Because of an article he had read in your column, he carried an organ donor card in his wallet. The Lord took our precious son 10 days later, but we were comforted knowing that Michael gave two blind people the gift of sight, and a young father who had been on a kidney machine for three years is now living a normal life.

Abby, please let your readers know how to visit their organs after death—Michael's father. Dear Father: My heart goes out to you and your family on the loss of your beloved son. May I offer this beautiful essay written by Robert N. Test:

To Remember Me
At a certain moment a doctor will determine that my brain has ceased to function and that, for all intents and purposes, my life has stopped.

When that happens, do not attempt to instill artificial life into my body by the use

of a machine. And don't call this my "deathbed." Call it my "bed of life," and let my body be taken from it to help others lead fuller lives.

Give my sight to a man who has never seen a sunrise, a baby's face or love in the eyes of a woman.

Give my heart to a person whose own heart has caused nothing but endless days of pain.

Give my blood to the teenager who has been pulled from the wreckage of his car, so that he might live to see his grandchildren play.

Give my kidneys to one who depends on a machine to exist from week to week.

Take my bones, every muscle, every fiber and nerve in my body and find a way to make a crippled child walk.

Explore every corner of my brain. Take my cells, if necessary, and let them grow so that someday a speechless boy will shout at the crack of a bat and a deaf girl will hear the sound of rain against her windows.

Burn what is left of me and scatter the ashes to the winds to help the flowers grow.

If you must bury something, let it be my faults, my weaknesses and all prejudice against my fellowman.

Give my soul to God. If by chance you wish to remember me, do it with a kind deed or word to someone who needs you. If you do all I have asked, I will live forever.

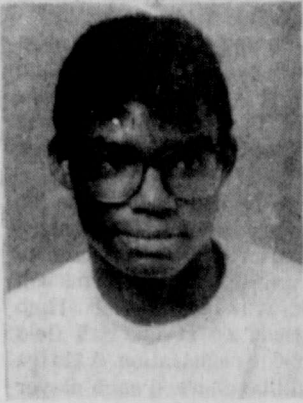
The public is invited to revival services May 2 through 6 at 7:30 nightly at Primera Iglesia Bautista, the Spanish speaking First Baptist Church.

Daniel Castro of Andrews is the evangelist and there will be special music.

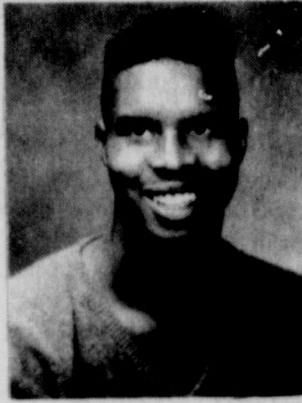

The Pleasant Hill Cemetery Association will hold its annual meeting, May 7, 1990 at 7:30 p.m. at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. All persons interested in this cemetery are invited to attend.

14th Annual Cisco Cemetery Association Meeting Held

The Cisco Cemetery Association held their 14th annual meeting on April 26. President Anton White presided over the meeting. Also attending the meeting were Vice-President Steve Clary, Secretary/Treasurer Trixie Whately, Treasurer Louise Cooper, Velma Joyner, Clara White, Isabelle Robledo, Millie Penn, J.T. Richardson, James W. Johnston, and Burnice Gor.

Trixie Whately gave a financial report for the association. She reported that the association had a total balance on hand of \$192,940.11.

Mr. White stated that the association was formed in 1976 and started with nothing. Since that time there has been 1,009 burials. Starting At the beginning of March the grass has been mowed weekly, and is being taken care very well.

It was time for the election of officers and there was a motion to keep the current officers by acclamation.

There was a discussion of planting more trees around the grounds of the cemetery, everyone felt it was a good idea but were not sure as to what type of tree should be planted.

Administrator Answers Charges Against Hospital

A paid political advertisement was published in the weekend edition, April 29, 1990, of The Cisco Press. Prior to this, a letter was mailed to each person that signed the rollback petition for the election held January 20, 1990, according to Don Henry, E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital administrator.

"The letter and the paid political announcement both made erroneous allegations directed toward the Board, and especially previous Boards, and the hospital. It appears that both publications are attempting to mislead the public and the underlying intent is to close the hospital," Mr. Henry said.

There were two bond issues on the hospital, he said. "The Series 'A' bonds were in the original issue amount of \$120,000 and were paid off with interest in 1987. The Hospital District made interest payments only on the 'B' bonds (original issue amount of \$480,000) until 1987/88, when the 'A' issue was paid. At this point, the District started regular payments on the 'B' bonds. The District is current on payments against the 'B' issue. The total amount owed on the 'B' bond issue original issue amount was \$480,000, but that principle has reduced to under \$435,000. The total amount the District will pay (with interest) when the 'B' bonds mature from 1990 until the year 2009 will be \$723,000. If the District can retire the bonds earlier, interest costs could be reduced considerably," according to the hospital administrator.

"The amount of \$135,000 paid to Memphis, Tennessee Corporation (United Hospital Corp.) over a seven month period was actually a standard fund transfer to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital from the Cisco Hospital District. The amount paid to UHC was \$44,000, which covered administrative salary, management fees, and office supplies, he added.

In August of 1989, a group of citizens entered the hospital with a list of records they demanded to see. They were advised that it would take several days to get the records together. They were provided everything they requested, including all bank statements. Salary records, payroll records and personnel files are protected under the Privacy Act and were not provided. The Conference Room at the hospital was provided to this group in their review. There was no refusal to provide bank statements, but it did take several days to collect them, according to Mr. Henry.

The 1989/90 budget did show a deficit because the budget reflects operating revenue only and property tax or ad valorem tax is non-operating revenue. The deficit of \$254,200 is the revenue the increased property tax would have generated had the rollback failed. If the rollback had not passed, the budget would have balanced, the administrator said.

The hospital is audited each year by a reputable C.P.A. firm, according to Mr. Henry.

Elections To Be Saturday

Cisco voters will go to the polls Saturday, May 5, to elect two members to the CISD School Board, two members to the Cisco City Council, three members to the CJC Board of Regents, and three at-large members to the board of directors of the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital.

Place 4 school board trustee Incumbent Yolanda Anderson is the only unopposed candidate.

Five people are running for Place 5. They are Ron Patton, Randy Taylor, Rena Autrey Midkiff, Yvonne McFadin and Danny Schaefer.

Running for Place 5 on the City Council are Incumbent Bural Chambers and Edd McGough. Place 6 candidates are Incumbent John Muller and Jimmy Griffin.

On the Cisco Junior College board of regents, Place 4 is being sought by Carolyn Page and Ronnie Ledbetter. Place 5 Incumbent Gary W. Harris is being challenged by Wayne Brock and Bobby Rains.

Six people are running for three at-large seats on the

board of directors of the Cisco Hospital District. They are Incumbent Emmett Rich, Newt A. Hagan, Dan Dixon, Ervin E. Addy, Jr., Carrol W. Stansell and W.B. (Bill) Philpott.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the Corral Room.

School Financing Crisis: County Schools Report of Status of Monies Available

As of May 1, 1990, the Texas Supreme Court will comply with their judgement in Edgewood vs. Kirby by shutting off State funding to Texas Public Schools. The State Legislature have been in special sessions since February 28th in an attempt to restructure the school financing, but both sessions have failed to produce a bill that was satisfactory to both Legislators and the Governor. In the latest attempt, a sales tax increase, Governor Clements vowed to veto the bill on Monday, April 30th and at this time the 2/3 vote of both House and Senate to override said veto had not been reached.

So how will this "State Shut-Off Of Funds" affect Eastland County schools? In speaking with the three superintendents, the following questions were asked of each and their individual reply follow.

1. WHEN AND IF THE TEXAS SUPREME COURT SHUTS OFF FUNDS TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS, WILL YOU BE ABLE TO REMAIN OPEN UNTIL THE END OF THIS SCHOOL YEAR?

Yes, we will remain open.
2. ARE YOUR RESERVE

FUNDS ADEQUATE ENOUGH TO CONTINUE THROUGH THE SUMMER AS FAR AS TEACHER/STAFF SALARIES AND MAINTENANCE OF SCHOOL CAMPUSES?

Yes.
3. DO YOU FORESEE PROBLEMS WITH SCHOOL STARTING IN THE FALL, EVEN IF THE LEGISLATURE PASSES A BILL THIS SUMMER IN COMPLIANCE WITH EDGEWOOD VS. KIRBY?
No.
4. DO YOU AGREE WITH GOVERNOR BILL CLEMENTS' PLAN TO

VETO THE TAX BILL IN LIEU OF HIS ALTERNATE FUNDING THROUGH CUTS IN OTHER STATE DEPARTMENTS?

No. They started off the year 500 million in the hole through paper shuffling last year.

5. DO YOU FEEL THE LEGISLATURE AND GOVERNOR CLEMENTS WAITED TOO LONG TO BEGIN PLANS FOR RESTRUCTURING SCHOOL FINANCING?

No. Schools are always last. It's the biggest expenditure of State Funds, but they always wait to discuss it's financing.

6. DO YOU FEEL THE EDUCATION OF TEXAS WILL SUFFER BECAUSE OF THE SUPREME COURT DECISION OR IS FINANCIAL RESTRUCTURING NEEDED IN MOST PUBLIC SCHOOLS?

Yes. It was needed.

7. DO YOU, AS AN EDUCATOR, FEEL THAT MORE MONEY IS THE ANSWER TO BETTER SCHOOLS IN TEXAS?

No. [locally] more parental involvement, less extracurricular activities during the week, and higher standards.

[statewide] less t.v., more homework; more calculators and computers, drop-out programs, more scientific equipment, some type of academic excellence awards and better enforcement of compulsory attendance laws with the installation of juvenile or truant officers funded by county or state which has the authority to enforce the law.

The second interview was with Superintendent Keith Watkins of Eastland, who answered all questions and had some other comments.

QUESTION 1: Yes. The local funds are available to finish this term without a problem.

QUESTION 2: Yes. We can maintain the staff and do the usual work around the buildings.

QUESTION 3: I think all the schools would have problems getting started next fall if the Legislature doesn't pass a bill that will give adequate funding. If they get the funding into compliance, I see no problem with next fall.

QUESTION 4: I don't agree with the Governor's plan to veto the bill to fund education by raising the sales tax. I don't think his partial funding from other sources will work.

QUESTION 5: Yes. I feel they could have been more prompt on this. But many

times packages on Education are the last thing to be funded. QUESTION 6: No, I don't think Education will suffer in the long run because of this ruling. I think it will be improved - but it will cost more money. Eastland would get more state funding by the restructuring - at least under the bulls I've seen.

QUESTION 7: No, money is not the only answer - but it is part of it. It has been frustrating in the past to have new programs mandated - but mandated without state funds. I hope this new plan would provide the funds.

In commenting on the situation in Austin, Watkins said: "I know the folks down there have a difficult job. I doubt if there are enough votes to override the Governor's veto - something else will have to be worked out. It will be interesting to see what!"

The third interview was with Superintendent Ray Saunders of Cisco, who also took time out to answer questions:

QUESTION 1: Yes, we have the funds to complete this school term.

QUESTION 2: Yes. We have the funds to do everything necessary this summer.

QUESTION 3: We can start school next fall without more state funding, but we would need help. We could probably run the school on through

October. If the state complies with the Edgewood Vs. Kirby ruling I see no problem.

QUESTION 4: No, I don't agree with Gov. Clements' plan. I'm not crazy about the Senate Bill - It is not what I wanted - but the Senate Bill sure beats a veto.

QUESTION 5: Yes, I certainly do.

QUESTION 6: Not if the State will address it. I believe all the schools in Eastland County would benefit from the Edgewood Vs. Kirby ruling, so in the long run it would help.

QUESTION 7: No, money isn't the answer to everything, but most of the schools can improve their programs with more funding. Every school would increase the curriculum with more money to do so. I think Cisco would gain from a restructuring, and it would help us build more into a quality program.

Saunders added that he did not know all the legal implications of events taking place now in Austin, but would be watching with great interest.

The latest word was that State Comptroller had a plan for advance state funding for the schools.

According to a telephone interview with Rep. Jim Parker, as of 4:00 p.m. Monday the Governor had not vetoed the Senate bill. The Senate had not gathered enough votes to pass the "Early Payment of Funds" nor a 2/3 majority to override the certain veto.

As soon as the Governor vetoed the bill, they will begin Wednesday in another session with a provision which includes no tax increase and would be funded by taking current funds from Tax Rich schools and giving that to the Tax Poor Districts. And example given was: An estimated 60 million from Dallas ISD.

50 million from Houston ISD. 21 million from Austin ISD.

Parker felt confident that this provision would be clarified and passed by both House and Senate and signed by the Governor by the first of next week. Checks for payment are not due til the 25th of the month, and all monies should be free and clear by then. There will be more details on this new provision in this week-end edition.

A \$15 fee will be charged each player to cover insurance and provide baseball caps. If two or more players register from the same family the charge will be \$10 for each additional player. 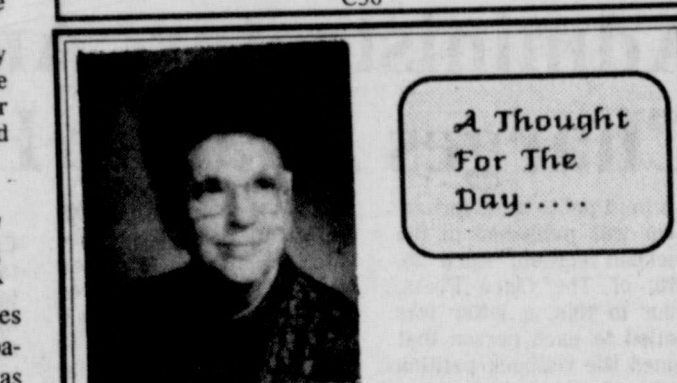

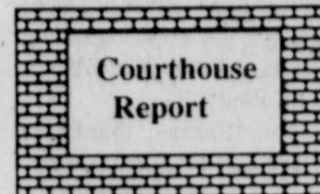

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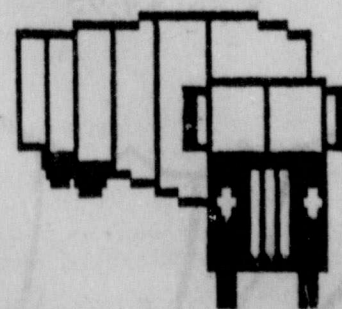

("Brazos Electric"), a wholesale generation and transmission electric utility, and the following Brazos Electric member retail distribution electric utilities ("Members"): Bartlett Electric Cooperative, Inc., Bellalls Electric Cooperative, Inc., B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc., Comanche County Electric Cooperative Assn., Denton County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc., Erath County Electric Cooperative Assn., Fort Belknap Electric Cooperative, Inc., Gate City Electric Cooperative, Inc., Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Assn., Hill County Electric Cooperative, Inc., J-A-C Electric Cooperative, Inc., Johnson County Electric Cooperative Assn., McLennan County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Mid-South Electric Cooperative Assn., Navarro County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Navasota Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., Tri-County Electric Cooperative, Inc., and Wise Electric Cooperative, Inc., have filed a Petition for Waiver with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC"). In the petition, assigned Docket No. 9453, Brazos Electric requests waiver of the obligation to sell retail power to qualifying cogeneration and small power production facilities ("QFs") and the Members seek a waiver of their obligations to purchase power directly from QFs. These obligations are contained in PUC Substantive Rule 23.66(d)(1)(A) and 23.66(d)(2), as well as 18 C.F.R. 292.303(a) and (b).

The proposed waivers will not impair the ability of QFs to sell electric capacity and energy or to purchase electric capacity and energy. In the territory served by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members (63 counties throughout Texas), Brazos Electric will assume the obligation for all purchases of QF generated electricity and the Members will assume all obligations for sales to QFs of capacity and energy. Only duplicate obligations which would otherwise be applicable to both Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members are proposed to be eliminated.

Reciprocal waivers of the type requested by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members have recently been granted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The proposed waivers will not discourage cogeneration and small power production. Members avoided cost can never be more than Brazos Electric's avoided cost because the Members purchase all of their wholesale power requirements from Brazos Electric.

The proposed waivers are subject to approval by the PUC. An Original Petition for Waiver specifying in detail each proposed waiver, the reasons waivers are being requested, and the effect of waiver is available at the general offices of Brazos Electric in Waco, Texas, and at an office of each of its above-listed Members.

Use do-it-yourself home health tests with the droppers, test tubes and other equipment that come with them. These supplies are usually specially calibrated to give more accurate results.

To reduce the nausea and vomiting accompanying chemotherapy, doctors have found good results with a new drug, ondansetron. Report from Boston University School of Medicine, leader of the eight-university trial, indicates an absence of side effects.

Visual disorders may be the first symptoms of Alzheimer's, say scientists at Wills Eye Hospital in Philadelphia. Though normal eye examinations show no problem, the patients complain of difficulty in reading and depth perception.

To improve the survival of stroke victims, doctors at Allegheny General Hospital in Pittsburgh drain fluid from spaces in the brain to reduce pressure, and then repair the aneurysm.

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Ten thousand "Texas Wildflower" school curriculum kits designed to teach fourth graders the importance of preserving the environment and the natural beauty of Texas are being shipped to the state's public schools in conjunction with Earth Day, USA.

The curriculum packets were developed cooperatively by the Texas State Teachers Association and the National Wildflower Research Center with financial assistance from National Computer Systems of Minnesota, Hart Graphics of Austin, the National Education Association in Washington D.C., and Simpson Paper Company. United Parcel Service is shipping the kits free of charge to Texas schools.

The two-year project was launched in 1988 as a tribute to former First Lady Bird Johnson on the occasion of her 75th Birthday Jubilee Celebration.

Working with the Wildflower Center, TSTA members developed a curriculum that would meet the criteria standards of the

Texas Education Agency and would incorporate the essential elements in science, social studies, language arts, art and math.

Mrs. Johnson said she applauds the introduction of a wildflower study unit for the state's fourth graders.

"Arousing their interest and providing them with the natural world and to human society will provide an invaluable resource," Mrs. Johnson said. "Our generation can feel confident these young people will grow up to be a part of nature instead of apart from it."

TSTA President Ollie Besteiro praised the former First Lady for her legacy of enriching the natural environment with renewing flowering beauty across the American landscape.

"I think that it's appropriate that we send these packets to our schools at a time when the wildflowers abound along our Texas roadways," Besteiro said. "It will be a 'living legacy' to Lady Bird and her life's work."

In August of 1989, a group of concerned citizens met with the hospital and requested to inspect the records (according to the hospital charter, the records are open for public inspection). This request was refused at first, but after a few days the group was allowed to see a small amount of the bank statements. Requests to view the bank statements for 1988 and seven (7) months of 1989 were refused and only two (2) months of bank statements were furnished.

The present Hospital Board on September 30, 1989, adopted a budget for the current physical year which has a deficit of \$254,200.00.
