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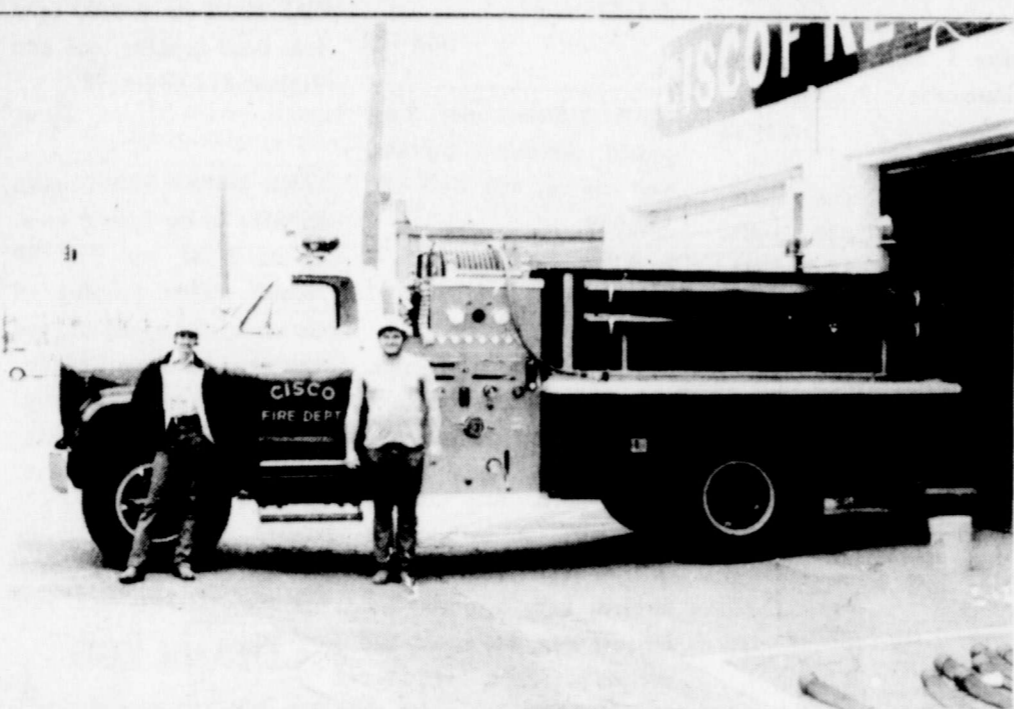

## Cisco Takes Delivery Of New Fire Truck

The City of Cisco took delivery last Sunday of a new Car-Mar Class A pumper fire truck for use by the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department. The new truck was purchased at a cost of \$56,746 by the City Council last February.

The truck was delivered from the Pennsylvania factory and arrived in Cisco at 2:15 a.m. Sunday. It replaces a 1956 model Seagraves truck used by the department over the years.

New hose purchased especially for a new truck some 18 months ago was installed on the new truck Sunday and it has been ready for use since that time, City Manager Mike Moore reported. The old Seagraves

truck will be advertised for sale.

The new truck was built on a new 1985 Chevrolet chassis, and it has a gross weight of 31,000 pounds loaded. It is powered with an 8.2

litre Detroit Diesel engine and has a five-speed transmission and three 12-volt batteries. It is equipped with four-wheel disc brakes and has a heavy duty cooling system, a 50-gallon fuel tank and carries a 12-month warranty.

The truck is equipped with a 750 gallons per minute water pump that carries a life-time warranty. It has a 500 fiberglass auxiliary

water tank, two electric rewind reels, warning lights and is equipped with two ladders, two axes, six poles, a basket, handlights and two 10-lb. extinguishers.

Mr. Moore said the new truck meets all state fire equipment codes and requirements. It will be inspected by state officials in the near future, he added.

The new truck and equipment package was approved by Fire Chief Richard Connell and members of the department when the City Council made the decision to purchase it.

Purchase of the truck was financed with federal revenue sharing funds.

## City Water Department Crew Repairs Break In 18-Inch Water Main

Clean water was available throughout the Cisco area by 9 p.m. Friday, March 14, after being off for some 10 hours while the city water department made repairs to an 18-inch main line break at the Lake Cisco Plant.

City Manager Mike Moore reported that the cause of the water problem was a break in the 18-inch line at the point where the water leaves the purification plant on its way to the College Hill Reservoir. Cause of the break was believed to have been due to saturated ground in the area, and this has been corrected, Mr. Moore said.

Supervisor Leon Boles of the water department and his repair crew of Earl

Petree, Bill Laird, Royce Darr and Randy Johnson, made the repairs with the help of LeRoy Stegemoller of Breckenridge, who is a veteran water system contractor.

Mr. Moore said that the Breckenridge man, who was the contractor for laying part of the distribution lines in the recent water system improvement program, volunteered his services "and we are greatly indebted to him for his valued contributions."

The line break occurred Thursday night after the College Hill Reservoir had been drained for repairs to be made to the roof. The reservoir was less than half full

when the pumps had to be shut off due to the line break, Mr. Moore reported.

Mr. Moore was on the job with the water repair crew throughout the day Friday and he made one trip to Abilene for parts needed to make repairs.

"I feel certain that our citizens will join me in expressing appreciation to Mr. Boles and his repair crew for their fine work in the Friday emergency," Mayor Eris Ritchie told The Press. "These men spent a lot of time in water waist deep to handle a difficult problem. We are grateful for their dedication."

## Firemen Watch Storm In Area

Cisco volunteer firemen manned five storm watch positions when a thunderstorm moved through this region Monday night, according to a report by Fireman David Gill. Rainfall measuring up to about an inch was recorded in the area.

Firemen put out a grass fire at the Ollie Moran place on East Highway 80 at 5:30 p.m. Sunday. There was no property damage. Firemen went to the Fee Ranch northeast of town last Friday after receiving a call. They found a trash burn under control.

THE FBI HAS joined Eastland County authorities in their search for Joe Perry, Sr., 45-year old former Ciscoan who has been charged with murder in the Garcia case. As you know, Perry is the last of four persons indicted some months ago after Bill Hart began work as a special prosecutor in the case.

Mr. Hart reported that they're pleased to have the FBI join in the search. A trial date for the group of persons indicted in the case will be set when they apprehend Perry, he said.

Mr. Hart also reported that he expects a ruling from the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals soon on the Loyal Lunstrom appeal of a life sentence given him in the murder of his wife a couple of years ago. The court has had the case under consideration for about a year.

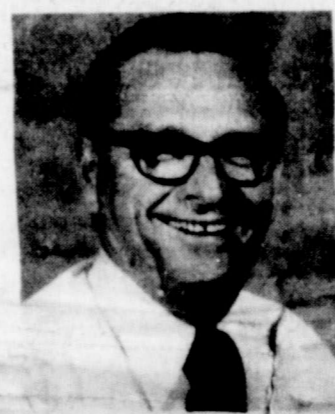

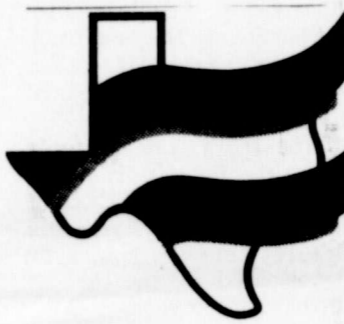

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# Area News Briefs

## GORMAN

The annual Gorman Chamber of Commerce Banquet will be held on Thursday, March 20 at 7 p.m. in the school gym. Tickets are \$5 each, and the meal will be catered by Oscar's Barbeque of Cisco. Speaker for the event will be George Brazell of Cisco. There will also be entertainment provided during the dinner hour. Awards to be given during the Banquet are Farmer of the Year for 1985 and the Community Service Award for 1985. If possible, purchase tickets in advance, so the Chamber will know approx. how many will be in attendance. Tickets will be available at the door, also. The Citizens State Bank, Sunbelt Savings and a number of Gorman merchants are selling tickets at this time. The public is urged to come out for this interesting evening.

Deane Christian is the new Administrator at Canterbury Villa, the Nursing Home in Gorman. Mrs. Christian, an LVN, has worked in Nursing Home for the past 22 years. In Sept., 1981 she received her Nursing Home Administrators License, and holds an Associate Degree in Nursing Home Administration and Long Term Care. She is a Baptist and a member of the Baptist Church of Round Grove.

A fund has been established at Sun Belt Savings for Brent Foster. Donations will assist in paying expenses incurred by the family during Brent's treatment in Abilene for kidney failure. He must travel to Abilene three times each week for dialysis treatment, and cannot work during this time. Dialysis treatment cost \$35,000 per year, not to mention related expenses. ## CISCO

The Cisco City Council has placed water conservation back in force under the authority of the Water Conservation Ordinance. This action was taken by the Council after considering the fact that the water level at Lake Cisco has continued to fall despite a brief reprieve during the spring of 1985. Mayor Eris Ritchie says that the city solicits and encourages everyone's sincere prayers for "good spring rains" so that the city will not have to expand the water conservation requirements. Because of the limited recharge area of Lake Cisco it will require rains over an extended period of time to have the desired effect.

City Manager Mike Moore has been asked to study the matter of establishing designated storm shelters for those who might wish to go to them during storms. The city has no public shelters large enough to accommodate many people at this time.

The Cisco City Council will seek a solution to the condition of the cover on the College Hill Water Reservoir at the March 25 meeting. It is reported that the cover has deteriorated considerably, and that a state regulation states that water reservoirs must be covered. A new cover would probably cost more than \$100,000, City Manager Mike Moore said.

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department is selling tickets for their March 22 Chili and Stew Supper, which they hope will bring in more funds for their Jaws of Life Project. Price of the tickets is \$3, and the event will be held in the Corral Room at the Laguna Hotel. Plans call for Willard Johnson's Country and Western Band to play during the supper.

Plans are in the making for the formal opening of the Mobley-Hilton Community Center in Cisco next October. George Bush, Vice President of the United States, has been invited to speak, and the two surviving sons of the late Conrad Hilton as well as the Hilton Foundation Board Chairmen has been invited to attend.

All details will be announced as soon as the program is finalized. The Hotel restoration is now 60 percent complete.

## RANGER

A beautiful and historic two-story home known as "the old Gholson residence" was extensively damaged by fire on Friday, March 14. The house, located at 405 South Hodges, was owned by Pete and Winnie Pilgrim. The Pilgrims purchased the house in Aug., 1984 and had furnished it in Victorian style. Ranger fire fighters answered the 10:15 a.m. alarm, and soon asked help from the Eastland Fire Department. The fire was very difficult to contain.

The Ranger Volunteer Fire Department have run into a delay on financing for their partially completed fire station. They still lack around \$35,000 to finish the structure, which is being constructed in World War II Park out on Highway 80 E. Mayor Raymond Hart indicated that the city attorney did not agree with the bank's attorney on the financing since the bids were not put up by the city. Volunteer Fire Chief George Beighley suggested that the city deed the construction site to the Fire Department, and "five or six firemen will personally guarantee the loan and sign the note." He has suggested that the two attorneys get together in an attempt to find a solution.

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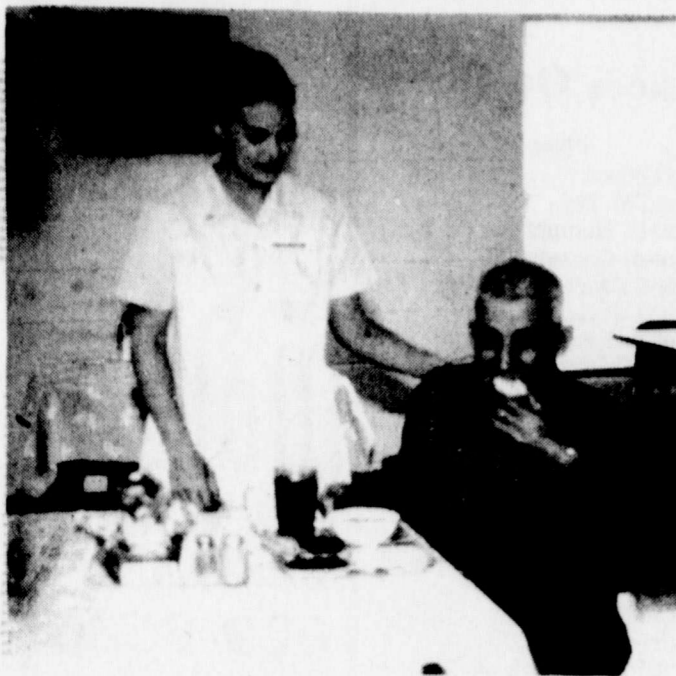
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## Good Eating At Canterbury Villa

## Driver Loses Control, Destroys Planter Boxes

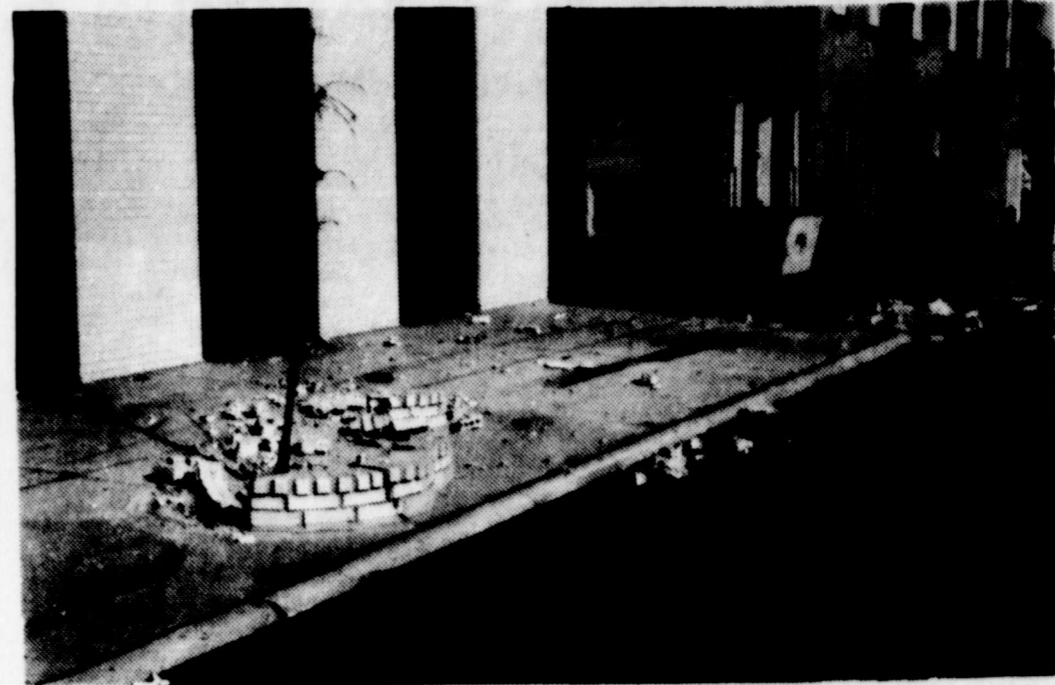

Damage to the planter boxes was estimated at \$350. No damage estimate was known to the vehicle and the driver was not injured.



Two of the new brick planters that were recently built at the office of the Eastland County Newspapers were totally destroyed by a car early Saturday morning. According to Eastland Police Officer Don Walls, the accident occurred at approximately 5:55 a.m. The driver of the auto was not injured and hopefully neither were the two trees.

## Retail Sales Decrease For Counties

The latest estimate of retail sales from the Office of the State Comptroller shows decreases in sales levels for three area counties for the third quarter, 1985 while two counties marked increases when comparisons were made to the July-September period of 1984.

According to a study done in five Cross Timbers area counties, when third quarter 1985 sales levels are compared to the same period in 1983, all counties except Bosque showed increases. Total sales for the first nine months of 1985 exhibited patterns similar to those of the third quarter.

William Beaty, Assistant Professor of Social Sciences at Tarleton State University, said that according to figures released recently Bosque County marked total retail sales of \$12.2 million in the third quarter of 1985. "This figure was 6.8 percent below the total for the same three months of 1984 and was virtually unchanged from the total for July-September, 1983," Beaty explained. Retail sales for the first nine months of 1985 totaled \$34.8 million. "This was significantly below the figure for the same period of 1984 and was only slightly above the total for the first three quarters of 1983," he said.

Comanche County also posted a sales decrease during the third quarter of 1985. The county's total of \$15.1 million was 6.1 percent below the year earlier level, but was 8.9 percent higher than the total for the same three months of 1983. Comanche County retail sales for the first nine months of 1985

totalled \$45 million, slightly below the figure for the January-September period of 1984, but significantly higher than the 1983 level.

Eastland County's third quarter retail sales totaled \$25 million, 5.5 percent below the corresponding figure for 1984, but 2.3 percent higher than the tally for the July-September, 1983 period. Total retail sales for the first nine months of 1985 were \$76.3 million. "This was down from the 1984 level but was higher than the figure for the same three quarters of 1983," said Beaty.

Erath County exhibited stable retail sales growth to achieve a third quarter, 1985 total of \$39.8 million. This figure was 5.5 percent above the 1984 level and 12.8 percent higher than the total for the same three months of 1983. Retail sales for the first nine months of 1985 were \$115.1 million. This figure was higher than the corresponding totals for both 1983 and 1984.

Hamilton County showed strong retail sales growth for both the third quarter and the first nine months of 1985. Third quarter sales totaled \$9.3 million. This was 14.6 percent higher than the 1984 level and was 24.7 percent above the figure for 1983. Total retail sales for the first nine months of 1985 were \$25.1 million. The tendency of some people to view their dependent, aging parents as childlike can result in an "emotional somersault" harmful to both generations. So says a prominent social worker and expert on aging, who adds that the heightened dependency and impairments that sometime accompany old age should not be confused with the behavior of a child.

Writing the newsletter "Advice for Adults with Aging Parents", Dr. Barbara Silverstone, a former chairperson of the Committee on Aging of the National Association of Social Workers, takes issue with the notion of "role reversal" in describing the reciprocal relationship between adult children and their aging

parents. "This notion," she says, "which suggests that the adult child has become like a parent and the aging parent like his or her child, is not only inaccurate but harmful to both generations." If aging parents are regarded as childlike, Dr. Silverstone adds, then they can easily be treated as children. This, in turn, increases their dependency and possibly undermines their self-esteem.

"When adult children try to see themselves in the parent role, the emotional somersault involved can result in negative feelings... anxiety, resentment, anger and guilt". Dr. Silverstone notes that

other factors may also sour relations between grown children and their aging parents. One problem may occur when a domineering parent, who over the years demanded much and gave little, suddenly becomes frail, "he or she may face an abundance of guilt from children no longer afraid to be forthright with their pent-up feelings."

A number of methods may be used to cope with negative feelings, she states. These include:

\* Letting your aged parent know how you feel. "Most aging parents, no matter how ill, are concerned about the well-being of their sons and daughters."

\* Improving communication among all members of the family.

\* Meeting with other caregivers or with self-help groups.

\* Accepting our own human limitations in a busy life with other priorities.

The co-author with Helen Kandel Hyman of the bestselling "You and Your Aging Parent," Dr. Silverstone is executive director of The Lighthouse, The New York Association for the Blind, which recently established a national center for vision and aging.

The attention devoted to public education on child abuse and neglect in recent years has been phenomenal. It has been long overdue and contributed greatly to ameliorating a social problem of major proportions. But there is another form of abuse and neglect that has received little attention and yet represents an imminent danger to large numbers of our population.

An estimated one million elderly Americans, or one out of every 25, is a victim of some form of abuse or neglect, ranging from blatant physical abuse to more subtle, psychological mistreatment or neglect. It is believed that only one in six cases of elderly abuse is ever reported because the victims are often afraid of being sent to a nursing home, and in fact, one half of the complaining victims reportedly do end up there.

According to a recent report from the House Select Committee on Aging, nearly half the elderly people who are abused live in nursing homes. The other half are abused by their children or other relatives. The abuse often occurs in the parent's own home. A typical victim would be a widow older than 75, who suffers from one or more disability, and who lives with an adult child or other family member who abuses her. The typical abuser would be a son or a daughter who is an alcoholic or abuses drugs, and who suffers from some sort of stress, such as unemployment or a long-term medical problem.

While many gerontologists blame elderly abuse on the stress felt by caregivers, Isabel Levow, program director for aging services at the International Center for the Disabled in New York, feels stress is only one of the factors involved. "I think it's a mixed bag. I don't see it as mainly stress-related. I think it has a lot to do with early relationships," says Levow, a social worker who deals with older persons suffering from some form of dementia. She says often the abusing caregiver was abused or mistreated in some way by the elderly person

Statistics bear out Levow's contention that elderly abuse isn't just a sudden reaction to the stress of caring for an aging relative. They show that three-quarters of all reported cases of elderly abuse occurred more than twice, and that some abuse has continued for as long as 30 years. The average period of abuse is said to be slightly longer than nine years.

Cases of extreme physical abuse have been well documented, including burns, bruises, cuts, sprains, and broken bones, but Levow says there are other forms of abuse. They can include verbal and psychological abuse and forms of neglect so subtle they would be difficult to prove in a court of law. She says she knows of children who have refused operations or other medical treatments to ill parents for seemingly responsible reasons. She says she has seen parents denied medication or given it incorrectly. Some of the dementia patients Levow sees, are financially exploited by relatives who have been given conservatorship or power of attorney when the elderly person was judged no longer able to responsibly make decisions.

Various solutions to the problem of elderly abuse have been proposed, including legislative incentives for states to improve enforcement of elderly abuse laws, requirements that employees in Medicaid/Medicare-certified long-term care facilities be bonded to reduce chances of financial exploitation, and unannounced site visits to nursing homes by government inspectors to ensure quality care.

The National Association of Social Workers is sponsoring a public service campaign entitled "Aging Parents: Return the Gift of Caring." The association urges adult children, their parents, public policymakers, and health care professionals to use this opportunity to focus attention on such problems as elderly abuse and on solutions that allow our aging population to live lives of dignity and personal fulfillment.

This campaign will coincide with the observance of March 1986 as National Social Work Month.

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## Don't Let Eggs "Spoil" Your Easter

It's that time of year again when some giant rabbit romps through neighborhood backyards just before the crack of dawn leaving a trail of magically colored hard-boiled eggs partially hidden in clumps of dew-fresh grass. Children from toddlers to teens know it's time for the annual arrival of the "Easter Bunny."

Wise parents know it's the time to take special precautions against possible food poisoning from con-

taminated or spoiled eggs. "Hard-boiled eggs that are cooled in water and not refrigerated can be a source of food poisoning," says Dr. C. David Morehead, Director of Infectious Disease in the Department of Pediatrics at Scott and White in Temple.

"Although unbroken and uncooked eggs are remarkably resistant to bacterial invasion," Dr. Morehead explains, "the heating process breaks down

the egg's natural defense mechanisms and creates an ideal growth medium for bacteria."

Dr. Morehead emphasizes that reports of contamination of whole shell eggs are rare, but cases of staphylococcal food poisoning commonly occur with improper handling and refrigeration of a variety of egg products, such as salad, custards and deviled eggs.

"Even an uncracked egg can absorb bacteria, and cooking greatly reduces the egg's defense against contamination," he adds.

"The bacteria can be transmitted to the cooling water or the egg by a cook with unwashed hands or by storing eggs at room temperature for more than 24 hours," notes Dr. Morehead.

Symptoms of staphylococcal food poisoning may include vomiting, abdominal pain and diarrhea within 12 hours after eating the eggs.

Scott and White recommends the following tips to help make this a safe, happy Easter free from food poisoning caused by contaminated or spoiled eggs:

- 1) Wash hands carefully before handling eggs
- 2) Refrigerate boiled eggs promptly after cooking
- 3) Keep eggs chilled until ready to eat
- 4) Throw out any cracked eggs
- 5) Make sure colorings are "food safe."

## DPS To Have Operation Plain-View II March 27

Major Dudley Thomas, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety's 49 County West Texas Region announced today, "that the DPS will conduct a high visibility patrol effort called "Operation Plain-View II on March 27. The special emphasis program on this day will be focused on Interstate highway 20 from the Louisiana State Line to the intersection of Interstate highway 10 in Reeves County and extending on IH-10 to the New Mexico State line."

"Operation Plain-View II will be conducted from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. along Interstate 20 and Interstate 10 in all areas of the state except in the Abilene District where it will be conducted from 12:00 noon to midnight," he said. "This special effort is designed to gain maximum compliance with all traffic laws and save lives by reducing the number of traffic collisions."

"Operation Plain-View is a program designed to make the officers of the DPS highly visible by having a DPS unit located about every 10 miles along the highway," Thomas said. "In the far western part of the state, where IH-20 and IH-10 merge, the same effort will continue to the New Mexico State line." DPS officers on IH-10 in the area of Ozona and Sonora will be conducting the same operation.

"Operation Plain-View was first conducted on December 19, 1985, on IH-20 from the Mitchell-Howard County line east of Big Spring to the in-

tersection of IH-20 and IH-10 in Reeves county, a total of 206 miles, and on IH-10 from Sheffield on the east to the New Mexico State line for a total of 325 miles," Thomas said.

During the 9 hours of the December 19 operation, 760 citations were issued for violations of the speed law, 10 citations for following too closely, 17 citations for seat belt violations, 1 person was arrested for driving while intoxicated, 3 wanted fugitives were apprehended, 95 arrests for other violations were made and 1 stolen vehicle was recovered. A total of 78 officers were involved in the original operation.

"Operation Plain-View II will involve 158 uniformed personnel with the DPS and will utilize 130 marked enforcement vehicles and 28 unmarked units," Thomas said. "The unmarked vehicles will mainly be used as radar cars"

"Officers of the Drivers License Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service and Safety Education Service will assist the highway patrol officers in this effort."

"Officers will be looking for all violations of the traffic laws with special emphasis given to the speed limit, following too closely, seat belt violations and driving while intoxicated."

"Special attention will also be given to commercial vehicle violations since they comprise a large percentage of the traffic on the highway," Thomas said. "The program is aimed at achieving maximum compliance with the traffic laws by all users of the roadways."

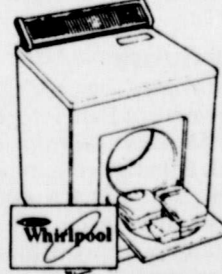
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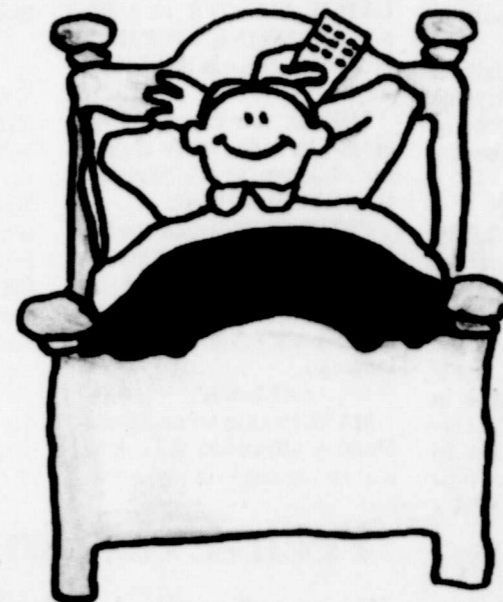

## New SSI Checks Coming

Starting with the supplemental security income (SSI) check delivered April 1, people in the Big Country area will get a new style check in multiple colors. Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently. The check will also be delivered in a new, blue envelope.

SSI recipients will no longer get the familiar, gold punch-card check, Hammons said. The new check, however, is as good as the old and just as easy to cash.

In addition to being multi-colored, the new checks show a full-length replica of the Statue of Liberty on the left side. A muted close-up of her head and torch is in the background near the right side.

The new check contains features that discourage alterations, forgeries, and counterfeiting, Hammons said. The new, lightweight paper stock is less expensive and takes less space to store. Use of the new check is expected to result in a savings to taxpayers of about \$6 million a year.

SSI checks will be delivered in blue envelopes to help distinguish them from other Government checks, which are delivered in brown envelopes.

## Doyle C. Dale, Bank President: Change

A tall young man enters the Citizens State Bank of Gorman with a light step - a blithe spirit headed indoors. He pauses to reply to "Good morning, Mr. Dale." His voice has a good tone - his smile is disarming. No harassed executive here, in spite of his long drive from Fort Worth.

He, Doyle C. Dale, is president of this new bank. He is also an official in Mid-Texas Bancshares of Fort Worth, the corporation which opened Citizens State on Feb. 28. This was the day after the closing of the First National Bank of Gorman by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Somehow Dale seems to relate to the massive curving desk in the president's office. Maybe it's the air he has of knowing what he is

about, or the stack of fresh mail with his name on it. Or perhaps it is because he, like the bank building and its furnishings, is contemporary - a part of the post-1960's era.

Change is the word here. Less formality, less distance. It is a curious paradox that this trend comes at a time when most banks are no longer home-owned.

People are transacting their usual business outside the president's office. Someone asks for a former official of the First National Bank, and is told "He is no longer here."

One farmer jokes to another: "You lost any of your money in this deal?"

"Not a dime," the other replies.

A well-dressed elderly lady comes by. "Just to say, 'hello' to the new president."

Dale speaks to her in an unhurried manner. She appears pleased and reassured as she leaves.

"People here have really been great - very supportive," Dale says. "That's one of the outstanding parts about this whole thing - the way the people of the town have treated us."

"We had no 'run' on the bank as we took over. I think anyone who had planned to pull out money had already done so before we got here."

"Now depositors who had pulled away from banking here in the past are coming back. We had over \$500,000 put in new deposits last week."

Dale says that he has lived in small towns, and knows how important a bank is to a town.

"They used to say: 'You can't have a town without a railroad,'" he remarks. "Now you can't have a town without a bank."

He explains some of the mechanics of the acquisition of the Gorman bank by Mid-Texas Bancshares, which also owns the Fort Worth State Bank.

The F.D.I.C., he says, keeps a file of corporations

which wish to bid on any banks in default. These corporations also list the geographic area in which they would be interested in owning a bank.

The list must include the banking experience of the prospective buyer, and how well the banks they have controlled have been run.

"It's not just a matter of money as to who gets to buy a bank," Dale says.

Mid-Texas Bancshares actually made the only bid on the Gorman bank, he explains. But the corporation did not acquire the bank for only \$60,500 - an impression people have received from what has been published. The sum of \$25,000 capital was added to the \$60,500.

New officers of the Citizens State Bank, in addition to Dale, are A.G. Cummings of Lometa, Chairman of the Board, Terry D. Jones of Fort Worth, Senior Vice President, Butch Crudginton of Cisco, Vice President, Shirley Eaves of Gorman, Vice President, and Penny Singleton of Gorman, Cashier.

Dale states that Citizens State Bank did not acquire any of the property owned by First National, not even this building in which they operate. It is occupied under a lease, option-to-purchase agreement.

All real estate property once owned by the former bank now belongs to the F.D.I.C., he says. This agency will eventually decide on the disposal of same.

Dale says that in the bank purchase the Citizens State Bank assumed certain liabilities of the \$12 million First National Bank had in outstanding loans.

"Generally these are the 'better' loans, with nothing past due, where the borrower is in fairly good financial condition," he says.

"The F.D.I.C. has acquired the past due, weaker loans. An office has been set up here to review these notes."

"The loans acquired by Citizens State will be carried as usual," he said. He went on to indicate that there will be no such thing as "calling in" this type of note.

"We are not here to liquidate people who are trying to meet their obligations.

Citizens State will be making even more loans. We want all the good loan business we can get.

"And yes - we will loan to farmers and ranchers. Obviously we will have to use sound business practices or we will run into the same situation as other banks have - but we want to work with the community here."

Dale mentions that the Citizens State Bank was greatly impressed by the quality of the staff they found working in the bank when they came here.

"They were all good people," he says. "We retained 10 of the 15 employees of First National. When we expand in the future we plan to do our hiring from this area."

Vice President Butch Crudginton of Cisco, he declares "has been my right-hand man" during the change of bank ownership.

When asked how he got into the banking business, Doyle Dale says that his immediate family was certainly not involved in it.

He did not have a grandfather who banked in Electra, but his father, the late Dan Dale, worked for oil companies in the southwest. At times he sold equipment, but at the time of his death he was a chemical engineer for Baroid.

Doyle says that he was born to Dan and Helen Dale in San Angelo. The family moved frequently, living in such places as Abilene, Odessa, Big Lake, Llano, and Santa Fe. Doyle graduated from high school in Llano. For a short while afterward he drove a truck for a wholesale hardware company, then decided he had better get some more education if he was going to make it.

He enrolled as a student at New Mexico Highland University, Las Vegas, New Mexico. While there he became interested in banking, and enrolled as an F.D.I.C. trainee. After he graduated - in 1978 - he worked for the F.D.I.C. for four years as a bank examiner.

He left this agency to become a chief lending officer in a bank. He quit this work recently to organize Fort Worth State Bank, which he also serves as president.

Bits of other information surface. Dale mentions that he is unmarried, and his family consists of his mother - who lives near Kerrville - and a brother and two sisters who live elsewhere in Texas. He is a Methodist, and has an obvious interest in churches. And, in his spare time - if there is such a thing - Doyle Dale enjoys boating and working on ranches.

He speaks again of Gorman, and his hopes for the bank here.

"I really like this place," he says. "We want to make a go of this bank - to have something the town can be proud of."

"The people deserve it."

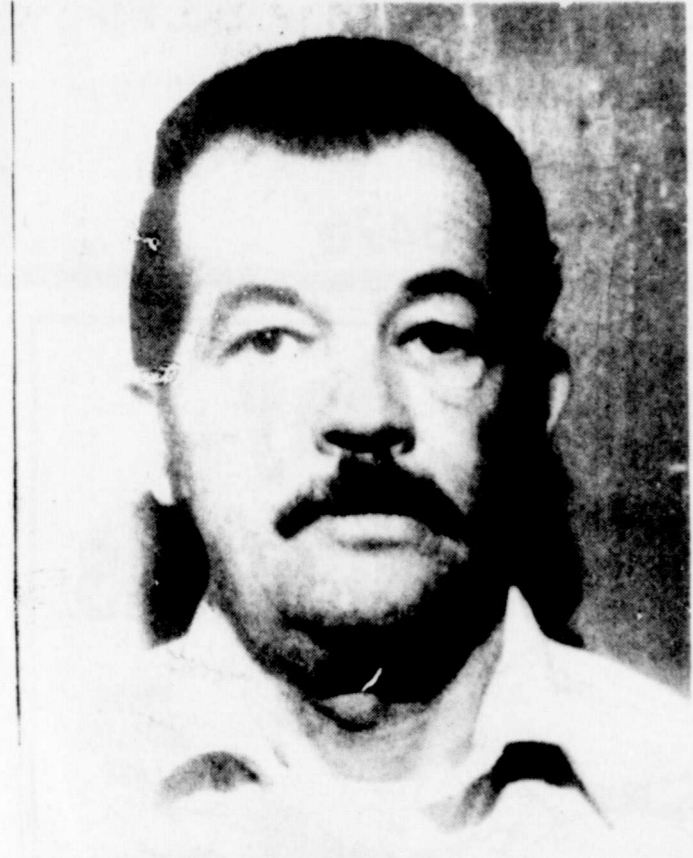

## Texas Most Wanted

TYLER, Texas - Edna and Clyde Malone might not have gained the same amount of notoriety like Bonnie and Clyde, but they have caught the attention of Texas law enforcement authorities.

The Malones are wanted on warrants charging them with aggravated sexual assault, parole revocation and escape from the Smith County jail.

And this week Edna and Clyde achieved something that not even Bonnie and Clyde were able to accomplish - they made the Texas Most Wanted list.

Their latest skirmish with the law occurred more than a year and a half ago.

Clyde and Edna were arrested April 30, 1984, on charges that they molested an 11-year-old boy. Edna was able to bond out of jail. But Clyde remained behind bars and eventually was made a trustee at the jail.

On August 25, 1984, Clyde walked away from the jail. Investigators say they believe the escape was well-planned and evidence indicates Edna was waiting for her husband when he made his bid for freedom.

The pair apparently drove to the outskirts of Dallas in their late-model white Pontiac Grand Prix and then abandoned the vehicle. They have remained at-large ever since.

This week the Governor's Office is offering rewards of up to \$1,000 each for information leading to the capture of Edna and Clyde Malone.

Edna Malone is described as a white female, 48, 5-5, 125 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. Prior to her arrest for aggravated rape, she worked as a salesclerk at a children's store. Investigators say she sometimes wears a blond wig and walks with a limp on her left leg.

Clyde Malone is a white male, 51, 6-0, 170 pounds, with brown hair and hazel eyes. He has a tattoo with the name "Etta Mae" on his right shoulder.

Anyone with information about the Malones' whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

As of March 10, 1986, the Department of Public Safety reported that Clyde and Edna

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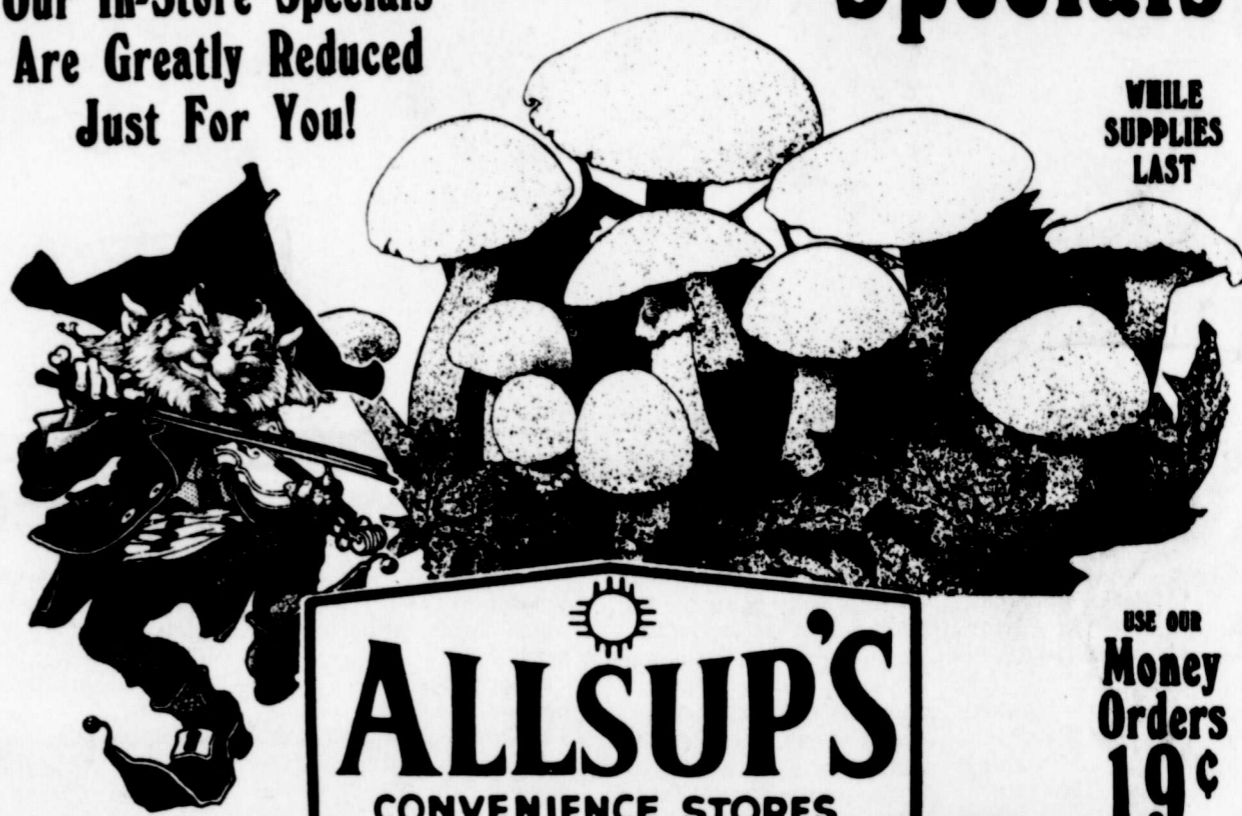
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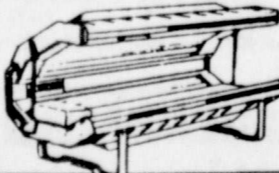
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
