds, and Barber, a sophomore, is averaging 10 points a game. Mendez, the team's floor leader, carries a 14-point average and averages seven assists a game.

"We play man-to-man defense, don't press much, but fast break when given the opportunity," Hearne said.

Hearne came to Cisco from Jacksboro High School, where his team won two district titles, including the first in the history of the school. This year's team is Hearne's best in his three years at the school. Last year's club was 20-12, and his first was 22-8.

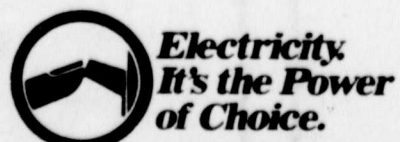
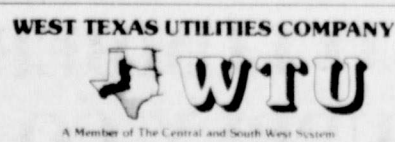

# Good Qualities Live On

When we hear how people came to America to escape religious persecution we usually think first of the Pilgrims in New England. There were a number of others, however, people lesser known but still enduring much in order to have freedom of worship.

Not only was religion a cause for the settlement of American and the southwest, but political and economic repression also played a big part.

One small group which caught trouble from both the religious and cultural sides of life were the Wends of Eastern Europe. Some of them came to Texas just before the Civil War, and are

often confused with the German settlers who arrived about the same time.

Although they had lived in Prussia for centuries, the Wends were actually a Slavic people, with their own language and customs. They were dedicated to the Luthern faith and were hard working and self-reliant. But they also loved beautiful things, such as intricate crafts and the growing of flowers.

A recent article in "Texas Highways" tells of this small ethnic group, whose descendants in Texas generally lived around a town called Serbin, east of Austin.

The article mentions early

settlements "in Eastland and Shackleford Counties" but not much information is readily available about these local people.

The later Herman Stephan of the Romney community was of Wendish descent. There were probably other Wendish farmers who acquired land in that vicinity before 1900, as he did.

His daughter, Anna Stephan, married a son of the Reich family - also from south of Cisco. Their children were Ernest Reich, Martin, Bertha (Stroebel), and Minnie (Paulsen). Ernest Reich farms south of Cisco, and is President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. Martin farms in the same vicinity, and Bertha

Stroebel also lives near Cisco. Mrs. Paulsen lives in Minnesota.

A number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren of Anna Stephan Reich live in Eastland County. One of her brothers, Robert, lives in Cisco. And the good farm settled by her father, Herman Stephan, is owned by a descendant of the family.

Among other people in the area with Wendish heritage is Ed Wende of Cisco and his family. Mr. Wende's mother, Ida Wernecke, was descended from the Wendish group which came to Texas in 1854. Rick Wende, an employee of the Eastland Post Office, is one of the children of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Wende. Another, son, David is a minister.

The Wendes have wondered about the similarity of their name to that of the word Wends. They feel there

is probably some connection on the paternal as well as maternal side of the family.

Several young women from Wendish families married German men and moved to Eastland County. Three Ziehr brothers, who settled south of Cisco, had Wendish names. Carl Ziehr, who is descended from one of these brothers, married Mary Ann Handrick of Albany, whose father was Wendish.

His name was Robert Handrick, and his father, August Handrick, was among a group of Wendish settlers who acquired land near Albany in 1906. Among them were the Noacks, Jentos and the Schkades.

Mary Ann, who lives south of Cisco, has pleasant memories of a big Wendish celebration in Serbin, Texas in 1954. This commemorated the 100th Anniversary of the arrival of the Wends in Texas, and much of the program centered around the large St. Paul Lutheran Church.

There were worship services, historical programs, music, crafts, and plenty of good food. "It was really like a large homecoming," Mary Ann says.

The Wendish people have a number of reasons for taking time out to celebrate. In Europe they were an ancient but embattled race - they trace their origins to Mazan, one of the grandsons of Noah.

The Prussians conquered them in 1167 following a 300 year war of extermination. After that many assimilated into the Prussian (later German) culture.

By 1800 the minority who held on to the Wends conservative religious beliefs, customs and language settled in the Lusatia area along the Spree River, which is now in East Germany.

The Prussian King had them in one place and he hit them hard. He denied them citizenship, property ownership, and admission to professional guilds. They were ordered to take German names, speak the German language, and join a state-regulated church.

It was the church order which proved to be the final blow. The Wends, believing this would dilute their pure Lutheran faith, made plans to come to America. A small group had already come to Texas, and they decided to follow.

The stormy voyage from Europe lasted 80 days, and 74 out of the 500 who began the voyage died of cholera and yellow fever. The survivors landed at Galveston, and walked and rode ox carts to Lee County. The first years there must have been extremely hard. They bought land for \$1 per acre, and had little left in the way of money. There were few tools and food was scarce.

But eventually they managed to build a church, begin a town, survive the

Civil War, and make their homes more comfortable. After the war more Wends came to join those already in Texas.

But on the frontier the very thing began to happen that they had worried about in Prussia. They found that they were becoming closer to their German neighbors - so close, in fact, that some Wends were marrying Germans and many were speaking German instead of Wendish. They got along very well together, in fact, helping each other in various ways.

In 1929 the last Wendish services were held in St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Serbin. But today there is revived interest in the Wendish language, customs and beliefs. The Texas Wendish Society was formed in 1971 so Wends across Texas could help save their disappearing culture. It has been estimated that 100,000 people of Wendish blood live in America today, with 7,000 in Texas.

And what is left of the Wendish culture in Eastland

County? More than a person would think, at first glance. For it is hard to weed out ways of thinking and ways of doing things, in a people which - like the German - were family oriented.

There is an enduring love of the land, a love or order, love of the home and the church. There is hospitality, self-reliance, and even a love of gardens and flowers.

Go past some of the farms south of Cisco and see if the land is being taken care of. Or go past Ed Wende's home in Cisco any day of the year and see what is in bloom. If you don't see anything outside, you can be sure that his carefully tended greenhouse is bursting with colorful blooms.

"I think Ed's mother, Ida, taught him how to raise flowers, smiles Mrs. Wende. "She always had beautiful ones out on the farm, even when she had to save dishwater to water them with. She was great on gardens, too."

And the thought comes that agriculture will have a better chance of survival if some of these skills are prac-

## County Gross Sales Reported

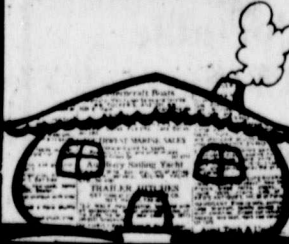
Eastland County reported gross sales of \$52,805,872 during the third quarter of 1984 to the state comptroller of public accounts.

A LOT OF progress has been made in the past dozen years in oil drilling equipment. That's the conclusion we reached the other night when we accepted an invitation to visit the site of TAD Energy's oil test on the W.B. Wright, Jr., Ranch northeast of town.

The drilling rig started work on Monday, Feb. 25, and the hole was bottomed at 3,999 feet in the Ellenburger lime on Friday, March 1. They used diamond tipped drilling bits that go through rock formations a lot faster than when we last visited a drilling rig in the early 1970s. They drill 24 hours a day.

Mr. Mike Anderson, boss man of TAD Energy, was on hand while a crew from a service company was running an electric log. While we watched, they lowered equipment measuring about 30 feet long and weighing around 500 pounds into the hole. It went to the bottom and the logging began as they slowly pulled the instrument out.

Mike spent the entire night there, he told us next day. The log result was such that they believed the well can be completed as an oil and/or gas producer, so they ran pipe to the bottom and had it cemented. The cement must set at least 72 hours.

They've drilled a couple of other wells on the Wright place lately with good pro-

spects. Lawyer Wright, who lives out there, told us that he hasn't quit work yet. It was very interesting to look in on the work. To go in or out, you open four gates (which we did).

MORE THAN 150 people dropped in at Lawyer Wright's offices last Friday afternoon to wish Mrs. Louise Cooper well in her retirement years. They held an open house in her honor as she was retiring after 22 years on the job as a secretary. She went to work there for the late W.B. Wright on a temporary basis - until they could find somebody.

Mrs. Billy (Sherry) Wright was in charge of the open house arrangements. They served coffee and punch with an assortment of cookies, candy and other goodies... Mrs. Cooper's daughter, Donna Jean, came out from Dallas and registered guests. Her sister and husband came over from Olney for the occasion. A number of gifts were left by friends.

Mrs. Cooper hasn't quite retired. She had her typewriter going in a back office Monday and will work part-time... Mrs. Barbara Pope, who is replacing Mrs. Cooper up front, is a former secretary. She worked out at Red Gap Western Store with Husband Tommie for 12 years and has worked at the

CJC Library for a year or so.

THE SEASON'S first thunderstorm moved through our region Sunday night. And some four tenths of an inch of rain accompanied it, according to the fire station rain gauge.

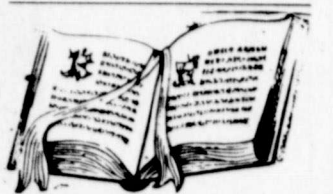
