Work On Water Lines Will Begin

On Thursday, May 5th the City of Cisco issued "notices to proceed work" to the two contractors who will be installing the water distribution and water storage tank improvements. The new 8 and 6-inch looping water lines that are to be installed throughout the city will be done by Stegemoller Construction from Breckenridge and the water tower rehabilitation and painting has been contracted to G&S Sandblasting and Painting of Abilene. Both contractors will be starting construction on Wednesday or Thursday of this coming week.

This is the third element of the water system improvements that the city initiated in November of 1983 and is being funded through a loan from the Farmers Home Administration. The first two elements were the

12-inch feeder line to the water tower and the filter and facility improvements at the water treatment plant.

Wells was school no. one District 16, in 1884-85, had 52 pupils and three months of school. Voted a special tax of 20 cents on the one hundred dollars valuation in 1891-92 and had an enrollment of 40 in that year. The following year the location was changed and the school was called Curtis, situated on the D.B. Curtis Farm. After some years the location was changed to another part of the farm and continued as a school until its consolidation with the Pioneer Independent School System. The school house was destroyed by fire soon after the consolidation.

The Curtis Baptist Church was organized probably about 1890 as that is the time of its first appearance on the minutes of The Cisco Baptist Association. M.E. Surles was named as pastor in charge with a church membership of 43. The next appearance of the church on the rolls showed T.J. Nicholas as pastor in 1897, followed by W.B. Cobb in 1898-9. The next information at hand names G.P. May as pastor in 1903; T.H.B. McAllister in 1904; W.J. Rodgers in 1907; and E.E. Mason in 1908. In 1910, W.J. Smith was pastor followed by J. Thad Johnson in 1911, H.J. Lee in 1912-14 and P.D. O'Brien in 1915. The Church probably demised about that time as no further ap-

pearance on the minutes of the Association is found.

Union Baptist Church, in the Cook school community was organized about 1902 with a membership of 15 and F.C. Dick was its pastor for that year. G.P. May was pastor in 1903 and the membership had increased to 41. He was followed by J.A. McIntyre in 1904-05, he by J.W. Tennyson, 1907-08; B.G. Richburg 1910-13, E.E.

Mason 1914, B.G. Richburg, S.H. Williams, 1916-17, T.H.B. McAllister again in 1918, Frank Skaggs, 1921, J.W. Vaughn 1922-24, B.F. Sandle 1926, I.K. Holmes, 1928. He was followed by E.H. Scott probably from 1930 to 1933 and he by W.R. Ivie who served when Leon Woods the present pastor was called.

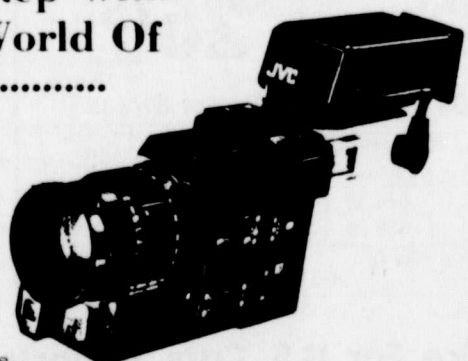

Homemaking Hints

The season for weddings and bridal showers has arrived. Sterling silver is one of the traditional wedding gifts for brides. I would like to make you aware of a special condition that happens when washing your sterling silverware.

Sterling silverware sometimes gets brown spots after washing. This reaction occurs only when silverware is new. Here's why. Sterling silver is, by law, 92½% pure silver and 7½% other alloys including copper for even greater durability. In automatic dishwashing, a reaction can occur between water droplets and the small portion of copper at the surface to cause brown spots on some pieces. After the silverware has been washed several times, the copper on the surface dissipates and a pure silver surface is laid bare. Avoid such spotting on new silverware by:

Using an automatic rinse dispenser feature of a dishwasher. The rinse agent lowers the surface tension of the rinse water so it sheets off the surfaces and droplets don't form.

Using a rinse agent in solid form that hangs on the dishwasher rack, if your dishwasher does not have an automatic rinse dispenser.

Removing new silverware from the dishwasher immediately after the last rinse cycle and towel drying for the first few times.

Washing and drying new silverware by hand for the first few times.

FROZEN STRAWBERRY DELIGHT
4 cups strawberries
1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
1 (8 oz.) container frozen whipped topping, thawed
1 (8¼ oz.) can crushed pineapple, drained
¼ cup lemon juice

Puree strawberries in container of an electric blender; set aside.

Combine condensed milk and whipped topping; stir until well blended. Stir in strawberry puree, pineapple, and lemon juice. Spoon mixture into a 13x9x2 inch pan; freeze until firm. Let stand at room temperature 15 minutes before serving. Yield 10 to 12 servings. Garnish with fresh strawberries as when you serve.

The Living Bible says, "Don't use bad language. Say only what is good and helpful to those you are talking to, and what will give them a blessing."

So make sure what you say is an improvement on the silence.

Audit May Save Money

Audits Cost Little

You can get an energy audit from several sources. The Residential Conservation Service (RCS) of the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) oversees state energy conservation programs, which perform home energy audits. Under the RCS program, most states offer audits costing about \$15. Most of the states not in the RCS program have their own energy audit programs. Homeowners can also hire private specialists in energy audits, usually at a cost ranging from \$60 to \$150.

Regardless of who conducts the audit, you should, if you follow the auditor's recommendations, save money in the long run because less energy will be used to heat and cool your home. Some researchers claim that energy audits of all American homes could reduce home heating demands by 50 percent.

An audit is "any thorough examination and evaluation of a problem." Mention that word to a taxpayer, however, and you're likely to see someone break out in a cold sweat.

But a different kind of audit—an energy audit—has been known to cause some people to break out in warm smiles. An energy audit can help you determine how energy efficient your home is and outline steps to save fuel and money.

The Mineral Insulation Manufacturers Association (MIMA) says it's a good idea because energy audits are fairly precise and relatively inexpensive. Sheldon Cady, MIMA's executive vice president, says, "An energy audit is well worth the money and the effort. First production data have been posted for the No. 2 J.E. Conner "A", a new producer in the Stephens Regular Field, two miles northwest of Parks.

With J.E. Conner as the operator, the well indicated it can flow 102,000 CF gas per day on a 3/8-inch choke. The absolute open flow came in at 15,300 CF. Flowing tubing pressure came in at 35 PSI.

Conner bottomed the well at 3,725 feet total drilling depth. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Caddo Formation, 3,088 to 3,162 feet into the hole. Drillsite was in the L.A.I. Survey, Stephens County.

Operating out of Midland, Expanding Energy Co. has staked location for the No. 2A Brazada "A", a developmental well in the Munneryn Field, two miles southwest of Frankell. The operator is aiming at production in the Mississippian Formation. With projected total depth of 4,200 feet, the venture is in a 40-acre lease in the T&P Survey.

Garvin Energy Corp. of Breckenridge is preparing to drill a 3,600-ft. developmental well in Stephens County, in the Breckenridge Townsite. The venture is in the Stephens Regular Field. The operator has five acres under lease with drillsite in

the L.A.I. Survey. The well will be known as the No. 1 King-Brown.

A successful natural gas wildcat has been completed in two different formations in a Palo Pinto County drillsite three miles east-northeast of Lone Camp.

With Cabot Petroleum as the operator, the No. 1 James F. Alexander will produce from both the Bend and Marble Falls Formations.

It showed ability to produce 1,120,000 CF gas per day from the Bend at 3,706 to 3,613 feet into the hole. It also indicated it can make 717,000 CF gas per day from the Marble Falls sat 4,076 to 4,112 feet into the wellbore.

Cabot had taken the venture to total depth of 4,779 feet and had plugged back to 4,703.

The North Mineral Wells Field gained a new producer when the No. 1 R.W. Decker "C" was finaled by Trumter Petroleum in a lease one mile northeast of the Oran community.

Bottomed at 4,995 feet, it will produce from a perforated interval in the Bend Conglomerate 4,734 to 4,740 feet into the hole. On flow pressure of 524 PSI, the well showed it can flow 927,000 CF gas per day through an 18/64 opening.

Home Remodeling Soars

Now that the interest rates on long-term mortgages are dropping, can the rates on home improvement loans be far behind? Many economists don't think so. Even without a substantial drop in rates for improvement loans, some people linked to the home remodeling field expect to see the industry take off in this decade.

According to the market research firm of Frost & Sullivan, the remodeling industry should grow by 25 percent to a record \$64 billion in 1984 and by another 23 percent to \$79 billion in 1986.

Market Grows

There are several reasons for the outstanding growth in home remodeling, says Julie Cahn, director of the Vinyl Siding Institute. "Among them are the steady aging of the nation's housing inventory, the development of new building products that are attractive and durable and the desire on the part of consumers for good looking, long lasting products that are easy to care for. Modern siding is an example."

Nearly \$2.9 billion worth of siding was sold in 1982. This year, according to one building industry magazine estimate, more than \$3.2 billion will be sold. While this figure includes all types of siding, industry insiders note that vinyl's share of this continually growing market will increase, because vinyl is easy to maintain and is an economical investment.

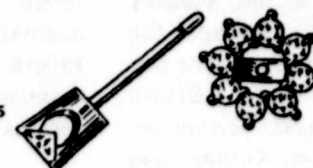

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County Leaders Attend WCTCG Aging Dept. Meeting

Among those attending the April 24 West Central Texas Council of Governments Executive Committee meeting in Abilene were Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen, Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey, and Lois Elsom from Ranger.

These individuals are all members of the Advisory Council on Aging; the Judges from the public sector, and Mrs. Elsom representing the private sector. Judges Kniffen and Bailey are also members of the Executive Committee for Sub-Region 4.

A number of other representatives from the 19 county area of WCTCG were present. This area includes the counties of Knox, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Runnels, Coleman, Brown and Comanche.

Attention was directed to the summary of a proposed two-year aging services plan, which would run from Oct. 1, 1985 to Sept. 30, 1987. Many detailed reports on services and expenditures and participation in programs was read and discussed.

In the area covered by this Aging Department there is a population of 309,686, with 64,376 of them above 60 years old.

This means that 21.1 percent of the citizens are in this 60 plus category - a 10.8 percent rise above the number reported in the 1970 census. Of this group, 12,131 are reported to be living below the poverty level. Eastland County is listed as having 28.9 of its citizens above 60 years old, and Callahan County 24.4.

Both Eastland and Callahan Counties rate well in the overall picture of services. Eastland County has five sites for meals and meetings, and three vans. Callahan County has three Nutrition Service sites, one Meals On Wheels Program, and two vans.

These counties are recognized for their good participation, and for the amount of contributions in money given at the Centers for meals. High rating is also given for the Directors, volunteers, the programs, and the quality of food prepared at these Centers.

Plans are to continue with the on-going services, and to expand them as funds are made available. More home delivered meals are needed, as well as transportation and shopping services, health screening, small home repairs, discount services, and others.

Objectives for 1986 include coordination with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association Inc. of Abilene in providing information and referral services, to maintain at least 100 emergency response system home units within at least 10 counties within the region, and to maintain a Carrier Alert Program in at least five counties to serve 250 older persons.

Others are training sessions for volunteers and workers, and the designation of at least one senior center as a community focal point, which will bring the total number to 40 throughout the region.

Services for 1986 are pro-

jected to include 400,000 congregate meals for the year to 8,000 older people; 50,000 meals home-delivered to 900 persons; and supportive services to 10,000 older persons.

In reporting on this West Central Texas Council of Governments meeting, Judge Bailey said that the budget has not been cut on the WCTCG services to the aged. The general comment was, however, that there was simply not enough money to cover all the services desired - and certainly not enough for the expansion wanted.

"So this will be a matter of on-going discussion," he said, "How to assist the elderly to have a quality of life which is meaningful to them.

Gordon Spot County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon

Hail caused considerable damage to crops, buildings, fruit and pecan trees, and ornamentals. The worse damage covered a strip four miles wide and 25 miles long from Carbon eastward to the county line north of Desdemona. There was some damage in other parts of the county.

Trees damaged by recent hail storms should be cared for as soon as possible.

First, remove broken limbs and branches, making the cut flush with the trunk or limb.

Small cuts will usually heal over quickly, and normally no treatment is necessary. However, if the cut is more than one inch in diameter, a wound paint

should be applied to prevent disease organisms or insects from entering.

Paint wounds with an asphalt emulsion or a commercial tree wound dressing. Such wound dressings are available at most garden supply stores. Orange shellac makes a good temporary wound dressing, especially on bark cuts made by the hail.

Ordinary asphalt paint can be used if the wound is swabbed first with alcohol. If the wound is wet or "weeping" don't apply a dressing until it dries.

I would caution against using tar or creosote compounds for tree wounds as these materials are toxic to the cambium layer beneath the bark and may prevent the wound from healing properly.

Keep an unbroken film or dressing over the pruning wound. One coating lasts from three to six months. Large wounds may require several coatings until they heal completely over.

To prevent bark breakage when removing a heavy limb, first cut the underside of the damaged limb about eight inches from the point at which it originates. Cut at least a third of the way through the branch until the saw binds.

Then cut through the branch from above and several inches farther out. Make the final cut flush with and parallel to the branch from which it originates.

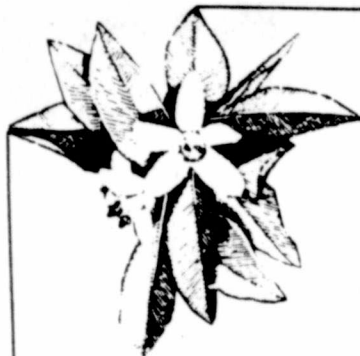

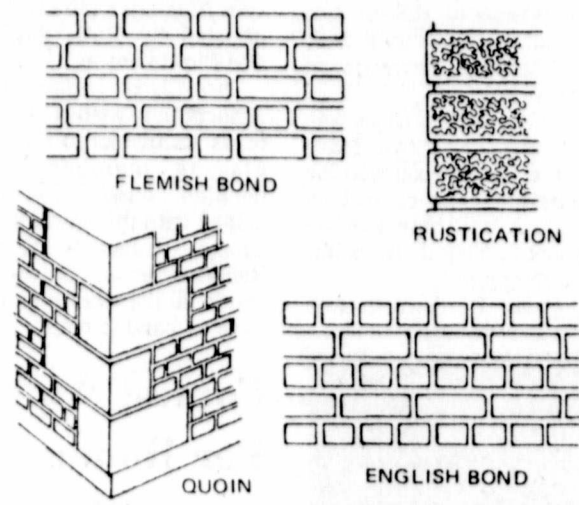

Talk the Language of Masonry



Whether you are building a masonry addition to an existing house or building a new house from the ground up, it is helpful to know the language of masonry. Here are some of the most common terms you will run into, courtesy of *Mechanix Illustrated* magazine.

First of all, **bond** refers to the pattern of headers and stretchers in the overall scheme of the brickwork. A header is simply a brick (or half-brick) laid with its end showing. A stretcher is laid with its side showing.

FLEMISH BOND alternates stretchers and headers in the same course (or row) throughout the job. Each header is centered with respect to the stretcher above and below.

ENGLISH BOND alternates courses of stretchers and headers. The headers are centered above and below the stretchers and the joints between stretchers.

COMMON BOND sometimes is called *American Bond*. In this pattern, every fifth or sixth course consists of headers; all other rows are stretchers.

RUSTICATION is stone work with the face hacked or picked. The separate blocks are marked by a deep raking or chamfer of the joints between the stones.

A **QUOIN** is a corner pattern in which heavy blocks of stone, cut to be modular with three or more courses of brickwork, are laid into the corners instead of brick. This pattern reinforces the corners of the building.

"We'll try to make the best of it with what we have right now. Education, generally, will respond. We'll get through it and it's not the end of the world," he said.

Kindergarten Pre-Registration
