County Jail Under Order From Jail Standards Commission

The Eastland County Jail has been placed under a preliminary order by the Texas Jail Standards Commission not to exceed a population count of 25 people who are properly classified.

The order came after a hearing in Austin Wednesday, December 3, in which the Commission reviewed two alleged violations at the Jail.

Eastland County officials who attended this meeting were County Judge Scott Bailey, Sheriff Don Underwood, County Commissioners Robinson and Owen, and Rising Star Constable Gene Hicks. Judge Bailey and Sheriff Underwood spoke before the Commission.

Two main points were cited against the Jail by the Commission.

The first was overcrowding, with a population count reported to be over 27 daily and sometimes as high as 30. The Jail was built with facilities for 25 inmates.

The second violation cited was lack of segregation of prisoners - mainly segregation as to types of crimes committed.

The Eastland County facility will be reconsidered.

Judge Raleigh Brown To Retire Valley View News

- County Speculates Successor

Judge Raleigh Brown, associate justice of the 11th Court of Appeals, announced Tuesday that he will retire Dec. 31. Brown, who has served in this position for 14 years, has four years remaining on his third six-year term.

This unexpired term has caused a lot of speculation around Eastland and across west Texas. Two area district judges, Jim Wright of Eastland and Bob Thornton of Olney, have stated they will seek the appointment to serve the rest of Judge Brown's term. An Abilene attorney, Charles E. Ervin, also announced he would seek the appointment.

Judge Brown says he has sent his resignation to Governor Mark White, but did not indicate whether White may or may not be able to appoint a successor. Some attorneys are questioning whether the law allows an outgoing Governor to fill such a vacancy.

Some interpret the law to say that such a judicial appointment by a "lame duck" governor would expire Feb. 1, 1987. One Eastland official said that Mark White had passed up some appointments already - that he doubted he would undertake this one. Other attorneys, however, said that White may appoint a Judge to serve until the next general election.

Word from the Governor's Office is that White does intend to fill the vacancy, and the naming of a new Judge could come as early as Monday, December 8. The applications named were Wright, Thornton and Ervin, and also District Judge George Hansard of Dawson County.

Judge Brown, a former state representative and district judge, has maintained his legal home in Abilene during his years of service to the Court in Eastland. Until two years ago he stayed in Eastland during the work week, but then began commuting from Abilene. He said he is retiring to reduce his workload.

And, in the meanwhile, Eastland County people wonder what will happen if 91st District Judge Jim Wright or some local official should be appointed. To the 11th Court of Appeals

Judgeship. Who would take his place? and what about Saul Pullman, Mark White's Eastland County campaign

manager? He might be under consideration. Next week promises to be very interesting.

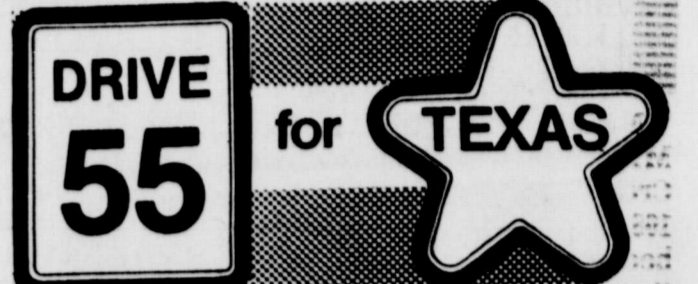

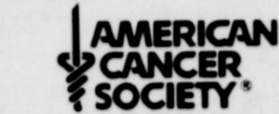

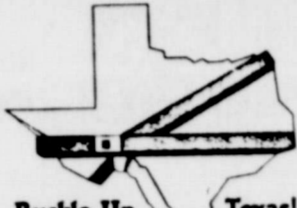

He sang a medley of songs in a deep, rich voice, strong and clear. The message of God's continued love and care in good and difficult times warmed my heart.

As he began the last verse, his voice broke, and he was unable to continue. The pianist "covered" expertly

for the young man and came back to the place where he had left off. He began again... again his voice broke and he could not continue.

The congregation was very quiet. My heart seemed to cease beating. Again the pianist covered, and came back. The young man began again. And a large number of the small congregation came to his aid and began singing his song.

This time the young man continued, with the help of his friends, his church. They saw his need, and responded. As he finished the song his voice grew strong and clear again, with the soft background singing of a growing number of the congregation.

He stepped down and moved to his seat confidently, unembarrassed. He accepted their gift, their love,

graciously. Tears came to my eyes at the beautiful scene I had witnessed. My husband reached over and took my hand. I saw others in the congregation wipe their eyes. Christian love for a brother was demonstrated that night in a touching, unplanned and unusual way.

I prayed that God would give me the courage to show my love for others not only in ordinary ways, but in unusual situations - and how to graciously accept love and help from others.

I don't know if the young man had a particular problem, or if he was simply touched by the words of the song, but I'm sure he went away that night feeling the love and protection of his Christian brothers and sisters.

But we still believe that our customers like to receive their papers regularly in their mail box, dry and on time. Increased postal rates will probably result in alternate methods of delivery.

Another cost factor over which there is no control is that for newsprint. Our cost will go to over \$500.00 a ton after the first of the year. It takes two rolls of paper to weigh a ton, but we're presently using from eight to ten rolls a week.

To reduce fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol consider using less shortening or butter. If possible use skimmed milk. Low fat yogurt could be used in place of sour cream. Reduce the high caloric type of mayonnaise and substitute it with low fat yogurt. These and other ways may meet your needs in lowering your cholesterol.

From Page One The method of computing jail population is not presently the same as that formerly used, where the number of inmates were reported by meal count rather than those booked.

The Judge did not discount the possibility of adding on to the six-year-old jail, or possibly using the old jail building for prisoners booked on minor offenses.

He pointed out that before the present Jail was constructed in 1980 a Dr. Free, a criminologist with Sam Houston State University, made a detailed study on the jail needs of Eastland County. This present building, whose base cost was around \$850,000, was supposed to be sufficient until at least the year 2,000.

"There have apparently been some variables," the Judge said. "We will have to determine the best move to make."

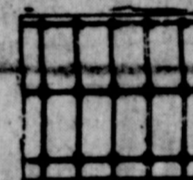

THE SCROOGE WITHIN

Every year I sympathize a little more deeply with Scrooge.

So far, Christmas has not brought into open expressions the "Bah! Humbug!" in me, but each year I am a little more aware that it is there.

Charles Dickens was a reporter, I believe, before he became a successful novelist. It is hard to convince myself that "A Christmas Carol" is just a charming figment of his imagination.

There were probably any number of Scrooges in Dickens' day. As for Marley? Marley was a ghost, but don't ghosts have to be people before they can become ghosts? Dickens may have known several Marleys as well as numerous Scrooges.

I do not begrudge Scrooge an easy conscience nor the Cratchitts their "God bless every-one" state of euphoria. I like Christmas, but I like it less than I used to. It seems to me it has become a case of the tail wagging the dog.

There isn't any place to stop. Though I have heard rumors of stoic individuals who don't "keep Christmas," I've never met any.

Do you know any parent who has told a child to limit his request to Santa Claus to only one item? It doesn't make any difference whether parent or child "believes in" Santa or not. And I am not going to delve into the Santa is/is not question - if there is a question at all.

Our Christmas observances are based loosely on Jesus' birthday. I subscribe to the ideal, but the calendar has had so many revisions that the exact date is problematical, at best.

However, "when" is not the important factor here. The fact that he was born is the reason we celebrate.

Birth, no matter whose, is the ultimate miracle in my book. Do you know what the odds were against your being born? Do you know what it took to make you become you?

My proficiency in neither math nor biology is great, but "Baby, them is s-o-o-ome odds!"

So, a birthday festival is in order in the Christian world. It just seems to me that our customs are become more Bacchanalian than Christian as we absorb more and more customs rooted in pagan rites into our lifestyle... Yule logs and Christmas trees come to mind.

And what about Santa Claus, though he didn't come along until well after the advent of Jesus? An adult is capable of realizing that Santa is a concrete symbol of abstract terms. Are children capable of the same thing? With the proliferation of Santa figures on street corners, fire engines and TV screens - not to mention the one kissing Mommy under the mistletoe - what is a child supposed to think?

It is the "in" thing to collect masses of materials - food, clothing, toys - for the needy. I hesitate to ask, lest I sound too Scrooge-ish, but what does this do to the man and woman who feel they are providing for their own? Lots of families are "poor" - even poverty-stricken - but they are not "needy" except in the eye of the beholder.

There are different perspectives of "rich" and "poor" - as in beauty being in the eye of the beholder.

The Cratchitts were going to have a good Christmas even if Marley hadn't rattled his chains, but Scrooge needed his point of view changed, and it was.

My own viewpoint could stand some work.

It's a cop-out to cry, "Commercialism!" But it's hard not to when I consider that Mandi (our eight-year-old satellite) received more presents for Christmas last year than both my sister and I ever got in an entire year when we were children.

Well, I'll hold the "Bah! Humbug!" a while longer, but I've made up my mind on one point: Christmas is not for children. It is for adults.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

From Thanksgiving through the Christmas holidays, one of the favorite foods is fruit salad which is served in a variety of ways.

This year, many of the large, red apples in your grocery store this year seem to be getting soft faster than they have in recent years once the consumer get them home. The reason for this problem are many, but they can be classed into two separate categories. First, large apples are always softer than small apples and second, because the growth regulator Alar was not used this year because of an unproven allegation against it.

Since Alar is known to produce redder, firmer apples, we have expected to see some problems of soft fruits this year, but not this early. It appears that growers left their fruit on the trees a little longer to obtain the red color and the fruit is softening even sooner. Consumers who

purchase these fruits should keep them refrigerated until they are eaten to maintain peak quality. If left at room temperature, they can be expected to develop a mealy texture within a week.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
The recipe for Sausage Breakfast Casserole is delicious. It is a great idea to serve for overnight holiday company or Christmas morning. This recipe is made up the night before, and refrigerated.

SAUSAGE BREAKFAST CASSEROLE

1 pound bulk sausage
6 slices white bread, crusts removed
Softened butter or margarine
1 1/2 cup shredded Longhorn cheese
5 eggs
2 cups half-and-half
1 teaspoon salt

D.D. and Charlotte are very active in bowling, fishing and crafts, but their favorite retirement activity has been spending time with their grandson Kerr.



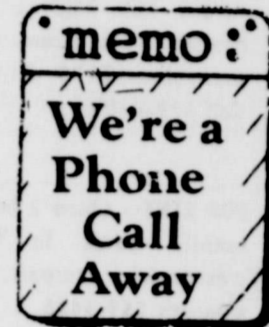

Fishing Outdoors

Lake Ft. Phantom Hill
Introduced hybrid striped bass have become a popular sport fish at Lake Fort Phantom Hill near Abilene, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Biologist David Terre said only an estimated 4.5 percent of anglers fished for hybrid strippers in 1981, but the figure has risen steadily until 1986 when about 37 percent of anglers surveyed indicated that they were fishing for hybrids.

"The department began stocking the fish in 1977, and supplemental stockings since then have resulted in a strong and expanding population of the fish," Terre said. He said an estimated 2,268 hybrids weighing 6,472 pounds were caught during a three-month period in spring 1986.

He added that while hybrids in the two or three pound class are the most common, fish up to 11 pounds are caught.

The fish are hatchery-produced hybrids between striped bass and white bass. They are stocked in 22 medium and small-sized reservoirs across the state, primarily near population centers. They do especially well in power plant lakes.

There is a statewide bag limit of five hybrid strippers per day, with a possession limit of 10. There currently is no minimum length limit.

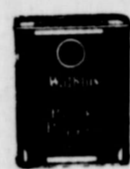

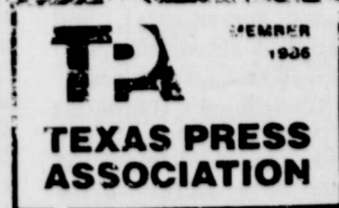
