Two Take Break From County Jail

Two men being transferred by an extradition bus, that had stopped at Eastland County Jail for a break, got a break from their captors for a short time just after lunch Monday.

Douglas Rhedrick and Lawrence Phillips, both of Los Angeles, escaped from the exercise yard at the jail at about 12:25 p.m. The two crawled under a fence that surrounds the yard and fled on foot towards the railroad tracks north of town.

Rhedrick was found about 30 minutes later in a boxcar

at the tracks but Phillips was still on the loose.

Officers from throughout the county responded and additional lawmen from Stephens, Brown, and Erath counties assisted with the search for both men.

A man answering the description of Phillips was spotted near Olden and was taken to the county jail for identifying. It was reported at approximately 2:30 that the man in question was indeed Phillips and the alert was called off.

Both men were passengers

on the bus carrying about a dozen prisoners from Los Angeles to the east. Rhedrick was enroute to New Jersey where he is to stand trial for armed robbery. Phillips was on his way to Little Rock, Arkansas to stand trial for theft.

Eastland County Sheriff's Deputy Jerry Hefflin expressed his appreciation to all the county and surrounding county lawmen who came to the aid during the break. The quick action of all the lawmen aided in the quick apprehension of the two escapees.

The dance is for high school students only.


Pat Leatherwood of L & L Music will provide the music for the dance. Admission will be \$2.50 per person. Soft drinks will be available for 50 cents.

JOSEPHINE CLEVELAND

A Sense Of Mission

Heinrich Bauer, a North American Company of Englewood, New Jersey, which publishes Woman's World, recently accepted the article "How I Coped", by Josephine Cleveland of Cisco. The article appeared in a June 1986 issue of Woman's World, and was widely circulated throughout the United States.

This is only one of the Kaleidoscope of events in the life of Josephine Cleveland, a wife, mother, writer, librarian and Christian worker. Perhaps the first impression a stranger would have of Mrs. Cleveland would be someone from the academic world - patrician good looks, tasteful clothing. It is difficult to picture her in some far-flung corner of the earth smuggling Bibles, or among the smells and dirt of a prison in Manila P.I. But these things, too, have been a part of her experiences.

In the Eastland County area she has been a contributing writer to the Cisco Press and other newspapers in the Big Country for several years. A column "Notes From A Librarian's Desk", was published while Mr. J.W. Sittton was Editor of the Press.

In this column Mrs. Cleveland reviewed current books of fiction and educational books. She was well qualified, for she is a certified librarian. She served 18 years as librarian, audiovisual coordinator and teacher in the Texas Public Schools. Previously she taught for seven years in Baltimore, Maryland, and Emerson and Beatrice in Nebraska.

For the past 11 years Mrs. C. has been a columnist for the newspapers owned by H.V. O'Brien of Eastland. Recently her column, "Lights from the Christian World", has appeared in the

sixth Big Country newspaper, The Breckenridge American.

Mrs. Cleveland is now completing her latest book, "Steps Upward: Inspirational Thoughts for Daily Living". It is expected to be sent to the printer by the end of the year. Mrs. C. credits her friend, Joe Johnson, Inspirational Editor of Broadman Press, Nashville, Tenn., as the one who encouraged and inspired her to continue writing.

This is not the only book Mrs. Cleveland has been involved with. While she was a librarian in Texas schools she assembled a book of "Publicity Ideas for Classrooms and Libraries." This book was published, noted in Bowker's "Books In Print", and purchased by school librarians.

While in public education Mrs. Cleveland also wrote several critiques for the publishers of "Junior Britannica", and was awarded prizes for these. The Awards were presented to the Cisco Intermediate School Library and the Junior and Senior High School Library.

Mrs. Cleveland has also felt a tremendous drive in the area of Christian service - a sense of mission. It has carried her behind the Iron Curtain and the Bamboo Curtain to East Berlin, Europe, the Middle East and Far East. In the 1960's she met A.K. Reiton, founder of a Christian ministry in Taiwan and the New Territories of China.

A.K. Reiton granted Mrs. Cleveland the right to author his biography. This was printed in an official publication, "The Voice of China and Asia". It also served as a historical document for the Churches in Kowloon and Taiwan.

Retiring after many years

of service, A.K. Reiton left his work in the hands of Dr. David Chan, who invited Mrs. C. to view the work being done. This led to giving a Chinese girl, Esther Young, an opportunity to come to the United States, and attended Cisco Junior College. During this time three young men from China also attended C.J.C., and visited the Clevelands a number of times.

This reaching out to new people and learning was nothing new in the life of Josephine Cleveland. Even when growing up in the town of Beatrice, Nebraska she knew she wanted to become a teacher. Her mother often remarked: "Josephine, you always have a book in your hand!"

Before she graduated from High School she and a girl friend studied 18 subjects in order to pass the Nebraska state examinations required for teaching jobs. They enrolled in Nebraska University in Lincoln for the summer, then began teaching in the fall. This pattern continued for three years, until Josephine received her first College Degree.

Soon afterward she met Dr. C.M. Cleveland, who was working in Baltimore, Maryland. They married, moved to Chicago, and their son, Charles Bruce, was born. After Dr. Cleveland, an Optometrist, completed his education they moved to Cisco, Texas, which was his birthplace. The Cleveland's daughter, Carolyn, was born in Cisco. While the children were small Mrs. Cleveland

spent her full time caring for her family.

When the children were older Josephine Cleveland resumed studies in college. She attended Cisco Junior College, Hardin Simmons University, the University of Durham in Durham, England, Southern Nazarene University in Oklahoma City, and East Texas State University. At ETSU she received a Masters in Library Science.

In 1967 Mrs. Cleveland and her daughter, Carolyn made their first trip abroad. They traveled to Europe, Egypt, Israel and Lebanon. Little did Josephine know that this would be the beginning of many overseas journeys.

Five other times in quick

succession she visited Europe. During one time she served as chaperone for the American Institute of Foreign Studies, where she and the students she chaperoned joined 200 others to study at the University of Durham, England. After their summer session was completed they traveled to many historic places in Europe.

In 1974 Mrs. C. was asked by the Rev. Howard Conrad to assist in organizing a new library at the Costa Rica Nazarene Seminary in San Jose, Costa Rica. Feeling impressed that she should help, Mrs. Cleveland packed her bag one week after school was out in the spring, and left to catch a flight out of Miami, Florida.

She recalls walking down the airport in Miami to the small waiting room of the Costa Rica airline, and feeling a wave of homesickness. Second thoughts flooded her mind, but she continued her walk to the little plane that was to take her to San Jose and the unknown.

After takeoff the plane was soon flying low over the green fields of Cuba. A fellow passenger fidgeted and voiced his concern. "I hope they don't take a shot at us!"

Once Mrs. Cleveland arrived in San Jose she was taken to a small wooden house on the edge of the jungle. This was to be her home for a month. Each morning found her walking two miles to the Seminary. While there she spent each day and evening instructing Mrs. Conrad and the Library students how to organize and set up a catalog card file. She also spent a great deal of time processing books and cataloging them.

In November, 1976 Mrs. C. received a telegram from Pat Robinson, President of Christian Broadcasting Network and founder of the 700 Club, inviting her to join a group traveling to Israel. Their hope was to find a means of broadcasting the gospel throughout that country. Josephine Cleveland ac-

cepted the invitation, and the group traveled all across Israel seeking ways to accomplish this. The Rev. Robinson interviewed Prime Minister Rabin in an attempt to fulfill this plan. The group was satisfied that much groundwork had been laid, but the dream was not realized until a few years later.

Feb. of 1977 found Mrs. C. traveling with Gwen Shaw, her husband Jim and a small group into Russia on Christian service. The Shaws, long-time missionaries, often went into this country for religious work. Mrs. Shaw was fluent in Russian. One other member of the group, a former prisoner of the Russian Communists, was knowledgeable in Russian ways and language. The group completed their mission successfully and returned to the states the first of March.

This trip heightened Mrs. C.'s interest in people behind the Iron Curtain and other Communist controlled countries. She did not realize that this was preparing her for later service in the Far East and behind the Bamboo Curtain.

During the next year Mrs. Cleveland was invited to a Seminar by Dr. Bill Brite at his headquarters in San Bernardino, California. She found a group interested in Christian service meeting there with Brite and his wife, Gloria. Among them was Roger Staubach and the Harlem Globetrotters. Mrs. C. recalls looking "way up" to converse with members of this team.

For the last six years

Josephine Cleveland has concentrated on the Far Eastern countries of Singapore, Kowloon, Taiwan, the Philippines, and the mainland of China. She has traveled with a team led by Nora Lam and her husband, S.K. Sung, helping conduct crusades throughout those countries. There they also distributed thousands of Bibles.

While in crusades in the Philippines Mrs. Cleveland joined Mrs. Olga Roberson, founder of the International Prison Ministries in the Philippines. This work includes prisoners in the Muntinlupa Bilibid Prison, located a few miles from Manila.


Here a chapel has been erected within the walls. In trips during the past four years Mrs. C. has spoken not only to those in the chapel, but has also gone into the part of the prison where men who have been given death sentences are housed. Many of these are political prisoners. Now they await their fate - with the change of governments. Several write to her, and she corresponds with them as time permits.

As Mrs. Cleveland reflects on her experiences, she says that she is grateful for her opportunities and for the privilege to participate in bringing what rays of light she can to people who live in conditions we would call almost hopeless. Life is still a challenge to her, and she accepts it willingly as part of carrying out the "Great Commission".

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
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


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4-H NEWS

Pecan Growers Recognized For Their Quality Pecans

Four Eastland County pecan growers were recognized for their top quality pecans at the State Pecan Show in Fort Worth recently. The state show was a part of the 1986 Texas Pecan Growers conference at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in downtown Fort Worth. The four growers were awarded six ribbons for placing among the top three within their variety says County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The pecan entries were from the 1985 crop and had previously placed at the county and regional shows.

Charles Walker of Eastland was the grower of

the first place Cherokee pecan in the state and Linden Boch of Ranger owned the first place Western pecan. Third place honors were won by Walker in the Wichita Class and by Boch in

the known hybrid shelling pecan class. Acres of Joy pecan orchard of Rising Star won third, in the Grabohl class and Mrs. W.L. Wright of Eastland won third in the highest native class.

Child Care Food Program Offered To Registered Homes

Any registered family home or group day care home many now participate in the Child Care Food Program sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture.

There are at least 29 registered homes in Eastland County.

The purpose of this program is to ensure that children in day care home receives nutritious, well-balanced meals. It also provides training in nutrition for the day care providers.

Those enrolling in the program will be allowed to claim a maximum of two meals and one snack for each child per day. Total reimbursement will depend on the number in care as well as the number of meals and snacks served, but the average reimbursement exceeds \$40.00 per child per

month.

There are no eligibility requirements for the children, but to participate in the program a provider must be a registered family home or a licensed group day care home, serve nutritious meals and keep a simple record of menus and attendance on forms which are provided.

This is a government-sponsored program designed to assist in providing quality nutrition for children for where there is no charge to the provider. No predetermined menus are provided, only guidelines for serving different food groups.

Youngcare, Inc. is a private, non-profit corporation with the responsibility of enrolling homes, monitoring the food service, and administering the program.

Homes are currently being enrolled in this area of North Texas. For more information on becoming registered, contact the local office the Department of Human Services. 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Prescription For Parents

Dear Mrs. Herron: My Mom and Dad never listens to me. How can I ever make them understand if they never listen to me?

Each week I hear children say, "No one listen to me." As adults, we probably have many times when we, too, feel there is no one to listen to us. Prov. 1:5 says, "Let the wise listen and add to their learning."

This is an often asked question.

The psalmist repeatedly acknowledges that the Lord heard him as he cried out. Jesus' ministry on earth has many descriptive instances when He heard and then responded to the need. Jesus listens. Because Jesus heard the full message, He could respond appropriately.

Many times as adults we are quick to respond or react to something our child has done without hearing the whole message. Every act of listening has the potential of being a ministry. Everytime we listen we reflect the likeness of our listening Father. Norm Wakefield, in his book *Listening*, suggests many reasons why listening is a valuable ministry to others. I would like to share some thoughts about a few of these with you.

1. Listening helps others express their feelings in a constructive manner. Through listening you may help a frustrated child to

discharge his emotions constructively and arrive at healthy solutions.

2. Empathetic listening is one of the best means of expressing unselfish love. Listening says to the child, "You are important", or "Your ideas, problems and feelings are important to me. I care about you." Listening is a means of modeling God's love. A child becomes very frustrated when an adult changes the subject or seems disinterested.

3. Listening provides the foundation for wise counsel. James reminds us that we are to be "quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry" James 1:19. As a child talks out his problem, he will often times see other things of which he was initially unaware which may help him make a right choice.

4. Listening says, "I want to understand you. I want to know you." Listening is one of the most basic ways to convey to your child a sense of respect, to treat another with dignity.

The wonderful ministry of listening may be applied at almost any age and to any one of God's family who longs to be available. May we learn the beautiful art of listening to our children and others.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

Greenland Eskimos baffled scientists for years. Their traditional diet, mainly fish, seal and whale meat, looked like a prescription for heart disease. It was high in fat, high in protein and low in fruits, fiber and leafy green vegetables. Researchers expected to find fat-clogged arteries and a history of heart disorders among the Eskimos. Instead these people seemed healthy with little evidence of heart disease. Even their blood cholesterol levels are low. The key to the Eskimo's good health, researchers are concluding, lies in the highly unsaturated omega-3 oil found in the fish and other marine animals these people ate. Omega-3 refers to the unique chemical structure of the fatty acids found in many plants and animals from the

sea. The Eskimo's intriguing story prompted investigators to ask if other people who eat diets rich in marine foods also showed little heart disease. Sure enough, a study that compared Japanese fishing villagers and farmers revealed a similar pattern: fishermen with a diet rich in fish and omega-3 oil had virtually no heart disease. A good lesson - eat a diet rich in Texas marine products! The Eastland County Extension Service has received several new publications on Texas fish which include Texas Fish Recipes and Sauces for Seafood. **RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:** If you need a quick casserole dish, here is a good one which is called Mexicale Casserole. Serve with a

green salad for a delicious meal!
MEXICALE CASSEROLE
1 pound ground beef
1 package (1 1/2 ounces) taco seasoning mix
1 can (14 1/2 ounces) whole tomatoes, chopped and undrained
1 can (8 1/2 ounces) whole kernel corn, drained
1 package (6 1/2 ounces) Mexican Cornbread Mix
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a shallow 2 quart baking dish; set aside. Brown ground beef in large skillet; drain. Stir in seasoning mix, tomatoes and corn. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Pour into prepared dish. Prepare cornbread batter according to package directions; pour over ground beef mixture. Bake 15-20 minutes. Let cool 10 minutes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Small Business Says State Must Cut Spending

AUSTIN - Small business is willing to tighten its belt, but wants government to cut to the bone before raising taxes. So says a spokesman for the National Federation of Independent Business - Texas, representing more than 44,000 small and independent businesses statewide.

Gov. Mark White has called for a special session, that was scheduled to begin Aug. 6, to deal with the state's revenue crisis. Although state agencies have voluntarily complied with the governor's recent executive order to reduce spending by 13 percent, the state is still grappling with a major deficit problem.

"Faced with a \$3.5 billion deficit and 11.1 percent unemployment, legislators have some tough choices to make," said Robert Stuka, director of governmental relations for NFIB-Texas. "But small business will support lawmakers as long as the show good faith by reducing spending before approaching business for help."

According to Stuka, if absolutely necessary, small-business owners would tolerate some tax hikes to increase state revenues. In a survey taken earlier this year, 7 out of 10 NFIB-Texas members responding voted to increase the state sales tax from 4.125 percent to 5 percent. In addition, small-business owners strongly - by 65 percent - approving pari-mutuel betting as a way to increase state coffers.

sixty nine percent of those responding also approved enacting a state lottery as another alternative to raising revenues.


Completes Basic Training

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
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
