## Five Candidates File For Precinct 4 Commissioner

The already crowded race for Eastland County Commissioner, Precinct Four (the Cisco area), gained two more candidates, including a Republican, as the filing deadline for the May 3rd first primary election passed Monday.

Five Democrats filed for the commissioner's job that Incumbent C.B. (Runt) Dill has held for six terms. Join-

ing the race Monday was Harold N. Pippen. Others who had already paid their filing fees were Billy Bacon, Jr., Reggie Pittman, Jr.,

Danny Claborn and Billy C. (Bill) Cozart. Jammie Fry, Cisco area rancher, filed as a Republican candidate for the post. As the only candidate, he will automatically be on the November general election ballot.

County chairman Mary Bailey reported that the committee would meet in the next two or three weeks to make up the ballot for the Democratic ballot. Absentee voting will begin about a month prior to the primary. A second primary will be

held a month after the first primary.

Mrs. Bailey said the filing fees for district offices amounted to \$1,000. County office seekers paid a \$600 filing fee as did candidates for the commissioner's race. Justice of the Peace candidate paid a filing fee of \$600.

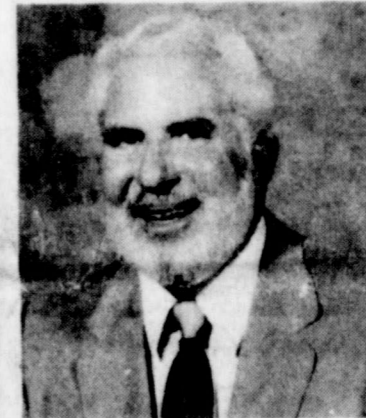

# Drilling Bits

Circle Exploration has given up on its efforts to make producers out of two developmental wells in the Linde Field, Eastland County. The wells were designated as the 1-A and 2-A Lambert and were located four miles northwest of Desdemona. Drillsites were in the David S. Richardson Survey, A-414. The 1-A well was spudded on Oct. 14 and bottomed dry at 572 feet, while the 2-A well was spudded on Oct. 19 and probed to a dry bottom at 1,200 feet.

At a location six miles north of Eastland, Snow Oil of Ft. Worth has staked drillsite for a 4,000-ft. developmental well in Eastland County's Snow Field. It is the No. 3 Wilbur Boone, to be located in the H&TC Survey, A-1126.

Santex Exploration has hung the "dry hole" tag on the No. 1 Lassiter. It was a wildcat try in Eastland County, one mile north of Carbon. Spudded Dec. 11, the well had reached a total depth of 1,605 feet.

Southwest Oil Exploration has issued plug-and-abandon orders for a developmental venture in the Eastland Regular Field. The No. 3 V.A. Childers was located two miles west of Nimrod. It was spudded on Nov. 12, and probed to a dry bottom at 1,600 feet.

Sun Exploration & Production Corp. has filed first production figures on two new oil wells in the Stephens Regular Field.

The No. 177 Eliasville Unit will make 45 barrels of oil

per day. Drillsite is four miles northwest of Ivan in the TE&L Survey.

The No. 180 Eliasville Unit demonstrated potential for 44 barrels daily. It is located five miles northwest of Ivan in the R.B. Craft Survey.

The wells will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation, ranging from 3,194 to 3,240 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depths were 4,560 and 3,400 feet, respectively.

At a location four miles north of Parks, Mobil Producing has finalized a new oil producer in the Stephens Regular Field.

The well is designed as the No. 909 Southeast Breckenridge Unit, pumping at the rate of 23 barrels daily.

Location is in the LAL Survey. Bottomed at 3,300 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Caddo Formation, 3,190 to 3,212 feet into the hole.

A gas producer has been brought on line in Stephens County's McLennan Field,

with Gondy Industries as the operator.

Located four miles north-northwest of Gunsight, the well is in the T&P Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 L. Mason "A".

On a 20/64 choke, it flowed 342,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 519,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 12 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 3,300-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Caddo Formation, 3,106 to 3,214 feet into the hole.

The Stephens Regular Field gained a new producer when S&J Operating completed the No. 96 J.W. Parks "A" four miles north-northeast of Parks.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 12 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 3,300-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Caddo Formation, 3,106 to 3,214 feet into the hole.

The operation is in the T&P Survey.

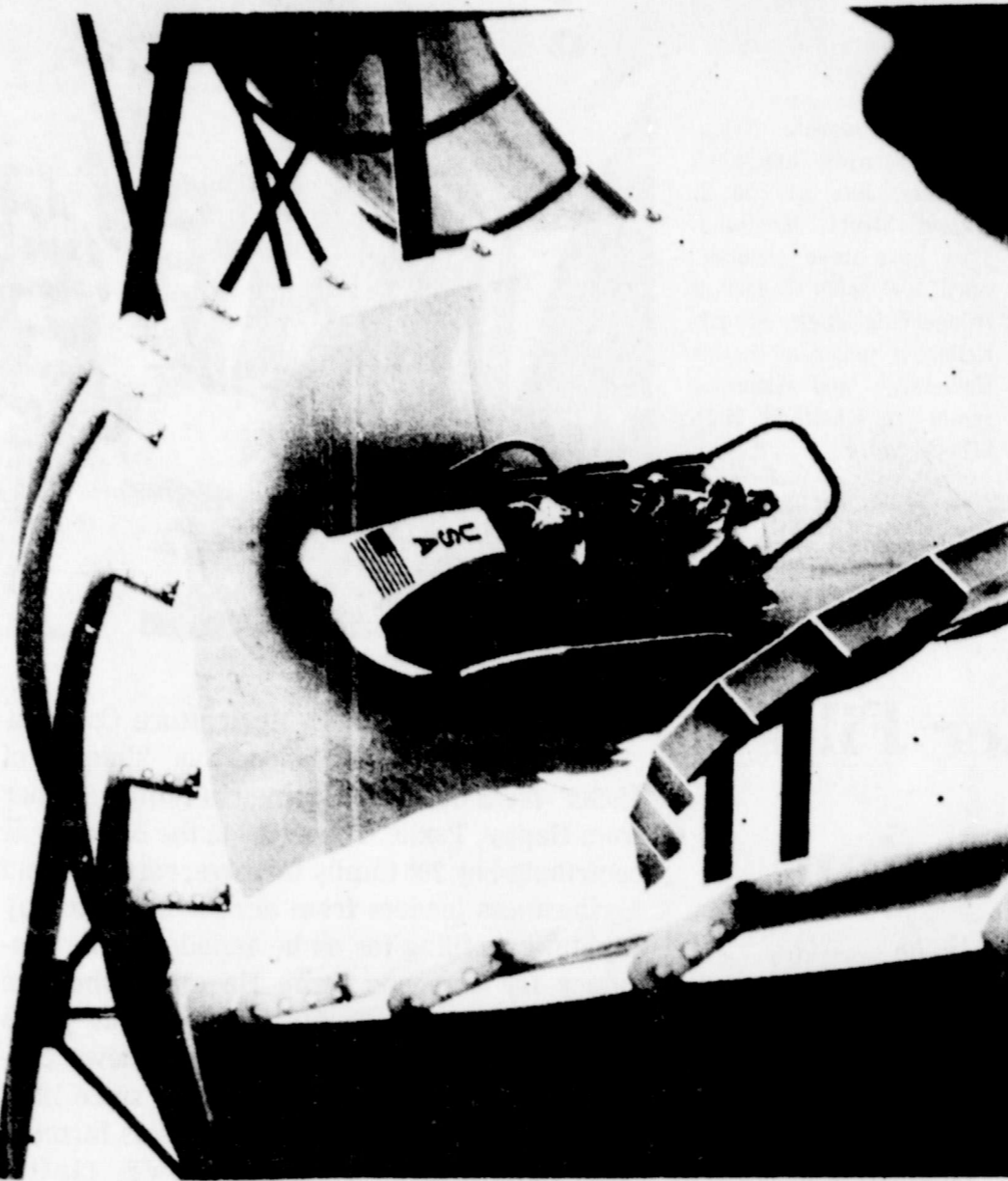

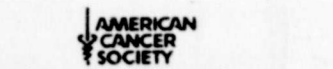

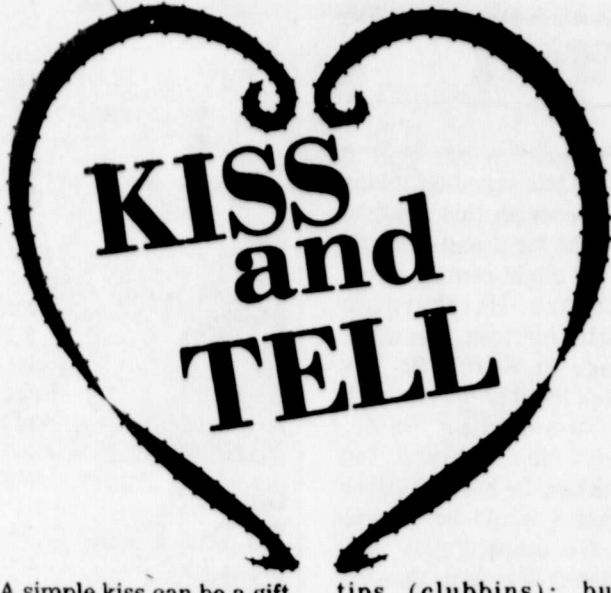

Shown here with Martha Elliott, CF Area Chairperson, Ricky was first diagnosed as having CF at the age of 6 months, after having seen 7 different doctors. Mrs. Gilman advises that any parent whose child has any of the symptoms of CF, especially the salty taste, sticky bowels and the mucus, should not wait, but have the child tested as soon as possible. Don't just assume it is a summer cold or an allergy.

Although Rickey's CF has been hard on both of his parents and his adopted sister, Donna, they try to live as normal a life as possible; enjoying many of the family outings that all of us do.

Ricky's routine is not a normal one however, for an

active teenager. His day begins at 5 a.m. when he rises from under his oxygen tent where he must sleep and immediately begins a 1 hour treatment designed to dilate the lungs, bring the mucus out of his body and strengthen heart function. This routine, along with CPT and sitting up exercises, is followed 3 times a day when he is well—more when he is sick. Also the 30 to 40 doses of medication required each day must be taken strictly. And the diet—a special one of course. He is allowed no fried foods, among other things. Can you picture your teenager without french fries?

This teenager has been able to go to school only 4 days this year. The rest of the year will be spent in homebound courses because of all the flux, colds and sniffler going around. He spent September and October in the hospital and Mrs. Gilman is proud of the fact

that he is now back up to 50 pounds.

Mrs. Gilman herself is an outstanding woman. She exudes the inner strength that all of us hope is present should we be called on to us it. She stated, "You have to put the death part behind you and just live each day as it comes."

Ricky is a spunky boy - trying his best to be like any other 12 year old boy. He bowled a 32 game the first time he picked up a bowling ball. Then he became tired and had to rest a bit so that his breathing would not be quite so bad. He did continue to pick at his sister, Donna, however. Just like all brothers everywhere.

It is hard to believe such an active, friendly, boy is a victim of CF until you notice his size and how easily he tires. You can see the intelligence and the understanding in his smoky blue eyes and then you realize that he

lives with this from minute to minute - and what a brave, composed person he is.

Today only 1% of the victims of CF live to age 20. The average lifespan is 18 years. Please check your child or grandchild if any of the CF symptoms appear or persist and urge everyone you know to join in CF's Bowl for Breath currently in progress at the Eastland Co. Bowling Center.

A simple kiss can be a gift of love. It can also be a matter of life and death. One of the signs of cystic fibrosis (CF) is an extremely salty taste to the skin. The next time you kiss your children, if you notice a strong salty taste, consult your doctor about the possibility of cystic fibrosis. Early diagnosis and treatment helps to prolong life, so give your kids a gift of love - give them a kiss - and tell!!

The following are a few questions and answers to help you better understand CF:

Q. What is Cystic Fibrosis?

A. A genetic killer of children and young adults which attacks the lungs and digestive system.

Q. How do you get CF?

A. CF is a genetic disease - it is passed on to an unborn child only when both parents carry the recessive gene.

Q. Then CF is not a contagious disease?

A. No - it is strictly a genetic disease.

Q. Is there any way you can tell if you carry the recessive CF gene?

A. There is no carrier test at present.

Q. How does CF affect it's victims?

A. It is a chronic progressive disease. The mucus producing glands produce a very thick, sticky mucus, which clogs body passages, causing severe difficulties in breathing and digestion.

Q. How many people are affected with CF?

A. Approximately 30,000 children and young adults are living with the disease at present.

Q. What do you mean by "children and young people"?

A. Since CF is a genetic disease, it is actually present in a child at birth, but may not be detected until the pre-teen years. Generally, it is detected in children from birth to 13 years.

Q. What progress has been made in fighting CF?

A. Thanks to research and better medical treatment, the lifespan for CF patients has improved from 3 years life expectancy in the 1950's to 21 years today.

Q. Is CF always eventually fatal?

A. Yes.

Q. What are some of the symptoms of CF?

A. Some of the symptoms of CF are: a salty taste to the skin; recurrent wheezing/persistent coughing/excessive mucus; pneumonia more than once; excessive appetite/poor weight gain; enlargement of the finger-

tips (clubbins); bulky stools; nasal polyps.

Q. If my child has any of these symptoms, does it mean that he/she has CF?

No. Many of these signs are common to other childhood illnesses - but do consult with a doctor about the possibility of CF. Early diagnosis and treatment will help prolong life.

Q. What are my child's chances of having CF?

A. Right now - one in every 1,800 babies have CF.

Q. Where is the closest treatment center for CF from the Eastland County area.

A. Cook's Childrens Hospital in Fort Worth.

Q. Where can I get more information about CF and the CF Foundation?

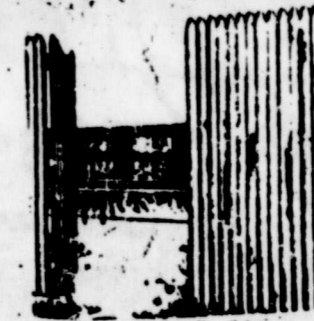

## Rain Throughout Area Makes Headlines

Soaking rains pushed across all of Eastland County from late Sunday afternoon until early Monday, ending almost three months of dry weather.

Rainfall totals varied from 2.10 inches in Cisco and the Kokomo Community to 1.25 inches 4 miles south of Cisco. Carbon and Rising Star each received 2 inches, with 1.3 at Eastland and 1.8 at Ranger. Some of the rural areas around both the northwest and south-central part of the county also reported heavy rains. Just across the county line near May there were reports of 5-6 inches.

The moisture came from two distinct waves of clouds, each streaming into the area from the southwest. The first one settled on the west side of the county about 5 p.m., with flashes of lightning visible in the north. Rising Star and Cisco got a good shower at that time, and Ranger also received rain. This continued in Ranger through most of the night.

The second line of clouds, which lingered around 2 a.m. to 4 a.m. Monday, covered a more general area. It left rain south of Cisco and in Eastland, as well as at places which had received earlier showers.

There was little wind and

no hail reported in the clouds here and little measureable damage.

But as the early line of clouds rolled into Parker County, residents there did not fare so well. An intense electrical storm left Weatherford in darkness around 9 p.m., with a tornado reported at 10 p.m., southwest of the town shortly afterward.

One traveler on I-20 reported that he ran into a "terrible storm" near Weatherford. The clouds began to break as he reached Thurber.

But there, he said, a combination of lights against the old smokestack and the clouds threw a dark shadow across the Interstate. This created an optical illusion of an approaching tornado. Drivers slammed on brakes until they decided what the dark shape was! It was really good to get out of that and into Eastland County, he said.

The County had a lot of other things to be thankful for beside lack of storms. The rains were too slow to put much water in area lakes, but farmers and ranchers reported that they would be of great benefit to pastures and grain fields.

This figure is based on the benefit of replacing market borrowing with the sale of Savings Bonds. In each case, the interest cost of redeemed Savings Bonds was compared with that of marketable securities of comparable maturity.

The reduced payments are due to the better-than-anticipated performance of the revised UC tax structure adopted by the legislature in May 1983, the League reports in the January issue of its monthly research publication, ANALYSIS.

After Texas' Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund ran out of funds in November 1982, federal loans were used to pay benefits to unemployed workers. These loans were paid off in August of last year, a full year ahead of schedule, according to Texas Employment Commission figures.

In addition, since the Unemployment Compensation

Trust Fund had a positive balance on January 1, 1986, the string of consecutive January 1 dates with an outstanding loan balance has been broken. As a result, the possibility of added federal taxes that are triggered to pay outstanding loans will not be a problem until at least 1988.

Although employers will pay less federal taxes, state law will continue to require state taxes to be above normal until the trust fund reaches the mandated floor of about \$400 million. This is predicted to take several years, and in the meantime the trust fund will remain vulnerable to dramatic and unexpected increases in unemployment.

## Spotlights and Sidelights

### THE QUARTER SYSTEM

School for four quarters is being noised around again. Texans tried it and didn't like it ten years ago.

That trial really was not quite fair to the quarter system.

The way it was set up, it almost guaranteed to fail. True four quarters were not designed, so they couldn't very well be implemented.

The "moment of truth" may have arrived.

Texas has the nation's largest school-bond indebtedness. Texas does not have the Number One school system in the nation.

That tells you that money spent on buildings with air conditioning and carpeted floors doesn't have much clout with the muscle between the ears. Or it says Texas was so far behind in educational facilities that we had to build like mad to catch up to mediocre.

It never has made sense to me, not to anyone else I've talked to about it, to leave buildings vacant as long as schools are empty every year. It is not good business.

Whether teachers and patrons like it or not, a viable schedule must be worked out to use efficiently the available school plants. Does anybody want to vote more taxes to put up more buildings to sit vacant three months of the year? No? Somehow, I'm not surprised.

Better think about an alternative you can live

with. When you get it figured out, work like a beaver to get yourself elected to a school board somewhere.

You can't do this if you're a teacher. That's a no-no.

"Conflict of interest," it's termed if you get people involved in schools to make the laws governing their operations. It is perfectly okay to elect lawyers to make laws that affect legal affairs, but mercy me, Miss Agnes, don't let a teacher have any say-so about schools!

The quarter system would afford better service to children already in school, and it would accommodate the predicted million-student increase with few more projected buildings...this is the state of affairs in Texas schools we are considering.

The school year could be spaced with subject matters scheduled so students could take an entire quarter off if necessary to accommodate parents' plans. How many households are tuned to the rhythm of the school year? Could this be wrong-end-to? We pay for the schools. They exist because of our children. Why don't our youngsters go to school when, as and especially if we want them to go?

Schools are great. I definitely am pro-school. But I am against "compulsory education." First, because learning cannot be compelled; second, because in my opinion, everyone should not

be in school. (Jefferson should have stopped with "...All men are born...", and with test tubes and such, I'm not too sure he was right on that.)

Affording everyone who wants an education the change to get one is not the same as decreeing, "Thou shalt stay in school until thou art sixteen."

With the quarter system, make the schools open-ended.

When the fifteen-year-old is convinced he knows all he needs to know, let him drop out of classes and test his rose-colored glasses. Maybe he does know all he needs. But if the time comes when he's equally convinced that he doesn't know it all, he can pick up where he took out—if we have an open-ended, no-age-limit school system.

Teachers would need to work harder to provide materials for students who knew what they needed to study. Don't tell me, because I won't believe you if you do, that any teacher wouldn't go the second mile and then some with a willing-and-eager group. I know how frustrating it is to cope with the can't do, won't do, and maybe-dos and the let's-get-on-with-it in the same classrooms.

The quarter system with year-round, open-ended classes could result in a closer approach to our goal of an education for everyone.

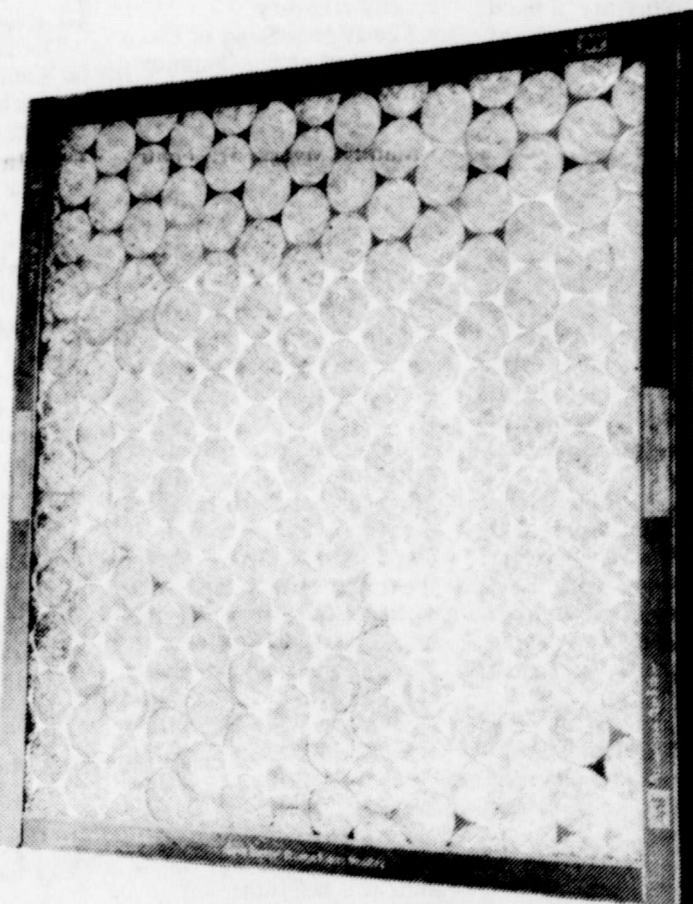

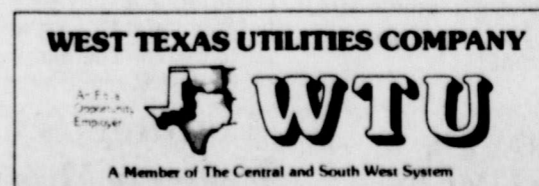

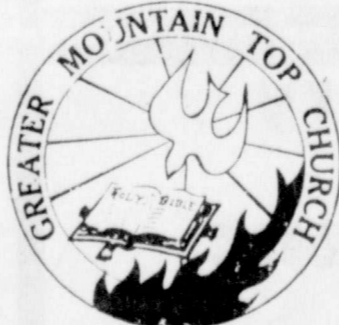

youngsters from each rodeo performance are awarded a "hard luck" certificate for their strong efforts in attempting to catch a calf, resulting in 32 more certificates given.

The calf scramble, a yearlong activity, is one of the Show's programs benefiting Texas youth. It begins with athletic competition in the Astrodome and ends with qualitative competition in the showing.

The event involves the turning loose of 28 energetic youngsters and half as many wild calves in one arena. Those who manage to grab a calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line are provided with a \$600 calf purchase certificate.

The certificate, donated by

a sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a purebred registered beef or dairy heifer.

The calf is raised by the winner for special showing competition to be held at the following year's Show. Each project is closely supervised by a vocational agriculture teacher or county extension agent.

Additionally, the winners are required to submit to the calf scramble office accurate financial records, essays, photographs and a scrapbook for the animal project.

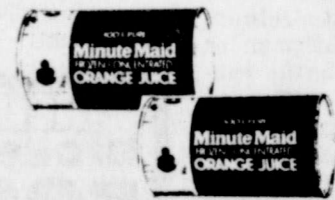

## J.V. Heyser Inducted Into Cattle Breeders Hall of Fame At January 26 Dinner In Fort Worth

James Virgil Heyser, of Cisco, president of the Texas Angus Association for 1985, has had a long love affair with the Angus breed. With the devoted help of his wife, Helen, and his four children, he has raised and shown a fine line of registered Angus for the past fifteen years.

This energetic couple is also responsible for founding the Texas Junior Angus Association, which has grown to be the second largest organization of its kind in the country. Even after their own children had outgrown the Junior group, the Heyser's continued to

sponsor the Association with such hard work and dedication that as the 17th National Junior Angus Show held in Tulsa, Oklahoma in July of 1985, they were named the Junior Advisors of the year, and presented with a framed portrait of themselves. J.V. says that this will be their "Emmy" for all time.

Almost every year, the Heyser's have held a club calf sale, a very popular event, both on account of the fine quality of cattle offered and the bountiful food that accompanies each sale.

Mr. Heyser was born in Cisco, Eastland County,

Texas on March 14, 1922. He represents the third generation of Heyser's engaged in the livestock business, dating back to 1887. J.V., as his friends call him, attended Cisco schools and then went on to Texas Wesleyan College on a basketball scholarship. After college days, he operated Heyser Livestock Trucking, along with and in connection with his cattle business. Gradually, he supplanted the Herefords his father favored with "The Bonny Blacks" and has been faithful to them ever since.

One of Mr. Heyser's biggest contributions to the progress of the breed in Texas has been his importation of a fine strain of Canadian-bred cattle, over a period of several years. This has improved the quality of his cattle and those that joined other herds.

Mrs. Heyser is a native Californian, born to a family in the dairy business, so that she was well qualified to become a rancher's wife. The four children, Sheri, Al, Sicily and Joe, grew up with the business, and still have an affinity for it. The Heyser's now have five grandchildren.

Among the livestock organizations of which J.V. is a member are the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (a former director), the National Cattlemen's Association, the American Angus Association, and locally, the Leon Valley Angus Association. He was on the board of the Texas Angus Association for twelve years before acceding to the presidency.

In other connections, J.V. served on the Cisco School Board for three terms, is County Precinct Chairman and serves on election boards, along with his wife, has been active in Boy Scout work for nine years, and has been a member of the First Baptist Church for thirty-

five years. Looking back, the Heyser family can be proud of the many trophies they have won at leading livestock shows, in Dallas, Ft. Worth, Houston, and New Mexico. Their cattle are widely known for their excellent quality and showmanship.
