Hilton Memorial Park Board To Accept Hotel

The board of directors of the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center has accepted the restored Mobley Hotel under a "substantially complete agreement," President Eris Ritchie reported Thursday.

The conditional acceptance, it was pointed out, means that the contractor still is responsible for finishing several items to the board's satisfaction. The "incomplete" items include the landscaping work as well as minor things inside the building, Mr. Ritchie reported.

The conditional acceptance will allow the Chamber of Commerce to move into the building, and this is expected to be done in the next week or two, Mr. Ritchie reported. The CofC board conferred with members of the Hilton board at their monthly meeting last Tuesday. CofC Manager Don Shepard will make arrangements for moving the CofC offices from 1112 Hilton Avenue, temporary location since the fire several weeks ago.

Besides the landscaping, the work that remains to be done consists of minor

things," Mr. Ritchie said. "The Bennett Construction Company, Brownwood, has done a good job and we believe the restored hotel will be a source of pride for all of Cisco."

Mr. Ritchie said that work would begin immediately on plans for the Oct. 13th dedication of the building. Committees are already studying details, he added. The dedication will be part of the state's 1986 sesquicentennial program.

Board members also discussed their plans for a perpetual care fund that will support the Mobley Hilton over the years, Mr. Ritchie said.

The restoration work had been underway for some nine months. It was financed by a 1.2 million dollar grant by the Conrad Hilton Foundation of California.

CISD Enrolls 897 Students For 1986-87 School Year

A total of 897 students had enrolled for the 1986-87 school year in the Cisco Public Schools through Thursday according to a report by Supt. Ray Saunders. This was down from the peak of 961 last year.

There were 261 students enrolled in the four high school grades, including 88 in the 9th grade, 73 in the 10th grade, 50 in the 11th

grade and 50 in the 12th grade. This was about the same as last year.

In the other grades, enrollment was reported as follows: early childhood, 4; kindergarten, 70; 1st grade, 73; 2nd grade, 68; 3rd grade, 72; 4th grade, 65; 5th grade, 83; 6th grade, 64; 7th grade, 76; and 8th grade, 61.

Others were expected to enroll in the next few weeks, officials said.

Enrollment At CJC Increased

A report that enrollment for the 1986-87 school year has shown an increase for the Cisco and Clyde campuses is expected to be given to the Cisco Junior College board of regents at their regular monthly meeting Monday night, Dr. Henry E. McCullough, president, reported Friday.

A survey of enrollment activities is expected to be completed Monday in time

for the board meeting, Dr. McCullough said.

The report is expected to show that the Abilene campus enrollment is about the same as last year while the Cisco and Clyde campuses are having an increase.

A new handbook for college employees will be submitted to the board for approval, Dr. McCullough said. Other routine matters are scheduled to be handled.

Wranglers Defeat Panhandle JV 42-0

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College dominated both offense and defense play as they scored a 42-to-0 victory over Panhandle State University's junior varsity in the opening game of the 1986 football season at Goodwell, Okla., last Thursday night.

The Wranglers seemed to move the ball at will on offense, and the strong Cisco defense held Panhandle for minus yardage for the night.

David Dacus, sophomore quarterback, played about 40 percent of the game, and Freshman QBs James Darby and Pike Martin divided the remainder of the game. All were effective.

Scoring was Kevin Evans, freshman tight end from

Fort Worth, on two touchdown pass plays, and scoring one touchdown each were Joe Huff, James Dixon, Todd Akers and Ezell Scott. Freshman Eric Edwards, the team kicker, had a perfect night.

Coach Rick Frazier reported that his big 60-man traveling squad came through the game without injuries. Every member of the squad saw action in the game.

The Wrangler squad made the trip by chartered bus. They left at 7:45 a.m. Thursday and arrived back in Cisco at 8 a.m. Friday.

The Wranglers will go to Gatesville to play Blinn JC at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 13.

CISD Tax Rate

To Be Set

Monday

The 1987 tax rate for the Cisco Public School is expected to be set by the board of trustees at the regular monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Monday at the high school library, according to a report Thursday.

The budget for the new school year was approved at the last board meeting. Supt. Ray Saunders reported recently that the same tax rate as that used in 1986 would probably be set for the coming year.

Other routine matters will come before the board.

Mandatory Water Rationing Possible

Unless heavy rains provide a substantial amount of new water at Lake Cisco before the regular City Council meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 9, the council is expected to consider implementing new water conservation efforts, according to reports Thursday.

City Manager Mike Moore told the Council at their August 26th meeting that too many people don't seem to realize the seriousness of the water problem. July water

use was at an all-time high rate, and the water consumption in August was up over last year.

The Council has two choices, Mr. Moore said at the last meeting: 1. Raise rates to discourage use of excess water or 2. Order mandatory rationing.

The new rates as proposed recently call for leaving the 2,000 gallon minimum at \$12 per month. The rate per 1,000 gallons for the first 50,000 gallons has been \$1.50 but the figure would change to the

first 12,000 gallons at \$1.50. Water used over 50,000 up to 200,000 gallons would go up to \$1.60 from the present \$1.25, and all water over 200,000 gallons would cost \$2.00 instead of \$1.00.

Mr. Moore said that 75 to 80 per cent of the city's households would not be affected. He added that only a small group of residents are using excessive water—over 50,000 gallons per month.

Lake Cisco has four "in-take" valves that allow water to flow by gravity

from the lake to the water filtration plant. Two of the "in-takes" are now out of water and the bottom valve is covered by silt and mud, Mr. Moore reported. This leaves No. 3 opening to serve the city's water needs.

If the proposed rates for water conservation are approved, water customers will feel the effect on their Nov. 1 statements, Mr. Moore said.

Rains during the past few days have missed Lake Cisco and its water shed.

Some Tax Rates Could Go Down

Tax rates for taxpayers in six of Eastland County's 18 taxing entities "could go down" as the result of this year's reappraisal, annexations and other factors, according to County Tax Appraiser Steve Thomas.

The Appraisal Office has completed the re-evaluation process, computed the effective rate and given public notices of that rate for all entities except for county taxes. (The effective rate has been computed for county taxes but is being held until final determination is made by the Commissioners Court on new provisions for Indigent Health Care requirements.)

The phrase "could go down" is important because each of taxing entities has

the decision to make as to whether they will use the effective rate or increase. They could add three per cent automatically, but if they go above three per cent they must give public notice and hold hearings before adopting a higher than three per cent increase in the rate.

If each entity chooses to add the three per cent, rates would be lower in these taxing districts: Gorman ISD, Ranger City, Cisco City, South Eastland County Hospital, Eastland City and Gorman City.

Loss of oil revenue affected all taxing entities, some more than others, but increased valuations and additions of property through annexations benefitted most entities.

The addition of some \$4 million in property boosted the City of Eastland. Most of this was from the Oak Hollow Addition and annexations on East Main St.

The reappraisal chart shows the 1985 tax rate actually used, the newly calculated effective tax rate, the permissible three per cent increase, and old and new total taxable value.

Mr. Thomas and the Appraisal Office employees all expressed their appreciation to the citizens of Eastland County for the cooperation and the understanding during the trying times of reappraisal, and also expressed appreciation to the officials of the various taxing entities for their cooperation.

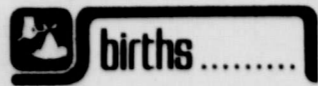
Nutrition Program

Friday--Turkey roast, cheese with rice and broccoli, spiced beets, fruit cup, bread, butter and milk.

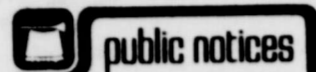


ANEW BROTHER

A summer place that symbolizes past, future

CISCO - One more hill I told my wife, and we'd see it, and she'd be impressed. I could picture it in my mind, wet bodies splashing in the water, plunging from the 30-foot high towers or swinging from a trapeze before plummeting into the coolness.

We shouldn't have been dallying. It's a long way from here to Waco and it was late on a Sunday afternoon. But I was drawn to the water like a diving rod. Finally we passed the sign, "Lake Cisco," telling me I was in the right place. I slowed to turn as I saw the dam that abutted what was toed many years ago as the world's largest outdoor swimming pool.

But as we pulled into a giant parking lot consumed by ruts and potholes, my memory came to a jarring halt. It was gone.

Well, the structure was there, but the water was gone, and so were the wet bodies, the colorful towels lining the pool, and the snow cones that made our tongues red. I clambered out of the car and stood there with my mouth agape, as if having stumbled on an ancient ruin.

The swimming pool of my memories at Lake Cisco was considerably larger than a football field. The shallow end I enjoyed as a child had enjoyed in later years had a dirt bottom, or so we understood. It was so deep that no one dared find out.

Now the pool looked like a desolate playground. The swings and slides were still there. The diving platforms in the deep end stood surrounded by an overgrowth of tall reeds. The trapeze was missing, and instead two frayed ropes drifted in the breeze.

For this community of approximately 4,600, 30 miles east of Abilene, the pool was and is a symbol. It was part of a complex that included picnic grounds, miniature golf and a roller-skating rink. All told, it helped to make Cisco one of the preferred tourist attractions in the region, and visiting my grandparents there was always a highlight of a Texas trip.

The pool closed in 1974. In the years since, Cisco has seen lean times. The oil industry that sustained it has slumped, and the community has had to battle to stave off decline.

The city is beginning to realize that the pool may be the missing link between stagnation and prosperity.

Cisco merchant Bill Austin, who remembers

spending every summer day of his youth at the giant pool, has been appointed to chair a committee to revive the pool and park.

"This community and so many other communities have relied on oil," he said. "We have been dependent on the boom times and devastated by the bust times." He said the people of Cisco have decided not to wait for oil to come back to bail them out again. Instead the quest is to attract light industry, and the pool complex may be a key.

"If people don't see something attractive, they're not going to move out here. We need recreation that has eye appeal," he said. "I'm not talking of Six Flags or White Water. I'm talking about a more pastoral type of entertainment."

Austin said he doesn't know if the pool and park can be restored, but he thinks it's worth a try.

"If we get this project going the way we are talking about, it will mean quite a bit. It could be the key to the turnover of our economy."

It is easy to see parallels between Cisco and Waco. Waco, too, has had misfortunes beyond its control. Waco, too, has had to analyze the qualities that make this place that would draw people and business.

It is possible, also, to see a parallel between Cisco's pool complex and Waco's Cameron Park. The crushing letdown I felt when I came upon the pool in Cisco surely has been felt by those who came to view Cameron Park after being away for many years. The city of Waco is trying mightily to turn it around, and it should.

So often we measure progress in buildings and pavement, and yet when a person surveys a location as a place to invest a portion of his life, it is not the pavement he examines. He looks for the things that lift life above the humdrum and offer respite from the working pressures of daily existence.

We need Cameron Park, and Lake Waco, and Lions Park and the shimmering Brazos.

And Cisco needs its swimming pool. I'll be back again one day with my hopes high.

Law Enforcement Assn. President And Chaplain



Above is pictured Cecil Funderburgh, President of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association and John C. Jones, Chaplain of the same. Rev. Jones serves the Association as well as the Sheriff's Department as chaplain without remuneration, and is available to all members for personal or professional, clergy related assistance or help. Rev. Jones has served as the pastor of the Greater Mountain Top Church, located ten miles So. of Cisco on highway 183, for some eighteen years. Each year his busy schedule includes crusades and revivals over the United States and into many foreign countries. Many of his foreign travels are into third world countries where he preaches among the jungle or "bush" people. Each year usually involves a trip deep into the Amazon Jungle hundreds of miles where seldom a visitor is ever seen by Indians. The first of this year found him preaching in Zimbabwe, Africa and he is scheduled for the fall into the Amazon in Brazil once again.

Chaplain Jones C. Jones is available to the judges of Eastland County when help is needed in relation to counseling and related fields. All that is necessary is a call to his Cisco number. Eastland County residents without a source for counseling may seek his help as County Chaplain of the Sheriff's Department for personal needs. All of this is his contribution to help make Eastland a better county for us all. Many Eastland County residents do not have a clergy they are close to and are reluctant to ask a minister they do not know for assistance. This type of problem has an answer

through the County Chaplain's Office.

Sheriff Don Underwood of Eastland was the first to establish this office officially, though Rev. Jones has served unofficially in this position, available to the past three sheriffs. Rev. Jones states that he is deeply impressed with Mr. Underwood's efforts and progress in dealing with crime related problems in our county, especially the drug problems, and that it is a real pleasure to be associated with such an outstanding sheriff. Each month Rev. Jones meets with the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association for their Luncheon Meeting, where matters of vital interest are discussed among the various departments, with the program on a rotation basis. Rev. Jones served for a period of time as the National Director of Prison Chaplain Ministries for the United Pentecostal Church, International. During this time it was his responsibility to train ministers as chaplains for prison, jail, and hospital work. This took Rev. Jones into various prisons from Florida to Texas. He held workshops at the U.P.C. General Conventions and Camp Meetings, and is still called on as a speaker in the area of chaplain work.

noncer will be Dan Coates of Weatherford. Yates continues, "Spectators who say last year's show voiced both surprise and pleasure that there were steers of this quality, size and horn spread still left in Texas."

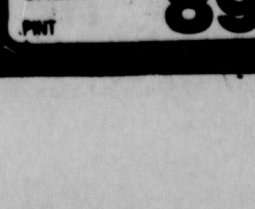

Prescription For Parents

Dear Mrs. Herron:

I am a step parent. I inherited a ready-made family. What should I expect from these children?

ANSWER:

James 1:4-5 "But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing. If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him".

I would like to think we

could somehow give a formula for the perfect family, with everything you want. You must be careful in your effort to control the children not to make the mistake of hassling them about everything - eating junk food, their music, their manners, they way they dress, their hair style and the way they keep their room. While these are important, you must not try to get everything at once.

There are 3 things that a

parent or a step parent must have from the child. If you have these, you will get everything else in a matter of time.

1. Respect & obedience - Be firm and fair but do not lose sleep over accusations that you are not being fair.

2. Accountability - They must simply take the responsibility to have permission for where they are going and with whom they are to go.

3. Control over friends - As your child grows, peer influence more than anything else will affect his attitude and moral development. You should make sure he knows how to choose friends.

When these 3 things are received by the parents from the child, the other mention-

ed issues become less urgent. Do not make the mistake of hassling the child about everything. Start with the items of most importance. It will not all come in a few short days. You must be sensitive to their feelings and frustrations. Children sometimes feel the newly married parent gained or benefitted by this where the child only lost something of his world and gained nothing but problems.

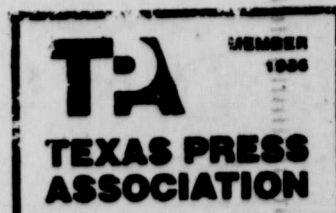

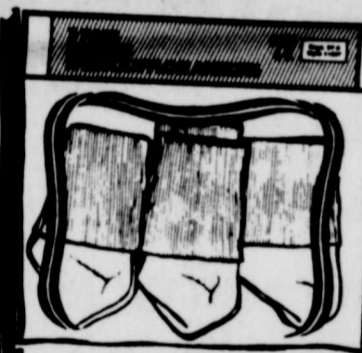

WATER - NATURE'S BEVERAGE

It is important to consume adequate liquids, especially water. It will help to soften the food in the stomach, and assist in moving food through the digestive system. Water is also important in carrying nutrients, disposing of waste products and regulating the body temperature.

Because the body loses approximately 10 glasses of water each day, it is essen-

tial to good health that it is replaced. If the body doesn't receive adequate water intake, a poor complexion may result; or the individual may experience a feeling of sluggishness.

man wearing a ski mask, said John Harper, Bangs police chief. The nurse and two other nurses fought the man off, he said.

Eastland police officers were alerted midnight Friday that Harlmon was a suspect in the attack, said Emory Walton, Eastland County District Attorney.

Bangs police officer relayed a description of Harlmon and of the 1972 Pontiac he was driving, Walton said.

Shortly before 2 a.m. Saturday Harlmon drove into the parking lot of the Country Villa Apartments where he lived, Walton said. As Fletcher was handcuffing Harlmon, Harlmon struck him the face and ran, Fletcher said.

Harlmon told Adrian Huddleston, Eastland police officer, that he ran because he was on parole and would go back to prison if caught, Walton said.

Coleman County authorities took Harlmon to Coleman County Jail Tuesday, Walton said.

Perry Held Without Bail In Boston Jail

A district judge in Boston ruled Wednesday that Joe Thomas Perry, 46, charged with 21 counts of organized crime in connection with the Debra Garcia murder in Cisco, will continue to be held without bail in jail pending outcome of efforts to extradite him to Texas. Perry was arrested there last week by the FBI.

District Attorney Emory Walton reported Friday that Special Prosecutor Bill Hart, who is handling the Garcia case, has made a formal request through the Governor of Texas to extradite Perry. The request went to the Governor of Massachusetts. The usual procedure takes from one to two months before the extradition can be approved, Mr. Walton said.

District Judge Thomas Dwyer said no bail will be allowed and ordered Perry held at Charles Street Jail in Boston. Perry has hired Denis Brown, a Wellesley, Mass., attorney, to fight the extradition to Texas.

Mr. Walton said if Perry claims he is not the "Joe Perry wanted in Texas," Eastland County would have to send Mr. Hart and witnesses who can identify him to Boston. Otherwise, there will be no need for local officials to make the trip as the extradition is a routine matter.

A hearing has been scheduled for Oct. 3 to check the status of Perry's extradition, it was reported. The review process for the extradition request includes the attorney general, the governor's legal counsel, the secretary of state and then the governor's legal counsel a second time in Massachusetts, the report said.

Perry is one of five people charged in the Garcia murder that followed an investigation directed by Mr.

Hart. Two brothers, Charles and Thomas LeFlore of Cisco, are serving sentences of 65 and 50 years, respectively, in the state prison for their alleged parts in the slaying.

Charged with Perry are Brenda Gail Perry Andrews, 24, of Rising Star, Pat Dwayne Starr, Elizabeth Perry Peacock and Richard Edward Hinton. All were apprehended soon after their indictment except for Perry who had alluded arrest for more than a year.

Mrs. Garcia, a convenience store clerk in Cisco, disappeared from her job at Quickway Grocery on Nov. 29, 1981. Her fully clothed body was found two days later in a roadside ditch west of town. She had been shot in the back of the head.

Pre-trial motions for the five defendants have been scheduled for Oct. 15th and their trial date has been set for Dec. 10th.
