Lawsuit Hearing Within Three Weeks

There was an informal conference in Judge Jim Wright's Chambers at the 91st District Court on Monday afternoon between Attorney Keith Woodley of Stephenville, representing Calvin Ainsworth of Ranger, and Attorney Bill Hart, representing Eastland County.

The plaintiff will amend his position and file special exceptions against Eastland County's counter claim in

the lawsuit involving a front-end loader.

Ainsworth filed a suit against the County in Oct., 1985 on an alleged debt and foreclosure on a lien. The County (represented by the Commissioner's Court) then filed a suit stating that any repair to the equipment was an unauthorized expenditure.

Briefs from both parties will be submitted to the Court within three weeks.

WTU Co. Receives Permission For Making Refunds

West Texas Utilities Co. has received permission from the Public Utility Commission of Texas to refund more than \$9 million in over-collected fuel costs to its retail customers.

The PUC's action was in response to a request filed March 17 by WTU. The total amount to be refunded includes \$9,146,092 in actual fuel costs savings which have accumulated since the current fuel rate for WTU was set by the PUC last August, plus \$215,837 in interest.

The refunds will be made through one-time credits on bills customers will receive in May. The typical customer should receive about \$22.

Also approved was WTU's proposal to reduce its fuel rates, technically known as

the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factor, for the three-month period beginning in May. WTU officials estimate that fuel charges to customers will drop by 6.2 per cent during that period. Base rates for kilowatt-hours used have not changed since 1984 and will remain the same.

WTU's fuel costs have declined for two years in a row, largely due to a softening natural gas market. Utility companies are allowed to pass the fuel costs to customers. Adjustments for over-collections or under-collections formerly were made automatically each month, but since 1983 utilities in Texas have collected fuel costs through fixed factors, which have necessitated refunds. This will be WTU's second refund within a year.

The Wrangler Band and Belles will provide programs for student assemblies in Cisco and Hamlin High Schools on Thursday, April 17, Director Tim Jones of the band reported. The schedule calls for the groups to perform at Cisco High School at 8 a.m. and at Hamlin at 12:40 p.m.

Mr. Jones reported that

the two groups are scheduled to participate in the annual Buccanneer Days program in Corpus Christi on May 24. Plans call for the Band and Belles to arrive there on Friday night and appear in the Saturday parade.

The students will enjoy a beach outing before returning home, Mr. Jones added.

THIS WAR IS NOTHING NEW

We are at war. This was my first response to the news about the U.S. retaliation against Libya. The news came over my car radio as I drove home from The Eastland Telegram Monday afternoon.

Around Eastland everything looked about the same. There was the usual afternoon rush, even at 5:30 p.m. People were stopping by the stores or restaurants for something extra for supper. But whether they realized it or not, we were at war - just as we have been for a long time.

Americans don't like war, I thought. They like to live in peace and have a good time, and will do almost anything to avoid war.

Anything, that is, except to pay too much in taxes, give up personal liberty, or be insulted everywhere around the earth.

As I drove out of town across the quiet countryside, memories of another war flooded upon me. How we of World War II had hoped to spare future generations anything like what was happened! What had become of our "brave new world" - that secure and perfect place we had hoped to wrap around our children?

It was in shambles. But actually it was not, for things were really little different from what they had been during the whole history of man.

The problem was that my generation had not understood the true nature of man, or the world and its destiny.

We were taught to cast aside old beliefs and values - to rely on science and technology. We were taught that man had the

power within himself to be good, and the world was going to grow better and better. Someday we might even conquer space and death.

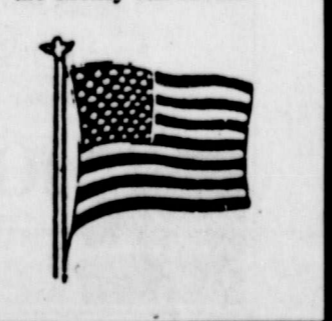
I had been able to buy that philosophy for a long time. But now I couldn't believe it any more.

Our country would have to defend itself - I would go for that. Most people would, for we had grown tired of appeasement. The nations of Europe, vulnerable as they were, would probably not support us. In any crisis, America usually has to carry the ball alone.

But now, at least, we could be realistic. And to be realistic, we must turn to our only real strength - the supernatural strength of the God who created man. Should this make us gloomy, filled with dark thoughts? On the contrary, this sort of realism should give us cause for optimism - and a chance to really enjoy life in the midst of whatever came upon us.

So Christ is the answer, I thought, just as He has always been. The teachings of Christ are the only answer, both in this world and the world to come.

We must walk forward in faith, believing that in His wisdom God will guide us in our personal, public and national life. And with that guidance will come protection against any sort of terror the enemy can mount.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

April is Cancer Awareness month with an emphasis on nutrition, diet and cancer. The second leading cause of death in the United States today is cancer. The development of cancer is influenced by lifestyle genetics, cultural patterns, health status, exposure to specific cancer producing substances and other unknown factors. The direct cause and effect relationship between diet and cancer in humans is not known.

Good nutrition for the person with cancer is especially important. A well nourished body is better able to hold up to the stress of cancer and its various treatments. A cancer patient who is well nourished can tolerate large doses of various drugs more readily and the recovery rate from surgery is faster.

Cancer patients who eat a well-balanced diet based on the basic food groupings are able to maintain strength, can prevent body tissues destroyed by the treatments and have better resistance to infections.

Many cancer patients suffer severe weight loss and wasting of body tissues because they fail to eat as much food as the body needs because they may have lost the appetite or suffer from depression which often accompanies the diagnosis of cancer. Failing to eat causes the body to use its stored fat, protein and other nutrients such as minerals and vitamins.

Maintaining body weight and controlling the symptoms which interfere with eating are two main goals in cancer therapy as it relates to nutrition. Protein and calorie needs are greater during illness, treatment and recovery. When weight is maintained, then this is one indication that enough calories are being eaten. Protein needs are more rigid than calorie needs. The daily

protein and calories for healthy men are 2,700 calories and 56 grams of protein. During illness, 90 grams of protein are needed by men. Healthy women need 2000 calories and 45 grams of protein. During illness women need 80 grams of protein and both men and women need 200 to 300 extra calories.

Increase calories in the diet by eating foods that contain more calories in less amounts such as the fat foods - butter, sour cream, mayonnaise, whipped cream and peanut butter. Fat has a high satiety value and provides 1 1/2 times more calories than protein or carbohydrate foods. Other foods to use to increase calories would be concentrated sweets such as hard candies, marshmallows with hot chocolate, crackers and jellies.

The best way to maintain a well-balanced diet is by selecting foods from the

basic food groupings. By eating a variety of foods from the main food groupings - fruit-vegetable, bread-cereal, milk, and meat groups plus adding enough servings from the other group to help maintain normal weight, you will have all the vitamins, minerals, proteins and other nutrients your body needs.

There is not enough research to support that large doses of certain vitamins or minerals, or that reduced amounts of any nutrient or removal of any food in the diet will prevent cancer or be helpful in the treatment. Yet, food faddism or misinformation as it relates to cancer therapy is rampant.

Eating a balanced diet daily is the best thing you can do nutritionally. Remember to maintain good nutrition by studying only recommended resource materials needed to good nutrition and cancer.

Drilling Bits

In the Reb Field, the No. 1 Parsons pumped two barrels of oil and 50,000 CF gas per day. Drillsite is five miles northwest of Ranger in Eastland County's Elizabeth Finley Survey, A-199. The operator took the hole to a 3,548-ft. bottom and production will be from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,020 to 3,042 feet into the hole.
Oil tested at 40-gravity for the three wells.
The No. 1 Perrin, a 3,700-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Eastland County, Meridian Reserve of Fort Worth is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 221-acre lease five miles northwest of Desdemona in the T.A. Howell Survey, A-152.

An unsuccessful developmental venture in the Ranger Field, Eastland County, has been written off as a dry hole by Sun Exploration & Production Co. Located one mile southwest of Ranger, the well was drilled to a total depth of 3,860 feet. The No.-4 C. J. Keathley "A" will be plugged and abandoned.
The No. 252 North Central Ranger Unit has been finalized by Sun. It is a development well in the Ranger Field, two miles southwest of Ranger. Drillsite is in Eastland County's John York Survey, A-557.
Daily potential of one barrels 40.2-gravity oil was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 3,734-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations in the McCleskey Formation, 3,450 to 3,461 feet into the wellbore.
Two new producers have been brought on line in Eastland County with Sol Edad as the operator. Located one mile northeast of Scranton, the wells are in the H&TC Survey, A-489. Both wells are situated in the Eastland Regular Field.
On a 20/64-inch choke, the No. 1-A Childers "A" flowed 66,000 CF gas per day. It was rated at 82,000 CF/D on absolute open flow. Tubing pressure registered 37 PSI. The well bottomed at 600 feet and was plugged back to 370 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Flippen Formation, 306 to 316 feet into the hole.
The No. 2-A Childers "A" indicated ability to flow 76,000 CF gas per day on a 20/64-inch choke. Tubing pressure came in at 37 PSI. It was rated at 100,000 CF/D on absolute open flow. The well was taken to 50-ft. bottom and plugged back to 370 feet. It will from a set of perforations in the Flippen Formation, 307 to 315 feet into the wellbore.
Two new producers have been brought on line in Eastland County with Snow Oil/TX as the operator.
The No. 2 Clark, located two miles north of Eastland in the H&TC Survey, A-300, Eastland County's Reb Field, pumped 28 barrel oil per day. It was drilled to a total depth of 3,924 feet and will produce from a set of perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,428 to 3,488 feet into the hole.
The No. 1 Nance, located in the Lake Leon Field, four miles east of Eastland in the S.J. Robinson Survey, A-423, pumped five barrels oil daily. Bottomhole was 3,715 feet. Production will be from a perforated interval in the Duffer Formation, 3,604 to 3,614 feet into the wellbore.

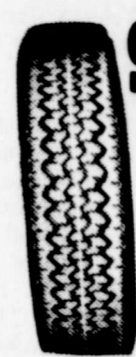

I also remember Mama's vocal displeasure one time when Papa used one of her washtubs to hold the water to temper the cultivator points he was working on. The smithy tub had spring a leak—well, if you did much plowing in those days, you kept your own horses and mules

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

Area anglers attended an excellent tournament on Hubbard Creek April 6th which drew 168 entries. Tommy Maynard finished 9th in the competition with 3 fish weighing 8.26 pounds. Tommy also had the tournaments third largest bass which weighed in at 5.54 pounds. Also attending and placing were Bobby Rains of Cisco, Butch Willingham, and Terry Wilson.

We were very pleased to see such good healthy fish caught on Hubbard during this event, perhaps we are finally entering the upside of the lakes cycle and it looks good for the possibility of having some big ole bass weighed in during the KEAN

BIG BASS CLASSIC this year folks, maybe even in the 7 pound range.

After examination by Texas Parks and Wildlife biologist Bill Harvey, tissue samples of Earl Crawford huge 16 pound, 14 1/2 ounce state record showed this fish to be a pure Florida bass. Mr. Harvey said two separate examinations using electrophoretic techniques were performed to obtain this positive I.D.

Florida strain bass, which generally grow to larger sizes than northern fish, have been stocked in some Texas reservoirs since the early 1970s. Harvey pointed out that many of the 12 pound-plus bass caught in re-

cent years in Texas were intergrades, or hybrid crosses, between natives and Florida bass.

Lake reports are looking up. Brownwood bass good to 6 1/2 pounds on Rat L traps and worms, strippers fair to 8 pounds on CC shads, crappie fair to 1 1/4 pounds.

Houston County, water clear, 69 degrees, normal level, black bass good to 10 pounds on black lizards, striper slow, crappie slow.

Calaveras, water murky 67 degrees, 12 inches high, black bass good to 6 pounds

on plastic worms, and crankbaits.

Ft. Phantom Hill, water murky, 64 degrees, 5 feet low, black bass fair to 3 pounds on black and chartreuse worms, hybrid striper good to 7 pounds, crappie good to 25 fish per string on jigs and minnows.

Possom Kingdom, water clear 65 degrees, 4 feet low, black bass good to 8 pounds on dark worms. Crappie picking up to 25 fish per string.

Spence, water clear, 60 degrees 30 feet low, black bass good to 6 1/2 pounds on dark worms, striper good on live bait to 24 pounds.

Leon, bass good to 5 pounds on worms and spinners shallow, crappie slow in rivers, but large numbers coming from baited boat houses.

Proctor, bass good to 4

pounds on jig and eel, striper fair to 9 pounds on live bait.

Commissioners Discuss Roads, Fencing, & Financing Monday

Matters relating to roads and county financing were some of the major topics when the County Commissioners held meetings on Monday, April 14.

Present in the Commissioners Courtroom were Commissioners Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Bill Riddell, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4.

County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk Joanne Johnson recorded minutes. Various other county officials and citizens attended portions of the meetings.

Approval was granted to Christie Energy Company, represented by Gilbert Meredith, to cross County Rds. 485, 486 and 509 in Pct. 2 with a gas pipeline. Meredith explained that this would be a 2 1/2 in. gas line which would reach from the vicinity of the "blow out" well south of Ranger to north of Desdemona - about 10 miles.

R.B. Haun came before the Court to request the acceptance of a Resolution for the state to improve a 5 1/2 mile portion of a Farm-To-Market Rd. lying in Eastland and Comanche Counties east out of Gorman. This would bring the old Oliver Springs Cemetery Rd. into the Gorman area.

"It appears that everyone in this area is in favor of the road," Haun said.

The Commissioners gave the project their approval.

Also approved was a request from Frances Bond to have an abandoned roadway returned to the three owners. This is in Section 30, Block 2, in Puntkin Center on the east side of Highway 6.

Fees for civil process by the Sheriff's Department were reviewed, and increased slightly. They will be

placed on a sliding scale, starting at 10 percent, and cut as the amount of the sale goes up. This is patterned after a method used in Parker County.

Bill Riddell, Comm. of Pct. 2, requested permission to delegate extra responsibility to one of his employees. This

person, Bobby L. Boles, would take care of locked doors and other jobs around the Precinct Barn in Ranger. His salary would be increased \$50 per month. The Commissioners approved the plan.

The afternoon session of the Court included bills,

claims and accounts, one of which was a problem with payment for fencing a Farm-To-Market Road in Pct. 3. Checks to fencing contractor George Fox included the names of property owners, two of whom refused to endorse their checks to Fox. Commissioners voted to stop payment on a \$1,760 check and make a new one to Fox alone.

Another landowner, Larry Stewart, refused to endorse a \$325 check because he was

dissatisfied with the contractor's work. The Commissioners were advised that Stewart would meet with officials at the site and discuss the problem. Commissioner L.T. Owen and District Attorney Emory Walton made an appointment to meet and resolve the matter if possible.

As the Commissioners Court meeting ended, Bill Hart, who is representing the County on two litigations, met to discuss these lawsuits with the Commissioners.
