Is there a father in your family who served in the Navy - or is serving now? You can honor him for Father's Day by enrolling him in the Navy Memorial Log. The Log will be housed in a Visitors' Center which opens later this year next to the U.S. Navy Memorial in Washington, D.C. A minimum \$25 tax-deductible donation is all that's required to enroll a name in the Log, and the Memorial

will acknowledge each enrollment with a special card for presentation to the father being honored.

Authorized by Congress in 1980 and funded solely through private donations, the Memorial is located on Pennsylvania Avenue, halfway between the White House and the Capitol. The Memorial includes a large amphitheater for band concerts, 16 fountains and two waterfalls, and the statue of The Lone Sailor.

The Navy Memorial Log is a computerized repository of names which have been entered by individuals themselves, in memory of shipmates or relatives, or as commemorative gifts. The Log will be on continuous display at the Visitors Center, each entry will show an individual's name, highest rank or rate held, dates of service and date and place of birth. The Log already holds more than 140,000 names.

Specially prepared greeting card acknowledgements and Log registration forms will be sent in time for Father's Day for requests with contributions received by Friday, June 8. Contributions received after that date will be answered as quickly as possible, but delivery by Father's Day is not assured. 

I have practiced law for 35 years and had experience both as a prosecutor and as a



STUDENTS AGAINST DRIVING DRUNK

At the Cisco High School Open House on Thursday, March 8, 1990, the Cisco High School Student Council will have a Students Against Drunk Driving booth set up. The booth will have S.A.D.D. "Contract for Life" for parents and teenagers to sign. The contracts state that if the teenager has been drinking and will be driving, he will call his parents for a ride. It also states that the parent will come and get the teenager with no questions asked.

S.A.D.D. is an organization founded in 1981 to discourage driving while drunk. Since its inception, a rapid turn of events has taken place. Death due to drinking and driving declined drastically and slowly but surely teenage drinking began to decline. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reported that the age bracket 15-19 years of age once again in 1989 led all age brackets in the fewest number of recorded drunk driving deaths.

Calvary Youth Plan Trip

"Youth Spring Break Fever" will be observed Saturday, March 10, when a bus leaves Calvary Baptist Church at 12 noon for a trip to Abilene, according to John Gonzales, youth director.

Each eighth grade student must bring a 2-liter soft drink. Parents for Teens rules will apply.


1. Only junior high students and their guests will be allowed to attend the dance.

Plan Now For Severe Weather

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so that family members know what to do and where to go if the National Weather Service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornadic winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently the cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several

flashlights (and fresh batteries for both) as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area.


Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter: go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local (city or county) emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions.

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications on various weather phenomena for local governments.

OFFICIAL MEMORANDUM
STATE OF TEXAS
OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Texas is a state with diverse weather and as spring approaches so does the tendency for that weather to become violent. In 1989, Texas set an unfortunate record, having eighty-six counties named presidential disaster areas under a single declaration. That declaration was only one of three major disaster declarations for Texas last year and all were due to weather.

At least five people in our state lost their lives because of weather-related incidents and hundreds more had their lives changed dramatically when their homes were damaged or destroyed. Although it is impossible to predict exactly when and where severe weather will strike, loss of life and property damage can be reduced if citizens and governments are prepared. Along with the Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service and the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, local governments are encouraged to actively work toward a high level of preparedness by joining with schools, libraries, the media and civic groups to disseminate awareness information and to organize and take part in emergency management planning and exercises.

Therefore, I, William P. Clements, Jr., Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 11th through 17th, 1990, as:

It's A Lesson To History...

Education is freedom. For Texans, that is not just a saying but a part of our history and everyday life.

When Texas Public School's Week was first set up by the Texas Masonic Lodges, it was meant to coincide with March 2, Texas Independence Day, pointing out that freedom and education go hand in hand.

In fact, Texans cited the lack of a public education system as one of their grievances in the Texas Declaration of Independence, again, putting education on a par with freedom. Texans knew that education was crucial for future generations.

When we celebrate Texas Public Schools Week this year—March 5-9—we should remember that "Building Brighter Futures" is what Texas schools have always strived for.

While the young republic was mired in the diplomatic, economic and military problems of a new nation, it never failed to keep education as one of its goals. The Texas Congress declared that four leagues of land be designated in each county to support public schools.

The Texas public school system, as we know it today,

came into being with the signing of the Texas Common School Law of 1854. The law also created the first school districts whereby each county was divided into districts to suit their population.

A \$2 million endowment for the permanent fund provided the initial funding for the public schools system. The Texas Common School Law also provided for the distribution of the interest earned from the "Special Fund" on a per-student basis.

Facing a drastically changed state of economy in the post World War II era, Texans restructured the public schools system in 1949 to meet the needs of future generations.

The Texas Education Agency became what it is today under the Gilmer-Aiken laws of 1949. The appointed school board became an elected body of 21 members. The elected superintendent of Public Instruction changed to the State Commissioner of Education, appointed to a four year term by the State Board.

An "economic index," a more complex formula for school funding based on a local school districts ability to raise their own revenues,

replaced the per-student funding formula. The new structure also provided minimum salaries for teachers.

In the 136 years the Texas public school system has been in place, Texans have placed education as their top priority. Education is the largest single item in the state budget.

But Texans are not satisfied with that. One national poll indicates that most people believe that we are still not spending enough on education and would be willing to raise taxes to expand our public school system.

Texans continually push for educational excellence and innovations. Now serving over 3 million students, Texas public schools have seen test scores in math and reading steadily rise in the last decade.

Renewed emphasis on science, math and writing highlight the most recent reforms in Texas public schools. Texans also measure educational accomplishments, not by what we have gained in the past, but what we need in the future. That is why Texas schools are "Building Brighter Futures."

Take the opportunity to see just how bright Texas' future is with the changes occurring now in education. Visit your local schools during Texas Public Schools Week, March 5-9, 1990.

The title of this film on the Marquee will make an interesting backdrop for other weekend activities at the Theatre. On Sunday at 2 p.m. Historical Markers will be dedicated and Congressman Charles Stenholm welcomed to Eastland.

"Back To The Future Part II" has the main characters as the earlier "Back To The Future," people who can run back and forth between time and events, making some effective changes.

Michael J. Fox and Christopher Lloyd resume their roles as Marty McFly and "Doc" Emmett Brown in this Steven Spielberg presentation of a Robert Zemeckis film. Others starring are Lea Th-

ompson, Thomas F. Wilson, and also Elizabeth Shue as Jennifer.

In his last adventure, Marty learned that his unwitting interaction between his parents in 1955 had a profound effect on his life in 1985. What he and Doc Brown soon find out is that the same rule applies to the future as well. Upon their return from the year 2015, things have changed again, and time is definitely not on their side.

Texas Gas Producing Increased In December, But Down For 1989

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 468,180,306 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in December 1989, compared to the November gas production total of 454,967,152 Mcf. December's production was down five percent compared to December 1988's production of 495,043,702 Mcf.

Texas gas production for 1989 totaled 5,595,189,980 Mcf, a two percent decrease compared to the 1988 total of 5,710,867,485 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary December production were: Pecos, 28,673,344 Mcf; Zapata, 26,327,967 Mcf; Webb, 24,887,003 Mcf; Panola, 16,712,480 Mcf; Hidalgo, 15,484,470 Mcf; Crane, 12,575,825 Mcf; Hemphill, 10,009,890 Mcf; Ector, 9,528,770 Mcf; Crockett, 8,767,606 Mcf; and McMullen, 8,434,531 Mcf.

Texas gas production in December came from 184,699 oil wells and 46,248 gas wells.

Total gas production in Eastland County for December is listed as 1,017,353 mcf, above that of about half the other counties in the state.

Pharmacy Topics

No-surgery technique to dissolve gallstones has been reported from the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. Methyl tert-butyl ether (similar to a gasoline additive) can dissolve some stones within 24 hours.

Preliminary research indicates a relationship between depression and thyroid malfunction, according to a report to the American Psychiatric Association. New research may discover which comes first.

Melanoma can be totally cured if it's caught early enough, say doctors at the University of Pennsylvania.

Tubal pregnancies can be removed more easily via laparoscopy than by abdominal surgery, says a University of Southern California gynecologist. Tiny lighted tube is inserted through a small incision in the navel. Microsurgical instruments are guided through a second incision.

Researchers in Finland reported a direct relationship between smoking cigarettes and clogging of carotid arteries. Test subjects were pairs of twins, one a smoker and one not, for direct comparison.

Daily Crude Oil Production Average Decreased In December

Texas crude oil production averaged 1,675,160 barrels daily in December, according to preliminary figures released by Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance. December 1988's preliminary production was 1,837,819 barrels daily. This figure compares with preliminary November production of 1,736,623 barrels daily. Final production reports for November indicated average production at 1,756,266 barrels daily. The preliminary Texas oil production figure for December is 51,929,949 barrels, down from 52,098,686 barrels in November. December 1988's preliminary Texas oil production figure was 56,972,402 barrels.

Texas crude production for 1989 totaled 650,513,557 barrels, a six percent decrease compared to the 1988 total of 698,869,689 barrels. Hance said the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary December production were: Gaines, 3,670,192 barrels; Ector, 2,966,249 barrels; Andrews, 2,837,564 barrels; Yoakum, 2,866,823 barrels; Hockley, 2,839,120 barrels; Gregg, 2,457,623 barrels; Pecos, 2,263,930 barrels; Crane, 1,518,753 barrels; Scurry, 1,282,720 barrels; and Kent 995,192 barrels. Crude oil production in Eastland County for December was 69,920 barrels.

Q. If I found myself identifying with characteristics of co-dependency what does that mean?

A. A co-dependent relationship means that you over-identify with another person. It means that you under-identify with a healthy you. You are the reactor to a negative someone or situation. Co-dependency has been attributed to the most classic of all stacked decks, the alcoholic family. Just as alcoholism can lead to co-dependency, so can an abusive relationship. Abuse, alcoholism, and co-dependency are all related. All three cause pain. All three require denial. Relating how co-dependency and drinking interact to produce spouse abuse problems can be understood. But if you are in denial (that there is a problem), working through it can be complicated. Here are some of the patterns:
--Using violence to avoid drinking or using alcohol to avoid violence
--The abuser drinks and then believes he has a license to abuse
--The woman drinks and then becomes a target for abuse
--Drinking may occur before, during or after violence (or before and during and after)
(Although an alcoholic's drinking may conform to a predictable pattern, his violence may not. Many alcoholics drink in cycles, creating even greater uncertainty is the fact that he may not be violent every time he drinks.)
--The abuser who drinks seeks treatment for battering, but continues drinking
--The drinking abuser seeks treatment for alcoholism but continues to abuse.
(There will be more on this topic next week.)

Maynard Places 10th At Lake Spence

Area anglers are invited to come fish this Saturday at one of the top producing bass lakes in our area, Lake Proctor. All entrants are required to be a current member of the Eastland County Bass Club. Memberships will be available at the tournament headquarters in the Promotary Park area. For more information contact Tom Maynard at 629-3550.

The fishing at Proctor for those bucket mouth bass has been a little hit and miss. Some excellent strings to 23 pounds for five fish have been reported over the past two weeks. The norm seems to be around 10 pounds per string with a few fish in the seven pound range. The top baits

seem to be spinners and crawworms in shallow water. During the past tournaments held at this lake some of the top strings each year are caught, so everyone make plans now to attend.

The recent West Texas Tournament Trail event held at Lake E. V. Spence was a big success in entries with a reported 220 contestants. And finishing in 10th place was home grown angler Bobby Maynard. Bob's finish netted him \$75.00 and guaranteed him a spot in the classic to compete for a fully rigged bass boat.

I understand that these fish came from the same small point at which Bobby and myself placed tenth in the 1st 1990 Anglers Choice Northwest Team event at Spence.

Both strings from this area were just over five pounds.

The next anglers choice event for this region will be held at Hubbard Creek Lake March 18. And the next West Texas Tournaments event will be at Lake Brownwood April 1, 1990. For more information on these and other tournaments please feel free to give me call.

Hubbards black bass were less than cooperative this past weekend, with few fish to 3 1/2 pounds own jigs. A number of small fish were taken on Rat-L-Traps in the main lake area.

Brownwood bassers are wondering if all there bass are gone. Fishing has been slow with only one good report, that being a five fish limit of fifteen pounds. This string was taken on crankbaits around main lake boat houses.

The overall outlook for the 1990 bassin year looks great. Most area lakes are catching some water and placing plenty of cover just right for spawn-

ing. But lets all remember keep only what fish you can use and release the rest. At this time of year a 100% release will insure you plenty of fishing for years to come.
