The Caladium is a tuber, not a bulb, and is native to the banks of the Amazon River in South America. Therefore, it comes to us from the tropic region. There are only 50 cultivars of Caladiums. They are very tolerant to varying light conditions from full sun to deep shade. Since they come from the tropic region, they are subject to cold damage very easily.

The tuber is stored at a temperature of 55 degrees while it is in the dormant state. The minimum low temperature is 50 degrees. When the day temperature reaches 70 degrees and the night temperature stay above 55 degrees, you may plant the Caladium tuber.

The roots grow from the top of the tuber; therefore, plant the tuber upside down and cover with one inch of soil. Plant the tuber in moist compost or vermiculite about 10 to 12 inches apart. You may add well rotted cow manure and sand to your planting medium. The Caladium should be fed every two weeks with a well balanced fertilizer such as 20-20-20 or a 6-10-5.

Remember to water regularly when the soil becomes dry around the Caladium.

The Caladium may be started in pots inside and transplanted outside as the temperature rises to a safe level. When starting the Caladium in pots, a four-inch pot shall be used along with planting medium described above.

The plants grow about a foot to 18 inches tall. The leaves resemble wet tissue paper texture. All wilted leaves should be removed. The flowers should be removed as they appear since the Caladium is grown for its foliage. The flowers are a pale pink and are usually hidden by the foliage.

When frost threatens in the fall, dig up the tubers with the soils and roots as well as the foliage attached. Let them dry in an airy place out of the direct sun for about a week or 10 days or until the foliage can be removed by an easy pull. Then shake the dirt off the roots and dust with a fungicide and store in dry peat moss at a temperature of 55 degrees or above. You may propagate the Caladium not by cutting the tuber and leaving one eye to each piece.

We have been discussing the standard Caladium. The Dwarf Caladium which reaches only 10 inches tall can be handled in the same manner.

Caladiums do excellent in

window boxes, planters, beds and pots for indoors.

The best effect is mass planting in the bed and planters. The various park departments have used Caladiums well in shaded areas to give the needed color to their landscapes.

There seems to be almost endless combinations of red,

pink, silver, white, and green Caladiums. Some of the more popular ones in this area are Candium Silver, White Christmas, Freida Hemple, Red-Green, Red Flash-red, June Bride, Silver Pink Beauty and Hortulania-pink.

The Candium which is a silver leaf with green veins showing is the most popular in this area.

COLLEGE STATION—The "fresh approach" is the in-thing again this year. Fresh vegetables are plentiful in Texas now, so make sure you get your share.

"Ask for fruits and vegetables grown in Texas," suggests Tom Longbrake, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "You'll be supporting Texans who earn their livelihood from growing your groceries.

Texas supplies broccoli, cabbage, carrots, spinach, lettuce and potatoes in early spring followed by cantaloupes, cucumbers, honeydews, squash, peppers and tomatoes. Blackberries, plums and early peaches will be available in late May and June along with watermelons, blackeyed peas and okra.

"Buying vegetables direct

from growers at 'you-pick' operations and roadside markets is increasing in Texas," notes Longbrake.

"Cost savings can be passed on to consumers by farm markets who sell locally grown produce through reduced costs in transportation, packaging and refrigeration."

Tomatoes are the most popular vegetable bought at

roadside markets followed by watermelons, peaches, blackeyed peas, okra, squash, new potatoes and green beans, says the horticulturist.

"If you're in the cost-cutting mood, consider buying fresh produce by the

bushel for canning or freezing at home," suggests Longbrake.

So, "get fresh" with Texas produce. Local radio and newspaper ads can tell you where fresh produce is available.

9. Read a book and play outside instead of watching TV so often?

Encourage the children to strive for "yes" answers to the above checklist. Parents may want to review the list with their children on a weekly basis and reward them with extra coins to put

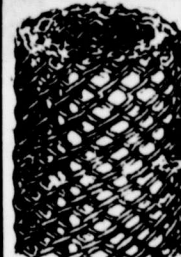

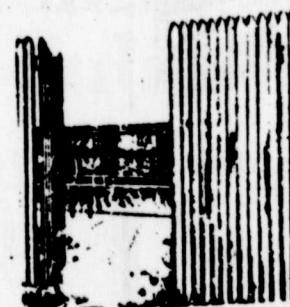

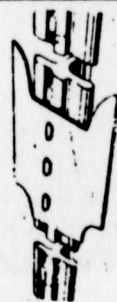

Yvonne would like to come to the United States for a year for the experience and to make her more independent. She doesn't think

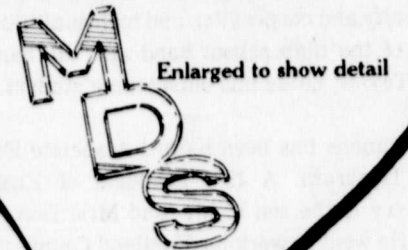
would be hard to adjust here, because she makes friends easily and adapts quickly.

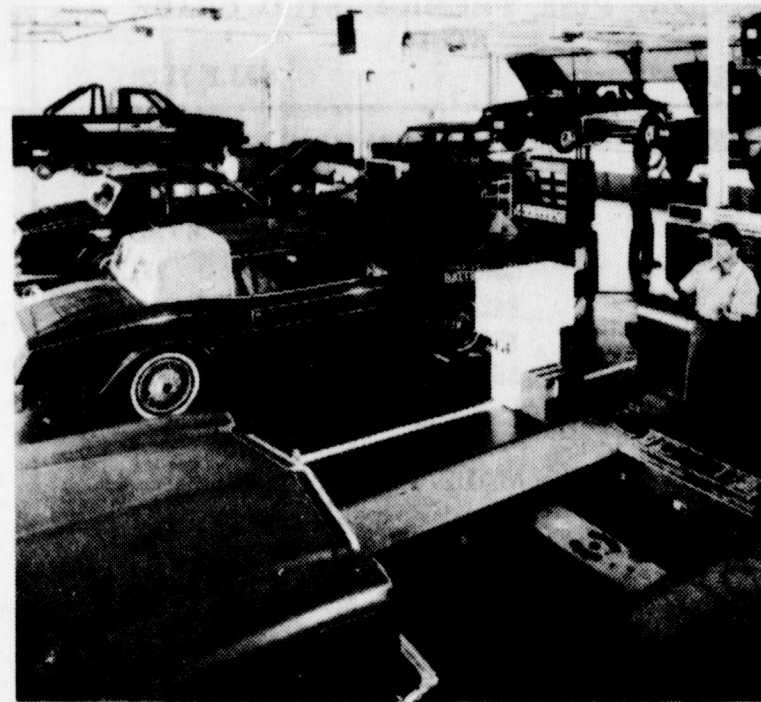

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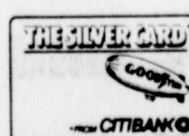

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STATE CAPITAL



HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—The dull, business like atmosphere of the current Legislature, which has drawn complaints from Capitol-watchers hungry for a little action, was interrupted last week by all the hubbub anyone could want.

Hundreds of University of Texas students, upset with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's plan to triple state college tuition, marched five blocks from campus to Capitol and, unluckily for Hobby, cornered him in a hallway for a 15-minute confrontation.

When Hobby escaped into the Senate chamber, the students ran upstairs and filled the Senate gallery, where they heckled and booed as Hobby tried to explain his proposal.

Hobby stuck to his guns, however, and the following day his position was reinforced by the UT Board of Regents. The Texas Student Lobby, which opposes the tuition hike, also sent apologies for the confrontation.

Dead Last

Hobby's proposal would raise in-state tuition from \$4 per semester hour to \$12 and out-of-state tuition from \$10 per hour to \$120. Texas is currently ranked 50th—dead last—among the states in tuition charges.

Before he walked out the back of the Senate chamber, Hobby told students in the gallery, "Texas is so low that if tuition is tripled, Texas would leap up and become 48th."

An important provision of his plan dedicates nine percent for financial aid, as opposed to 25 percent included in a House plan.

Scuffling Match

As if the student protest weren't enough excitement, the next day a representative and a senator, both from Houston, got into a scuffling match by the tourist desk just outside the governor's door.

The governor, who was with them when the finger-pointing and lapel-grabbing began, retreated into his nearby offices. A third lawmaker stepped in just as blows were about to be exchanged and broke it up, leading the senator away from the scene.

The subject of the argument was of minor importance: whether one of them had requested an attorney general's legal opinion regarding minority contracting by the City of Houston. But it's the local issues which can provoke some heated debates, as demonstrated once again.

In The House

On a more positive note, the House voted last week to:

—Increase the penalty on checks returned for insufficient funds, up to three times the amount when the writer of a hot check refuses to pay.

—Give committee approval to a \$200 million fee hike package on items such as wrestling and boxing permits, personalized license plates and vehicle inspection fees.

—Offer a \$96.1 million package of enticements to bring a battleship home port to the Texas coast.

—Send to the Senate a bill

requiring licensing and regulation of time-share interests by

the Texas Real Estate commission.

—Add fines up to \$2,500 for dentists who violate state rules.

Senate Action

Meanwhile, their colleagues in the Senate acted to:

—Allow police officers to use deadly force when assaulted by persons armed with modern electric "stun" guns.

—Let state banks charge a "reasonable fee" between \$18 and \$24 each year to credit card customers. This bill affecting only in-state banks attempts to give consumers a break by eliminating interest charges where the account is paid off monthly.

—Give the state the right to enter privately-owned land in order to gain access to landlocked state tracts to develop minerals.

—Apply the death penalty to mass and serial murderers.

—Include gang rape as an aggravated offense under the sexual assault statute, punishable from five years to life imprisonment.

—Give committee approval to a bill which directs the State Board of Education to consider shortening the six weeks eligibility period of the controversial "no pass, no play" rule.

The bill also provides for suspension or expulsion of students for assault, possession of weapons, drugs or alcohol, or chronic bad behavior.

Mattox Opinion

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox filed a lawsuit last week seeking a special master to oversee the charity operations of a Houston hospital for the poor.

Mattox charged that theft and mismanagement of money from the multi-million dollar Hermann Hospital Estate has occurred, presumably by some of the directors and executives of the hospital.

Cornelius Gives Employees Bonuses Totaling \$60,000

Surprise bonuses totaling \$60,000 were handed out Wednesday, May 15, to the 75 employees of Victor Cornelius, Inc.

Mr. Victor Cornelius passed out the checks personally. Forty six \$1,000 checks were distributed to long standing employees. Other employees received checks comparable with their tenure at Victor Cornelius, Inc.

Other manufactured items have arisen in the wake of the new printing business. Rediclip, the now familiar white plastic clips found in many menus advertising "Today's Special" originated at Victor Cornelius, Inc. in the 1960's. While at first marketed only to restaurants, the Rediclip has since become a nationwide advertising standard for companies like Coca Cola

and Anheuser-Busch. Rediclip orders now leave Eastland on a regular basis for destinations all over the U.S. and Canada, and for more distant customers in Europe, and even Hong Kong.

In the mid 1970's Victor Cornelius, Inc. introduced its nursing home tray cards. The small reusable cards designed to aid in specifying a patient's daily diet, can be found today in almost 8,000 nursing homes and hospitals across the United States. These too have become an important part of the Victor Cornelius line.

The Chamber of Commerce membership plaques seen so often in stores and businesses throughout the county are yet another V.C. product.

More recently Mr. Cornelius has come up with a new item: the grocery store "Rail Clip" These clips attach to most types of grocery store specials. During construction of Eastland's Wal-Mart, Mr. Cornelius was able to modify his original rail clip to fit Wal-Mart's special shelf design. The resulting new design is now being used in 700 to 800 WalMart stores.

Mr. Cornelius stated that he is most appreciative of his employees for their years of service and sustained effort which have helped so much to help during these fifty years.

Crime Stoppers Most Wanted

MONAHANS, Teaxs - Merchants in this friendly west Texas community described the couple as "nicely dressed" with "outgoing personalities".

Law enforcement officials describe the couple as slick bad check writers who took MONahans for more than \$7,000 during a weekend spree early in April.

This week Gerald Arlington Poole III and Jasmine Elizando Poole have been added to the Texas Most Wanted list as a result of warrants issued for them in Ward County. They are charged with theft over \$750 and less than \$2,000. Ms. Poole is also charged with theft over \$750 and less than \$2,000 in connection with the disappearance of some money from a local tavern.

Rewards up to \$1,000 each are being offered by Texas Most Wanted for information leading to the capture of the fugitives.

In addition to his problems in Monahans, detectives say Poole is also wanted by Ector County authorities in Odessa, Texas, for bond forfeiture in connection with still more bad check charges.

Poole is described as a white male, 41, 6-1, 190 pounds, with brown eyes and brown hair streaked with gray. He may be growing a mustache and a beard. Ms. Poole is a white female, 29, 5-3, 150 pounds, with hazel eyes and brown hair. The pair was last seen in a light brown 1977 Pontiac Bonneville with Texas Plates PBV-45.

Sgt. Ellis Butler of the Ward County Sheriff's Department says that on that weekend of April 5 "almost every major business in Monahans" was stung by the fallout of bad checks.

3 Video cassette recorders, 1 Television set, 3 Pistols, 2 expensive watches, 2 rings, clothing and auto tires were purchased during the two-day spree.

Sgt. Bulter said several private individuals were also victimized by the bad checks.

Detectives also want to talk to Ms. Poole about the theft of weekend bar receipts at the Eagle Lodge, which amounted to \$1,835.97. Ms. Poole was working at the lodge until April 5.

Officials say this isn't Gerald Poole's first brush with the law. They say since 1962, Poole has been arrested by a variety of police departments in Texas, Louisiana and Nevada on charges ranging from bad checks and auto thft and burglary.

Ms. Poole is also known as Jasmine Lawhon.

Anyone with information about either of these two fugitives is asked to call their local Crime Stoppers program or the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477. In all cases, caller do not have to identify themselves.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council.

Morton Valley 1st grade plus 40 years Aline Berry never wore a fur coat, drove a Cadillac or had hot water. What my mother did was kill rattlesnakes with a hoe—in the garden, in the back yard, and once in the house. Mama washed clothes on a rub board by the cistern, and made lye soap in a big black kettle in the back yard. She also made sausage in a hand-turned grinder when Daddy and the other men butchered a hog; and she "pieces" many quilts.

When it was time for fried chicken, Mama would wring the hen's neck until its head popped off, and the headless chicken did a frenzied dance in the back yard.

Mama's a survivor. She got her grit from her Primitive Baptist circuit preacher father and her patient pioneer stock mother (of French and Indian heritage)—the late Elder and Mrs. C.L. Casey of Cisco.

Married during the Depression, she and Daddy moved in 1938 to the place where she still lives. That is home—the gathering place for the clan. The clan consists of four children and their families. Her children are:

Mrs. Henry (Georgia) Burkman of Lueders; Mrs. Frank (Shirley) Strawn of Abilene; Mrs. Bill (Margaret) McDowell of Fort Worth; and Mr. Cherry Lee Berry of Arlington.

Mama's a giving person. She gave me whiskey and sugar for the whooping cough—and castor oil for everything else! Mama's a giving person in other ways—During our teen years, she never bought herself a new coat, but bought my sisters and me one every year or two, and she—being the same size—wore our hand-me-downs.

During the 1950's, when I finished high school and worked in Abilene I rode the Greyhound bus home every weekend. I'd leave Abilene with my tin suitcase full of dirty clothes and return with it full of clean ones. Mama did more than my laundry on weekends. On at least two occasions, she spent Saturday night making pretty party dresses for the next week.

Mama still puts other first. When she cooks for the clan, she sits back while everyone else eats; and when she is persuaded to eat at the same time, she takes the less desirable piece of meat.

When we take her out to eat, she's careful to order the least expensive item, and skip the salad bar or anything that would add to the cost.

Mama will be 75 this summer, but Mama will never be old to her children, her grandchildren, or her two great-granddaughters.

Mama didn't have to say "I love you" in words very often—She proved her love by her actions years ago, and she proves it now.

(And Mama, we love you.)

Odesa-based Circle Exploration Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 2-A Williams in the Eastland Regular Field, ten miles southeast of Eastland. With total depth projected to 990 feet, the well's drillsite is in a 109-acre lease in the McLennan CSL Survey, A-368.

Pendragon Oil Co. has finalized a new producer in Eastland County's Reb Field, pumping 30 barrels 40-gravity oil daily with 102 barrels water. Drillsite was in the McLennan CSL No. 364 Survey, A-367, five miles east of Eastland.

The well is designated as the No. 1 McClesky.

The well was originally completed March 5, 1985 through a set of perforations in the Duffer Formation at a total depth of 3,617 feet. In a plugback to the Marble Falls Formation, the operator will produce from a set of perforations, 3,080 to 3,100 feet into the hole.

R Enterprises has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 Elbert L. Pierce. It was a developmental try in Eastland County, one mile southwest of Rising Star. It bottomed at 1,179 feet without production prospects. It will be plugged and abandoned.

the Marble Falls Formation at 3,464 to 3,504 feet into the hole. The well showed potential to pump 65 barrels 40-gravity oil per day with 38 barrels water.

The absolute open flow came in at a sturdy 5,061,000 CFD.

Ranger Operation has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of Stephens County wildcat about two miles northwest of Necessity. Designated as the No. 1 Floyd Ray Vick, the well bottomed dry at total depth of 4,399 feet. Two intervals were perforated in the Bend Conglomerate but with no indications of commercial prospects.

The well has been plugged and abandoned.

Wildcat drilling action is planned in Stephens County by Shoshone Oil Inc. of Dallas three miles west-northwest of Crystal Falls. It will be known as the No. 1-C Puckett, with drillsite in a 140-acre lease, Jose Malone Survey. The venture is under permit for 4,999-ft. maximum depth.

Another pumping oiler has been brought on line in the Eliasville Unit of the Stephens Regular Field four miles northwest of the Ivan townsite.

With Sun Exploration and Production as the operator, the No. 164 Eliasville Unit pumped 24 barrels of oil per day along with 695 barrels of waste water on an open choke.

It was drilled to 3,400-ft. total depth and will produce from a set of Caddo perforations 3,524 to 3,470 feet into the wellbore. Oil tested at 39-gravity.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for unsuccessful wildcat venture in Stephens County about nine miles north-northwest of Breckenridge. Designated as the No. 1 Alice Walker, the well was spudded on April 1 of this year and probed to a dry bottom at 4,600 feet. Paul de Cleva Inc. was the operator.

Ed Overton, independent operator from Dallas, has staked location for a 4,600-ft. developmental try in the Stephens Regular Field about four miles west-northwest of Crystal Falls.

Designated as the No. 3 Harbison, the venture is in a 172-acre lease in the G.H. York Survey.

Good production potential was indicated when Dallas-based Ameritech Oil and Gas completed a Palo Pinto wildcat near gas production wells in the PK Dam and Regular Fields.

The well is designated as the No. 3 Sudan Kimberlin.

It flowed 280 barrels of oil per day on a quarter-inch choke with flow pressure standing at 600 PSI.

Production will be from a set of Perforations 6,624 to 6,626 feet into the wellbore. The producing zone is Pennsylvania Conglomerate.

Ann ill-fated developmental well has been written off as a dry hole in the Palo Pinto Regular Field about two miles west-northwest of Mineral Wells. Carter Energy Inc. was the operator.

Designated as the No. 1 F.W. Wilson, the well was spudded April 2 of this year and was bottomed with no apparent commercial prospects at a depth of 4,564 feet. It has been plugged and abandoned.

Weatherford-based Thomas Hydrocarbons have driven stake for a Palo Pinto County wildcat one mile southeast of Metcalf Gap. Carrying permit for 4,700-ft. maximum hole, the well is in a 120-acre lease in the B&P Survey. It will be known as the No. 2 Roberson.

Regulation Fee Offered As Substitute For Completion Fee

The Texas Senate Finance Committee has amended a bill to set a fee on all state oil and gas production. The "regulation fee", offered as a substitute by Sen. Grant Jones (D-Abilene) for a proposed well completion fee, is part of a \$220 million fee package offered to meet the revenue needs of the state during the next two years.

Although oil operators continue to insist that their industry already pays more than its fair share of taxes and fees, all seem pleased that the Senators have rejected the completion fee concept. These fee proposals would have cost \$8,000 for certain wells, and the independent operators would have been hit particularly hard. A production fee is considered to be more equitable and broad based.

fund. The bill dedicates 17.5 percent of the monies collected - up to 4.5 million per year - to the Railroad Commission well plugging fund. This would be used to replace the funding currently received through the 1 1/2 year old \$100 drilling application permit, which would be repealed. The remaining revenues from the fees would be deposited in the state's general revenue fund.

The Texas Senate has honored former State Rep. Joe Hanna - now a legislative representative for Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners and regional oil and gas associations - for his public service. A resolution was adopted unanimously in which Hanna was recognized for his 13 years of legislative work.

Before legislative redistricting, Hanna represented Eastland County as well as the Stephens County area.

This eminent public official is recognized among his colleagues for his voice of reason which guided the

many committees on which he served during his seven terms in the Legislature. Known for his zeal and hard work, he was Chairman of the Energy Resources Committee in the 66th Legislature, and served on a total of 14 committees during his career. The resolution reads in part.

Palo Pinto County's Long Ranch Field gained a new producer when Raw Energy completed the No. 3 Long Ranch two miles northwest of Gordon.

The well indicated ability to flow gas at the rate of 1,073,000 CF per day on a 18/64-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating came in at 1,300,000 CFD. It was taken to a 3,580-ft. bottom, and production will be from Bend Conglomerate Formation perforations, 3,425 to 3,432 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is located in the Burleson CSL Survey.

Thomas Hydro-Carbon has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the BBB&C Survey, Palo Pinto County.

The No. 1 Yeats showed potential to flow 759,000 CF gas per day on a 12/64-in. choke. The absolute open flow rating was 1,450,000 CFD. It will produce from an interval in the Conglomerate Formation, 3,506 to 3,512 feet into the hole. Total drilling depth was 4,078 feet.

The wildcat is located five miles south-southeast of Pickwick.

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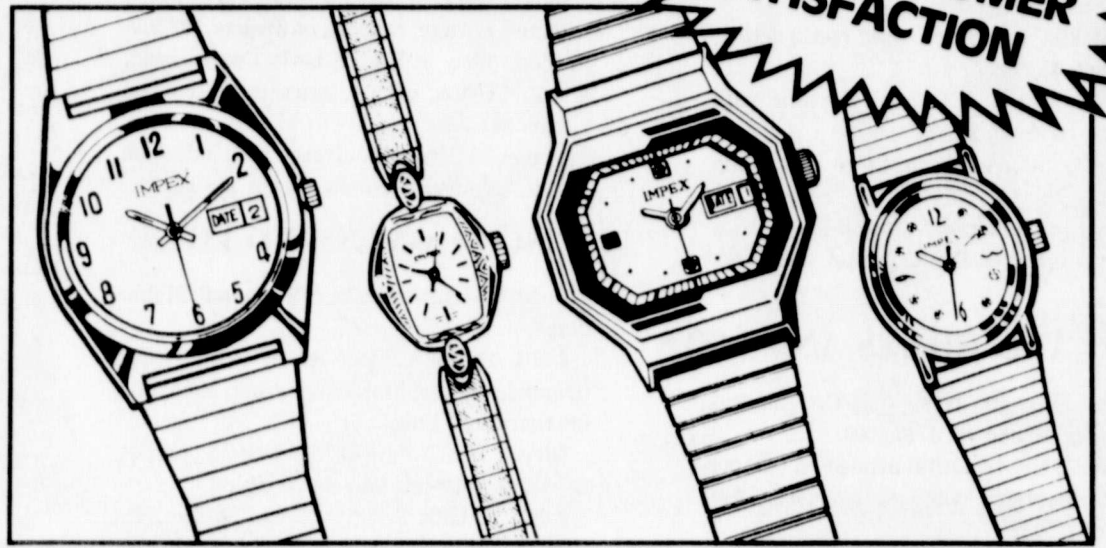

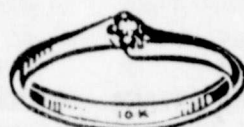

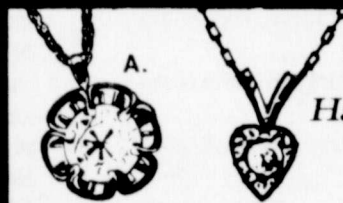
