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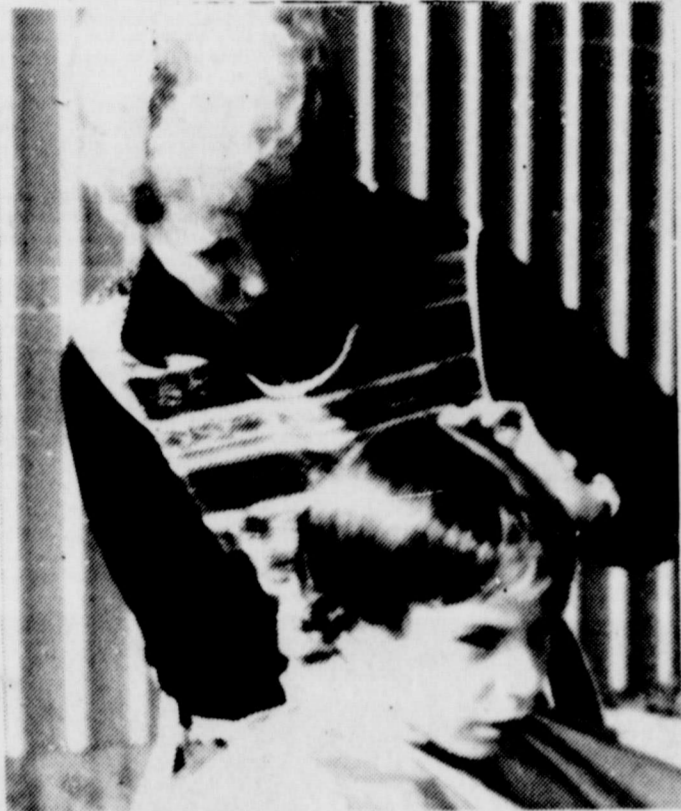

Arraignment For Joe Perry Postponed By Judge Wright

Arraignment of Joe Thomas Perry, 46, on charges in the Garcia Murder Case were postponed by Judge Jim Wright in 91st District Court last Wednesday after Perry requested the court to appoint an attorney to represent him.

Perry certified that he was without funds to employ an attorney. Judge Wright was expected to appoint an attorney soon and a new date for the arraignment will be set, officials reported.

After the arraignment, Judge Wright is expected to set bond for Perry, who is being held in the county jail. He was returned to Eastland County last Monday from Boston, Mass., where he was arrested on a fugitive warrant some two months ago.

Many miscellaneous items including clothes, kitchen

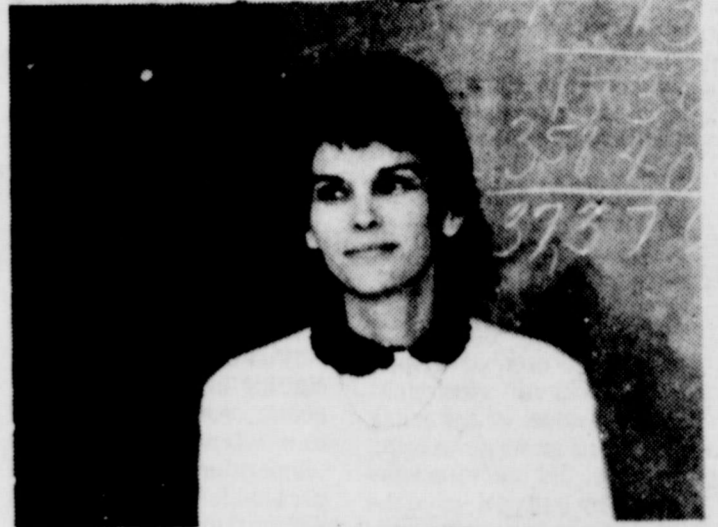

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Homemaking Hints

Thanksgiving is fast approaching. The traditional food served at Thanksgiving is that all-time favorite bird...TURKEY!

Turkey isn't a hazardous food, but what the cook does or doesn't do to the bird can literally make you sick.

Like all protein foods, turkey can harbor food poisoning bacteria, such as salmonella. Because it's a large, dense food that requires several steps in preparation, bacteria have even more opportunity to grow if proper precautions aren't taken.

While food-borne illnesses are rarely fatal, they can cause unpleasant symptoms that can last for several hours or even days. Medical doctors estimate that a high percentage of symptoms attributed to over-eating or flu are actually food-borne illness.

Here are some safety precautions:

*Thaw the turkey in the refrigerator as recommended on the package directions. Thawing the bird in a microwave oven or by putting it in a watertight package under cold running water are also safe thawing methods. But don't thaw the turkey by letting it sit on the kitchen counter, since room temperatures allow bacteria to grow.

*Should your plans change

after the turkey is partially thawed, it may be refrozen if it has not been held more than 1 to 2 days in the refrigerator. Place it directly on the floor of the freezer so that bird will refreeze as rapidly as possible.

While this is a safe practice, the quality of the turkey will decline.

*Do not partially cook turkey one day and complete the cooking the next day. This will not shorten the cooking time as it takes just as long the second day to bring the internal temperature up to the recommended point as it does to cook the turkey initially. Furthermore, bacteria may multiply in the stuffing using such a roasting method.

*Wash the defrosted turkey thoroughly, running water over its inside and outside areas. Drain the body cavity and wipe the turkey fairly dry.

*Stuff the turkey right before you cook it. Warm, moist dressing is an ideal medium in which bacteria can grow.

*You can prepare the dry stuffing ingredients the day before, cover them tightly and leave at room temperature. But keep the perishable ingredients such as butter, mushrooms, oysters, cooked celery, onions and broth in the refrigerator. Then combine

ingredients just before stuffing the turkey.

*Cook the turkey in a 325 degree oven. Cooking in a very slow oven at 200 to 250 degrees is not recommended. Because of the low temperature, the turkey and stuffing could take more than 4 hours to reach a high enough temperature to destroy bacteria which is 180 degrees.

*Once the turkey is completely cooked, remove all the stuffing from the cavities. Also after dinner, refrigerate the turkey and stuffing immediately. Food poisoning bacteria can grow quickly in high protein food left at room temperature.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

After Thanksgiving and you have left over turkey, there are many different dishes you can prepare with the turkey. Here is a good one!

TURKEY TACO PIE

4 cups diced turkey
1 can enchilada sauce
1 can mushroom soup
1 large onion, chopped
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
Dash pepper
11 ounce package corn chips
1 cup grated cheese
1 cup chicken/turkey broth

Combine chicken, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup, onion, garlic salt and pepper. Grease a 2 quart baking dish and line with corn chips. Add chicken mixture, sprinkle with grated cheese and cover with corn chips. Pour 1 cup chicken broth over mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serves 6. This dish freezes well. If frozen, bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

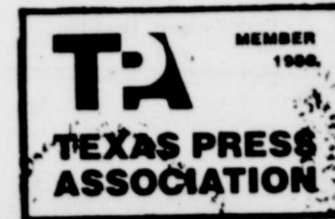

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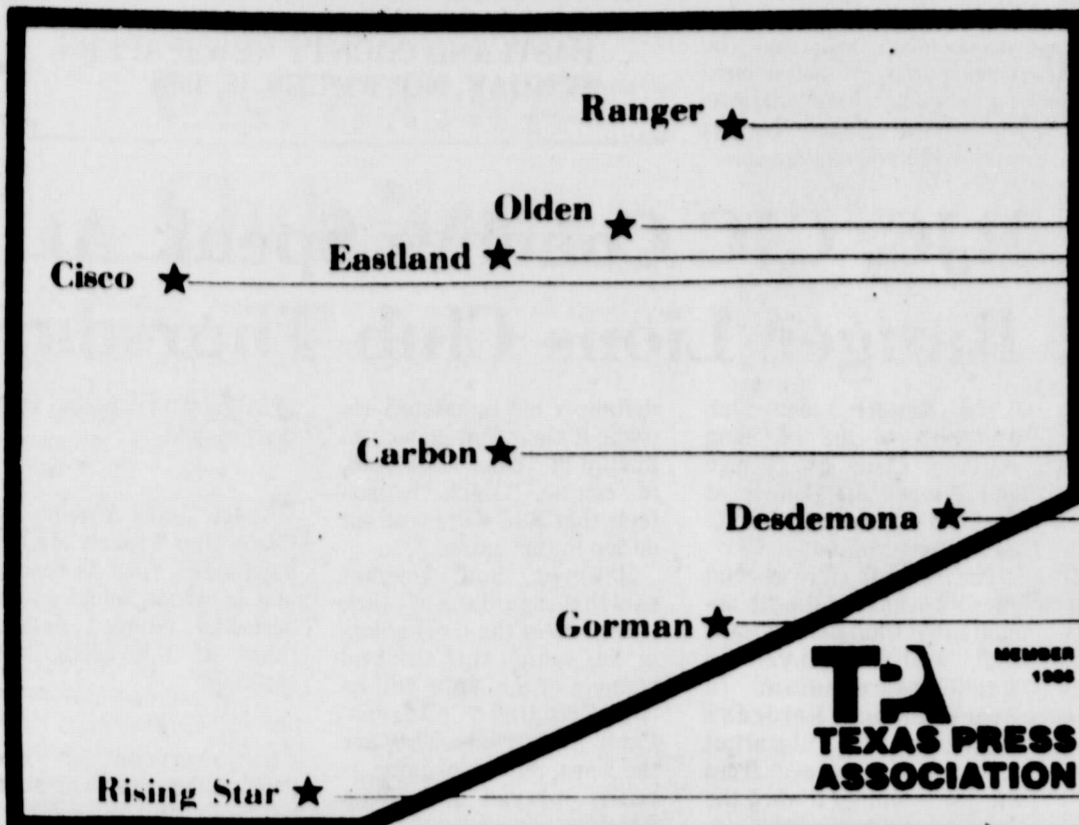

Area News Briefs

BAIRD
The Directors of the First National Bank of Baird have appointed Sammy Edington as the new President and Chief Executive Officer. He assumes the duties previously handled by Fred Goble, who will step into the position of Vice Chairman of the Board of Director and Bank Officer. Goble has been with the Bank since Aug. 7, 1947. He became President in 1973. The new President, Edington, is a Coleman County native who presently resides in Abilene. He attended Cisco Junior College, Central Texas Commercial College, and has taken short courses at Texas A&M University. He has 19 years experience in banking and credit institutions.

The City of Baird will soon receive a federal grant for \$180,000 through the Texas Economic Development Committee. The City will then make a Small Business Loan to Grumpe's Specialties to build a candy factory on the corner lot in the second block of Market Street. The factory is expected to be in operation within two years, with approx. 24 full-time employees.

RANGER
In cost-cutting efforts, Ranger City Commissioners have voted to stop paying city employees insurance costs, which is approx. \$2700 per month. The employees were given the chance to either pay the insurance themselves or drop it. At the last meeting the subject of asking employees of retireable age to retire was again brought before the Commissioners. The subject of Police Chief J.C. Rose retiring was tabled until the next meeting. Mayor Hart insisted that Ranger needs a Chief of Police, but the Commissioners decided to cut Rose to a four-day work week during December. Ranger Fire Department's two paid employees will go on straight time, with no overtime pay allowed.

In the meeting this week Ranger City Commissioners also discussed the contract and usage of water supplied to Staff and Morton Valley. Commissioner Schooling said that Morton Valley does not exceed the amount of water designated in their contract, but that the Staff community does exceed the limit designated in 1972. Staff's contract calls for \$1,250,000 gallons of water, with rates to continue for water used above the contract amount.

Julia Worthy, local journalist, has been notified that she won First Place in the Thriller (Mystery Story) category of the Johnson County Creative Writer's Contest, held recently in Cleburne.

Her 1600-word story, "Writer's Block", was chosen from a number of entries received from across the southwest.

Winning contests is nothing new for Mrs. Worthy. She has won places for articles, short stories and poetry in various other competitions.

She began writing columns for the Waco Citizen while living in that city, and has written for The Eastland County Newspapers since moving to Eastland.

The Eastland County Pecan Show is scheduled for December 4 and 5 in the Eastland County Courthouse Lobby. This will be the 34th consecutive pecan show in the county, reports Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The show is sponsored by grower's association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Any pecan grower in the area may submit entries to the show. No entry limit per exhibitor is made, but participants are limited to one entry of each named variety

they grow. The grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he wishes. The exhibitor must be the grower.

A minimum of 43 pecans are necessary for each entry. This sample of 43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. Mixed samples - more than one variety in an entry - are disqualified.

The grower may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement.

A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one choctaw entry.

Nuts should be free of dust, dirt, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed to the extent that shape or color is altered.

Discolored shells and kernels may result from peeling pecans from the shucks too early. Pecans must be from 1986 crop and are judged on the basis of size (number per pound), appearance, and shell color.

Kernel quality is also important and is based on percent kernel, color, general appearance, texture and taste.

All entries of nuts must be entered by 4 p.m. Wednesday, December 3. They may be sent or left at the County Agent's office in Eastland prior to December 3.

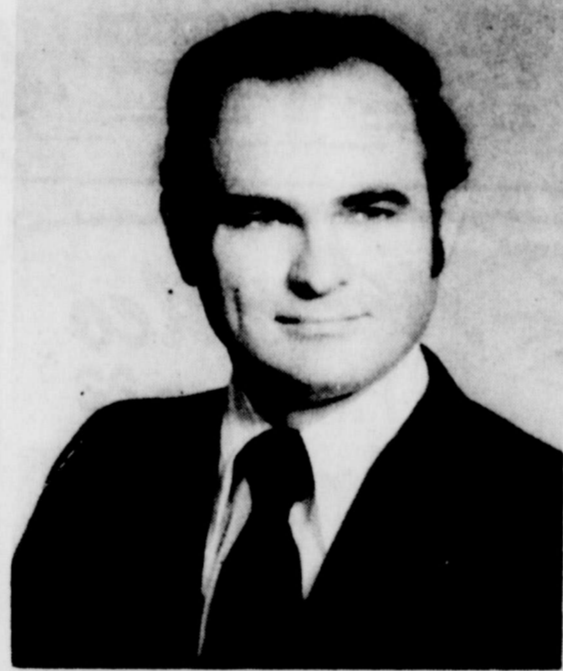
The first place entries will be sent to the Regional Pecan Show. Entries not winning first place will be sold to pay expenses for the show.

The pecan crop is small this year, but the quality is very good according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

Walker said there will be a class for every variety provided there are at least two entries in that class. There will be a class for the small pecans, native pecans, seedlings, as well as all variety. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion-in-shell shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded for reserve champions and the first three place ribbons will be given in each class.

Recognized as the oldest woman exhibitor was Mrs. Lillie Hill of Ranger. The oldest man exhibitor was Mr. David B. Allsup, of Ranger. Special recognition was also given to the oldest

man and woman in attendance. Receiving this honor was Mr. Clyde Campbell, of Eastland, and Mrs. Essie Glenn of Cisco.

The Bazaar was co-sponsored by the Eastland County Extension Service and the Eastland National Bank provided corsages for honorees and rental fees for building.

Courthouse Repairs, Sales Tax Raise Are Main Topic

Discussions ranged over a wide variety of topics at the Eastland County Commissioners meeting November 10. Two of the main items concerned a report on the courthouse on structural engineer Terry Crozier, and the possibility that the County will levy a 1/2 cent sales tax raise for "Ad Valorem Property Tax Relief".

Crozier stressed that the Courthouse is basically sound, an "almost irreplaceable building". But there is a problem with shifting on the west side of the building, and he believes the difficulty lies with the shallow foundation. The existing foundation will need to be underpinned - an operation that is estimated to cost in the vicinity of \$100,000.

The damages from the May 24, 1985 blast was also considered.

After listening to all these reports and evaluating them, a state of emergency on repairs to the Courthouse was declared by the Commissioners. At the Commissioners meeting on November 24, the Court will discuss how to proceed with these repairs and how to pay for them. Cracks in the walls of the County Agents office have already been repaired, and those in the County Auditor's office are being worked on.

County Judge Scott Bailey reported that he had been handed a Resolution voted on at the Eastland County Farm Bureau Convention October 4.

TAXES: Eastland County Farm Bureau supports the idea that the County road and Bridge Taxes be used only for road and bridge maintenance. These funds should not be transferred to other accounts or used for other purposes.

The Farm Bureau organization has a membership of approximately 2200 farm families in Eastland County, the Judge said.

He also reported that he had been told that many farm people are displeased with the amount of taxes being levied on their property, and feel that they are paying more than their fair share.

This remark led to a discussion of the "Ad Valorem Property Tax Relief", whereby the County

would levy a 1/2 cent raise in sales taxes, and use this sales tax revenue to replace property tax revenue. State Comptroller Bob Bullock would collect the tax and return the money to the county.

The last session of the Texas Legislature made it legal for the county to raise the local sales taxes by 1/2 cents, provided a referendum was held and the voters

approved. The law goes into effect Jan. 1.

One commissioner said "When the time comes we should call an election on this."

The general opinion was that the referendum on this tax increase should be held in April rather than January. The matter will be under discussion at future Commissioner Court sessions.

Fishing Outdoors

When the name Bomber is spoken in fishing circles two things come to mind. Quality lures and Floyd Mabry.

Bomber Bait Company first came on the fishing scene around 1942, with the original Bomber. Today the Model A has become a necessity in every anglers tacklebox. With a slim, trim, fast wiggle body style and a little deeper diving Bomber has added a molded bill to body design, for extra strength and to insure freedom of operation. The Mag A is a full 3/4 oz. bait which makes for good long casts. After all you can't get deep if you don't get the bait out the needed distance. Gibbons Creek, black bass mostly within the slot or smaller, two keepers for week 10-10 and 6-8 on purple worms, crappie real good, catfish good to 2 pounds on rod and reel.

Lake Whitney, black bass fair to 5 1/4 pounds several 5's

on spinners, striper good to 16 pounds on slabs and shiners, crappie fair, some to 20 fish per string 1 1/4 pounds on minnows, white bass good to 300 fish per string to 3 pounds on slabs, catfish slow.

Lake Fork, black bass slow, crappie fantastic with limits in less than 90 minutes on minnows, to 3 pounds, catfish good to 8 pounds on trotline using shrimp.

Lake Monticello, black bass good to 9 1/2 pounds on black plastic worms, crappie fair, catfish very good to 8 pounds on Canadian crawlers.

Toledo Bend, black bass fair to 4 pounds on spinners, buzz baits and red worms with gold fleck, striper slow, crappie good, limits on shiners in 12-15 feet of water, white bass slow, catfish fair on live bait.

Lake Spence, black bass slow, striper fair to 14 pounds on live perch, white bass fair, crappie slow, catfish fair to 3 pounds.

Mr. Webb has recruited some 15 local Lions to help run the food concession at the game. He asked workers to be in the stadium at 5:30 to help get ready to sell food.

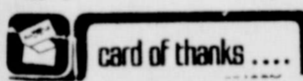
CHS To Begin Basketball Season Tuesday

"The Glass Fly..." If I didn't read so much, I'd have more time for writing. Admitted. But let me tell you about a book I just read.

"The Glass Fly" is the title for a collection of short stories by Rowena Autry Motoret, and one of the stories is about a glass fly.

Rowena is Viola Autry Payne's sister, and this series of stories is about their growing up in western Texas in The Big Depression years.

Barney and Susan Bozeman Autry had five children to bring up on a cotton farm on the lines of Mitchell and Scurry Counties. You know what kind of rainfall we average around Eastland. My father admitted to being a "dry-land farmer" over in Shackelford County, and the Ballards had a pretty fair season compared with the Autrys.

Viola and I have compared notes on the similarities in our lives even before I read Rowena's book: Born the same year, first child in each family, grew up on farms, valedictorians of our graduating classes, and both fascinated with the process of filling up blank pages of paper.

Both our fathers practiced diversified farming and ranching and were about equally resentful and critical—not to say suspicious—of any government intervention in what they considered private matters.

All of us chopped cotton, and Rowena tells how they made their money for school clothes and expenses by picking cotton. That left me out, though I tried to pick cotton...once. As Papa really wanted to get the crop out to begin some time that year, he gently shunted me into other activities—even as he found something besides milking for me to do when it was time to go to the cowpen.

Rowena's stories, written first for children and grandchildren, range from fields through school days in Texas and New Mexico, war-time employment and marriages. They are true tales.

However, Rowena says that memories of the other offspring of Barney and Susan often differ in evaluations of different memory-makers. Viewpoints do differ for all of us. Maybe that's

The viewer will make four stops with the courier: to a father and son team who have been tempered in the fiery crucible of arrest and harassment and now serve as key contacts for UE; to deliver aid to a Christian family man who has been

denied a work permit because of his Christian activities; to a believing mother of six who has been forced to raise her children in a boxcar since her husband died in the course of Christian service; and to a Christian brother who has spent two years in prison for exercising his gift of evangelism.

During the course of the trip, the Underground Evangelism courier explains the nature of the Russian church, carefully distinguishing the differences between the official and the underground churches.

The viewer finds his heart broken repeatedly during the several visits but each time finds it spiritually healed as the victims of persecution express their gratitude.

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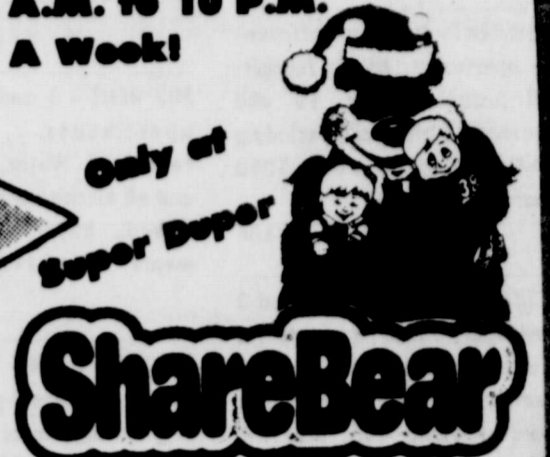

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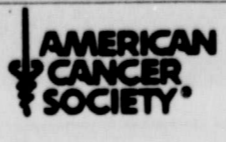

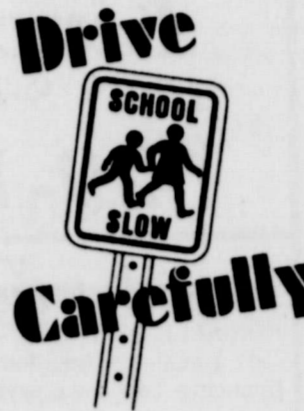

Yet some people have spent life-time savings for a farm or city property with little or no thought about the title. Of course, they will learn better later, but why not avoid the pitfalls and expense of poor judgement by getting an abstract or title policy first and buying the property later.

During the past four years he has traveled many times into South American to minister, which included crusade preaching up the coast starting at Sao Paulo, north to Rio de Janeiro and way on up north to Victoria.

The past months his international invitations were into Fiji of the South Pacific where he taught "faith ministry" to the ministers of several of the South Pacific islands; Zimbabwe, Africa, where he preached a camp meeting, was speaker at several graduation exercises for Bible colleges, and "taught ministers the principles of faith."

His 1987 international preaching schedule is at present: National Conference speaker for churches in communist Burma (near China-India border) in February; Zimbabwe, Africa, again; Fiji and other South Pacific islands again, and Italy for a

conference as speaker. The pastor says, "It looks as if, with national invitations already accepted, 1987 will be my most involved year of ministry to this date, without question." The international travels will take him literally around the world this year, a circle from Cisco east to west.

In the Amazon jungle he will be preaching "faith and miracle services" as well as spending time among the remote Indians of the jungle. The International Ministry is one of "faith" with support coming from people of various religious backgrounds, and not limited to our local area.

The Cisco Post Office box of 269 has had several surprises and has been a "door of faith" for support of these travels to help those beyond our border, according to the pastor, who stated, "It seems that people like to support some person they know, and know where their money is going rather than some person they have never personally met and personally don't know the work being done."

Medical Perspectives

PEPTIC ULCER DISEASE

Peptic ulcer refers to a crater-like sore in the lining of the stomach or the duodenum, which is the first part of the small intestine. The word peptic refers to pepsin, one of the digestive enzymes produced in the stomach. Ulcers, however, are actually thought to be caused by an excess of stomach acid or by a defective mucous membrane lining.

Ulcers typically produce a gnawing type of pain in the upper abdomen which is usually worse when the stomach is empty, often two to three hours after a meal or during the night. This pain may be confused with the pain of ordinary indigestion (heartburn) or reflux, where the stomach contents are regurgitated back into the esophagus. This is a common problem, especially in those who have a hiatal hernia—where the upper portion of the stomach pokes up into the chest, alongside the esophagus. The pain of an ulcer is often more intense and persistent than this and not as well relieved by antacids and other medications.

Ulcers can result in a number of serious complications. The ulcer can erode into a blood vessel, resulting in the vomiting of blood or the passage of blood in the stool. Blood in the stool may be bright red or may appear black and tarry if it is partially digested. An ulcer can also bore a hole in the wall of the stomach or duodenum and spill the contents into the abdominal cavity. This would result in rather sudden severe pain. Ulcers can

result in scarring and the duodenum. This will cause the stomach contents to back up, leading to distention and vomiting.

Ulcers will ordinarily heal on their own eventually, but the healing process can often be hastened by medications. The medications are used to either neutralize acid (antacids), to inhibit acid secretions (Tagamet, Zantac) or to provide a protective coating over the ulcer

(Carafate). These all work rather well and usually speed the ulcer healing to 3-4 weeks. Many of these medications can now be taken as a single night-time dose and with minimal side effects. After the ulcer has healed, a smaller dose of the medication will often be prescribed as an attempt to prevent recurrence of the ulcer. Tagamet and similar drugs should not be used for mere indigestion - liquid antacids such as Maalox and Mylanta will often work much more quickly, since they neutralize the acid juices immediately. Antacids may provide some relief while waiting for an ulcer to heal but should not be taken at the same time of day as Tagmet.

Smoking, drinking alcohol and taking aspirin and similar anti-inflammatory

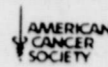
drugs can make one more prone to develop an ulcer. These things should be avoided if a person has an ulcer or severe indigestion. Dietary factors are not thought to be nearly as important as they once were, but one should avoid foods that cause pain. If you experience unremitting abdominal pain, persistent vomiting, rectal bleeding, black tarry stools or vomiting of blood, you should see your physician immediately. There are two definitive methods of diagnosis, an ulcer. The

first is an X-ray of the stomach and duodenum after the patient has swallowed some white chalky liquid called barium. The other procedure is called endoscopy, during which a fiberoptic scope is used to directly visualize the esophagus, stomach and duodenum by introducing it through the mouth. It is important to determine the location of a peptic ulcer, as those in the stomach itself will very rarely become malignant and so require more careful follow-up.

New Regulations Made For Corral Room

Regulations governing the use of the Corral Room and the Agriculture Building were approved by the board of regents of Cisco Junior College at their monthly meeting last Monday night. The new regulations become effective immediately.

Dr. Henry E. McCullough, CJC president, said the new rules provide for a fee of \$50 to use the buildings for those other than civic organizations using the property for community interest purposes who will pay \$25. A returnable deposit is also required.

The new regulations provide (1) persons using the facilities are to contact the college at least a day prior to use and arrange for opening and closing; (2) no decorations or other materials are to be attached to the ceilings or walls other than on hooks provided; (3) kitchen facilities are not to be used unless permission is granted; (4) persons using facilities must assume responsibility for any damages; (5) facilities must be left clean; (6) persons using facilities assume responsibility for any caterer

clean-up, trash cans, and so forth; and, (7) no alcoholic beverages will be allowed on premises.

Cisco Junior College wishes to be a contributing force in the community by making its facilities available for community purposes whenever possible," Mr. McCullough said. "However, the college does not have the financial resources to provide utility services for community organizations and functions. As a public educational in-

stitution, the college is accountable for the use and care of its physical resources."

In other action, the board received a report by CPA Bobby Smith on an audit his company made on the school's financial records. The report showed that the school's records and books were in good condition.

A resolution was passed to permit the college to purchase certain supplies for the science department through the State Purchas-

ing and General Services Commission.

Ralph Glenn, vice president for business, submitted a financial for the month of October. The report showed receipts from all sources of \$806,423 during the month with expenses totalling \$831,166. The college had a fund balance of \$1,604,893 at the end of the month.

President Dick Woolley of the board presided at the meeting. There was a brief executive session with no action being taken.

Perry is one of four persons charged in the Garcia case as the result of an investigation headed by Bill Hart as special prosecutor. Others indicted with Perry are Richard Hinton, Brenda Andrews and Pat Starr.

Mrs. Garcia, a resident of Cisco, was found dead in a roadside ditch on Nov. 29, 1981, two days after she was kidnapped from her job in a convenience store. Two brothers, Thomas and Charles LeFlore, are serving prison sentences after pleading guilty in the shooting death.
