## Primary Runoff To Be June 7

A second primary runoff on Saturday, June 7, will be necessary to elect a county commissioner and a justice of the peace for the Cisco area after the results of the first primary last Saturday were tallied. Runoffs also will be necessary for the county treasurer's office as well as in commissioner and justice of the peace offices in Precinct 2.

A total of 1,034 ballots were cast at the Corral Room of the Laguna Hotel.

In the Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace race, Incumbent J.V. Heyser was the leader with 505 votes, followed by Bruce Speegle with 315 and Willard L. Johnson with 219. Heyser and Speegle will be in a runoff.

Danny Claborn received 375 votes to be the top man in the Precinct 4 County Commissioner's race, followed closely by Billy Bacon, Jr., with 349 votes. Other received votes as follows: Reggie Pittman 171, Billy Cozart 94, and Harold N. Pippen 63. The runoff will be between Claborn and Bacon.

In the County Treasurer's race, Ruth Puglise of Cisco was the leader with 1,642

votes. Second and her runoff opponent was Betty Cross of Eastland with 1,312 votes. Rita Reid Byrd, the third candidate, had 854 votes.

## Primaries Re-Elect Walton, Rowch-Brown, Johnson Run-Off June 7

Emory Walton was re-elected as Eastland County Criminal District Attorney over challenger Leslie Vance with 1,948 votes to Vance's 1,810 votes for a difference of 138 votes.

Mary Jane Rowch-Brown will remain as the District Clerk for Eastland County with her win over Dorothy Pyke. Mrs. Brown had a total of 1,941 votes while Mrs. Pyke had 1,749 for a difference of 192 votes.

Eastland County Clerk Joanne Johnson won over her challenger with 2,087 votes. Her challenger, Sherry Staggs Johnson had

1,706 votes for a difference of 381.

Several runoffs resulted from the Saturday primaries in the county. A run-off for Eastland County Treasurer between Ruth Puglise who had 1,642 votes and Betty Cross with 1,312 votes; for County Commissioner Precinct 2 Norman Christian with 574 votes and Roy Thackerson with 229; Justice of the Peace Precinct 2 Alford Bush with 323 votes and Donna Justice with 306 votes.

In Precinct 4 run-offs, for County Commissioner are Danny Claborn had 375 votes

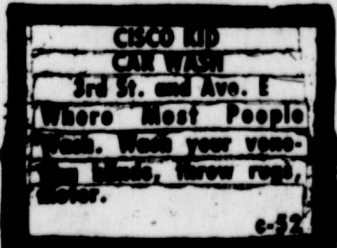

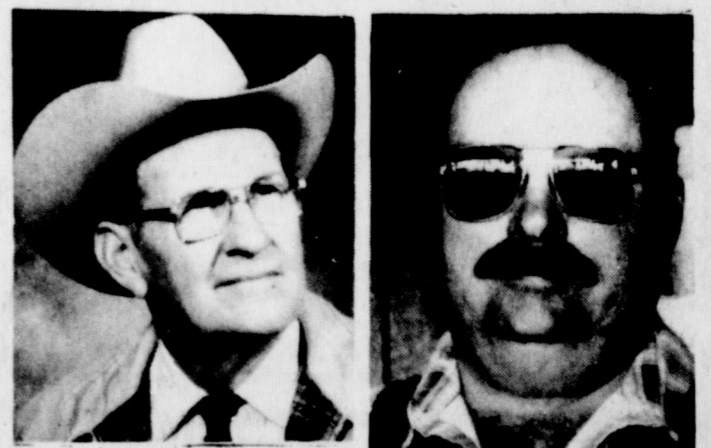

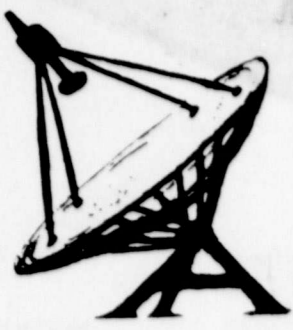

## 4-H NEWS

**EASTLAND**  
The Eastland Police Department is beginning a Safe Home and Neighborhood Crime Watch Program for the town. The Safe Home Program is to provide a place for children to go if they are in need of help. Registered Safe Homes will be thoroughly checked by the Police Department to insure the child's safety. The idea of the Neighborhood Crime Watch is for each person on the block to help watch for suspicious activities. The Police will lead out with this organization, and overwhelming support in the community is expected.

The Eastland County Extension Clubs have begun the work of constructing the 30x50 ft. Texas flag. Kerry Sanders and Tony Boreno of Tri-Tex Manufacturing Co. are furnishing all the material. The star will measure approx. 10 ft. around, according to Dorothy Underwood, Extension Leaders, who is planning the model to scale. The actual work will be done in the Courthouse lobby.

There are a number of events around Eastland celebrating the 63rd annual National Music Week May 4-11. The Eastland Music Club sponsored a poster contest about National Music Week in Siebert Elementary School, and around 90 children entered. These posters are now on display in Eastland Memorial Library and the two Nursing Homes. A Band Demonstration at the High School on May 6, radio programs, and musical programs in the Nursing Homes are some of the other highlights of the week.

The West Texas District Campmeeting will be held May 16-18 at Camp Inspiration in Eastland. Dr. Leroy Oesch will be camp evangelist and Rev. S. Lynn Higgins will be music evangelist. # Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Your paper has run a number of stories reflecting dramatic changes in our health care system.

What's often missing from health coverage is practical information about what patients can do to assure they get the care they need. Your readers should know about a new booklet available free from the American Association of Retired Persons called "Knowing Your Rights." This booklet describes important changes in the way Medicare pays hospitals for services. It also outlines specific steps Medicare beneficiaries can take to control their personal health costs and still get quality care.

We continue hearing reports of patients being discharged from the hospital

too soon, for example, the booklet provides the following information.

1) Medicare's fixed-price payment does not dictate the number of days you are hospitalized. If you are told before you believe it is medically appropriate, you should contact the doctor and, if necessary, the Preer Review Organization (PRO) which is responsible for ensuring that Medicare patients receive quality care.

2) If your hospital determines that you no longer require hospitalization and it obtains the agreement of either your attending physician or the PRO, it must issue a written notice advising you that Medicare coverage of hospital services will end.

3) You have the right to a

review of the notice by the PRO. Your request to the PRO may be made by telephone or in writing, preferably both, and as soon as possible.

4) You have the right to be informed in writing of the PRO's decision within three working days of its receipt of your request for a review.

5) If the PRO decides in favor of the hospital, you become liable for hospital charges beginning the 3rd calendar day after you receive the hospital's notice.

I urge Medicare beneficiaries, their families and friends to order a free copy of this new booklet from AARP Fulfillment, Stock #D12330, 1909 K Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20049.

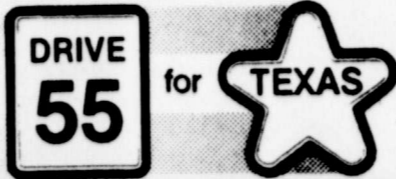

This negative response does not go back to childhood as I remember very well the happy welcome "the Watkins man" received when he showed up on his horse-and buggy rounds. It was years before I knew there was another brand of vanilla. By that time, the Watkins man traveled in a Model T and was not quite as willing to swap his fragrant wares for chickens, eggs, potatoes or what-have-you. Through the years I have met at my front door, among

others, Fuller Brush men, Jewel Tea Co. salesmen and Avon ladies. An aluminum siding salesman embarrassed both of us by launching at once into a fervent pitch for his company's product. Our house already had siding; aluminum siding. A pair of Mormon missionaries got an invitation to come inside one miserably hot afternoon as I had recently read the book of Mormon and I wanted to ask some questions. They kept telling me what they thought I should hear instead of what I wanted to know. But they appreciated the cold water I gave them to drink, if not

what I threw on their earent efforts of missionary-ing. My patience was long gone by the time a lady came by with some Watchtower tracts from Jehovah's Witnesses, I think. I wasn't even unlatching the screen by then, and why I went to the door, I don't know. I thought I was polite when I told her that I appreciated her acting on her convictions but I wasn't interested in hearing why I should change mine. That really ticked her off! She let go a real tirade on, of all things, my lack of respect for this "great democracy" in which we lived. I will take oath that I did

not mean to make her angry, but I thought she was going to have a stroke when I interrupted her to agree that I didn't appreciate our great democracy because we live in a republic -- not a democracy. "The devil made me do it," I suppose, but I was working up a pretty good tirade of my own when she wheeled around and turned to go to her car. I wound up with the advice to her retreating back to read her dictionary as well as her Bible! Or is it only addressed in different terms?

## Bob Bullock Sends Mixed Drink Tax Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$11.7 million to the 220 counties and 423 cities as their share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during the first quarter of 1986. Eastland County total tax revenue was \$13,910.01, and the county received 12.5% remittance - \$1,738.75. The City of Eastland had a total tax revenue of \$1,964.27 and received \$245.53. Ranger had a total tax revenue of \$4,740.25, and received a check for \$592.53. Bullock said the state collected \$48.9 million in mixed drink taxes for the first quarter, compared to \$48.7 million collected during the same period in 1985.

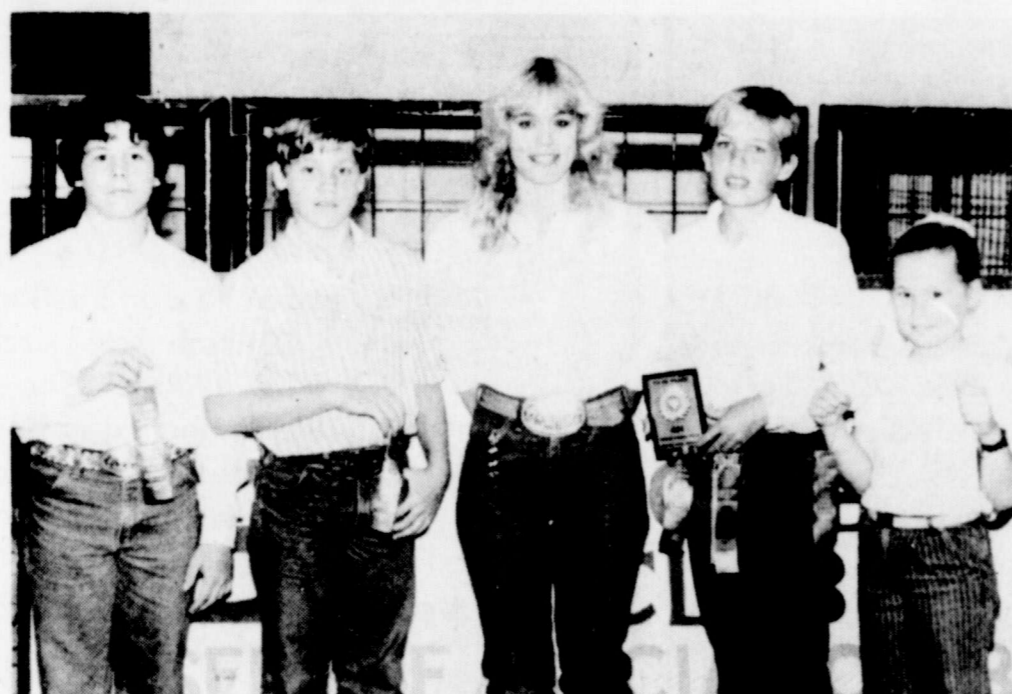

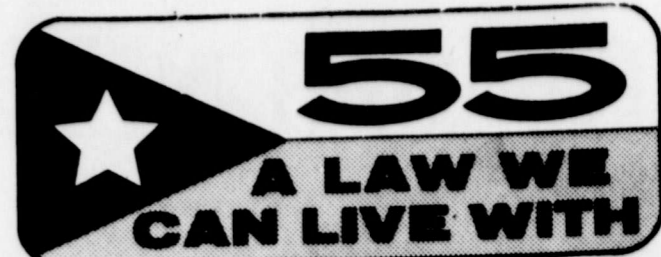

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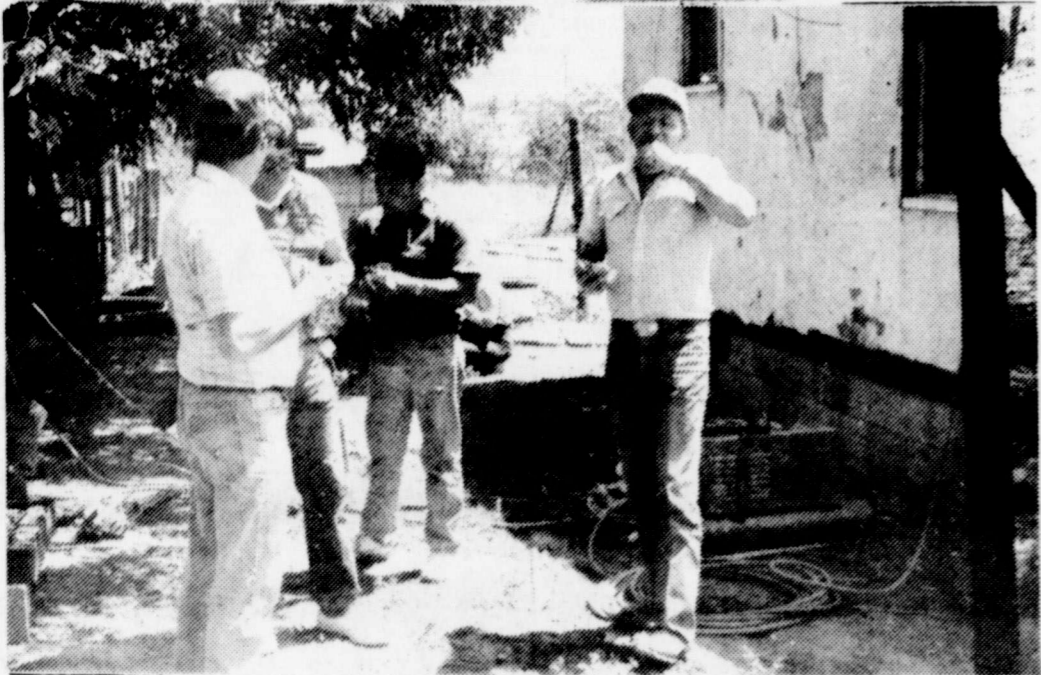

## Allergy Sufferers Battle Unseen Enemies

For some of us, allergies mean coping with the sniffles a few months each year. Some non-electronic models have up to 78 square feet of filtering surface trapping even microscopic particles passing through them.

electronic and non-electronic models on these points:

**Cost of Operation**  
A non-electronic air cleaner needs no electricity so there are no installation costs for wiring and no operating costs. Unlike electronic units, non-electronic units have no component parts subject to mechanical failure. No service is ever required.

**Maintenance**  
The only maintenance required for non-electronic air cleaners is replacing the high efficiency cleaning filter once a year. It's a simple, 10 minute job.

With electronic air cleaners, the thin metal strips must be washed every two months or so. Otherwise, they become so loaded with particles they become less effective at filtering the air.

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## Old Davis Homestead Is Site Of Celebration

Thirteen guests honored Cleo Carlisle Davis at a birthday dinner at the "Old Davis Homestead", March 19, 1986. Kathryn Schmidt of Dripping Springs, Texas served as hostess. Others attending were Samuel A. Davis, Ella Davis, Venita Smith, Kent Davis, Pam Duncan, Ryan Duncan, Sunshine Duncan, Heather Duncan, April Duncan, Melissa Davis and Brenda Davis of Bedford, Texas.

The impressive three tier floral garden cake was designed and catered by Nancy Trout of Eastland. After the traditional blowing out of the candles, Cleo (in her usual dry sense of humor) said "75 is half again better than 37. I have many memories of those years, however, my fondest memories are of my

horse back. Sunday School and Church started at 10:00 o'clock at Corinth and then at 2:00 p.m. we would walk to the Bedford Methodist Church for Sunday School and Church just a few hundred yards across from our house. Most of all I loved revival time that would begin in June. All baptisms were in a tank belonging to Thomas and Elizabeth Evans. I remember how everyone including the preacher would be waist deep in the muddy tank water waiting to be baptized. Bedford Methodist church would have their revival in the brush arbor. Everyone would rejoice and praise the Lord for all the bountiful blessings God had so richly rewarded and provided for us in our every day life."

"Summer was also a very

childhood on the farm with my mother and dad."

"Dad and mother moved to Eastland County, Texas, when I was about one year old and bought 80 acres in the Bedford Community where I spent 18 happy years. There was never a dull moment in our house of 10 over active children. Some how I was wedged in as the sixth child which had many advantages as well as disadvantages. Being the sixth child never bothered me - I was too happy being the daughter of a proud farmer."

"My mother was a tall, thin, sober, quiet, peaceful woman. I remember her always being happy. She made all our dresses and some of the boys shirts. Some days she would sew all day long on an old pedal sewing machine and hum beautiful songs as she sewed. She was never too busy with her sewing and household chores to remind us of our duties: feed the chickens; bring in the big basket of eggs; feed and milk the cows and bring in the stove wood all before twilight came. I never really liked going to town for the material for our dresses and shoes because it took all day in the wagon. I would rather stay home and play games like Hide and Go Seek, rook the hoop, leap frog, Tom Walker or go squirrel hunting with our dog Flint."

"Saturday was mama's wash day. The big black pots were close to the wood pile and many gallons of water were carried bucket by bucket up the hill from the well on Lake Leon river. It also took lots of wood to get the water boiling hot the way mama wanted it before she shaved off the lye soap in the pots of water. We rubbed the colored clothes on the rub board so they wouldn't fade and everything was rinsed twice with Mrs. Stewart's bluing. Then we would hang the clothes on the line to dry and bring them in to iron with four flat irons that were heating on the wood cook stove. Mama had a covered board that was placed across two cane chair backs that served as an ironing board. We wrapped rags around the hot handles of the irons so we could hold it to iron the clothes. When that iron would cool off I would get another iron. This process was repeated til the wash day and ironing was done."

"Sunday was a very special day for me. We would all go to Corinth Baptist Church in the morning in the wagon. Mother and Dad in the spring seat, Ella Merhea, Edward, Edwin and I sat on a quilt in the floor of the wagon. Roxie, Lenord and Reighnie sat in the back of the wagon with their feet hanging out. Joe, my oldest brother, would come later on

busy season on the farm with hoeing cotton, hand cutting and shocking maize - then hauling the shocks to the stack lot. The can was mowed, raked in wind rows to go on the wagon with pitch forks. Also, to be taken to the stack lot for winter feeding for the animals. Corn was gathered by pulling the ears off the stalk and throwing the ears into the wagon. Mama and Dad had it all figured out how to manage the most efficient labor from us. The older children would gather the rows on each side of the wagon while the younger ones would gather the "knocked down rows" by the wagon tongue. The mules would walk in the middle with the wagon straddling one row. We would shell the corn and Dad would take it to a Miller in Cisco to be ground into corn meal. As I have mentioned many times we were always happy; but a much happier time was when the KATY T&P train whistle blew at 11:30 - we knew it was time to head for the house because mama would have dinner on the table at 12:00 o'clock and we had feed and water the mules before we could eat our cornbread, butter, beans, fried chicken, plenty of milk, greens and green onions."

"I was seven years old when I started to school. Bedford was a red two room school house 2 1/2 or 3 miles to and from home. Sometimes we would be caught in a snow storm or rain which was okay with me because I loved school. I was so timid I would walk close to Reighnie for a few days until I made friends with my new

playmates. The school bell would ring at 9 o'clock; we would have five minutes to get a drink of water from a dipper in a bucket, get in line and on the second ring walk quietly to our seats. We did not have books until I was in the fifth grade when Texas started purchasing books for schools. Before we had books our wonderful teacher would teach us reading, spelling and arithmetic. On Fridays the older children had spelling matches and the younger ones had story telling. After school it was back home to do the chores before supper time."

"The real job for all of us kids came in the fall at cotton picking time. Our cotton sack was measured according to our size. Dad was the 'clean picker'. His cotton sack was always emptied in the back of the wagon. He used knee pads and walked on his knees. The rest of us 'goosed picked' - cotton that was left in the burrs. Cotton was our major cash crop. We were always overjoyed when we finished up with 1600 pounds - we knew this would make a 500 pound bale of cotton. In the fall there wasn't much time for play with cotton picking, corn to be brought in to the corn crib, and to be put in stacks. The first blue norther was hog killing time, ham to cure, sausage to grind, bacon to cure and lye soap to make. Mama raised turkeys for the fall sale to supplement our cash crop and there were always turkeys left for our Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners."

"Christmas must have been the supreme happy time in our life on the farm with cake, pie and pudding

baking. Mama and my older sisters baked the pies, cakes, candy and pudding while the younger ones did the popcorn balls. Christmas was not only a happy time at our house but for the whole Bedford Community. We had Christmas trees and programs at school and Church. We always failed to stay awake on Christmas Eve to see Santa and his reindeer. We would awake to Christmas day with stockings for everyone filled with one toy, lots of oranges and stick candy. After Dad gave thanks to the Lord for the big Christmas dinner, turkey with all the trimmings - mother was ready to carve - watching our happy faces with great anticipation."

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## Who Was Eastland?



### Part 5

As the 1830's ushered to an end, Captain William Eastland continued to serve on Indian forays, receiving a wound to his nose by an arrow in 1839.

It must be remembered that Santa Anna had signed a treaty after the battle of San Jacinto in which he promised to withdraw Mexican troops south of the Rio Grande and out of Texas.

However, there was one major problem. The Mexican Congress did not ratify the treaty. They signified instead that the Mexican military would return and subdue the Texans.

In 1842, this threat almost became a reality. On March 5, 1842, Rafael Vasquez occupied San Antonio with five to seven hundred men. The Texans, not being strong enough to hold the town,

evacuated without a fight when Vasquez demanded its surrender.

He took San Antonio, raised the Mexican flag, and declared Mexican laws in force. However, he departed two days later.

Historians have regarded this invasion as nothing more than a plundering party.

In September of 1842, General Adrian Woll, a French soldier of fortune in the employ of the Mexican Army, again captured San Antonio.

Texan runners were dispatched for help.

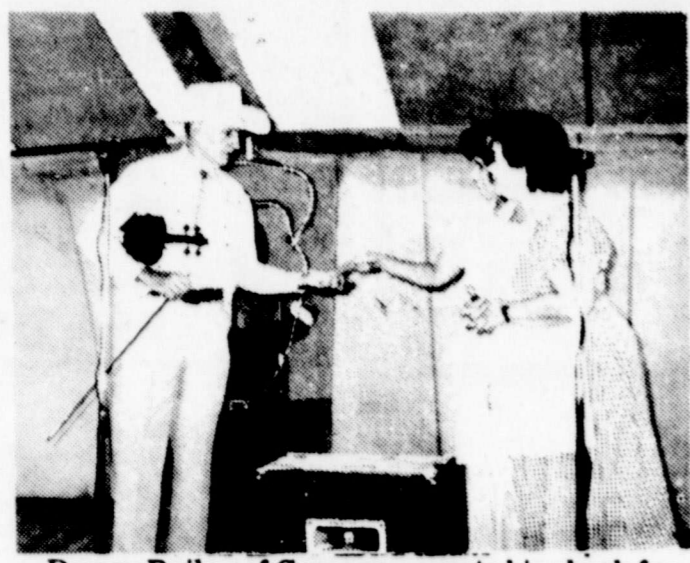

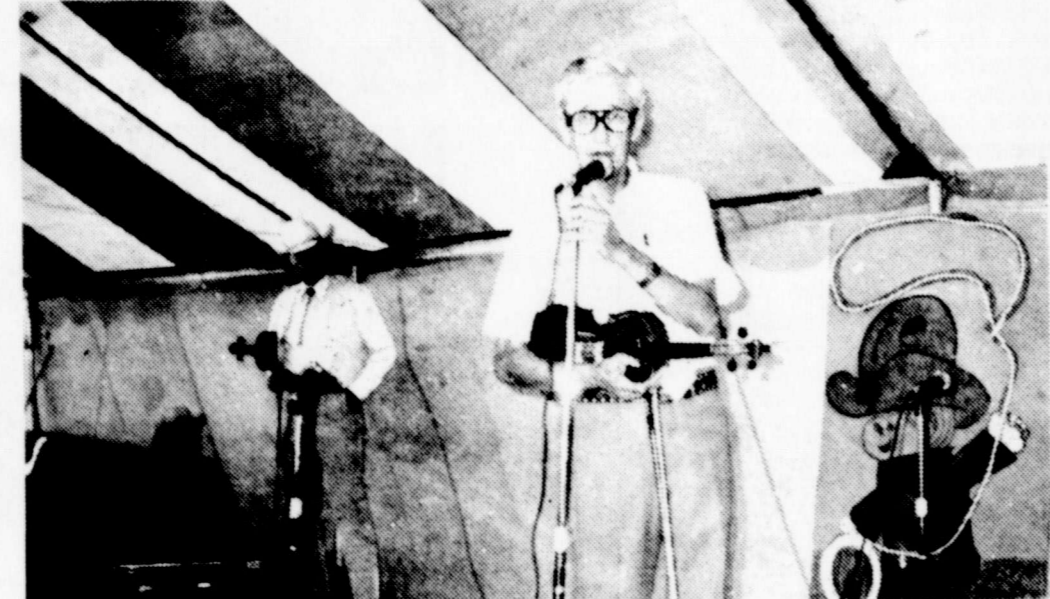
Contestants from Midland, Ranger, Abilene, Rule and Borger played for the title in the "Under 60" Division.

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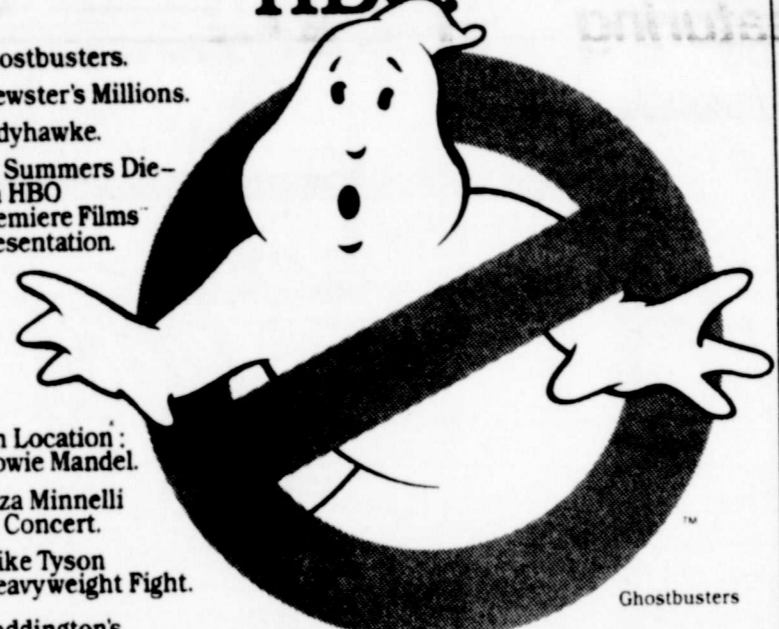

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## Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



**Low birth weight** is the leading killer of babies in the United States—accounting for about half of all infant deaths.

Newborn babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds are 40 times more likely to die during their first month of life than larger infants.

Underweight babies that do survive are 10 times more likely than others to suffer mental retardation, which could require long-term institutional care. They also are at much higher risk of birth defects, motor skills impairments, cerebral palsy, seizure disorders and respiratory problems.

Regular medical checkups during pregnancy allow doctors time to avoid problems that could result in babies being born prematurely or underweight.

Studies show that among low-income mothers, prenatal care can prevent 26 percent of infant deaths, reduce premature births by 20 percent, and sharply curtail life-long impairments such as mental retardation.

**Government programs** that provide medical care during a pregnancy cost \$400 to \$500 for each woman. That's a modest sum compared to the \$25,000 it can cost to keep one newborn in an intensive care unit for 20 days, the average stay for an underweight baby. And it's a drop in the bucket compared to institutional care for a mentally retarded child for one year, which can cost \$25,000 to \$100,000 depending on the level of care.

That makes regular medical care during pregnancy a wise investment of time for an expectant mother—and a wise course for our government to encourage.

A study by the National Academy of Sciences shows that each dollar spent on medical checkups for pregnant women saves \$3.38 in medical care for their babies during the first year of life—and this is a low estimate. Other studies have shown savings ranging up to \$12 for each dollar spent on prenatal care.

Medicaid paid for one-fourth of the \$2.6 billion spent in 1980 on hospital care for underweight babies during their first year, according to a study by the Department of Health and Human Services.

So spending Medicaid money on prenatal care becomes a cost-saving measure that also avoids needless suffering.

But until now, Medicaid statutes required that the same package of services be provided to all Medicaid patients. No distinctions were made for special types of patients, such as pregnant women.

**Because of this**, many states limited the number of physician and hospital visits during a pregnancy and did not make available such important services as nutritional counseling and vitamins.

The 1985 Budget Reconciliation bill, recently signed into law, contains a provision I authored that allows states to provide full prenatal care to pregnant women through the Medicaid program.

Last year, I also succeeded in closing a loophole that had denied any medical care for women—otherwise qualified for Medicaid coverage—who were pregnant for the first time.

It's high time we encouraged more vigorous intervention by the Medicaid program to reduce the incidence of underweight and premature births, rather than continuing to spend an unnecessarily large part of our limited resources on high-cost intensive and institutional care.

Prenatal care is a sound investment that not only saves the government money, but lessens the toll of suffering that can result when a baby is born too small to thrive—or even survive.

In addition, our state law defines a lottery as "any scheme or procedure whereby one or more prizes are distributed by chance among persons who have paid or promised consideration for a chance to win anything of value, whether such scheme or procedure is called a pool, lottery, raffle, gift, enterprise, sale, policy game, or some other name."

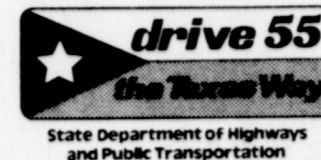
### WHEN BINGO IS LEGAL

Any lottery is illegal, even if conducted for charitable purposes. On the other hand, regular bingo games may be legal if conducted for charitable purposes and in accordance with the Bingo Enabling Act, Article 179d, V.A.T.S. This lengthy and complex law allows bingo to be played for money on a limited basis by organizations registered to do so with the Comptroller of Public Accounts. It is not illegal to play bingo at home for amusement if entry fees and prizes are "nominal" and there

are no more than 15 players. Nursing home and retirement home residents may also play bingo for fun if fees and prizes are nominal. If you wish to set up a charity bingo game, you should contact a lawyer in your area.

### IT'S A BAD BET, ANYWAY

If you have spent money on a mail bingo game or other type of lottery, your chances of winning are extremely small. However, your chances of receiving more entry blanks in the mail are great. Next time you get one of these entry blanks, and the accompanying letter requests you send in money, the best place to file that entry blank is with the trash.

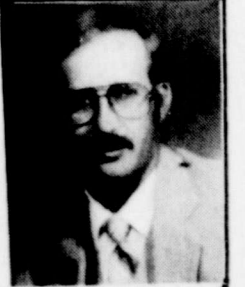

## "Skill-Bingo" by Mail Is Illegal in Texas

You may have recently been offered a chance to win a new Cadillac simply by playing a so-called "Skill-Bingo" game through the mail. It's easy and the official entry blank only requires that you send in one dollar in order to play. But if you read the fine print, you learn that there are several "playoffs" after the initial entry. What you don't learn is that you could spend at least \$75 getting to the final game—and that the final game is so difficult that the vast majority of entries are wrong.

The California company mailing out this promotion claims that it is not illegal. While that may be true under California law, it is not true under Texas law. Whenever you are asked to pay money to enter a contest, you should be suspicious.

### WHAT THE LAW SAYS

Under our state's penal code, a bet is an agreement that a person will win or lose something of value, dependent on chance, even though accom-
