## Annual Clean-Up Campaign Is Set For Week Of April 9-13

At their meeting on Tuesday, March 27th, the City Council designated the week of April 9th through April 13th as the Spring Clean-Up Week for the City of Cisco. During this week the City will be running trucks throughout the city collecting limbs, brush and other large debris set out by city residents. The landfill will be open all day, every day during the clean-up week.

As normal, residents are requested by City Hall to stack their trash and brush on the curb by the street and to have limbs cut to a size which can be handled by one man. City personnel will not go on private property to haul off trash on limbs. Also, residents are asked to please have their trash and brush out for pick-up no later than Tuesday, April 10th, so the collection of the debris can be completed by the end of the week.

City Hall will be maintaining a special "work order list" for this trash and brush pick-up effort, so any resident who has large items of trash, limbs or brush to be picked up during the clean-up campaign can call City Hall at 442-2111. Please remember in order for the work crews to complete all the collections during the

clean-up week, these special "work orders" should be called in as soon as possible. City Hall cannot accept the special pick-up requests after 5 p.m., Thursday, April 12th.

"The City Council also wanted to take this opportunity to thank all citizens for their participation in this special and important clean-up effort," said City Manager Michael Moore.

Moore went on to remind the residents of Cisco that the "growing season" is upon us and because we have been blessed with early Spring rains, everyone will need to be especially mindful to

keep their yards mowed and their property maintained. Moore stated "When it comes to caring for our property and being responsible property owners, we need to remember that we all live together in Cisco and we must be considerate of our neighbors and our community. I believe everyone can and should show pride in their neighborhood and town by simply maintaining their individual properties."

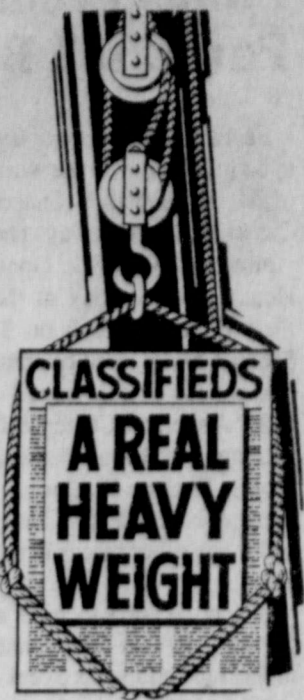
**Review On Schubert**

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## Funds From "Polo On The Paradise" Benefit Area

Eastland County continues to be involved with the work of M. D. Anderson Cancer Center in a special way. The Anderson Network Open House last Saturday at the First Baptist Church on S. Seaman had a good turnout. There were visitors from the M.D. Anderson Center, and patients and former patients from Eastland County, Brownwood, Graham, Clyde, and many other places in the area.

It was decided to have a day-long patient conference in Eastland on June 2. Speakers from M.D. Anderson will discuss topics of interest to patients, their families, and others with concerns about cancer patient support.

Invitations to this event are going out to 800 former patients of M.D. Anderson who live in Eastland County and the surrounding area.

The Conference will provide the latest in cancer information, education, coping mechanisms and employability/insurability issues.

The M. D. Anderson Center, a branch of the University of Texas, is one of the world's foremost Centers in cancer patient care, research and prevention. The Hospital's research center employs leaders in tumor and cell biology, immunology, biochemistry, genetics and other fields.

The Center is a referral hospital, so patients must be referred by their local doctors to the Houston facility. M. D. Anderson doctors then work closely with local doctors in arranging treatment for patients after they return home.

The Anderson Network and a number of other M. D. Anderson projects are being funded by the annual "Polo On The Prairie" Benefit at the Musselman Bros. Ranch near Albany.

Co-Chairmen of this exciting fund-raiser are Henry Musselman of Midland and Mary Anne McCloud of Eastland, the wife of Judge Austin McCloud. Musselman is married to the McCloud's daughter Melinda, who graduated from Eastland High School.

"Polo On The Prairie" holds a special place in the hearts of its Chairmen, as well as others who assist. Henry Musselman's mother was treated at M.D. Anderson Center for cancer for several years before her death in 1972. Her family appreciated the kindness shown her by the staff at M. D. Anderson, and wanted to show gratitude in some manner.

In the mid-1980's Musselman, the President of the Midland Polo Club, began to wonder if fund-raising Polo matches could be held on his ranch near Albany. He told his Mother-in-Law of his dreams, and she encouraged him. Mary Anne McCloud assisted in organizing the first "Polo On The Prairie" in 1987. The event had 750 attending, with \$25,000 raised.

It has since mushroomed, with 1200 guests in 1989 and \$80,000 raised for the Hospital. This year's event promises to be even more successful, with interested people who cannot attend the late-April Polo match sending contributions to raise the total.

Besides the Anderson Network, the 1990 "Polo On The Prairie" will fund a Long-Term Follow Up and Health Maintenance Clinic for Pediatric Patients, Reconstructive Surgery for Patients, Metastatic Melanoma Research, and Cancer Prevention Clinic Projects. Numerous other projects have been funded in the past.

"These programs would not be possible without this special funding," Mary Anne McCloud says.

She also explains there is

"M. D. Anderson is on the cutting edge of cancer treatment," Matthews says. He adds that the Hospital not only

gifted artist, drew the poster for the 1990 "Polo On The Prairie" invitations. David's grandfather, Don Benson, worked in Eastland County with TU Electric Co. some years back.

As Mary Anne McCloud looks back over the four years of "Polo" fundraising, she recalls many direct and spin-off benefits of the event. For one thing, members of the M.D. Anderson staff and Hospital have enjoyed coming to this area.

There have been personal interactions between them and local health-care people. New friendships have developed, and many enjoyable hours spent have been spent on the Musselman ranch.

"Henry and I really appreciate all who have made this fund-raising possible," Mary Anne McCloud says.

"With the help of our generous contributors, we hope to have even more money for research, the Anderson Network, and other projects."

## Pharmacy Topics

Experiments in tattoo removal have been done at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Dermatologists found they can erase tattoos with a ruby laser without harming the skin.

Changes in life style can not only prevent heart attacks but even unclog the arteries, say researchers at the Preventive Medicine Research Institute in Sausalito, California. Their regimen called for a vegetarian diet, moderate exercise and lots of yoga and/or meditation.

Advances in dental technology have improved the fit and function of dentures. Geriatrics expert at Tufts University Dental School recommends that seniors wearing old dentures replace them-especially since the shape of the mouth changes over time.

**Gordon Spot**

**By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—**

Now that our fruit crops apparently got the late March freeze last week, we need to turn our attention to the important cultural practice of thinning. The moisture that fell and froze on the young fruit and blossoms was the best thing that could have happened during the freezing temperatures. The ice helped protect the young fruit.

Despite conclusive evidence that thinning is beneficial for all peaches and absolutely necessary for early peaches, it is one of the most unpopular and typically poorly performed tasks by homeowners and commercial growers alike. Trees loaded with peewee sized "Springolds" or trees broken down under the weight of unthinned "Junegolds," "Sentenels" and "Redskins" are familiar to most.

Peach and plum thinning increases fruit size, improves fruit color in peaches, reduces limb breakage, allows better pest control and contributes to tree vigor. Timely thinning

is credited with adding 18% to the average size of some varieties of peaches. An increase of size from 1.9 inches to 2.25 inches in early peaches will double their worth in most markets and make the backyard grower happier to. Why

then is it so hard to accomplish adequate thinning?

There seems to be several reasons. It is psychologically hard to remove and discard immature fruit. It seems such a waste to see all the immature peaches on the ground. This seems to be an especially important factor for new growers and homeowners. But, after a few years of little peaches, or after a humid, hot year where every peach that

touches another peach has brown rot, most find it easier to take the small fruit off.

We have lost so many crops to late freezes, it is understandable for people to be conservative about thinning. Some people reason that a spring hail storm or wind storm may come and destroy part of the crop. This could happen, but if the storm is bad enough to destroy part of the crop it will probably destroy the entire crop. This is one of the risk associated with the crop.

Another reason why it is hard to thin is the time and labor required. That decision that must be made based on cost versus reward.

Timing is a key element in fruit thinning. The earlier that peaches are thinned, the greater the dividends. Bloom thinning is best for very early peaches but is unnecessary for most midseason and late peaches. It can even increase pit splits in varieties prone to that characteristic. After pit hardening, thinning doesn't do much good.

Mid and late peaches can be thinned in the dime size stage by scraping and plucking. Growers and the literature describe a procedure using a baseball bat padded with sponge rubber to thin peaches. A few firm swings shake loose a portion of the excess fruit. A stiff, rubber hose does a similar job. The procedure is fast but inadequate unless it is supplemented by handwork.

How much fruit should you leave on the trees? That is the important question rather than how many should be removed. In a good year there are four to five times more fruit set on a mature tree than is necessary for a full crop. Peaches and plums should be spaced every 6 inches on a branch. The potential of a properly trained and properly maintained mature peach tree is four bushels of small peaches or 4 bushels of large peaches. It takes 191 peaches 1 3/4 inches in diameter to make 1/2 bushel, on the other hand it takes only 79 peaches 2 1/2 inches in diameter to make a 1/2 bushel.

Q. My child seems to be having learning problems in school. As a parent what should I do about it?  
A. You have made the first step in recognizing that there may be a problem. It would be a good idea for you to talk with your child's teacher about your concerns. By having a conference you and the teacher may find new ways of helping your child. Early intervention is the best way to curb problems that may become very serious in the years to come.  
It is said that all people have learning disabilities to some degree, but when they interfere with normal progress, the teacher and parents may need to look for different ways of helping the child learn.  
Some characteristics of learning disabled children are as follows: sloppy handwriting, inability to follow instructions, poor pencil position, impulsive, poor reading or math skills, right and left confusion, distractible, allergies, forgetful, poor logic, hyperactivity, few or no friends, hyperactivity, poor judge of time and difficulty in telling time (very early or late), low frustration level, perseverates (doesn't want to stop an activity), can be destructive, disorganized, achievement may be low in one area and very high in another, clumsy (poor coordination).  
These are indicators of learning disability. The school has access to testing that can determine if the child qualifies for special instruction in a resource room. It may be that the classroom teacher can modify some instruction in the regular classroom as well.

### "THE WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD"

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service joins the National Association for the Education of young children efforts in promoting April 1-7, as THE WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD.

The purpose of the week is to build public understanding of the importance of early childhood programs in our society and to foster needed public support for such programs.

The theme this year is "Quality Child Care: Good Beginnings Never End." Today more than half of all mothers of pre-school children and more than 2/3's of all mothers of school-age children are in the labor force. These numbers are expected to grow. The number of children living in households

headed by a single parent female has also risen and will continue to grow. Having two children in child care costs a single Texas mother earning minimum wage 86% of her annual income.

Every child deserves a good beginning that provides growth and development. An estimated 30,000 Texas children under age six are left to care for themselves while their parents work.

Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent, suggest these words that can help kids. Parents, teachers, child-care providers, grandparents can start using these words that will validate a child's feelings and give him or her encouragement....

"I/We love you, That's Great!, Good job, You look terrific, What did you like best about today?, You're very special, I like your smile,

Let's talk about you, I/We want to help you, I'm/We're so proud of you, I can see why you're angry, Let's talk about it, I believe you can do it, Believe in yourself as I believe in you, Thanks for your help, You're such a good worker, You do \_\_\_ so well, Don't give up, You're so nice to be around today, Just do the best you can, How can you/we fix it?, Angels can do no more, Give it your best.... You are what matters, We can do it together, you made me happy; I hope you made you happy.
