This attitude might persuade a psychiarist that I need lots of expensive counseling, but I took care of

the matter years ago.

It was at a parade. The reason for this particular parade escapes me, but it was patriotic. I was one of the thousands of warm bodies lined along the sidewalk in WWII Washington waiting for FDR's limousine to appear on Pennsylvania Avenue.

In due course, it did appear and FDR, or a reasonable facsimile was in it.

But it did not show up before I was pushed around, my feet were stepped on—I suggest steel-toed safety boots to a dedicated crowd participant—and I heard spurts of language that would have sent my grandmother flying for the lye soap to launder a few mouths.

Pickpockets did not purse me as I had left my purse in my room, and my money was—well, never mind where it was, but my money and my streetcar pass were safe.

Indignation and discomfort mounted, but I had no choice but to wait for the parade to pass. I was close enough to get a good—and disillusioning—look at Roosevelt. He was a tired, old man.

But he was the President of the United States of America. No doubt of it. Call it charisma, call it projection, call it whatever you want to; he had "it."

That was the day that I gave up crowds. It I couldn't use binoculars to watch an event, forget it!

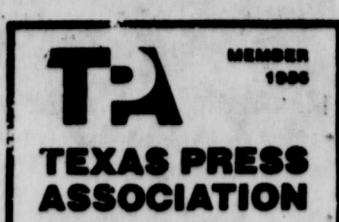
Though I do my share—maybe more—of grumbling at television, I do appreciate the uncrowded-spectator aspect of it. My mental processes may feel assaulted by TV on occasion but not my all-too-corpulent reality.

My mind realizes a certain validity in Miss Liberty's birthday celebrations, in Willie Nelson's Farm Aid, in parade-watching and team-boasting. But my body rebels even more than it used to, and my mind is more tolerant of rebellion.

When I appear in a crush of humanity, do believe there is a very good reason: a true case of mind over matter.

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Fire Department To Sponsor Controlled Burning of Lots

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department announced Monday, June 30, that they will begin controlled burning of lots in Cisco. Fire Chief Richard Connell said, "that the burning of lots consisted of vacant lots only, and that they must be clear of any out buildings." He said, "we cannot even consider burn-

ing lots with buildings of any kind on them."

Chief Connell stated that since the department has only a limited amount of time wishing to have this done should call the Fire Dept. on their non-emergency telephone number: 442-3078, during regular business

hours. He also stated that possibly one a week is all they can handle, and that lot owners need to still keep lots mowed until such time as the fire department can get to them.

Fire Chief Connell said that he will be in touch of those that request a lot to be burned, before it is burned.

The emergency curfew will remain in effect until it is cancelled by Mayor Joe Wheatley, according to an announcement.



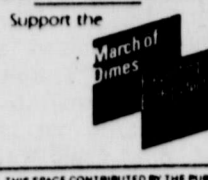

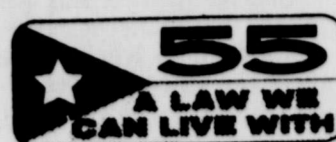

INSURANCE FRAUD HURTS OLDER TEXANS

My Consumer Protection attorneys have informed me that there is a particularly vicious form of insurance fraud going on in Texas today. The victims are generally elderly people who worry that their relatives will be stuck with a large funeral bill. So, they are happy when an insurance salesman arrives on their doorstep, saying he will sell them "burial" insurance.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS

According to the State Board of Insurance, which regulates the sale of insurance policies in Texas, there really is a form of insurance, generally sold by funeral homes, known as burial insurance. It is wise to be extremely careful in buying this type of insurance also. Often, the policy will appear to pay for more than it really does, according to the State Board of Insurance.

THE SCAM

This so-called burial insurance is most often just a term life insurance policy. It could be used by the beneficiary to pay for the deceased's funeral expenses - if it were a legitimate policy. It isn't.

In this particular racket, the salesman pockets the premium money instead of sending it on to an insurance company. In some instances, the salesman also gets the consumer to sign a form giving him power to draft from the consumer's bank account in order to pay for "future monthly payments." It may be several months before the elderly consumer realizes that he has not received his policy and money has also been withdrawn from his account.

It is always best to buy insurance from someone you know, if possible. If you don't know an insurance agent, ask a friend for a recommendation. That way, you are less likely to fall prey to one of those bad characters. Before you sign anything like this, check out the company and the "agent" with the State Board of Insurance and your local Better Business Bureau. If the "agent" says the offer is good only that day or he "won't be coming back again," don't sign anything. Report the incident to the BBB. If you believe you have been victimized by an insurance agent, you can call the State Board of Insurance at (512) 475-4511.

FOR MORE HELP

In some cases, the salesman comes back to the consumer's house and informs him or her that the policy has been rejected by one company, but another company will issue the policy. Then, the salesman gets another payment from the consumer, without refunding the original amount.

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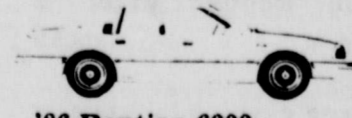

Special Issues Face Agriculture and Natural Resources

After the first meeting on April 15 the Program Builders Task Forces met a number of other times while deciding on the most critical issues facing Eastland County.

Although this program was sponsored by the Extension Service, these were citizens' meetings - and it was the Task Force members opinions which counted.

By time for the public announcements on June 24 the four Task Forces - Agriculture and Natural Resources, Community Development, Home Economics, and Youth - had named 26 issues.

The first Task Force to report was the Agriculture and Natural Resource group, with Jay Lafferty as Discussion Leader and Don Mauney the Recorder. Lafferty is an employee of Perkins Implement Co. in Eastland, and Don Mauney of Gorman is the Manager of Production Credit Association in Eastland.

Besides Lafferty and Mauney, other people from around the county had worked on this report. They included Arlin Bint, Ernest Reich, Charles Walker, Joe Taylor, Bob Green, George Steel, Bob Shults, Richard Robinson, Mrs. Don Mauney, Hoy Johnson, and Cecil Self.

Lafferty, the spokesman for the group, began by speaking of Issue No. 1, Water. "There is a need," he said, "to assure an adequate, safe, high quality water supply for agricultural production in the county and for domestic use by the citizens of the county. Approximately 12,500 acres of crops are irrigated in the county. Most of this water comes from shallow wells. It is necessary to maintain an adequate supply of good quality irrigation water to continue the level of agricultural production we now have." The discussion leader continued by saying that Underground pollution of irrigation and domestic water is occurring from improperly plugged oil wells, and there could be pollution from underground flood activity which is being done to recover oil. Frequent droughts cause water shortages for livestock and farm use and reduction in yields of crop and livestock products.

No. 2 On Financial Management Lafferty said There is a need for farmers and ranchers to keep better records to make wise financial management decisions. Few producers budget their crop and livestock enterprises and most are not able to present their credit agency with sufficient records to show borrowing needs and plans for paying the loans. Producers need financial records to determine which crop and livestock enterprises are profitable and which are not.

No. 3 Profitability. "Profitability in agriculture has declined because prices received by producers have not kept up with increasing production costs," the speaker continued. "This is compounded when losses build into carry over debts from year to year, adding to interest costs without generating additional income. Some producers have been forced out of agriculture because of little or no profits from their operations."

No. 4 Marketing "Agricultural producers are not making reasonable profit on goods they deliver to the market. Consumption patterns have changed markedly in the past decade, making market information and coordination even more critical. More cooperative efforts need to be made in marketing as well as efforts to control the commodity closer to its final consumption form."

Lafferty stressed Item No. 5 Agricultural Enterprise Diversification. "Peanuts and beef cattle bring in the majority of the agricultural income to Eastland County. Peanuts account for about 65% of the total agricultural products sold from county

farms. Reductions of peanut quotas imposed by the USDA Peanut Program have resulted the reduction of 10,000 acres of peanuts since 1976.

Other crops need to be developed in the county so that producers may choose among sufficient alternative enterprises to increase profits or to reduce the risk associated with producing only one commodity," he said.

A special mention was made of issue No. 6 Soil Conservation Most of the crop land in Eastland County is

vulnerable to wind and/or water erosion. Native grasses and trees have been removed from sandy land so that peanuts and other crops can be grown. This has exposed the soil making it vulnerable to wind and water erosion.

Lafferty concluded by talking about item No. 7 Wildlife Management - "Eastland County has an abundance of wildlife including white tail deer," he said. "The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department estimates that deer range on

on 457,567 acres of Eastland County. Other wildlife and game birds includes turkey, quail, dove and several varieties of duck and geese. Fish are abundance in the lakes and streams. Landowners are not realizing the full potential from the wildlife. Through the proper management and promotion wildlife could provide additional income to supplement agricultural income and bring in money to other segments of the economy."

When Mr. Lafferty concluded his statement on these issues he thanked all

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who had worked with him in deciding the most critical needs of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Charles Walker, Chairman of the Eastland County Program Building Committee, opened the floor for a discussion period. There was general agreement that each of the issues outlined by Mr. Lafferty were important. Later several of the issues were included in the most critical ones to be forwarded to the State Extension Service office for inclusion in a study.
