Is Texas Independence Day

WHEN A GOVERNMENT HAS CEASED TO PROTECT THE LIVES, LIBERTY AND PROPERTY OF THE PEOPLE... These words were the beginning of an article that was adopted 150 years ago today-Sunday, March 2. The article is the Texas Declaration of Independence and on March 2, 1836, in a blacksmith shop belonging to Noah T. Byars (who is the grandfather of Laura Lou Trammel of Eastland) at Washington-On-The-Brazos the Texas Convention of Independence met. They drew up and signed the document, declaring their independence from Mexico.

connections with the Mexican nation has been forever ended; and that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign, and independent republic... and so began the Republic of Texas which lasted nearly 10 years. On December 29, 1845, the United States Congress accepted a newly written state constitution and Texas became a part of the United States. On February 19, 1846, the flag of the Republic of Texas was lowered for the last time in Austin and was replaced by the stars and stripes of the United States.

NOTE: This is the 150th anniversary of the signing of the Texas Declaration of Independence. This is the year of our Sesquicentennial

celebration. Many different "celebrations" are taking place now, and throughout the entire year. City Buys New Fire Truck

Purchase of a new fire truck at a cost of \$56,746 from the Car-Mar Corporation was approved by the City Council at the semi-monthly business meeting Tuesday night at City Hall. Two other bids were submitted and the Car-Mar bid was the lowest of the three.

City Manager Mike Moore was in touch with Car-Mar Thursday and was advised that the city could expect delivery of the new truck, which will be coming from Pennsylvania, by March 15th.

The new fire truck will have a 1985 Chevrolet truck chassis with a gross weight of 31,000 pounds. It will be powered with an 8.2 litre Detroit Diesel engine and a five-speed transmission. It

will be equipped with a 750 GPM pump and have a 500-gallon booster tank with re-wind reels. It will have all standard equipment for fire trucks.

The new fire truck is expected to receive a 25 or 30-year approval by the State after an inspection, Mr. Moore said. It will replace the city's Seagraves fire truck that was purchased in 1956.

The purchase is being financed with Revenue Sharing Funds.

In other action, the Council approved an ordinance designating the 100 block of East 3rd and East 4th Streets as one-way streets. The action was taken on final reading and will become effective when work is completed on the Mobley Hilton Restoration Project.

Another ordinance, raising the re-connection fees for city water meters from \$10 to \$25, was approved on second and final reading. The ordinance will be effective March 1st. Water meters cut off for any reason, including non-payment of water bills, will not be re-connected until a \$25 fee is paid under terms of the ordinance.

A public hearing was conducted for an amended revenue sharing budget, which was reduced from \$104,000 to \$101,200 because of anticipated cuts in federal contributions during the year. The cuts were \$1,500 in

administrative costs and \$1,400 in water department proposed expenditures.

The amended budget left intact fund for upgrading fire department equipment, including the new fire truck, and \$21,500 for the street department.

The monthly financial statement, which was prepared by City Bookkeeper Maryann Perry, showed tax collections for the 1985-86 budget year of \$248,022 - 93 per cent of the budget. This compares with 88 per cent at the same time last year, Mr. Moore reported.

The city manager told the Council that attorneys will begin work in March to collect delinquent taxes and

that three district court tax suits are scheduled for trial in 91st District Court on April 9th. The monthly report showed tax collections in January of \$71,181 along with \$10,280 in sales taxes, \$16,992 in franchise taxes, \$8,622 in sanitation charges, and \$6,874 in oil and gas royalties. Expenditures for January totaled \$62,468 to bring the fiscal year's total of \$278,464.

The water department had total income of \$46,169 and expenditures of \$46,143.

Mayor Eris Ritchie presided at the meeting. Present were Councilmen Brad Kimbrough, Roy Dennis and Bobby Ingram, City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney W.B. Wright, Jr.

Board Votes To Reconsider Remodeling School Building

Trustees of the Cisco Independent School District approved a motion to re-open Phase Two of the Intermediate School improvement program for reconsideration at a called meeting Thursday night at the high school library. More than 100 school patrons attended the meeting and applauded the decision.

Phase One of the improvement program is represented by new construction, including some 15

classrooms and a combination auditorium and cafeteria. Phase Two, which was shelved at the last regular meeting, was to provide for remodeling of existing facilities at the school.

The board decided after discussion to request Architect Tommy Huckaby to return at the next meeting to re-examine the plans that were shelved.

Other agenda items included the payment of Supt. Ray Saunders' moving ex-

penses from Anton to Cisco last summer. This item was explained in detail by Business Manager Martha Davis to the satisfaction of everyone. A personnel agenda item was not taken up.

The board's regular monthly meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Monday, March 10, at the high school library. An agenda item will be drawing for places on the ballot for the April 5th school board election. Deadline for candidacies to file is March 5th.

First National Bank Of Gorman Closes - Citizens State Bank Opens

The First National Bank of Gorman, the oldest bank in Eastland County, was closed by Federal authorities Thursday.

The Bank was declared insolvent and sold to a newly formed holding Company - Mid-Texas Bancshares of Ft. Worth. This Company submitted the only bid to take over the Bank.

The new Bank opened Friday morning as Citizens State Bank, with all 2,700 deposit accounts automatically transferred to it.

Michael Patriarca, deputy comptroller of the currency, was present when the First National's doors were closed at 2 p.m. Thursday. The Comptroller's official statement list the bank's failure as "substantial deterioration of the quality of the bank's loan portfolio and its inability to remedy the situation over the last three years."

John Vella, closing supervisor for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in Dallas, said the problem loans for the bank were mainly in the area of peanut farming, with some in oil and gas.

FDIC is reported to have sold the bank and a portion of its \$13.7 in assets to Mid-Texas for \$60,500. First National had about \$12 million in outstanding loans.

Officials in Washington said the FDIC has advanced the new bank \$7.9 million and retained \$8.1 million of its assets. The FDIC has also assumed \$3.7 in First National's bad loans.

Cisco High School Senior Receives Honor

Word was received at the Cisco High School office last week that Nathan Urban, senior student, had achieved the standing of finalist in the 1986 National Merit Scholarship Program. The letter which accompanied the Certificate of Merit said in part: "You have every reason to be proud of this accomplishment for it distinguishes you in a very select group, representing fewer than half of one percent of American high school seniors."

The process which led Nathan to this point of achievement began in October, 1984, when he was still a student at Colstrip (Montana) High School, with the taking of the PSAT test. His score on that test classified him as a

Semifinalist for the taking of the SAT test last fall. The scores on that test, his academic rank in his class, and the recommendations of the high school principal and counselor have qualified Nathan as one of 13,500 Finalists among U.S. Seniors. The process of choosing approximately 5,800 Merit Scholars from among the 13,500 highly qualified Finalist is now underway.

Nathan has listed Baylor University as his college of first choice with the National Merit Scholarship Program and is eligible for a four-year tuition and fees scholarship from that institution. He plans to major in music education.

Wednesday's regional tournament schedule calls for Western Texas JC of Snyder to play Weatherford JC at 7 p.m. and for Odessa JC and Grayson JC will meet at 9 p.m. The finals will be played Thursday with the

Texans Declare Independence From Mexico

On March 2, 1836, Texas' Declaration of Independence from Mexico was adopted at Washington-on-the-Brazos. Richard Ellis served as president of this convention of delegates chosen by Texans. Ellis appointed five on a committee to write the document but George C. Childress wrote it with little help from the others. He is known as the author of the declaration.

The following text contains the exact wording and punctuation of the original Texas Declaration of Independence and the names of signers are exactly as written on the original document.

Texas Declaration of Independence

When a government has ceased to protect the lives, liberty and property of the people from whom its legitimate powers are derived, and for the advancement of whose happiness it was instituted; and so far from being a guarantee for the enjoyment of those inestimable and inalienable rights, becomes an instrument in the hands of evil rulers for their oppression; when the Federal Republican Constitution of their country, which they have sworn to support, no longer has a substantial existence, and the whole nature of their government has been forcibly changed without their consent, from a restricted federative republic, composed of sovereign states, to a consolidated central military despotism, in which every interest is disregarded but that of the army and the priesthood — both the eternal enemies of civil liberty, and the ever-ready minions of power, and the usual instruments of tyrants; When, long after the spirit of the constitution has departed, moderation is at length, so far lost, by those in power that even the semblance of freedom is removed, and the forms, themselves, of the constitution discontinued; and so far from their petitions and remonstrances being regarded, the agents who bear them are thrown into dungeons; and mercenary armies sent forth to force a new government upon them at the point of the bayonet; and in consequence of such acts of maleficence and abdication, on the part of the government, anarchy prevails, and civil society is dissolved into its original elements; In such a crisis, the first law of nature, the right of self-preservation — the inherent and inalienable right of the people to appeal to first principles and take their political affairs into their own hands in extreme cases — enjoins it as a right towards themselves and a sacred obligation to their posterity, to abolish such government and create another in its stead, calculated to rescue them from impending dangers, and to secure their future welfare and happiness.

Nations, as well as individuals, are amenable for their acts to the public opinion of mankind. A statement of a part of our grievances is, therefore, submitted to an impartial world, in justification of the hazardous but unavoidable step now taken of severing our political connection with the Mexican people, and assuming an

independent attitude among the nations of the earth.

The Mexican government, by its colonization laws, invited and induced the Anglo-American population of Texas to colonize its wilderness under the pledged faith of a written constitution, that they should continue to enjoy that constitutional liberty and republican government to which they had been habituated in the land of their birth, the United States of America. In this expectation they have been cruelly disappointed, inasmuch as the Mexican nation has acquiesced in the late changes made in the government by General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, who, having overturned the constitution of his country, now offers us the cruel alternative either to

abandon our homes, acquired by so many privations, or submit to the most intolerable of all tyranny, the combined despotism of the sword and the priesthood.

It has sacrificed our welfare to the state of Coahuila, by which our interests have been continually depressed, through a jealous and partial course of legislation carried on at a far distant seat of government, by a hostile majority, in an unknown tongue; and this too, notwithstanding we have petitioned in the humblest terms, for the establishment of a separate state government, and have, in accordance with the provisions of the national constitution, presented to the general Congress, a republican constitution which was without just cause contemptuously rejected.

It incarcerated in a dungeon, for a long time, one of our citizens, for no other cause but a zealous endeavor to procure the acceptance of our constitution and the establishment of a state government.

It has failed and refused to secure on a firm basis, the right of trial by jury, that palladium of civil liberty, and only safe guarantee for the life, liberty, and property of the citizen.

It has failed to establish any public system of education, although possessed of almost boundless resources (the public domain) and although, it is an axiom, in political science, that unless a people are educated and enlightened it is idle to expect the continuance of civil liberty, or the capacity for self-government.

It has suffered the military commandants stationed among us to exercise arbitrary acts of oppression and tyranny, thus trampling upon the most sacred rights of the citizen and rendering the military superior to the civil power.

It has dissolved by force of arms, the state Congress of Coahuila and Texas, and obliged our representatives to fly for their lives from the seat of government; thus depriving us of the fundamental political right of representation.

It has demanded the surrender of a number of our citizens, and ordered military detachments to seize and carry them into the interior for trial; in contempt of the civil authorities, and in defiance of the laws and the constitution.

It has made piratical attacks upon our commerce; by commissioning foreign desperadoes, and authorizing them to seize our vessels, and convey the property of our citizens to far distant ports of confiscation.

It denies us the right of worshipping the Almighty according to the dictates of our own consciences, by the support of a national religion calculated to promote the temporal interests of its human functionaries rather than the glory of the true and living God.

It has demanded us to deliver up our arms; which are essential to our defense, the rightful property of freemen, and formidable only to tyrannical governments.

It has invaded our country, both by sea and by land, with intent to lay waste our territory and drive us from our homes; and has now a large mercenary army advancing to carry on against us a war of extermination.

It has, through its emissaries, incited the merciless savage, with the tomahawk and scalping knife, to massacre the inhabitants of our defenseless frontiers.

It hath been, during the whole time of our connection with it, the contemptible sport and victim of successive military revolutions and hath continually exhibited every characteristic of a weak, corrupt, and tyrannical government.

These, and other grievances, were patiently borne by the people of Texas until they reached that point at which forbearance ceases to be a virtue. We then took up arms in defense of the national constitution. We appealed to our Mexican brethren for assistance. Our appeal has been made in vain. Though months have elapsed, no sympathetic response has yet been heard from the Interior. We are, therefore, forced to the melancholy conclusion that the Mexican people have acquiesced in the destruction of their liberty, and the substitution thereof of a military government — that they are unfit to be free and incapable of self-government.

The necessity of self-preservation, therefore, now decrees our eternal political separation.

We, therefore, the delegates, with plenary powers, of the people of Texas, in solemn convention assembled, appealing to a candid world for the necessities of our condition, do hereby resolve and declare that our political connection with the Mexican nation has forever ended; and that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent republic, and are fully invested with all the rights and attributes which properly belong to the independent nations, and conscious of the rectitude of our intentions, we fearlessly and confidently commit the issue to the decision of the Supreme Arbiter of the destinies of nations.

Washington-On-The-Brazos Signing Has Eastland County Ties



The Texas Declaration of Independence from Mexico was signed on March 2, 1836 in Noah T. Byars' blacksmith shop at Washington-On-The-Brazos. Noah T. Byars was the grandfather of Eastlander Laura Lou Byars Trammel.

When Noah T. Byars moved to Texas in 1835, he built a blacksmith shop at Washington-On-The-Brazos and little did he know that his shop was to become a historical park one day.

Noah T. Byars was born in South Carolina on May 17, 1808. He felt that he had been called to the ministry so he left South Carolina in 1830 and went to Georgia. He felt that his lack of formal training made him inadequate for this task. But he could not rid himself of his convictions, so he moved to Texas in hopes of finding people who might, because of their isolation, be willing to listen to him preach. He settled at Washington-On-The-Brazos where he built a blacksmith shop.

It was in this blacksmith shop that the Texas Convention of Independence met on

March 1, 1836. Noah Byars, then a layman, cleared out his shop for the convention. The blacksmith shop was used since it was the only building in town large enough to accommodate the delegates. The Texas Convention of Independence met, drew up and signed the document, declaring their independence from Mexico on March 2, 1836.

Even after the war between the Republic of Texas and Mexico, Noah T. Byars services to the republic continued. He became sergeant-at-arms of the Texas Congress at Houston in 1837 and 1838, and later held the same position at the new capitol in Austin for five years. He also served as associate judge for the county court.

But with all this, Noah T. Byars never lost sight of his original purpose, the

ministry. When he was reelected as judge, he decided to accept. He wanted to devote all his time to the religious development of this new republic. He felt he had been called to preach, and he would no longer resist the call.

From 1848 to 1888 his life was spent on the remote frontier preaching the gospel and organizing churches.

Noah T. Byars was instrumental in organizing many Baptist churches across central Texas.

Noah T. Byars and his wife had one daughter and four sons. One son, Baylor, moved to Parker County, where he married Loucretia Bacus of Grandbury. They had four sons and three

daughters.

The eldest son of Baylor, Charles A., was born and reared south of Weatherford. He married Lula Mae Kincaid. The had two sons and one daughter. Their daughter Laura Lou is Laura Lou Trammel of Eastland. Mrs. Trammel moved to Eastland with her husband Leonard Trammel in 1932 where she has remained for many years.

So if you happen to run into Laura Lou Byars Trammel, ask her who Noah T. Byars was. She will most likely say, "He was my grandfather!" And I bet she can tell you alot of interesting stories and facts about Noah T. Byars and Washington-On-The-Brazos.

Replica Of Historic Alamo Mission Bell On Display In Eastland

The Alamo Mission Bell was cast in 1722 for the Mission San Antonio de Valero, known as the Alamo, where it hung for many years. From there, as the story goes, it was being taken to the mission at Refugio when the cart in which it was being hauled broke down, and the bell was left beside the road near the San Antonio River.

There in time some passing horseman found it a likely weight for staking his mount, but the bronc stampeded, dragging the bell "for miles," cracking it badly and breaking away its thin-lipped rim.

In 1900 it was found on a scrap pile and brought to Victoria, to Moses Op-

penheimer, a dealer in junk, who recognized its historical interest and sent it to Miss Adina de Zavala, proud descendant of a pioneer family in San Antonio.

Miss de Zavala gave it to Mrs. Bessie Lee Fitzugh, who featured it in her book, "Bells Over Texas", and later sold it to a dealer in antiques, who in turn sold it to a collector in Nashville, Tennessee.

The bell was purchased in 1974 by five West Texans for the Nita Stewart Haley Memorial Library located in

Midland, Texas.

A replica of the bell and a book titled "The Alamo Mission Bell," written by author J. Evetts Haley, along with many of Mr. Haley's books are now displayed in the Eastland Centennial Memorial Library.

The Haley collection was donated to the library by Mr. Haley in appreciation of his friend Roger L. Stephenson. Mr. Stephenson and his sons own and operate Stephenson Oil and Gas in Eastland and are originally from the Midland area.

"The Alamo Mission Bell" tells of how five Texans, Ray Whiteside, Don L. Bradshaw, J. Ray Stewart, John Haley and Evetts Haley, Jr. all pooled their banking credits and purchased the historic bell from a collector in Tennessee. The bell was brought back to Texas where it now remains.

The book also briefly tells of the history of Texas and is well written.

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120 Attend Local S.T.A.N.D. Rally, View Film On Drug Abuse

The Students of Texas Against Narcotics and Drinking (S.T.A.N.D.) Rally was held Wednesday night, February 26, 1986, at Camp Inspiration. Approximately 120 students, parents, and concerned citizens were in attendance. The towns of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, and Gorman were all represented.

The program started with a movie entitled, "American Dream - A Nightmare." This movie touched on some areas as drugs, suicide, peer pressure, intimate relationships, and more. Students in the movie shared personal testimonies about things they were involved in and how they found solutions in dealing with their particular situations.

After the movie was shown, Marilyn Golightly, Regional Field Coordinator for the Texans' War On Drugs, reported about projects going on regionally, as

well as, nationally.

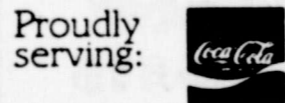

FIT FOR LIFE - A Weight Control Program:

Fit For Life is a total fitness program that teaches weight control through the combination of basic nutrition and exercise principles.

The For Life program is a comprehensive 12 week series of lessons which is being sponsored by the Eastland County Extension Service. The cost is \$25...\$10 purchases your notebook and resource materials. Attend eleven of the twelve sessions for \$15 of the registration fee will be returned to you at the awards ceremony. The class will be limited to 25 persons and pre-registration will be required. The first 25 persons to pre-register and pay their registration fee will be enrolled.

Each participant will receive a comprehensive notebook containing weight control and exercise information.

Does this sound interesting and something you need to do? Then let me urge you to call the Extension Service Office, 629-2222 or 629-1093, for a registration form.

The Fit For Life programs will begin Tuesday, March 4 and we will meet for 12 consecutive Tuesdays. We will be meeting from 4 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. in the Ranger High School.

If you are interested in joining, please pick up registration forms at the Extension Service Office (basement of courthouse) or call me, and we will mail you a pre-registration form. This form has a physician's release form which must be signed by your doctor and either returned with the registration form or bring to the first session.

Briefly this is what each lesson will include:

Week 1
Orientation; measure percentage of body fat; flexibility; cardiovascular fitness; the use of diet and exercise.

Week 2
Measure heart rate, blood pressure and muscular endurance; identify and control eating cues; personal exercise prescription.

Week 3
Nutrition principles; food selection; serving sizes; flexibility exercises.

Week 4
Prudent snacking; control eating binges; prevent exercise injuries; flexibility exercises.

Week 5
Select low-calorie foods; sample low-calorie recipes; strengthen knees and prevent knee injuries.

Week 6

Stress management techniques; relationship of stress to nutrition and exercise; remeasure fitness parameters.

Week 7

Nutrition myths; exercises for the abdomen and waist.

Week 8

Build activity into your day; recipe modification.

Week 9

Positive self-concept; creating a slim appearance through line and color; exercises for hips and thighs.

Week 10

Eating out with a clear conscience; prevent back problems.

Week 11

Evaluate fad weight control diets; exercises for the upper body.

Week 12

Remeasure fitness parameters; awards ceremony.

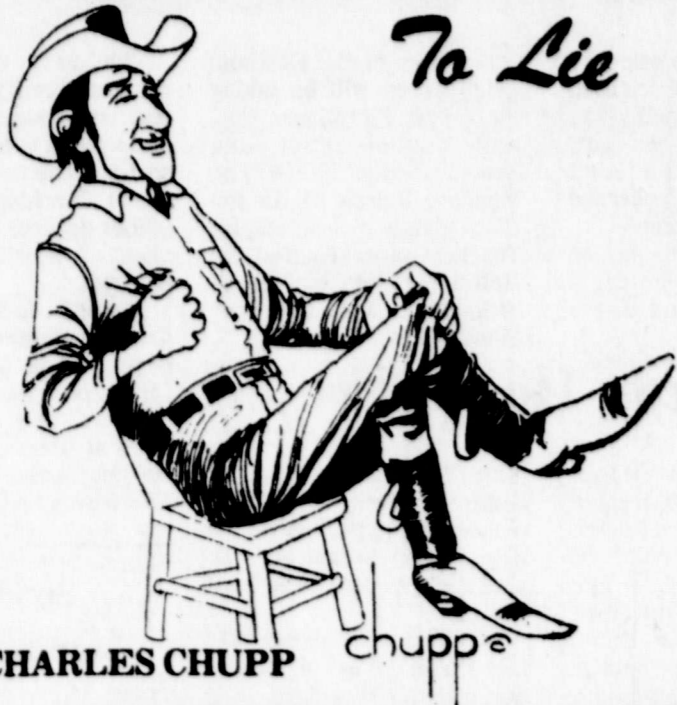

A unique coming out party was held February 28, 1928, at Eastland, Texas. There were 1500 spectators in attendance. An innocent reptile had been sealed in a cornerstone of the courthouse since 1879. Thirty-one years without food or water and with little room to exercise. Today he was being freed.

A Mr. Ernest Wood had placed him there, and was at the courthouse razing to renew their friendship.

A wall was pulled down with a winch, and the metal ceiling of the small cell was revealed. There was a muffled drum roll, and the metal plate was carefully pried loose by Mr. Gene Day.

A hush fell over the crowd as Gene reached inside and carefully retrieved a small dusty horned frog who wriggled feebly.

Witnesses included Reverend F. E. Singleton, County Judge Edward Prichard and a man who would later be head coach of the University of Texas Longhorns, but Blair Cherry was coaching the Ranger High School team on that date in 1928.

Two flappers were motoring from Abilene to Fort Worth that historic date, and attracted by the crowd, had stopped to see what was going on.

Lizzie climbed onto the hood of the Model T Ford in order that she

might see over the crowd. The remained on the running board and could not see at all, and scarcely hear.

"What's happening Liz?" The lugged at Lizzie's skirt. "I can't see!"

"They're pulling down a wall! Now, a man is moving a metal plate! He's reaching down into a hollow stone!" Lizzie delivered her play by play account from her precarious perch.

Blair Cherry lifted the small lizard into the bright sunlight and the multitude responded with a thunderclap of applause.

"Thirty-one years he has slept in this cornerstone! He is alive, well and anxious to renew acquaintances. Ladies and gentlemen, I give you Old Rip!" a booming voice announced.

A new wave of applause was instantaneous and The lugged even more vigorously at Lizzie's skirt.

"What is it Liz? What's been in the cornerstone for thirty-one years?" The was desperate in her curiosity.

"It's a horny toad!" Lizzie was stricken with awe.

"Well, I'm not surprised," The responded, "and I'll bet he's hungry, too!"

Fishing Outdoors

"Leon Record Falls"
The three year old record of Odell Taylor's 9 pound 13 1/2 ounce Lake Leon Black bass record fell prey to Mr. James Bonham of Fort Worth, with an enormous 11 pounds 13 ounces lunker. The big sow fell prey to a red brown crawworm, Sunday 23, 1986 at approximately 4:30 p.m. The exact location of this catch remains a mystery at present, as we have not spoken with Mr. Bonham. We do hope to have a picture, compliments of the happy angler. Congratulations, and thanks to Mr. Bonham for showing us again that some of the best fishing around is right here in our own backyard. This fish along with other

new largemouth records around the state is clear evidence of a successful genetic stocking program which the Texas Parks and Wildlife can be very proud of. Unseasonably warm weather this winter has been an important factor in the appearance of big bass this year. Since the first of the year three fish have made the top 20 list of the biggest bass, a 13-5 from Murvaul, a 13-5 from Possum Kingdom, and of course the new state record of 16 pounds 14 1/2 ounces from Pinkston. Effective March 1, persons reserving campsites or other facilities in state parks more than 10 days in advance will be required to pay a reserva-

tion fee. The fee will be in the amount of one day's user fee for each facility reserved. Lake reports: Brownwood water clear, normal level, black bass good to 4 pounds, strippers slow, crappie good on jigs and minnows, catfish good to 3 pounds on shad. Proctor water murky in river areas, bass good to 5 pounds, crappie excellent to 70 fish per string, strippers slow, catfish excellent to 9 pounds on shad. Leon water clear in main lake, level 6 inches low, black bass good to 11 pounds 13 ounces, most in the 2 to 4 pound range on spinner baits, crappie slow, best in shallow willows. Hubbard creek, water clear, 55 degrees 8 feet low, black bass good to 3 pounds around Goat Island and the dam area on spinnerbaits, strippers fair to 6 pounds 16 ounces, crappie slow, catfish good in creeks to 16 pounds on live perch.

Possum Kingdom water clear, 50 degrees, 4 feet low; black bass slow, as all species. 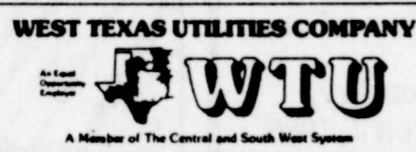

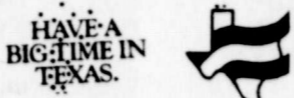

ORDINANCE NO. 0-86-3

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS AMENDING PARAGRAPH (a) OF SECTION 20-29 OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES INCREASING THE WATER METER RECONNECTION FEE; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

1. Section 20-29, Paragraph (a) of the City of Cisco's Code of Ordinances be amended as follows:

(a) If utility service and delinquent charges are not paid on or before the expiration of ten (10) days from the date the charges become delinquent, the City, with just cause and upon notification, is hereby authorized to disconnect the water service furnished by the City. A fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) will be charged for the reconnecting of such service.

(b) The above increase in the water meter reconnection fee shall be effective on March 1, 1986.

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


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
