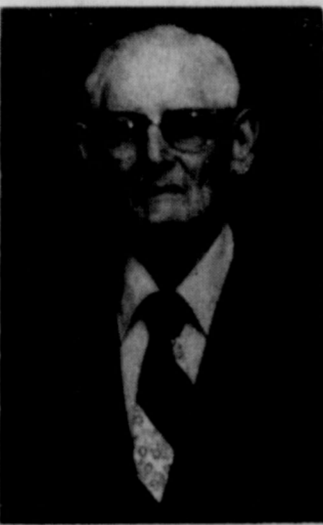

Voters To Decide Run-Offs Tuesday; Polls Open 7 To 7

Cisco voters will go to the polls Tuesday, April 10, to settle six runoff elections on the Democratic ballot and two on the Republican ballot.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Democrats will vote at the College Hotel Annex (Senior Citizens Center) and Republicans will cast their ballots at 807 West 6th Street.

In this runoff election voters must vote the same party they voted in the primary. Voters will have the opportunity to split tickets in the November 6, 1990, general election.

Republicans will vote for Commissioner of General Land Office. Candidates are Wes Gilbreath and Grady Yarbrough. The GOP will also vote for Commissioner of Agriculture and the candidates are Rick Perry and Richard McIvery.

In the Democratic runoff, the race for County Commissioner Precinct 4 has drawn the most local interest. Candidates are Reggie Pittman and Billy Bacon Jr. In the primary election, Pittman received 335 votes to Incumbent Bacon's 339 votes. In a county-wide election, Kathy Trout Hallun and Bill Miers are in the race for District Clerk.

In the state-wide election, Democrats will choose a

candidate for Governor of Texas. Candidates in the runoff race are Jim Maddox and Ann W. Richards. Also appearing on the ballot are Nikki Van Hightower and Tom Bowden for State Treasurer; Ross Sears and Bob Gammage for Justice Supreme Court Place 2; and Morris L. Overstreet and Frank Maloney for Judge Court of Criminal Appeals Place 1.

Annual Clean-Up Campaign Is Set For Week Of April 9-13

The week of April 9-13 is Spring Clean-Up Week for the City of Cisco. During this week the city will be running trucks throughout the city collecting limbs, brush and other large debris set out by city residents. The landfill will be open all day every day during the clean-up week.

As normal, residents are requested by City Hall to stack their trash and brush on the curb by the street and to have limbs cut to a size which can be handled by one man. City personnel will not go on private property to haul off trash on limbs. Also, residents are asked to please have their trash and brush out for pick-up no later than Tuesday, April 10th, so the collection of the debris can be completed by the end of the week.

City Hall will be maintaining a special "work order list" for this trash and brush pick-up effort, so any resident who has large items of trash, limbs or brush to be picked up during the clean-up campaign can call City Hall at 442-2111. Please remember in order for the work crews to complete all the collections during the clean-up week, these special "work orders" should be called in as soon as possible. City Hall cannot accept the special pick-up requests after 5 p.m., Thursday, April 12th.

The City Council also wanted to take this opportunity

to thank all citizens for their participation in this special and important clean-up effort," said City Manager Michael Moore.

Moore went on to remind the residents of Cisco that the "growing season" is upon us and because we have been blessed with early Spring rains, everyone will need to be especially mindful to keep their yards mowed and their property maintained. Moore stated "When it comes to caring for our pro-

perty and being responsible property owners, we need to remember that we all live together in Cisco and we must be considerate of our neighbors and our community. I believe everyone can and should show pride in their neighborhood and town by simply maintaining their individual properties."

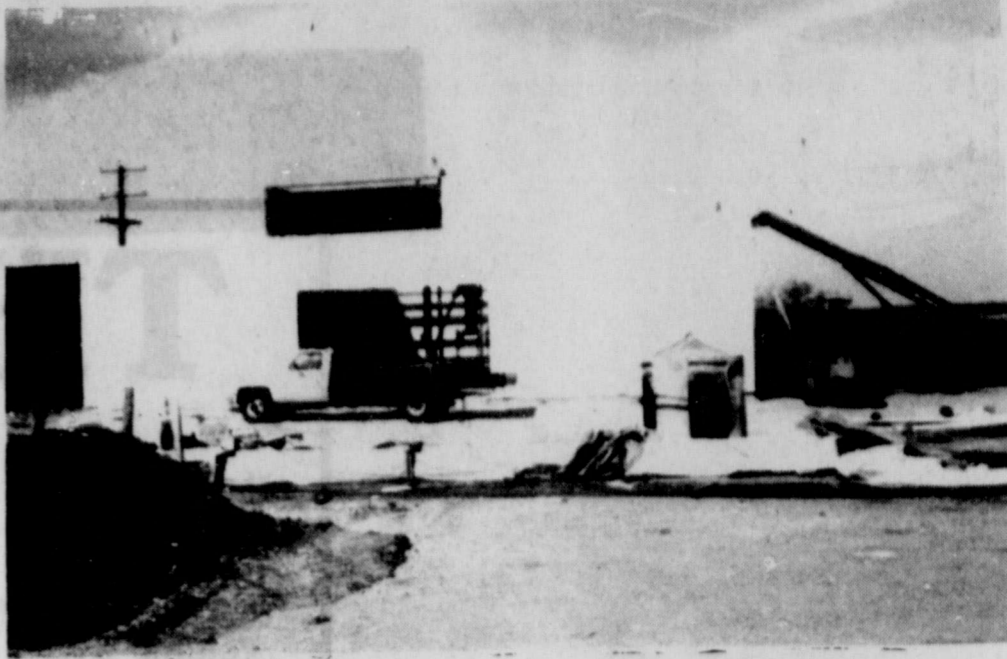

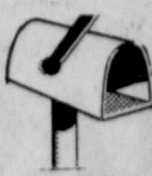

Census Earnings Won't Affect Housing Subsidy

On March 28, Hud Secretary Jack Kemp signed a Federal Register Notice excluding money earned as a census taker from income for

determining eligibility or benefits under public or assisted housing programs.

This means that people in low income, rent-subsidized or public housing developments can work for the census bureau to help in canvassing their communities without getting their rent increased because of the added income.

Hud is the third federal agency to modify their regulations to assist the bureau carrying out the 1990 census.

The department of Health and Human Resources earlier exempted income earned as a census taker when computing benefits under the aid to Families With Dependent Children Program, and the

Department of Agriculture exempted this income when computing Food Stamp program benefits.

Person interested in applying for these temporary census jobs should contact the local census bureau office or their State Employment Commission. They will be paid an hourly rate plus mileage for use of their private automobile when applicable.

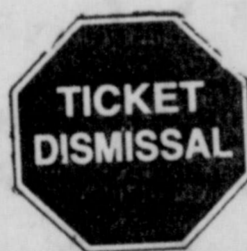

Comanche Peak Begin Operation April 3rd

Initial reactor start-up of Unit 1 of the Comanche Peak Generating Plant near Glen Rose occurred at 5:42 p.m. Tuesday (April 3), plant owner TU Electric announced.

"This means that Unit 1 is another step closer to commercial operation," said TU Electric chairman Erle Nye. "Testing is proceeding as scheduled, and the unit should be at full power during this summer's peak season, providing needed electricity to our customers."

Unit 1 will operate at low power (not more than 5 percent power) for an estimated two to three weeks during which low-power testing will be completed. The reactor was started by slowly decreasing the amount of boron, a chemical used in the cooling water to help control power levels. Reactor Power is also controlled by raising or lowering

control rods in 53 of the reactor's 193 nuclear fuel assemblies.

TU Electric officials will meet with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in Washington, D.C., later this month to discuss the company's readiness to operate Unit 1, its commitment to safety, and the unit's status. If the commissioners agree that Unit 1 is ready to proceed with testing, they will issue a full-power operating license at a later date.

A full-power license will allow operation and testing at increasing power levels, when the unit is producing 10 to 15 percent power, it will begin supplying electricity to TU Electric customers.

The NRC issued a low-power operating license for Comanche Peak Unit 1 on February 8, 1990. Fuel load was begun early the following day and was completed

on February 14. Unit 2 is scheduled for commercial operation in 1993. Each of the two Comanche Peak Units will produce 1,150,000 kilowatts, which is enough energy to serve almost half the needs of a city the size of Dallas.

Pharmacy Topics

Experiments in tattoo removal have been done at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Dermatologists found they can erase tattoos with a ruby laser without harming the skin.

Changes in life style can not only prevent heart attacks but even unclog the arteries, say researchers at the Preventive Medicine Research Institute in Sausalito, California. Their regimen called for a vegetarian diet, moderate exercise and lots of yoga and/or meditation.

Electrical charges seem to stimulate new bone growth in rats with osteoporosis, a study at the University of Pennsylvania found.

Smokers have more lower-back problems than others, according to a wide-ranging study at the Seattle Veterans Administration Medical Center. And the risk increases the longer and heavier they smoke.

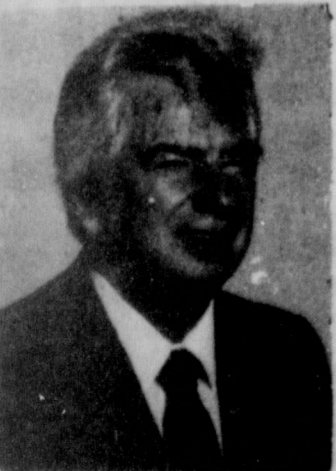

Q. My child seems to be having learning problems in school. As a parent what should I do about it?

A. You have made the first step in recognizing that there may be a problem. It would be a good idea for you to talk with your child's teacher about your concerns. By having a conference you and the teacher may find new ways of helping your child. Early intervention is the best way to curb problems that may become very serious in the years to come.

It is said that all people have learning disabilities to some degree, but when they interfere with normal progress, the teacher and parents may need to look for different ways of helping the child learn.

Some characteristics of learning disabled children are as follows: sloppy handwriting, inability to follow instructions, poor pencil position, impulsive, poor reading or math skills, right and left confusion, distractible, allergies, forgetful, poor logic, hyperactivity, few or no friends, hyperactivity, poor judge of time and difficulty in telling time (very early or late), low frustration level, perseverates (doesn't want to stop an activity), can be destructive, disorganized, achievement may be low in one area and very high in another, clumsy (poor coordination).

These are indicators of learning disability. The school has access to testing that can determine if the child qualifies for special instruction in a resource room. It may be that the classroom teacher can modify some instruction in the regular classroom as well.

Fishing Outdoors

Volunteer Fire Dept. Tournery April 29
Turkey hunters are preparing to enjoy the longest spring gobbler hunting season ever in Texas, April 7-May 6.

Don Wilson, turkey program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., said prospects are fair for the 30-day season. Dry weather caused poor turkey hatches during the past two years, so statewide we don't have as many birds as in past years. There should be plenty of birds for a decent hunting season.

In Texas, hunters are allowed to harvest two gobblers in the fall and one in the spring, or vice versa. Last fall's harvest reflected the lower numbers of birds, as hunters took an estimated 30,000 birds, compared to the long-term average of 39,000 and the 63,000 harvested in the fall of 1987.

The longer season was authorized by the Parks and Wildlife Commission in order to give hunters a better opportunity to hunt during the periods of peak gobbling activity which can vary from spring to spring, Wilson said.

While turkey populations are down, Wilson said recent rains over much of the traditional Rio Grande turkey

range make an excellent hatch a possibility this spring. "There have been widespread rains in the Rolling Plains, the Edwards Plateau and South Texas, so turkey productions is likely to improve significantly this year," said Wilson.

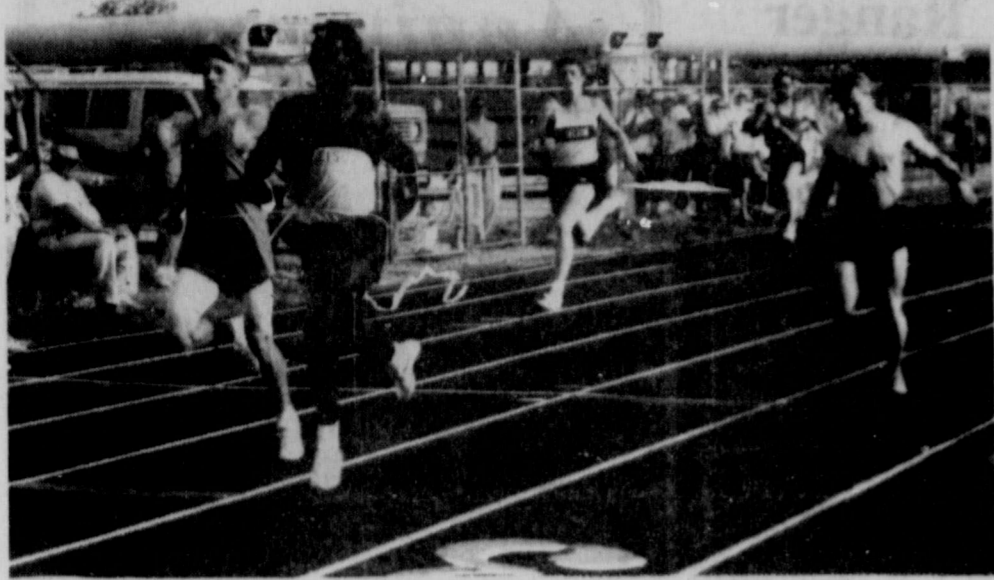

Two of the three preachers to be honored by A.C.U. soon have close Eastland ties.

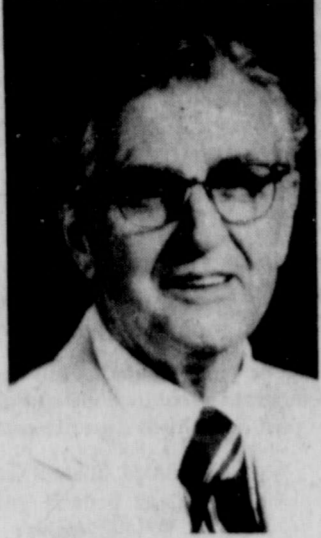
One married an Eastland County girl and another's son lives in Eastland.

The men being honored are James LeFan, of Temple, Lawrence Hazelip of Pasadena, and Carl Spain of Abilene.

James LeFan was born February 17, 1923, in Bailey and attended ACU from 1940-44 majoring in education with minors in speech and Bible.

He married Jackie Lusk, daughter of the late Jack Lusk and Zelma Lusk Greenfield, in 1944. They have three children: Mike, Kevin, and Lorin Beimer who died from cancer in 1981. Mrs. Green-

field now lives with the LeFans in Temple.

LeFan has served as associate minister of the Northside (now Jefferson) Church of Christ in San Antonio; the Missouri Street Church in Baytown; and the Western Hills Church of Christ in Temple for 39 years. He retired from the pulpit in July 1989, but is still faithfully preaching all over the country.

Currently, he is a member of the Board of Development at ACU. He has served as president of the Lion's Crippled Children Foundation, Inc., chairman of Leon Valley chapter of the March of Dimes, president and board member of the Bell County Rehabilitation Center, president of the Alumni Association at ACU, and as co-chairman of the board of directors for the "Rose Garden" house in Temple for the brain damaged, mentally retarded and mentally ill.

LeFan has received special recognition from the governor of Texas for his work with the mentally retarded. He also was honored as ACU's Alumni Citation Winner in 1973.

Lawrence Hazelip was born July 15, 1912 in Edmonson

County, Kentucky. He attended Western Kentucky University from 1930-35 and graduated with a degree in school administration and supervision. He married Barbara Carey in February of 1937; they have two sons, Donald, an Eastland CPA and Jon.

During the last years of his college career, he taught school. After graduation, he worked for B/G Sandwich Shop in Chicago, Ill., and for Household Finance Corporation loan company, later leaving to preach for the Central Avenue Church of Christ in Valdosta, Ga.

Hazelip also has preached for the Shaw Street congregation in Pasadena; the Garden Oaks church in Houston; then returned to Pasadena where he has remained since 1970 working the Watters Road Church of Christ.

Robert Carl Spain was born in Chattanooga, Tenn., in 1917 and attended ACU from 1936-38, graduating with a BA Degree in Bible; he continued his education at Southern Methodist University where he received a masters degree. He married Mildred McClung in 1938; they have two daughters, Carla Trammell and Claudette Rogers.

His preaching career be-

gan when he succeeded his close friend, Batsell Barrett Baxter, as the preacher for the congregation in Paducah, Texas. He then preached for the church in Auburn, Ala., and for the church in Irving, (now the MacArthur Boulevard Church of Christ) while attending SMU. He went on to teach at Harding University's Bible department and to preach for the College Church while residing in Searcy, Ark.

From 1947-51, Spain served as associate minister of the Broadway church of Christ in Lubbock, and established the first Bible Chair at Texas Tech University.

In 1954, he came to ACU to teach undergraduate courses in Bible, and after obtaining his doctorate in theology from Southwestern Theological Seminary, taught graduate level courses. He preached for the Graham Street Church (later becoming the Hillcrest congregation) and served interim ministries for 16th and Vine and the Westgate congregations in Abilene.

Spain retired from ACU in 1984, and has remained as a professor emeritus. He also has served as a staff writer for 20th Century Christian magazine; department editor for the Christian Bible Teacher; past president of the southwest section of the American Academy of Religion; and

authored volume 14 of the Living Word Commentary of the Letter of Paul to Timothy.

He was the recipient of the 20th Century Christian magazine's Christian Educator of the Year in 1978; awarded ACU's Caring Award in 1987; and this year received a Serving Award from ACU.

He currently serves as director of ACU's preacher placement service and works to recruit Bible majors for the university.

Runaway Teen Killed In Accident

A 14-year old runaway from the Big Country Boys' Ranch in Cisco has been identified as the victim of an accident near Thurber.

The body of Joe Marquez, originally from Big Spring, was identified by another auto theft suspect, Sonny Jericho Reeves, 17, of Weatherford.

Reeves, who ran away from the boy's home with Marquez, was arrested and charged and third-degree felony theft. He is in the Parker County jail in lieu of \$15,000 bail. A third runaway, who was not identified, has not been located.

The three youths ran away from the boy's home late Wednesday, March 28, and are suspected of stealing a vehicle in Eastland before making their way to Weatherford, according to investigators.

In Weatherford, residents of an apartment complex reported seeing someone trying to steal a vehicle around 4 a.m. Thursday. An officer investigating the report saw two suspects in separate pickups.

When the pickups split, the officer followed the truck driven by Marquez onto Interstate 20, chasing it west at speeds of up to 100 mph. Marquez ran onto the median in an attempt to pass two trucks that were traveling side by side, but did not realize the median ended at an overpass just ahead, police said.
