Saturday, Feb. 3, the Cisco Junior College Lady Wranglers went to Hillsboro and took on Hill County. The half time score was 38-to-29 with Cisco on top. The Lady Wranglers won with a final score of 89-to-75. Their record is now 4-1 in conference action.

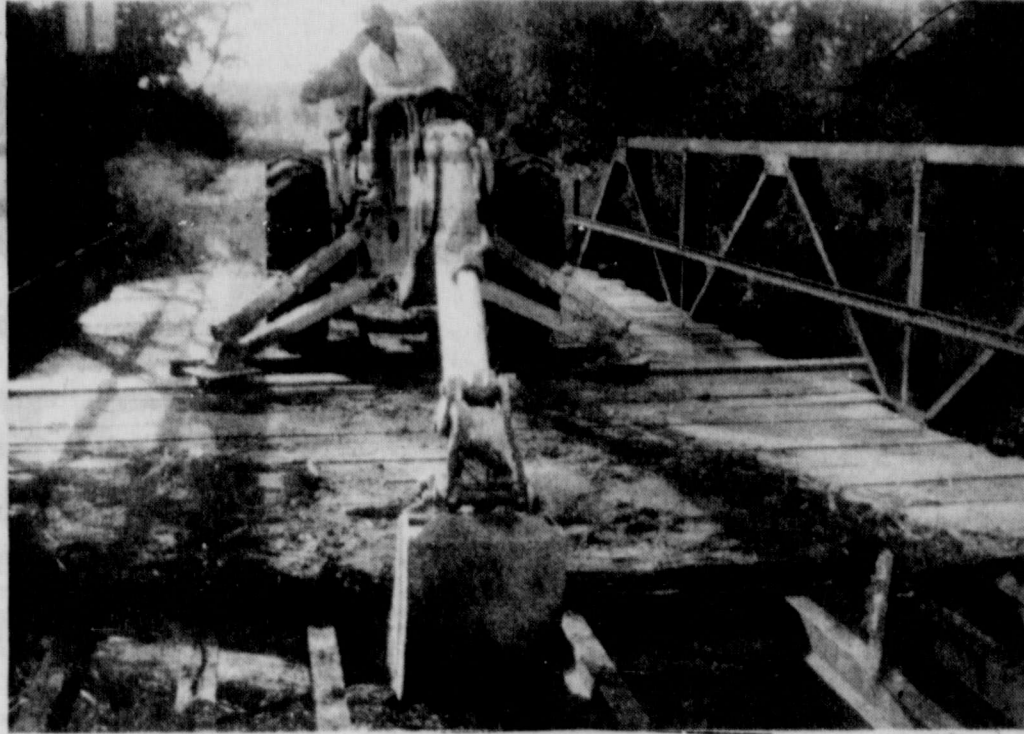
It was a very worthwhile trip for the Lady Wranglers. They played strong the entire game. Even when the Lady Rebels got within one point of Cisco, with about seven minutes left in the game, they did not let up. Nicole Davenport had an outstanding game offensively. She did well on the defense end also. No one can stop the Lady Wranglers when they are playing to their ability.

The leading scorer for CJC was Davenport with 24 points. Tiffany Burris was close behind with 21. Pam Wilkerson had 19 and Amber

Whisenhunt connected for 10. Tiffany and Amber led the Lady Wranglers in rebounds with seven each. Pam and Kelly Page had five. Stacy McPherson had six assists to lead Cisco. Dana Hearne handed off for five.

Over a five conference game total, the leaders in points, assists and rebounds are Pam Wilkerson who is averaging 17.4 points and 6.4 rebounds a game; Tiffany Burris is averaging 12.2 points, 4.6 assists and 6.6 rebounds per game. Nicole Davenport's average is 12.6 points and 3.4 assists a game. Stacy McPherson is handing off four assists per game. Misty Kohart is averaging 4.2 rebounds a game and Kelly Page 4.8 per game.

The Lady Wranglers will next take on Grayson County, who is ranked seventh in the nation, Wednesday, Feb. 7, at 6 p.m. The Wrangler game will follow at 8 p.m.

## Wranglers Lose To Hill County In Close Contest

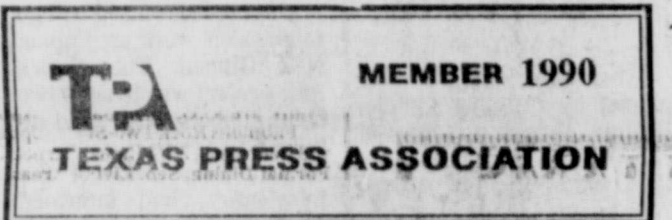

## State Department of Highways & Public Transportation Update

If your driveway entrance accesses a state highway, it may be in line for paving some time in the future.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation embarked two years ago on a long term project to pave all frequently used home and commercial driveway entrances and all county road intersections on state maintained highways as a roadway is scheduled for construction work or a summer seal coat.

According to Johnny Duncan, district maintenance supervisor, the work is being done systematically as time and money permit and may be performed as much as a year to 18 months in advance of the project.

"We do the necessary reconstruction work on each entrance and place seal coat or premix before we seal the roadway," Duncan said. "In this way, we get two applications on each entrance to provide a long lasting sur-

face."

The paving of the entrances is done from the edge of the highway pavement to highway right-of-way line.

Duncan said the department is paving only those driveway entrances that lead to house or place of business, not those to a field or pasture.

"If you are wondering when your driveway entrance is going to be paved, we can only say that it depends upon whether the highway it accesses needs paving and when we can schedule the work," Duncan said. He added that the entrance paving project will take approximately five to ten years to complete. Based on that, some driveways may be paved next year and some five to eight years from now.

Duncan asks that everyone "please be patient." "We will get to your driveway as soon as possible."

To date, District 23 has paved 2,133 driveway entrances. There are 5,250 still

to be paved in the nine-county district.

"We have been doing the work with maintenance forces in some areas and contracting the paving in others as money becomes available," Duncan said. "Our goal is to have all the district's 7,383 private driveway entrances paved by 1998."

The paved driveway entrances are expected to create uniformity statewide, promote highway safety and beautification, and help keep and pavement clear of mud.

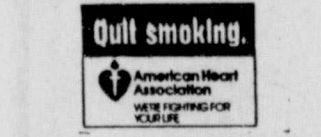

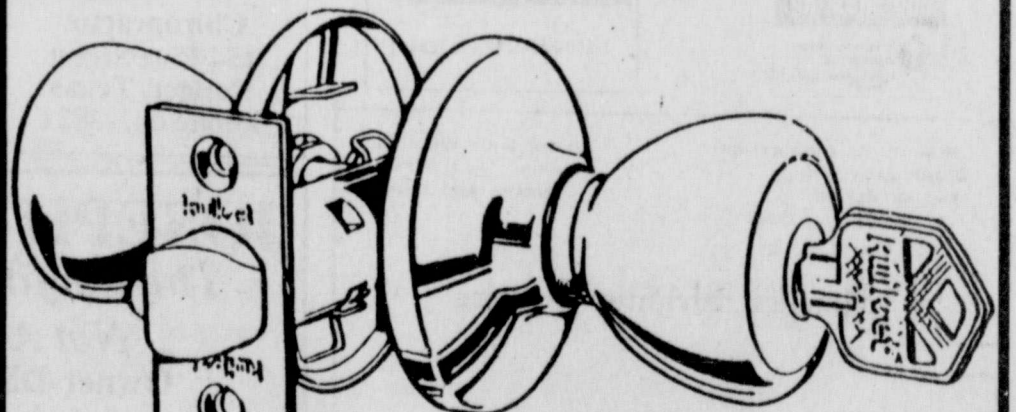

### County Welfare Programs

The state spent a total of \$6,487,479 last year for major welfare programs in Eastland County, according to Ray L. Dunavant, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$4,808,076 spent for aged and disabled residents of the county and \$542,088 for families and children in the county," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$903,449 were issued for the fiscal year which ended Aug. 31, while Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$233,866. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

In addition to services and assistance to low-income residents of the county, the

department extended protective services to 44 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger to children.
