## County Commissioners Meeting - Bills And Roads

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting on Monday, May 12, in the Commissioners Courtroom. Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1; Bill Riddell, Pct. 2; L.T. Owen, Pct. 3; and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk Joann Johnson recorded the minutes.

One of the first items of business was a request by Tex Evans, Justice of the Peace in Rising Star, for air conditioning in his office. The Commissioners agreed that it looked like a long, hot summer coming up, so an air conditioner would be obtained.

There was some discussion concerning gas and pipeline crossings under county roads, and the difficulties which could arise.

An incident of last weekend was mentioned, in which a country road about six miles S.E. of Cisco caved in where a pipeline had been repaired a few months ago.

This happened after a 2-inch rain in the vicinity. It was reported that a mailman's car fell into the hole, but fortunately he was not going fast at that time. Commissioner Dill said that this bad place in the road had been repaired so that it is now passable. Warning flags are also up.

The Commissioners mentioned a number of pieces of surplus county equipment soon to be offered for sale to the public. The equipment will be itemized and advertised in the newspapers for bids.

As the Commissioners began consideration of bills, claims and accounts, Sheriff Don Underwood brought a certain bill to their attention which had been sent to his department.

He said that it was from Patterson Ambulance for \$1844.60, reportedly for transporting sick prisoners from the jail to Eastland Memorial Hospital. The bills reached from Jan. 20, 1985 to the present.

"We carry inmates in cars to the hospital unless it looks like they are so critically ill that they might need the equipment in an ambulance," the Sheriff said. He indicated that he thought ambulance service to the jail was supposed to be covered.

Several of the Commissioners stated that they thought the county was paying for three memberships in the Ambulance Service, and these would not expire until July of this year. They mentioned plans to look into the matter further before making a decision on the payment of these bills. The meeting concluded around noon.

# Spotlights & Sidelights

FIGURES DON'T LIE!  
IS THAT SO?

Figures on results of the teachers' competency test keep dribbling in—though the dribbling is hardly up to that on a basketball court.

The subject is like a kid with a scab—just has to be picked at until it is raw and bleeding again.

Instead of the predicted ten percent of teachers failing, only 3.3 percent came out below C-level.

Reports say 96.7 percent passed, but they do not give you the 3.3 percent figure for failure. Nope. "There were 6,579 teachers who failed the test," says the Associated Press report that is tucked away between "Death Notices" and an ad for ceiling fans.

No total number of those taking the test is given. If you want the total, divide 6,579 by 3.3 and multiply by a hundred. At least, that's according to the math I learned by competency tests inflicted upon me by Teacher Mattabel Downing in Moran Grammar School (I never got to go to an "elementary" school) and Papa C.C. Ballard at home.

Associated Press couldn't go with the percentages...had to switch to figures to make a better story, no doubt.

Well, 6,579 definitely has a larger ring than 3.3 percent, even if 3.3 is percentage. Seems as if I recall Mattabel issuing the unquestioned (by me, anyway) edict that one cannot add apples, oranges,

and bananas! However, I believe it is done now, and the answer is "Fruit Salad." 3.3 percent is not a large percentage. I agree, it is too much, as we put teachers down at the same time, expect them to be 'way UP in the knowledge bracket. But aren't percentages relative to something else?

One millionth of one tenth of one percent is too much error when you are talking about chances of failure for Challenger 7 of the nuclear plant at Chernobyl—or Glen Rose. But wouldn't you have a handsome increase in your paycheck if you got to keep 96.7 percent of every dollar you earn?

In the progression from Kindergarten to graduation (we won't count pre-school), a child will have a guesstimated 200 teachers. Add teachers for gymnastics, ballet, piano, voice, strings, swimming, tennis, baseball, et cetera, and the figure may be closer to 300. We'll use 200 for a base figure, anyway. That means that 6.6 people—all right, 7, if you don't want part of a person running around—7 people did not pass a reading/writing test with an arbitrary and fixed "Pass" point which may not be valid.

My personal opinion is that anyone is lucky if there are only 7 duds encountered in the educational process.

Yes, I do think teachers should be competent. I don't know any teacher who

doesn't agree.

I do think reports should be carefully evaluated by the readers as the A.P. breaks down the failures into 6 percent Hispanic, 18.4 percent blacks and 1.1 percent whites. What is not clear is whether the 6 percent, 18.4 percent and 1.1 percent figures are of the total 100 percent number tested or of the 3.3 percent of the failures.

The manipulator of any given figures can paint any kind of statistical picture desired just as any argumentative theologian can prove/disprove any given premise with Biblical references.

Just as I resented for years having to report on the races represented by the students in my classrooms, I resent "Teachers" being reported as "White, Black, and Hispanic." What happened to "Other?" One of the best teachers I have known is Chinese.

And what about the Williams girl who married Gomez? She's listed as Hispanic now. And the Torres' daughter who married the Smith boy? What does a name prove.

What does a test score prove? "supercalifragilisticexpialidocious" prove—if I did?

Tests may break teachers, but they won't make one. To paraphrase G. Stein, A teacher is a teacher is a teacher is a teacher.

# Tornado Tips

Tip No. 2

People living in areas subject to frequent tornadoes should prepare some type of tornado shelter. A root-cellar makes an excellent tornado shelter and requires very little modification. Locate the tornado shelter near the residence but not so close that falling walls or debris could block the entrance. If there is a bank or rise in the ground nearby, a cellar might be dug into it to take advantage of the extra protection the bank or rise might provide.

The tornado shelter should not be connected to the house drain, cess pool, sewer, or gas pipes. Upon entering the shelter, leave the surface door open. The inside shelter door should be hinged to open inward so it will open even when debris blocks the entrance. The shelter need not be large but it should be large enough to provide storage for a lantern, shovel, pick, crow-bar, and other tools that might be needed for rescue work or to clear debris from the shelter entrance.

If a **TORNADO WATCH** is announced:

1. Listen to the radio for weather advisories. A battery-powered radio should be available in case electric power is lost.

2. Move loose objects indoors or tie them down.

If a **TORNADO WARNING** is announced:

Move to your tornado shelter immediately. Stay away from windows.

In **OFFICE BUILDINGS**, move to an interior hallway on a lower floor or go to the designated shelter area.

At **HOME**, go to the most protected and strongest part of the basement. If you have no basement, seek shelter at the lowest level in the center of the house, in a small room or closet, or under sturdy furniture.

While **SHOPPING**, seek shelter inside a solidly built building, not one with a wide free-span roof.

At **SCHOOL**, follow the school disaster plan. Stay away from auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other areas with wide, free-span

roofs. **STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS.**

In **OPEN COUNTRY**, move away from the tornado's path at right angles. If there is not enough time to move into a shelter or avoid the storm, lie flat in a ditch, ravine, culvert, or under a bridge. **DO NOT STAY IN YOUR CAR.**

In a **TRAILER, or MOBILE HOME**, move to a shelter area far enough away from the trailer to avoid being injured if it is overturned. All mobile homes should be tied down.

If you are in a thinly settled rural area and observe a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law-enforcement officer or National Weather Service Office-giving the type of storm and its location, intensity, and direction of movement. When you report, give your name and address. Write the telephone number of the office to which you will report with your other emergency telephone numbers.

## Cisco Senior Citizen Center Site For "Green Thumb" Worker's Program

Green Thumb workers and host agency sponsors from a multi-county area met Tuesday, May 6, 1986, at the Senior Citizens Center in Cisco, Texas.

The training seminar featured Judge Scott Bailey, who welcomed the group to Eastland County. Roy Cartee, who presented a film "Know Your Rights" and discussed hospitalization and Medicare; Department of Public Safety Representative Wendell Rehms,

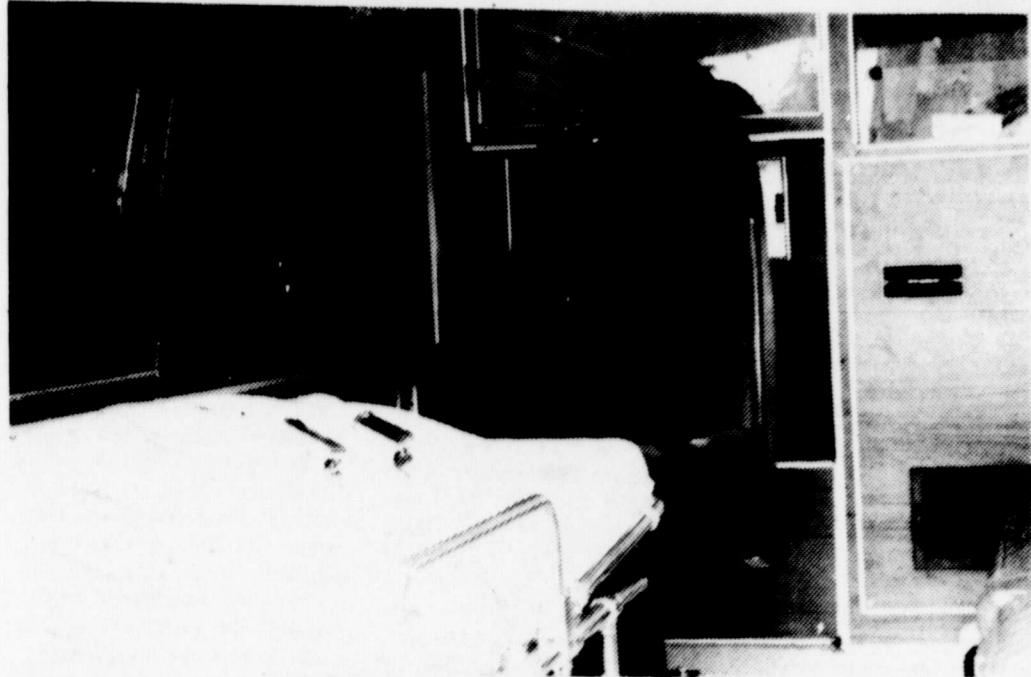
