Mrs. Burton Is Named Teacher Of The Week

The feature elementary teacher of the week is Betty Burton. She teaches first grade at Cisco Elementary School.

After graduation from Gorman High School in 1965 she went to Temple Commercial College. She worked as a secretary for The Eastland Co. Abstract Office in Eastland for 2 years then secured work in Fort Worth in an insurance office.

As a mother of two young children Betty stayed home for eight years. Going back to work after a long stint at home made her realize she needed to further her education.

She attended Cisco Junior College, then went on to Tarleton State University

where she received her Bachelors of Science Degree and teaching certificate in December, 1984. She has begun her second year as a first grade teacher of C.I.S.D. She said, "I enjoy helping kids learn their basic skills".

When not teaching Betty enjoys camping, music concerts, ball games, sewing, and traveling. She is an avid Dallas Cowboy fan.

As a single-parent to two teenagers, David (16 yrs.) and Cynthia (14 yrs.), she stays busy. Betty has lived in Cisco for 6 years. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Audy Moore of 1204 West 14th, and a member of the I-20 Church of Christ.

The Cisco Goodfellows, an organization that helps the needy in Cisco at Christmas time met last Thursday evening and began making plans to start this year's program.

Goodfellows was started in 1984, by Jim Jones, in an effort to make Christmas a little brighter for those who are sick, out of work, out of luck, poor or just do not have any money.

These families usually want to provide their children and their spouses with as nice a Christmas as everyone else, but maybe they cannot afford to spend the extra money. Such is the plight of many families in Cisco with acute needs who will be seeking help for their families at Christmas.

And it has made Christmas better for people here in Cisco in the past. Some of the thank you letters received from recipients were:

"Dear Goodfellows, "I thank you very much for the people and the men for working and spending for all the goodies. A child cannot be happier than I was for all this I get for Christmas. A special thank you to Santa Claus for the shopping cart. "A Happy Woman".

Another letter said: "Dear Goodfellows, "God will surely bless each and everyone for help-

ing us for the food. I didn't thank you all soon, because I was in the hospital. But we are very happy for the food.

"Thank you all, "God Bless you all." Before Goodfellows began the Cisco Kiwanis Club distributed baskets of food and toys to needy families. This year applications for food baskets from the Goodfellows will be given out beginning Monday, November 3. Applications may be picked up at the Chamber of Commerce Office, 104 East 4th.

Letters of request for help from any family in Cisco are invited for review by the Goodfellows Board of Directors. The letters of request should contain the complete mailing address of the person requesting help and the telephone number, if the family has a telephone. Letters should be mailed to the Goodfellows of Cisco, Box 1072, Cisco, Texas 76437. All request for aid must also include one of the applications forms.

Goodfellows also request that families more fortunate than the destitute contribute funds to help those families in need who can not help themselves. All donations are tax exempt.

The Goodfellows officers started the fund this year by donating money at Thursday's meeting. Donations

may be made at The Cisco Press, 700 Conrad Hilton or the First National Bank, 418 Conrad Hilton, or to any of the board members. All checks are to be made payable to Goodfellows Fund of Cisco.

Mr. Schaefer Named Teacher Of The Week

The article this week is about a local individual whose family has had an interesting background in local history as well as being gifted in many aspects of work and life. This story is about Delbert Schaefer who teaches math in our Junior High School.

Delbert Karl Schaefer was born in 1941 to Harry and Thelma Schaefer. Harry was a local sign painter. Delbert's grandfather, Karl Schaefer, immigrated to the United States in 1888 from Berlin, Germany. He and his family settled in Cisco. Karl Schaefer was a carpenter and cotton gin operator. Karl was killed by one of the first cars ever to be in the state of Texas. The full details of this tragedy have never been known. Karl's son, Harry, was born in 1893 in this community, and in 1913 ran off from home to join the circus. The name of this group was called "Nutt Brothers Comedy Art Players," and they traveled all over the United States. Harry became the leader of the circus orchestra. One interesting story about this circus concerned the high wire walker, Crazy Harry Rich. He would stretch a high wire from a tall building to the ground where a bucket of water was at the end. He would then sit on a pulley device and had gasoline poured over him. They would then set fire to him, and he traveled down at a high speed on the Human Flame. Once Harry missed the bucket with this stunt, and Crazy Harry burned.

After World War I began, Harry Schaefer became a band leader and performed for troops in France and other parts of Europe. Delbert still has his father's dairy. One of the entries tells of Harry and his band coming home from the War and seeing the Statue of Liberty. The band began playing "Home Sweet Home," and there was not a dry eye among any of the

soldiers. Delbert learned sign painting from his father and continues the business. He has donated many signs to the community such as signs for the Chamber of Commerce and the "Welcome to Cisco" sign.

In 1960, Delbert graduated from Cisco High School. He was quarterback for the Lobos. Delbert was involved in football, track, basketball and baseball. They won district in all of these events. In baseball they won regional, which in those days was the highest the team could go.

After graduation, Delbert received a scholarship from Texas Tech University. He became one of the quarterbacks, and the Raiders were undefeated—first time in 30 years. He then left Tech and played baseball for Jim Puryear at Cisco Junior College. He completed his college education at McMurry and graduated in 1968. During his years at Cisco Junior College, he met Joyce Reynolds, and the two were married in 1964. They have two children: Shelly Bean, age 19, and Dusty, age 15. The Schaefers attend The First Baptist Church in Cisco where Delbert is the Director of Sunday School.

Delbert began his teaching career in 1966, and this has been his only school since that time. He has been head basketball coach, assistant football coach, and has taught math, physical education and history. Delbert enjoys fishing and has won many golf tournaments as a member of the Cisco Country Club.

Delbert's philosophy of education is, "Help students and give them encouragement, so that they develop self-confidence in themselves."

Applications Taken For Home Loans

The Texas Housing Agency announced Wednesday it is accepting applications from mortgage lenders who would like to participate in a below-market FHA-insured loan program designed to assist first-time homebuyers.

"Qualified lenders who sign up for the program will receive an allocation of low interest mortgage money that may be used to finance homes for low and moderate-income families in their community," said Dan A. McNeil, Executive Administrator of the Texas Housing Agency.

McNeil said the interest rate on the \$83 million in available funds has not been determined, but is projected to be 8.75 percent or less.

"In order for us to provide a family with an affordable home loan, there must be a lender in the community who is willing to originate and service the loan on our behalf," McNeil said. "The success of the program on a statewide basis depends on the participation of numerous, community-oriented lenders," he added.

Lenders may obtain an application package from the Agency by contacting Jim Williams at (512) 474-2974. The deadline for lenders to request an allocation of funds is noon Thursday, October 30, 1986. The minimum allocation awarded to each lender will be \$500,000.

The Texas Housing Agency was created by the state legislature in 1979 to provide affordable home financing to low and moderate-income families. The Single Family Home Purchase Program is funded through the sale of tax-exempt bonds; no state or federal appropriations are used.

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Homemaking Hints

Ghosts and goblins, tricks and treats, pumpkins and parties - and Halloween treats are just a few of the things that come to mind when we think about this weeks holiday which is devoted to fun.

It's hard to imagine Halloween without those delightful "pumpkins with personality" we've dubbed Jack-O-Lanterns. This versatile vegetable is, interestingly, one of the oldest edible plants grown by man in this hemisphere.

Pumpkins and other squash varieties are part of the curcubit family, along with cucumbers, gourds, and melons. They are a good source of Vitamin A, Potassium, and are low in calories. Vitamin A is necessary for proper eyesight and healthy skin. Potassium is vital in maintaining the heartbeat and proper cell function. Pumpkins should be bright orange in color and firm, with an unblemished rind.

4 cups of raw chunked or lightly grated pumpkin will yield 2 cups cooked, pureed, drained pumpkin. Cooked pumpkin can be refrigerated for up to 5 days or frozen for 6 months.

Besides great eating, pumpkins make interesting and attractive serving dishes. First wash the pumpkin carefully. Cut a lid from the top and thoroughly clean out the seedly, stringy interior. Then if you wish, decorate a "face" with colored markers. Refrigerate until ready to use. This pumpkin will make an ideal punch or apple cider bowl. The pumpkin can be used as a centerpiece, arrange fall leaves and mums for an added festive decoration.

As you go about your "hobgoblins Halloween" remember safety. Children in costumes at night should use reflective tape, etc. and use caution in crossing streets. "Trick or treats" should be inspected carefully by an adult before a child is allowed to eat.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
As Halloween arrives, use pumpkin for delicious, tasty treats.
PUMPKIN PINEAPPLE CAKE

Topping:
Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Melt 1/2 cup butter or margarine in 13x9 inch pan in oven. Remove from oven; stir in 2 cups firmly packed brown sugar, mixing until well-blended. Arrange 1 can (20 oz.) drained pineapple rings and maraschino cherries over brown sugar

mixture.
Cake:
1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar
6 eggs slightly beaten
1 cup wheat germ
1/2 cup plain yogurt
3 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons ground ginger
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1 can (16 oz.) solid pack pumpkin

Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Bled in eggs, wheat germ and yogurt. Mix together four, baking soda, salt and spices; mix well. Alternate additions of dry ingredients and pumpkin, mixing well after each addition. Pour over prepared pineapple mixture. Bake 60 to 65 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 5 minutes; invert on wire rack. Cool. Yields 12 servings.

Peanut growers in Eastland County who did not contract their crop are reaping the benefits of a keen market competition. Because of a short crop in the Southeastern United States, growers are receiving 125 to 150 percent of the government support price.

This is only the second time in 30 years that the Southeast has had a short crop. That area which includes Georgia, Florida, and Alabama usually account for 65 to 70 percent of the total U.S. peanut production.

The short crop in the Southeast was caused by a very dry fall in 1985 and a continuing drought in the winter, spring and summer.

We hope the good market will help a lot of our county growers as they have not had a good production year since 1981.

Winter pastures germinating from recent rains need adequate amounts of plant nutrients to get off to a good start.

Forage producers who planted their winter pastures in dry soil without a fertilizer application should give particular attention to this matter.

Fertilizer applications (topdressings) should be based on soil test recommendations, and there's still time to get soil tested. A soil test can be processed by the Extension Service Soil testing lab at Texas A&M University in three to four days plus mailing times.

With adequate moisture, winter pastures will make good growth over much until about Dec. 1, or the first heavy frost of the season. Providing a topdressing of fertilizer will give them a big

boost along the way.

The Eastland County Pecan Show is scheduled for December 3, 4, and 5 in the Eastland County Courthouse. The show has been moved one day earlier in the week than in past years. Pecans will be entered by 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, December 3. Processing and judging will be done on Thursday and the pecans with awards will be on display all day Friday. This will coincide better with the pecan bake show on Friday. All displays will be taken down after 4:00 p.m. on Friday. In past years the pecans were left on display until noon Saturday.

Anyone who grew pecans in 1986 may put an entry in the show. Each entry must consist of at least 43 nuts and should represent the variety, and be uniform in size and shell color.

Now is the time to collect and dry pecans for the show. Winning entries in the county show will be sent to the Central Texas Regional Show and winners there will be sent to the State Show.

Tri-County Cow-Calf Clinic To Be Wed. Oct. 29

Cattlemen will be given some helpful information at a tri-county cow-calf clinic Wednesday, October 29, in Palo Pinto County. Eastland, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties have the clinic each fall and rotate to a different county each year.

County Agent DeMarquis Gordon says the clinic will be in the Cowboy Sports Arena on Highway 281 between Interstate 20 and Mineral Wells. The indoor arena, located on the West side of the highway is nine miles north of I-20.

Registration begins at 9 a.m. and the first topic on the program will begin at 9:30 a.m. The program ends about 3:45 p.m. with a free lunch at noon, courtesy of sponsors. County Home Economics Agents will have a beef promotion booth. There will be no registration fees for the clinic.

Topic to be discussed for cattlemen include Financial

Aspects of the Cattle Market trends and price outlook, Bull Soundness-Fertility Testing, Newer Diseases of Beef Cattle and Evaluation of Range Bulls.

Harry Holt of Abilene, KRBC, will be moderator. Speakers include Fort Worth Banker Bob Wright; Anne Anderson, Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board in Austin; Jim Gill, Texas Cattle Feeders Association of Amarillo; Bob Woodard, Boca Select Sires, Inc. of Tyler; Dr. Buddy Faries, Extension Veterinarian; and Dr. Steve Hammack, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist.

Little Girl Dies From Illness

Meningitis & Hib Vaccine

A few days ago, on a Tuesday morning, a 2-year old little girl began experiencing a runny nose, sore throat, and low-grade fever. That afternoon her parents took her to the doctor. The doctor diagnosed her condition as meningitis. He put her in the hospital and immediately began giving her medication to combat the disease.

There are several different types or forms of meningitis. Perhaps some may be treated successfully with medications, but in little Jennifer's case, with the type she had the medication didn't help her. Medical specialists said that the doctor in Aspermont and the doctors in Abilene did the right thing and did all they could for her, but the disease acted so quickly, she could not be saved.

Dr. William Oswalt of Eastland has provided us with the following information about the disease of meningitis and the vaccine against the disease. Dr. Oswalt said the vaccine is new. We feel everyone should know about it.

At this time we would also like to thank Sara Neal for calling our office and telling us about the tragedy involving her niece, and enabling us to have the opportunity to tell you about the vaccine.

"Haemophilus influenzae" is a gram-negative coccobacillus which causes a wide variety of clinical diseases in a significant number of persons. Of the typeable and non-typeable strains, Hib is the most virulent and accounts for approximately 95 percent of serious systemic infections due to "H. influenzae" in children. Hib strains account for 5 percent - 10 percent of "H. influenzae" causing otitis media.

An estimated 15,000 - 20,000 cases of invasive disease caused by Hib, including meningitis, epiglottitis, sepsis, cellulitis, septic arthritis, pneumonia, and osteomyelitis, occur annually in the United States. Children under 5 years of age are the major group at risk for Hib disease, although invasive disease has been reported in all age groups. Studies have shown that a child's cumulative risk of developing Hib disease at some time during the first 5 years of life is about 1:200. Thirty-five - 40 percent of Hib disease occurs in children 18 months of age or older, with 25 percent occurring in children 2 years

old or more.

Hib can cause systemic disease among previously healthy children attending nursery school or day care centers, and that attendance at these facilities significantly increases the risk of developing systemic Hib disease. Furthermore, the risk of acquiring systemic Hib disease is up to 400 times that of a child in the general population.

Hib is the leading cause of meningitis in children in the U.S. Although mortality has been reduced by antibiotic therapy to between 5 percent and 10 percent, significant, long-term neurologic sequelae, such as mental retardation, deafness, blindness, and seizure disorders occur in up to a third of survivors. Hib meningitis is regarded as the leading cause of acquired mental retardation in the U.S. Hib is also the major cause of epiglottitis, an infection that can lead to life-threatening airway obstruction and usually occurs between the ages of 2 and 7 years.

Control of disease due to Hib is becoming more difficult because of plasmid-borne resistance to ampicillin and chloramphenicol.

The incidence, morbidity and mortality associated with invasive disease due to Hib, the recognition of its transmissibility, and the emergency of strains of Hib with increased resistance to one or more commonly used antibiotics emphasize the IMPORTANCE OF VACCINE PROPHYLAXIS AGAINST THIS DISEASE IN CHILDREN.

In tests using the vaccine, among children 18 months through 5 years of age, 90 percent protectiveness was demonstrated against all forms of invasive Hib disease for the 4-year follow-up period. Children younger than 18 months of age had little immunologic response to the vaccine and were not protected.

Therefore, a second dose of vaccine may be needed to maintain immunity throughout the period of risk, particularly for those in the youngest age group considered for vaccination, those 18-23 months of age. Studies in children are ongoing to determine the need and timing for revaccination.

Hib vaccine is indicated for immunization against the invasive disease caused by H. influenzae type b in children from 24 months through 5 years of age. Routine revaccination of these children is not recommended at this time.

The younger children may need a second dose of vaccine within 18 months following the initial dose to ensure protection.

Hib vaccine will not protect children younger than 18 months of age and will not protect against H. influenzae other than type b or other microorganisms that cause meningitis or septic disease.

So, to put in all in a 'nutshell', meningitis and other related disease can be deadly to your child, as in was in little Jennifer's case. Protect your child from the regular childhood diseases by having them inoculated against these diseases, which is required before they start to school, but also speak to your family physician or to Dr. Oswalt in Eastland and learn about the Hib vaccine to protect these young children against diseases such as meningitis. For goodness sakes, don't hesitate to call and find out all the information needed to help ward off a dreaded disease such as meningitis.

Thanks again to Sara Neal for sharing her sorrow with us, and thanks to Dr. William Oswalt for providing us with the information we needed on meningitis and the vaccine that is now on the market to prevent this disease.

Lillian Bradshaw and Janelle Shrader were introduced as new members. Ruth Noah of Eastland was a

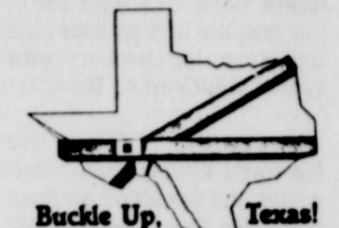
visitor and reported that plans are underway to organize a hospital auxiliary for that city.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE, PART I

Robert Matthews, M.D. High blood pressure, also called hypertension, is a very common malady and often quite dangerous. It kills princes and paupers alike. Franklin Delano Roosevelt suffered from a severe form called malignant hypertension.

crease tremendously. If the heart pumps harder or faster, more volume flows through the system per minute, also causing an increase in blood pressure - unless, of course, the capillaries get larger or dilate at the same allowing the pressure to remain the same. It is not quite as sim-

ple as I have described, but that is the general idea.

In most cases, the cause of high blood pressure remains unknown. There are some rare cases in which there is an underlying cause, such as a kidney disorder, a hormonal imbalance, a tumor, or a narrowing of a major blood vessel. In such cases, treating the underlying cause will usually cure the high blood pressure. In most people, however, treatment controls the pressure but does not cure it. If treatment is stopped, the pressure goes back up. Factors which are thought to contribute to high blood pressure are a family history of high blood pressure, being male, being

a black, smoking, excessive alcohol intake, excessive weight, high salt intake, and stress.

High blood pressure is dangerous for several reasons. It is often referred to as a "silent" disease because it often exhibits no symptoms until it has reached an advanced state. The most lethal result is a stroke - when a small blood vessel in the brain bursts under the pressure, causing bleeding or hemorrhage into the brain itself and subsequent brain damage, often death. Over a period of years, high blood pressure can damage the heart and can lead to kidney disease.



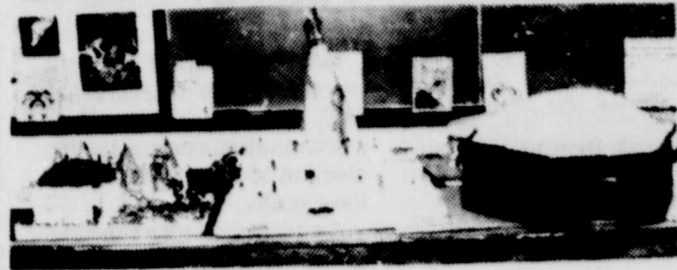

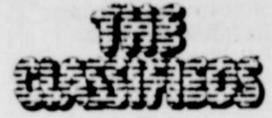

Spanish Gold And Silver In County

By BOB LAMB

Several years ago Texas ranked 8th in the nation in mining, then Shafter & Terlingua mines in the Big Bend were opened and started operating making Texas 5th in mining.

Gold is yellow in color except Telleride of gold such as Cripple Creek, Colorado. It is soft enough in its natural state to be penetrated by a knife or pin. Gold melts at 1064.43 degrees C and boils at 2807 degrees C. It's atomic weight is 196.967, atomic number 79 and density is 19.32 grams per cubic centimeters at 20 degrees C. It takes 12 troy ounces to make a pound. It dissolves in mixture of hydrochloric and nitric acids called aqua regia or use the alkaline cyanide solutions. Sometimes separated by a hot solution of ferric chloride, thiosulfate solutions, mercury or nascent (free) chlorine. It is then allowed to come in contact with metallic zinc to which it adheres and is melted and cast into gold bars. Gold can be man made by a particle accelerator combining lead and mercury, however, the process is too costly to be commercially profitable. Platinum and iridium have been similarly joined and is more valuable than gold.

Gold is rarely found in a pure state, often in combination with copper and silver. Rich deposits of gold is often found in a matrix of rose quartz. Lode gold is so called because it is found in veins in hard rock. Placer gold is where it is washed out of veins or seams and carried by water to streams, bed or sand bars. Most placer gold is mined by suction dredges or rockers. Small amounts may be washed out by panning in water with a gold pan. Most pans are of steel or copper, but plastic pans are very popular and are fairly cheap. The gold in sand is agitated by a circular motion of the pan filled with water and as the lighter sand and gravel is worked over the rim the gold being heavier settles to the bottom. Gold dust is found by panning and sometimes gold nuggets.

Pure gold is yellow, soft, spreadable, beautiful, and 12 troy ounces to the pound but the best part is it sells for \$300 to \$800 a troy ounce depending on the rate of inflation. In fact, there is brisk trading in gold as a hedge against inflation. Flour gold or gold particles as fine as flour that is in trinity sands. Some is located in old creek lake sands at Brock, Tx., in the Leon River near Lake Proctor, and in Sabanna River (Long Branch tributary) between Romney, Tx. and Rising Star, Tx. Flour gold is difficult to process and generally can be collected only by passing gold sands with water over copper plates coated with mercury

(which can absorb over 10 times its weight in gold). This forms a putty like substance called amalgam which heated in a retort where the gold remains and the mercury fumes are collected thru cooler coils and then drops into jars of water to be used again. A word of caution, mercury is poisonous when handled or breathed. Leave mercury to the professionals and live to spend your gold dust poke.

This is a mini-course to introduce you to what gold is. Next week (if you write the editor) we will publish part 2 of 6 parts telling you where many Spanish gold and silver mines in this area are. Happy hunting and don't spent all your gold nuggets in one place.

The youngsters receive

training in assorted fields, including water sports, fine arts, arts and crafts and the like. Counsellors are in charge of small groups and live with during their two weeks at the camp, Miss Ray said.

Miss Ray hopes to be a counsellor at the camp next summer. She said the counselling program is open to interested and qualified young people, age 17 and up.

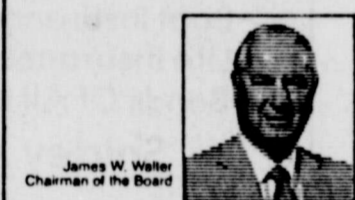

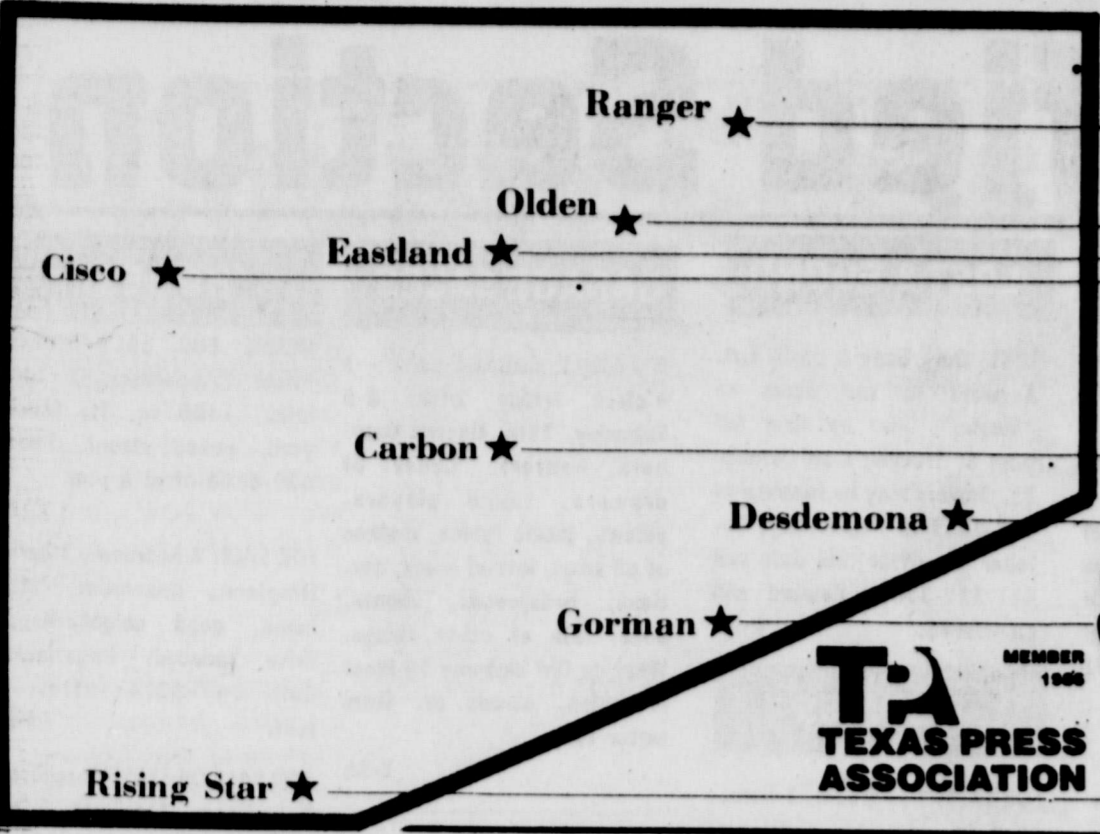

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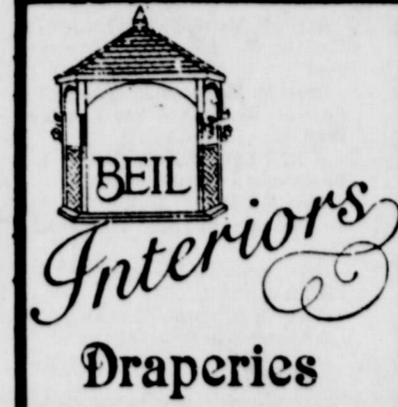
