

Bill and Paula Oxford Restore Family Home

A young woman who grew up in Eastland, Paula (Lund) Oxford, and her husband, Attorney William H. "Bill" Oxford of Stephenville have opened a beautifully restored Victorian home as a "Bed and Breakfast" Inn. A special "Open House" will be announced soon.

This two-story house, located at 563 North Graham in Stephenville, was built by Bill Oxford's grandfather, Judge W.J. Oxford, in 1898. Judge Oxford used the house as the family residence until after the death of his first wife, Elizabeth, in 1904. Later he married Lula Oxford, who died thirty days after the marriage.

The home was then used as a bank and later as a boarding house until Judge Oxford married Myrtle White in 1911. They lived in the home from 1920 until the Judge died in 1923, then she remained in the property until her death 40 years later in 1983.

Myrtle White Oxford will Bill Oxford's grandmother, and his father, W.J. Oxford Jr., grew up in the house. So preserving this charming old residence is much more than a business venture for the Bill Oxfords.

For several months the work of restoration occupied Bill and Paula Oxford, craftsmen they hired, and volunteer part-time workers such as Dr. and Mrs. Fehrman Lund of Eastland, Paula's parents. Add to that the inside wiring and outside construction work of Brian Lund of Fort Worth, and other special projects by family members.

The results are appealing, inside and out. The walls of the house are ice blue, trimmed in blue of a deeper shade. Screens around the numerous windows are trimmed in maroon.

The structure is all original, except for the posts around the porches. These had to be replaced. The stained glass and gingerbread trim, however, was in very good condition. The main floor has eight rooms, each featuring beaded ceilings and high carved wainscoting. The second floor has five bedrooms and a wide hallway which runs between the rooms and a balcony on the front.

Each room has distinctive period furnishings, although some of the pieces are not as old as the house. The living room, for example, has the white wicker furniture Dr. Lund found in his office at 204 Exchange Building when he bought his practice in Eastland in 1950. Mrs. Lund (Helen) and daughter Paula "restored" those pieces with coats of white paint.

A recent article in the Stephenville Empire-Tribune reprints some historical material columnist Autis McMahan gathered on the Oxford House. McMahan is quoted as saying that before the turn of the century and before he became Judge of the 29th Judicial District in 1900, Attorney W.J. Oxford Sr. won a lawsuit centered in the boomtown of Thurber and brought back to Stephenville \$3,000 in silver in a buckboard for the purpose of building a house.

On the construction of the home, McMahan wrote: "Made of cypress, it featured porches which reached three quarters around the home, which had hand-turned gingerbread trim, carved wooden ridgerows and a large cupola topped with a copper eagle weather vane."

The columnist added that in 1920, because of water damage, Judge Oxford had the cupola removed. He replaced it in a building, where it remained for several years before it disappeared. The Bill Oxfords have not restored the cupola at this time, although they may do so later.

The restoration of the house promises to mean a lot to the community as well as to travelers who want a special place to spend the night. For besides the owners offering "Bed and Breakfast", they plan to

keep the dining room open for special occasions, such as catered luncheons, birthday dinners, rehearsal dinners, bridal showers, and business meetings. This room will accommodate up to 30 guests, and is certain to be a favorite spot for the people of Stephenville.

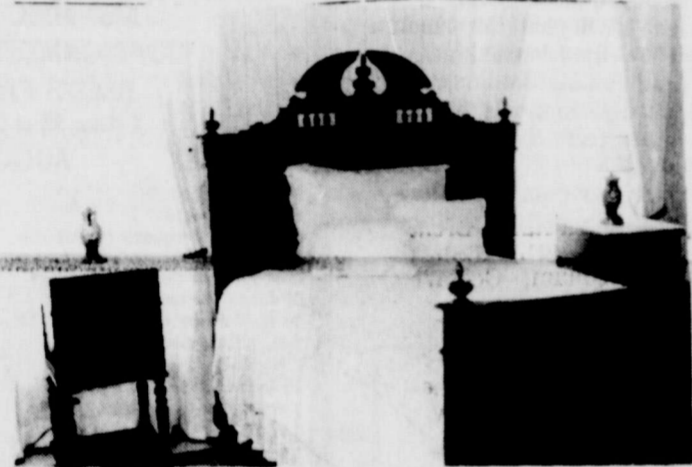
The Oxfords, too, plan to spend a lot of time in the house, although they and their four children will con-

tinue to live in another home. Paula will assist the Manager of the Inn by baking homemade bread for breakfast, and by offering other personal touches.

All who have worked on the house agree that it has been a very rewarding experience. They hope Eastland County friends will stop by and enjoy the atmosphere of the place.

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Commissioner Court Approves Two More Voting Places To Be Accessible To Handicapped

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular session in the Commissioner's Courtroom on Monday, Aug. 25. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk JoAnn Johnson recorded minutes. The Commissioners from all four Precincts were present.

The first item on the agenda was consideration of an ordinance for the closing of a 20 ft. alleyway (Norwood Addition) east of the Highway Department on the north side of East Main Street, Eastland.

This request was brought by Attorney Bill Hoffmann, Jr. on behalf of Bob and Lucille Carroll, who own property on both sides of the alleyway.

Hoffmann also requested that the title of the property revert to the Carrolls. The attorney stated that all proper legal procedure for the closing of the alley had been followed, such as the filing of a petition, and giving notice to all affected property owners.

Judge Bailey asked those in the courtroom if there was anyone in opposition to this move. He noted that the Norwood Addition was set up in 1919, but was still out of the city. The alley had never opened and had never been used.

When no one stated opposition, the Commissioners voted to close the alleyway and relinquish the title to the Carrolls.

Jo Ann Johnson, County Clerk, then brought a request to the court that the commissioners consider bringing two voting precincts up to meet Federal Laws of Accessibility for the handicapped. These precincts, she said, were Ranger, at the

Community Building in City Park; and Carbon, in the Homemaking Cottage at the school.

"The law does not allow the county to put permanent improvements on property it does not own," Mrs. Johnson said, "yet it is the court's responsibility to see that the voting places are accessible. Portable ramps have been suggested as the best solution."

Mrs. Johnson stated that the other eight election places in the county were already in compliance with the Federal Law.

The commissioners agreed to obtain equipment for the Ranger and Carbon polling places, and have a commissioner meet with local officials and get the equipment set up before Nov. 4 general election.

A Mr. Martin from the State Highway Dept. in Austin was supposed to meet with the commissioners and discuss maximum load limit signs for the county bridges. Since he did not appear, this discussion was tabled. One commissioner said that 19 bridges in the county needed to be posted.

Also deferred was consideration of the 1986 County Tax rate. Judge Bailey stated that the Commissioners Court would need to confer further with Steve Thomas before coming to a decision.

Rena Midkiff, from the County Auditor's office, brought further information about the Indigent Health Care plan, which will go into effect Sept. 1. She and Emma Morris, county auditor, and Jean White, Judge Bailey's secretary, have attended several seminars on this plan recently.

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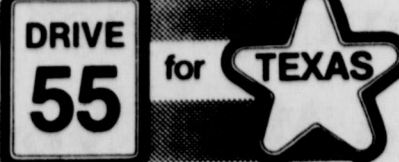

To Change Sept. 1

Beginning September 1, 1986 a lot of changes are in-store for outdoorsmen. Texas Hunting License will expire August 31, so if you haven't bought your new ones you better hurry before dove season. Beginning September 1, 1986 anyone hunting in Texas will have to buy a hunting license. There are no exemptions concerning land ownership or hunting in the county of residence. Special Resident Hunting License are for those under 17 years of age and 65 years or older. The Special Resi-

dent License cost will be \$6.00. Regular Hunting License are \$10.00. The combination hunting/fishing license is \$15.00. This year also brings changes in Fishing License. The Resident Fishing License can be bought for \$8.00. The Special Resident Fishing License is free to those who are under 17 or 65 or older. Everyone must possess this free fishing license to fish freshwater, regardless of county or location of the fishing site.

The chronic complainer is unhappy first cousin to the tattler. Things rarely go right for them because if they did, he would be stripped of his attention-getting device. You might find the following helpful.

1. Ask your child to submit the complaint in writing.
2. Have a round table discussion to discuss com-

plaints.

3. Have him express a positive statement each time a negative one is given.
4. Keep a tab of the complaints and present them at a private conference with the complainer.
5. Pray that God will give you insight and wisdom necessary for meeting the needs of your child.

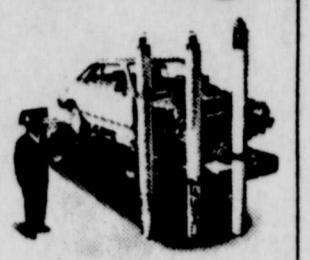

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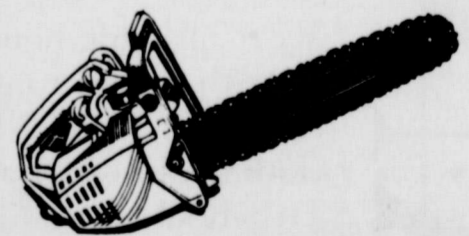

CISD Issues Policy Concerning Meals

The Cisco Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 35 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

Nondiscrimination: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible. Please answer all question on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older or the word "None" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Ray Saunders, Superintendent, Box 1645, Cisco, 76437, Telephone 442-3056.

Confidentiality: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

Help With Application: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact Brenda Jarrell, Counselor, at Cisco High School. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

Verification: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

Reapplication: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

Foster Children: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Drinking Age Will Raise Monday, September 1

On Sept. 1, the legal age for drinking alcoholic beverages in Texas will go from 19 to 21.

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission reminded Texans that the change will cover several laws.

Beginning Sept. 1, possession of an alcoholic beverage by a person under 21 will be a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.

Sale of alcoholic beverages to underage people is the most serious offense, the commission noted. The penalty for a first violation is a \$100 to \$500 fine and a year in jail. A second violation can lead to the same jail term and a fine of up to \$1,000.

Col. Jepson Speaks On Emergency Management

"Civil defense is obsolete," said Wayne Jepson to Cisco's AARP last Thursday evening at the Corral Room. "By the decree of the Disaster Act passed by the Texas Legislature in 1975, every town and city is required to have either a voluntary or paid Emergency Management. Cisco's is voluntary. Abilene's has one and one half paid workers in that area. I share my secretary half-time with another city official."

Some 75 members and guests listened as Col. Jepson said in part: "Although we cannot control tornadoes, hail storms, floods nor icing conditions, it is our job to be able to direct activities when those things hit. Especially when a crisis strikes such as the Sweetwater tornado or the Abilene flood of some 4 years ago. We went in person, knocked on doors, and warned the people the flood was coming and asked them to leave their homes. Even then, some would not believe and we had to evacuate some 600 in boats. It was my job to have a place of shelter for them with dry clothes and hot food. Depending on the location, we usually use church basements, gym-

nasiums or some other roomy place. The city and the federal government can only feed and clothe them for a short time. It then becomes their own responsibility."

The speaker continued with, "We rarely think of a railroad or a highway as being a hazard. The Missouri and Pacific Railroad runs through the edge of Cisco and bisects the heart of Abilene. That Line carries more explosive gases and poisonous chemicals than any other in the USA. What planning can we do when one of those cars derail and starts spewing a poisonous gas into the air? There must be gas masks, a warning system for people of the danger zone to evacuate and quick highway signs ready for detours. The same applies to a wrecked truck carrying inflammatorly gases or toxic ones. People panic in crises. It is our job to warn and protect with a workable plan."

After listening to reports from all committee chairmen, Col. Jepson said, "You have inspired me with all the things you are doing. I'm going back to Abilene and look for a live organization like yours and join the local unit. I already belong to the national."
