Deadline To Register To Vote In March Primary Is Feb. 11

Citizens are reminded that the deadline to register to vote in the March 13 Primary Election is 5 p.m. Feb. 11, 1990. Those who are mailing in forms must have their letter postmarked by 5 p.m. on that date.

People who have not registered may go in person to the office of Tax Assessor-Collector Nancy Trout, or call that office and request that forms be mailed to them. Those registering must give their place of birth and birthdate in order to obtain cards.

There are also some voter's registration forms available

at public places in various towns, Mrs. Trout says.

The Feb. 11 deadline meets the requirement that voters be registered at least 30 days before an election. There are presently a total of 11,002 voters registered in all Precincts of Eastland County.

Nancy Trout says that the Voter's Registration list is now being updated for the March election.

"I have really appreciated the patience of the public on this," she says. "Anyone who is registered but who has not received a card should contact this office at once."

Counselor Series

How To Help Children Of Divorce

One of the most current issues in education today is children of divorce. Teachers all across the nation constantly face obstacles as they attempt to educate today's youth, but the most prevalent cause of difficulties for students of all ages is divorce. It is estimated that over 1 million children each year are affected by divorce. This means schools are bombarded year in and year out with children trying to understand divorce and themselves at the same time as they try to master the many academic skills in school. Although a marital breakdown is never without its effects, most child guidance specialists agree that if handled correctly, all children will not be developmentally damaged. In working with children and parents as they go through the divorce process, professionals have established several guidelines which can help to soften the blow for children.

At the onset of a divorce, it is best for parents to give a simple, honest explanation on a level the child can understand. However, parents must "never" burden the children with their problems. No matter

what age, children must never bear the knowledge of either parent's infidelity, if that is the situation. Even teenagers and adult children should never be told the details of the crumbling relationship. Simply explain that is too difficult for Mother and Dad to live together any longer.

Also in this explanation, make it clear that the child is not to blame. Divorce is a "grown-up" problem which affects children, but they are never to blame. All children at some point try to blame themselves for the break-up, and they need "constant" reassurance that they are not to blame.

It is best to avoid blaming anybody for the family break-up. Even a parent who deserts a family can be presented as too sick to cope with marriage. If one parent belittles another, the son or daughter will feel badly about himself, since he is the offspring of that parent. Divorced parents don't need to go overboard and pretend they are still in love, as this could arouse false hopes of reconciliation. However, treating ex-partners with respect can save the children much psychological trauma.

Although the above-

mentioned guidelines are but three of many to be found effective when coping with divorce, following them can mean the difference between children surviving a divorce and children being destroyed by divorce. Many states are requiring participation in "divorce seminars" before a divorce can be granted. From an educator's standpoint, this could be one of the most logical means of improving education. Parents who receive training to help their children cope with divorce would alleviate many problems teachers are dealing with in the schools.

Divorcing couples are encouraged to seek help through private, school or church-related counselors. These professionals have dealt with many children and parents, whereas most parents have never experienced anything like the trauma of divorce.

Both parents and children should read some of the many books written to help families cope. Most school counselors and libraries have some of the books listed below and would be pleased to share them with parents and children. With understanding and self-discipline on the parents part, divorce can be a maturing experience for children and parents alike.

"Sacred Site", the other half of the double feature, is a short subject examination of the return of Halley's comet over Central Australia's Ayers Rock. The famous monolith is a source of religious awe among the country's Aboriginal tribes.

As a late night double feature, "Chronos" and "Sacred Site" offer Fort

Worth audiences a unique alternative to the Omni Theater's more conventional films, "Beavers" and "The Dream Is Alive". In his review of the film, Michael Price of the "Fort Worth Star-Telegram" said "Chronos" is an experimental film in the truest, most fascinating sense of the term...no synopsis is really possible."

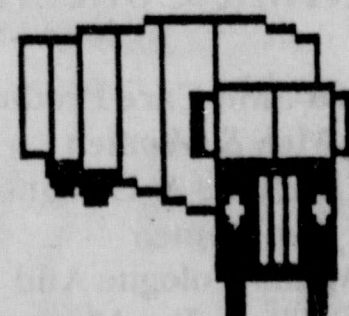

According to IRS Notice 907, agricultural employers are now required to withhold income tax from cash wages paid to farm workers. Income tax must be withheld from farm workers on all cash wages paid after 1989 which are subject to social security taxes.

Since this is a new requirement for agricultural employers not all agricultural employers will be familiar with the process of withholding, depositing, reporting, and paying taxes and contains the tax tables which tells the employer how much income tax and social security tax to withhold. We have a limited supply of circular E in the Extension office.

These are the steps that an agricultural employer should take:

1.) Get an Employer number. This number is requested on Form SS-4. You can call 1-800-424-3676 to request Form SS-4.

2.) Get the employee to complete a Form W-4. These forms are available from the IRS at the same phone number as in step 1. This completed form must be kept on file until the employee elects to change his withholding, at which time he completes a new form.

3.) Next, withhold the tax from the employer's paycheck. The amount of withholding is determined by using two tax tables in Circular E.

4.) Make timely deposits of the taxes at a financial institution normally a local national bank which is qualified as a depository of federal taxes. Make the deposit using a Form 8109, Federal Tax Deposit Coupon, which you will receive from the IRS when you receive your employer number. Deposit time

requirements differ according to the amount of the deposit, but are normally made monthly or quarterly. More details on depositing taxes can be found on page 8, paragraph 13, of Circular E.

5.) An employer must annually report income tax withheld on the employee's Form W-2. The employer then submits to the Social Security Administration a Form W-3, which is a cumulative report of all W-2 reports given.

6.) An employer must report income tax withheld annually on Form 943, Employer Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employers.

Now, what do you do until you receive your employer number? The circulars and publications listed later in this column contain information on how to make deposits, file returns, etc., if they are due before the employer has received the employer number.

If you must make a deposit before receiving the employer identification number (EIN), make the deposit with your IRS Service Center. The check payable to the IRS, should include an attachment showing your name as shown on Form SS-4, address, kind of tax, period covered, and date you applied for EIN.

Since the amount of income tax withholding is based upon a W-4, employees should get a signed copy on file as soon as possible. Begin withholding with the next pay period. In the absence of the W-4, withhold tax as if the employee is single, with no withholding allowances. Several methods of withholding may be acceptable, as long as the amount of tax withheld is about the same as it would be under the percentage method in Circular E.

An employee may claim to be exempt from income tax

withholding if the employee had no income tax liability last year and expects none this year. However, the wages may still be subject to social security taxes.

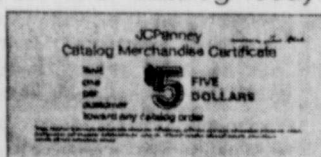

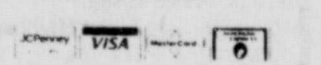

Census '90

The Census is strictly confidential; your answers are protected.

The law (Title 13 of the United States Code) does not allow welfare agencies, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Internal Revenue Service, courts, police, the military - any institution or anyone - to obtain information showing how you answered the census questionnaire. While attempts have been made to get this information through the courts, the United States Supreme Court has ruled that individual answers are absolutely confidential. The 1990 Census records will be held confidential for 72 years - until the year 2062.

Census Bureau employees take an oath to keep individual answer to the questionnaire confidential. They cannot reveal information about any individual or family to anyone outside the Census

Bureau. An employee breaking this confidence is subject to severe penalties - up to \$5,000 in fines and five years in prison.

The census questionnaire does not ask for an individual's Social Security number. The only reason names and addresses are asked is to make sure that no one is missed, or anyone is counted more than once.

The Census Bureau tallies only answers to questions on an individual's form along with answers to the same questions from all other census forms. This creates statistical totals for geographic areas. It is these numeric totals, not personal answers, that are then published and put to thousands of uses.

There is no access from outside Census Bureau buildings to any confidential information in Census Bureau computers. In fact, the tapes with the combined data carry no personal identification.

'Best Of The Best' Now Showing At Majestic

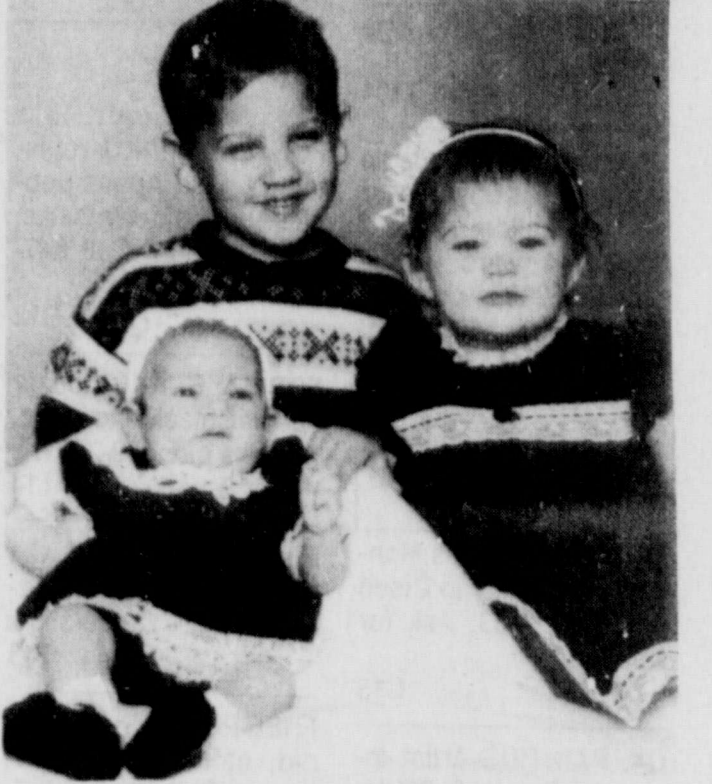

'Coldham Discovers New Passenger Records'

Peter Wilson Coldham, author of THE COMPLETE BOOK OF EMIGRANTS 1607-1660, THE COMPLETE BOOK OF EMIGRANTS IN BONDAGE, 1614-1775, and THE BRISTOL REGISTERS OF SERVANTS SENT TO FOREIGN PLANTATIONS, 1654-1686, has recently discovered some 1,000 records of English colonial emigrants to North America never before published. These records comprise the basis for Mr. Coldham's new book, CHILD APPRENTICES IN AMERICA FROM CHRIST'S HOSPITAL, LONDON, 1617-1778.

Based on the 'Children's Register' of Christ's Hospital, a kind of preparatory-vocational school for orphaned or homeless children of the city of London, CHILD APPRENTICES IN AMERICA identifies approximately 1,000 students who chose to take up apprentices in America between 1616 and 1778. Each of the entries extracted by Mr. Coldham, typically, gives the name of the child, his date of birth of baptism, date of admission, native parish, the name of the person to whom he was apprenticed, and the place in America where he was to serve his apprenticeship.
