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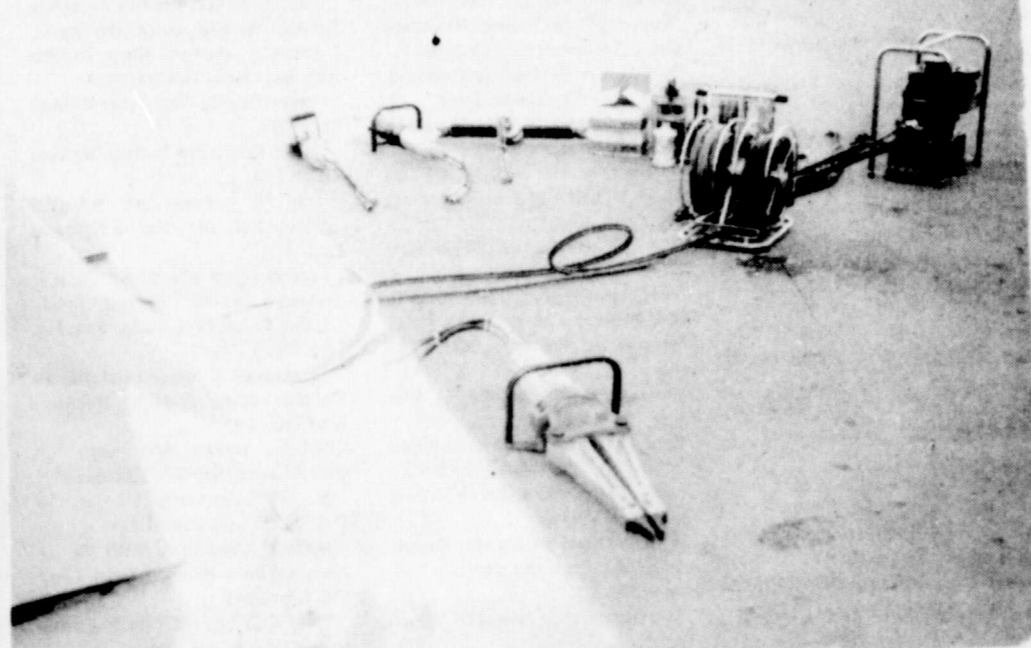

## Christian Scientists Present Lecturer



JOHN M. TYLER

In his lecture here Easter Sunday, March 30, 1986, Mr. John Tyler, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, will discuss what he calls "one of the central messages of Jesus' teachings and of Christian Science: that man is not what the physical senses tell him he is, despite the persistence of their message." The title of the lecture is "Spiritual Man Discovered," and Tyler emphasizes that "Jesus recognized the great need to lead human thought back to the recognition of man's true and original identity, back to

our native freedom and spirituality — our unity with God... In fact, Tyler points out, "everything Jesus knew about man came from his understanding of God."

Mr. Tyler, a former university professor, will be speaking here as a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship. He has been a public practitioner of Christian Science for a number of years and cites a variety of healing experiences during his lecture. He is also an authorized teacher of Christian Science.

The lecturer describes Christian Science healing as "not mysterious, nor supernatural" but an opportunity "for man to learn about God as... his literal Father, his only creator and cause."

Christian Science, he points out, is a revival of "the method of healing which Jesus taught his disciples," and which is again available to anyone interested in learning more about the spiritual values of primitive Christianity.

The lecture is sponsored by Christian Science Society of Eastland and will begin at 3:00 p.m. on March 30, 1986, at the church, on the corner of Lamar and Plummer Streets in Eastland.

The lecture is open to the public and free of charge.

The residence and contents of the Henry Lind family on the Lake Bernie Road were destroyed by fire that broke out around 10 a.m. Saturday, according to a report by the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department. An estimate of the damages was not available.

Mr. Lind, a construction and ready-mix contractor, was at the family home when the fire started. The three bedroom frame home had recently undergone extensive remodeling.

The fire was believed to

have started from embers and ashes from a fireplace that had been dumped outside the house, according to Fire Marshal Billy Rains. Grass in the yard also caught fire.

Firemen sent three trucks to the scene. A high wind caused the blaze to spread quickly, firemen said. The family's household goods along with some of Mr. Lind's tools went up in the flames.

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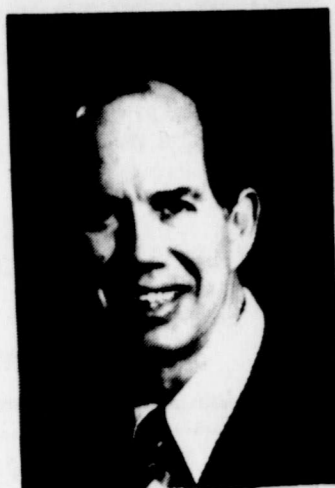

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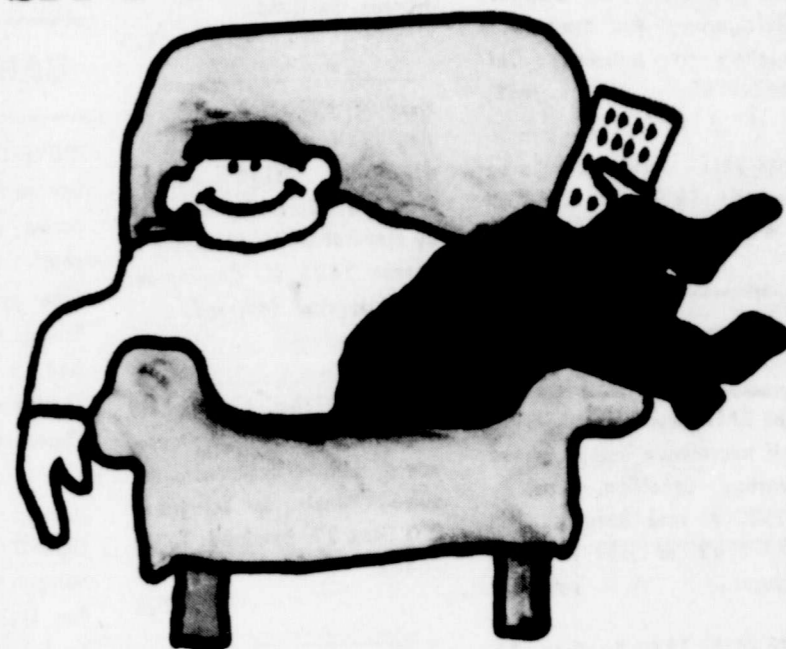

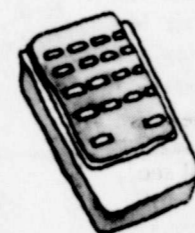

BE IT recorded that on Wednesday, March 19, 1986, at approximately 5:30 a.m. at Lajitas, Tex., (alongside the Rio Grande River and Big Bend National Park), a trio of our tribe witnessed the Comet Halley in a cloudless, star-filled sky.

At that early hour there was a cold wind howling onto that deep Southwest Texas area, and although we had found a totally dark viewing spot about a mile from town in the Desert Museum parking lot, we were thankful for a partial windbreak fence, and the fact that properly armed with data, we were able to find the comet quickly and all had good views through field glasses.

Halley was one of a number of high points on what was a Spring-Break for Med-School Son Vance with GayNell and I to a part of Texas we'd ignored too long. Still-in-classes, Amy couldn't make this jaunt but is looking to her Spring-Break up-coming.

How we parlayed with Halley and all the other Texas treats in the short five-day, long-miles excursion took some careful advanced planning and scheduling on the part of Coordinator GayNell. It's a long haul for sure, and we were amazed at all we got in, and were super treated by a

bonsu surprise feature on our last day on the road.

Big Bend had been the agreed-upon choice for the school break - and we're ashamed that we'd not done it sooner. To think that many of us looked to Yellowstone, Yosemite and whatever before we did our own BIG National Park is a shame. We hope to go back for a longer stay - and highly recommend it to your family for many reasons. No. One: It's spectacular. No. Two: It's not packed. (We read somewhere that more people have slept in the Grand Canyon than have visited Big Bend). But you'd better hurry; the word is getting out, and it no doubt will become jammed.

This isn't the only way it could be done, but here's basically how we touched many bases in a few precious days:

Leaving Eastland on a day at 11 a.m., we lunched late in San Angelo (the jumping-off place) and arrive in Alpine about 7 p.m., having gone through Rankin, McCamey, Fort Stockton and others. It's not bad at all with a couple of drivers.

A pretty little, interesting town, Alpine is the home of Sul Ross State University of about 1,600 students and still primarily a teacher-training center.

We spent two nights there

in order to take the next day up to Fort Davis, a really pretty and unique frontier town, which offers the beautifully restored National Historic site of Old Fort Davis, an outstanding Fort Davis State Park where we had lunch at Indian Lodge, and just up the mountain, the McDonald Observatory. All of these we did in one good Monday-bearing in mind that our time was limited, and also, it was still raw-wind cold. Any of these spots would merit a several-day visit. (Details on these individual attractions will follow).

Alpine has a really neat Museum of the Big Bend on the campus of the University that's worth a good visit.

Tuesday we left Alpine and drove the some 100 miles down to Big Bend park, with lunch at the Lodge in the Basin of the Chisos Mountains--breaking visits in every direction.

In the afternoon we drove to the far east side of the park to the Boquillas Canyon area.

Coming out of the park we backtracked to the Study Butte Entrance, then headed west through Ghost Town Terlingua (of Chili Cook-Off Fame) and onto to Lajitas (another ghost town that's now building into a resort center "to equal Palm Springs.")

If you look at these places on a map, you'll see that nobody "just drops by" - you must be planning to go.

We did a lot of miles and a lot of looking.

It's all worth the effort and we'll be tell you more in detail.

What do I do if I really want to remarry? The first thing you don't do is get a T shirt and advertise. Some singles feel that the only way to find a mate and or date is



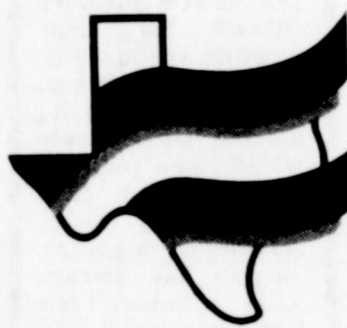

## Wagon Train Rolling Through Texas

When wagon trains rolled across Texas years ago, making camp wherever sundown caught them, mobile telephones and fiber optic cable were light years away.

The wagon riders didn't imagine that some day technology from Southwestern Bell Telephone would enable their descendants to talk to relatives, friends, or even a sweetheart while out on the trail.

Today, another wagon train is making its way across the Lone Star State—not to move families toward new territory, but to carry Texans on a 3,000-mile journey to celebrate the state's 150th birthday.

So that riders on the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train can speak to those they have temporarily left behind, Southwestern Bell Telephone is providing mobile coin phones at remote campsites along the trail as it winds through the state.

"I can't imagine what trailriders of long ago went through without the advanced technology we have today. The wagon train will make it equal to the distance between New York and California. By car, it takes about six days. By wagon or horseback, about six months."

In December, hundreds of Texans loaded up 100 wagons with supplies, hitched up teams of horses and began the journey at a 4 mph pace from Sulphur Springs in northeast Texas. Some even chose to travel by horseback.

Covering about 20 miles per day, the wagon train has made its way down through

Then, the caravan will head east and north to Odessa, Midland, Abilene and Wichita Falls, arriving in Fort Worth July 3.

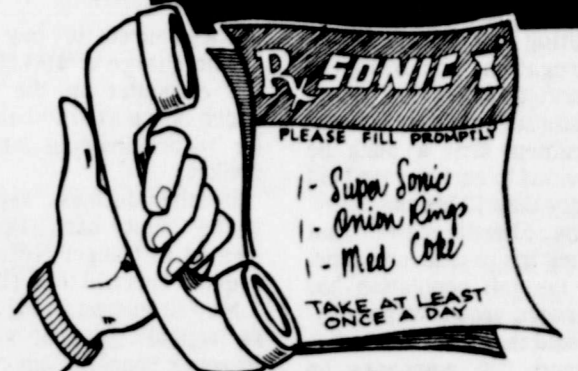

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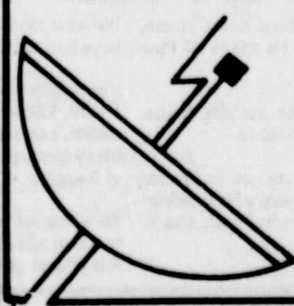
