Family Of George Fee Will Be In New Adopt A Highway Program On Hwy. 183

The George Fee Foundation has contracted the 3 miles on Hwy. 183 that run thru the Fee Ranch in the new Adopt a Highway program from the Texas Highway Department. Mr. Bill Fairchild, grandson of George Fee has agreed to keep that stretch of highway clean of litter for 1 year. The program began in Tyler, Texas and has really caught on now.

Private organizations can donate 1 year of service to a stretch of highway, usually two miles, and at the end of that time they can renew for another year if they want to. Groups are given instruction classes before they are allowed to work and then given signs and flags to post on the road to show where they are working and they are given vests to wear. They are also given

trashbags that the highway department will pick up when called. With this new program the state of Texas will be able to save millions of dollars. It also helps the highways to look better. Mr. Fairchild suggested that maybe the boy scouts or girl scouts or another civic organization would like Adopt the stretch of road on Hwy. 6 that runs from Albany into the Conrad

Hilton-Mobley Hotel. This would help Cisco to keep a good appearance for the tourist who will stop in Cisco to view the Mobley.

According to Bill Claborn, maintenance supervisor of Texas Highway Department, it will take a little time if someone applies to Adopt a Highway. Someone from Eastland recently applied and they were number 58 on the list.

Police Still Searching For Mundens Would Be Robber

A police search was underway Tuesday afternoon for a young black man driving a red Chevy Malibu Sedan who attempted to rob Mundens Discount Center at 1002 Hilton in Cisco at 1:40 p.m. Cisco police chief Billy Rains was directing the search assisted by several police officers and Highway Patrol officers and others.

The man entered the store and appeared to be shopping according to Mrs. Linda Keck who was on duty as checker-cashier. Mrs. Keck was in a side aisle some distance from the check out

center when the man walked up behind her and "Put something hard in my back." "Let's go and open the safe- I want your money",

the man told her.

As she entered the small office near the front Mrs. Keck shut the safe door and twisted the combination knob. She told the man she did not have the combination.

"He exploded and I won't repeat what he said," Mrs. Keck told the Press.

The man then left, jumped into his car and sped away. Mrs. Keck called police and went to the rear of the store where Mrs. Dee Jackson, store manager was working. Police appeared very quickly and interviewed Mrs. Keck and began the search.

Mrs. Keck and Mrs. Jackson said the black man and a companion were in the store last Sunday. The hold-

up man was wearing green shorts and a white shirt she said. She said he was in his early 20's.

The hold up man got something for his day's work. He left with a can of Right Guard, dollar value \$1.67.

Mrs. Keck who has worked at Mundens for 14 months is the wife of John Keck, a native of Cisco who is a mechanic at Ensearch. They live here with their 3 children who attend Cisco public schools.

Mrs. Jackson said the Mundens store received a threat last June during the series of fires that dynamite would be placed in their business. She said they took precautions and nothing

ever happened.

Mundens store at Colman was held up last month Mrs. Jackson reported.

Police were reported to have advised all area cities to be on the lookout for the hold up men and car.

Robert Rains, tackle, injured his leg during the Early game and will not be playing in the Roscoe game according to Coach Doyle Walker. He also said the game against Roscoe will be a good one. The Loboes are getting better with each game they play and even though Roscoe is a bigger team, Cisco will have a good chance to win.

Early won the coin toss and received the first kick-off. Cisco's Roy Boykin ran in for a touchdown early in the first quarter but it was called back because of a penalty against the Loboes for holding.

With 5:33 left in the 2nd quarter, Early was on the 10 yard line and they faked a field goal attempt and Travis Jones caught a pass to make a touchdown. The PAT was good to make the score 7-to-0.

With 3:41 left in the 4th quarter Cisco's Joe Flores carried the ball in for a touchdown from the five yard line. Cisco tried for a 2-point conversion but was stopped by Early.

Jimmy Cox ran 48 yards to make a touchdown for Early with 58 seconds left in the game. The PAT was blocked but the score was Cisco 12 and Early 13.

Junior Class To Take TEAMS Test Oct. 28-29

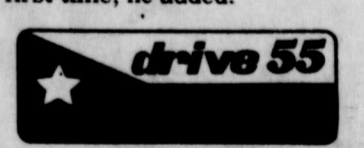
Jack Martin, principal at Cisco High School, has announced that the junior class will take the TEAMS test Oct. 28th and 29th.

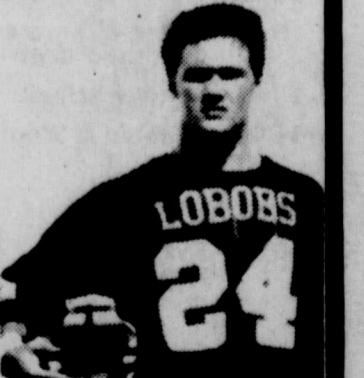
DOUG WITT

18 CJC Wranglers Report For Workouts

The CJC Wrangler men opened formal basketball workouts on Monday, Sept. 22, in preparation for the 1986-87 season. Eighteen candidates reported to Coach Dan Montgomery, who is starting his eighth season at the Wrangler helm. Montgomery's overall won-lost record at CJC is 54-32.

The Wranglers were 20-7 in '85-86, and won the Northern Texas JUCO championship for the first time ever. They will try a repeat performance with five returning players, one transfer, one redshirt, and several freshman recruits and walk-ons.

Top returnees are Mike Knorr and George Westbrook. Knorr, a 6-5 forward from Killeen, was a starter last season and was named to the Region V All-Tournament Team. Westbrook, a 6-4 guard from Fort Lauderdale, FL, was the team's second leading scorer and, was the conference's freshman-of-the-year.

The returning redshirt is Johnny Hudson, a 5-10 guard from Clint. He walked-on last year and improved enough to return as a scholarship player. Kerry Hadley, a 6-7 post man from Port Arthur, is now eligible after transferring from Odessa Junior College last January.

Top freshman recruits include: Thomas Miller, 6-6, from Killeen; Tony Gould, 6-1, from Wichita Falls; Todd Mannon, 6-5, from Truth or Consequences, NM; Tyrone Teasley, 6-3,

from Alexandria, La.; Darren Nelson, 6-2, from Gonzales; and Sherman Ray, 6-4, from Amarillo.

The season opener is on Monday, Nov. 3, in Snyder against Western Texas, and conference play begins on Dec. 1 against TSTU in Waco. The home opener is on Monday, Nov. 17 against Texas Wesleyan JV.

The Wranglers will have a game-type scrimmage this Saturday, Sept. 27, at Wrangler Gym against Ranger. Starting time is 10 a.m. Admission is free and the public is welcome.

CJC Wranglers To Play Here Thursday

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, who lost a tough game to Northeast Oklahoma A&M in their home opener last Saturday afternoon, will play at home again this week. They will meet the junior varsity of Howard Payne University at Chesley Field at 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

Coach Rick Frazier expected his Wranglers to be at full strength for the Howard Payne game.

Three turn-overs - two fumbles and an interception - inside their 20-yard line contributed to the defeat suffered by the Wranglers to the nation's No. 5 team last Saturday. The final score was NEOkla 32, Cisco 13.

The Wranglers held their own in the stats department with 225 yards total offense to 234 for the visitors. Cisco had 17 first downs to 12. The Wranglers compiled 14 of 34 passes with one interception, and Oklahoma had eight of 18 passes good with one interception.

The Cisco team scored first on a short pass, QB David Dacus to End Joe Hough, and Eric Edwards added the extra points.

The Oklahoma team took the kickoff back 90 yards with Denson carrying for a touchdown, and Springer added the extra point. Shortly thereafter, NEO recovered a fumble and a 11-yard run by Denson added six points. The PAT failed. NEO then tackled Dacus in the end zone for a safety.

QB Bolyard connected to End Jones for 15 yards and a touchdown to add to the NEO scoring, and Springer kicked a field goal for 25 yards on their next possession. Cisco's final score was a six

yard TD run by running back James Dixon, and a try for two points failed. The final score was a four-yard pass, Bolyard to Osborne, for six points. The kick was good.

Andrea Horton, sophomore safety from Austin LBJ, was named Wrangler Player of the Week by the CJC coaching staff on the basis of his outstanding defensive work. He had a total of 16 tackles and broke up several passing efforts.

Horton was the safety replacement for Tiger Mack, freshman from Daytona Beach, Fla., who suffered a knee injury last week. Mack underwent orthoscopic surgery last Friday in Abilene and was reported Monday to be doing nicely. Coach Frazier expected Mack to be out about four weeks.

Sam Dudley, defensive end from Daytona Beach, Fla., was also a defensive standout. He had eight tackles, had an interception and covered one fumble.

QB Dacus, who played most of the game, suffered a mild concussion midway in the fourth quarter and left the game. His replacement was Freshman QB Pike Martin of Springtown who was two of four for 31 yards passing. He engineered the final Cisco touchdown. Dacus was expected to play this week.

Coach Frazier expected the starting lineup for Cisco to be about the same as last week-as follows:

Eric Edwards and Bobby Dino were expected to divide kicking chores.

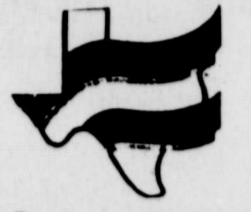

Graduates of the course earn credits toward an associate degree through the Community College of the Air Force.



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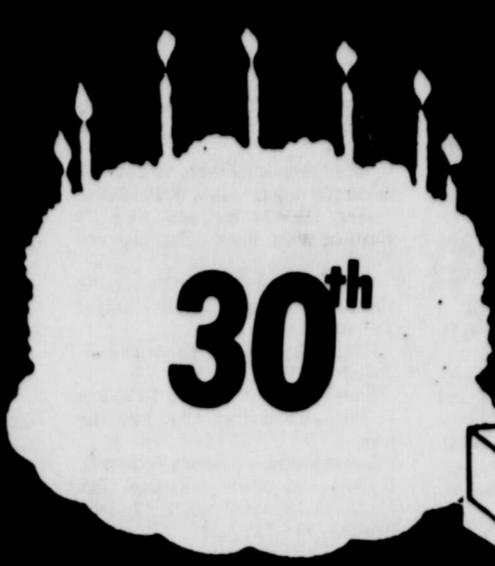

With Fall, Eastland County has a virtual display of color and there are many leaf-peckers. Brilliant displays of red, orange, yellow, gold and bronze greet us each October as mother nature unveils the colorful ritual that marks the end of the growing season in the temperate regions of the northern hemisphere. Where do these colors come from? As children we were told that Jack Frost painted them. In reality, the colors were present in the leaves all the time.

During the growing season these deciduous trees - oaks, maples, aspens, birches, gums, etc. - have green leaves because of the presence of the green pigment chlorophyll. It is the primary pigment that allows green plants to produce food through photosynthesis. Other pigments are also present. The yellow and red carotenoids and the blue to red anthocyanins are simply overwhelmed by the massive amount of chlorophyll, so we do not see them. In the fall, the tree prepares for winter by

releasing hormones that cause certain nutrients to be withdrawn from the leaves while the chlorophyll is degraded. As the green chlorophyll wanes, the other pigments begin to show through leading to the fall plumage of the deciduous. Gradually these leaves fall off (in most cases) and the trees go bare through the winter. The light of spring triggers the growth of new leaves and a new growing season begins.

Why does this happen? The deciduous trees typically have broad flat leaves that maximize the surface area that can be exposed to the sun. This increased exposure allows more photosynthesis. The large surface area also allows a lot of water to evaporate from the leaf surface. In fact a mature oak tree may release more than 100 gallons of water during a particularly hot day. This water is replaced by water that passes from the soil through the roots into the tree. That poses a problem in winter.

Once the ground is frozen, the roots can no longer absorb adequate supplies of water. Dissolved minerals in the tree itself could act as an antifreeze to keep the water in the tree from freezing.

If the leaves remained, evaporation would continue, and the tree would lose water without being able to replenish it. The trees adapt by dropping their leaves, thus conserving their water. Evergreens, especially the conifers, escape this problem by having thin needle-like leaves to minimize surface area for evaporation. The waxy coatings on their leaves further reduce evaporation. Evergreens greatly reduce their activity in the winter, but they retain their green foliage.

Wartime Veterans Could Be Due Benefits

According to James Wright, Veterans Service Officer for Eastland County, some disabled wartime veterans may be due some monetary benefits they are not aware of.

Wartime veterans who had 90 days or more of honorable military service, and who are disabled and unable to work, may be eligible for Veterans Administration pension benefits. In order to qualify, the veteran must either be 65 years of age or older, or must provide medical evidence showing he is permanently and total disabled. A veteran who is age 65 or older is presumed by law to be disabled for this purpose.

In addition to the disability provision, the veteran must meet certain annual income limitations. Under the current pension law administered by the Veterans Administration, a disabled veteran can be paid a maximum monthly amount of \$490 if he has no income from any other source. If he has a wife or minor child, the maximum pension of \$642. In both instances, the maximum pension is reduced by the amount of any other income which a veteran and

his dependents have from any source. For example, an otherwise eligible veteran with Social Security of \$300 per month would be entitled to \$190 from the VA. If he had a wife who had no income, the VA payment would be \$342 per month.

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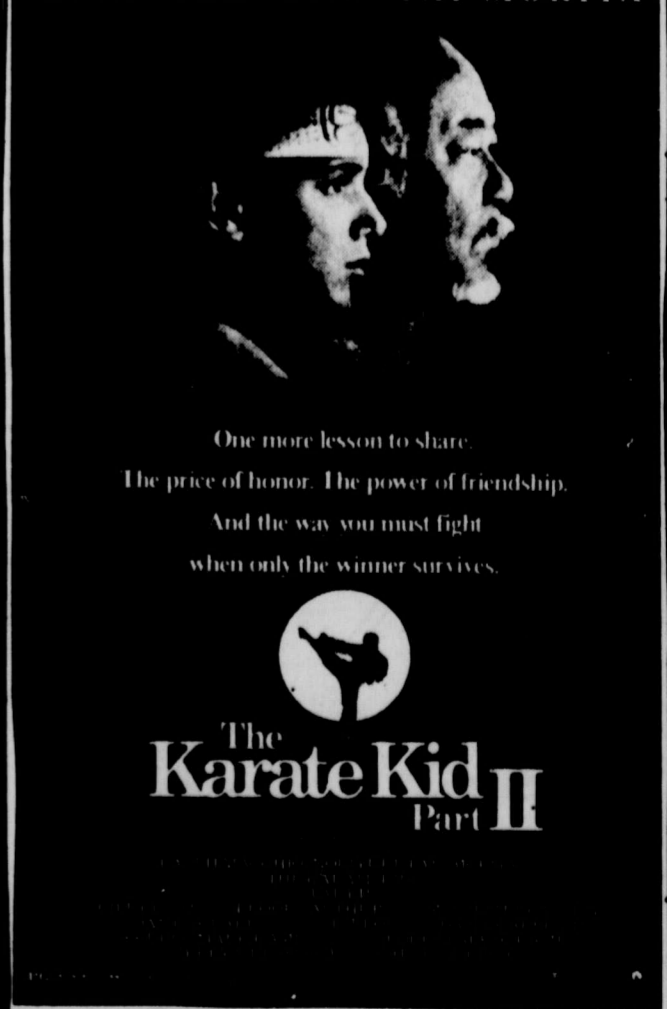

Love in the Classroom
Thousands of teachers are back in the classrooms of our nation attempting a task that would daunt the stoutest of men. Children soon learn that there are those who are smarter, more attractive, more popular, more athletic. The Lord did not make us all the same. The world would have been a boring place had He done so. Learning to cope with the differences in people is often a major emotional challenge for children.

SWBT supports program that addresses school dropout problem

Texas' most precious resource is not oil or gas, but rather the young men and women of the state. Unfortunately, a large proportion of these youths will never reach their fullest potential because of their decision to drop out of school. They end up cheating themselves, and society, out of the contributions that only they and their unique talents can make.

Recently published statistics reinforce the severity of this problem: The dropout rate in Texas hovers around 30 percent. Last spring alone, one out of every three potential high school seniors in the state - about 80,000 - failed to graduate.

This problem affects all of us, since young people with little education often turn to crime when they are unable to find a job. STATE REP. Jim Parker, in a telephone visit Tuesday with a staff member of this newspaper, indicated that he will introduce a local bill in the next session which would re-establish jurisdiction for the Eastland County Court, which would lighten the case load in 91st District Court. Rep. Parker said that the bill probably could not be entered during the special session because of the necessary public notice time limit provisions required for such a bill. He also indicated that provisions would be included through amendments to provide a county attorney to help process the misdemeanor cases at the county level rather than through the district court as they are now handled.

"I think such a step would be beneficial to Eastland County and I can't find any negative reasons why it shouldn't be done," he said.

There appears to be a growing concern here for re-franchising the county court here to handle such cases, and some have stated that such a system could be quite a revenue-generating avenue for the county.

Rep. Parker, expressing some consternation with the state affairs at the state

house, indicated that he had understood that the House was to have received a tax bill Tuesday, but learned that it would be postponed - "And we're running out of time," he exclaimed. If a tax bill isn't passed by Oct. 1, the state will lose an entire quarter of needed increased tax revenue, and that's what we're suppose to be here for, he said.

Asked about reported cuts for higher education, he said that it now appears that the legislature would succeed in trimming only about some \$40 million more than what the colleges and universities had already volunteered recommended.

Rep. Parker promised to visit the district once the special session ends.

Attorney Bill Hart To Stay As Attorney Pro Tem In Case

Eastland County Commissioners decided to continue to employ Attorney Bill Hart as Attorney Pro Tem investigating the Debra Garcia Murder Case after a detailed report on the case Monday.

Hart requested an Executive Session for part of his report, and after this one-hour hearing the meeting was opened to the public.

"The purpose of my being here with this report is to talk about the lawsuits threatened against you, and the rumors and gossip about

this case," Hart said.

Their threats are that you (the Commissioners) don't have the authority to hire me to investigate and prosecute this case," the attorney continued.

He stated that the State Attorney General has given an opinion that the County Commissioners Court does have the authority to enter into a contract for professional services involving the investigation of crime.

Hart gave some of the background on the case, which began with the abduction of Debra Garcia from the Quickway Convenience Store in Cisco on Nov. 29, 1981. Her body was found several days later. First Charles and then Thomas Le Flore pleaded guilty in the robbery-slaying of Mrs. Garcia. They were sentenced to the State Department of Corrections. Brenda Gail Andrews received a ten year probated sentence for criminal conspiracy in the case.

In Nov. 1982 Thomas La Flore gave a confession and named other people involved in the crime, Hart said. This was admitted into evidence in the Court. In Jan. 1985 a third person communicated with Judge Jim Wright. This person said he would not talk to the District Attorney, Texas Ranger, or County Sheriff, but would talk to another individual representing the county.

In March, 1985 District

Judge Jim Wright asked Bill Hart to act as a special investigator and prosecutor, presenting the new evidence into a Grand Jury.

District Attorney Emory Walton, Hart reported, aid that he did not have the time needed to properly investigate the case. So the County Commissioners agreed to ask Hart to serve as Attorney Pro Tem in an on-going investigation.

Since that time he has investigated and secured indictments on several individuals for organized criminal activity, Hart said. This covers murder, robbery, conspiracy, aggravated sexual assault and aggravated robbery.

"I believe that five or more people participated in these various offenses," Hart reported.

He stated that he hired a private investigator for a while, then let him go.

"I received no assistance in this investigation from law enforcement officers in the county," he said.

He has uncovered enough new evidence for several more trials on this case, Hart indicated. On Oct. 30, there will be a hearing in the District Court on pre-trial motions.

"The purpose of this is - if the parties named are guilty they should be prosecuted," the attorney said.

After this report Commissioner Richard Robinson made the motion that Hart continue the investigation. Commissioner Owen seconded the motion. The Commissioners agreed unanimously to ask Hart to remain as Attorney Pro Tem.

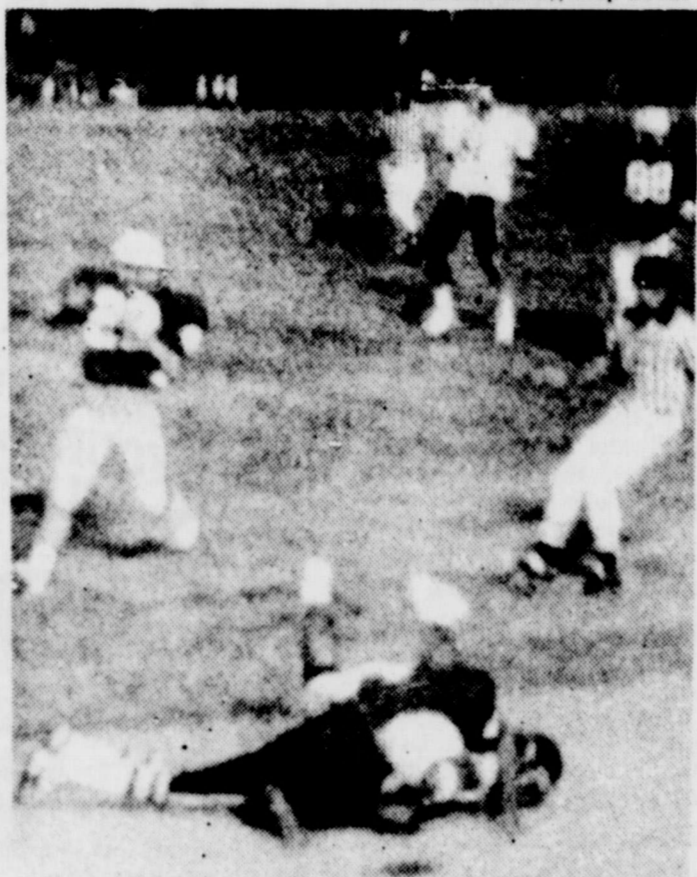

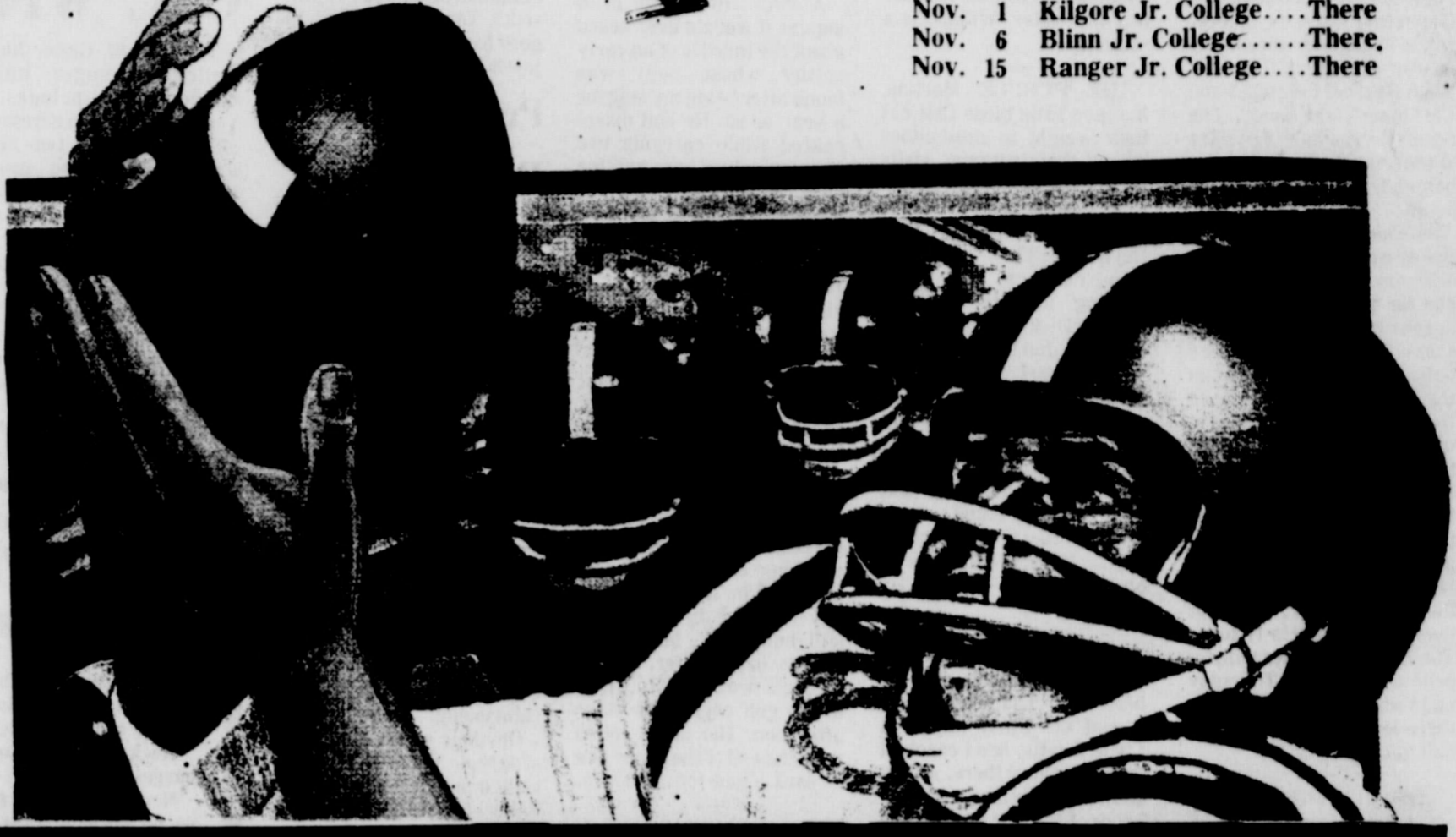

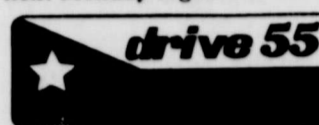
Lawsuit Settlement Has Been Reached

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**American Cancer Society
District 16 Meeting Held**

The Texas Division - District 16 - of the American Cancer Society met for their annual meeting in Abilene

Thursday. Eastland County is one of the fifteen counties comprising this district. Mrs. Jo Thompson,

district lay director of Abilene, opened the session by welcoming the volunteers and staff personnel from Abilene, Ft. Worth, and Austin. The purposes of the meeting were to review the successes of this district in 1985-1986; elect district leadership; exchanging new ideas for reaching our goals in cancer control; and providing training for committee chairpersons, new board members, and key leaders in each unit.

Next, reports were read by the four District Chairmen, in public education, crusade, service and rehabilitation, and public information. Two Eastland County residents serve on the District Board as chairpersons; Sharene Richardson of Cisco, and Marilyn Brashier of Ranger.

After listening to several informative speakers, the volunteers were allowed to choose a special session to attend for added training. Marilyn Brashier, District Service and Rehabilitation Chairman, and former District Service Trainer, presided over that session. There are excellent service and rehabilitation programs provided by the American

Cancer Society FREE of charge to the cancer patient. Patients are able to receive hospital beds, side rails, wheel chairs, shower seats, walkers, crutches, and commode chairs. Also, gift items include eggcrate mattresses, comfort pillows, micropore tape, room deodorant, sheepskins, ostomy supplies (up to six months), laryngectomy stoma bibs, bed pans, urinals, emesis basins, and dressings.

There are various patient rehabilitation programs offered by fully trained and carefully supervised volunteers who give reassurance and emotional support to patients that have had the same kind of surgery. One type of program offered in Eastland County is the Reach to Recovery program. This program provides rehabilitation to women who have had breast surgery. It is designed to help them meet their physical, psychological and cosmetic needs.

One of the newest (and exciting) programs for this area is the Guestroom program, which provides tem-

porary housing for patients who must travel for cancer related treatment and check ups. This service will soon be in effect for this area.

There were three awards presented to the Eastland County unit. Loretta White, crusade chairman, was presented the Silver Achievement Award. It was given to those units have a five cent per capita increase in giving and raising an all time high in crusade.

Letty Craddock, public information chairman, was recognized with a certificate for attaining the highest visibility through the local media. This is measured by the number of clips in the newspaper during the fiscal year. Mrs. Craddock was credited with 245 clips which included all the papers in the county.

Marilyn Brashier, service and rehabilitation chairman, was presented the Quality of Life Award - an engraved plaque. This was given to the unit serving 33 percent of the potential number of cancer patients in their unit, and exceeding the Texas Division goal of a 10 percent increase over the number of patients

served last year. Mrs. Brashier served 46 patients, which was 40 percent of the potential number of patients.

Part of the money donated to the American Cancer Society in Eastland County is used to service patients.

Wiping out cancer in your lifetime is the primary goal of the American Cancer Society. Meeting the needs of the cancer patient and their families through education, information, research, service, and rehabilitation is our concern. 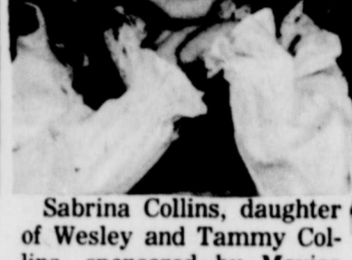
