Alderton Receives 65 Year Sentence

Randall Ray Alderton is in Eastland County jail awaiting transfer to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville, after pleading guilty to Arson Tuesday, July 29.

His guilty plea was to arson involving injuries. Two Cisco firemen were injured in the Cisco Lumber Yard fire on June 10. Fireman Jerry Daugett received a broken leg fighting the fire when a wall collapsed, and fireman Royce Darr was burned in attempting to assist Daugett.

Alderton was also sentenced to 20 years for the burglary of Dean Drug, 91st District Judge Jim Wright ordered the sentences to run concurrently. Alderton will be taken to T.D.C. probably next week, a sheriff's deputy said.

Alderton was also ordered to make restitution of \$141,000 to the owner of Cisco Lumber, Mayor Joe Wheatley, and of \$500 to Lloyd McGrew, owner of Dean Drug.

Cisco Police Detective Risa Livingston, during a short noon hearing, testified about statements taken by police.

She said that Alderton told

police that he started the lumber yard fire with a gasoline soaked washcloth stuffed in a partially filled gasoline Mason jar. He then pushed open the back door of the warehouse just enough to get the jar inside and lit it. After making sure the fire would spread, Alderton then went to the drug store, Livingston said.

At the drug store he broke a window with a hammer and entered the building and took various drugs, she continued.

Detective Livingston also testified about a statement given by Karen Lee Hunter stating that Alderton was living with Mrs. Hunter and her husband, Harlin Dean Hunter, in Cisco at the time of the fire. Livingston further stated that Mrs. Hunter and her husband were not aware of Alderton's activities. She also stated that Alderton did move to Dublin with the Hunters, and he was arrested there.

Livingston further stated that Alderton told the Hunters that "he has got drugs from Dean's, and told them about a week later that he burned down the lumber yard."

The items to burn the lumber yard and burglarize

the drug store came from the Hunters without their knowledge, stated Livingston.

Livingston said that in Alderton's statement that he had tried to talk Thomas Markham, a Cisco resident into going with him, but he was too drunk.

Alderton, in a statement given to police on Monday, explained why he implicated Markham. He "thought Markham had snitched on him. So he was going to take him down with him."

Alderton took the stand, and admitted he had criminal records in Illinois, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas. He also indicated that he understood the severity of the sentences.

He further stated that he acted alone and without aid.

After the hearing, Alderton said he was born in Missouri, and said that his


The annual CJC Drive-In Band Camp is to be held during the first full week in August. Those students interested should contact CJC main offices.

Rita Clements Speaks In Eastland Wednesday

Rita Clements, wife of Republican gubernatorial candidate Bill Clements, spoke to a group of people in the Eastland Chamber of Commerce meeting room Wednesday afternoon, July 30.

Mrs. Clements, an attractive brunette, appeared fresh and rested in spite of her campaign swing through North Central Texas in 103 degree weather. She addressed the crowd in an easy, direct way.

"One of the most important issues right now in the Clements - Mark White campaign, is the deficit in state finances," she said.

She stated that when her husband left the Governor's office Jan. 1, 1983, there was a one billion dollar surplus in state finances. Now a 3.5 billion shortfall is projected.

"Where did that money go?" she asked. She said that state revenues had gone up 38 percent since 1983, so the deficits could not be due to lack of revenue.

"It would have to be the mismanagement and overspending," she said.

In outlining the needs of the state, Mrs. Clements said that what Texas needs is a leader with credibility, and a businessman who knows how to create jobs and

attract industry. The economy is very much on people's minds, she said.

She listed a major qualification of a leader as "Someone who will stand firm behind a low tax base.

"Texas also needs better relations with Washington," she added.


"PRESERVING YOUR FAMILY'S HEALTH"

Summer is filled with an abundant array of delicious fruits and berries just waiting to be made into jams and jellies. These preserves can be loaded with refined sugars. This sugar lacks nutritional value, contains no vitamins or minerals and

This year, you can use your home cooking to control your family consumption of sugar. The following recipe allows you to enjoy the luxury of preserves while avoiding sugar-laden calories:

1 cup water
1 package unflavored gelatin
Dash cinnamon (optional)
Artificial sweetener to taste (about 3 pkgs)
Crush berries. Combine with water and gelatin. Add sweetener. Boil for one minute. Pour into hot jars and seal. Place jars in boiling water bath for 10 minutes. Cool and store.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

Is Mexican vanilla safe? This is a frequent question asked.

This summer more than ever tourists may be traveling to Mexico to take advantage of bargain prices. But one bargain may not be in your best interest. I am referring to vanilla purchasing in Mexico. The kind that is an extract of tonka beans or better known as coumarin is no bargain and may damage your health. This product smells like real vanilla and usually sells for \$1.50 - \$2.00 a bottle.

Dr. Al Wagner, Jr., Extension Service Food Technologist, at Texas A&M University shares the following information:

The genuine vanilla bean, *Vanilla fragrans*, is a native to Mexico, but is not cheap, even where it is grown. The vanilla plant is an orchid in a vine form that grows in the subtropical areas of southeast Mexico and nearby countries.

The tonka bean, *Dipteryx odorata*, is a native of South America, but grows in Mexico. It is a tree that grows up to 150 feet tall the belongs to the pea family. It smells enough like vanilla to satisfy all but the experts. However, in 1964, this impostor was prohibited by FDA for use as a food or food additive because it was determined to be a poisonous and deleterious substance.

It is interesting to note that a derivative (dicumarol) of coumarin is used in certain

blood thinning medicines (anticoagulants). This derivative is also known as warfarin is used in rat poison as well, causing the rodent to die from hemorrhaging. There has been no evidence that coumarin itself has a blood thinning effect in humans.

The Food & Drug Administration (FDA) standards for vanilla extract specify that 13.35 to 15 ounces (depends on moisture content) of vanilla beans be used per gallon of extracting fluid. The extracting fluid consists of ethyl alcohol (35%) and water (65%). There are other standards for vanilla flavoring. (Which is a more dilute solution); for mixtures with artificial vanilla (vanillin); and for concentrates and powders.

The chances for deception in buying vanilla would be lessened if everyone bought the whole bean. Vanilla beans are long (7-10 in.) and thin (1/4 in.) like a pencil. They turn dark brown to black when cured. The entire pod can be ground and used for flavoring, or the flavoring can be extracted with ethyl alcohol and water. Tonka beans, on the other hand are oval in shape, about 5 in. long by 3 in. wide. Only the seeds are used for flavoring. These are about 3/4 X 2 inches in size. The pod is not used at all.

Verifying the presence of coumarin in vanilla type products is relatively easy

using a fairly simple laboratory procedure. F.D.A. has tested many vanilla type products from Mexico and has found coumarin often and in varying amounts. But how does the average consumer know before they buy? There is no good way to tell. Stay away from the real cheap bottles of vanilla (\$1.50 - \$2.00) is one suggestion. The best way to avoid coumarin in your vanilla is to not buy it in Mexico.

DILLED OKRA

3 pounds uncut and washed young okra pods
Celery leaves
6 small hot red peppers
Cloves of garlic

1 quart water
1 pint white vinegar
1/2 cup salt
Pack okra into hot pint jars with a few celery leaves, pod of pepper, clove of garlic and head of dill or dill seed in each jar.
Make brine of water, vinegar and salt; heat to boiling. Pour over okra. Close jars. Process in boiling bath 20 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as hot jars are placed in actively boiling water. Makes 6 pints.

Simmons answered when asked about reported changes in regulations at the lake.

Effective Sept. 1, 1986, a new Recreational Permit will be available for boating AND fishing which will replace the present separate boating and fishing permits. In the past, these separately have cost \$7.50 each a year (or \$1. daily), and the new Recreational Permit will cost \$12.00 annually, and permit the holder to do both.

The only new regulation is provisions for camping for which a \$3.00 per night fee will be collected.

And it is true, as it always has been, that property owners at the lake who use the lake for any recreational

purposes, should secure the Recreational Permit, at the \$12.00 per year per family rate.

Receipts and decals will still be issued to show the permitted activities. Mr. Simmons explained.

The permits may be secured at the Lake Keeper's Office near the dam, and probably will be available at other locations as well.

Beginning August 31, 1986 we understand everyone who visits or lives on Lake Leon will be assessed a fee. That's right, anyone camping, swimming, wading, skiing, fishing, and as we understand, lot owners will also be required to pay this fee as well as anyone who has a boat house or boat dock on the lake.

And of course we know where this comes from, the Eastland County Water Board. What have these people done in the past to improve our recreation on and around the lake? Around the lake trash has been picked up, and some new restrooms.

But no swimming areas have been kept trimmed of growth or the underwater objects removed. And on the lake! Have they removed flooded timber during low water periods? NO. Perhaps marked underwater hazards for boaters? NO. Were they responsible for part ramp improvements at Chock-O-Block? NO. (Texas Parks & Wildlife).

And where was the water board when landowners in the river area push acres of timber and piled them next to the river bed, only to be washed and scattered along everyone's lots? By the way these gentlemen were notified of this only days after the dozing stopped. And what about the new, or now old trash dump just west of Chock-O-Block on the north bank. Wreckage from torn buildings, including chemically treated lumber and shingles along with metal objects have been dumped into the lake. Again the water board was notified of this, but the same results, nothing.

And now they expect we the people to pay them to carry our children and our children's children out for a day at the lake. At this rate next item will be toll gates around the lake just to drive

around it. Where are the changes going to stop?

You might say that with these fees some improvements could be done. Well in years past the fees which have been collected have not shown up around the lake in improvements that we have seen. So they must be drawing some healthy interest by now.

Here is the chance to stop being charged to use a public boat ramp (Chock-O-Block) and a public water way (the Leon River). Contact your water board members now, so generations to come can enjoy the great outdoors.

Area News Briefs

EASTLAND

Rita Clements, wife of Republican candidate for Governor Bill Clements, spoke at the Chamber of Commerce office in Eastland Wednesday afternoon, July 30. Mrs. Clements, a native of Brady, was on a campaign trip for her husband across Central Texas. She listed major concerns of the Governor's race as the State deficit, the economy, education, and the war against drugs. Bill Clements' race against Mark White will be "very close", she said, "and will probably be decided in the rural areas of Texas."

The Casper Drum and Bugle Corps was welcomed to Eastland late Wednesday, and performed at Maverick Stadium during their time here. The 150 member group was housed at Eastland High School, with the EHS Band Boosters in charge of meals and other courtesies. At 3:30 p.m. the Troopers left for Dallas, where they will join in a nationwide competition.

County Commissioners declined an offer for \$4,000 for Courthouse repair from an insurance company carrying insurance on the building. Commissioners will hire workmen to scrape away some of the loose plaster in a basement and hall and attempt to determine the extent of damage. The walls have been cracked since the May 24, 1985 derailment and explosion.

Ten miles of the outside westbound lane of Interstate 20 will be resurfaced soon through a contract awarded by the Highway Commission.

The restoration of the Mobley-Hilton Hotel is expected to be completed and the building turned over to the Board of Directors within ten days. Vice President of the Board Dick Wooley reports. The last official tour of the building disclosed only a few minor flaws, and another tour is scheduled early this week. The rehabilitated hotel will serve as a museum, community center, park, and as the offices of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. A water well drilled on the grounds several months ago is expected to begin operating this week. Formal dedication ceremonies for the project are scheduled for October.

Cisco's voluntary water conservation is still in effect, according to City Manager Mike Moore. The area around Lake Cisco did not receive the heavy rainfall that came in the central and south part of the county in June, and remains low. Over the last two weeks the water consumption was up 35 percent over the previous two weeks, Mr. Moore said. He also said if the consumption continues at this rate and the citizen's can't voluntarily cut back, the city council will have no choice but to look at

mandatory curtailment.



Alderton

life of crime started at the age of nine. "I started stealing after my mother abandoned me," he said.

He said that at first he stole for money, but later, after a welding accident broke his back, he began stealing to get drugs.

He told of some of his crimes but admitted that he couldn't remember all of them. He did mention burglaries, armed robberies, and car theft.

He said there was an accessory to homicide. "The murder occurred in Illinois this year."

When asked why a plea bargain, he said, "I did it for two reasons - I know I did it and if I went to a jury, I'd get hung anyway."

His second reason involved Markham. "I already put somebody else into it - and he didn't do it," he said.

Alderton stated that after his arrest he believed that Markham had fingered him to officers. "I figured if he went down with me, I could take care of him."

Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton said that he has filed a motion to dismiss the burglary charge against Markham, and is in the process of preparing a motion to dismiss arson charges with Justice of the Peace J.V. Heyser.

Walton said, "We could have tried the arson case against Alderton before a jury and possibly got more time and possibly less time."

"Also, there's the possibility there would be a change of venue. Alderton's lawyer, Jim Farrar, and Alderton called that to my

attention. (Farrar is Alderton's court appointed attorney)

"And in any event, the board of pardons and paroles' policy is any sentence above 60 years is treated as a 60-year sentence. Consequently, if we tried the case before a jury and got more than 60 years, all that have accomplished would have been to cost the county a lot of money."

The Cisco Lumber and Supply fire was the first in a series of fires that plagued Cisco in the middle of June.

The Red Front Mini Mall sustained damage, along with two businesses located in the Mall. An oil company and a real estate office were damaged as a result of a fire there on June 11. Fire authorities have called that fire arson.

The third in a series of fires was on June 12, when the White Auto Store, a warehouse for Webb's Inc., and Dixon Auto Supply were completely destroyed. Jim Bob Cozart, who was arrested as he fled the scene, was indicted for arson by a 91st District Court Grand Jury.

The Frank Wilcoxon home, northeast of town on the Breckenridge Highway, burned in the early morning hours of June 13. State Fire Marshall office officials and Cisco Fire Marshall Billy Rains ruled that fire as arson. Walton said however it is not believed that this fire is connected with the downtown fires.

After the series of fires in Cisco the City Council voted to impose a midnight to 6 a.m. curfew. According to Mayor Joe Wheatley Thursday afternoon, the curfew is still in effect.
