Polls Open 7 To 7 Tuesday

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at Eastland County's nine voting precincts Tuesday for the General Election. Ballots for Eastland Counties will all be the same down through county surveyor, and generally there's not a lot of contests locally. Of course the state governor's race is the one that will attract the most attention based on the pre-election campaigning. One local race of interest pits Democratic Billy Bacon Jr. and Republican Jammie Fry for the position of Place Four (Clisco) County Commissioner. C.B. Dill did not seek re-election. Norman Christian, Democrat, is unopposed for County Commissioner, Place Two (Ranger) in the Ranger, Desdemona, Olden and Lake Leon boxes. Justices of the Peace in Eastland, Ranger, Rising Star, Clisco and Gorman are unopposed. One state race pits Incumbent State Rep. Jim Parker of Comanche against Republican Challenger Joe Branham of Brownwood in District 65 which includes this county. United States Rep. Charles Stenholm is unopposed as

what effect "no-pass, no-play", teacher competency testing, non-veto of the paramutual wagering bill and other matters will have on the outcome of this election. Eastland County went for Clements in '82; how it will go this year is anybody's guess. On issues, the candidates state: TAXES: White: a broader base for sales taxes; Clements: Texas needs more taxes. Both support a ban on constitutional ban on state income tax. Economic Development: White says his administration has laid the foundation for industrial growth; Clements has a six-point job program. On No-pass, No-Play, White says no retreat and Clements wants to cut the six-out period from six to three weeks. White is against repeal of the seat belt law and Clements wants to repeal it. Both oppose annual legislative sessions. White supports election public utility commission and Clements opposes. White opposes state lottery and Clements supports it with state and local referendum. White says he'll vote on 1987 referendum on paramutual gambling and Clements won't comment. LAND COMMISSIONER Incumbent Democrat Garry Mauro is expecting his Republican opponent M.D. Anderson Jr. to get votes on his name. Anderson (no connection with the medical center) owns a construction company and a nightclub. Incumbent Bill Hobby is opposed by Republican David Davidson; Bob Bullock has a Libertarian opponent; and State Attorney General Jim Maddox is opposed by Republican Roy R. Barrera Jr.; John Sharp and Milton Fox seek the railroad commission position; and Jim Hightower is opposed by Republican Bill Powers. STATE SUPREME COURT The four state supreme court justice slots each have contests for the six-year, \$78,795 salary, as one of the nine members of the state's highest civil appeals court. Four Democrats, three of them incumbents, are battling three Republicans and a Libertarian for seats on the Texas Supreme Court in the Nov. 4 election. In Place 1, state Sen. Oscar H. Mauzy, a Dallas Democrat, faces Republican Charles Ben Howell, a Dallas appeals court judge. In Place 2, Justice Robert M. Campbell, a Democrat, opposes Republican Nathan E. White Jr., a lawyer from Plano. In Place 3, Democratic Justice Jim Wallace faces Libertarian Wiley H. Rawlins, a Dallas lawyer. In Place 4, Justice Raul Gonzales, a Democrat, is challenged by Republican John Bates, a Waco lawyer. Only four of nine seats on the Supreme Court, Texas' highest civil court, are up for election this year. The Supreme Court race that has attracted the most attention is in Place 4, where Gonzales, appointed in 1984 by Gov. Mark White, is trying to win election to the post. Gonzales, 46, could become the first Hispanic elected to statewide office.

County Budget For Fiscal Year

County officials have set a budget of more than \$2.8 million for the fiscal year 1986-87. This was finalized during several working sessions, with a few details discussed during the regular meetings. This budget is slightly above the budget for the previous year, according to reports from County Judge Scott Bailey. The county spent \$2,718,276.37 in all its operations for the fiscal year 1985-86. The 1986-87 budget is reported to be a balanced one, with an income of \$1,237,362 projected from county taxes. This will come from a tax rate of 22.949 per \$100 valuation, an increase of more than 1.8 from last year. Other county revenue to meet the almost \$3 million budget is expected to total around \$1,763,838.70. This is projected from licenses and permits, intergovernmental revenue, fines, and forfeitures, etc. The new budget includes a 3 percent across-the-board pay raise for all county employees. In addition, salary adjustments have been made for some employees. Each County Commissioner's salary has been raised from around \$17,500 annually to approximately \$20,000 annually - up to the same general amount as that of the other elected officials. A new item on the county budget is the Indigent Health Care Plan. This is projected as costing \$47,560 for the year, but most officials indicate they do not know whether this will be enough. The county also continues to pay \$138,935 annually on the jail, with \$435,000 still owed.

RANGER The Texas Department of Community Affairs notified Mayor Raymond Hart this week that Rangef will receive a \$300,000 grant for housing rehabilitation. This is the maximum award possible, and funds will be channeled to owner-occupied dwellings. Guidelines will be set up soon, and money should be available in about two months, Hart said. Local contractors will be given hiring priorities for the work. This is the third, Grant Ranger has received over the past three years under the leadership of Mayor Hart. The other two Grants were for a total of \$500,000, and were used to upgrade the town's water systems. Ranger City Commissioners and the Mayor are attempting to solve some of the financial problems of the town. The loss of Revenue Sharing, the decrease in sales tax money and the drop in oil prices has hurt the city's income. Officials are discussing ways to cut down city employee insurance costs, and other measures to reach a sound financial footing. The city now pays 100 percent of the employees insurance, or a little over \$98 per month per employee - approximately \$2,600 per month. Ranger is celebrating Halloween this weekend, the traditional date. Kids will be "Trick or Treating" Saturday night, Nov. 1, and the Band Boosters will have a carnival at the old gym on South Marston St. There will be a lot of games, food and a Spook House at the Carnival - come out and have some fun! EASTLAND In conjunction with WFAA TV in Dallas, Stacy Balir has been awarded the Texas Sesquicentennial "Spirit of Texas" award. Homemaking Hints

November brings the start of the holiday. Parties and dinner are on everyone's calendars.

Selecting the "perfect" ham for your holiday dinner can require some careful label reading.

Variations in the moisture content, style, cut and brand of ham can affect its price and the quality of the product you put on the table. But these variations are clearly stated on the label so consumers can compare features and costs.

The first choice you have to make is between a fully cooked or a cooked-before-eating ham. The two types of hams are processed for different amounts of time, but both are pre-cooked long enough to make them safe to eat.

Fully cooked hams offer convenience since they can be eaten as is, or baked for about ten minutes per pound. Smoked or cured hams require further cooking to develop desired flavor and tenderness, usually 18 to 20 minutes per pound for whole hams.

Fully cooked and cooked-before-eating hams contain equal amounts of moisture at the end of processing, but usually differ in moisture content by the time they are served.

Ham that contains no more moisture after processing than before, is labeled "cured smoked" or "fully cooked" with no further qualifying statement on the label.

Because cured or smoke hams require additional home cooking their moisture

content at serving time is lower than fully cooked hams. This means that meat will be somewhat denser and less juicy.

The "water added" statement on fully cooked hams is there to call attention to the amount, rather than the presence of water.

If more moisture is added to ham than is removed during processing, the label must carry the words, "water added". Even then, the weight of the finished product cannot exceed the weight of the fresh ham by more than 10 percent.

The choice of a bone-in or boneless ham has a great affect on yield. In a semi-boneless ham, bone is removed to the joint at each end of the ham, leaving only the long bone in the center. These hams yield 4-5 servings to the pound.

Boneless hams may be purchased in a wrapper or in a can. Wrapped boneless hams have about 5 servings to the pound; but canned hams yield only 4 because the net weight includes the congealed juices in which the ham was packed.

Shank or butt portion hams are often not the good value they appear to be because they are ham ends with center cuts removed, but an estimate of two and one-half serving per pound is usual for shank or butt hams with bone.

Medical Perspectives

High Blood Pressure-Part 2

I discussed the causes and the dangers of high blood pressure in last week's article. Today, I will discuss the treatment of high blood pressure. Blood pressure should be measured regularly by someone trained in the procedure. The higher or upper number is the systolic pressure, the pressure at the moment the heart pumps. The second or lower number is the pressure between beats, when the heart is resting or the diastolic pressure. When your pressure reaches a certain level, based on several measurements over a period of time, your physician may recommend treatment. He or she may advise you to stop smoking, decrease your

alcohol intake, lose weight or decrease your salt intake. If these measures are not sufficient to control the blood pressure, medication may be needed. There are numerous blood pressure medications to choose from. Some cause the heart to slow or pump less forcefully. Others cause the miles of capillaries to dilate. Still others may decrease the amount of adrenalin in the system. Diuretics, or fluid pills, draw water out of the blood vessels. Some people will have to take several medications. In any case, your physician will arrive over a period of time at a combination suited to your needs. All medications have potential side effects, but these can usually be minimized with the drugs which are now available.

OATMEAL PIE

(Just like pecan pie)

1 - 9-inch pie crust
3/4 cup brown sugar
3/4 cup white syrup
1/4 cup shortening, melted
1 teaspoon vanilla
3/4 cup rolled oats or oatmeal
1/3 cup coconut (optional)
2 eggs
Mix eggs and beat until foamy. Gradually add sugar. Stir in remaining ingredients. Mix well. Pour into unbaked pie crust. Bake in pre-heated oven (350 degrees F) about 45 minutes or until center of pie is firm. Serve with whipped topping if desired.

Some medications will cause dizziness as the blood pressure is falling or may cause the heart to beat faster. Some cause retention of fluid and so are often given in combination with diuretic. Drugs which slow the heart rate may cause one to feel less energetic. Others may affect the sexual drive or cause a mild depression. Some diuretics will drain potassium from the body, making it necessary for the person to take a potassium supplement. A blood potassium level will have to be checked from time to time. Some may cause a rapid increase in blood

Fighting Crime In Eastland County

Frustrations in the battle against crime is shared equally between the public, law enforcement, and prosecuting attorneys. One of those frustrations is the so-called "revolving door" process by which arrested offenders post bail and are free until their guilt or innocence is established by a court of law, and due to overburdened court dockets and continuances granted defense attorneys, the offenders freedom may be prolonged. When the authors of our Constitution guaranteed the accused a speedy trial, they sought to ensure swift vengeance for the victim as well, but with the Federal Courts' obsession for the rights of criminals the rights of victims have been lost.

Plea bargaining is often maligned but just as often misunderstood. Again, the rigidly enforced rights of the accused often places the prosecuting attorney and the jurors at a disadvantage.

pressure if the medication is suddenly stopped. If you experience any adverse effect from a medication, contact your physician before you stop taking it.

Again blood pressure is a silent killer. Have your blood pressure checked regularly. Take the medications your doctor prescribes regularly and change your lifestyle accordingly. Blood pressure will not be adequately controlled if the pills are taken when one "feels like" his/her pressure is up. Take them as directed, and inform your physician if you experience side effects from a medication.

Many times, evidence of guilt against the accused is ruled inadmissible during the trial which makes conviction by jury a decided gamble with the odds in favor of the defendant. In some, if not most instances, plea bargaining exacts some form of punishment, and even with probation, the door is still open to confinement in prison if the conditions of parole are broken, whereas an innocent verdict by a jury exempts the guilty of any further prosecution, and even a guilty verdict is often appealed and the verdict reversed, requiring a new trial which is costly to the public in terms of public funds. This "one bird in the hand" process is another by-product of a justice system gone awry.

Over crowding in our prisons also play a major role in dispensing penalties in the form of parole, particularly for first offenders. Another example of judicial prejudice in that the welfare of criminals is paramount and therefore given priority over the welfare of society. Then Federal Judge Wayne Justice adds insult to injury by demanding that the citizens of our state spend a few million extra tax dollars to underwrite this preferential treatment.

The most sobering and alarming aspect of crime is the effort to condition and encourage people to submit or surrender to criminals rather than resist, even to the extent that if force is used to protect ourselves or our property, we are subject to felony charges. This is scary.

For the past three decades, the osmosis of

power from the Legislative branch our Federal government to the Judicial branch has tipped the balance of power contrary to the stipulations in the preamble to our Constitution.

Federal judges presume to wear the robes of dictatorship rather than the robes of justice, and without the advice and consent of the governed, but with the timid acquiescence of the Legislative branch who willingly shift the responsibility

of decision making to others. Efforts to reduce the crime rate in Eastland County alone will be no more successful than attempts to rid an acre of land from Johnson grass and careless weeds when the surrounding sections of farmland are rife with growth that is being fertilized and irrigated by judicial order.

This time we have to start at the top in order to solve a problem.

The thought of cuts in social services is frightening to those who are dependent on them. Those who are unemployed need these services; yet, the monies that pay for these services come from the employed and there are fewer of us. We increase taxes on those who are working to support those who are not. How long can we do this?

I feel our problem can be solved with the creation of more jobs. We are going to have higher taxes. The loss of oil revenue will force this increase.

Our state is blessed with all of the basic needs for industrial development. We have land, labor, utilities and supporting businesses and services. We have the right to work law and no state income tax.

What we are lacking is a good incentive program for industry to relocate to Texas and expand industrial opportunities within our state. Programs that include tax incentives for relocation, cooperation from local industrial development committees and local businesses that help support industry.

We have a Texas economic development board in our state. Is it working? Have they helped local areas like ours? Have you ever heard of this group? I think not. You heard of our local group who work diligently to help our local economy by luring business to our area. But not the much needed help and backing of our state.

Our present governor has no experience in this field of basic need. He has never had to meet a payroll; he has never had to search for customers; he has never had to work within a budget; he has never had to work with local, state and federal agencies which dictate our every move. Only a business owner and operator knows the problems involved in making a profit.

Business owners cannot raise the price of their product or services in competitive market. Only

governments can increase their intake of monies by raising taxes. When a business owner has a problem he has to solve it with hard work and within the budget he has. He cannot increase taxes and throw it at the problem.

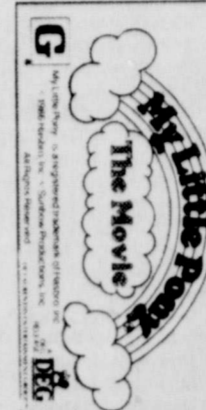

Branham urged all voters to turn out for Tuesday's election and "send a conservative voice to Austin."

"Over half the State Legislature is made up of lawyers," he remarked. "Isn't it time some other segment of society got a voice?"

The white man arrested is a suspect in two other Brookhollow home robberies on Oct. 10 and Oct. 29, Becker said.

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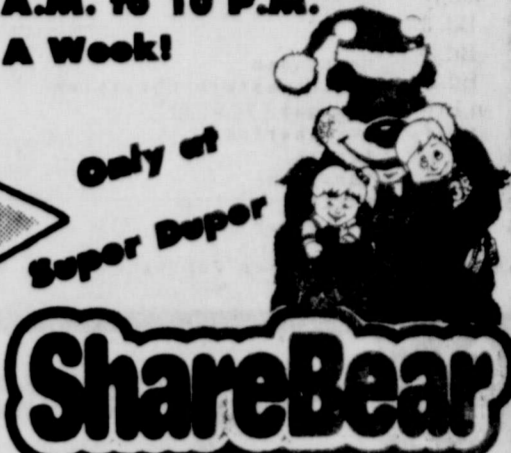
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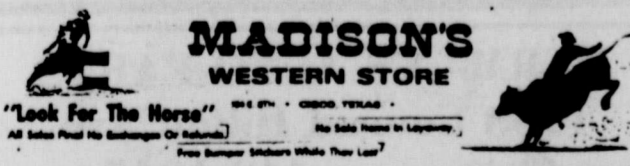

All of Eastland could have had scrambled eggs for breakfast last Sunday morning if the broken eggshells around the square and along the side streets were reliable indicators.

The kids had a great time throwing the eggs at each other, but they didn't come around the next morning to clean up the mess they made. Nor did their parents. They rely on blissful anonymity to protect themselves, "everybody does it."

No, everybody doesn't. But the cleaning up is not really what I want to comment on here—cleaning up is a way of life. It doesn't matter whether it's eggshells or paper cups, though the contents of the shells are stickier and stinkier than the contents of the cups. Usually, the waste inherent in the egg-throwing is part of what concerns me. Egg cartons were in that Sunday morning litter, too; fresh eggs, bought with no other purpose than to waste them.

Fun? I hadn't considered "fun" as a good reason to ruin food that some people, even closer than those starving children your mother used to persuade you to eat your spinach, would appreciate on their dining tables, if they have tables.

This kind of activity perpetuates the sick humor of Halloween which is the worst aspect of the event. There is a weird reasoning—a reasoning which scares me—behind the publication of the offer to bring your Halloween loot by "Blank St. Station" to have it X-rayed for dangerous objects. The local PTO Carnival at Siebert Elementary School is a safety valve for the small fry. Not all communities make the effort Eastland does.

What about the older youngsters? The egg-throwers and the chauffeurs of the egg-throwers and tossers of water-filled balloons? When vehicles are involved, danger increases—well, no used beating a dead horse.

My question is: Why isn't the destructive energy channeled elsewhere? Obviously, the effort made to provide an outlet for our teenagers is not enough.

Egg shampoos are highly touted for promoting shiny locks but not necessarily at midnight with bits of shell clinging to the hair, too.

It is doubtful if anyone has found broken eggs beneficial to the welfare of cashmere sweaters or designer jeans. Certainly, a carwash is in order before Daddy sees eggs-actly what happened to the vehicle Junior was tooling the night before...though I don't for one minute think Junior sneaked the wheels.

Adults must cooperate with almost-adults to find a

satisfactory solution. It is my feeling that youngsters must come up with the answer to satisfy all of them, except the malcontents, of course.

There is no use expecting an adult-only plan to work. Our perspectives are different. They're supposed to be. "It" must be worked out and worked on by the teenagers who participate in the result. Adults should act as balance wheels in the interest of saving time, energy and money. Adults must be cooperators; not dictators.

If you still see your fifteen-year-old as five, swap working on teenage interests with another parent. You may be surprised to discover how intelligent today's youngsters are.

I am reasonably sure that running a street sweeper to clean up eggshells and litter does not constitute a satisfactory solution for anyone.

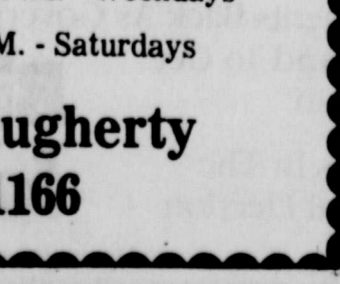
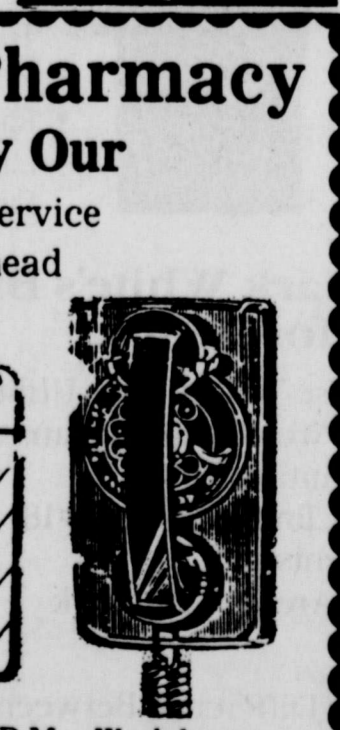
