Series Theme Set At Church Of Christ

"NEW EVERY MORNING" will be the theme of a special series of services to be held at the Cisco Church of Christ, 1-20 at Avenue N, on Monday through Thurs-

day evenings, April 1-4, at 7:30 p.m.

Speaker for the series will be Lynn Anderson, well-known minister of the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene. Congregational singing will be led by Eris Ritchie of Cisco.

Anderson, a native of Canada, has been minister of the Highland church in Abilene for fourteen years. He is well known throughout the Abilene-Big Country area for his sixty-second radio program heard at regular intervals on several radio stations in this area, and his program is also carried in New Mexico.

Mr. Anderson has conducted gospel meetings in most of the 50 states as well as throughout Canada. He

has also preached in Europe, Latin America, and Brazil. Additionally he conducts Spiritual Development Seminars, Church Growth Workshops and Marriage Seminars.

Anderson's "Living Word" cassette tapes and printed materials are produced and circulated widely throughout the USA and Canada. Approximately 30,000 of his tapes are circulated each year.

He has been speaker for large-scale "Campaigns for Christ" in Moses Lake, Washington; Salisbury, Maryland; and Sacramento, California; and he personally directed three-week campaigns in two different Canadian cities, with 30 full-time workers in each.

Mr. Anderson has been a featured speaker in Lectureships at Abilene Christian University, Harding University, Pepperdine University, the University of Texas, Texas Tech, and several other colleges and universities in the USA and Canada.

Anderson is the author of two books, *Steps to Life and American Preachers in Canadian Churches*. He has also had articles published frequently in various periodicals.

Jim Hatcher, speaking for the Cisco Church of Christ, its elders and members, has issued a cordial invitation to everyone in the Cisco-Eastland County and surrounding area to come and hear Mr. Anderson for any or all of his four "NEW EVERY MORNING" presentations.

U.S. Flag Is Stolen At CJC Campus Sign

The huge 12x18 foot United States flag was stolen from the new flag pole on College Hill at about 9 p.m. Friday, March 22, according to a report by Police Chief Billy Rains. The garrison type flag has a value of about \$500, Mr. Rains said.

A motorist driving up the hill noticed a white pickup parked near the new flag poles, Mr. Rains said. He saw three numbers—473—on the pickup's license plates.

"We would appreciate it very much if anyone seeing a white pickup with '473' as part of their license plate identifying numbers and letters would call us," Mr. Rains said.

Cisco Junior College plans to prosecute the thief, the chief said. Theft of anything worth \$500 is a misdemeanor theft and punishable by fine and jail sentence, he added.

City and county authorities are investigating the flag theft.

Investigation Underway In Two Burglaries

Burglary of two residences were being investigated by the Cisco Police Department this week, Chief Billy Rains reported. The home of Dr. and Mrs. E.E. Addy at 1212 Park Drive and the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Spencer at 1003 West 16th Street were burglarized.

Chief Rains said thieves entered the Addy home between March 19 and 24 and took a number of household items and jewelry of undetermined value.

Missing from the Spencer home last weekend were a weed eater, an electric chain saw, a battery charger, an air tank and a ladder, all valued at about \$285, the police report said.

Couple Plead Guilty Here

Timothy and Vickie Teads of Mineral Wells stood trial last week in 91st District Court in Eastland on charges of burglarizing the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Evans in Cisco.

Authorities reported that the husband and wife entered a guilty plea and received 10-year probated sentences. In addition, they must make restitution for the stolen merchandise.

Last August, the church had a Revival Meeting with this young evangelist, now 27 years old, from Cleveland, Ohio, and the church experienced a tremendous spiritual impact. So impressed was Pastor West with this evangelist's ministry, he decided to have him back again.

During that Revival meeting last August, there were ten people saved and a great many other decisions

made by the members of the Bible Baptist Church.

Soon after his conversion, he surrendered his life to full-time evangelism and God has been using him mightily ever since. Evangelist Kidd has a special appeal to young people.

Pastor West would like to invite everyone to come and hear this great man of God preach. Services will begin on Sunday, March 31, at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m., then Monday, April 1 through Friday, April 5 at 7:30 p.m.

However, I am sure Cisco is no different from any other city in the world in this particular statistic.

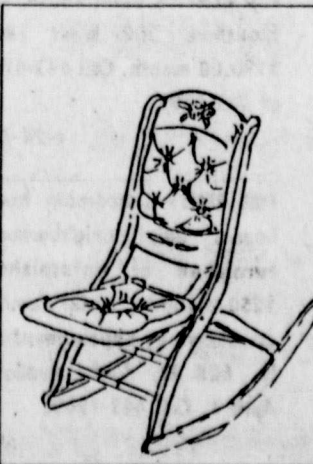

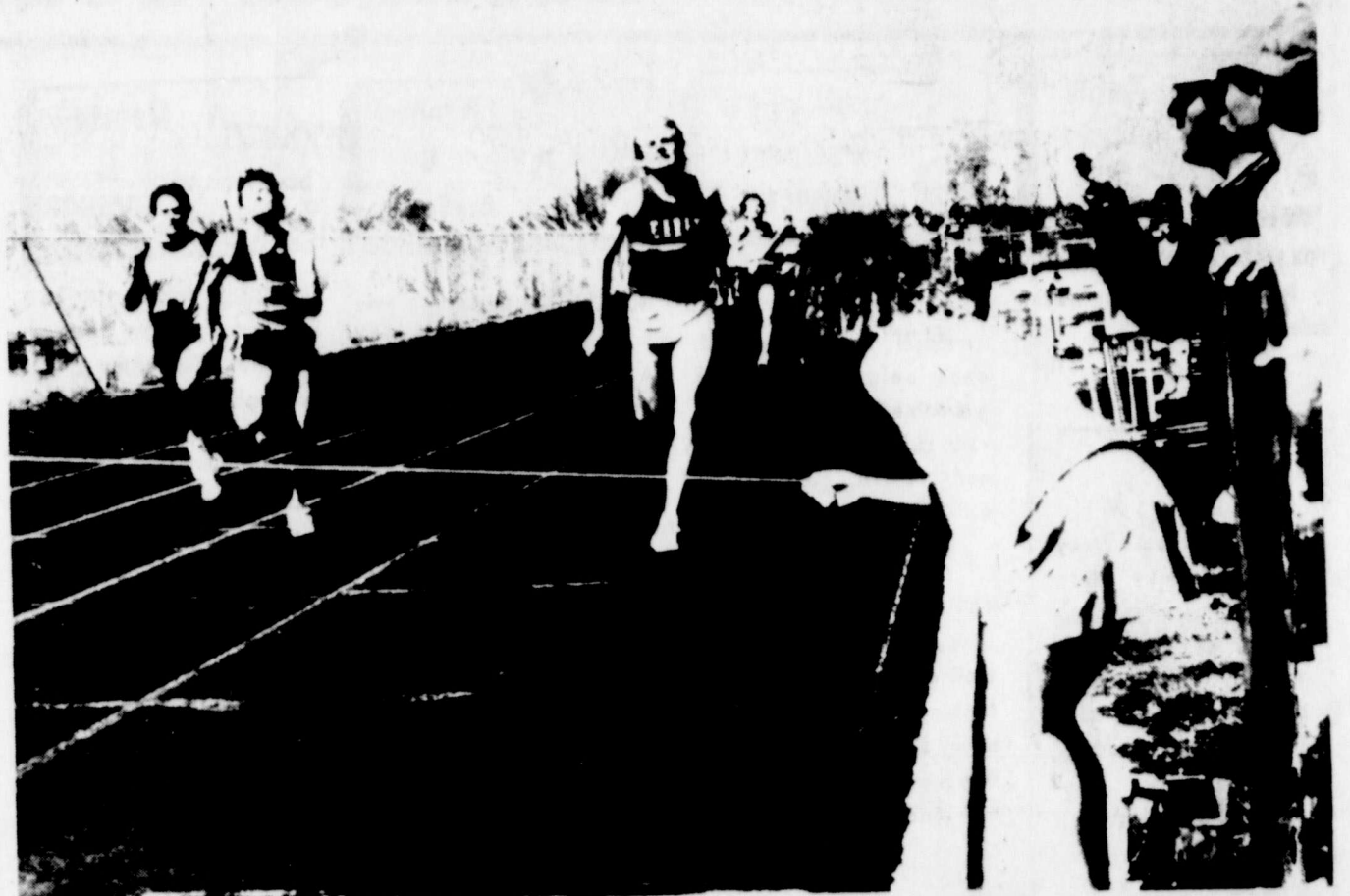

Veterans Using State Housing Assistance

According to Jack Mathis, Commander, VFW Post 4136, Eastland County, a large number of veterans have used the State Housing Assistance Program to purchase a home. This program was established by the Texas Legislature in 1983, and went into effect February 1, 1984. Since that date, some 15,000 veterans have applied for the financial assistance provided through the State of Texas.

Eligible to participate in this program are veterans who were legal residents of Texas at the time of entering

into active military service, and were honorably discharged after serving 90 days or more at any time since September 16, 1940. Also eligible are veterans who entered service from other states, but who have resided in Texas for five years or more.

Under this program, the eligible veteran locates the home he wishes to purchase, completes a purchase contract through a private mortgage company, and makes application to the State Veterans Land Board. The application papers are pro-

cessed by the mortgage company for submission to the Veterans Land Board in Austin, Texas. When the veteran is shown to be entitled, the Land Board will advance \$20,000 to the mortgage company, representing a down payment on the veteran's loan, and usually resulting in a lesser interest rate than would be applied to

the loan without a down payment or a smaller down payment.

Veterans desiring to take advantage of this home loan assistance program may contact a local mortgage company, who will process all of the paper work that is necessary. One such company is Cassle & Cassle, Inc., Abilene.

Number Of Pipeline Crossings On County Commissioners Agenda

The Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting on Monday, March 25 in the Commissioners Courtroom. All the Commissioners were present: Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Jack Blackwell, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4.

Due to the press of business in the County Judge's office, Judge Scott Bailey alternated with C.B. Dill on presiding at the Commissioners meeting.

Most of the items on the agenda were requests to cross county roads with pipelines. Don Craig of El Paso Hydrocarbons Co. requested permission to cross County Road 211 in Pct. 3 with a gas line. This is in the Union Center community, about 2 1/2 mi. from Rising Star. The request was approved.

The next request was from Eastland Petroleum Land Services, represented by Ben Paxton, to cross County Roads 374 and 375 in Pct. 3 with pipelines, one a gas line and one to carry salt water. This location is about 6 mi. N.E. of Rising Star.

The request was approved, but Commissioner Owen asked for special care in laying the lines at this location.

Paxton promised to comply with all safety standards, and invited inspection of the project.

Another request that followed was from Gilbert Meredith on behalf of Enserch Exploration, Inc. This was for a 6 in. gas line to cross County Road 337 in Pct. 1, five miles north of Eastland. This is just north of Morton Valley. The request was approved.

Greg Fox, of Flatwood Gas Co. then brought a request for permission to cross County Road 313 in Pct. 1 with a 3 in. gas line. This is in the Flatwood Community, south of Eastland. The request was approved.

Next on the agenda was the request that the Commissioners consider an order abandoning a portion of Old Strawn Road in Pct. 2, adjacent to Highway 16. Bill Hart, Attorney, appeared on behalf of Hugh Wolfe, Real Estate Developer of Stephenville.

The road lies near the east side of the County, north of I-20. It was once the main road to Strawn, but has not been in general use since the construction of a new road. Its main function now, the Commissioners were informed, "Is a place for beer

drinkers to pull off the main roads and drink".

When one Commissioner asked what they would do if the road was closed, another chuckled and replied that we didn't need to worry about them - they would always find a place to drink.

On a more serious note, Bill Hart stated that the landowners on each side of the approx. one mile of roadway, Wolfe and Walker, will sign a mutual agreement to purchase the roadway and provide a right-of-way in an equitable fashion.

He asked that the Commissioners pass a resolution authorizing him to do the necessary legal work in setting this county-owned property. The intent to abandon the road would be advertised, and an appraiser then be set up to determine the selling price of the property to the adjacent owners.

The Commissioners approved this plan.

Homemaking Hints County Extension Agent Janet Thomas

March is National Nutrition Month. Today's lifestyle means healthful living, and at the pulse of living right is eating right. Foods with lowered saturated fat, cholesterol and calorie levels are especially in tune with good health.

A balanced diet is the key to good eating habits. A balanced diet is the daily selection of a variety of foods that fulfills the body's needs for essential nutrients—proteins, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins, minerals and water.

Learning to choose those foods that provide key nutrients and lower amounts of fats and cholesterol is important. Avoid fat cuts of meat, addition of saturated fat when cooking meat, large meat portions and processed meats high in saturated fat. Also high saturated fat dairy products, baked goods high in saturated fat and cholesterol, butter, shortenings and margarine high in saturated fat, candies high in saturated fat, egg yolk,

bacon, lard and suet.

Select margarine made from vegetable oils only. The label is the key. The ingredient listed first is the major ingredient. A margarine that lists liquid vegetable oil as the first ingredient is low in saturated fat, high in polyunsaturates. While most vegetable oils are beneficial in a low saturated fat/low cholesterol diet. Scientific studies over a ten-year period show that none is more effective than liquid corn oil in lowering blood cholesterol.

Fish, chicken, turkey and veal are all recommended and should be eaten frequently because they are lower in saturated fat than most meats. Fish, is a particularly good choice. Shellfish, however, is a high source of cholesterol, and should be used sparingly. Avoid duck and goose.

Beef-choose lean cuts of beef, such as rump, round and tenderloin. Trim all extra fat before cooking. Ground beef—don't buy it

already ground unless it is lean. Preferably, have it ground to order from lean round. Lamb—the leg and loin sections are the leanest; trim all visible fat. Avoid organ meats, luncheon meats, hot dogs and sausage-processed meats high in saturated fats.

Select skim milk and skim milk cottage cheese in place of whole milk and cheese which are high in saturated fat and cholesterol.

Egg yolks are the highest single source of cholesterol in the average American diet.

Almost all fresh fruit and vegetables contain very little fat or any kind and are, therefore highly recommended in a modified fat diet.

In general, breads and cereals are low in saturated fat and cholesterol. Other products like rice, macaroni and flour are also excellent foods for a modified fat diet. Avoid egg noodles and baked goods high in saturated fat and cholesterol.

Select desserts low in fat. Gelatin desserts, sherbet, corn-starch puddings made with skim milk, angel food cake and fruit are good examples.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Fajitas are very popular in Texas restaurants. The beef skirt steak now so popular for fajitas used to be thrown away by meat wholesalers or ground into hamburger.

If you have not tried fajitas, they are excellent. This is lean-nutritious cooking at its best!


BEEF FAJITAS

Marinate whole skirt steak 24 hours in:
1 part soy sauce
1/2 part Worcestershire sauce
1/2 part lemon juice
1/4 part salad oil
1/4 part red wine
1/4 part pineapple juice
Cook on a barbecue grill. Slice into thin strips across the grain. Place on a warm tortilla, add sauce to taste, roll and enjoy.

CHICKEN FAJITAS

Cut 2 chicken breasts into thin strips, 2" long. Marinate in juice of 1 lime. Heat 2 tbsp. oil; add 1 clove garlic, crushed and sautee 1 minute. Add 1 onion, cut in rings and 1 bell pepper, cut in julienne strips. Sauté until translucent. Remove from skillet, add chicken strips to skillet with liquid and 1 tbsp. pepper. Sauté until chicken is done. Add vegetables and quickly reheat. Serve with warm flour tortillas and choice of toppings.

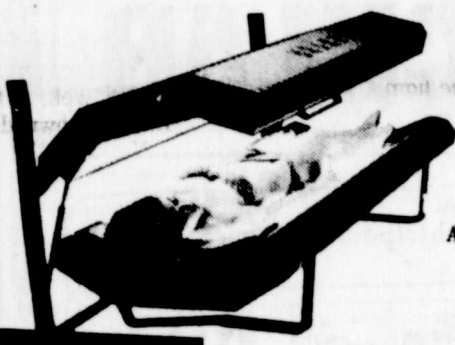

Eastland County History

Cisco Chapter No. 461, Order Of The Eastern Star was organized October 26, 1921. Its principal officers were Grace D. Bettis, Worthy Matron; Goodson Bedford, Worthy Patron and Ava Green, Associate Patron.

Soon after the cessation of Hostilities in the first world war, the John Williams Butts post of the American Legion was organized at Cisco. It was so named in honor of John William Butts, son of the late John J. and Burnie Butts, long time residents of Cisco, who was killed in line of duty in air plane accident while carrying the mail.

The Veterans Of Foreign Wars, whose membership is made up of those who have seen service in the armed forces of the United States outside the limits of its home territory, have a camp at Cisco. This organization, and others of like nature, do much to keep the fire of patriotism burning and the spirit of national service alive in our citizenship.

The First Methodist Church at Cisco was organized in a log cabin in the year 1880 by the Rev. Lamb Trimble. M.V. Mitchell and wife and Mr. and Mrs. Walton were the entire membership. Mr. Mitchell was steward and presumably its secretary and treasurer. The log cabin is supposed to have been the same in which Calista Green taught the first school in the community, at Red Gap. When Cisco was founded, the church moved to town. In the interim Rev. Andrews had served as circuit rider and John Lane as Steward.

Rev. Elijah Mills is said to have been the next minister to lead the church and it was during his term of service that the little church, supposed to have been made up of about twenty members,

held its meetings in the frame or box house which was also used for school purposes.

Shortly afterwards, under the leadership of pastor John A. Wallace a small church building was erected on the site of its present house of worship. In 1890, John A. Wiseman was in charge of the Cisco Station. He seems to have been followed as pastor by T.C. Ragsdale, under whose leadership the structure was enlarged but was destroyed by the cyclone in 1893.

As in the case of other churches in Cisco, the congregation was not denied a place of worship and soon began a new one which was a credit to the congregation and the town. This building cost around six thousand dollars and a parsonage was

erected at an approximated cost of twelve hundred dollars. The membership at this time was three hundred.

The present home of the body was begun under the pastorage of Rev. Humphrey Lee in 1918, is a beautiful and well arranged edifice and cost around eighty thousand dollars.

Those who have served following Rev. Ragsdale are; R.F. Dunn 1894; J.H. Chambliss 1895-96; S.W. Turner 1897-98; E. Hightower 1899-00; S.J. Vaughn 1901-03; J.R. Henson 1904-07; B.W. Dodson 1908-09; W.H. Doss 1910; K.P. Barton 1911-12; J.E. Crawford 1913-14; J.M. Wynne 1915; E.L. Loyd 1916-17; Humphrey Lee 1918; L.N. Stuckey 1919-21; H.B. Watts 1922; L.A. Webb 1923; S.J. Rucker 1925; P.T. Stan-

ford 1926-27; F.E. Singleton 1928-29; O.O. Odum 1932; F.L. Turner 1933; W.H. Cole 1934; J.I. Patterson 1936-40.

In 1890, in addition to Cisco Station there is also a Cisco Circuit, supplied by Rev. R.B. Vaughn who probably served in that capacity through 1903. In 1907 this service was called a Mission and M.J. Vaughn is said to have been in charge but in 1910 it was called a circuit under the care of I.N. Anderson but reverted to mission standing in 1912 which it maintained until the creation of the Twelfth Street Church in 1920 with C.E. Wilkins in charge. Rev. Wilkins was succeeded by U.S. Sherrill in 1921; H.B. Ellis, 1923; J.B. Weathers, 1925; W.L. Connell, 1926; R.T. Capps, 1928; O.A. Morton, 1930; Victor Dow, 1931; B.W. Cramer, 1933; A.B. Armstrong, 1934; Preston Broxton, 1936; R.H. Heiser,

1940.

Cisco Mission is said to have had a membership of 206 in 1915. Cisco Mission is again mentioned in 1936 and as having Bedford Chappel associated with it.

The house of worship of the twelfth Street Church was valued at \$7,000 and its parsonage at \$1200.00 in the conference report of 1936.

John T. Yeargin was sent by the Cisco Methodist Church as a messenger to the General Conference in 1882, the Reverend John Lane in 1886 and J.M. Williamson in 1898.

The First Baptist Church to be organized in the Western part of Eastland County seems to have been Red Gap Baptist Church in

1879 when Reverends C.G. Stephens and W.B. Cobb called together the adherents of that faith in the vicinity of Red Gap and organized Red Gap Baptist Church. It is said that this organization took place in a little log house which stood near the Western boundary of the Cisco Cemetery. In 1881, with the coming of the

railroads and the establishment of the town of Cisco the church moved its meeting place to the little long schoolhouse, used for all public meetings at the time.

Oil Belt News

Adler Petroleum Co. has finished a new producer in Eastland County's Adler Field, flowing 284,000 CF gas daily on a 16/64-inch choke, with flowing tubing pressure at 397 PSI. The absolute open flow came in at 485,000 CFD.

Drillsite was in the TE&L Survey, A-511, six miles northwest of Cisco. The well is designated as the No. 1 Yeager.

The operator took the hole to a 3,163-ft. bottom and perforated the Caddo Formation for production at 3,109 to 3,163 feet.

An unsuccessful developmental well has been written off as a dry hole in Eastland County's East Flatwood Field, three miles northeast of Carbon. The well probed to a dry bottom at 1,600 feet total depth. AWS Petroleum Co. was the operator. The well had been designated as the No. 2 Larry & Paula Morrow.

Eastland County's Ranger Field gained a new producer when the No. 5 Wood Heirs was finished by Double River Oil & Gas.

The No. 1 Bledsoe has been labeled as a dry hole by G H F Oil Co. at a location three miles northeast of Romney. The well had been spudded on February 5, 1985. It was located in the H&TC Survey, A-268. The wildcat try had reached 3,560 feet total drilling depth.

Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge is preparing to make hole for a 3,700-ft. developmental well in Eastland County, three miles east of Eastland. The venture is in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 148 acres under lease with drillsite in the HT&B Survey. The well will be known as the No. 2 Hildegard.

First production data have been filed for the No. 3 Maynard, a new producer in the Marsan Field, five miles southeast of Carbon, Eastland County.

With Morrison Energy as

The well pumped 42 barrels 40-gravity oil daily with 18 barrels water. With drillsite in the H&TC Survey, A-1937, the well was drilled to a total depth of 3,960 feet. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,476 to 3,518 feet into the hole.

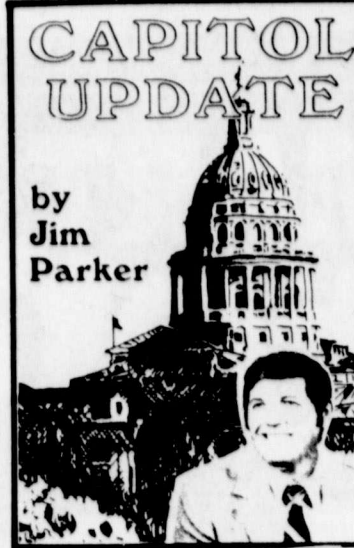

So many things are occurring in Austin that I think you should know about, I have simply given up trying to maintain any continuity in my weekly column and simply have succumbed to the overwhelming urge to talk to you about whatever subject that is, at the time of each writing, most present in my mind.

This week a couple of matters beg discussion.

Firstly, let me impart some information to you that I obtained only last week and I feel may be helpful to some of you. Fortunately, we do not have a great deal of crime but we do have some and, in about 1981, the Crime Victim's Compensation Act was passed with the purpose of compensating crime victims for "pecuniary loss" suffered as a result of criminal and quasi-criminal acts. This Act, until recently, had little or no significance because there were simply no funds with which to compensate crime victims. I have learned that this fund now is in excess of \$6M and am extremely concerned to find that there are almost no requests for compensation and cost assessment in criminal cases. Our locality

pays in our fair share and it will be our own fault if we do not get our fair share back through compensation to victims.

In theory every victim should be notified by local law enforcement or district attorney offices of the availability of these funds but, unfortunately, this does not always happen. The fund is administered by the Industrial Accident Board and it is a relatively simple process for one to avail himself of benefits, plus the fact, an applicant can recover attorney's fees expended in qualifying for compensation.

My staff and I are available to assist any of you who may be potential beneficiaries of this fund.

Secondly, since this space is running short, let me close with a few comments on the progress of H.B. 649, the subject of a prior article, dealing with relaxation of the requirements for participation in extra-curricular activities. That bill is set for

public hearing before the Committee on Public Education in the House on Wednesday, March 20th, at 2:00 p.m., in Austin. I am personally calling some of you who have unique circumstances to come to this meeting to testify and would ask all of you who can, and who are interested, to be present for the meeting and to sign witness affirmation forms in favor of the bill. There will be no necessity for your testimony, but your presence and signed form will serve as an indication of the extent of support for the legislation.

Believe it or not, public sentiment is still the greatest moving factor in the decision-making process of a legislator and your mere presence could have a tremendous effect. Again, if you need additional information or wish to reconfirm the committee schedule early next week, my staff will assist you in coordinating this effort.

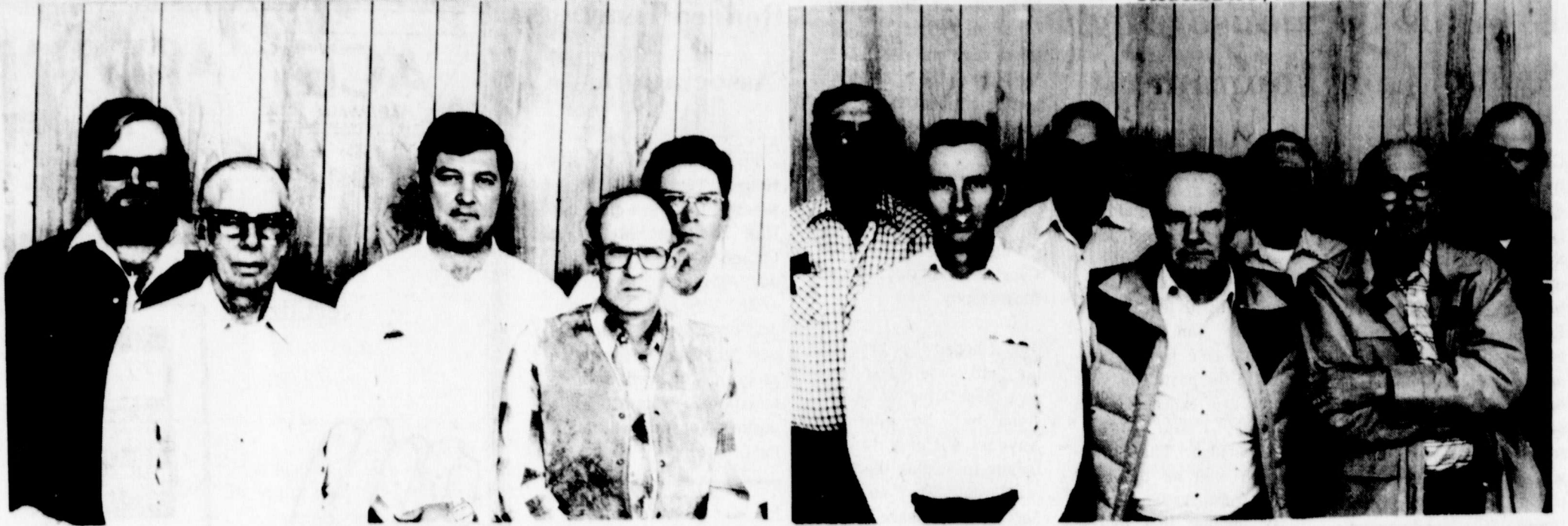
The awards were presented by Brownwood District Engineer Lawrence Schulz at the annual district-
