Texas Secretary of State George Bayoud reports the extended absentee balloting period is under way for those registered to vote in the March 13 primaries.

Registered voters will have until Friday, March 9, to appear in person at county courthouses and polling places across Texas to cast absentee ballots in next month's Democratic and Republican party primary elections. The deadline to register to vote in the March 13 primary was Feb. 11.

Under a 1987 state law that relaxed absentee balloting requirements, registered voters need not give a specific reason for casting in-person, absentee ballots during the extended period. A separate period still exists for those who cast absentee ballots by mail. That period began Jan. 27. Those who vote absentee by mail must give a reason for not being able to cast their ballot on Election Day.

### Leslie Vance Candidate For DA Office

Leslie B. Vance of Eastland, Texas, is a candidate for the office of Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County.

Mr. Vance is a practicing attorney with an office at 110 South Seaman Street in Eastland. A member in good standing of the State Bar of Texas, Mr. Vance is engaged in the general practice of law. He is married to the former Milta Kincaid of Eastland, daughter of Robert and Phyllis Kincaid of Cisco. His daughter Kathryn lives in Comanche; son Byron, a graduate of Eastland High School, is a freshman at Baylor Law School in Waco, and son Josh is a 6th grader in the Eastland Public Schools. The Vances reside at 402 Briarwood in Eastland.

Mr. Vance served as County Attorney of Bosque County and as District Attorney of the 52nd and 220th Districts of Texas for about 10 years.

"The office is an important one which deserves a District Attorney who will be a zealous protector of the interests of the people of Eastland County and will ensure that the accused are fairly and quickly tried and punished. I will provide leadership for our law enforcement officers with a cooperative and coordinated effort. Our State, County and City officials deserve a District Attorney's Office that is ready and able to direct and assist in fighting crime. I will further represent the interest of all county officials as required by law.

"I will personally prosecute the serious and important cases and it will be unnecessary for the people of Eastland County to bear the costs of Special Prosecutors.

"Special attention will be given to drug related crimes since Eastland County's drug crime rate is among the highest in the state. Our children and citizens are exposed to the county situation where for too long the drug dealers have been allowed to spread the destructive and immoral fruits of their drug labs and have subjected our children and people to the evils of the drug world. The drug problem is responsible for many of our thefts and other crimes. Unfortunately, theft is one of the handiest ways for users to obtain illegal drugs.

# Two Local Churches To Host Jordan River Jubilee Concert

The First United Methodist Church and the First Christian Church of Cisco invite the entire community to come hear the Jordan River Jubilee Gospel Music Group from Brownwood, on Sunday evening, February 25, 1990 at 8:30 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church. A free-will offering will be taken for the groups expenses, and everyone will be treated to refreshments following the concert.

Jordan River Jubilee began in February, 1984, when several members of the Sanctuary Choir of First Methodist Church were asked to provide special music for a dinner honoring then District Superintendent Bobby Weathers who was being transferred to a pastorate in Fort Worth. The group provided a short program for that event, made up entirely of secular music and spirituals, a direct departure from the repertoire of a church choir. In May of that year, the ensemble was asked to provide special music for the church's Holy Smoke event, a home-coming, dinner-on-the-ground, all-day Sunday gathering. In keeping with the gospel

meeting atmosphere, and relative to the style of music the group was to perform, the name "Jordan River Jubilee" was created to be used in the order of worship for that morning service.

Seven singers make up Jordan River Jubilee, all of them active members of the Sanctuary Choir of First Methodist. And from the early beginnings, Jordan River Jubilee, has asked to be considered as an out-reach ministry of First Methodist, giving its performances to area churches and to organizations within the framework of the many local and area ministries of the church. In addition, the group has performed for large meetings, including state conventions of several organizations. In April, 1986, JRJ presented a program for the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Texas, at their meeting in Abilene; and in June of that year, the group performed in Tarrant County Convention Center for the opening session of the Texas School Food Service Association's annual conference. The group will perform for this organization again this summer at their

convention at the George R. Brown Convention Center, Houston. Locally Jordan River Jubilee has participated in many civic events including the Bicentennial Celebration and the more recent, highly enthusiastic Aldersgate Rally. One of the highlights for the group was the opportunity to appear with well-known comedian, Jerry Clower as a part of a locally-sponsored trade show at Brownwood Coliseum.



## Counselor Series

**THE GREATEST GIFT: SELF ESTEEM**

What is self-esteem? It is how a person feels about himself. It is his over-all judgement of himself-how much he likes his particular person.

The importance of self-esteem in a child's life can hardly be over emphasized. His judgement of himself influences the kinds of friends he chooses, how he gets along with others, the kind of person he marries and how productive he will be. In fact, self-esteem can determine for a child his success or failure as a human being.

Research studies have indicated that few factors are more relevant to the child's academic success and social development than his feelings of personal adequacy and self acceptance. In general, the measure of self-concept and self-esteem made at the beginning of kindergarten has proven to be more predictive of reading achievement two years later than was the measure of mental ability. The major factor that results in underachievement, lack of motivation and unproductive conduct is low self-esteem.

High self-esteem is not a noisy conceit. It is a quiet sense of self respect, a feeling of self-worth. It is not uncommon for people to try to gain a sense of importance by being one up over others. This is egotism: getting a sense of importance at another's expense. People who feel good about themselves don't have to put others down.

For better or worse, adults constantly influence the self-esteem of children—whether they realize it or not—whether they intend it or not. The words they use when they talk to children are either positive and increase self-esteem or they are negative and tear it down.

Specific strategies for changing from negative to positive approaches to children are:

- Change your focus. Instead of always catching your kids being "bad," catch them being good. What you look for, you find. Give them lots of encouragement and support for positive behavior.
- Expect the best. Kids want to live up to our expectations—unless those expectations are unrealistic or impossible. Expectations of perfection lead to disappointment and despair. Criticizing parents expect the worst, and they get it! Nurturing parents expect the best, and they get it!
- Give up blaming and fault finding. Criticizing parents look for what's wrong, find it, then put down the other person in order to feel one-up and superior. But no one likes to be put down, ridiculed, humiliated or blamed.

The language parents and teachers choose and the way they use it can determine a child's destiny. Words have power to lift up or to put down. With our word choice we build or shred self-esteem. The words that damage self-esteem are spoken without respect for others. They are spoken in a nasty tone of voice and can be condescending and cruel.

Halting criticism is an extremely important step to building self-esteem. Equally important is increasing the number of positive strokes—appreciation, compliments and support. We can communicate to children that they are worthwhile and valuable through:

- Non-verbal messages. Positive facial expressions, eye contact, loving touch and attentiveness make others feel important.
- Positive words. Everyone wants to hear good things about themselves. Make sure your words are sincere.
- Respect and enjoyment. Children read our attitudes. When we have fun with them, everybody wins.
- Look to the climate surrounding your child now. Regardless of the past, deal with the present, with where you and your child are at this moment. If you are uncertain about whether your look, talk or expectation withers self-respect, put yourself in your child's shoes and then you will have a clue.

## Eastland County Literacy Council

In August 1989 a group of concerned citizens met to discuss the problem of adult illiteracy in our county and to devise solutions. From a series of meetings the Eastland County Literacy Council was formed to support adult literacy and learning opportunities in our county.

Organizationally, by laws have been approved, the organization has been chartered in Texas as a non-profit corporation, permanent officers will be elected in April and papers are being filed for federal tax-exempt status. Council members are drawn from throughout the county with current members representing Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, and Rising Star.

The primary goals for the Council this first year include formalizing the structure and status of the organization, increasing public awareness of the problem of illiteracy and the opportunities in our

area, and assisting in the creation of literacy programs in the various communities. The Council has several activities about to begin.

On Thursday, Feb. 22, 1990 Community Education classes began in Cisco. These sessions will be held on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month, free of charge, and will include information on Cooking with Commodities, Dealing with Family Stress, Managing a Checking Account, Buying a Used car, Household Fire Safety, and Poisoning. The site for these sessions will be East Cisco Baptist Church, Fellowship Hall, with child care for 9 years and under available in the Education Building.

On March 2 & 3 a Laubach Basic Literacy Tutor Training Workshop will be held at Cisco Junior College. Anyone interested in becoming a tutor or finding out more about literacy efforts are invited to

attend. The workshop is free of charge with registration through Charlotte Speegle, CJC, 442-2567.

The Council has also participated in a grant proposal submitted by Cisco Junior College for Student Literacy Corps funds. The Grant would assist in conducting family literacy programs in Cisco, Eastland and other county communities where there is sufficient interest. Notification on this grant will not be until, May, 1990.

## Bond Set At \$1 Million Each For Two Arrested With Drugs

Walton said he would start forfeiture proceedings on the car and money as soon as possible.

People who have information about a crime are urged to call 629-TIPS. You will be given a number and be asked to call back if the information you give is new information. If it results in an arrest and conviction, you will be paid a reward by Crimestoppers.

As the leads received by Crimestoppers result in an average conviction rate of about 97 percent when an arrest is made and the person is indicted, the organization has helped to quickly solve many serious crimes which might have gone unsolved otherwise.

Crimestoppers is a non-profit organization operated by the public which strives to be a good example in the community. And the Eastland County Crimestoppers works closely with the state office, which is a government agency.

Donations and fund raisers are the main sources of money to pay the rewards, which result in crimes being solved.





MANGUM, TEXAS or CAMELOT, EASTLAND COUNTY STYLE

The following article appeared on the Editorial page of the Greenville Herald Banner, Hunt, County, Texas on Feb. 4, 1970. The article was from the ASSOCIATED PRESS and they were kind enough to allow me to reprint it here.  
Editor's Note (Newspaper): Hardly a sign exists today of the once bustling little West Texas town of Mangum. Here is the story of how it grew, based on a collection of documents discovered last summer.  
EASTLAND, Tex. (AP) - Mangum is no more. But a collection of letters discovered recently tells the story of the tiny little Spa before it faded back into the dry west Texas soil on which it was built.  
Mangum, about four miles west of Flatwood, grew up

with the railroad. It prospered momentarily on the strength of its special health water, then disappeared.  
Ricky Johnson, 13, of the Flatwood community south of Eastland, recently discovered a dusty, tattered book which tells the history of the ghost spa.  
Mangum has literally faded from the face of the earth. Its heyday came with the railroad around the start of this century.  
A whole row of one-story brick buildings stood on the east side of the track in the 1920's. There was a railroad station, along with a post office, grocery store, wood yard, gin, grist mill, school, church and a few other businesses.  
And there was Mangum's developing health resort business, the Mangum Mineral Water Co., owned by Pete Mangum.  
The book found by young Johnson contains yellowed letters dated from 1904-1910, whose faded pages tell how Mangum came to be.  
"If parties who own land on south side of track will join Mr. Kay in cutting this land up into town lots deeding alternate lots to the railroad company, I will take the matter up with Col. Hamilton and do everything in my power to induce him to build a nice little depot at Mangum, and when this is done I am sure it will be only a short time until Mangum will improve very rapidly," said a letter on the stationery of the Texas Central Railroad Co. of Waco.  
It is a mystery just who kept the scrapbook, but it was originally an atlas with railroad routings. Clippings, letters, and pictures have been pasted over the printed pages.  
The book has been given to the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee.  
Letters promoting the curative powers of Mangum mineral waters show that visitors came as far away as Georgia.  
A three-color brochure dated April 28, 1909, described Mangum as a health resort which "maintains absolutely unsurpassed hotel service, 18 wells flowing as many varieties of mineral water of unlimited curative powers."  
Mangum drew business to the town named after him. He was railroad agent, postmaster, express agent, mineral water company president and a couple of other things too.  
Still another letter that Mangum wrote had this to say, "Mangum, Eastland Co.

## Community Service Groups Report At County Resource Meeting

Reports on the work of the County Resources Association as well as those from various community service agencies were featured during the noon meeting of the Resource Association Feb. 13. The meeting was held in the Conference Room of Eastland Centennial Memorial Library.

Corrie Cowley, Chairman of the Resource group, said that during the past month four families had been helped with travel expenses for health care of ill and disabled children. This travel was to the West Texas Rehab Center and a Scottish Rite Hospital. Some of the funds will be reimbursed to the Association.

Three individuals were also helped with gas and electricity payments.

Next Linda Ferguson spoke for the Eastland PTO, saying that the organization was in the middle of a Campbell's Soup Co. label drive.

The school children are collecting, and 67,000 points will add a computer to the Computer lab at Siebert Elementary School.

Mrs. Ferguson mentioned that the labels are on all products distributed by Campbells Corp., not just soup.

She reviewed some of the things the PTO has provided to improve the school system, and said the organiza-

tion also gives a Scholarship each year. This is awarded to a Senior who is going into Education as a major. The money for these Scholarships is given in the form of memorials.

Attention turned to the Goodfellows organization, with Linda Parker bringing a fine report on the Goodfellows which serve Eastland, Morton Valley and Olden. This group distributes groceries, toys and other items at Christmas time, bringing cheer to a number of people. This past Christmas the Eastland Goodfellows served 134 families, and also 21 patients in Nursing Homes. Gas bills were paid for six elderly people.

Continuing with reports, Danella Gevarra outlined the many services of the American Cancer Society, focusing on the work of the Eastland County Chapter.

She said that the Golf Tournaments held by Brad and Mindy Stephenson had proved to be great fund-raisers. The Stephensons are now serving on the State Board of the American Cancer Society, she reported.

Each year the state predicts the number of cancer patients expected in any given area. The state predicted 98, but 33 were served last year. This year, however, 26 people have already been served in

Eastland County, at a cost of \$8,946.

Some items are given to patients, Mrs. Gevarra said, and some loaned. The Society cannot give cash to patients, but has special services available to anyone who needs them. She stressed early detection as a tool against cancer, urging anyone who has symptoms of the disease to get medical help immediately.

Rhonda Pipkin of the Department of Human Services reported on the extensive work of this agency. In January 312 families were served by food stamps, with 58 families receiving aid for dependant children. There were 63 receipts for medicaid. The trend has been generally up in the number of people being assisted through the Department of Human Services.

Another agency which helps provide for critical needs is the Multipurpose Center. This Center, as well as the Department of Human Services, sometimes refers people with special needs to the County Resources Association.

Peggy Roberts, Director of the Multipurpose Center, also brought a report to the meeting. She said that the distribution of commodities is continuing, with 234 families serviced last month. The Center also provided medical transportation for qualifying patients. Now there is another service - public transportation for shopping or other necessary errands. This service costs 35¢ one-way to a destination.

The Center paid utility bills for 58 needy people last month, and furnished clothing for 433 people. A number of people attended the family planning clinic. Medical prescriptions were provided for four people, including a sick child.

Lois Robinson, a volunteer worker for the Food Pantry (located at the Multipurpose Center) said that the generous people of this area were keeping a supply of groceries there. The need for the Pantry seemed to be rising - in January 30 families were assisted with emergency supplies of food. Staple foodstuff is always welcome, Mrs. Robinson said.

She continued with a report of the Headstart work. This pre-school center, sponsored by Central Texas Opportunities Inc., is located at 901 W. 7th St. in Cisco. The children have received physicals and dental exams, with over \$600 spent on dental services. They are making progress in work preparing them for school, Mrs. Robinson said.

On another matter, Mrs. Robinson reported that she is still working on the County Directory listing services to the communities. She still lacks Gorman, Rising Star and most of Ranger. Any Churches or organizations which have not been contacted but have help for the

### Possum Kingdom Produces a 13.75 Pound Bass

Big bass are what anglers are looking for these days. The new standard for true lunkers is recognized by the state at 8 pounds. But Texas anglers have placed a 10 pound goal for bragging size black bass.

And a number of local anglers made a journey last week to the number one lunker lake in the state "Lake Fork," located near Quitman in East Texas. Success was fair with Tommy Rose and Tim Freeman both landing fish over 6 pounds. A number of small fish were caught and released during what I'm sure was an enjoyable trip.

But look at one of our backyard lakes Possum Kingdom in October of 1989 shocked the state by giving up a 16.02 lunker. And now Don Frazier of Millsap, and a member of the Parker County Sportsman Club landed a 13.75 trophy. This fish was caught during Parker County's February Club tournament. Don's fish came from the Rock Creek area at 7:15 a.m. and won him 1st place and big Bass honors. Second with 3 fish 12.33 Mike Little. Mike's big fish was 7.43. Third with 3 fish

11.84 Barry Liles. Barry's big fish went 5.36. Fourth was Burt Hobkins with 2 fish 9.17. Burts big fish went 5.16. And fifth was Joe Byrum 3 fish 9.12. A total of 72 fish were weighed in for a total of 186.69 pounds.

Unfortunately the 13.75 pound lunker Don caught was not able to survive to be placed in the states Lunker Program. This program offers anglers the chance to loan 13 pound plus bass to the Texas Parks and Wildlife for future spawning. Anglers will be given a free fiberglass replica mount and the fish will be returned to the lake of origin.

With the 13.75 pound lunker at Possum Kingdom I also received reports of 2 other fish this past weekend which went over 10 pounds. Lunker time folks at all our area lakes.

And coming up at Possum the Parker County Sportsman Club Inc. will be hosting its Annual Open Bass Tournament Saturday, March 31, 1990. Headquarters will be at South D & D, entry fee \$35.00 and \$5,000.00 in prize money is guaranteed. There will also be a Junior Division with no entry fee for 13 years and under. For more information you may call Joe Byrum at 594-9508, Lloyd Lothridge

598-0616 or myself at 629-3255.

And closer to home the Second Annual Eastland Volunteer Fire Department's Open Bass Tournament, April 29, 1990. This years event is bigger and better than ever with a \$1,500.00 guaranteed first place. Also there will be an all expense paid 2 day guided trophy bass fishing trip to Lake Fork with Richard McCarty. This trip will be for May 26 and 27, 1990.

A couple of very special radio personalities will be on hand also. Hal Jay and Sam from Sales of Texas number one radio station WBAP. These gentlemen are both avid bass anglers and will be competing in this event.

Also for this year a name I hope you all have come to know, Trilene will be on hand Saturday evening to fill your reels with the number one line in the fishing industry today. Trilene Ambassadors James Fullen and Terry Wilson will be offering this service thanks to Trilene Representative Bob Lawson. All paid entrants should plan to have their bait-cast only reels at Chock-O-Block headquarters between 6 p.m. until 10 p.m.

The Trilene service will also be offered during the 18th Annual Brownwood Bass Club Open Tournament Sunday, March 25th. Once again the service will be free to paid entrants Saturday 6 p.m. til 10 p.m. This years event will

be held at the Flagship Inn. 1st place is guaranteed \$1,250.00 with over \$4,045.00 in cash and prizes to be awarded. Entry for this event will be \$25.00 with an optional \$5.00 big bass pot. For more information on these and other upcoming events feel free to call me at 629-3255.

Smallmouth bass, first introduced to Texas waters during the 1970's are continuing to show they have a place in the state's sport fishery.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department brought smallmouths from Tennessee and other southeastern states and released them in clear, rocky reservoirs that were not productive as largemouth bass habitat.

The experiment has proved a success in a number of reservoirs including Lake Meredith, Fexome, Whitney, Georgetown, Canyon and Cisco.

While smallmouth bass do not match the sizes attained by Florida strain largemouths, an increasing number of five-pound-plus smallmouths have been taken. The Texas state record smallmouth is a seven pound 11.5 ounce fish caught by Ron Gardner of Lake Whitney in 1988.

Till next week keep a crappie for that fish dinner and live release those bass.

## Advice Given On Teaching By Dr. D. Barry Lumsden

**TEACH BY EXAMPLE**  
Jake and Lottie Poole wish to share this commentary written by Koo-hyun Kim about their son-in-law, Dr. D. Barry Lumsden, professor at the University of North Texas, Denton, taken from the North Texas Daily.

**Instructor shows concern with lessons for life**

Dr. D. Barry Lumsden is a full professor who teaches courses titled "Teaching/Learning" and "Academic Publication" in the College of Education at the University of North Texas. His 70 scholarly publications include six books, four monographs, five chapters in books, five book reviews and many articles.

His academic advice was great and wonderful as he helped one of his students get seven articles published out of one dissertation on his advice as major professor.

He taught a class in fall 1986 these lessons: "You are future teachers, be harmonious with your colleagues. Don't be arrogant, never be boastful in front of your colleagues. Don't be involved in departmental conflicts. The invisible administrator is the best one. Life is serious, but

never too serious to laugh. Fight for pleasure. To improve college teaching means to improve yourselves. A good teacher is involved in more than delivering mere knowledge. A good teacher knows how to show his students their needs. Don't be externally controlled. Don't blame others. Carry a book wherever you may go. Learn it by yourself. Do something good for others."

**ONE OF HIS** most inspirational and invigorating teachings seems to be this: "The difference between a failure and a successful person is very slight. A failure stops right there if he fails, but a successful person will never stop, even if he fails again and again."

He told his students that it is not always easy to tell the truth, but he told them to strive to tell the truth. No one in our class raised his hand when Professor Lumsden asked who had never told a lie.

He was once on a Channel 13 for a discussion about American illiteracy. When other intellectuals said the government was responsible for the high rate of illiteracy in the United States, he said "No." He explained why a problem such as illiteracy

should be solved by the people at the local level.

His explanation likely reminded the audience of the late President John F. Kennedy's inaugural address: "My fellow Americans, ask not what your government will do for you, but ask what you can do for your government; my fellow world citizens, ask not what America will do for you, but let us ask what we can do together for the freedom and peace of the world and human beings."

**HIS CONCERN** and interest in his students is exceptionally special. For example, in 1987 I invited him to my apartment at 308 Bradley, near NT, to which it belongs. He said it was the first time he visited that housing complex since he came to NT nine years earlier. I spent about \$37 for preparations for the dinner for him and my family.

Three days after he came to my dinner I found \$100 cash in my mailbox. The envelope had no name or address of the person sending it by regular mail. Professor Lumsden denied sending it, but I know he did.

When he knew my car had no window on the driver's side, he gave me his winter coat and lots of clothes for my wife, my children and myself. He gave me two pairs of almost-new, very expensive shoes. I wore his winter

coat and studied in my apartment in Dallas without turning on the heat to save on bills. I did not feel cold, thanks to his coat and clothes, when I had to run my car without a window during snowstorms and cold wind, ice and rain.

Recently I got a memo mailed from Mrs. Sharon Lumsden, who wrote: "Mr. Kim: This is the ad we discussed by phone... Good luck. I hope you get the job." Her concern was special and amazing. She had cut an advertisement from a newspaper and mailed it to help one of her husband's students find a job.

Whenever I am frustrated and do not know what to do, I always think first of Professor Lumsden and his wife.

Q. I feel that my husband is abusive. Could I be contributing to this abuse?

A. There are some patterns that women may develop that may allow them to continually take abuse. According to the book *Abused No More: Recovery for Women from Abusive or Co-Dependent Relationships* by Robert J. Ackerman and Susan E. Pickering there are some patterns that may be in a present or a past relationship.

"We received little nurturing ourselves and try to fill this unmet need by becoming a care giver especially to men who become needy."

"We believe almost nothing is too much trouble, takes too much time, or is too expensive if it will 'help' the man in our relationship."

"We are accustomed to lack of love in our relationship and are willing to wait, hope, and try harder to please."

"We are willing to take far more than 50% of the responsibility, guilt, shame, and blame in a relationship."

"We have a desperate need to control our relationships, usually because of lack of security in childhood, and mask our control of people and situations by being helpful."

"Our self-esteem is critically low, and deep down inside we do not believe we deserve to be happy or that we are as good as other people."

"In relationships we are much more in touch with our ideas of how it could be than with the reality of how it is."

"We are drawn to people with problems that need fixing or we become involved in chaotic uncertain or emotionally painful relationship ignoring our responsibility to ourselves."

"We may have a tendency toward episodes of depression which we try to forestall through the excitement provided by an unstable relationship."

"We find 'nice' people and comfortable relationship hard to identify with or be around."
