A color guard of 10 U.S. Marines from the U.S. Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Training Center in Abilene will attend to present the colors and handle the flag raising ceremony that will be a part of the dedication program. Huge 12X18 foot flags

- USA and Texas flag- will fly from the new poles that are part of the sign.

The Wrangler Band and Belles will be present in uniform to provide music for the occasion.

Following the program, a reception will be held at

Maner Memorial Library under the sponsorship of the CJC Faculty Association. Punch and cake will be served.

The new sign and flag poles were erected mid-way on the College Hill Road several weeks ago.

Texas Gearing Up For '86 Sesquicentennial Event

Texas is gearing up for the 1986 Sesquicentennial celebration to be held next year according to Sandra Fox, co-chairman for the Sesquicentennial for Randall and Shackelford Counties. Ms. Fox reported at the Texas Day Tea, hosted by the Cisco Federation of Women's Clubs, on Thursday, March 7, at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall.

The country of Australia is also celebrating their 150th anniversary and there will be an exchange of ideas between Texas and Australia during this time she said.

Cities throughout Texas are making plans. Such as El Paso trying to get the King of Spain to attend the celebration. Other plans include a wagon train to make a 2800 mile trip through Texas making a stop in Albany. A train will be meeting the wagon train later in San Angelo.

Several communities have plans in the making and Sandra stressed that it is important as a community to become involved. She said

1986 will be a year to enjoy the history of Texas and each community where you live.

Mayor Eris Ritchie reported the construction will begin in May, 1985 for the Mobley Hotel and the hotel will be dedicated in May of 1986. This will be Cisco's project for the Sesquicentennial.

He said there are well known events that have happened in the past such as the Santa Claus Bank Robbery and the Mobley Hotel. He praised the efforts of the local towns to

preserve the past in activities such as Cisco Folklife Festival and the Ranger Roaring Days.

Charlie Garrett, mayor of Gorman, reported that their committee have no definite plans as of yet but they are in the making.

Ginger Mangum the county co-ordinator reports that there will be a county-wide fashion show and a beard growing contest among other things. She said that she is very excited about next year and knows that it will be a big success.

A special thanks was given to Mrs. Ruby Lee Pirtle from Mrs. Edna Bint for all the hard work she did for the Texas Day Tea. She worked several weeks to get it ready.

Rev. Buddy Sipe and his wife Carolyn sang "Beautiful Texas" and led the group in singing "Texas Our Texas". Rev. Sipe also gave the invocation.

School Board Offers Only Contest For Local Voters

Place 6 on the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District will be the only contest for voters of this area to settle in the annual April 6th elections, it was determined after the deadline for candidates to file for ballot places ended last Wednesday.

Candidates for Place 6 on the board are Bill Kendall, the incumbent, who is being challenged by Sue Covert and John A. Gerhardt.

Emmett Rich, incumbent candidate for re-election to Place 7, did not draw an opponent. There were only two candidates for two City Council places, and only two names will be on the ballot for two positions on the Cisco Hospital District.

Mr. Kendall, 44, running for re-election to the school board, has been on the board three years. He works as a cable splicer for Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. here. He has lived here all of his life. He and his wife, Melanie, have on son in High School.

Mrs. Covert, 34, lives with her husband, Kurt, and a daughter, Leslie, a high

school student, on their ranch northeast of town. They moved here three years ago, from Dallas, when they purchased their ranching property from Mr. and Mrs. Morris White.

Mr. Gerhardt, a farmer and rancher who lives south of town with his wife, Lou Ann, and their three children, is 38 years of age. He attended Cisco schools and grew up in this area.

Mr. Rich, a local garage owner, has been a member of the board for nine years.

Roy Dennis, owner of Quickway Grocery, has been a member of City Council two years. He and his wife Sandy are the parents of three children. He represents the Woodmen of the World Lodge in this area, is a member of the Lions Club and the Church of Christ. He is seeking re-election to Place 3 on the Council.

Place 4 candidate is Bill M. Roberts, 42, who is a sales representative for the Keebler Company in this region. He formerly taught at Cisco Junior College and operated a printing business. He and his wife, Donna are

the parents of three children. They attend the Church of Christ.

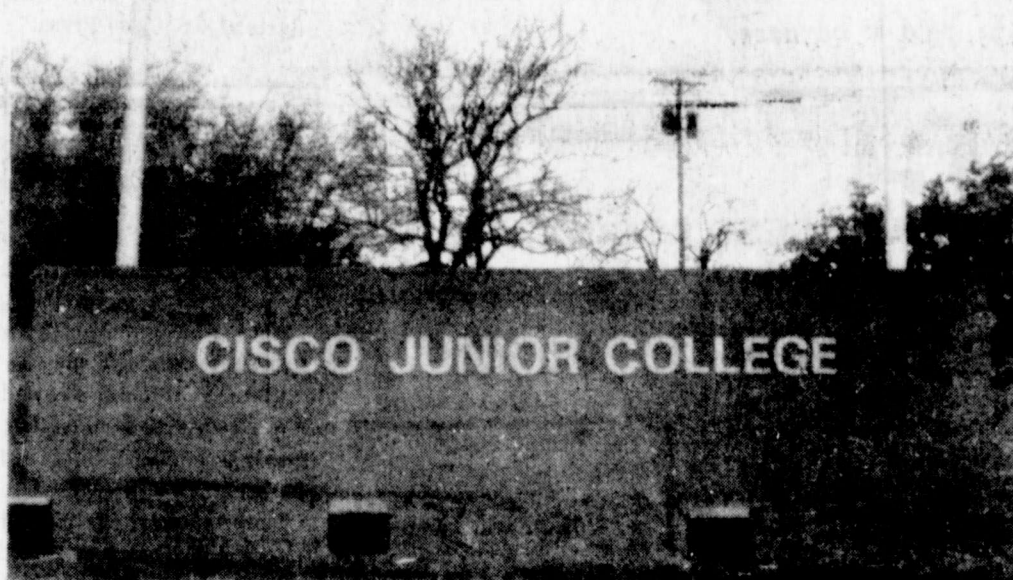

As widespread as heart disease is, causing 51 percent of all deaths in 1980, there is an encouraging outlook, states the American Council on Science and Health. Age-adjusted death rates from heart disease dropped 18 percent from 1950 to 1970 and there was an annual decrease of 2.6 percent per year from 1970 to 1977.

Also, according to the council, the age-adjusted overall incidence rate for cancer dropped slightly from 1947 to 1977.

So while we are still not free from all diseases, there is a great effort on the part of the scientists in lowering the disease rate.

Science is looking "hard" at the proper nutrition for the Americans. The Senior Center gives special attention to this aspect of the study, so we encourage you to call 442-1557, Monday, Wednesday or Friday to receive a well-balanced diet.

THE SISTINE CHAPEL
The Sistine Chapel is probably one of the most beautiful works of art that we visited. Many tourists were there that day and we had an excellent guide. Some of the groups do not, and they try to attach themselves to groups that do have guides.

The Sistine Chapel is one of the outstanding masterpieces of Italian art in the world. The chapel is called after Sixtus IV, the Pope for whom it was built.

This building was begun on the site of another chapel which was destroyed probably because it was in a poor state of repair, in the year of 1475, the year of the Jubilee, when many other ecclesiastical buildings in Rome were erected.

The Sistine Chapel is a simple and plain building, 134 feet long by 44 feet wide, and 85 feet high (it measures 40.93 meters long by 13.41 meters high, that is, the dimensions that the Bible gives for the Temple of Solomon).

The building has a cellar, a mezzanine floor and the chapel. The mezzanine floor is divided into nine rooms, which were the offices of the "Magistri Ceremoniarum." On the inside low marble seats run along the walls on three sides. The floor is of colored marble inlay with highlights in its geometrical patterns in the areas into which the space of the church is divided.

On one side is the presbytery, with the altar and the pope's throne, reserved for officiating clergy, and one the other the space for the faithful.

The chief papal coronation takes place in the chapel and it is also used by

the cardinals for the voting by which they elect a new pope.

The Chapel has on its walls and ceilings some of the greatest art ever produced in the Western World. Brilliant artists of the early Renaissance decorated the walls with paintings that tell the stories of Moses and Christ. On the ceiling are magnificent Biblical stories painted by the great artist, Michelangelo, in the 1500's. It took him four and a half years to complete this ceiling.

Equally famous artists painting the scenes on its walls panels with pictures. Starting from the altar and following the right walls, on sees:

"Moses on the way to Egypt," "Moses and the daughter of Jethro," "The Crossing of the Red Sea," "Scenes from the Life of Moses," "The Punishment of Korah," "The death of Moses," and returning to the altar, one now looks at the left wall: "The Baptism of Christ," "The Temptation of Christ," "The Calling of the Apostles," "The Sermon on the Mount," "Christ giving the Keys to St. Peter," and "The Last Supper."

Now we look at Michelangelo's great masterpiece:

On the great wall of the altar is depicted the "Last Judgement," painting between 1536 and 1545, after he had already painted the entire vault (ceiling) of the Chapel. It is a majestic representation of the last day of Judgement: the center is dominated by the figure of Christ the Judge, and there are many other figures in this huge fresco.

The frescoes that decorate the vault, which were

painted between 1508 and 1512, are another magnificent achievement. Nine scenes from the Old Testament occupy the central part of this cycle of frescoes:

The Separation of Light and Darkness, The Creation of the Sun and Moon, The separation of Land and Water, The Creation of Adam, The Creation of Eve, The Fall and Expulsion from Paradise, The Sacrifice of Noah, The Great Flood, The Intoxication of Noah, "Figures of Youths, Sibyls, and Prophets are arranged around the nine scenes. It is all very beautiful and majestic, one of the summits of Michelangelo's art.

There are many other paintings and beautiful frescoes throughout the building.

There are four rooms named "Raphael Stanze," which are decorated by this famous artist and painted.

Then there is a Gallery, Loggia of Raphael, decorated by this famous artist and his pupils.

Another Chapel of Pope Nicholas V, is covered with frescoes depicting "Scenes from the Life of St. Lawrence and St. Stephen."

The Gallery of Maps, has maps of all the regions of Italy on the walls, painted by Danti.

Next we come to the Gallery of Tapestries (with the tapestries carried out after designs of Raphael and Leonardo de Vinci).

The Gallery of Candelara contains a fine collection of Greek and Roman candelabra and copies as well of interesting pieces of sculpture and the Room of the Chariot.

last departments of this vast series of Museums and Galleries. Of course, the most impressive are the ceiling paintings, by Michelangelo. One could spend hours looking at them, and always find a different scene.

The Basilica and the Catacombs of Saint Sebastian. After we left the Sistine Chapel we went to the Catacombs in the south part of the city. They are outside the old walls of Rome. The Catacombs are systems of underground passages to rooms used as burial places. In the 200's and 300's, Christians dug catacombs in the soft tufa rock near Rome. These well-known catacombs have over 90 miles of corridors. The word "Catacomb" was first used for a district near Rome where the Chapel of Saint Sebastian stood. The catacombs are situated outside the old circle of walls, this was in observation of a Roman law that strictly prohibited the burial of burning of any dead body within the city.

The extent of these tunnels in the Catacomb of Saint Sebastian reached a length of seven miles. It has been estimated that the 32 known catacombs in Rome, if laid in a straight line, would have a total length of no less than 360 miles, and they would cover more than 600 acres of land.

The bodies of Saint Peter and Saint Paul are believed to have been placed for a time in the vaults of this chapel (where the chapel of Saint Sebastian stood).

The early catacombs had many rooms, connected by long, narrow halls. They branched off in all directions. If more space was needed, a second line of halls or galleries was dug beneath the first. Graves were cut into the walls and some of them were closed by slabs.

The Christians often used the catacombs for their

funeral and memorial services. When there were persecuted, they hid there because the catacombs were protected by law.

Some of the catacombs were discontinued for awhile, but many of them have been rediscovered through the years.

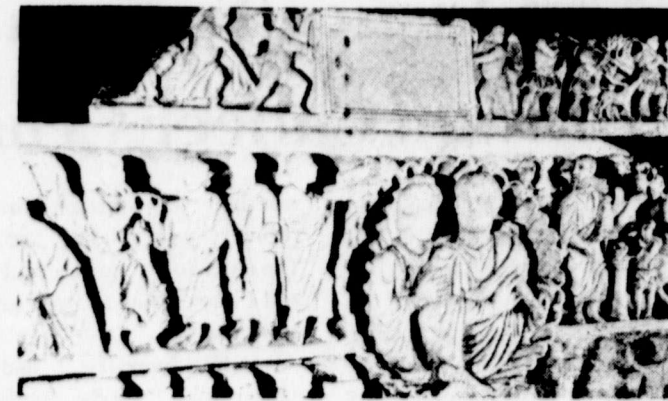
Much excavation work has been done for many years, and the catacombs are visited by thousands of visitors each year. A story is told about the catacombs and the Basilica of Saint Sebastian, which is the entrance of these catacombs.

Saint Sebastian was a native of Milan and at the end of the fourth century St. Ambrose reminds the Milanese that he is a fellow citizen of theirs and a saint. Later he is denounced by the emperor for his ardent preaching of the Gospel and condemned to be shot to death by archers. When the archers left him to die he is found by Irene, the widow of St. Castulus, and nursed by her. After fully recovering, he presents himself before the emperor who orders him to be taken to the Palatine Circus and beaten to death there, his body to be thrown into the Cloaca Massima (the big sewer) running under the circus. But the saint appears in a dream to a lady called Lucia and tells her: "In the sewer running next to the circus you will find my body hanging from a peg, you will remove it from there and take it to the Catacomb and bury it at the beginning of the crypt, near the remains of the Apostles."

In the Basilica of Saint Sebastian, the Altar contains many "reliques." It shelters one of the arrows which pierced St. Sebastian, the column to which he was tied, the Quo Vadis slab with the imprints of the feet of Jesus

when He appeared to St. Peter and many other famous relics.

Many of the people on our tour walked through some of the catacombs, they are dusty and damp in some parts, however it was a great experience to visit the Catacombs of Rome.

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Ann Justice To Speak For Annual Cancer Crusade

(ED. NOTE: Eastland Countian Ann Justice will speak Thursday evening in Abilene for the kickoff of the District 16 Annual Cancer Crusade. Her topic will be "Living With Cancer". The following is an extract of her speech.)

Hello, I'm Ann Justice, through the grace of God, a survivor and a winner. I thank God each morning that I am still alive and try to live each day as if it were a gift. The beginning, not the end. Through God's grace I am a winner.

I had surgery in 1980 for ovarian cancer. Doctors told my husband that I might live six months. But Cyrus, my husband, is the one who did not live the six months.

This all hit me like a bolt of lightning. One thing I had to do along with cancer, was to fight loneliness after I lost Cyrus. This is a special, awful loneliness for any human being to endure. There are no easy answers. One day brings feelings of confidence, the next day despair.

I knew I had to keep going

whether the outlook for recovery was good or bad. The days go by one at a time and I knew I had to live one at a time.

I didn't feel like I had cancer and I surely didn't want to look like I did.

I started my chemotherapy two weeks after I had surgery. The doctor told me I might have an 80 percent chance, but not a guaranteed cure.

"Cure" is not a word that doctors use when talking about cancer. She told me I would have to have 12 treatments, one every 28 days. First thing that ran through my mind, was that it would be a year. It wasn't always easy. Sometimes, I felt like "pulling the covers" over my head and getting it over with. When you have no one to provide you encouragement, then you act as your own cheering squad. It is hard but not impossible.

What would I have done without my children and all my friends?

I knew I was powerless to deal with my problems myself. The more I struggled to work it out, the more difficult it became. I had to

remind myself, this day and everyday, I will place myself and my life in the hands of God, secure in the knowledge that he will not fail me, if I, too, do my part.

He gave me the peace of mind and tranquility and that was the miracle.

After my first treatment in Fort Worth I came home and my husband became very ill. He stayed in the local hospital seven weeks before he could be moved to Abilene for surgery. We lost him. When you live with someone for 48 years and you can't go to him when he is sick, because you are also sick, it creates a feeling you can't overcome.

September 1st: I went back to work; still attempting to deny the seriousness of my disease. I felt tired and didn't have much appetite during the treatments, but was determined not to be "sickly". I took special care with my makeup and resolved not to look like a cancer victim.

Chemotherapy generally fails to distinguish between cancer cells and hair cells. I lost all my hair. I bought a

wig, figuring I wouldn't be fooling anyone anyway and might as well go all out. But I did fool some people: a woman in a restaurant once asked me who was my beautician?

I kept working and arranged my treatments over the weekend so that my daughter could be with me. I would go in the hospital Saturday morning, and come home Monday, go back to work Tuesday. By the end of six months I understood who some give up and refuse treatments. I could not eat, and could hardly stand up while I was in the hospital. But hope sustained me - hope that the drug would work.

Doctors tell you to be cheerful and active despite your illness, but it is difficult to convince yourself that you are recovering when you feel absolutely rotten. You are convinced that there never was a day when you didn't feel awful; and never will be one when you feel normal, if only you could remember how normal feels.

After my eleven treatments which was eleven months since my surgery, I had my second operation. The doctors did not find one trace of cancer cells. How did I feel? Lucky. I felt like a winner.

Cancer is not something

anyone forgets. Anxieties remain as active after treatments cease, and the waiting stage begins. I went four years and did real well, kept working and doing what I wanted to do. This is where we need to go back to the scanner to be sure. I went to my family doctor every three months for examinations. But in September of last year I had a recurrence and have to have another surgery. They removed three tumors from my left side which were malignant. The doctors told me I would have to take radiation treatments, because I could not take any more chemotherapy.

I started my radiation treatment on Oct. 6, and took them until Dec. 19. I had 50 treatments in all and the last

two weeks I felt like really pulling the covers over my head. Mine had been a long battle but I decided I wasn't ready to call it quits.

The best attitude for approaching this ordeal of battling cancer is that you have to believe that you will make it. Don't put all your hopes on a particular milestone or time frame.

Giving up isn't a good idea, either, but you torture yourself and your family needlessly if you refuse to come to terms with reality.

When cancer entered my life, I found new faith and faith gave me a new found strength I didn't know I had.

Any person who experiences a serious illness wonders at times: "Why me?" I have no answer.

When we have moments of doubt and questioning, I hope someone like Jesus will come along and put an arm round us, and say we are to believe until we have a belief, then because we have a belief we will believe life keeps going on.

A diagnosis of cancer is a powerful stimulus against procrastinating on warm and kingly or beautiful things - a reminder that many of the material things aren't that urgent after all. Take time to watch the sunset with someone you

love--there may not be another as lovely for the two of you.

Whether age makes me ripen or wear out, it's wonderful to know that I had a good change to find out.

I will remind myself each day how fortunate I am and remind myself that this instant is the only time there is.

So if you want to be a winner, think like a winner, act like a winner, and sooner than you think, you will be a winner.

Texas Farmers To Plant More In 85

COLLEGE STATION—If Texas farmers follow through on their planting intentions, there will be more grain sorghum, corn, cotton and peanuts to harvest this fall than a year ago.

Grain sorghum acreage will likely increase 3 percent to 4.5 million acres. The corn crop should increase 4 percent to 1.75 million acres, and the peanut acreage may increase about 6 percent. Although cotton plantings will likely be around 5.3 million acres (almost the same as in 1984), a larger crop is expected since last year's production was cut short by drought.

Texas farmers also intend to reduce their rice and soybean acreages by 12 and 18

percent, respectively.

"Nationally, prospective plantings point to continued abundant supplies of grain sorghum, corn, cotton and soybeans," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "This will continue to exert downward pressure on commodity prices."

Cotton acreage across the nation will be down only slightly this year, notes Anderson, while peanut and soybean acreages may drop 2 to 5 percent and rice acreage may decrease about 12 percent. However, large carryover stocks of these crops will likely offset any reduction in production.

While overall increased crop plantings will boost business activity for firms selling agricultural supplies such as chemicals and seed, the sizeable acreage will keep the wraps on commodity prices.

"About the only price improvement that producers can expect will be tied to seasonal and technical movements," says Anderson. "For fall-harvested crops, the highest prices for 1985 may be sometime during spring or early summer. Chances are good for about loan rate prices for corn, grain sorghum and cotton at harvest. The price for wheat may fall below loan."

Facing that kind of outlook, farmers may want

to price at least part of their expected production over the next several months during price rallies, notes the economist.

"The strong dollar abroad offers little hope that exports will increase sufficiently to

bolster demand and crop prices during the coming crop year," Anderson adds.

"Cotton textile imports continue to pour into the U.S., causing the U.S. textile industry to shrink."

Railroad Commission Approves Gas Rate Decreases

AUSTIN--The Railroad Commission this week approved natural gas contract changes sought by Ferguson Crossing Pipe Line Co., Unit Gas Transmission Co., and El Paso Hydrocarbons Co. which will save their customers almost \$10 million annually.

The largest decreases came in two contracts between El Paso Hydrocarbons and Texas Utilities Fuel Co. Rates will drop to \$3.30 per

MMBtu (million British thermal units) from \$3.75 in one contract and \$3.35 in the other. Total estimated annual savings to TUFCO and

its affiliated electric generating plants are \$8.2 million. The new rates are

effective for bills on and after Jan. 1.

Savings will be passed through to electric customers in the form of reductions to the cost of fuel portion of their monthly bill.

The Commission also approved Unit Gas Transmission Co.'s request to reduce rates to large volume, interruptible customers in the Bayport area of Harris County. Rates will drop from \$3.63 to \$3.31 per MMBtu, which will yield an estimated \$1.7 million in annual savings. The new rates are effective for bills on and after Feb. 11.

Valero Transmission Co. customers will save more than \$22,000 annually as a result of changes to two contracts held with Ferguson Crossing Pipe Line Co. Rates will fall from \$3.11 to \$3.00 per MMBtu for bills rendered on and after Dec. 11 of last year.

Another customer of Ferguson Crossing, Liquid Energy Corp., will save some \$54,000 annual under a contract amendment which reduces gas rates from \$2.75 to \$2.50 per MMBtu. Liquid Energy is a large volume purchaser which uses the gas at its Milam County processing plant. The contract change is effective Jan. 29.

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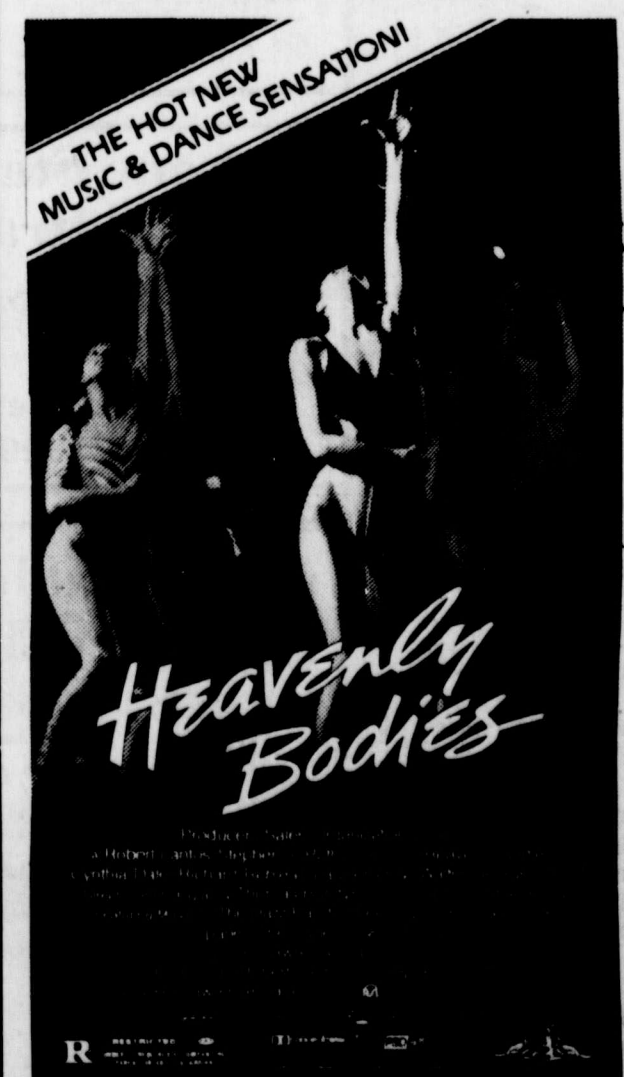

Oil Belt News

Pumping 30 barrels of 40-gravity oil per day with 25 barrels water, the No. 1 T. Choate has been brought on line in the Kleiner Field, Eastland County, by Southeastern Resources.

Location is in the H&TC Survey, A-1526, two miles east of Cisco.

Southeastern took the hole to a 3,833-ft. bottom and perforated the Lake Sand Formation for production at 3,349 to 3,354 feet into the hole.

The No. 39 Delbert Tarver "A" has been labeled as a dry hole by Ridgeway Exco at a location one-half mile west of Romney. The well had been spudded January 17, 1985. It was located in the H&TC Survey, Eastland County, and had reached 1,115 feet total drilling depth.

An unsuccessful developmental well has been written off as a dry hole in Eastland County's Moreno Field, four miles southeast of Carbon. The well probed to a dry bottom at 3,100 feet total depth. Snow Oil Co. was the operator. The well had been designated as the No. 1 Barnett.

Sun Exploration & Production Co. has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 21 O.H. Delano. It was a developmental venture in Eastland County, 12 miles north of Desdemona. It bottomed at 3,420 feet without production prospects. It will be plugged and abandoned.

Dallas-based Pendragon Oil Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 McClesky in Eastland County, three miles southwest of Ranger. With total depth projected to 3,900 feet, the wildcat well's location is in a 200-acre lease. William Todd Survey, A-537.

At a location three miles east of Eastland, Tiki Exploration Co. has completed the No. 2 Wood Heirs in Eastland County's Ranger Field.

The well pumped 50 barrels of 38-gravity oil per day along with 90 barrels water.

With drillsite in the T&NO Survey, A-1713, the well was

drilled to a total depth of 3,682 feet. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,194 to 3,213 feet into the hole.

The No. 1 Ogle is scheduled for spudding in Eastland County's Moreno Field, six miles southwest of Gorman. Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth will be the operator. The venture will be situated in a 140-acre lease in the D&DAL Survey, A-2099. It carries permit for 4,000 feet maximum depth. The well's target is production in the Marble Falls Formation.

Wayne Turney Oil Co. of Eastland has revealed plans to drill the No. 2 Schaeffer, a 3,000-ft. wildcat venture one mile northeast of Nimrod in Eastland County. The operation will be in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-172.

At a location two miles northwest of Crystal Falls, Hoyt F. Casteel has completed the No. 5 F.C. Finley in Stephens County's Bowar Field.

The well flowed 14 barrels 39.5-gravity oil per day on an 8/64-inch choke. Flowing tubing pressure came in a 540 PSI. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Conglomerate Formation, 4,217 to 4,226 feet into the hole.

With drillsite in the Albert Sidney Johnson Survey, the well was drilled to a 4,260-ft. total depth.

Flowing 130,000 CF gas per day on a 3/8-inch choke, the No. 1 J.E. Conner has been brought on line in the Akin Field, Stephens County, by J.E. Conner. It was assigned a 183,000 CFD rating on absolute open flow. Location is in the TE&L Survey, four miles northeast of Eolian. Conner took the hole to a

4,370-ft. bottom and perforated the Caddo Formation for production at 3,102 to 3,164 feet into the hole.

An undrilled location has been abandoned by Delta Oil & Gas Co. in Stephens County. It was to have been spudded one mile northwest of Caddo. It was designated as the No. 3 R.M. Rogers Estate "H".

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 Robertson "R", a developmental venture of Eldorado Oil & Gas Co. in the East Crystal Falls Field, Stephens County. Spudded on January 9, 1985, the well had reached 4,410 feet total depth. Drillsite was two miles southeast of Crystal Falls.

Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge is preparing to drill a 4,300-ft. wildcat well in Stephens County, two miles south of Caddo. The operator has 640 acres under lease with drillsite in the T&P Survey. The well will be known as the No. 6 Coody.

At a location three miles northwest of Parks, Ridge Oil Co. has driven stake for the No. 2 Groseclose "A", a developmental well in the Stephens Regular Field. With projected total depth of 3,400 feet, the venture is in a 114-acre lease in Stephens County's LAL Survey.

Grothe Bros. has abandoned an undrilled location in the Stephens Regular Field, ten miles west of Gunsight, Stephens County. The well had been designated as the

No. 1 Elliott.

Four undrilled locations have been abandoned by Ray Herring in the Stephens Regular Field. They were designated as: the No. B-3 Scarlett "B", the No. C-6 Scarlett "C", the No. D-5 Scarlett "D", and the No. 3 White, all located three miles northwest of Gunsight, Stephens County.

First production data have been filed for the No. 2 East Green "L", a successful re-entry and workover of a project originally completed November 22, 1976 at a total depth of 4,420 feet.

With Jones Co. as the operator, the wildcat well indicated it can flow 1,339,000 CF gas per day on a 16/64-inch choke. Flowing tubing pressure registered 855 PSI and absolute open flow rating came in at 4,200,000 CFD.

Jones bottomed the well at 2,927 to 2,929 feet into the hole. Drillsite was in the J.E. Michamp Survey, nine miles northwest of Breckenridge.

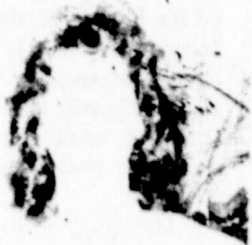
and to win 2nd place out of the above competitive teams is a thrill, we are all very excited."

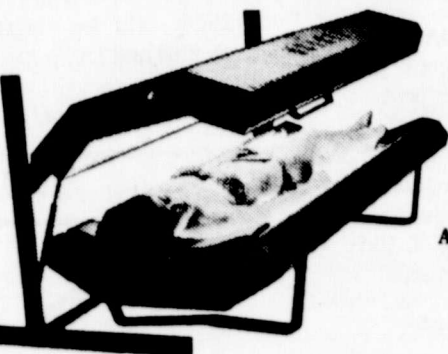
JP Coordinator To Begin Duties

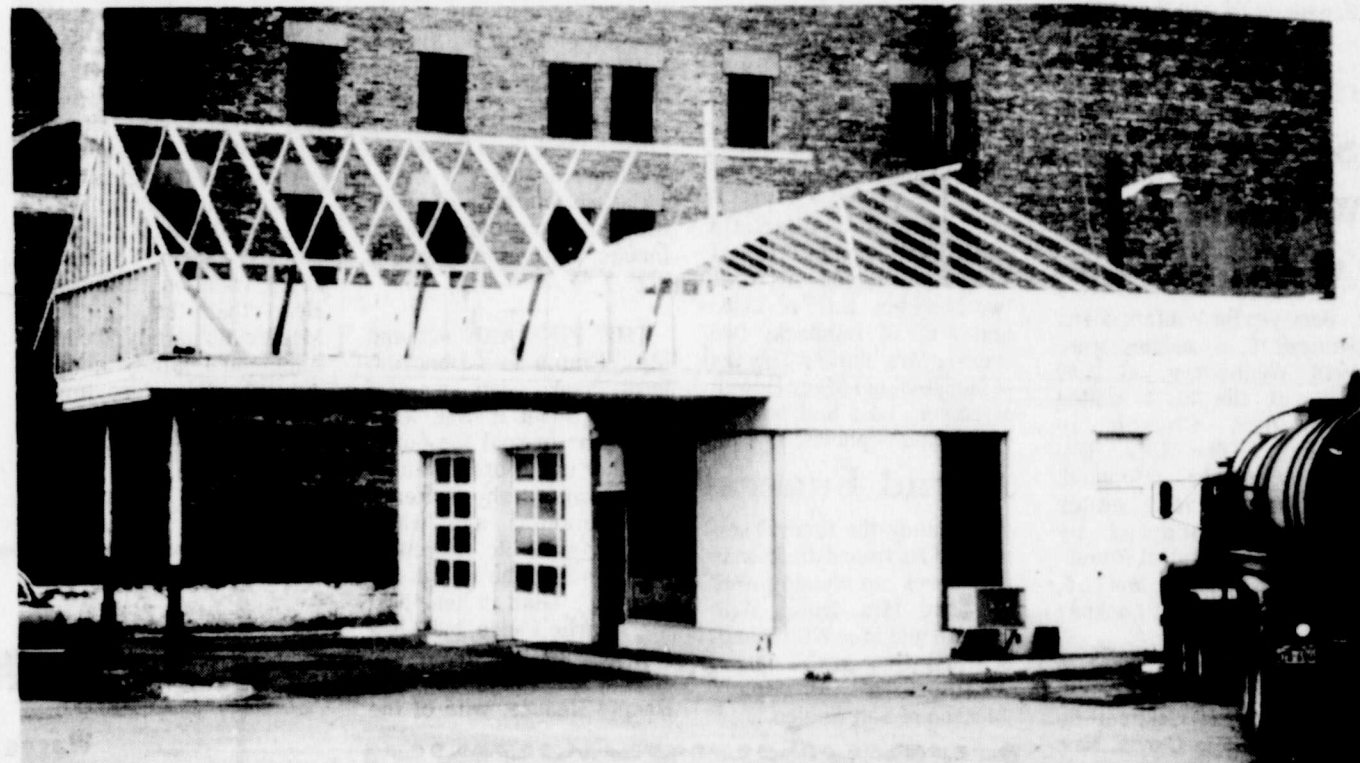
