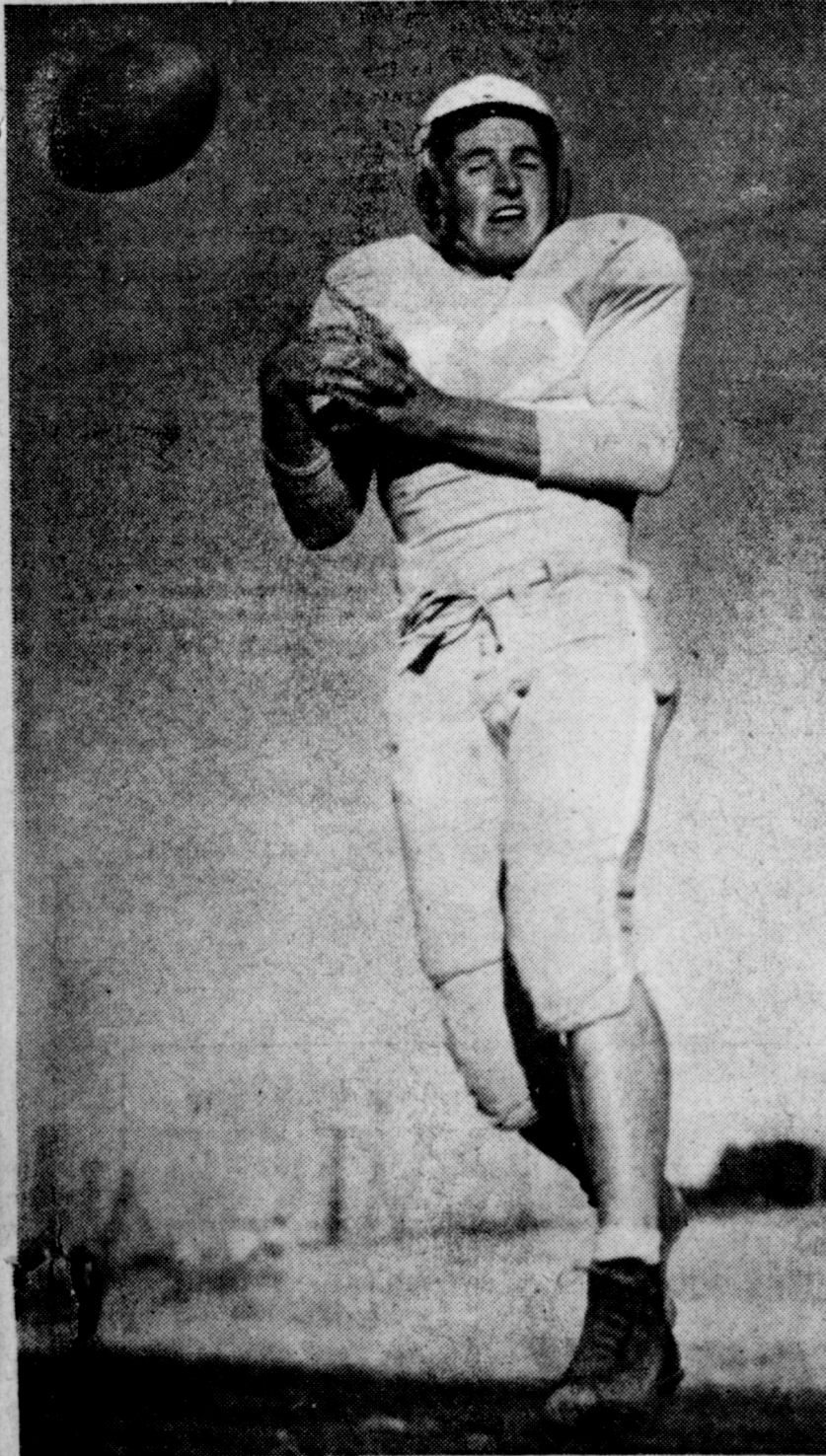

## More Than 2,300 Bales Ginned Here As Growers Find Some Needed Hands

### Church Addition For Lazbuddie

First Baptist Church of Lazbuddie is planning to erect an educational building, starting in the near future. Rev. L. B. Edwards, pastor, said today.

The addition will join the present building and will be 32 by 48 feet in dimensions, and of two stories. The building will provide needed class rooms for Sunday School and Training Union, an assembly hall and social room seating from 75 to 125 persons, and a modern kitchen.

Plans for the new building were discussed at a conference of the church held Wednesday night. At that time Rev. J. D. Wharton, Amarillo, the architect, explained details of the building plan. Rev. Wharton is with the extension department of the Baptist State Board, and is cooperating with rural churches over Texas in their building programs.

Farmers around Muleshoe have been more fortunate the last few days in securing cotton pullers and Muleshoe gins' total of bales turned out rose accordingly. Wednesday a poll of the three plants, Edwards Gin, Copley Gin and Muleshoe Gin showed 2,335 bales ginned. Cotton was worth about 28 to 30 cents depending upon staple and grade and seed was worth \$85 a ton.

Many Mexican cotton pullers have come into the territory in the last week or ten days, and they thronged the streets here Saturday. Their patronage helped to swell the day's total business at Muleshoe stores.

Frost occurred on three mornings this week and the leaves will soon be falling. This will mean, some believe, that mechanical cotton pullers, many of which are in the hands of farmers here, will do the bulk of the cotton harvesting this year. Some of the pullers get 7 to 10 bales of cotton a day. If this comes true, cotton picking here will not be the long drawn out affair that it usually is.

### Guinn's Shop In New Building

The building is 40 x 60 feet exclusive of the paint booth, which is 12 by 22 feet in dimensions.

Mr. Guinn has been in the paint and body repair business for many years, the last several in Muleshoe. He has to assist him a corps of helpers who are thoroughly trained in making crippled or faded auto like new.

The company specializes in rebuilding wrecked cars, straightening the frame, rolling out fenders and body, making all necessary repairs and repainting. In their new paint booth they are able to apply the paint at the temperature suggested by the manufacturer of the car being worked on. The booth is explosion proof and dust proof.

Another service now being supplied by Guinn is the undersealing of automobiles, using DeVilbiss Chassis Undercoater. A rubberized substance is applied underneath fenders, running boards, on chassis, motor tops, etc., and eliminates rattling, prevents rust, and keeps bolts from working loose. 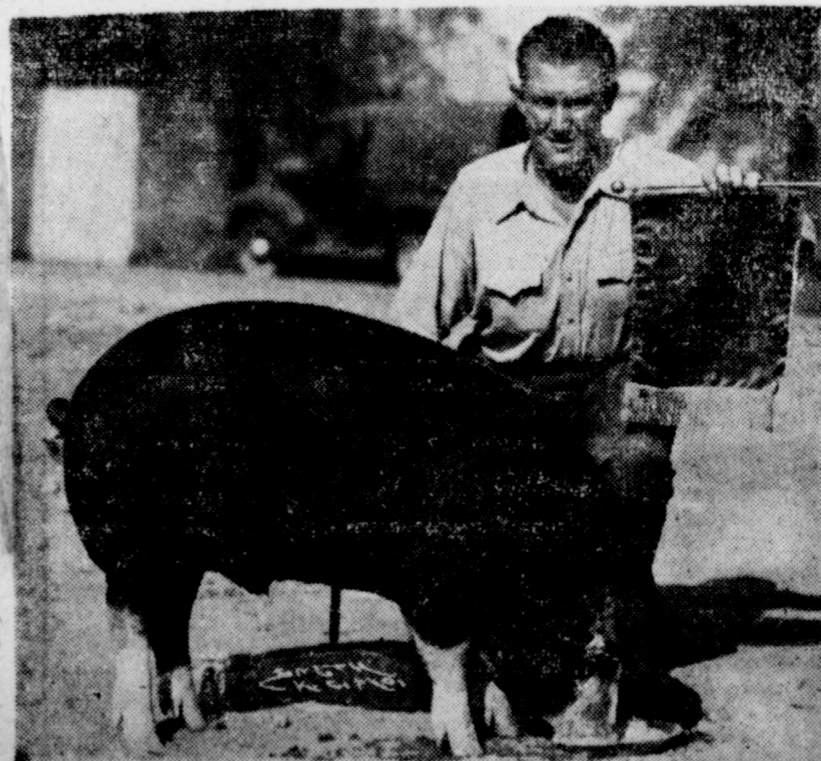

### Santa Fe Crop Report Notes The Dismal Outlook For Plains Wheat

The September drought, with few variations, continued in Texas during October and all crops, except cotton, were somewhat cut in production. Cotton seems to be in better condition and is yielding higher as a result of the hot, dry weather. With picking 85 per cent completed, the last cotton estimate of 3,150,000 bales stands unchanged,

against 1,669,000 bales a year ago, and 3,021,000 bales the 10-year average. Corn is estimated at 50,193,000 bushels, grain sorghums at 57,849,000 bushels, rice at 22,491,000 bushels and peanuts at 319,600,000 pounds. Rice alone shows a material increase over last year.

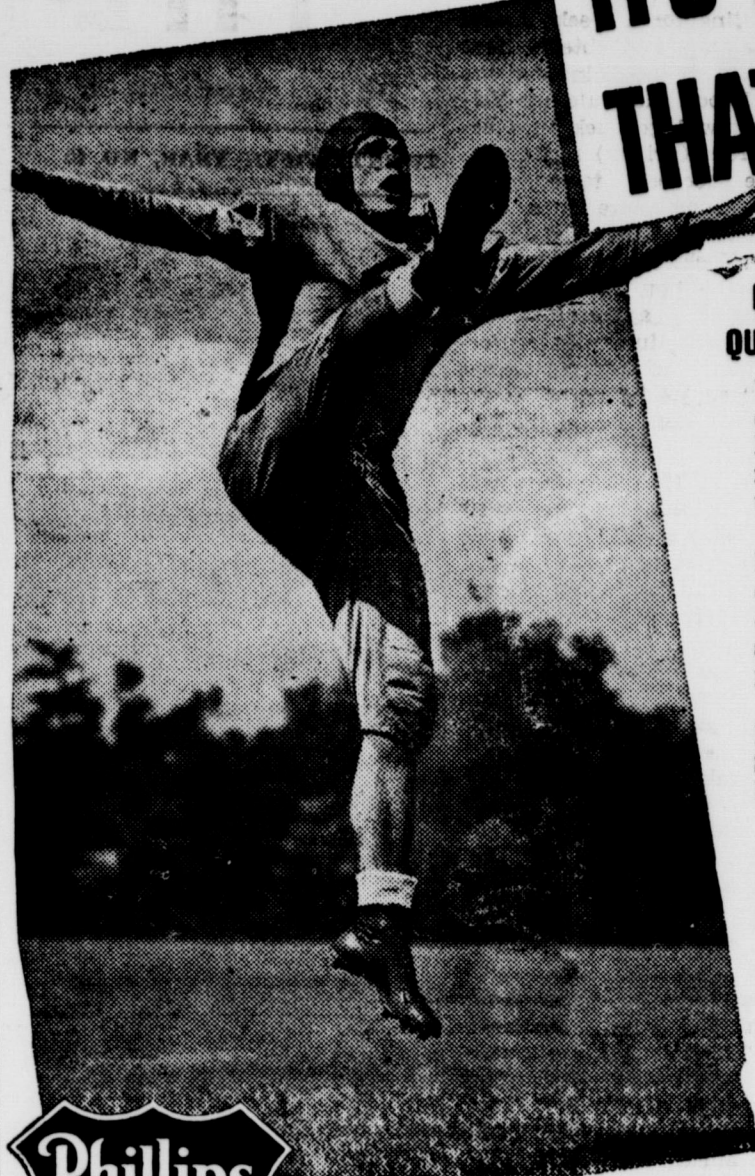
Scattered showers over most of North Texas during the past week brought enough moisture to probably sprout volunteer wheat but not

enough for continued growth. For this reason many farmers are using caution in planting fall grains, and some are waiting for additional moisture.

Extreme drought has prevailed over all of Northwest Texas for the past four months. There is very little subsoil moisture in storage, and all wheat land is dry to the bottom. An exception, of course, is summer fallow land and a few areas favored by heavy showers but for the most part the latter have been widely scattered and offered only temporary relief.

Moisture has not been sufficient to start volunteer wheat so that it

could be killed before sowing the main crop. Careful estimates indicate that only between 30 and 40 per cent of the wheat acreage has been planted, part of which is irrigated and well started. Some wheat planted in dust had enough moisture to bring it up but not enough to keep it alive. Such fields will have to be resown.

Regardless of the present rather dismal outlook, wheat in this part of Texas may be planted any time up to February and still make a fair crop. The remedy is sufficient moisture in time to start the crop and the right kind of weather to keep it in good condition until the spring growing season.

Weather in this section of the

state has been favorable for harvesting cotton and the yield is turning out better than expected. Picking will continue through November. Grain sorghums also are giving up surprisingly good yields, with harvest at a peak. The sugar beet crop is the best in several years.

A fair to good crop of head lettuce grown this fall in the vicinities of Monroe, Plainview, Littlefield and Hereford, is now being harvested and assembled at Monroe for disposal. Quality of the lettuce is said to be good.

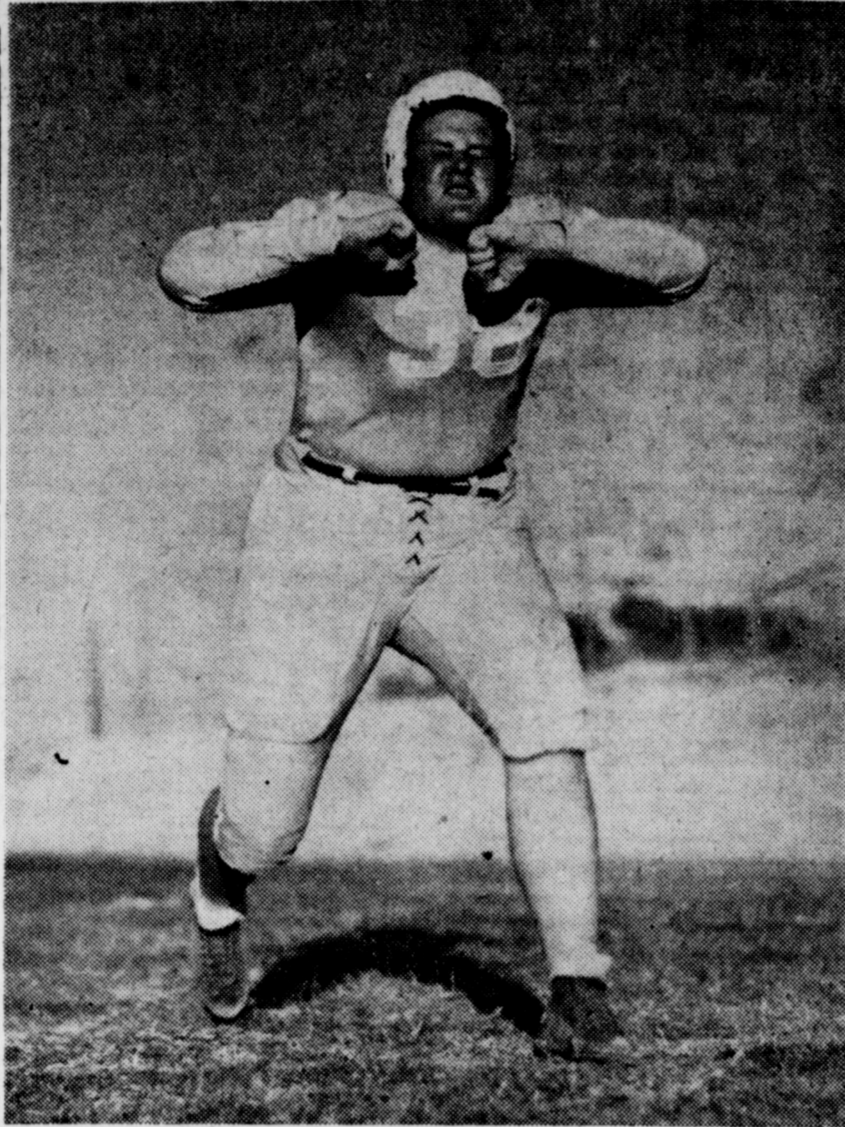



**STORMPROOF COTTON SEED TO BE SCARCE**

Lubbock—Seed from improved

stormproof cotton recently developed by the agricultural experiment station at Lubbock will probably be very scarce and hard to find until the 1949 planting season, according to Dr. A. W. Young, head of the Texas Technological college plant industry department.

Dr. Young, who recently described superior features of the new variety as shown on the college farm, has received numerous inquiries from farmers who wish to obtain seed.

Small lots of seeds were distributed for planting in seed blocks this year, he explained, and most of the receivers will probably wish to keep this year's seed yield for next year. However, seed should be more

For a fruit batter, combine 1 cup pancake ready-mix with ½ cup milk, 1 beaten egg and 1 tablespoon sugar. Stir lightly. Dip fruit in batter and fry in hot deep fat 370° F. until golden brown.

**French Fried Shrimp**

Peel raw shrimp; remove black vein, drain and salt well. Dip in batter and fry in hot deep fat about 2 minutes.

**French Fried Cauliflower**

Wash cauliflower and separate into flowers. Boil vigorously for 2 to 3 minutes in salted water. Drain. Dip each flower into batter. Fry in hot deep fat for 2 to 3 minutes.

**French Fried Eggplant**

Peel eggplant. Cut crosswise in ¼-inch slices. Cut each slice into pie-shaped wedges. Dip in batter. Fry in hot deep fat for 2½ to 3 minutes.

**French Fried Fruit**

Dip fruit (pineapple rings, half bananas, apricots, peaches or apple slices) in fruit batter and fry in hot deep fat for 1 to 3 minutes.

**French Fried Onions**

Peel medium-sized Bermuda onions and slice crosswise in ¼-inch slices. Separate rings. Dip in batter and fry in hot deep fat for about 2 minutes.

## Louis Bromfield To Speak On Soil Conservation At Lubbock Nov. 13th

Twelve thousand personal invitations to a series of six open soil conservation lectures in the West Texas and Panhandle territory served by Fort Worth and Denver City and the Wichita Valley Railways are being mailed to bankers, farmers, business men, and other individuals throughout that territory by the Second National Bank of Houston, which, in cooperation with these railways comprising the Burlington Lines in Texas, will bring the noted author and lecturer, Louis Bromfield, to Texas to be principal speaker at these meetings.

The public is being urged to attend Mr. Bromfield's lectures so that everyone may be made to realize the meaning of soil conservation and agricultural development in its true sense, and to realize also what the annual loss of Texas' rich, producing top-soil mean to him individually.

Scheduled at six centrally located points, these meetings will be held in Corsicana, November 10, Fort Worth, November 11th; Amarillo, November 12th; Lubbock, November 13th; Wichita Falls, November 14th; and Abilene, November 15th. Local committees in these towns, comprised of bankers, business men, county and home demonstration agents, garden club workers, and Soil Conservation and Burlington Lines representatives, are working out details of the programs at each point.

Afternoon and evening lectures are to be delivered by Mr. Bromfield. Plans for the afternoon meetings at each point are under the supervision of local garden club organizations; the evening meetings are being planned by committees comprised of Chamber of Commerce and other business and agricultural interests.

A large group of nationally known business men, agricultural experts and others interested in soil conservation and agricultural development will accompany Mr. Bromfield. More than 150 reservations have been made for accommodations on the Burlington Lines' special train which will transport him and the bank and railroad group on this trip.

Ralph Budd, president, and L. R. Capron, vice president, Traffic, Burlington Lines, Chicago; C. D. Peck-

enbaugh, vice president and general manager, Fort Worth; R. Wright Armstrong, executive assistant, Houston; C. S. Edmonds, freight traffic manager, and Robert L. Hoyt, general passenger, also of Fort Worth; and A. G. Hepperly, agricultural agent, Denver, will accompany the party.

L. R. Bryan, Jr., president, C. M. Malone, vice chairman of the board; Tom O'Brien, vice president; and O. Dooley Dawson, vice president and manager, agricultural department, all of the Second National Bank of Houston, will be in the group accompanying Bromfield. Dawson was

the principal speaker at a series of five soil conservation meetings which were held cooperatively by the Bank and Burlington Lines successively in Haskell, Iowa Park, Dalhart, Memphis and Plainview in January of this year. The January meetings were such an outstanding success that this larger and much more comprehensive program is being undertaken.

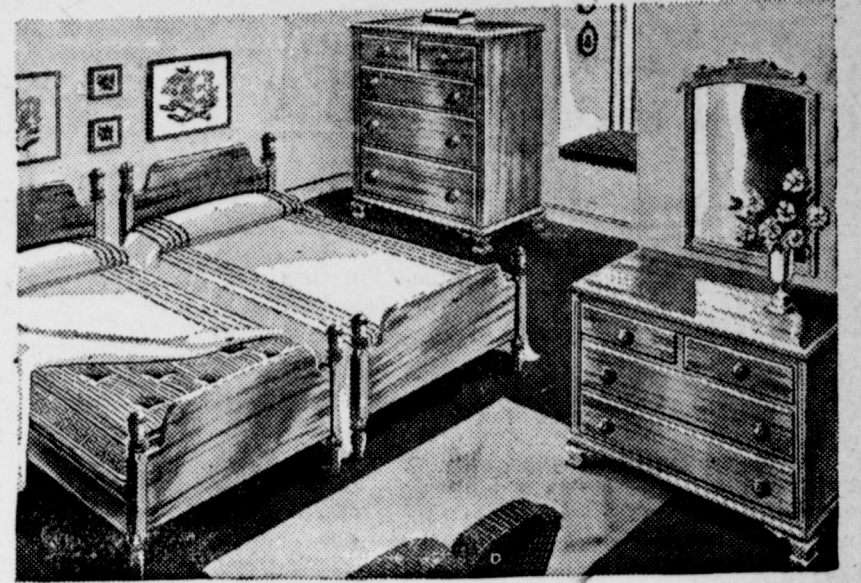

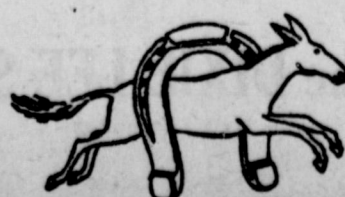

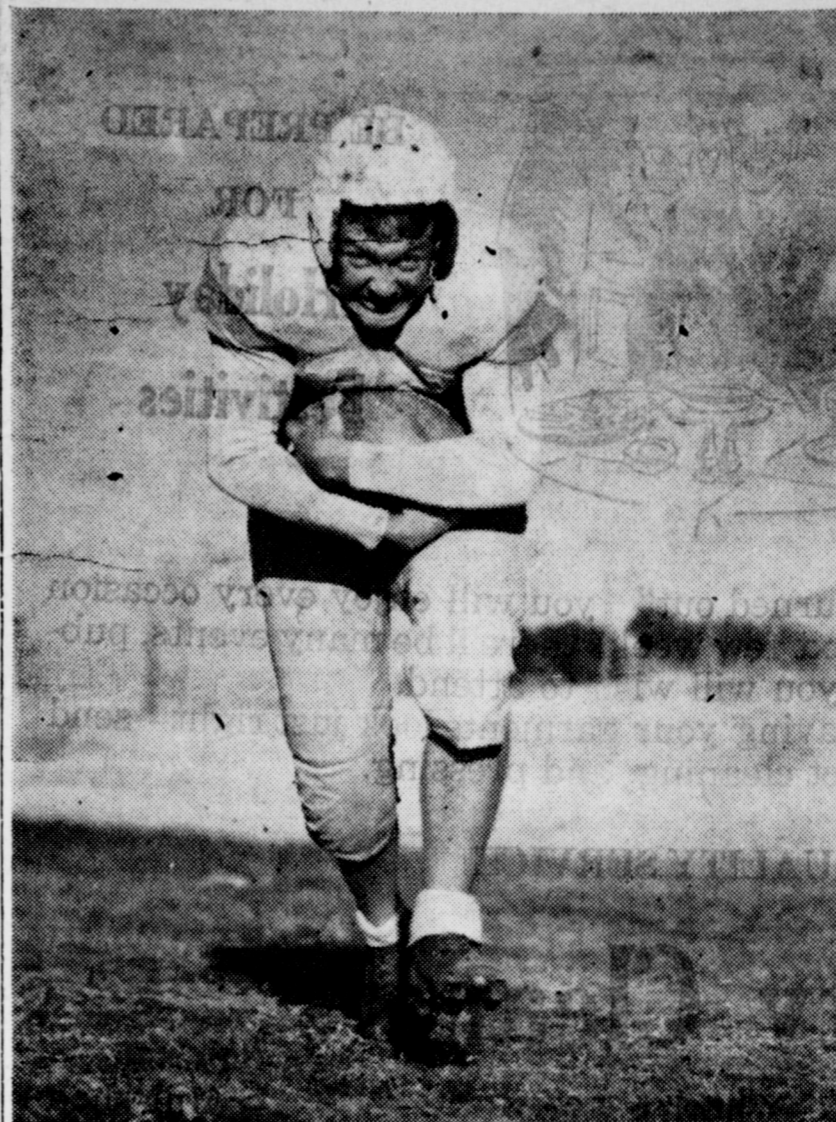
### CONSTRUCTION STARTED ON NEW STORE BUILDING

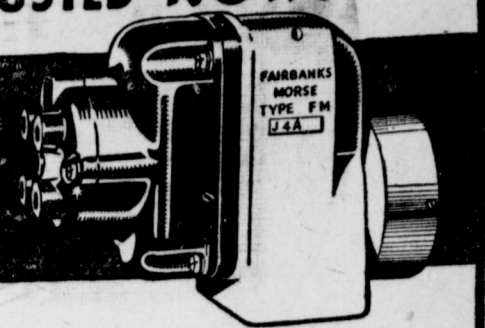

### The Xavier

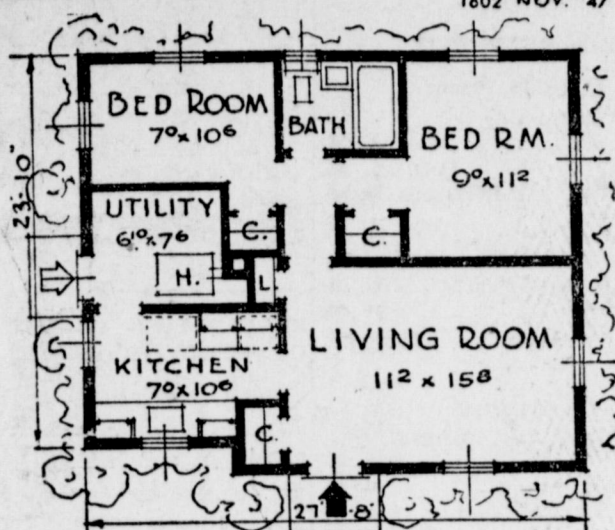
